### MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY.

All persons furnishing materials or service for the city, or aid to the city poor, should be particular to take the name of the person ordering such service, material, or aid, and should *know* that the person is duly authorized to contract such liability.

The city will not be holden for merchandise sold or delivered on city poor account, except on the written order of the overseer of the poor, and for no longer time than until his successor shall have been appointed and qualified.

Duplicate copies will be required of all bills payable by the city, furnished on county poor account.

All bills against the city must be approved by the person authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

Bills so certified should be left with the city clerk on or before the second day of the month.

If approved by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, they will be ready for payment on Thursday following the regular monthly meeting of the city government.

The regular monthly meetings of the city government occur on the second Monday of each month.

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#### INAUGUARAL ADDRESS OF ROBERT W. BROWN

MAYOR OF CONCORD, N. H., JANUARY 28, 1930

To the Board of Aldermen:

At the outset I feel called upon to say that my election as Mayor of my native City by the Board of Aldermen, and subsequent re-election by the people, is to me a source of mingled pride and satisfaction, and because I was originally selected to fill a vacancy caused by death it has been my constant endeavor to carry out, in a general way, the policy of my immediate predecessor, the late Olin H. Chase.

During the past two years the business of the City has been handled with a minimum of friction and the following outstanding results have been accomplished:

An appropriate celebration of Armistice Day was observed.

An extension of the sewer was made to serve residents of the extreme South End in the vicinity of Hall, Broadway, Rockingham, Wiggin, and South Main Streets.

The City Engineer reports that several new streets have been laid out and accepted.

An Engine Company, known as No. 5, has been organized in Ward 8 on the Plains.

In order to facilitate the transaction of city business, Miss M. A. Spencer has been appointed Deputy City Clerk.

A new piece of cement concrete road has been constructed from Fruit Street to St. Paul's School.

Town line signs have been placed on all roads leading out of Concord.

Repairs on City Hall and Auditorium have been authorized and the work is well under way.

Three pumping engines have been added to the equipment of the Fire Department.

The water system has been extended to East Concord village.

An entirely new system for the control of the Police and Fire Departments has been put in force. This system consists of Police and Fire Committees in the Board of Aldermen, both of which have enlarged powers of control.

The first steps have been taken looking to the possible re-location of both the Good-Will and Alert Fire Stations by acquiring the Franklin Street School property and land bordered by South, Broadway and West Streets.

The Penacook School, located at the corner of South State and West Streets, has been purchased for playground purposes.

Several points of extreme hazard on the trunk lines have been completely removed, or the dangers greatly reduced. In the latter class I point with much satisfaction to the increase in width of roadway on the curve at the Golf Station West Concord.

Discount on taxes, based on approximately the same rate at which money has been borrowed from Banking Institutions, was allowed to our citizens.

All roads, which have become dangerous through lack of use, have been posted, thereby relieving the City of liability in case of accidents.

It should be kept in mind that the Mayor takes no credit for these accomplishments beyond the fact that they had his full sanction and hearty approval.

During the coming two years I shall continue the policy of keeping the Board of Aldermen and general public informed of all important phases of city business.

Citizens individually or in organized groups who desire to make suggestions in the line of civic betterment and progress will receive respectful hearings in my office and all such matters when transmitted to the Board of Aldermen will be given careful consideration.

With the many demands for new projects that will add to the comfort, pleasure and safety of our people combined with those now under consideration; such as the swimming pool, completion of Athletic Field buildings, the Pembroke Bridge and other undertakings of less importance, I can see little or no hope of reduced taxation. In this connection the most that I can honestly promise is that I, with the support of the Board of Aldermen, will do all in my power to eliminate waste and extravagance.

I am opposed to any change in the method of garbage disposal at this time except in the matter of the City Dump. With the segregated collection that is now demanded there are many places where otherwise useless material can be used for filling purposes, thereby creating taxable property out of waste-land. Filling such as has been done along the Bog Road is a fair demonstration of the value of such material.

During my service as Mayor it has been by aim to thoroughly acquaint myself with the workings of all the City departments, with no thought of dominating the management of any, but rather to suggest change of methods that will be of benefit to the City. Several changes have already been made and others will become effective in 1930. The resulting improvements in methods could not have been accomplished without the co-operation of department heads and the sympathetic support of the Board of Aldermen.

The Police and Fire Departments are now under the supervision of aldermanic committees or boards. These boards are continually working for the betterment of their departments, and since I am a member of each I am able to testify of my own knowledge that they are making excellent progress. Much has been done so far and much more remains to be done.

I recommend that certain changes be made in the Building Code that will give the Building Inspector a broader use of his discretion in safeguarding life and property.

I recommend that the Board give serious consideration to the important matter of zoning.

I recommend that the matter of a year-round Playground Director to work with the Recreation Commission and Playground Committee be given careful consideration by the Board.

I recommend necessary changes in the accounting system looking toward a more rigid central purchasing set-up.

I recommend that all city employees handling public funds be bonded to the full extent of the hazard involved.

With reference to the financial standing of the City a statement of the bonded indebtedness follows: The borrowing power of the Union School District, is \$904,799, and its present bonded indebtedness is \$710,000. The borrowing power for regular city purposes, excluding the Water Works, is \$980,512. Our bonded indebtedness at the present time is \$467,689. Our tax rate in 1929 was \$29.60, made up as follows: \$5.04 County and State, \$13.98 Schools, \$10.54 general City budget, \$.04 special sewer tax. In other words more than one-half of the tax assessed is used for State, County and school purposes, and in this matter your Board, as a body, has no voice.

As an indication of the sound financial condition of the City I call attention to the latest sale of municipal bonds at \$1,006.59.

Although I am pleased with the general situation much remains to be done. It should be borne in mind that the Mayor, even with the full support of the Board, is unable to do everything that he would like to do. If it were as easy to do well as it is to wish to do well, my task would be an easy one. Our City Government system is an old one and it usually takes time to successfully combat the fallacy that a thing is right simply because it has always been so. With these things in view it will be seen that this is neither the time nor the place for ill-considered promises and none will be made, except that I will, with your assistance, strive incessantly to give the City an administration that will be a source of pride and satisfaction to all our people.

In addition to that pledge I also promise that inside of forty-eight hours from noon today the present City Dump on Bridge Street will be moved to a location that was prepared for that purpose many months ago.

It would be quite impossible for me to close this address without expressing grief over the untimely passing of our beloved colleague Charles H. Rowe. In his death Concord lost a citizen of sterling worth and it is my belief that every member of the City Government is conscious of a deep personal loss.

And now in conclusion I wish to express, in a very hearty and friendly way, my gratitude to the Board for its unfailing courtesy to me and I can honestly enlarge that expression so that it will include all heads of departments and every employee of the City with whom I have come in contact.

#### ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

Passed During the Year Ending January 12, 1931.

An Ordinance in amendment of chapter 42 of the revised ordinances.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of Chapter 42 of the Revised Ordinances is hereby amended by striking out all of the words commencing with the word "Mayor" in the next to the last line thereof to the end of the Section, and substituting therefor the following: "police board and city clerk who are hereby constituted a licensing board", so that said Section as amended shall read as follows: Sec. 1. No showman, tumbler, rope dancer, ventriloquist or other person shall for pay, exhibit any feats of agility or horsemanship or sleight of hand, rope dancing, or feats of cards, or any animal, wax figures, puppets or other show, or shall perform or exhibit any theatrical representation in this city, nor give any musical performance or exhibition of singing or dancing or other exhibition or amusement of any kind with or without pay, unless a license or permit therefor in writing, specifying the time and object for which said license is granted, shall first be obtained from the police board and city clerk who are hereby constituted a licensing board.

SECT. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed Feb. 10, 1930.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO A DEPUTY FOR THE CITY TREASURER.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter III of the Revised Ordinances is hereby amended by adding a new section as follows:

SECT. 19. The City Treasurer shall designate a Deputy Treasurer for the City of Concord, who shall perform the duties of the Treasurer for the City of Concord, at such times as the

said Treasurer shall be absent or disabled to perform the duties of his office. The said Deputy shall hold office at the will of the Treasurer. He shall give bonds for the faithful performance of his duties in such amount as shall from time to time be prescribed for the Treasurer.

SECT. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed March 10, 1931.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER XLIII OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

- SECTION 1. That clause (b) of Sec. 1, Chap. XLIII of the Revised Ordinances be amended by striking out the words "nineteen hundred fifty" and inserting in place thereof the words "twenty-two hundred fifty", so said clause as amended shall read as follows:
- (b) City Clerk, twenty-two hundred fifty dollars per annum.

Further amend said Sec. 1 by adding a new clause to be designated (bb) and to read as follows:

(bb) Deputy City Clerk, seventeen hundred fifty dollars per annum.

And further amend said Chap. XLIII, cause (a) of Sec. 2 by striking out the whole of said clause and inserting in place thereof the following:

- (a) First clerk in the city clerk's office not to exceed twenty-two dollars per week. Second clerk in the city clerk's office not to exceed twenty dollars per week.
  - Sect. 2. This ordinance shall take effect as of January 1, 1930. Passed May 12, 1930.
- An Ordinance in amendment of chapter 36 of the revised ordinances, relating to hours of employment.
- Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Chapter 36 of the Revised Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section as follows:

SECT. 7. Nothing in Sec. 5 shall be held to prohibit the head

of any department from prescribing a different hour for beginning and ending a day's labor, provided that such change of hour shall not add to the total number of hours which shall constitute a day's labor. During such periods as private business within the City shall generally conform to the schedule known as "Daylight Saving", the offices of all City Departments in the City Hall shall be open continuously from eight o'clock in the morning to four o'clock in the afternoon on each day excepting Sundays, holidays and Saturdays. On Saturdays such offices shall be kept open from eight o'clock in the morning until eleven o'clock in the morning, except the tax collector's office, which shall be open Saturday afternoon and evening preceding the day on which taxes may be paid at a discount.

2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER XL KNOWN AS THE BUILDING CODE.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Amend Sec. 3, Chapter XL of the Revised Ordinances by adding a new paragraph to Section 3.

All territory lying easterly of the Merrimack River that is bounded as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the center line of Bridge Street with the center line of the Merrimack River, thence easterly on the center line of Bridge Street, 1000 feet, thence southerly at right angles to the center line of Bridge Street 1000 feet, thence westerly parallel with the center line of Bridge Street 1000 feet to the center of the Merrimack River, thence northerly by the center line of said river to the point of beginning.

Passed May 17, 1930.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER VIII OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That Section 1, Chapter VIII of the Revised Ordinances be amended by adding after the word "Concord" the following:

"The Police Board in granting licenses shall have authority to prescribe in each case such regulations and conditions relative to the storing and screening from public view of junk, as in their judgment may be deemed necessary", so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Section 1. The provisions of Chapter 159 of the Public Laws relating to junk dealers are hereby adopted to be in force in the City of Concord, with the following provisions: The Police Board in granting licenses shall have authority to prescribe in each case such regulations and conditions relative to the storing and screening from public view of junk, as in their judgment may be deemed necessary.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage. Passed June 9, 1930.

An Ordinance in amendment of chapter thirty-five of the revised ordinance in relation to board of aldermen and committees,

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Amend Sec. 1, Chap. 35, of the Revised Ordinances, by adding thereto the following, "except during such periods as private business within the city shall generally conform to the schedule known as "Daylight Saving" the time of meeting shall be six o'clock p. nt. "Eastern Standard Time," so said section as amended shall read as follows:

Section 1. The regular meetings of the Board of Aldermen for the transaction of business shall be held in the council chamber in the City Hall on the second Monday of each month at seven o'clock P. M., except during such periods as private business within the city shall generally conform to the schedule known as "Daylight Saving" the time of meeting shall be six o'clock P. M. Eastern Standard Time.

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage. Passed June 9, 1930.

An Ordinance amending chiapter XIV of the revised ordinances regarding plumbers, plumbing construction and inspection.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 17 of Chapter XIV of the revised ordinances is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following: and shall be branded on the hub or within six inches of the hub; so that the said section as amended shall read as follows:

Sect. 17. All cast-iron pipe through which the discharge of any water-closet passes, and all pipe which is buried in the earth inside of any bulding or runs within four feet of the interior face of a foundation wall of any building, shall be of the description known as the extra heavy pipe and shall be tarcoated. All pipe shall be of uniform thickness, free from all defects, and shall have an average weight per linear foot not less than below specified, viz.:

All cast-iron pipe used shall bear a mark showing whether it is extra heavy or standard and shall be branded on the hub or within six inches of the hub.

SECT. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed July 9, 1930.

AN ORDINANCE ENLARGING THE FIRE PRECINCT.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. The Fire Precinct as defined in Chapter XL in the Revised Ordinances is hereby enlarged and amended by adding thereto the following territory: Beginning at a point on the southerly line of Clinton Street and 200 feet westerly of the westerly line of Avon Street; thence southerly and easterly parallel to and 200 feet distant from the westerly and southerly lines of Avon Street to a point 200 feet westerly of the westerly line of South Street; thence southerly parallel to and 200 feet westerly from the westerly line of South Street to the intersection of a line parallel to and 200 feet southerly from the southerly line of Noyes Street; thence westerly on the line parallel to and 200 feet southerly of the southerly line of Noyes Street to a point 200 feet westerly of the westerly line of Yale Street so-called; thence northerly parallel to and 200 feet westerly of the

westerly line of Yale Street to the southerly line of Clinton Street; thence easterly on the southerly line of Clinton Street to the point of beginning.

SECT. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed July 14, 1930.

An Ordinance combining the offices of the city engineer and the superintendent of streets.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 24 of the Revised Ordinances is hereby repealed, by striking out the first section thereof and substituting the following: Section 1. A department of the city government is hereby created and established, to be styled the engineering department, which shall embrace an engineer, his deputies and assistants. Said engineer shall be well skilled in the science of civil engineering and have a practical knowledge thereof. The engineer shall be chosen by the board of public works, and his salary shall be fixed by them. He shall perform the duties performed by the Superintnedent of Streets and City Engineer.

SECT. 2. Section 2 of said Chapter 24 is hereby amended by striking out the word "city" wherever appearing before the word "engineer", and by striking out the word "mayor" in the seventh line of said Section and substituting therefor the following: Board of Public Works, also substituting for "clerk" the word treasurer; so that said Section as amended shall read as follows: Section 2. All instruments and supplies necessary for the proper administration of said department shall be furnished by said city, including office rent. At the commencement of each fiscal year an appropriation shall be made for the engineering department sufficient to cover the estimated expense of the department for the ensuing year. The engineer shall have the right to employ, subject to the approval of the board of public works, such number of assistants as he may need from time to time to properly perform the duties of his office. Bills for such assistants shall be presented monthly and paid by the city treasurer out of the appropriation aforesaid, the bills therefor having first been approved by the engineer and committee on account and claims. All maps, plans, surveys, notes and note books made or used in said department, shall be the property of the city, shall be kept in a proper and safe place and together with all property of the city in said department'shall be turned over by the engineer, to his successor when chosen and qualified.

- SECT. 3. Further amend the other sections of said Chapter 24, by striking out the word "city" wherever it appears before the word "engineer".
- SECT. 4. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect January 1, 1931.

Passed December 8, 1930.

- AN ORDINANCE TO PROMOTE THE HEALTH, SAFETY, MORALS, CONVEN-IENCE AND GENERAL WELFARE OF THE COMMUNITY BY REGULATING AND RESTRICTING THE USE AND CONSTRUCTION OF BUILDINGS AND PREMISES IN THE CITY OF CONCORD, AND FOR SAID PURPOSES DI-VIDING THE CITY INTO DISTRICTS.
- Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

# ESTABLISHMENT OF DISTRICTS SECTION 1.

#### Six Classes of Districts

(a) The City of Concord is hereby divided as shown on the Zoning Map in three sheets dated October 1930, and filed with the City Clerk, into six classes of districts:

Single residence districts, General residence districts, Apartment house districts, Local business districts, Commercial districts, Industrial districts.

#### Boundaries of Districts

(b) The boundaries between districts are, unless other shown, either the center lines of streets, alleys or railroads, or lines parallel to and one hundred feet distant from the less restricted side of the block, provided that within blocks less than two hundred feet wide such lines are median lines between the street lines.

#### Cases of Lots in Two Districts

(c) Where a district boundary line divides a lot in a single or joint ownership of record at the time such line is adopted,

uses. The term "accessory use" in this ordinance shall not include

(a) Any use injurious, noxious or offensive to the neighborhood:

the regulations for the less restricted portion of such lot shall extend not more than thirty feet into the more restricted portion, provided the lot has frontage on a street in the less restricted district.

#### Use Regulations

#### SECTION 2.

#### Single Residence District Uses

In a single residence district no building or premises shall be erected, altered or used for any purpose except

- 1. Detached dwelling for one family or housekeeping unit;
- 2. Club, except a club the chief activity of which is a service customarily carried on as a business or a club with more than five sleeping rooms;
  - 3. Church;
  - 4. Educational use:
- 5. Farm or garden, excluding any use injurious, noxious or offensive to the neighborhood;
  - 6. Municipal recreational use;
  - 7. Accessory use customarily incident to any of the above
- (b) Any use not on the same lot with the building to which it is accessory;
  - (c) The taking of more than four lodgers;
  - (d) The sale of produce not raised on the premises;
- (e) Garage space for more than two automobiles, provided that one additional automobile may be provided for on a lot with an area exceeding nine thousand square feet and two on a lot with an area exceeding twelve thousand square feet;
- (f) Garage space for or storage of more than one commercial automobile, except on a farm;
- (g) Any use, except signs, located upon that half of the lot nearest the street line or lines or within ten feet of such part of an adjacent lot, unless it is either fifty feet from the nearest street or in the same building to which the use is accessory; or
- (h) Signs except those pertaining to the lease, sale or use of a lot or building on which placed, and not exceeding a total area of eight square feet; on a lot occupied by a dwelling there shall not be more than one such sign pertaining to the use thereof or bearing the name or occupation of an occupant for

each family housed and no such sign shall exceed one square foot in area.

- 8. Any of the following uses, provided the Board of Adjustment shall rule that such use is not injurious, noxious, offensive or detrimental to the neighborhood:
  - (a) Aviation field;
  - (b) Cemetery;
  - (c) Greenhouse or nursery;
- (d) Harvesting of natural ice and storage on the same premises;
  - (e) Hospital, sanitarium, institution or philanthropic use;
  - (f) Municipal use;
- (g) Garage, provided that repairs other than minor repairs of automobiles stored therein shall not be done, and, except on a farm not more than one commercial automobile shall be stored, and provided further that there are on file with the Board the written consents of the owners of seventy-five per cent of all the frontage of the following property, exclusive of the lot for which the permit is sought and exclusive of all lots used for such garage and all lots in local business commercial and industrial districts: (1) all lots within one hundred and twenty feet of such lot; (2) all additional lots abutting on any street or alley to which such garage is to have vehicular access, or on a street or alley in substantially direct continuation thereto, and within three hundred feet of the site of the proposed building. Where a portion of a lot is within the above limits a length of frontage equal to the width of such portion only shall be included. On a corner lot with both sides within the above limits the longer side only shall be included.

#### SECTION 3

#### General Residence District Uses

In a general residence district no building or premises shall be erected, altered or used for any purpose except

- 1. Any use permitted in a single residence district;
- 2. Detached two-family dwelling or pair of semi-detached one-family dwellings;
- 3. Telephone exchange, not including a service station or outside storage of supplies;
- 4. Accessory use customarily incident to any of the above uses.

#### SECTION 4.

#### Apartment House District Uses

In an apartment house district no building or premises shall be erected, altered or used for any purpose except

- 1. Any use permitted in a general residence district;
- 2. Dwelling;
- 3. Club, except clubs the chief activity of which is a service customarily carried on as a business.
- 4. Hotel, provided it conforms to all the requirements of this ordinance for a dwelling;
- 5. Accessory use customarily incident to any of the above uses.

#### SECTION 5.

#### Local Business District Uses

In a local business district no building or premises shall be erected, altered, or used for any purpose prohibited in a commericial district, nor, except under like restrictions, for any purpose restricted in a commercial district; for any purpose injurious, noxious or offensive to a neighborhood by reason of the emission of odor, fumes, dust, smoke, vibration or noise or any other cause; or from any purpose except.

- 1. Any use permitted in an apartment house district;
- 2. Hotel:
- 3. Fire Station:
- 4. Office or bank;
- 5. Place of amusement or assembly;
- 6. Any other retail business or service not involving manufacture on the premises except of products the major portion of which are to be sold at retail by the manufacturer to the consumer and provided further that not more than five operatives shall be employed in such manufacture.

#### SECTION 6.

#### Commercial District Uses

- (a) In a commercial district no building or premises shall be erected, altered or used for any of the following specified trades or uses:
- 1. Ammonia, bleaching powder or chlorine manufacture or refining;
  - 2. Asphalt manufacture or refining;
  - 3. Blast furnace:

- 4. Cement, gypsum, lime or plaster of paris manufacture;
- 5. Coke manufacture:
- 6. Creosote manufacture;
- 7. Dextrin, glucose or starch manufacture;
- 8. Distillation of bones, coal or wood or manufacture of any of their by-products;
  - 9. Dye manufacture;
- 10. Explosives or fireworks manufacture or storage in excess of five hundred pounds;
- 11. Fat, grease, lard or tallow manufacture, refining or rendering;
  - 12. Fertilizer manufacture;
- 13. Gas (fuel or illuminating) manufacture in excess of one thousand cubic feet per day or storage in excess of ten thousand cubic feet except in a municipal or public service plant;
- 14. Gelatin, glue or size manufacture from fish, animal refuse or offal:
  - 15. Hair manufacture;
  - 16. Hot rolling mill;
- 17. Hydrochloric, nitric, picric, sulphuric or sulphurous acid manufacture;
- 18. Incineration, reduction or dumping of dead animals, garbage, offal or refuse except by the city or its agents or when accumulated and consumed on the same premises without the emission of odor;
  - 19. Lamp black manufacture;
  - 20. Linoleum or oilcloth manufacture:
  - 21. Match manufacture:
- 22. Petroleum or other inflammable liquids: production or refining;
- 23. Pyroxylin manufacture, manufacture of articles thereof, or storage in excess of five hundred pounds;
- 24. Rubber manufacture, or treatment involving offensive odor;
- 25. Slaughtering except as permitted by the Board of Health or stock yard except as appurtenant thereto;
  - 26. Tanning, curing or storage of raw hides or skins;
  - 27. Tar distillation or manufacture;
  - 28. Turpentine or varnish manufacture;
- 29. Any other trade, industry or use that is injurious, noxious or offensive to a neighborhood by reason of the emission of odor fumes, dust, smoke, vibration or noise or other cause, but not including places of amusement; provided however, that a building or use otherwise excluded but distinctly incidental and es-

sential to a use of a building or plant with a series of buildings permitted in a commercial district may be erected, altered and used if not more than ten per cent of the total floor area of the building or plant is to be so occupied, if not more than ten per cent of all the employees are to be engaged therein, if it is not located within fifty feet of any street line or lot line, and if it is not detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.

#### Restricted Uses

- (b) No building or premises shall be erected, altered or used for any of the following specific uses unless the Board of Adjustment shall rule that such use under such conditions and in such a building as it may prescribe will not be detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood:
  - 1. Blacksmith Shop;
  - 2. Coal yard;
  - 3. Filling station;
  - 4. Junk yard;
  - 5. Lumber yard; or
  - 6. Public Garage or stable;
  - 7. Commercialized Amusements.

#### SECTION 7.

#### Industrial District Uses

In an industrial district no building or premises shall be erected, altered or used for any use prohibited in a commercial district unless the Board of Adjustment shall rule that use under such conditions and in such a building as it may prescribe will not be detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.

#### NON-CONFORMING USES

#### SECTION 8.

#### Continuation of Non-Conforming Uses

(a) Any lawful building or use of a building or premises or part thereof at the time of the adoption of this ordinance or any amendment thereto may be continued although such building or use does not conform to the above provisions hereof, or of such amendment.

#### Conversion of Existing Single Dwellings

(b) In a single residence district nothing herein shall prevent any dwelling, existing at the time this ordinance is adopted

and having a volume above the first story floor, exclusive of porches, exceeding twenty-five thousand cubic feet, being altered to provide for and being used for two families, provided it is not enlarged in volume.

#### Change or Extension of Non-Conforming Uses

(c) The Board of Adjustment may order the issuance of a permit for any non-conforming use to be changed to any specified use not substantially different in character or more detrimental or objectionable to a neighborhood, or if in a part of a building or premises designed or intended for such use to be extended throughout such building or premises. The Board of Adjustment may order the issuance of a permit for any building of non-conforming use to be enlarged during its life not more than twenty per cent in volume and to be altered during its life to an extent not exceeding fifty per cent of its assessed value.

#### Temporary Uses

(d) The Board of Adjustment may order the issuance of a permit for a quarry or gravel or sand pit or for a non-conforming temporary building or use incidental to the development of a neighborhood, such permit to be issued for an initial period of not more than two years, and only upon application accompanied by a bond effective in case the building is not removed prior to the expiration of the permit. Such premits may be ordered renewed by the Board for sucessive periods of not more than one year each.

#### Restoration After Fire

(e) Nothing herein shall prevent the substantial restoration within one year and continued use of a building damaged by fire or other casualty, provided that in case of damage to a building non-conforming in use, location or structure to an extent that the estimated cost of such restoration exceeds three quarters of its fair valuation immediately prior to such damage the Board of Adjustment so authorizes.

#### HEIGHT REGULATIONS

#### SECTION 9.

#### Single Residence District Height

(a) In a single residence district no building shall exceed two stories or thirty feet in height unless it sets back from each street and lot line five feet in addition to the requirements of Section 10 plus one foot for each foot of excess height. No building shall exceed four stories or fifty-five feet in height.

#### General Residence District Height

(b) In a general residence district no building shall exceed two stories or thirty feet in height unless it sets back from each street and lot line five feet in addition to the requirements of Section 10 plus one foot for each foot of excess height. No building shall exceed four stories or fifty-five feet in height. No dwelling for more than one family shall exceed two stories or thirty feet in height, provided that this shall not prevent any dwelling existing at the time this ordinance is adopted being altered to accommodate not more than two families.

#### Apartment District Height

(c) In an apartment house district no building shall exceed four stories or fifty-five feet in height unless it sets back from each street and lot line ten feet in addition to the requirements of Section 10 plus one foot for each foot of excess height. No building shall exceed six stories or seventy-five feet in height.

#### Local Business District Height

(d) In a local business district no building shall exceed thirty feet in height unless every part exceeding such height sets back from each street and lot line one foot for each foot of excess height. No building shall exceed fifty-five feet in height. In a local business district contiguous to an apartment house or commercial district these heights may be exceeded by twenty-five feet. In a local business district not contiguous to an apartment house or commercial district no dwelling shall exceed two stories or thirty feet in height.

#### Commercial District Height

(e) In a commercial district no part of a building shall exceed seventy-five feet in height unless such part is set back from each street and lot line one foot for each one and one-half feet of excess height. No building shall exceed in volume its lot area multiplied by seventy-five feet.

#### Industrial District Height

(f) In an industrial district no building shall exceed the height prescribed in commercial districts. No dwelling shall exceed three stories or forty feet in height.

#### Measurement of Height

(g) The height of a building abutting on a street shall be measured from the mean curb grade, and if not on a street from the mean ground level along its front, to the mean height of that portion of the roof above the highest floor.

#### Height Exceptions

(h) Chimneys, elevators, tanks, poles, spires and towers not used for human occupancy may extend above the height limits herein fixed, and parapet walls and other unused projections and bulkheads may so extend not more than five feet.

#### Area Regulations

#### SECTION 10.

#### Rear Yards.

(a) In a single residence district no building shall be built within a distance from the rear lot line equal to one-quarter of the depth of the lot or thirty feet, whichever is the less. In a general residence district no building shall be built within a distance from the rear lot line equal to one-fifth of the depth of the lot or twenty-four feet, whichever is the less. In an apartment house district no building, and in a local business, commercial or industrial district no dwelling shall be built within a distance from the rear lot line equal to one-fifth of the depth of the lot or fifteen feet, whichever is the less, and such distance shall be increased five feet for each additional story of the building above three stories.

#### Side Yards

(b) In a single or general residence district no building shall be built within five feet of a side lot line, nor within sixteen feet of any other building on the same lot, provided that on no lot existing at the time this ordinance is adopted shall the aggregate width of side yards required be such that less than twenty-four feet of the width of the lot may be built upon, and provided further that in a general residence district nothing herein shall prevent the building together of two one-family dwellings separated by a fireproof division with no openings. In an apartment house district no building shall be built with a side wall within five feet of a side lot line, except where there is a party wall, and such distance shall be increased one foot for each additional story of the building above three stories and also one foot for each twenty feet or fraction thereof that the

length of the side yard exceeds sixty feet. In a local business, commercial or industrial district no dwelling shall be built with a side wall within the distance required in an apartment house district from a side lot line unless contiguous thereto.

#### Outer Courts

(c) The term "outer court" shall mean an unoccupied space other than a yard and extending through its full required width to a street, yard, or another outer court. No outer court on a lot line shall be less than six feet wide. For each story over three stories in the height of any such court its width shall be increased one foot. No such court shall be less than one-seventh as wide as it is long. No outer court not on a lot line shall be less than twelve feet wide. For each story over three stories in the height of any such court its width shall be increased two feet. No such court shall be less than two-sevenths as wide as it is long. In a single or general residence district no window in a dwelling shall open upon an outer court with a horizontal depth exceeding its width.

#### Inner Courts

(d) The term "inner court" shall mean an unoccupied space other than a yard and not extending through its full required width to a street, yard or outer court. No inner court on a lot line shall be less than eight feet wide nor less than sixteen feet long. For each story over three stories in the height of any such court its width shall be increased one foot and its length shall be inceased two feet. No inner court not on a lot line shall be less than sixteen feet wide or long. For each story over three stories in the height of any such court its width and length shall each be increased two feet. In a single or general residence district no window in a dwelling shall open upon an inner court with a vertical depth exceeding its width.

#### Front Yards

(e) In a single or general residence district no building shall be built and no roadside stand shall be placed within fifteen feet of the street line, provided that no building need be set back more than twenty per cent of the depth of the lot nor more than the average of the setbacks of the buildings on the lots next thereto on either side, a vacant lot or a lot occupied by a building set back more than fifteen feet being counted as though occupied by a building set back fifteen feet, and provided further that no uncovered porch need set back more than ten feet. In

an apartment house or local business district no building shall be built within five feet of the street line.

#### Rear Dwellings

(f) There shall be in front of every building not fronting on a street a yard not less than the depth required for the rear yard behind the same building.

#### Vegetation on Corners

(g) Within the area formed by the lines of intersecting streets and a line joining points on such lines fifteen feet distant from their point of intersection, or in the case of a rounded corner the point of intersection of their tangents, no structure other than a building and no foliage may be maintained between a height three and one-half feet and a height eight feet above the plane through their curb grades.

#### Accessory Buildings

(h) On a lot occupied by a dwelling other than an apartment or tenement house or hotel, a one-story building of accessory use thereto and not more than twelve feet high may be located in and occupy not more than thirty per cent of the rear yard of such dwelling. No yards are required for such building by this ordinance. The area occupied by a building of accessory use shall be included as occupied area in computing lot occupancy.

#### Projections

(i) Nothing herein shall present the projection of cornices, window sills, belt courses and other ornamental features not more than three inches into any required yard or court, nor the projection of cornices not more than fifteen inches into any required yard.

#### Lot Size

(j) In a single or general residence district no dwelling shall be erected on a lot containing less than five thousand square feet or less than fifty feet wide unless such lot is of record at the time this ordinance is adopted, and no dwelling for more than one family shall be erected on any lot containing less than six thousand square feet. In any district no dwelling shall occupy more than seventy per cent of its lot.

#### Required Windows

(k) Every room in which one or more persons live, sleep, work continuously or congregate, except storage rooms, bathrooms, toilet compartments, hallways, stairways, rooms where the nature of the occupancy will not permit, and rooms mechanically ventilated so as to provide at least three positive air changes per hour, shall have windows or ventilating skylights, with an aggregate area not less than one-eighth of the floor area of the room, opening directly either upon a street, alley, public park, cemetery, or railroad right-of-way, or upon a yard or court located upon the same lot.

#### Appurtenant Open Space

(1) No lot shall be so reduced that the dimensions of any of the open spaces shall be smaller than herein prescribed. No yard or other open space required for a building by this ordinance shall during the life of such building be occupied by or counted as open space for another building.

#### Enforcement

#### SECTION 11

#### Enforcement by Inspector of Buildings

(a) This ordinance shall be enforced by the Inspector of Buildings in the same manner and with the same powers practiced or provided under the Building Code of the City of Concord. No building or structure or part thereof shall be erected, altered or moved without a permit from the Inspector of Buildings, issued upon application, stating that the plans and intended use indicate that the building is to conform in all respects to the provisions of this ordinance.

#### Certification of Occupancy Required

(b) No premises or structure or part thereof hereafter erected or altered wholly or partly in use or structure, or moved, or the open spaces of which are in any way reduced, shall be used until the Inspector of Buildings shall have certified on the building permit, or in case none is issued shall have issued a certificate of occupancy, specifying the use to which the premises, or building upon being sufficiently completed to comply with the provisions and regulations relating thereto, may be put.

#### Board of Adjustment

(c) Within thirty days after the adoption of this ordinance and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Mayor, subject to confirmation by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen, shall make appointments to a Board of Adjustment conforming in membership and duties to the provisions of Section 7 of chapter 92 of the Laws of 1925. The Board shall act on all matters within its jurisdiction under this ordinance in the manner prescribed in said section of said chapter and subject always to the rule that due consideration shall be given to conserving the public health, safety, convenience, welfare and property values.

#### Penalty

(d) Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars for each day of such violation.

#### SECTION 12.

Other Laws, Etc., Not Interfered With Unless Less Stringent (a) This ordinance shall not interfere with or annul any ordinance, rule, regulation or permit, provided that unless specifically excepted, where this ordinance is more stringent it shall control.

#### Validity

(b) The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate any other section or provision hereof.

#### When Effective

(c) This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage. Board of Aldermen Dec. 13, 1930. Passed.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 42 OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of Chapter 42 of the Revised Ordinances is hereby amended by striking out the whole thereof and substituting the following: Section 1. No showman, tumbler, rope dancer, ventriloquist or other person shall for pay exhibit any

feats of agility or horsemanship or sleight of hand, rope dancing, or feats of cards, or any animal, wax figures, puppets or other show, or shall perform or exhibit any theatrical representation in this city, nor give any musical performance or exhibition of singing or dancing or other exhibition or amusement of any kind with or without pay, nor hold or engage in any parade or procession upon any public street or way, nor hold or take part in any open-air public meeting upon any ground abutting thereon, unless a license or permit therefor in writing, specifying the time and object for which said license is granted, shall first be obtained from the mayor, city clerk, and chief of police, who are hereby constituted a licensing board.

SECT. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed Dec. 29, 1930.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE SALARIES OF POLICE OFFICERS ON SPECIAL ASSIGNMENT.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. Sub-section (j) of Section 1 of Chapter 43 of the Revised Ordinances is hereby amended by striking out the words "a minimum of one thousand dollars per annum and", and substituting for the words "mayor and board of aldermen" the following: police board, so that said sub-section as amended shall read as follows: (j) Each regular police officer while assigned to duty in the police station or upon other special assignments than those provided under the preceding sub-section, a maximum of thirteen hundred dollars per annum, the police board in each case to prescribe the salary within the limits named.

SECT. 2. All police officers except the chief, the deputy chief, and the captain of the night watch shall hereafter be retired from the police force and, if possible, assigned to special service upon attaining the age of sixty-five years.

Sect. 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed Jan. 12, 1931.

#### RESOLUTIONS.

Resolution in relation to a temporary loan not exceeding seven hundred thousand dollars (\$700,000).

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the Committee on Finance is hereby authorized to borrow on the credit of the City the sum not to exceed seven hundred thousand dollars (\$700,000) for expenses in anticipation of taxes for the municipal year 1930 and to issue notes of the City therefor upon such terms and for such amounts as the committee shall determine. The said loan is to be payable from the taxes for the said municipal year, and the said Committee on Finance is hereby authorized to refund all or any of the said notes at their maturity; provided, however, that the refunding notes shall be payable within one year after the date of the incurrence of the debt represented by the note or notes refunded.

Passed Jan. 28, 1930.

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR PRINTING OF THE ROSTER OF THE CITY GOV-ERNMENT.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the city clerk be instructed to prepare a roster of the present city government and cause copies to be printed, and that the expense of printing the same shall be charged to the account of printing and stationery.

Passed Jan. 28, 1930.

RESOLUTION IN RELATION TO PAYING SALARIES, PAY-ROLLS AND RENTS.
Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the Mayor be, and hereby is, authorized to draw his warrant on the city treasurer for the payment of all salaries, pay-rolls and rents as the same shall become due during the present municipal term, and all bills so paid shall be laid before the Committee on Accounts and Claims at the next meeting.

Passed Jan. 28, 1930.

Resolution asking for sealed proposals for printing and binding the annual city reports.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the city clerk be, and hereby is, instructed to ask for sealed proposals for printing and binding the city reports for

the year 1929 and submit the same to the Finance Committee who shall have full power to act in the matter.

Passed Jan. 28, 1930.

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING FIFTY-FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS FOR THE PUR-CHASE OF LAND FOR FIRE DEPARTMENT PURPOSES.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That the sum of fifty-five hundred dollars (\$5,500) be, and the same hereby is, appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of purchasing the piece of land bounded by Broadway, West and South Streets, owned by Mrs. Maude N. Blackwood, for fire department purposes.

Passed Jan. 28, 1930.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO GIVE A QUITCLAIM DEED TO MAE E. DRISKO.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

WHEREAS in the years 1926 and 1927, taxes were assessed to Conrad D. Vincent on a tract of land bounded as follows: A certain tract of land situated in said Concord, on the south side of the road leading from Penacook to Horse Hill Bridge, beginning at a point on the northerly side of land now or formerly of Thomas Murray and being the southwesterly corner of land now or formerly of Frank S. Morrill, 65 feet from said Morrill land; thence westerly 50 feet to a pin set in the ground; thence northerly on a straight line to Contoocook River; thence by said River parallel with the first mentioned line and carrying a width of 50 feet to an iron pin; thence southerly in a straight line to the point begun at; together with a tract of the same width from east to west, beginning at the southwesterly corner of the first described tract; thence southerly in a straight line continuing the westerly side line of said first described tract 50 feet; thence easterly to a point in the continuation of the east line of the first described tract; thence northerly in a straight line 50 feet to the southeasterly corner of the first described tract; thence by the southerly line of the first described tract to the point begun at. Reserving the highway running through said land, and

WHEREAS during the same years the title to the premises described was in the name of Harvey E. Sink and taxes were assessed upon the said premises in duplicate to the said Harvey E. Sink and by him paid, and,

WHEREAS sale of the said premises for non-payment of the said taxes for 1926, in the name of said Conrad D. Vincent were made to the City of Concord by error, and the City paid the taxes assessed against the said Vincent on the said property in 1927, and

WHEREAS the said Harvey E. Sink has since made a conveyance to the said Mae E. Drisko, who is the present record owner.

THAT the Mayor be and hereby is authorized to execute and deliver in the name of the City of Concord a quitclaim deed of the said premises to the said Mae E. Drisko.

AND be it further resolved that the collector of taxes be authorized to file certificates of redemption for the said tax sale for 1926 so far as the sale covered the premises as above described and no further.

RESOLUTION RELATIVE TO THE USE OF THE CHANDLER SCHOOL FOR PLAYGROUND PURPOSES.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

The Board of Aldermen hereby request the Board of Education of Union School District to grant the city the use of the Chandler School, located at the intersection of South and Fayette Streets, for recreational purposes until such time as said Board of Education has need of the aforementioned building.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUE OF EIGHT THOUSAND DOLLARS IN SERIAL NOTES TO PAY FOR THE BEAVER MEADOW GOLF PROPERTY.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

That for the purpose of paying the Concord Country Club in part for the property at the Beaver Meadow golf course which the City has recently agreed to purchase for the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.), the City Treasurer be and he

hereby is authorized and directed to issue under such date as he may determine to be most convenient for promissory notes of the City of Concord for Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.) each, payable respectively in one, two, three and four years time, said notes to bear such rate of interest as the City Treasurer may fix with the approval of the finance committee and to be payable at such place and to be sold in such manner as the City Treasurer determines best for the purpose.

Passed March 27, 1930.

RESOLUTION FIXING AND DETERMINING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY TO BE RAISED FOR THE ENSUING FINANCIAL YEAR FOR THE USE OF THE CITY.

Resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Concord, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be raised and there is hereby ordered to be raised on the polls and ratable estates within said city, the sum of three hundred ninety-seven thousand dollars (\$397,000.) to defray the necessary expenses and charges of the city for the ensuing financial year, which, together with the sums which may be raised by taxes on railroads and from other sources, shall be appropriated as follows:

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

The Board of Water Commissioners, in submitting their annual report for the year 1930, feel that this is a rather eventful year in the history of the Concord Water Works, for the reason that the city was obliged to obtain an additional supply of water, supplementing the main source of supply at Penacook Lake. On account of the continued drought and low water in Penacook Lake, the Water Board, acting on the advice of its superintendent, Mr. Sanders, and the firm of Metcalf & Eddy, engineers of Boston, decided last summer to commence the work of driving test wells in the Soucook River Valley. The result of this work has been extremely gratifying and satisfactory up to the present time, as there is being pumped daily from these driven wells about eight hundred thousand gallons of water into the city's distributing water system. The pumping of this additional water supply from Soucook River Valley relieves the main water supply by that number of gallons.

We are also at the present time buying from the Boscawen Water Works about 150,000 gallons of water daily, in supplying the water takers in Penacook.

The coming year will show the completion of the new water supply from the driven wells in the Soucook River Valley which includes the driving of the wells, the erection of pump houses and the installation of two electric pumps and one gasoline pump capable of pumping 2,500,000 gallons of water daily. There are also to be erected in connection with the pumping plant, a work shop and garage and when

all of this work is completed, including cost of land, rights of way, piping, roadways, etc., it will amount to about \$125,000.

Eighty-seven new services have been laid consisting of 1.936 feet of 3/4-inch; 121 feet of 1-inch; 27 feet of 2-inch; also four 6-inch fire supply pipes were connected as follows:

City Hall; Monitor-Patriot Co.; Evans Printing Co., and Perry Bros.

Fifteen services were discontinued of which eight were replaced by new ones and seven discontinued permanently. One hundred and forty services were relaid and curb valves placed on fifty-four old services.

One hundred twenty-three new meters have been set and five have been discontinued.

Nineteen gates were set of which eighteen replaced old ones; one was discontinued.

Four hydrants were replaced by new ones.

Fifty-eight services were relaid and new curb boxes were set on fifty-seven services; eight services were discontinued.

The schedule of work done in extensions and relaying of mains shows in detail the amount of cement lined pipe that has been replaced in Penacook. All house services have also been relaid in connection with the mains.

On January 1, 1930 the height of water in Penacook Lake stood at 179.60 and dropped to 179 by the last of February

which point was 6 feet below the overflow and 9.25 feet above the top of the intake. The very small rainfall in February, March and April gave us a rise of only 1.6 feet bringing the height of water to 180.6, 4.4 feet below the overflow and 10.85 feet above the intake. It soon became apparent that in all probability there would be no further rise and an estimate of the drop in level for 1930 comparing with that of previous years would bring the level down to 176 feet, 9 feet below overflow and 6.25 feet above the intake. The drop was actually greater than this estimate by one foot and the level reached December 31, 1930 was 174.95, 5.25 feet above the intake.

Recommendations were made to the Board by your Superintendent early in June that steps be taken at once to procure an additional supply of water from the area recommended by Metcalf and Eddy in their report of 1927 and he was authorized to begin work at once.

Investigations were made through the summer to determine the practicability of obtaining a supply from driven wells in the Soucook River valley.

About thirty-five wells were driven to ledge throughout this area, samples were taken of the sand and pumping tests were conducted on every well. The water pumped from the wells on the Concord side of the river showed a large percentage of iron, contributed no doubt by a swampy area which was in close proximity to the wells. The tests made on the Pembroke side of the river some distance above the Concord area showed only a slight trace of iron, so small that it was negligible.

Pumping tests were conducted on a number of wells connected together on the Concord side to determine the amount of drop in level by pumping. This test was carried on for three weeks, twenty-four hours per day. An experimental iron removal plant under supervision of Metcalf and Eddy was also built which consisted of aeration, coke filtration, sedimentation and rapid sand filtration. By

means of this process it was demonstrated that all of the iron could be removed from the ground water.

The ground water from the Pembroke side of river showing such good tests, it was decided to install a driven well system in this area to yield approximately 1,500,000 gallons daily.

The 12-inch force main was continued along the North Pembroke Road from the point where it was laid in 1928 to the proposed location of the Pumping Station at the well field. Work was begun on this line October 27 and completed November 20.

Work was started driving the wells November 10 and was in charge of John M. Prescott & Son.

It is planned to continue work during the winter and place an auxiliary pump in service as soon as possible.

December 17, 1930 the gates between the Concord and Boscawen supplies were opened and water has been supplied to Penacook and as far south as the West Concord Cemetery from the Boscawen Water Works, amounting to approximately 150,000 gallons per day. The total daily consumption of the city varies from 2,750,000 to 3,000,000 gallons daily.

In this report I wish to take the opportunity of thanking the men of this department who realizing the urgency of obtaining this new supply as soon as possible have cheerfully cooperated at all times and in all weather to push the work along.

I also wish to express my thanks to the members of the Board for their continued confidence.

In accordance with the requirements of the city ordinance, I herewith submit for your consideration the report of the Fire Department for the year 1930.

The Department responded to 86 bell alarms and 536 still alarms.

While the number of alarms exceeded all previous records, there was a gratifying decrease in property loss. The apparatus is in good condition in the main but the combination car at West Concord should be replaced and the pump attached to Combination 1 car should receive attention.

First aid kits and salvage covers were installed and two thousand feet of hose purchased during the year, also a new fire alarm repair truck and Chief's car and life net.

The fire alarm system is in good condition. The overhead lines on South Street between Pleasant and Downing Streets, were replaced by underground cable. Eight alarm boxes, to be installed when locations are determined, and material for substituting the overhead parallel lines from the city sheds to St. Paul's School with overhead cable were among the purchases of the year.

The boiler at the Central Station should be replaced—the one in present use having been installed in 1904. I respectfully recommend the purchase of fifteen hundred feet of hose and the addition of at least one man to the permanent force.

For the opportunity afforded me to learn by attending the convention of The International Association of Fire Chiefs held at Winnipeg during October, a report of which was rendered at that time, I return my sincere thanks.

To the Board of Mayor and Aldermen:

Gentlemen: Herewith is submitted the thirty-eighth annual report of the Engineering Department.

An itemized account of all work and expenditures is kept on a card system, which we will be pleased to show and explain to all interested parties.

Thirty-six plans and 1,001 blue prints were made; 20,037 feet of grade stakes were set; 515 transfers of property were recorded; 0.373 miles of street were laid out in 1930 and 200 feet of streets discontinued, bringing the total mileage of streets and roads in the entire city up to 178.507 miles.

The deed book of Blossom Hill Cemetery showing transfers of lots was brought up to January 1, 1931.

The work done under the supervision of this office is: general engineering, construction and maintenance of sewers, building inspection, plumbing inspection and examining of plumbers.

An interesting fact is, that out of every dollar raised by taxation, only \$0.0087 of it is used for the maintenance of the Engineering Department, and we are closing the vear with an unexpended balance of \$36.76.

Considerable work was done for the Zoning Commissioners preparing maps, field work and office work.

It would take up too much space to outline in detail the amount of work done in this office, but I assure you we have been busy handling the work assigned us by your government, heads of departments and citizens, which we trust has met with their approval.

The employees of this department have been: Edward E. Beane, assistant engineer; C. Fred Moulton and Paul

Chattock, rodmen, and Frances Richardson, clerk, all of whom have rendered valuable service to the city.

For the support and co-operation of your Board, the heads of departments and citizens of the city, I wish to express my appreciation.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS

January 1, 1931.

To the Board of Public Works:

At the outset, I want to express my personal loss in the death of Orrin W. Head, former Superintendent of Streets. Mr. Head served this Department for approximately 10 years, and he has left behind many friends and accomplishments.

This Department is charged with the responsibility of the collection of garbage, maintenance of sidewalks, highways, bridges, and street lighting, as well as the care of trees.

During the year 1930, there have been several important pieces of construction, the outstanding is the work on Gulley Hill, so-called, which in addition to the roadway and sidewalk also carries sewer construction about a mile in length, to which the Plains system will be connected when finances permit. The cost of this construction was borne one-half by the State, and one-half by the City.

Five bridges were built;—two on Clinton Street near Turkey Pond, one on the Birchdale Road, one on the Hooksett Turnpike, and one on the new Hopkinton Road. The two construction items mentioned above were paid for by a Bond Issue of \$20,135.80, balance 1929, bridge bond account, \$5,668.84 and \$7,319.98 was transferred from the Hopkinton Bond account.

Cement was laid from the Bog Road to the Gulf Station wholly at the expense of the State.

Main Street in Penacook, from Hoyt's Garage to the Boscawen Town line was rebuilt with modified asphalt, after necessary change in sub-grade on which to properly maintain a first class street.

The Bridge Street Bridge of the Railroad has been re-

constructed, the City to share with the Railroad; one-half the cost in excess of \$34,000.

As closely as I followed this Department as Mayor I did not realize the number of more or less personal matters that the Superintendent of Streets was called upon to administer.

Finance—The appropriation as made, earnings, and amount of money expended will be found in the financial statement, therefore, that information will be omitted from this report.

Bridges—On account of the increased use of the Lower Bridge, so-called, it seemed necessary to make temporary repairs to floor system. While this turned out to be more or less of an experiment it served its purpose in that no accidents, due to failure of the floor system, which have in the past been brought to the attention of the Board, have taken place this summer.

Equipment—We have added to our equipment three Chevrolet one ton trucks, equipped with Wood Hydraulic Hoists and 1½ yard steel bodies also. Two used International Trucks of the same type and capacity as were formerly in the Department, and the other two International Trucks have been thoroughly overhauled. We have also exchanged two Mead-Morrison Tractors, and the remains of the third one, which was demolished by a train on the crossing at East Concord, for three new Mead-Morrison Tractors. The barn, sheds and garage have had a thorough house cleaning, and the discarded equipment has been sold as far as possible and the money received turned into the Department. We have purchased two pair of horses, and sold one horse formerly used in the Department. The result of the above has put the equipment in first class shape.

The sewer in Eastman street was built by the same contractors out of the regular sewer appropriation.

The total mileage of sewer built in 1930 was 2.101.

The department maintains 55.744 miles of main sewers, approximately 4,100 house connections and 1,450 catch basins.

Every sewer that was granted has been completed with the exception of the sewer in Bridge street through Gulley hill which will be completed by the 15th. of January. The total length is approximately 4,500 feet. This work was done under contracts made by the State Highway Department in conjunction with the road construction. Figures as to costs will not be available until sometime in February 1931.

Our regular employees of the department have been: William H. Murphy, foreman; Richard Morrill, James J. Berryman and Wilbur Kendall, assistant foremen, all of whom are skilled workmen and a great assistance to the department.

During the year there were installed electric street lights as follows: 2—200 C.P.; 5—60 C.P.; 1—40 C.P.; making the total number of lights in operation December 31, 1930, as follows: 143—600 C.P.; 211—200 C.P.; 571—60 C.P.; 550—40 C.P.

During the year there were 38 signs erected.

#### REPORT OF CITY LIBRARIAN FOR 1930.

To the Board of Trustees of the Concord Public Library:

Gentlemen:—It has been a pleasure to write this report because it can tell of gain along all lines.

Except, let me hasten to say, except in the matter of expense. Asked not to exceed last year's outlay, we practiced economy through the twelve months and were rewarded by finding we had, by \$84.00, bettered 1929. The cost of this city department for 1930 was \$10,101 the items of expenditures being as follows:

Taking up topics in the order prescribed for library reports we come to the subject of

#### Accessions

There was therefore a net gain of 1223 (as against 639 in 1930) bringing the number of books in the library up to 40,005. Of course the booksellers' experiment with dollar editions has enlarged our purchasing power in a way which does not seem likely to continue, judging from the latest announcements from the publishers.

Circulation of books.

This grew gratifying the past year, 9400 more volumes having been charged out to borrowers, making the total figure 98,216 as compared with 88,813 in 1929. This increase is due largely to the Branch Rooms at West Concord and Penacook. In the former, the books we have loaned have gone out more than 1000 times. Over this central and cheery room Rev. and Mrs. Franklin C. Thompson, its originators, have continued their intelligent, accurate and sympathetic care, and certainly their enterprise is for the good and pleasure of Ward 3. Last fall we put \$50.00 at its disposal so that Mrs. Thompson could buy some books for which she had learned there was a crying need.

At the beginning of last March, spurred on and assisted by the Penacook Woman's Club, we started a modest deposit and delivery station in the rear of Stuart G. Fifield's store; to be open twice a week, 2:30 to 5 o'clock; to be managed Fridays by two of the Club women, Tuesdays by two from our regular staff; expense of rent and janitor to be shared by Club and Library. September found the Penacook ladies ready to enlarge and beautify the room so as to make it suitable for their monthly meeting. The Library fell in willingly with their plans, Mr. Fifield gave interested cooperation, and the result is a sizeable, attractive place overlooking the river, stocked with 800 books to which borrowers have free access. A great table is abundantly supplied with current magazines contributed by Penacook people. Upwards of 300 persons in Ward 1 have already registered as borrowers. In the ten months since the Branch was started, 7147 books have been given out. In the coming year we want to bring the number of volumes on the shelves up to 1000, and to further the use by pupils of books taken up to Penacook to help them in their school requirements. Though this Branch renders much wider service than could the delivery station maintained through previous years in another store, it costs but

little more. Despite some initial outlay which will not have to be repeated, \$35.00 would cover the increased overhead expense. It should be added, however, that we have had to buy for this Branch, duplicates of popular books and those on church and other recommended lists.

#### New Borrowers.

What with the Penacook customers and those applying at the main library, we have filed away 1033 names in 1930.

#### Service to Schools.

Teachers from half a dozen districts have had loans of books, twenty-five to fifty being taken to their rooms at intervals.

# The Reference Department,

and this is almost the same as saying Miss Dennett, has answered 3,849 inquiries the past year.

#### Troubles.

Of course the library has them—what business has not? Mutilation and ribald defacement of magazines is a major annoyance. A little amateur detective work brought one culprit to task—a confirmed eater of paper, who had chewed off margins from several volumes. Then there are pupils who have been told to embellish their compositions with pictures and who help themselves to illustrations; the worse case of that in 1930, being the tearing of a few leaves from a reference set in order to get a likeness of Alexander Graham Bell.

# Changes in Staff.

April first, Miss Helen C. Clarke, a valued assistant for twenty-eight years, resigned her position, to our regret. On June first, Miss Marion Holt, a Concord girl with some Boston training and experience in library work, joined our staff.

### Vacation Reading Club.

Our working number thus complete again, we undertook for a second time this Club which met with success, boys and girls eagerly enrolling as members. More than sixty read enough books to entitle them to receive diplomas, and the four who had read the most and reported thereon most ably, were awarded prizes at an ice cream party that brought the club to a close the last of August and left the children anticipating a similar organization next summer. Miss Melvin and Miss Holt took almost entire charge of the children this year.

### Patronage.

It is said that a poor year in business makes a good year at a library, implying, of course, that people curtail pleasures which cost and revert to the free privilege of reading. Whether owing to slack times or not, this present season sees our reading room full to overflowing. The next one must be larger.

# A Suggestion.

Thus we are brought to stress again the need of a new building. It may not have occurred to residents that the good time coming when Concord shall have a fine library can be hastened; the future building will require a children's room, a small audience hall, a study room, office equipment, etc., etc. The expense of any one of these could be taken care of by a gift, or bequest from an individual, whose name and deed would be memoralized on a fitting tablet. If in this way the cost of some special features were provided for, the comprehensive outside structure of the

Library could the sooner be undertaken by the accumulating building fund.

# REPORT OF SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES FOR THE CITY OF CONCORD

COVERING PERIOD JANUARY 1, 1930 to JANUARY 1, 1931.

To His Honor Robert W. Brown, Mayor, and the Board of Aldermen:

During the past year there were 678 scales tested which were found correct and were sealed, 305 were adjusted before being sealed, 20 confiscated and 32 condemned for repairs which were later reinspected and sealed.

There were 1,678 weights tested which were found correct and were sealed, 1 adjusted before being sealed and 7 confiscated. 4,873 liquid measures were tested, found correct and sealed, 7 adjusted before being sealed, 19 confiscated and 14 condemned for repairs, later being reinspected and sealed. Six dry measures were tested and sealed.

Your sealer made 529 tests of gasoline pumps, 417 of which were found correct and were sealed, 96 were adjusted before being sealed and 16 were condemned for repairs, later being reinspected and sealed.

During this period 2,886 reweighings were made of commodities in package form, 2,777 of which were correct, 33 over and 76 under weight. Seven loads of coal in the process of delivery were reweighed, 5 of which were found correct and 2 over weight.

There were 40 cart bodies used in the delivery of wood measured and found to be in accordance with the law. Two coal bins were measured by request of citizens to estimate the contents thereof and an amount of soft coal was weighed. There were a number of reweighings of ice made which resulted in two prosecutions in court and consequent convictions.

# REPORT OF THE CITY SOLICITOR FOR NINETEEN HUNDRED AND THIRTY

Concord, N. H., December 31, 1930.

There has been the usual activity in the office of the City Solicitor during the last year and at times more than usual activity.

The situation of pending cases has been bettered. The suit of Frank H. Silver was dismissed upon the motion of his council at the April Term and that long drawn out matter is disposed of. The case of Royal Ford against the City (Water Works Department) was defended by the insurance company, but as the damages claimed exceeded the amount of the policy, I sat in at the trial, but took no active part. There was a verdict for \$1,500.00 against the City which was covered by the insurance.

This leaves pending on the docket only proceedings for the discontinuance of the old Soucook River Bridge and of the highways at St. Paul's School. The first named case is concluded as far as the discontinuance is concerned, but is pending on the application of the parties interested for damages. The St. Paul's School cases are being continued at the desire of the City.

## HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

### Reports of the Sanitary Officer and Milk Inspector.

Mayor Brown, Board of Health and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen: Following will be found the summary of the work for the year 1930.

The number of contagious diseases were comparatively few and there were many non-resident deaths in the State and City Institutions.

The Venereal Clinic is held weekly under the auspices of the State and local Boards of Health with Dr. Adams in charge: Mrs. Ada Parsons assisting.

In June 1930, Toxin-Antitoxin Clinics were started in the schools of the city, for the prevention of diphtheria and by the end of the school term in June, 1931, all children between 1 and 12 years of age will have had the privilege of having the 3 inoculations given them. Dr. Charles H. Parsons is in charge of these clinics and is assisted by Mrs. Mansur and Mrs. Benson. The Board of Health greatly appreciates the help and cooperation given by The Concord District Nursing Association.

The shores of Penacook Lake have been inspected as well as the alleyways of the city proper and conditions were found to be most satisfactory.

The city parks have been kept up to the usual standard and at White Park the iron fence has been carried along Beacon street 268 feet.

Four new swings have been added to playground equipment at White Park.

At Rollins Park the Veterans of Foreign Wars have fitted out a swimming pool that will be greatly appreciated by the children of the South End. The northern end of the body of water in the park has been transformed into a pool thirty feet wide and sixty feet long and eighteen inches deep at its deepest point. The work was all done by members of Concord Post, No. 1631.

## PUBLIC PLAYGROUNDS COMMITTEE.

To the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

To put into a short report the many and diversified activities of your Playground Committee would be a difficult task. We can, at least, assure you that there is a great desire on the part of our citizens for adult as well as child recreational facilities. For a small city we are fortunate to have for our summer program many beautiful playgrounds, a municipal golf course, and the Memorial Field with its tennis courts. In the winter, our hills afford coasting and our ponds excellent skating.

Your committee elected, for the season of 1930, Mr. Paul Crowell as Playground Director. From a long list of candidates he was chosen because of his training and because he is a resident of Concord and knows our problems and desires. He proved to be an able director and left the work well organized for another summer.

The attendance, on the whole, was the largest it has ever been on the playgrounds. Competitive sports were much enjoyed and an elastic program afforded opportunity for timely activities.

Penacook School Playground was a new project and filled a need in that section. Equipment was purchased for this area. This Committee is now considering the advisability of protecting this playground by a fence on all sides.

One of the directors had charge and responsibility of the swimming hole at Soucook River. It was fairly well patronized. It's inaccessibility makes its use somewhat of a question, although fifteen boys and girls passed the test as Junior and Senior Life Savers. The Red Cross generously contributed the time of Miss Beatrice Baker for this work. We continue to bring to your attention the need of a municipal swimming pool.

The winter program has included protecting coasters and

preparing skating areas. Hockey is a favorite sport and should be encouraged in this locality.

The Board of Education has given to the Playground Committee the use of the Chandler School. Under the supervision of the Chairman, this building has been put in excellent condition to be used as a community center. At present the Girl Scouts have the use of two rooms, Veterans of Foreigns Wars one room, and the fourth room is reserved for playground purposes.

A flag pole, the gift of Mr. Fred M. Dodge of Penacook, was erected at the Penacook Playground, Penacook, N. H.

The Playground Committee acknowledges the help received from Mr. Wellington of the National Recreational Association and the generous cooperation of various departments of the city government.

We also certify the cash balance to be one hundred twenty thousand one hundred thirty dollars and fifty-one cents (\$120,130.51), with a note outstanding and unpaid for one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00), due Februrary 7, 1931; the balance of the Bridge Bond Account to be ten thousand six hundred thirty-seven dollars and seventy-six cents (\$10,637.76; Gully Hill Bond Account one hundred thirteen dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$113.87); Memorial Athletic Field Bond Account five thousand four dollars and thirty-two cents (\$5,004.32); Sewer Bond Account one

hundred three dollars and twenty-one cents (\$103.21); City Hall and Auditorium Bond Account seven hundred eighty-four dollars and seventy-one cents (\$784.71); and the City Water Department nine thousand five hundred nine dollars and sixteen cents (\$9,509.16).


