**TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

**THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN
FROM 10:00 A.M. TO 6:00 P.M.**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of WAKEFIELD in the County of CARROLL in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wakefield on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. Are you in favor of a basic zoning ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, the purpose of which is to preserve the basic character of the Town and encourage future growth compatible with its resources and needs?

Article 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of a basic building code, as proposed by the Planning Board, that would apply to future construction and major renovations in order to reduce hazards to life, health and property?

Article 4. Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen and Tax Collector to adopt a computerized tax billing system in accordance with RSA 8-C:11, the purpose of which is to expedite the tax collection process and reduce interest costs to the Town?

Article 5. To see if the Selectmen will look into the possibilities of installing Cable T.V. in the Wakefield-Sanbornville area. (By petition)

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and/or Health Officer to post signs around the

lakes and ponds of the Town prohibiting washing in said bodies of water with soaps or detergents and to assess a fine of \$100. (By petition).

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Wakefield on Saturday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at seven of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, the amount of Thirty-two thousand, eight hundred dollars (\$32,800) for a new International Truck and four thousand, seven hundred dollars (\$4,700) for a V-plow for the Highway Department. (Not approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand, four hundred dollars (\$4400) for a spreader for the Highway Department. (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand (\$4,000) for the purchase of office equipment (copier, two typewriters, calculator) for the Town Hall Offices. (Approved by the Budget Committee)

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,113.12 to be paid to the State Highway Department to continue work on Witchtrot Road. The State to contribute \$7,420.78 (TRA) (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$10,920.95 (Additional Highway Subsidy Funds). These monies to be used to finish Canal Road and Jug Hill Road with the balance to be expended on the Old Stage Road. (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,000.00 to install a Town Fuel depot and to supply fuel for the Highway Department Vehicles, Police Cruisers, Ambulance, Fire Trucks and any other use of the Town equipment. It is recommended that the fuel committee appointed by the Budget Committee be empowered to monitor the use of fuel from this depot. Further, it is estimated that the payback period will be Twenty-two months. (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000. to be set aside in a special fund for the future construction of a fire station in East Wakefield, on a lot for which funds were raised and appropriated at the last Town Meeting. We further petition that the Selectmen be directed to appoint a volunteer building committee of six persons to prepare plans and specifications for this fire station and to accept donations of monies, materials, equipment time and labor to construct this station. (By petition). (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to tar the roads in the villages of Sanbornville and Union, Dearborn Road, Ballards Ridge Road, Willey Road, Acton Ridge Road as far as the Perkins Hill Road, and to seal Hill Top Drive or as far as the appropriated funds will go. (By petition). (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 15. To see if the Town of Wakefield will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the straightening, grading and drainage of the northerly half mile of Access Road, currently Class VI road, and reclassify this section as Class V highway, upon completion. (By petition). (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to resurface and tar that

part of Bonnyman Road between the tarred road at Province Lake Store and the tarred hill at Point Road, a distance of approximately 1,000 feet. Also to tar the hill of said Bonnyman Road at the southwesterly side of the Prince Property or as far as the appropriated funds will allow. The controversy regarding the ownership of Bonnyman Road has been resolved by a recent decision of the Carroll County Superior Court declaring the road to be Town property. (By petition). (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept Cosmar Drive, formerly Railroad Avenue, Sanbornville, running from Main Street (Route 109) southerly about 700 feet more or less to beyond the former freight house of the Boston and Main R.R., in accordance with deed of 1973 deeded to the Town of Wakefield by Clarence O. and Alice B. Martin. (By petition).

Article 18. To see if the Town of Wakefield will accept as a Class V highway, 1000 feet of Randall Drive between Route 109 and Route 153. This road was built to state specifications and is in good condition. Has more than 12'' gravel bed and is tarred 20 feet wide. (By petition).

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.) for Huggins Hospital. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1,000.) for Carroll County Mental Health. (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.) for the Wolfeboro Visiting Nurses Association. (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.) for the Meals on Wheels program. (Approved by the Budget Committee).

Article 23. To see if the Town of Wakefield will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 in support of the Center of Hope, Inc. (By petition). (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 24. Are you in favor of entering into a contract with the Sanbornville Fire Precinct to furnish fire protection for the rest of the Town outside of the precinct in the amount of \$10,933.? (Approved by Budget Committee).

Article 25. Are you in favor of entering into a contract with the Union Fire Precinct to furnish fire protection for the rest of the Town outside of the precinct in the amount of \$8,040.? (Approved by Budget Committee).

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town bills in anticipation of taxes.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$591,058.00 to defray Town Charges as submitted by the Budget Committee.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

The past seven months have been a period of growth and adjustment for the Town, the Selectmen and myself as we develop and define the role of this new position and attempt to create and implement policies to increase the future effectiveness and efficiency of your Town government. Although this span of time has been, for the most part, a learning process, we have taken several positive steps toward improving the internal functions of the Town. Included among these accomplishments are the adoption by the Selectmen of a comprehensive personnel policy, centralized purchasing regulations and a revamped book-keeping method. The direct result of these programs will be to maintain a greater control of Town expenditures, provide consistent methods of management and reduce inefficient usages of time, resources and money.

Looking ahead to 1982 and the future, we hope to embark on a more aggressive financial policy which will cut the Town's interest costs while maintaining or improving our return on investments - all of which will have a positive effect on the tax rate. The key to this program will be the adoption of semi-annual tax collection, which will be enacted by the Selectmen pursuant to RSA 76:15-A and which will be implemented for the Calendar year 1983. This delay of a year has been incorporated to provide taxpayers with sufficient notice and the opportunity for adequate preparation. Tax billing will remain the same in 1982, but in 1983 bills will be issued in June and December.

The advantages of semi-annual tax collection will be to greatly improve the Town's cash flow, thereby reducing or eliminating the need for borrowing. With interest rates at their present level, this will represent a significant savings to the Town. To implement this process, we hope to utilize a computerized tax billing service which will expedite billing procedures; providing an earlier return of tax monies and pre-empting more costly alternatives. This, too, will cut interest costs and pay for itself within the first year of use.

Other goals for 1982 include researching and producing a long term, cost effective solid waste program which will meet statutory requirements and eliminate operational difficulties with the current landfill, develop a solution to the Town's septic waste disposal problem, implement a departmental review plan which will help spotlight problem areas in Town government and which will work toward defining and providing the appropriate level of services for your tax dollars, both on an immediate and on a long range basis and, finally, we are striving to make the day to day functions of government as responsive to the needs of the taxpayer and to the growing demands of the economy and the environment as is possible.

In closing, I would like to thank everyone for their hospitality, kindness and support and give a special Thank you to the Selectmen, Department Heads, committee members and all Town employees for their cooperation and dedicated service.

1981 REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Regular meetings of the Board were held on the last Thursday of the month except in November when the Thanksgiving holiday fell on the 26th, and in December when the last Thursday was on Christmas Eve. The November meeting was moved forward to Thursday, the 19th, and no formal meeting was held in December.

During 1981, 110 building permit applications were received of which two were not approved. Fees accruing from building permits amounted to \$614.00; fees from subdivision applications were \$306.88. The total of these applications, \$920.88, was turned over to the town general fund.

Frequent meetings and much individual and cooperative effort preceded the publication of the Wakefield Community Survey by the Wakefield Planning Advisory Committee. Copies of this survey were available to Wakefield residents after April 15, 1981. The survey was the result of a comprehensive questionnaire sent out to town taxpayers. Some 1230 were returned to the Advisory Committee.

From this survey the Advisory Committee has drafted a Town Master Plan submitted to the Planning Board for the latter's consideration as mandated by state law.

The Master Plan's main elements are based on 1) an inventory of the town's physical characteristics and natural resources, 2) the opinions of the residents as expressed in the Community Survey, and 3) the present uses of the town's resources and recommended directions for future development.

The following are highlights of some of the responses of town residents as summarized in the Survey:

1. Town services leave room for improvement but a reluctance to a tax increase to achieve this.

2. Town growth should be under some control with strong encouragement for agricultural development.

3. Strong support to maintain a rural atmosphere and protect the town's natural environment.

4. A large majority favored the adoption of "a standard building code."

5. Question on Town Growth: 647 said it's "too fast," 521 "just about right", 28 "not fast enough", 95 "no opinion."

Using the above and other responses to the questionnaire, the Planning Board considered it only fair to let the voters act according to these judgments and accordingly placed in the town warrant an article for the adoption of a basic building code and another article for a simplified zoning ordinance.

The Planning Board was fortunate in enlisting a group of citizens who have voluntarily given time and much energy to perform a service which has met high professional standards. Unlike some communities we did not have to rely on expensive, private advisers and consultants to comply with the state mandate for a master plan. This listing of the committee's names (Planning Advisory Committee) is but small recompense for their services: John Hraba, Chairman; Alfred W. Amundsen; Raymond H. Ayers; John E. Bowker; Titia Bozuwa; James F. Keating, Jr.; Stephen Michalsky, Jr.; Betty S. O'Brien; Ralph Samuelson; George W. Searle.

It is only fitting for the chair to commend Robert H. Glidden for his service as building permit officer, and for the cooperation extended by each member of the Planning Board.

Progress Summary

TRAINING: This year all Special Officers received New Hampshire State Certification.

Sgt. Anna Reid served on the staff for the Training Counsel as a Juvenile specialist.

Officers received New Hampshire State Certification as Radar Operators.

RECORDS: An accurate and detailed Record System is necessary for a Police Department to function efficiently. It provides citizens with information readily, and makes the Department accountable for time and performance by daily documenting activity.

This year clerical assistance has enabled us to complete the final phase of organization. Our records have been systemized, resulting in more productive man hours in crime prevention, detection, and apprehension of violators.

PATROLS: A trial summer Foot Patrol was instituted and proved effective in preventing congregating of disorderly groups.

A special Burglary Patrol was instituted by the Department. 640 Hours of patrol was added to the schedule to effectively reduce Burglaries.

The Wakefield Area Ambulance Corps successfully completed 120 calls in 1981. This reflects a drop of 4 calls in ambulance usage over 1980. Increase snowfall in December led to more activity for the month, and an anticipated greater use this winter.

With our beepers (message relay units) Volunteer workers on call have more freedom of movement with increased efficiency. We now have a unit of 11 volunteers.
