TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough in said State of New Hampshire; qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at 7:30 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To elect necessary town officers and school officers for the ensuing year and ensuing three years.
- Article 2. Shall the zoning be amended by adding Article VI B Trailer Residential District to the Zoning, Building and Road Ordinances for the Town of Bedford, New Hampshire, as proposed by the Planning Board, be adopted for this Town? (Recommended by the Planning Board.)
- Article 3. Shall the zoning ordinance be amended by adding Article IV B Apartment Residential District to the Zoning, Building and Road Ordinances for the Town of Bedford, New Hampshire, as proposed by the Planning Board be adopted for this Town? (Recommended by the Planning Board.)
- Article 4. Shall the Zoning Amendment to change the classification of a plot of land, presently owned by Pearl Dowd and adjacent to Horne's Nursery on Route 3, from Agricultural to Commercial ,as recommended by the Planning Board, be adopted for this Town?
- Artcle 5. Shall the Town grant to the Planning Board authority to adopt the proposed land sub-division regulations in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 36, Subdivisions 19 through 29, New Hampshire Revised Statutes annotated 1955?

Voting on the above Articles shall be by written ballot. Polls are to open at 7;30 A. M. and are not to close earlier than 6 P. M.

At 8 P. M. action will be taken on the following Articles in the Warrant:

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes in a sum not to exceed Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) if needed and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the payment of interest on such borrowing.

- Artcile 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and apprpriate the sum of Five Thousand Six Hundred Eighteen Dollars and Fifteen Cents (\$5,618.15) for the operation and maintenance of the Bedford Public Library.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to secure the services of an architect to prepare preliminary plans and estimates for a new Library Building incorporating offices for Town Officials, the construction of same to be acted on at the 1966 Town Meeting. (Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars and Twenty Six Cents, (\$1,338.26) for the construction of Class V Highways within the own, provided that the State of New Hampshire shall contribute Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty One Dollars and Seventy Six Cents ,\$8,921.76) toward such construction.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00) for the tarring of Class V Highways within the Town under the direction of the Selectmen.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new Fire Truck. (Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Road Grader.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a tractor Loader.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to eliminate the full time Police Department and full time Police Chief and establish a part time Police Chief and Department. (By Petition.)

- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Police Chief annually beginning with the next Town Meeting in March, 1966.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$16,500.00) to operate and maintain the Town Police Department.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) to trade the present Police Car for a new cruiser.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Two Dollars (\$42.00) for the maintenance of a street light at the corner of County and Back River Roads. (Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$2,850.00) to trade the Tractor and Mower.
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to improve the upper road in the Center Cemetery.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to modernize the Rest Rooms in the Town Hall.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00) to purchase an electrically operated Addressing and Imprinting Machine.
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to assist in the appraisal and evaluation of the taxable property of the Town, and to appropriate such sum as may be required to reimburse the State Tax Commission for such assistance as provided by R.S.A. 71:29. (By Petition.)
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) which ap-

proximates one third the actual cost to the Town of the appraisal and evaluation of the taxable property as requested in Article 24. (Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.)

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a change in the Tax Collector's rate of compensation from 3/4 of 1 percent to the percentage schedule as suggested by the State Tax Commission:

Percentage schedule:

up to \$100,000.00—1%

\$100,000.00 to \$500,000.00—3/4 of 1% \$500,000.00 to \$4,000,000.00—1/10 of 1%.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Conservation Commission as set forth in R.S.A. 36-A. (By Petition.)

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to tax permanent-type Swimming Pools at the prevailing property tax rate. (By Petition.)

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept Rockwood Court in its entirety, 1,445 feet x 50 feet wide.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept Westview Road in a Southerly direction from North Amherst Road for a distance of 350 feet by 40 feet wide and 1,750 feet by 50 feet wide.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept Garrison Drive from Old Bedford Road for a distance of 1,710 feet by 50 feet wide.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept Random Road from Strawberry Hill Road Southerly for a distance of 850 feet by 50 feet wide.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept Curtis Lane Southerly and then Easterly for a distance of 900 feet by 50 feet wide as an extension of the previously accepted Curtis Lane.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept Pinecrest Drive, extending from previously accepted road 440 feet by 50 feet wide.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept Pinecrest Circle Easterly from Pine Crest Drive for a distance of 300 feet by 50 feet wide to a temporary turn around.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept Savoie Street Northerly for a distance of 400 feet by 50 feet wide as an extension of the previously accepted Savoie Street.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

The Budget Committee has prepared the budget after many meetings with the respective department heads, the School Board and the Selectmen. There are a few items that deserve special comment and they are as follows:

TOWN BUDGET

POLICE DEPARTMENT — The Budget Committee recommends the amount of \$16,500 in lieu of \$17,535 requested by the Police Department. After detailed analysis of this request, it was felt that prudent management of funds, the elimination of unnecessary items such as latent print cameras, photography fees, excess private car mileage, and the establishing of fixed salary of \$5,500.00 and \$4,680.00 for the two permanent policemen were consistent with the needs of the town and the expenditures of comparative towns.

ASSESSMENT ARTICLE—This article is contingent on the preceding petitioned article being passed. The matter of reassessment is a question of policy to be determined by the voters, consequently the Budget Committee submits this appropriation article without recommendation; thus enabling the voters to act on this article and appropriate funds, if necessary.

STREET LIGHT—It is not the function of the Budget Committee to decide where street lights should be located in the Town. The Committee does recognize that some lights are necessary, but that the Town cannot afford lights on all poles. It therefore submits this article without recommendation so that it is in the Budget and the voters can decide if a light is necessary in this location.

ARCHITECT'S STUDY OF NEW BUILDING—This article is submitted in the budget without recommendation so that the Town Meeting may determine the policy for the Town and appropriate the amount requested, if necessary.

CAPITAL RESERVE FUND (FIRE TRUCK)—A majority of the Budget Committee felt that since this is the commencement of a new reserve fund for a fire truck, it would be appropriate for the voters to consider and act upon the policy of Capital

Reserve Funds in general and their effect on the fiscal and tax policies of the Town.

SCHOOL BUDGET

SPECIAL ARTICLE KINDERGARTEN—The Budget Committee submits this article without recommendation so that the voters may set the policy on this subject and appropriate funds, if necessary.

ITEM 1267 EQUIPMENT—The Budget Committee eliminated an item for a floor washing machine as they felt it a luxury rather than a necessity.

SUMMER SCHOOL—It was felt by the Budget Committee that the Summer School should be operated on a self-liquidating basis.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

To the Selectmen:

The Planning Board held 15 meetings, including the regular monthly meetings in addition to three special meetings, during the past year. At the March 1964 Town Meeting, the Board submitted amendments to the Zoning Ordinance, a new land classification map and requested authority to establish Land Sub-Division Regulations, in accordance with the recommendations contained in the Comprehensive Town Plan. The Town rejected all proposals.

In July after several public hearings, the Town, at a Special Town Meeting, was asked to vote on the reclassification of the Bourque property, located on Route 3 and Moore's Crossing Road, from Agricultural to Industrial Park Zone and to prescribe regulations for such classification. The Planning Board recommended these changes and the Town voted overwhelmingly to approve them. At the present time Mr. David Foster is planning to develop this area as an Industrial Park.

A land classification map has been prepared and is on file at the office of the Selectmen.

At the Town Meeting this year the Board requests that the Town approve Land Sub-Division Regulations with the added provision that any amendments or changes would have to come before the Town Meeting and be approved before they could be adopted. Sub-division regulations will ensure conformance with the Comprehensive Town Plan. The complete text of the proposed regulations are included in the Town Warrant printed in the front of this Town Report.

The Board has submitted an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance to include a Trailer Residential Zone. This would require

any new trailers to be located in such a zone. The Board urges the adoption of these proposals.

Several other changes have been submitted to the Board for inclusion in the Warrant by interested individuals. These have been discussed and heard at two Public Hearings and appear on the ballot. At the time of this writing the hearings have as yet not been held and the Board has expressed no opinion regarding these propositions.

A meeting was held during the year with a representative of the Jordan Marsh Co. relative to the possibility of locating the proposed shopping center in Bedford. As yet, no answer has been forthcoming.

The new fire truck has a great deal more power which enables us to reach the scene those precious few minutes earlier and knock the fire down in its incipent stage. We have added several new members to the Department in the past year. These men along with our regular members have undergone a rigid training program. The training program has been held twice a month for the past two years. Several members also attended the state sponsored fire school at Meadowood.

Fifty oil burner permits were issued during 1964. Outside of a few violations noted, we feel that the people of Bedford will receive a more safe installation due to these inspections. We are receiving good cooperation from the heating installers.

We would like to thank the people of Bedford for their splendid cooperation in fire prevention. It is only through the combined efforts of every person in town that we will keep our fire loss at a minimum.

We would also like to thank the Police Department for their splendid cooperation at time of fires. Through their investigation, several incendiary fires were solved.

It is with deep regret that I submit my resignation from the Fire Department. Due to health and other commitments, I feel unable to give the Department the time I feel that a fire chief should.

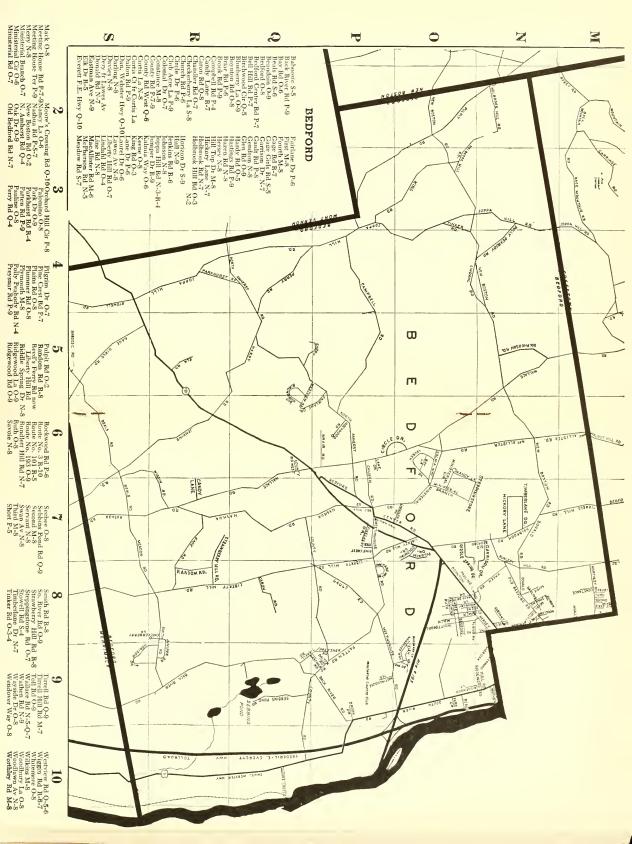

REPORT OF THE BEDFORD CIVIL DEFENSE ORGANIZATION

It is most gratifying to your Director to be able to report that during a recent nationwide Civil Defense Exercise, when an alert came via the Fire Department's Red Phone, of a simulated nuclear attack, when the members of the Organization were notified, all responded within a forty minute period, reporting at the Town Hall, tho inadequate, the Operating Center, there was but one exception, and that one person was within easy reach in case of real need. We had expected such an alert, but this came a full day earlier, so that this response on the part of the Bedford C. D. Team is a true index of the interest and dedication of your follow Townspeople, in meeting a possible Town emergency.

The Fire Chief reports that Leo Bongers, Chief of First Aid and Light Rescue, has given the Fire department personnel training in first aid and that continuing training in rescue and safety techniques will go on thru the year. Added safety equipment has been purchased and has been incorporated in the department. A full set of "air" splints are now in their possession. Walkie Talkies have been provided, their use demonstrated.

Dick Durette, Chief of Radiological and George Cleaver, Chief of Communications, report that weekly exercises have been carried on, via the Bedford Net, the County Races Net, and the State Operations Center in Concord. Radiological problems transmitted thru the above networks for local solutions by the Radio Teams. We expect to provide the Fire Department with added Walkie Talkies, mobile equipment is to be built to enable the Communications Center to become Mobile, is as much as the Town Hall would be inadequate, to furnish protection to operators, and would enable the equipment to be in use tho moveable in cars.

The Organization wishes to inform the Townspeople that the present CD Alerting Horn is woefully inadequate, reaching a small percent of our residents. We have requested that a survey of the true need be made and evaluated, a multiple siren type, similar to that being installed in Milford is desirable. Thus the Red Phone would be alerting and activating instumentality of any emergency,

this could and would carry fire alams, as well as the Civil Defense signals. This involves an expenditure of several thousand dollars, the present horn now in use, could be used as partial payment of such costs. Half of such a system would be paid by matching funds, half comes from the Towns funds the other from State and National Civil Defense.

It is hoped that at that Town Meeting the Townspeople will give your C. D. Organization some indication, either approving or disapproving such an installation, it is not the responsibility of a small handful but the united judgment of the whole town to make the decision, whether we should develop this part of our Town safety adequately.

Again, quoting Radio Chief Dick Durette, and Communications Chief George Cleaver, we issue our yearly warning, that during and after NUCLEAR ATTACK, NO ONE SHOULD GO OUTSIDE HIS SHELTER OR HOME UNTIL POSITIVE CLEARANCE HAS BEEN GIVEN BY YOUR OWN RADIATION DETECTOR OR A MEMBER OF OUR RADIOLOGICAL TEAMS; MONITOR YOUR PORTABLE RADIO (battery operated) AND WAIT!

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficient of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2,280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in the community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state in now 86% wooded and its economy —both industrial and recreational—is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area-4,350.000 acres-is everyone's responsibility and prevention is on of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out

2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.

3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are

confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965. Number of fires and burned area in 1964.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

The purpose of this report is to keep you in mind of the activities of the Bedford Library, the librarians and the trustees. There are two items of business we would like to report. At the January, 1964 meeting it was voted to double the present insurance on the contents of the library building, bringing the insurance from \$5,000 to \$10,000. Later in the year it was voted that the Bedford Public Library should become an affiliated member of the "New Hampshire Statewide Library Improvement Program."

Perhaps the outstanding event of the year was the Art Exhibit, held at the Library during National Library Week, April 12-18. A silver tea was held in the Little Green House, the Saturday previous to the Exhibit, honoring the artists. There were 37 exhibitors during the week, 92 works of art, and approximately 500 visitors to the Library. Our librarians justly received high praise for their effort.

May was a month of library meetings. The N. H. Association of Trustees met at the Presbyterian Parish House on May 5th. Mr. Gerald Hyde, Chairman of our Trustees, welcomed the group to Bedford. On May 14th the Annual Meeting of the N. H. Library Association was held in Concord at St. Paul's School, with our Frances Wiggin presiding as President. During the morning business session Mrs. Wiggin was re-elected to serve on a second term as President of the group and all three sessions of the day were excellent—the high point, the lecture by Louis Untermeyer, poet and critic, as the after dinner speaker. In September, Mrs. Wiggin was busy with four regional meetings of the Association. Also in September, Mrs. Wiggin and Mrs. Smiley attended the annual meeting of the N. H. Library Trusteees Association.

The usual Summer Reading Contest for Young People was held during the Summer, with 55 young people participating and 800 books read. The Contest culminated in November during "Children's Book Week" with a party given by the Librarians and Trustees to the winners of the contest. "Children's Book Week" (Nov. 1 to Nov. 7) was observed in other ways. Mrs. Wiggin spoke to the 6th Grade at Memorial School on "Library Procedures" and invited them to visit the Library and bring their parents. This resulted in several new borrowers. Also added to our list, during this week, were several groups from the Steven Buswell School with their teachers, who visited the Library.

As usual our library friends have been generous to us. During the year we have acknowledged gifts of books from Mr. George Woodbury twice, a two year subscription to "The Horn Book Magazine" from Mrs. Helen Fletcher honoring her mother, a subscription to the Atlantic Monthly from Miss Elizabeth Farrar, a book of poems by Jean Carlisle from her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sumner Carlisle, a supply of text books from a friend of Mr. Bailey's, Mr. Raymond Rondeau, of the Merchants National Bank and a gift of money from the Bedford American Legion Auxiliary. The Mother's Club always remembers us with a gift of money with which to purchase children's books. Very recently a gift of a portable stereo record player to the Library has been made by Attorney and Mrs. John Carleton. Our thanks go to many other people who have helped us during the year with gifts of books, magazines and their time.

We would like to report that the Farrar Fund has been used to buy reference books, which a library can never have enough of. Also, following a book sale held at the Town Hall in December, a gift of money to the library was made of \$368.00 from the Library Associates. This gift has been used to buy books for the Library. We want to mention here, too, the excellent publicity given the Library by "Welcome Wagon" during the year in distributing to new families information concerning the Library, its location, hours, and an invitation to visit us. This has resulted in new subscribers, week after week! We must never forget the service rendered by the "Book Mobile," a function of the state of New Hampshire. This year we have been the highest borrowers in our district from the "Bookmobile" in the State. The books, together with books from our own library, are loaned to the various town and school libraries, doubling their usefulness.

In closing, a good deal of time has been spent by both librarians and trustees in discussing a larger and more adequate housing for the Bedford Library. Conferences have been held with Mr. Majeski, and Mr. Allen, our State Librarian. At the present writing we can only say that we have confidence that the voters of Bedford realize the need of the Library, and will see to it that it is housed in a building adequate and suitable to the growth and calibre of our townspeople.

REPORT OF THE BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD

The present school year will probably best be remembered for two events. First, this was the year of completion of the McKelvie School. This fine structure represents years of planning by your School Board, educational consultants, and, particularly, by many interested and devoted citizens. I sincerely believe that this building is not only beautful but, more important, functional and flexible, and will well serve the needs of this community for many, many years to come.

The second important event was the increase this year of grade one from three sections to four sections. We had hoped that this event would not occur until at least September 1965. During the present school year we had planned to operate all grades on a three section basis and it is clear at the present time that we will also need four sections of grade one and two next year. To meet the demands of this increased enrollment next year we will have to reopen either the Peter Woodbury School or the Stevens-Buswell School. There will be a special article in the warrant for the School District meeting requesting a public kindergarten. If this article is approved we will probably reopen the Stevens-Buswell School and place the kindergarten and first grade in that building. If the kindergarten is not approved, the Peter Woodbury School will be reopened.

During the current year two other events have occurred which are worthy of note. The State of New Hampshire purchased for \$1,900 approximately 2½ acres of the Memorial School property for the extension of the Manchester By-Pass to Grasmere. Fortunately, the land acquired by the State is the gully and steep bank located East of the school building and its loss will have no effect whatsoever on the school. Last year the voters authorized the School Board to sell the Donald Street School. The School Board advertised for bids and the bid of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Manchester in the amount of \$5,700 was accepted. This school served the District well for many, many years but it has outlived its usefulness as a part of your educational program.

Last spring the Supervisory Union engaged Claude Leavitt as Superintendent of Schools. Mr. Leavitt came to us with considerable administrative experience and we have found him a vigorous and efficient Superintendent who has been of inestimable assistance to your Board during the last eight months. Raymond

Edwards has continued to serve us ably and well as the Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

This year the District was also fortunate in engaging Peter Dolloff as Principal of the Memorial School and Carl Shaw as Principal of the McKelvie School. Because of the ever increasing enrollment it was decided to hire both of the Principals on an eleven month basis rather than a school year basis. This will be of great benefit to the District since it will give the Principals much needed time to devote to planning of curriculum, and scheduling and their many other administrative tasks.

Two things which always increase are pupils and salaries. Most of the local School Districts, except Manchester, are planning to increase minimum teachers' salaries into the range of \$4,700 to \$5,000. Last year Bedford adopted a minimum of \$4,400. This year the School Board in its budget has asked the voters to approve a small increase in teachers' salaries to remain competitive at least with Manchester and has further asked for full-time teachers in art, music and physical education. Both art and music are presently taught by part time teachers who have done excellent work despite the fact that the time available per class is almost negligible. Now that we have adequate facilities available to all our children for physical education we hope the voters will approve a full time teacher in this field. These full time teachers will greatly enrich our educational program at a relatively small cost.

In closing I should like to express my thanks to the Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, the Principals, teachers, to Ruth Gott, Hot Lunch Director, Gladys Smend, School Nurse, and all the cooks and custodians who have worked so hard during the past year. Bedford is certainly fortunate to have such willing and devoted personnel in its school system. My special thanks to my fellow Board member, Ann Van Loan. This has been a very exciting and rewarding year. At the same time it has been a busy year full of problems and decisions. In all, I believe it has been a most successful year, marred only by the terrible tragedy of Jack Mc-Kelvie's death on November 20, 1964. Jack worked tirelessly as a member of the Board. In the few short months that he was allowed to serve he accomplished much and he left us a beautiful school which will reflect, for years to come, his fine taste. Jack always claimed to represent only the interest of the school children—and our children and our District are richer because Jack lived and served them.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

January, 1965

To the School Board and Citizens of Bedford:

Today, more than ever before, improvement in the quantity and quality of public education is necessary. Better education demands an expanded and upgraded curriculum to meet the needs of every child. To meet the needs of curriculum changes and increased enrollments adequate building facilities are required. All of these needs serve to point the need for greater understanding and respect for the mutual responsibilities of the voters, boards of education and educators. It is only by the cooperation of all people that our educational problems can be resolved.

The people of Bedford are to be commended for providing an attractive and functional learning environment that is evident in the McKelvie School. This building should serve as a memorial not only to a devoted and sincere public servant, John N. McKelvie, but to the people of Bedford as well, for their genuine respect and enthusiasm for education.

Every effort has been and will continue to be made to fill our classrooms with highly trained and qualified teachers. We are pleased to note the following additions to our present instructional staff:

Miss Linda Blanchard of Peterboro, a graduate of Keene State College, is our special class teacher.

Mrs. Irene Colpitts, a graduate of Plymouth State College, is teaching grade two with four years of experience.

Miss Kathleen Foye of Manchester, a graduate of Plymouth State College, is teaching grade five.

Mr. Richard Janelle of Manchester, a graduate of St. Anselm's, College, is teaching science and mathematics in grades seven and eight.

Miss Barbara Ramig, a graduate of Keene State College, is teaching grade two.

Mr. Richard Kleinfelder, a graduate of Plymouth State College, is teaching grade six.

Mr. Peter Dolloff replaces Mr. Donald Fournier as principal of the Memorial School. Mr. Dolloff is a graduate of Holy Cross.

Mr. Carl Shaw, a graduate of Springfield College, is the principal of the McKelvie School.

The need to attract and hold good teachers is an annual problem. With the present shortage of qualified teachers and the competition for high salaries no district can afford to neglect its salary payment plan. Bedford needs to continue to give this matter high priority when considering budgetary items.

Both the Memorial and McKelvie schools are being fully utilized this year. We anticipate the need for an additional second grade for 1965-66. This will require the utilization of the Peter Woodbury School facilities. By opening this school and using three rooms next year it will meet two needs. First it will provide adequate classroom space for the next few years and secondly allow for the implementation of a full-time art program in all schools. The expansion of art and music into full-time programs in addition to physical education, will provide better and varied educational opportunities for the children of Bedford. Both the quality and quantity of education will be improved by these curriculum changes.

In conclusion I would like to acknowledge the cooperation, enthusiasm, and hard work that has characterized the performance of the members of the Bedford School Board during the past six months. The tragic passing of Mr. McKelvie has not only increased their responsibilities but has made them even more determined to perform the tasks of providing improved educational opportunities in Bedford. The work of Mr. Shaw and Mr. Doloff, our two principals, together with our entire instructional and non-instructional staffs is appreciated.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Mr. Claude H. Leavitt Superintendent of Schools Bedford, New Hampshire Dear Mr. Leavitt:

The following paragraphs constitute my report as Assistant Superintendent in the School District of Bedford, New Hampshire.

The Bedford School District crossed many milestones in the past year in its determined drive to lay a solid foundation for the building of an excellent and progressive educational program. The building of the McKelvie School has provided opportunities and challenges of exciting dimensions with numerous implications.

This building program has allowed the bringing together of primary grade children under one roof thus allowing the faculty of the Memorial School to move an important step closer to the implementation of an ungraded primary school system. As the mechanics of the current program have been ably described in Mr. Dolloff's report, I will limit myself to a few comments con-

cerning the implications of such an organizational plan.

Gone is the day when Bedford's schools can be looked upon as composed of a series of little boxes in which are isolated classes of 25 to 30 children guided down the path of learning by one teacher. The closer we get to an ungraded program, the higher the degree of cooperation and teamwork that becomes mandatory. The teamwork of which I speak can be described as the implementation of a total school program to which all children are exposed. The energies and special talents of each individual teacher must be collectively brought to bear on the problem of constructing and maintaining a program that will meet individual needs within the school. Under the able leadership of Mr. Dolloff, the Memorial School houses one of the most closely knit teams of teachers with which I have had the privilege to work. The program in this building was not imposed. It grew out of the teachers' concern with finding ways to more completely meet the needs of their pupils.

Those who approach an ungraded program with due respect for pitfalls realize that quality education is not inherent in the organizational plan of nongrading. Rather, as recently pointed out by Madeline Hunter of the University of California, quality education can result from the wise application of the philosophy of nongrading—from the diagnosis of the educational needs of individual children and the availability of alternatives for creating educational prescriptions. It is the function of the organizational plan to make

these alternatives available.

The ungraded primary system is an organizational plan that does not leave a child's placement to chance, but rather forces educational decision—making that takes three important considerations into account: the teaching style that most successfully motivates, the peer group that most successfully stimulates, and the educational opportunities that most successfully advance the learning of each child.

As in the case of the Memorial School, the construction of the McKelvie School has opened a multitude of doors which can and will provide improved educational opportunities for children in grades 5-8. Of prime importance are the vastly improved science facilities now available. The study of science in depth with student involvement in the learning process are now the keynotes of

this aspect of the educational program.

The combination library-study center will prove in the long run to be the most significant innovation in the educational program offered to Bedford students. In reality it is a research center which will be equipped with every tool necessary to make this area the center of the instructional program of the McKelvie School.

The fine, fully equipped gymnasium offers Bedford townspeople the opportunity to provide for their children a complete physical education program. This should be done at the earliest possible date. Although the primary function of this facility is to serve the children of Bedford, it offers a wide range of adult physical education and sports activities. Provision for the maximum utilization of the gymnasium should be of immediate concern to the people of Bedford.

Despite the inevitable and unavoidable difficulties involved in opening a new school during the school year, instructional standards at the McKelvie School have been maintained at a high level. The efficiency with which this school facility is being operated is a credit to Principal Carl Shaw and the collective

action and attitude of the entire staff.

I would like to emphasize that maintenance of high educational standards in the Bedford schools has been in large part due to Bedford's insistence that instructional groups be kept to reasonable size. It is my sincere hope that this policy will be a continuing one. Well trained and conscientious teachers placed in charge of reasonably sized groups of children are the primary prerequisites of excellent educational opportunities.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL BEDFORD MEMORIAL SCHOOL

Mr. Claude Leavitt Superintendent of Schools Bedford, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

It is with a great deal of pleasure and not a little anxiety to be about the work that lies ahead that I submit my first annual report.

To say that we cannot begin too soon is certainly an understatement at a time when we must prepare our children for a future in a space age whose possibilities and demands are almost beyond comprehension. With the awarenes of this awesome responsibility clearly in mind, the organization and curriculum of our lower elementary grades is undergoing a careful examination and evaluation. Before making any changes, however, we are being careful to analyze their effects and to implement them slowly as the needs and demands of our community dictate.

The first few months of school saw a great deal of time and energy being devoted to the preparations necessary for the consolidation of our primary grades in one building. Due to the untiring effort and zeal of the teaching staff, and the cooperation of the children and parents, this move was accomplished as efficiently and quickly as posible. The first three grades and two sections of the fourth are now housed in the Bedford Memorial School. This centralization allows for greater efficiency of administration and the opportunity to coordinate the organization and curriculum of these lower grades.

In an effort to loosen the vertical structure of the school and to provide for the optimum development of each child we have made several changes in our school organization. We have extended the Joplin Plan to include the first grades. Children in the first grades regroup into homogeneous reading groups for one and a half hours in the morning and an additional 45 minutes in the afternoon. This allows the teachers to work with children in a similar range of ability and to regroup within the classroom diag-

nostically. We are paying close attention to this program under the direction of our Assistant Superintendent, and with the advice and assistance of a professional reading consultant.

The second and third grades are now grouped homogeneously according to reading ability. They regroup once during the morning into homogeneous groups for arithmetic and once three afternoons a week into mixed, heterogeneous groups for science and social studies. In the higher academic areas of reading and arithmetic this program gives the teacher the opportunity of working within a narrow range of ability while the children are given the opportunity of participating in a mixed group for science and social studies. This type of organization also allows for those children, either exceptionally advanced or retarded in certain subject areas to move forward or backward through grade barriers in those subject areas concerned.

We have organized a series of ten levels based on achievement in the areas of language arts in the first grade and language arts and arithmetic in the second, third, and fourth grades. The teachers on each grade level meet, once every week to discuss the possibility of changing a youngster from one level to another. As previously stated a child may progress or move back to a level in a particular subject area even if this necessitates crossing a grade barrier.

Our hope for the future is to establish a truly ungraded primary based on ten levels. The children will be homogeneously grouped according to achievement in language arts and arithmetic. They will also regroup into mixed heterogeneous groups for the areas of science, social studies, and physical education. There will be freedom of movement both horizontally and vertically with children working on levels where they are most comfortable and capable of finding success. Although allowed to progress at their own rate, the pupils will be required to cover thoroughly the subject skills as established for the various levels of achievement.

In the area of curriculum the Greater Cleveland Mathematics Program is now in its second year of operation in grades 1-4. The teachers as well as the students are constantly working to adapt themselves to the program and their efforts are beginning to bear fruit. It is a thrilling experience to those of us associated with the program to realize that children as early as the first grade are gaining an insight and understanding of the mathematical process that was not possible under traditional programs.

We are currently initiating a study of our social studies curriculum for grades 1-8. We will of course include in our consideration suggested revisions from the State Department of Education which is currently making a study of the state program under the guidance of Dr. Linwood Chase of Boston University.

We hope to expand our offerings in the areas of art and music. Too often we are guilty of neglecting these areas so necessary to the development of the complete child. It is hoped that more time will be devoted to an appreciation and understanding of the aesthetic qualities inherent in these subject areas, in an effort to establish a sound basic set of values at this early stage in their school experience.

In conclusion I would like to say that my first eight months in the service of the Town of Bedford have been both a rewarding and an inspiring experience. I would like to thank the School Board, Mr. Edwards, the staff, the children, the citizens of Bedford, and yourself for your cooperation, assistance, and guidance.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL BEDFORD McKELVIE SCHOOL

1964-65

Today, rapid advances are being made in our society and to prepare our students for their future educational pursuits the curriculum of the school must be continually studied, evaluated and modified.

SCIENCE

Upon moving from the Memorial School to the McKelvie School, the science program was greatly enhanced by the fine science laboratory. Students are learning laboratory techniques and are conducting experiments which closely relate to work in the classroom. By participating in laboratory exercises, the students obtain a clearer understanding of science concepts; consequently, the whole science program becomes very meaningful to the students.

To provide seventh and eighth grade students with a rich background for future science courses, they are being presented units of study in four broad areas: (1) earth science, (2) biology, (3) chemistry and (4) physics. The entire science program is and will continue to be studied in order to determine what changes or modifications should be made for next year.

MATHEMATICS

Modern math programs are designed not simply to present mathematical principles to students but to explain why and how the principles were developed.

Last year the Greater Cleveland Modern Mathematics Program was introduced to all sections of grades one through four. The program has been expanded this year to include all sections of grade five and the top section of grade six. Next year all sixth grade sections will be included in the Greater Cleveland Program.

Currently, the top sections of grades seven and eight are taking a modern math program published by Silver-Burdett. As the Silver-Burdett Program includes only the top sections, con-

sideration is being given to including more or all seventh and eighth groups in the program. Also, consideration is being given to adopting the recently published Greater Cleveland Junior High Program.

READING

Reading has long been and will continue to be the most important program in the elementary school. Our students in grades four, five and six are participating in a program of thoughtful, imaginative reading rather than one which would simply have students glean facts from a printed page.

To effect good instruction in reading, grouping procedures are often necessary in elementary classrooms. Students are first grouped homogeneously within each grade with subsequent smaller instructional groups formed within each classroom. Such grouping allows students to progress at individual rates of speed and provides for adequate attention to individual differences.

LIBRARY

Our well equipped library is presently in the process of being organized. Many new books have been added to the library, and more are being carefully selected. In ordering books for all grade levels, a balance between fiction and non-fiction books is being maintained.

In addition to books, the library will contain filmstrips, records and tapes for use by students and teachers. Many of these audio-visual aids have been ordered with others yet to be selected.

Organizing a library requires much work and time. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mrs. Ralph Wiggin, Jr., and Mrs. Byron Peck for their fine cooperation in offering to help set up the library and advising us on all aspects of library organization.

MUSIC AND ART

Both art and music are offered to all students in the school. However, in grades one through six both programs are offered on a voluntary basis once each week. Consideration is being given to expanding both the music and art programs next year.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the School Board, Mr. Claude H. Leavitt, Mr. Raymond G. Edwards and the Faculty of McKelvie School for their support and devotion to the educational program of the school. I also wish to thank Mrs. Ruth Gott and the Hot Lunch Staff; the school nurse, Mrs. Gladys Smend; and the school custodians, Mr. Gordon Ellison and Mr. Donald Flanders, for their cooperation in providing services to the school.

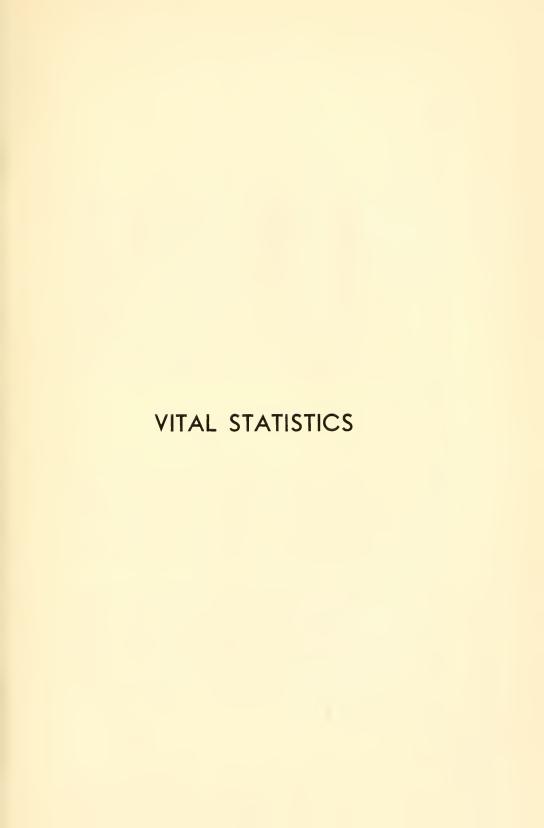
