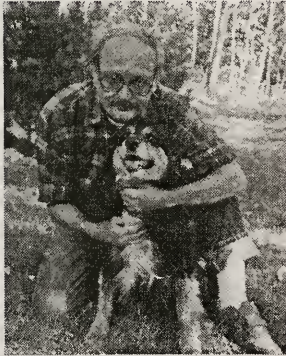


Marilyn J. Huff

The exemption would, in each case, be granted for as long as the system is operational following the approval of an application by the Selectmen. An application (certifying the system is operational) must be submitted by April 15th to be considered for that tax year.

- Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund – established 1991
- Emergency Rescue Equipment Capital Reserve Fund – established in 1995

These actions include:

1. Establishment of a national program requiring reductions of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions while protecting the U.S. economy.
2. Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and investment.

In addition, the Town of Shelburne encourages New Hampshire citizens to work for emission reductions within their communities and we ask our Selectmen to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, to the President of the United States and to the declared candidates for those offices.

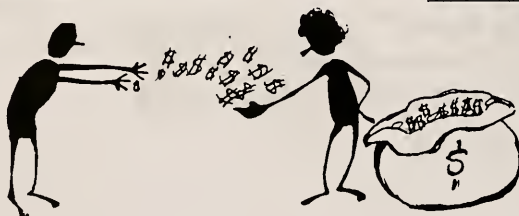

DEPARTMENTAL REVENUES

Under the Municipal Budgeting System, each municipality must budget using gross expenses by department. The associated revenues are not permitted to be deducted to reflect the net operating expenses. In order to clarify the interrelationship of the departments' revenues and expenses, the following information is being offered.

1. **Executive** - This budget includes all of the Town's copier expenses. When used for non Town business, the Town receives compensation. The Town also receives reimbursements for certain other expenses such as public hearing expenses. For 2007, this totaled \$160.03. Rebates of \$30.00 were also received. Miscellaneous reimbursements totaled \$16.00.
2. **Elections, etc.** - The associated revenues include fees from motor vehicle registrations, dog registrations, and the UCC's. For 2007, these fees totaled \$1,548.50. Fees for checklists totaled \$100.00. Fees for dog fines totaled \$27.00.
3. **Financial** - Costs of registering liens are recovered in the liening process. For 2007 fees for purchasing the assessing data base totaled \$39.00.
4. **Revaluation of Property** - There were no associated revenues year.
5. **Legal** - For 2007 \$675.00 in legal fees were reimbursed.
6. **Personnel Adm.** - There were no associated revenues this year.
7. **Planning** - The associated revenues include fees from the applications for site plan review, subdivision, and any associated expenses. For 2007, these items totaled \$1,803.46.
8. **Buildings**- Several donations were received for use of the Town Hall. In 2007, this totaled \$300.00.
9. **Cemeteries** - This budget is partially offset by the interest received on Cemetery Perpetual care trust funds and burial fees. In 2007, this amount was \$269.99. \$ 700.00 was received from burial fees and 4 cemetery lots were sold for \$2,600.00.
10. **Insurance** - This budget is partially offset by the credit received due to past history. In 2007 received a credit from workers comp of \$897.00.
11. **Regional Assoc.** - There were no associated revenues.
12. **Police** - There were no associated revenues this year.
13. **Ambulance** - Gorham does receive revenues against their gross expenses. Our fee is calculated based upon actual usage, and their net operating expenses.
14. **Fire** - The Fire Department receives 50% reimbursement for fire warden training, forest fire fighting. Reimbursements for rescue expenses and insurance money from accidents are also received. In 2007, this amount was \$ 2,604.81.
15. **Building Insp.** - The building inspector's salary is totally reimbursed by the associated fees. In 2007, this totaled \$1,587.00.

16. **Dispatch** - Our fee is calculated based upon actual historical usage. (running 3 year average). There were no associated revenues.
17. **Emergency Management** - In 2007, \$59.98 was received in rebates on glucose meters that were purchased.
18. **Highway** -This department does receive occasionally income from plowing and sanding and from the highway block grant from the state based upon the number of miles of town roads maintained; and some other smaller misc. items. In 2007, the Block Grant totaled \$11,485.41 Revenues for sanding were received that totaled \$85. A reimbursement of \$40.00 was also received.
19. **Solid Waste** - This department receives income from recycling, and fees for disposal of various items, from the sale of PAYT bags and from the sale of recyclables In 2007, \$806.25 was received from fees; \$6,955.00 was received from the sale of bags; and \$2,415.40 from the sale of recyclables.
20. **Health, Welfare** - There were no associated revenues.
21. **Parks** - The development and some of the park maintenance is supported by the FOSR. In 2007 FSOR installed playground equipment and purchased bark for a base.
22. **Library** - The library received many gifts of books. The Library is authorized to receive monetary gifts. In 2007 they received several donations of books.
23. **Memorial Forest** - In 2007 \$502.50 was withdrawn from the Town Forest Account to pay for cutting in Town Forest and the purchase of a sign.
24. **Conservation** - All expenses except for dues are funded from their savings account.
25. **Principal** - Long-term note - There were no associated revenues.
26. **Interest** - Long-term note - There were no associated revenues.
27. **TAN interest**. - There were no associated revenues.
28. **Land use change fees** - This money can be used by vote of the Town, to offset a special warrant article. In 2007, no funds were available to be used.
29. **Special Revenue Fund** - Funds from fees and sale of recyclables are deposited in this fund. The use of this money must be authorized by town meeting. No money was authorized in 2007.



SHELBURNE TRUST FUNDS

Cemetery Perpetual Care - There are 47 individual funds managed as one common trust fund.

Library Trust Fund - The Trustee of Trust Funds now hold the trust fund for the Library.

Capital Reserve Funds - There are nine active capital reserve funds. These are Cemetery Maintenance, Cemetery Equipment, Heavy Highway Equipment, Fire Truck, Town Road Paving, New Storage Building, Revaluation, Peabody Farm Museum and Fire Department Equipment

Expendable Trust Funds - There are four expendable trust funds . They are the Fire Mutual Aid Expendable Trust, Household Hazardous Waste, Town Vehicle Maintenance and the Sand/Gravel Expendable Trust Fund.

Special Trust Fund - There is one special Trust Fund - the Wheeler Cemetery Fund established by a gift of \$30,214.38 to the Town from the estate of Joanne B. Harriman.

GRS Cooperative School District Funds - The Shelburne Trustees of Trust Funds were chosen at the 2005 School District Meeting to manage the 5 capital reserve funds and 4 scholarship funds for the GRS Cooperative School District.

Detailed accounts have been delivered to the Selectmen, Auditors, Attorney General and The Department of Revenue Administration. A summary of all accounts is listed below.

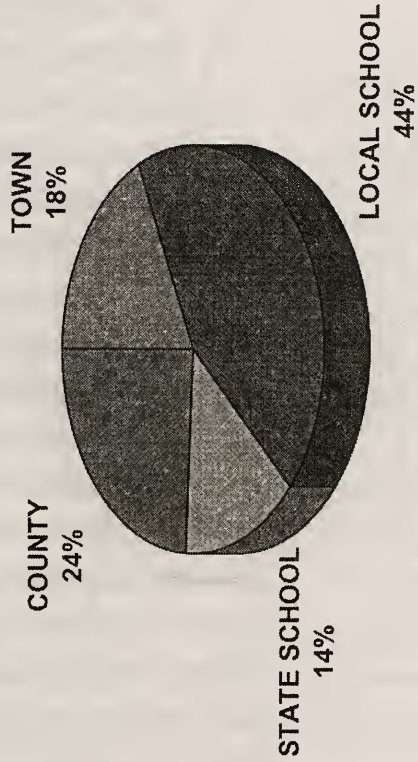

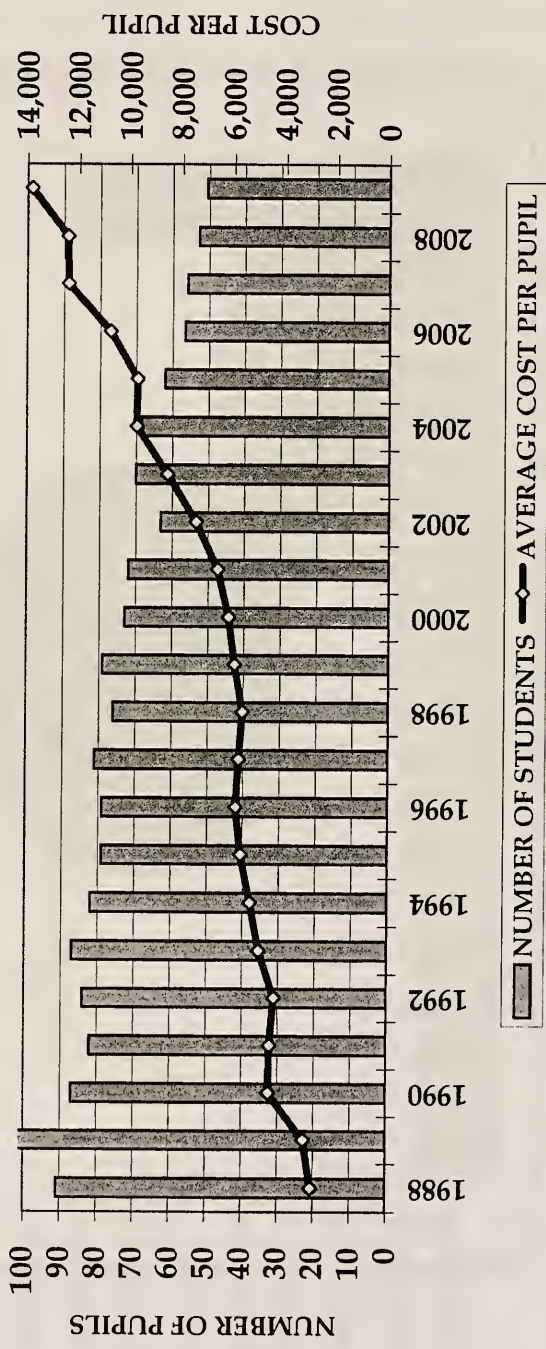
**TOWN OF SHELburnE

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Board of Selectmen has had a busy year in trying to meet the ever-changing challenges of a small town in New Hampshire. The Selectmen attended 30 posted meetings, as well as a number of other Board meetings.

The Board of Selectmen continued to learn more about the change in Town Clerk position. Some citizens still find the new hours challenging but on the whole things are going well. However, due to increased demands from the state and federal governments in regards to elections and document security the Board has found that the job takes more hours than anticipated. In 2008 the hours will be restructured to allow time to work these other matters and window hours on Wednesdays, which are not used much, will be discontinued. This will leave Tuesdays – 11 AM to 3PM and Thursdays – 3 – 6 PM for times to register vehicles.

The Board dealt with several abatement requests following the revaluation of property in 2006. Some were granted and some were denied. One case will proceed to the Board of Land and Tax Appeal.

A digital mobile radio was purchased for Police Officer Bill Weichert. He is now able to effectively communicate with other law enforcement units in our area and this helps to maintain his safety at all times.

The Board has met several times with Fire Chief Tom Hayes and the Fire Department Officers to improve communication and to keep abreast of the needs of the Fire Department. After a very productive meeting in June, the Board approved the purchase of a 1988 used pumper to replace the 1973 Farrar. The Board plans to continue these meetings in 2008.

The Board has also met periodically with Ken Simonoko to address the needs of the Public Works Department. Each year the Board reviews and updates the Heavy Equipment replacement schedule and the

paving schedule. The replacement of the 1993 plow truck is still scheduled for 2010 and the cost still continues to rise.

The Board began to address the painting of the inside of the office addition. The bathrooms were painted in December and more of the rooms will be done in 2008. The colors are being chosen from a Historic Color Chart.

During the year the Board met with Time Warner Cable to discuss their use of the town's right of way on North Road to lay fiber optic cable. This led to a discussion of a franchise agreement with the town. The Board has negotiated a draft agreement to cover part of the town in 2009. A public hearing on the draft agreement will be held in 2008.

The town meeting in 2007 voted to name the portion of the Town Forest near the Maine border the William "Bill" Hastings Memorial Forest. A sign has been made and the dedication will take place in the spring of 2008.

Once again Shelburne's town report won first prize for town's with population under 700 in New Municipal Association Town Report Contest.

The Board has found budget development for 2008 a challenge. Health insurance and retirement continue to rise and energy costs have soared. The town budget increased by 9.7% but the Board strongly feels that the town's needs must be realistically addressed and therefore the town budget can not always be sacrificed at the expense of other budgets. The Board is also committed to funding Capital Reserve Funds and Expendable Trusts which help to smooth out large expenditures

Lastly, the Board would like to thank Selectman George Corriveau for serving the town as a Selectman for 7 years. His winning smile and can do attitude will be missed.

Well, we finished our first full year at the town hall. Most folks are getting into the swing of things and managing to get here when I have office hours. Change is hard. Speaking of change, check the bottom of this report, as I am discontinuing Wednesday window hours.

This year I have started to develop a Disaster Preparedness Plan for town records. It is a time consuming process, but I will eventually finish it. I am using (free) internet software provided by the Northeast Document Conservation Center.

I am still working with Dr. Douglas Teschner, Assistant Secretary of State in the Vitals Preservation Grant. This year they provided us with a dehumidifier/air conditioner. Also, we have started planning the preservation and microfilming of our last two books by Browns River. You may remember that in the past, you paid for the preservation of the other books. This grant money is being supplied by the State. It is the monies they have collected over the years from marriage, birth and death certificates.

Speaking of vitals, Civil Unions were signed into law and will become effective on January 1st, 2008. Come into the office if you need any information.

Another project for this year is the technical data for the 2010 census. Jo and I started working on it during the last week of 2007.

We spent December getting ready for the Presidential Primary. We have three more elections to look forward to in 2008. Don't forget, if you are "Undeclared", and you want to remain "Undeclared" you must see the Supervisors of the Checklist after you vote and request to be put back on the "Undeclared" list. You also must sign a card or list that the supervisors have made available to you. Otherwise, you will become a member of the party in which you voted.

Most of our (Town Office) duties are driven by state statute. In other words "we don't make the laws, we administer them." Other responsibilities are a result of custom, such as receiving telephone inquiries dealing with anything from titles, registrations, marriage licenses, dog licenses, taxes, assessments, cell towers, elections, etc. It is often the clerk's/deputy's job (or Town Office employee) to help the public find answers.

The Town Clerk/Deputy is the receiver and recorder of the town's archives, and is charged with preservation of town records. The office is responsible for:

- administration of all elections
- recording proceedings of annual and special meetings
- recording of land records including deeds, mortgages, liens, surveys, and other legal documents
- filing, indexing and certification of all vital records including births, deaths, marriages, and civil unions
- motor vehicle titles and registrations
- issuing of licenses including dogs, marriage and civil unions

New items:

A “drop box” will be available on the front porch of the town office (not the library). It is there for you to drop off items rather than use the mailbox.

Reminders:

Dog Licenses are due April 30th, with a \$1 a month fine and a \$25 penalty on June 1st. Don't forget to bring in your new rabies certificate, I will copy it and keep it on file for you.

Registrations are due any time during the month of your birth. Renewals can be done up to three months in advance (for you travelers out there).

You can register to vote at the town clerk's office any time during the year.

Town Clerk hours will be as follows:

Tuesdays 11am – 3pm

Thursdays 3pm – 6pm

I am keeping my hours short in an effort to save tax dollars. Also, I have kept track of activity each day for the past two years, and there was very little activity on Wednesdays.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

This was quiet year with no major emergencies. We did have some minor flooding in April but there was no major damage.

We devoted quite a bit of time to updating our Emergency Operations Plan. An Emergency Operations Plan establishes a framework for local government to provide assistance in an expeditious manner to save lives and to protect property in the event of a disaster. The purpose of the Emergency Operations Plan is to facilitate the delivery of emergency response and to help deal with the consequences of significant disasters. What this really means is that we have to establish what disasters we are most likely to face and develop plans on how we will handle these emergencies with our local manpower because the local response is the first line of defense and maybe the second and third line of defense depending how quickly outside help arrives.

The most likely disasters we have identified are Flood, Drought, Extreme Heat, Wildfire, Earthquakes, Severe Winds and Extreme Winter Weather. However, we could also be subject to man-made disasters such as Arson, Chemicals Spills, Nuclear/Radiological Events, Terrorism, Disease Epidemics such as Small Pox or Avian Flu, Plane Crashes, Train Derailments or Multiple Vehicle Accidents.

The Plan details the various types of responses and outlines the duties of the Police Department, Fire Department, Highway Department and other local officials. Emergency Management directs the whole operation.

It is also very important for each household to be prepared for an emergency. The Red Cross recommends that at least 3 days worth of water and food be kept on hand.

SHELBURNE FAST SQUAD

In 2007 the Fast Squad, in conjunction with Gorham Emergency Medical Service, and Shelburne Fire Department, responded to 23 Medical Calls, 6 Motor Vehicle Accidents, and 1 Fire Call.

Shelburne Fast Squad has two members, Director George P. Corriveau NREMT-B, RN, and Assistant Director Luc G. Corriveau NREMT-I. The Fast Squad takes continuing education very seriously, and both members have attended classes and conferences throughout the year to expand their knowledge and patient care skills as well as satisfying requirements for re-licensing.

We are pleased that we may soon have a new member. We now have a student in the EMT class being offered by Gorham EMS.

Shelburne Fast Squad now has two complete responder kits for both members of the Fast Squad, a Pulse Qximetry device, and a Cardiac Monitor.

Fire Fighter trivia:

The worst loss of life fire in US history occurred in Peshtigo, Wisconsin on October 8, 1871. Very few people have even heard of this fire because it occurred at the same time as another historic fire, the great Chicago fire. An estimated 1,100 people died when a forest fire overtook their town, in comparison, about 250 people died in the Chicago fire. So if you see a fire in the woods, call one of us above, or call the police. We don't want to end up like Peshtigo!

POLICE REPORT

We've had another year free of most of the law enforcement problems that keep other larger towns busy.

Most of our efforts are preventative as they should be when law enforcement works.

Gorham is currently trying to recruit and retain good officers and find the money to pay them. Incidentally, it is in the best interest of Shelburne for Gorham to have a full and experienced police force. When something "BIG" happens they always lend their help.

Moose and deer road kills are on the rise, but have not reached the levels of the 80's and 90's.

Turkeys have become a road hazard. Although they don't present the immediate danger to people that deer and moose do, when they cross traffic it can be a dangerous distraction. Are the "Brake for Turkey" signs in our future?

An untimely death was caused, in part, by an insulator being broken by a pellet. Some person had fired a pellet gun at a power line ceramic insulator causing it to break into two pieces. Gravity and friction were holding it to the pole. A bit of motion by a worker caused the wire to fall and make contact with him.

A common and usually not deadly bit of mischief contributed to a death.

PUBLIC WORKS

Looks like we are back to an old fashion winter!! It's been awhile since we had one of those.

With this much snow it is hard to find a place to put any more snow. I want to remind you that the town has an ordinance against placing snow in the street. Snow placed in the street may become a hazard to others, especially when the plow does not come by for several hours.

When I am plowing on our narrow town roads, the plow takes up more than half the road. With the wing down I can not move quickly to avoid oncoming traffic so on snowy days or nights please slow down and watch out for the plow.

Once again I held off on paving because of the price of asphalt but we will be moving forward on paving projects this year.

I have replaced all the tires on the plow truck because of their age. This will help ensure that the truck can be safely used until its scheduled replacement in 2010. The Selectpersons are asking that \$30,000 be placed in the Heavy Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund in anticipation of this purchase.

Shelburne Waste District

The operation of the "Dump" continues smoothly, with Shelburne's citizens working with the operating crew to reduce waste and enjoy the donuts. Pay-as-you-Throw bags are still available at both the Town office and the transfer station, and the cost is still \$7.50 for a roll of 5 bags.

For a number of years we have collected all florescent bulbs separately, since they contain mercury. Now, we are also collecting all mercury items such as switches, thermometers, compact florescent lights (CFLs) and small "button" batteries. Therefore, please keep these items out of the regular trash and place them in the special containers.

On the revenue side, we shipped cardboard, tires and scrap metal for a total of over \$2415. Currently waste paper is bringing \$75 to \$110 per ton, so that it saves the town a total of about \$180 per ton to recycle over the cost of landfilling. In addition, we received over \$800 for landfill fees, and over \$6950 from the sale of green bags. The income from sale of bags offset over 24 percent of the solid waste budget for the year. In addition we have put over \$3200 into the landfill equipment account against future purchases.

We also removed most of the accumulated demolition debris so that we will be starting over in 2008. The trash truck is still operating, but it will need to be replaced within the next two years and we are reviewing alternatives.

The Household Hazardous Waste collection day is scheduled for June 7. Please look for information at the transfer station in May.

Again, we wish to thank everyone who helped to make the transfer station operation go smoothly, and to reduce the waste. Please join us for coffee and donuts.

PLANNING BOARD

While 2006 was a very busy year for the Board 2007 saw a significant reduction in the proposals requiring its attention. This was most fortunate for it allowed the Board and it's three new members, Jen Corrigan, David Landry, and Steve Tassej a chance review our Rules of Procedure and to gain experience without major proposals before us.

During 2007 the Board dealt with three subdivision proposals, approving two, with the third being withdrawn. The Board adopted revised "Rules of Procedure" that clarified the responsibilities of the Chairperson, Board Members and the Administrative Assistant. The Board also reviewed 4 proposed projects to determine if Site Plan Review would be required, ruling in three that it would not be and the fourth is still pending. The Board also worked with the two cell tower applicants to ensure that they were following the approvals granted in 2006.

Looking to 2008 the Board is again focusing on updating the Town Master Plan. As first steps we have asked and Ray Danforth has agreed to author a white paper for the Board on the potential impact of conservation easements on the Town and also how they may impact the planning process. We will also be meeting with North Country Council in February to determine if they can be of assistance to us in the Master Planning process and to start developing what that process will look like.

There will be one proposed zoning change for the voters' consideration at Town Meeting. The proposed change was initiated by petition signed by 31 residents. The proposed change would allow for the operation of "Mini Storage Facilities" in the Route 2 District by "Special

Exception". The Planning Board held a public hearing on the proposal and after extensive deliberation voted 5 to 1 to recommend it for approval. The Board felt that this use was not inconsistent with the purpose of the District, the current uses allowed within the District, and that changes made to the conditions for special excepting in 2007 would give the Zoning Board of Adjustment and the Planning Board the tools needed to regulate any proposal that might come to them.

PARK COMMISSION

During 2007, the Park Commission – with budgetary approval from the selectmen – completed the survey of its eastern boundary and erected a security fence along that boundary. The fence is expected to provide better animal control, a clear demarcation between public and private land, and has settled a long-standing boundary “discussion.”

The outstanding accomplishment in the Park in 2007 belongs to the Friends of Shelburne Recreation who secured a grant of over \$11,000 for playground equipment with the help of former Commissioner Brooke Grondin and then set up the playground equipment with the all volunteer work crew The Friends gathered together for the final playground assembly. The playground equipment is of superior quality, very attractive, and safe for all children who regularly use it.

In 2008, the Commission will run its operation on a budget of about \$4000. Projects will include the usual summer mowing, loaming and seeding around the playground area and pavilion, and touching up the playing area at the soccer field so it will be ready for use about mid-August. The Commission will not seek funds to improve the pavilion during the summer maintenance season.

The Commission now has just four members: Ken Simonoko, project Manager; Doris Gorham; Beverly Pinkham and Bob Corrigan, Commission Chairperson. CONSERVATION COMMISSION

This year the Selectmen asked the Conservation Commission to try to determine what the citizens of Shelburne felt about future development and use of the Androscoggin River. This request was triggered by a proposal to construct a parking area and boat launching site below the dam.

The proposal seems to be dead for now, but it brings up the reality that as the pollution level of the river goes down, the pressure to develop the shore land and the river itself will soar.

The Androscoggin River in Shelburne is already being used by several guides bringing paying clients here for trophy fishing. There are organizations actively pursuing the development of a canoe trail through the area.

Obviously, the pressure is already building and we need to decide how the town will be affected. Nothing much is solid at this point as we are just entering the discussion with the State and North Country Council on how to proceed from here.

Also the matter of streambed improvement on Connor Brook is ongoing. A walking tour in November with Jay Mailhot, the Ranger in charge of the project, showed the progress so far. There is another season of work scheduled. Actually, since the start of the project, there has been no good run-off to see how the debris positioned in and along the stream will set up. With heavy snow-pack this winter, the spring melt should have very interesting results

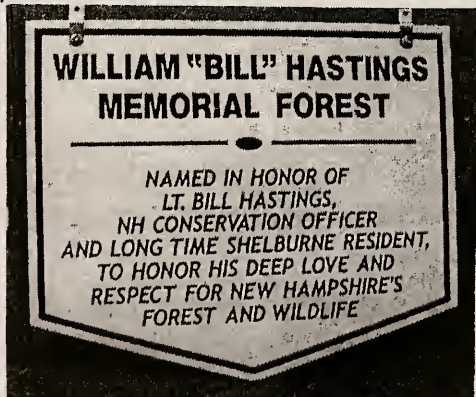

The biggest problem, however, was that some miserable deer decided that it loved the hostas that Debbie Ryan planted and chewed them all down to the ground. 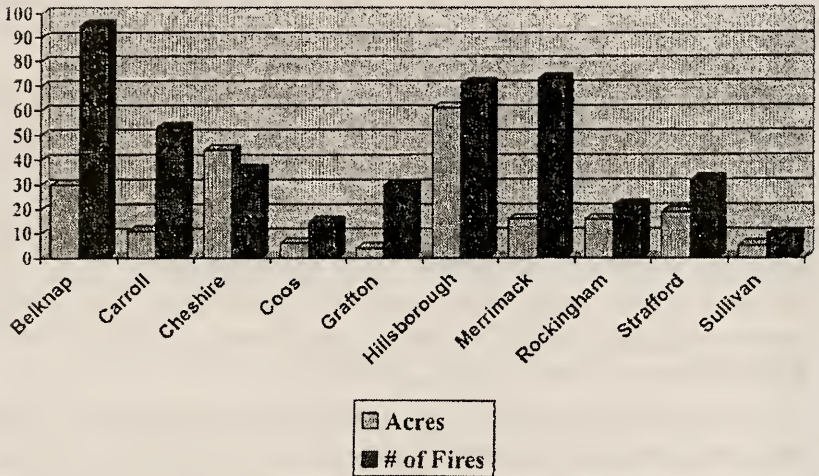


REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing **ANY** outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact local fire departments or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information contact the Division of Forest & Lands (603) 271-2214 or online at www.nhdfi.org.

Fire activity was high during the spring of the 2007 fire season, particularly late April and early May. As the forest and fields greened up in later May the fire danger decreased. However, a very dry late summer created very high fire danger again from August into September, with fire danger reaching very high on Labor Day weekend. Even with the dry conditions, the acreage burned was less than half that of 2006. The largest forest fire during the 2007 season burned approximately 26 acres on the side of Wantastiquet Mountain in Chesterfield during the month of May. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 207 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland

fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, maintaining adequate green space around your home and keeping your home free of flammable materials. Family Resource Center @ Gorham

In 2007, the Resource Center provided direct services to approximately 1,000 low income children, youth and families in Shelburne and the surrounding communities. Hundreds of others received referrals to other services, attended a class or workshop here or received clothing from the "Boutique"-a free second hand store.

The direct services the FRC staff provided included home visiting for families at risk of abuse and neglect, after school programs, substance abuse prevention activities, workforce development training, computer classes and parenting workshops. The Center also sponsored "Coats for Community" which provided free donated winter clothing to over 300 individuals and "Operation School Supplies" which provided 223 needy students with backpacks and school supplies to start the school year. Last year the Center provided over 150 low income families and seniors with free on-line tax filing and returned over \$80,000 in refunds and tax credits.

Residents from Shelburne have participated in the Center's after school program in Gorham, computer classes, parenting workshops and free income tax preparation program in 2007. We have also had several Shelburne residents participate on the Center's board of directors and volunteer in many of the programs.

We are grateful to the Town for its support as we continue to offer opportunity and build capacity for the children, youth and families of the Androscoggin Valley.

North Country Council Regional Commission & Economic Development District Report

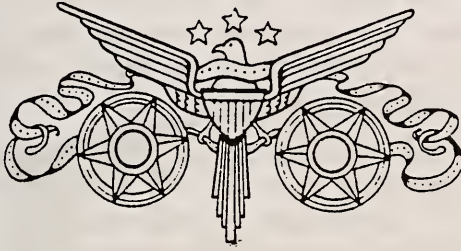

REPORT TO THE PEOPLE OF DISTRICT ONE

It is a pleasure to serve this large Northern District of 98 towns, 4 cities and 5 counties with a population of 247,000 people. The Executive Council is at the top of your Executive Branch of the NH State Government. The Governor and Executive Council appoint 352 Commissions and Directors who administer NH law and budget as prescribed by the NH House and Senate.

2008 is the year to keep an eye on and follow the progress of the NH Transportation Plan. The recommended projects in the highway and bridge plan can be accomplished with existing revenue from the state gasoline tax, bonds and matching federal funds. The Executive Council held public hearings on the projects throughout the state and forwarded their recommendations to Governor Lynch. Governor Lynch will review our recommendations and then submit his recommended plan to the NH House and Senate by January 15, 2008. Without any new revenue for additional projects we will be lucky to maintain the existing state highway and bridge system. If more work is desired than new revenues will have to be voted by the Members of the

House and the Senate and signed by the Governor. Contact your local legislators – House and Senate. Find them by going to www.nh.gov

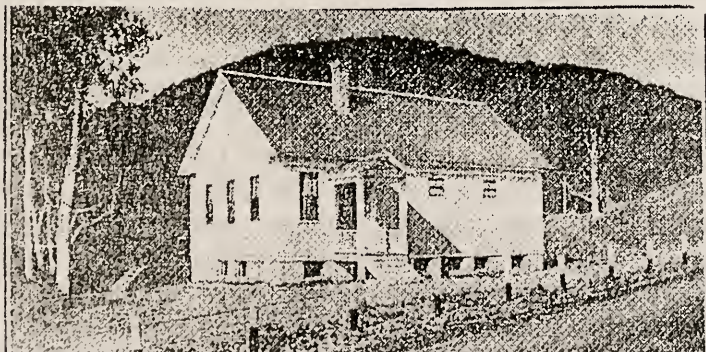

DOG LICENSES

It's the Law

1. **EVERY DOG**, three months old or older, **MUST HAVE A LICENSE**. These are obtained from the Town Clerk. This must be done **EVERY YEAR BEFORE APRIL 30TH**. Penalties will be imposed on any dog that is not registered as of June 1st.

2. **EVERY DOG*** must have a certificate showing that it has been **VACCINATED FOR RABIES**. This certificate must be presented at the time of registration.

3. **EVERY DOG** must wear its license tag. (RSA 466:1)

4. License Fees: (RSA 466:4)

\$ 6.50 - all neutered dogs

\$ 6.50 - puppies (3 - 7 months)

\$ 9.00 - all unneutered male dogs

\$ 9.00 - all unspayed female dogs

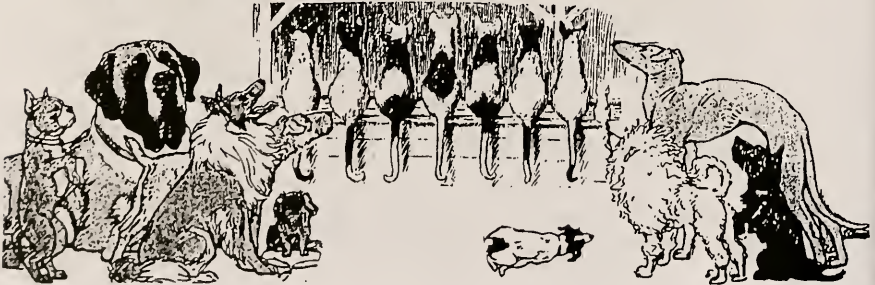
\$ 2.00 - owners over 65 (one dog only)

Failure to comply will make you liable for a penalty of \$25.00 per dog. (RSA 466:13)

5. **SHELBURNE HAS A LEASH LAW**

No dog may be allowed to run at large unless it is accompanied by the owner or custodian. (RSA 466:30a)
(Voted November 4, 1980)

6. * It is now State law to have all cats 3 months of age and over vaccinated against rabies.





SNOW REMOVAL ORDINANCE passed 8/14/94



No person shall remove snow from his/her premises and deposit it on any street or highway.

Any person who violates this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$1,000 and not less than \$50 for each separate and distinct violation.

PARKING BAN



It was voted at the 1990 Town Meeting to mandate a parking ban within the boundaries of town roads' right of way during and 24 hours after a snow storm.

Vehicles in violation will be towed at owner's expense.



SPEED LIMITS IN SHELBURNE



The selectmen have set speed limits for the following town roads:

East end of North Road - from intersection with Meadow Road to the Maine Line - 35 miles per hour.

Village Road and all other town roads - 25 miles per hour.



LANDFILL REGULATIONS

Hours: Saturday - 7 AM to 12 PM all year
Wednesday - 3 - 4:30 PM June 13 - Sept 5.

Shelburne has adopted Pay-As-You-Throw. This means that garbage must be disposed of in special bags which may be purchased at the Transfer Station or the Town Office. The cost of a package of 5 bags is \$7.50.

There are now charges to dispose of many different items.

These fees reflect the cost to the Town for disposal and are subject to change. People wanting to dispose of items that have a fee associated with their disposal should see the landfill attendant and pay him before disposing of the item. People disposing of items, not paid for, will be billed. A list of fees is available at the Transfer Station.

The Transfer Station does not accept any hazardous waste including hazardous household waste. A Hazardous Household Waste Collection Day will be held again this year with the Androscoggin Valley Regional Refuse Disposal District. Details will be posted at the Transfer Station.

A list of recyclable materials is available at the Transfer Station.

ORDINANCE REGULATING USE OF ALCOHOL ON TOWN PROPERTY

Section 1: Consumption of Alcohol Restricted

Except as otherwise provided by this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful to drink or otherwise consume any alcoholic beverage or alcoholic liquor as defined in RSA:175, in the Chester C. Hayes Memorial Park, any Town buildings or associated parking lots in the Town of Shelburne.

Section 2: Possession of Open Containers

Possession of open containers which contain alcoholic beverages or alcoholic liquor as defined in RSA:175 in any public place shall be considered prima facie evidence of consumption.

Section 3: Penalty

Whoever shall fail to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation and subject to a fine as specified in Criminal Code 651:2, not less than \$ 50.00 per violation.

WEIGHT LIMITS ON ALL TOWN ROADS

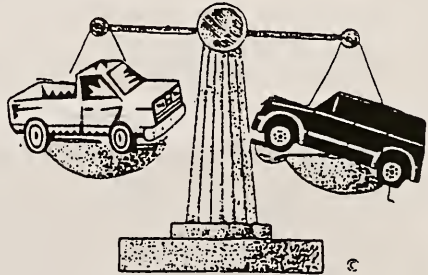
After holding a Public Hearing during the August 27, 1996 Selectmen's Meeting, the Board of Selectmen voted to set the following weight limits under the authority granted them by RSA 231:191 at their Selectmen's Meeting on September 5, 1996.

The weight limit on any town road within the Town of Shelburne shall be set at 60,000 lbs.

Per RSA 231:191 applications may be made to the Board of Selectmen to exceed this weight limit. The Board may grant permission in writing may impose reasonable conditions and may establish reasonable regulations for bonding and restoring the highway.

The roads to which this shall apply are as follows:

- North Road (intersection of Meadow Road to Maine)
- Conner Road
- Hayes Road
- Hubbard Grove
- Landfill Drive
- Losier Road
- Mt. Moriah Drive
- Power House Acres
- R-F Drive
- Seyah Road
- Sunrise Drive
- Village Road
- Winthrop Drive



Burning and Permits

Contact your local forest fire warden or fire department for information on obtaining a written fire permit.



It's The Law - RSA 227-L:17(II)

Anyone who wishes to burn clean, ordinary combustibles such as leaves, brush or untreated lumber, or have a camp or cooking fire must have written permission from the landowner and a fire permit (requires the free Adobe Acrobat Reader at 100% actual size) from the local forest fire warden or local fire department in the town or city where the fire will be kindled. You must be at least 18 years of age to obtain a written fire permit.



Gas grills or charcoal fires in a container up and off the ground on your own property do not require a fire permit.


Public or privately owned camp or picnic grounds must obtain an annual written fire permit from the town forest fire warden for use of outside fireplaces, camp or cooking fires used in the operation of the camp or picnic grounds. Such camp or cooking fires should:

1. be in an area cleaned to mineral soil at least 8 feet across;
2. have at least 6 inches of sand or gravel under the fire for any fire built on the ground;
3. have no limbs or other burnable material to a height of 10 feet above the fireplace area; and
4. be constructed so they cannot be moved from their mineral soil area.

What You Can Burn and When

Only leaves, woody debris or brush less than 5 inches in diameter, or untreated wood and dimension lumber can be burned. For any open burning a written fire permit is required. Even with the permit, no open burning between the hours of 9:00 am and 5:00 pm unless it is raining.

When the ground where you are burning is completely covered with snow no fire permit is required. However, be sure to check local ordinances that might restrict winter-time burning.

Air quality regulations restrict the type of material burned in the open. Stumps, painted or treated lumber, tires, tubes, plastics, foam rubber and shingles are some of the prohibited materials (see Department of Environmental Services, Air Resources Division Open Burning Rules) requires the free Adobe Acrobat Reader. 

A buried fire is NOT an extinguished fire!

What You Need To Know

When you request a written fire permit you will need to know the following:

What are you going to burn? Material must be clean ordinary combustibles. Brush cannot exceed 5 inches in diameter.	How much help will you have during the burn? Your fire must be attended at all times, or completely extinguished.
Where are you going to burn? How far from the nearest	Do you own the land where you plan to burn? If not, do you have written

Commercial Permits

The Forest Ranger for your town/city and local Warden are needed to issue a commercial permit to burn when no other means of disposal of material is available, such as chipping, hauling to a landfill or other methods of legal disposal.

The commercial permit is for contractors who use hired help for the burning of material between the hours of 9:00 am and 5:00 pm and only needed when the ground is not covered with snow.

The permit will be required to have suppression equipment on site while the burning is being done and the fires will have to be totally extinguished or be constantly attended.
