THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chichester on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for the prompt payment of property taxes; the same as in 1952.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of current year taxes and to issue notes therefor in the name and on the credit of the Town, said notes to be repaid from receipts of current year taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred eighty-five dollars and forty-eight cents (\$385.48) for payment of 1952 Blister Rust control, and four hundred dollars (\$400.) for 1953 Blister Rust control.

6. To see if the Town shall adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano in this Town.

7. To see if the Town will vote to construct a basement, partially under the present Town Hall and partially to the rear thereof, move the building back onto same and make such repairs thereto as are necessary; and for such purposes vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000), One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) to be raised from taxes this year and Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) to be borrowed

on notes payable in three equal payments in 1954, 1955 and 1956.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize their Fire Department to go to the assistance of another town, or city according to the provisions of Chapter 175 of the Revised Laws, and Amendments, thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600) for new snow plow.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy dollars (\$70) for the Merrimack Valley Region Association.
- 11. To see if the voters will choose a committee not to exceed five (5), to confer with the Town Officials or a similar committee from the town of Epsom relative to perpetuating Deermeadow Pond as a fishing, wildlife, water fowl, recreational and residential area. This committee to report back at the next town meeting with any plans or recommendations that the joint committees may see fit to make.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to allow the collector of taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the state head tax and to fix the amount thereof.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE CHICHESTER VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

As chief of the Chichester Volunteer Fire Department for 1953, I would like to dedicate this 1952 report to the memory of John C. Langmaid. It was he who first started the idea of having a Volunteer Fire Department in Chichester and became our first Fire Chief. From this beginning in 1936, with 24 charter members, we have grown to 62 active members, a fire station, 2 trucks, 2 portable pumps and approximately 2500 feet of hose. One truck is a pumper carrying; ladders, 200 gallons of wet water, 40 feet of 4 inch suction hose, an 80 gallon per minute portable pump, plus 1800 feet of high pressure hose including a one-inch booster hose and reel. The other truck, a tanker, carries; 800 gallons of water, 30 feet of 21/2-inch suction hose, a new high pressure portable pump, and 700 feet of 11/2inch high pressure hose, including a one inch booster line and reel. Both trucks carry a special fog nozzle along with the regular assortment of standard nozzles and other fire fighting tools. Both trucks are now equipped with 2-way radio. This will enable us to talk with each other, the State Forestry Department, or any other fire department in the surrounding area.

At this time on behalf of the Chichester Department I wish to extend sincere thanks to Mr. Clifford Shaw for his donation of \$50.00 towards these radios. We also extend sincere thanks to the Ladies Auxiliary, for their donations of fire coats, hats, and boots and also for other services rendered. These hats, coats, and boots have already seen service and are on the two trucks. Our Dept. has been called out during the past year for 8 chimney fires, one brush fire, 1 grass fire and 2 house

fires, one of these caused by lightning. The Dept. is now making preparations to start a new Fire house. This is to be a two-story wood structure approximately 30 x 40 feet. Some money, lumber, siding, etc. have already been donated by interested townspeople, and any other donations will be gratefully accepted.

In closing, I wish to express on behalf of the Firemen our great respect for the efficient manner in which our past chief Charles Call, ran the Dept. during his 12 years as Chief. Also for the work and other things he did beyond the line of duty which was of benefit to us and the town.

- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, Committees, in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the

balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to allow the School Board to make fuel and transportation contracts for periods not to exceed three years. This article to remain in effect until rescinded.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chichester School District:

I would like to mention some basic needs of Chichester Central School which should be given considera-

tion by the people.

In Chichester, as elsewhere, school enrollment is now beginning the upward climb. It is a fact that throughout the country first grade enrollments are about 20 per cent above last year's figure, and that next September will bring another 12 per cent rise. Chichester has already felt this upward swing. Forty-five children registered for grades one and two last fall. In order to meet this emergency, a part-time teacher was added. This fall a full time teacher will be needed for grade one which should be separated from grade two. Such an arrangement is vitally necessary to care for the needs of the children. This would relieve the situation of overcrowding in the lower children's group.

By proper combination of the other grades it will be possible to give all reasonably good opportunities

for learning.

It is also recommended that thought be given to providing for more active sports for the boys and girls of the upper grades, especially. Games such as touch football, baseball, basketball are natural play activities for children of this age. Organized playground periods, each under teacher supervision, and with games suited to the age group, are very valuable as a means of relaxation and of giving real enjoyment while at the same time promoting good health.

It would be very helpful to some of the children to

have more chances to develop manual skills. Some instruction in handicrafts, the encouragement of hobbies, and some school recognition for individual achievement in these lines could be given attention. Learning, as we know, comes through participation in a wide variety of activities, and enriches each child differently. Individuality in children is more and more being recognized and given attention by successful teachers. It is one of the real challenges of education today.

The new equipment purchased for the school kitchen, and the improvements made there last summer add much to the kitchen and make the work of preparing and serving the lunches easier. This program

is being well administered.

The work of landscaping and grading has been another improvement. However, if the loose gravel around the building could be removed, or enough tar added to adhere it, there would be less gravel "tracked in" to the building. Nothing cuts up asphalt tile floors more than sharp particles of gravel carried in by many little feet.

Chichester can be pretty proud of its school and of the fact that its citizens are helping to plan for its growth and improvement. It is also, no doubt, aware of the real service of its local School Board, whose members are extremely alert and sensitive to the school's needs, and willingly give time and thought to caring for them.

I want to express my appreciation to this School Board, to the teachers who work with the children, and to the community whose support makes possible the improvement of educational opportunities for the chil-

dren of Chichester.
