

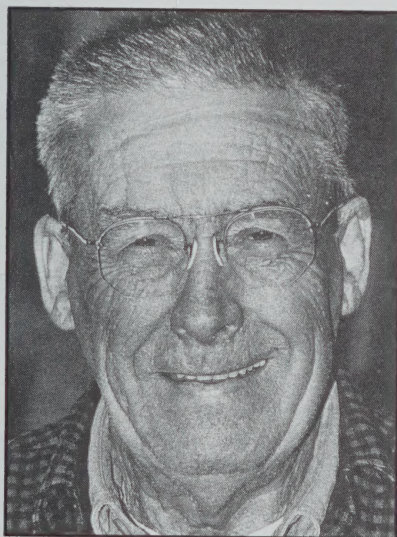

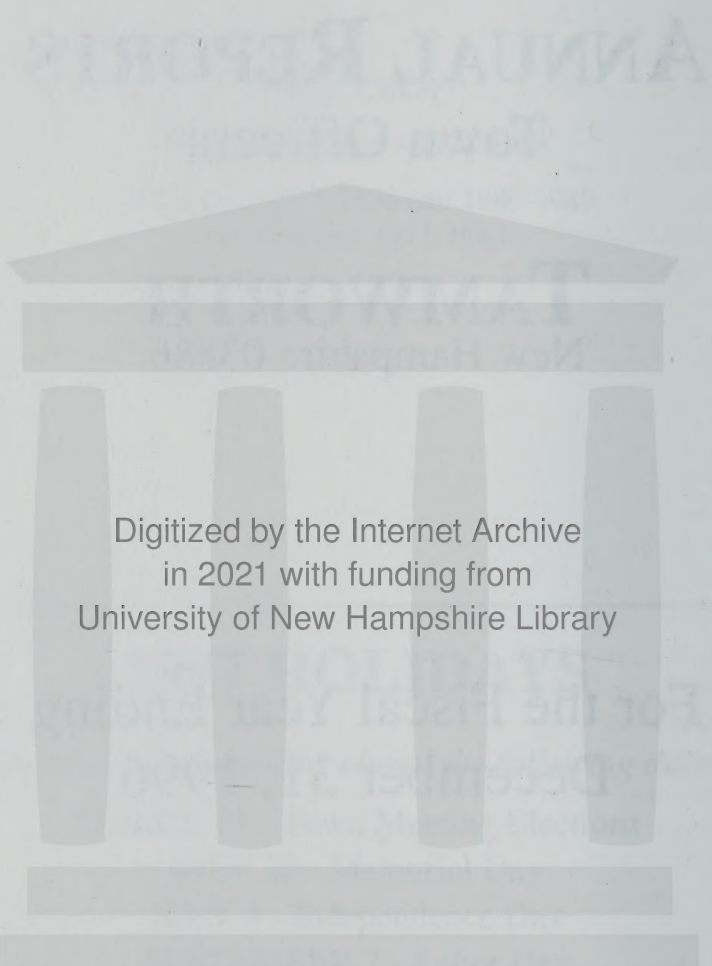

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth, County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tamworth Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the eleventh of March, next at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE #61: Shall we modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Tamworth, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000.00; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000.00; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$19,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$27,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$35,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence. (This will be a paper ballot vote.) (If passed, the effective date will be 4-1-97.)

ARTICLE #62: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept donations of personal property in accordance with RSA 31:95-E.

ARTICLE #63: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal and State grants which may become available during the course of the year in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money.

ARTICLE #64: To see if the Town will vote (in accordance with RSA80: 80) to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired by Tax Collector's deed as justice may require.

ARTICLE #65: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE #66: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

The volunteer members of the Finance Committee are appointed by the Selectmen to assist in researching the cost of various projects, as well as evaluating the petitions brought before the towns people at Town Meeting.

This year, the Finance Committee was asked to help evaluate the following:

- All agencies and organizations presenting petitions for town funding met with the Finance Committee to discuss the basis for their requests;
- Continued evaluation for future location and design of Town Offices and Town Garage, looking specifically at any available properties that would be sufficient for the town's needs.

In evaluating the needs of our health and human service petitioners, the committee felt that there needs to be a strong emphasis on reducing costs and keeping the town tax rate down. As a result, the committee recommended level funding for all the health and human service agencies who provide a valuable service to our community, but who the committee would like to see move towards greater self-sufficiency. The committee commends those agencies who requested level or reduced funding this year.

Once again, the Finance Committee encourages a review of the plowing of driveways and private roads based on the significant cost of this practice, which this year stands at \$100,000. We would like to see several options evaluated, such as restricting plowing to certain segments of the population such as the elderly and disabled. The dollars saved could then be better used to upgrade and maintain our existing roads, or other projects the town deems appropriate.

Absent any available property at the present time in the village for Town Offices and Town Garage, the committee turned its attention to property already owned by the town on Durrell Road. Utilizing the land where the recreation fields are currently located would also mean not taking any additional property out of the current tax base. The entire project is an ongoing process and the committee will continue to look into all available options.

As we look to the future, the committee recognizes that there are costly projects on the horizon for the town including, but not limited to, the capping of the landfill and the building of a transfer station, new town garage and office building, and major road repairs and equipment. The Finance Committee is committed to providing you the voter with as much information, research and options as possible so that you can make the best informed decisions on these matters which will significantly affect your tax rate in the future. With this in mind, we hope that our evaluation of this year's articles is useful to the voters.

TREASURER'S REPORT

During 1996, all funds under the jurisdiction of the Treasurer's Office were invested so that the town would receive the maximum interest available at the time of the investment. Citizen's Bank and the Municipal Deposit Investment Pool both offered excellent yields, along with safety through full collateralization.

We borrowed \$1.5 million in tax anticipation notes in March, at a cost of \$51,871. for the use of this money until December 31. Citizen's Bank was the low bidder. However, investments earned a total of \$51,142., so the net cost for using this money was only \$729.

One major change this year has been the use of municipal accounting software to maintain our financial records. This change from the old hand written cash journal books began early in the year, and has made record keeping and report generation easier.

Special thanks go to Selectmen's Assistant Dorothy Hidden, Town Clerk/Tax Collector Theresa Boewe, Selectmen Sam Hidden, John Roberts and Bruce Robinson, and the staff at BNH, Citizen's, Fleet, and the MDIP for their help and support. Also, I thank you, the residents and voters of Tamworth, for your continued support. It is greatly appreciated.

Training included drills and courses on Crime Scene Management, Water Supply, Relay Pumping, Forest Fire Tools, Testing Hose, 2 Mutual Aid Drills, Air Packs, Gas Detector, Special Deputy School, Forest Fire Training in Hill NH, Map and Compass Work on Great Hill, Firefighter Level II, CPR Firefighter Level I, Basic Forest Fire and EMT Refresher.

We want to thank the Tamworth Foundation for buying us a new base radio for Central Station.

We also urge all home owners to keep their homes safe. Check that all electrical cords are not frayed and are in good condition and keep the coils of your refrigerator and freezer clean of dust and free of combustibles. If there are young children around, put dummy plugs in unused outlets. Also make sure you have at least one smoke detector on each level of your home and the batteries are changed at least once a year. In addition, be sure that the type of smoke detector is the correct one for the location at which it is to be used.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing any open burning. Violations of RSA 227-L: 17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws please call our office at 271-2217.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments.

As in the past we are very proud of our community involvement. We continue to offer CPR and first aid training to the public. We regularly sponsor American Red Cross Blood Drives. We are pleased to provide standby services for several community events each year. TAMWORTH PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Again this year the planning board has had numerous small applications rather than the large subdivisions of the mid 1980's. There were four applications for subdivision which we held hearings for and then approved with some modifications. Boundary line adjustments were slightly more numerous with five. Again with some changes we approved them. Five projects were brought in for conceptual review. On these the applicant asks for our non binding input as to how the subdivision regulations would apply. We held one scenic road hearing and two septic system waiver hearings. These we signed and passed on. One hearing was held for the phasing of a larger subdivision. A discussion was held for land reclamation using sludge. We reviewed 14 miscellaneous applications that are sent to us by the state. These include applications for inspection stations and others. With the exception of the flood plain ordinance we don't have too much control over these but we review them with in the light of how Tamworth would like to grow.

The planning board had intended to bring the zoning ordinance that the committee had worked hard on for a vote at the 1997 town meeting. After much debate we decided not to do it. We had held a group of meetings called Tamworth 2000 in August and September that were not very well attended. There are a few people that are very supportive but we didn't feel that the majority of Tamworth is behind zoning at this point. We will continue to study it.

The revision of our subdivision regulations has taken a large part of our time or more specifically the time of a hard working committee. This project has been going on for several years and we hope to see its conclusion this year.

Our meetings are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month at 7:00 PM in the town offices. The meetings are always open to the public so if you are interested please come.

AGENCY INFORMATION

Tamworth Community Nurse Association, Inc. received renewal of licensure for another year of service as a Community Health Agency after annual inspection on September 5, 1996 by Eleanor Enenkel, RN of the New Hampshire Bureau of Health Facilities. Board policy, operating procedures, patient records, office statistics and documentation were examined to ensure all state regulations and protocol are being met and actively practiced. TCNA continues to maintain, as well, its licensure under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendment (CLIA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Public Health Practices Program for testing of blood sugar and urinalysis specimens. We continue to offer the service of drawing blood samples for homebound patients and we are thankful for the cooperation of the office of Tamworth Family Medicine and Huggins Hospital for transporting and processing samples.

John Patten, M.D. continues to serve as the Medical Advisor to TCNA. His willingness to donate his time, knowledge, and efforts has been greatly appreciated.

Supplemental services of physical, speech, occupational and IV therapies, social workers, home health aides, homemakers and "back up" registered nurses, as well as hospice care have all been provided to Tamworth residents by other area agencies. We are grateful for the cooperative efforts extended to us by Heritage Home Health and Hospice, Northern Carroll County VNA and Hospice, and VNA and Hospice of Southern Carroll County. All have provided valuable assistance for Tamworth residents. Many area adults have come to rely upon the homemakers and health aides of Carroll County Health and Home Care Services for assistance with daily activities which enables them to

remain in their homes.

Promoting optimal health, safety, and quality of life is the objective of TCNA. Through continuous assessment of the patient and collaboration with assisting agencies, physicians, and supportive family members this objective can be attained.

AGENCY FUNCTIONS AND PROGRAMS

The Board of Directors of TCNA continues to meet on a monthly basis to direct agency functions and operations and to handle financial matters. The Board members and the Friends of TCNA (formally the summer board) volunteer their time with board activities such as clinics and screenings, special programs and fund raising events. With their guidance and assistance and support from the townspeople we have continued to function as a non-profit, non-charging community health agency.

This has been a very productive year for the office of TCNA. We have updated our facilities by adding a second phone line to accommodate a fax machine and the many incoming and outgoing phone calls. We also received as a private donation from a friend of TCNA, a new computer and printer. This equipment has necessitated some rearranging of the office and the addition of another desk. It has also facilitated the transfer of referral information from hospitals and physician offices' as well as increasing efficiency of record keeping and completion of monthly and annual reports.

Monthly blood pressure clinics continue in the TCNA office on the last Wednesday of every month from 12 to 1 PM and on a monthly basis at the Congregate Meal site on the third Monday of each month. Office hours are also available Monday through Thursday 9 to 11 AM and Fridays by appointment for blood pressure checks or other health questions, concerns, and problems.

The Spring Adult Health Screening cosponsored with the Whittier Lions and Memorial Hospital was Held in April. About 100 people were screened for basic vision, glaucoma, dental, podiatry, hearing, blood pressure, blood glucose, cholesterol, hemoglobin, and pulmonary function, nutrition, and information on Living Wills and Advanced Directives was offered.

The Flu Clinic was held in October with over 200 recipients of the trivalent vaccine. Many have already been spared the severity of the flu with this preventive measure.

The dental program afforded to students at the Kenneth Brett School allows dental care free of charge to eligible children. The program is scheduled to begin in February of this year with Dr. Michael Glick as the providing dentist. We are very appreciative of the Tamworth Foundation for their continued support.

The Tamworth Community Christmas Project (TCCP), a task force dedicated supplying residents in need with gifts at Christmas time, was again a great success. The cooperative effort of members and the division of tasks enhances the smooth operations of this project, not to mention the generosity of the townspeople and area businesses! Gifts of sweatsuits, hats, mittens, boots, coats, gift certificates, sundry items, turkey baskets, and miscellaneous

items were offered. Many thanks to those who helped or donated.

The “loaner closet” continues to be of great use by many residents. Wheelchairs, commodes, walkers, canes, crutches, car seats, and assorted supplies are available free of charge. We thank all who have donated items and encourage all residents to use the equipment and supplies.

Our “skilled” nursing care services, offered in the office and at home, as needed, continue to be directed by the patients physician. Referrals are received from physicians, hospitals, family members and patients themselves. After an initial assessment is obtained, TCNA can continue visits and collaborate care with their physicians consent. Skilled care procedures include assessment of vital signs, safety, adherence to medication regime and general health status. Patient teaching and education are also vital aspects in maintaining the health of the community.

Attending conferences, seminars, networking programs and other meetings is yet another area of necessity for the agency. This includes keeping updated on medical treatments, procedures, and health issues as well as maintaining required continuing education units for RN licensure. Also meeting with area home health agencies providing supplemental services to our patients is of paramount importance.

The Tamworth Community Nurse Association is also this areas Salvation Army Unit Station. Some emergency funds are available depending on eligibility, a Tamworth or Sandwich residents experiencing a financial crisis and all other financial avenues have been exhausted.

June Donovan continues to function as our office manager. June’s warm friendly attitude, efficiency, and reliability are much appreciated. She continues to coordinate the Tamworth Meals on Wheels program prepared by the Ossipee Concerned Citizens. Much effort goes into scheduling drivers to deliver the meals to more than 30 households five days a week. We thank our many faithful drivers, and June, for the valuable service.

Karen Pelsor, R.N. continues to function as our associate nurse. Karen works on a part time basis 3 days a week. Her experience, caring attitude, and astuteness are reflected in her job performance and her repoire with patients.

As health care continues to change much of the burden is falling on the home health care industry. TCNA is unique due to the fact that we are not bound by the constraints of medicare or other insurance regulations hence’ can provide services based on our own assessments and on the needs of each individual and family. However, some limitations remain such as not having 24 hour coverage and the inability to provide home health aides, PT, OT, speech therapy, and hospice care (if needed we refer to another agency for these services). We continue to seek your support and encouragement in our efforts to promote health and quality of life to all Tamworth residents.

Some of the highlights for 1996 include: the wiring of the region into the Internet; completion and distribution of the Vision 20/20 survey to help guide growth and the quality of life in the region; approval of a \$100,000 per year for 2 years Capacity Building Grant to hire a full-time Executive Director and office assistant to work directly with businesses and local government on Community Block grants and our own revolving loan fund program; success in obtaining town's support from 9 out of our 12 towns in our region based on equalized valuations; support from the Northern NH Foundation has provided operational and program funds, while a grant from the Ham Foundation made the purchase of computer equipment possible; educational forums addressing municipal cooperation with the Selectmen and Planning Board members; a Maine Sales Tax Forum addressing concerns and rights of N.H. businesses; an informational forestry forum addressing the challenges facing the forestry industry and value added products; an anticipated reopening of a local employment office (a result from needs expressed at the forestry forum); a highly successful and informative annual meeting (standing room only) with guest speakers Gov. elect Jean Shaheen and Cranmore's new owner George Gillett; Energy forums addressing the cost of fossil fuels and examining our alternatives; "Economically Speaking", MWVEC's newsletter made it's debut and will be published quarterly to keep our town's people informed and abreast of our activities; and finally increased membership and corporate sponsorship support.

As we begin a new year, the Council will be relocating to Conway village. This new site will also include the establishment of a one-stop small business resource center. To keep in touch with business needs and issues, monthly business leader's breakfasts will be held beginning in March. The Business Visitation Program will shift into high gear throughout the region in hopes providing support and economic opportunities for all who live and work in the Mt. Washington Valley. MWVEC welcomes public input and volunteers to serve on our committees. Your involvement in our programs will help make them more successful. MWVEC can make a difference.

TAMWORTH POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Once again, I would like to express my personal gratitude and the gratitude of all the members of the Tamworth Police Department to the people of Tamworth. Over the past year I have had the good fortune to meet and discuss issues with a number of Tamworth residents and business people. In these discussions I have had the opportunity to hear both suggestions and concerns about a number of issues.

As a department we have been particularly focusing on two major issues of concern. First, is availability of a Tamworth Officer. As a part time department our availability is naturally limited, however, as can be seen by the activity for the year we are making every attempt to respond to your calls whenever we can. We have seen over a 300% increase in calls for police services from 1995. This increase doesn't in m' opinion reflect a major increase in crime in the area but instead it reflects the availability of a local Tamworth officer when someone has a problem or simply needs to talk with a police officer.

The second issue expressed, is the availability of the Animal Control Officer. I am happy to say that Charlie Pearson, a full time Freedom Police Officer and a Tamworth resident, has taken over the duties of animal control. Another change affecting animal control is that the animal control officer is now a part of the police department. This allows the police department better access to where animal complaints are being made. With this information every member of the police department can better respond to your animal control issue. Charlie is an outstanding officer and for those who do not know him, if you have the opportunity to introduce yourself he would be glad to meet you.

I am also happy to tell you that Domenic Richardi and Mark Emme are still with the Department. They are both outstanding police officers. Domenic has been with us for about two years and Mark about a year and a half.

As a goal for the upcoming year the Tamworth Police Department is determined to become an even more important part of the community. Last year, we worked closely with the K.A. Brett school to provided a day where students were taught the importance of bicycle safety and we were involved with the NH State Police in promoting the importance of D.A.R.E. As part of our efforts I encourage anyone with ideas where the police department may be able to provide assistance to the community please let us know.

In closing, let me emphasize that we are here to serve you. If you have any questions or concerns please don't hesitate to call.

COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The Cook Memorial Library is a public library open 16 hours per week with programs and services available to residents and nonresidents. The library continues to strive to better meet the needs of the community in providing educational, cultural, recreational and informational services.

We are pleased to report that 1996 was a busy year. Volunteers assisting in the library accounted for hundreds of hours. We greatly appreciate their hard work. The childrens' programs continue to be a success. The Tuesday morning storytimes and summer programs for children are consistently well attended.

Increases can be reported in all circulation categories, adult as well as children. The library circulated an additional 2,000 volumes over last year. The library is being used by many community groups for meetings. In addition to circulating over 13,000 volumes in 1996, the library hosted over 50 community meetings, sponsored over 20 childrens' programs, hosted 3 author visits, and logged nearly 7,000 visits.

We were able to provide over 50 magazine articles via Article Express for our patrons. Books In Print on CD ROM was a welcome addition to the library. Our use of the Internet as well as the New Hampshire State Library Automated Information System, has simplified our usage of interlibrary loan requests and reference services. We borrowed hundreds of items from other libraries, and they borrowed from us as well. The Cook Memorial Library will reach its goal of automating the cataloging and circulation system in 1997. The support of the Tamworth Foundation has made this possible, and is gratefully acknowledged.

The library loans books, magazines, videos, book cassettes, and music on compact disc. The New Hampshire Collection is a circulating collection and is well used. The Ulitz Room, which houses our noncirculating local history and genealogy collection, is staffed by devoted volunteers. The library has a VCR available for meetings and programs, as well as a typewriter for public use. Art exhibits are on display featuring works of local artists.

We wish to thank everyone for their assistance in making the year a success. We wish to especially thank our many loyal volunteers who contribute over 600 hours of their time! I welcome each of you to visit the Cook Memorial Library. Library hours are Tuesdays and Wednesdays 2 - 8 and Saturdays 10 - 2.

CHOCORUA PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Chocorua Public Library was founded in 1888, and is one of the oldest chartered public libraries in the state of New Hampshire. Together with the Cook Memorial Library, it forms an Associate Library under the New Hampshire State Library System, serving the Town of Tamworth and all of its residents.

This year, we are requesting that \$2,500 be put on the warrant article for The Chocorua Public Library. Although we had our investment portfolio analyzed and were able to increase the income realized from our holdings, this income still doesn't meet the needs of the Library. Unfortunately, 90% of our budget is in fixed expenses related to the building and operations over which we have little control.

In August, our long time Librarian, Marjorie Mather will be retiring. The Tamworth and Chocorua Libraries hope to share one Librarian. There will also be assistants to the Librarian, in both libraries, as necessary. The Librarian will have knowledge of both libraries and understand the unique needs and assets of each.

During the past year, we logged 1984 visits, circulated nearly 2,600 pieces of printed materials, and added many new books to our collection. We also purchased the World Book Encyclopedia and the Lands and People Encyclopedia. One hundred new cards were issued this past year. We had many adult and children programs which included the "Artist of the Month". This program put a wide variety of local artists' work on display for all to enjoy. We also had a nice turnout at our Annual Tree Trimming Party, through which the Tamworth Community Christmas Project received dozens of new mittens and caps for holiday delivery to the needy.

Through fund raising we will add a new service this year. We will be able to purchase a computer for the public to use. The computer system will allow patrons to use the word processor to type and print reports. With the addition of our new computer, we will focus more attention on the growth of computer offerings for children, especially in relation to what they are studying in school. We were also able to upgrade the Children's Corner of the library. In August the Children's Corner was dedicated to the memory of Karly Goodson. Many donations in her memory were made to the library. These donations were used to buy children's books, and puppets for the new puppet theater.

TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT 1996

DREDGE AND FILL - Tamworth Conservation Commission (TCC) has checked three dredge and fill applications in 1996 and sent recommendations to the Wetlands Board. One case, that has now been approved though with some conditions, involved negotiations over a period of time with the land owner, planner and abutter. It resulted in an amended application and change of location of a farm pond. A second case, involving bank stabilization on the Bearcamp, was an expedited application. After on site inspection TCC recommended approval. In a third application, for culvert repair, TCC approved but recommended work be postponed from spring to a low flow time in fall. TCC has been notified of 14 applications for forestry minimum impact work in wetlands. No approval is needed for these provided the application is complete.

EASEMENTS - Work on any single easement usually proceeds over a period of years. One such plan, on which TCC has spent considerable time in an on site visit and discussions with the owners and in commission meetings, has progressed to the point where owners are agreed on a plan which is expected to be presented soon to the Commission and the Selectmen for approval. In another case, to protect land along the Bearcamp some time has been spent, but progress is slow. However there has been educational work and groundwork has been laid. Alan Smith discussed with TCC the concern of Chocorua Lake Conservation Foundation over pollution of the lake and the possibility of easements from abutters on the Chocorua River. Mr. Tewksbury has donated a piece of land and the Town is reported to own a piece of land in the area, although its location on the tax maps is not established. There is focus on the need to document all easements and monitor them now and in the future. As this is a considerable job, TCC easement monitoring chairman feels it is better to acquire only those in which the land can be protected in no other way, Work continues for protection of three other areas, but without specifics to report as yet.

TRAILS - Damage from a fallen tree to the bridge over Swift River in Big Pines Area was repaired by commission members; the only cost was \$64 for lumber. TCC member, Roy Ames Jr., has been appointed trails co-ordinator. Work needs to be done on Jackman North, Earle Remick and Easy Walker (Big Pines Area) trails. Volunteers have been found for the two latter trails.

Work is ongoing to update and reprint the brochure which describes TCC owned or managed areas and the trails there. All sections have been rewritten and the final brochure is now in the draft stage, to be published and distributed in the coming year.

SLUDGE - This is a complex issue on which more information is needed by TCC to make a decision on policy. Members have attended a meeting and a workshop on the subject and have acquired a video. Concern is for content of sludge

as to pathogens and minerals, and potential for groundwater pollution. TCC will continue to work on this. On the first request for a permit for use of sludge, in Tamworth, State Dept. of Environmental Services ordered a hearing. Second proposal is for use of sludge in a different type of project in which no permit is required, only notification of abutters and an informational meeting. This is a subject TCC will continue to explore.

RECYCLING - Charlie Townsend, TCC representative on the Town Recycling Committee, reported a grant to the Town of \$45,000 for three containers at the dump, for cardboard, paper and plastics. Household Hazardous Waste Day, July 27th, was promoted by TCC with the distribution of flyers, a sign at the dump and TCC found a Volunteer to serve at a collection site on that day. At the Ossipee site 16 Tamworth residents brought Hazardous waste and to the Moultonboro site 22 brought waste. This compares well with participation by residents in other towns.

MEETINGS AND WORKSHOPS - Two members attended the Annual Meeting and Workshops of the N. H. Association of Conservation Commissions in November. Four members went to a Workshop in August, held by the Dept. of Environmental Services, to explain the new wetlands law (which transferred decision from the Wetlands Board meeting weekly to Wetlands staff members). Two went to a Conservation District meeting on biosludge.

MEMBERS - In April Roy Ames Jr. was appointed by the Selectmen as a member of TCC, and in September Alan Smith was appointed as an alternate. Roy brings a variety of abilities to the commission and is now trail coordinator, Alan, past president of Chocorua Lake Conservation Foundation, brings the benefits of the Foundation's extensive and ongoing conservation work in the Chocorua Lake area.

ROUTE 16 CORRIDOR STUDY - TCC Chairman, John Mersfelder, serves on this study group as a representative of environmental interests. Tamworth representatives on the group are Rick Canfield and Helen Nickerson, appointed by the Selectmen after recommendation from TCC and the Planning Board. John was appointed by Peer Lund, of Lakes Region Planning.

BY-LAWS - By-laws have been adopted as a guide to conducting meetings and to administrative work of the Commission.

GREAT HILL TOWER - The tower, which TCC manages at the request of the Selectmen, required some repair, near one landing to make it safer. Measurements were taken and a metal bar made and installed.

The staff of the Tamworth Swim Program realizes how fortunate we are to have the continued support of the Tamworth Foundation and the Town of Tamworth. The help that is offered by both the children, parents and the staff of the White Lake State Park continues to make our jobs both a pleasure and a joy. The support we continue to receive enables us to continue the quality program that has become our trademark.

All of the staff associated with the Tamworth Swim Program are certified in the new programs offered by the Red Cross. We look forward to continuing to serve the children and surrounding communities. From Martha Chandler, Ellen Hamilton, Tammy Johnson and myself, our thanks for your continued support.

Our request for funding this year from the Town of Tamworth is in the amount of \$2900.00. This represents the same level of funding as last year.
