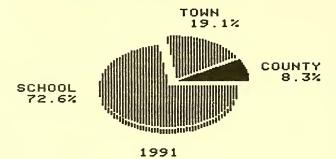

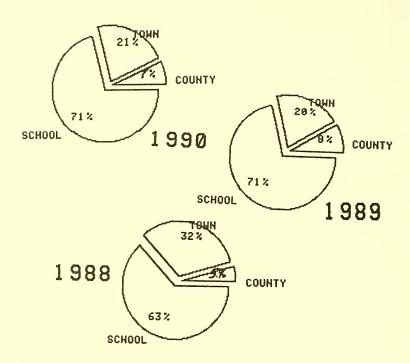

# FINANCIAL CLARIFICATIONS DECEMBER 31, 1991

The Town of Deering, New Hampshire operates under a Selectmen form of government.

The financial statements of the Town have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to the governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the government's accounting policies are described below.

### A. GOVERNMENTAL FUND TYPES:

The town of Deering uses two funds for account purposes:

### 1. General Fund:

The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

### 2. Trust Funds:

Trust Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust by the town.

### B. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING:

The accounts of the General Fund are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting.

Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when susceptible to accrual (i.e., when they become both measurable and available). "Measurable" means the dollar amount of the transaction is known, and "available" means collectible within the current year to be used to pay expenses of the current year.

Those revenues susceptible to accrual are taxes, intergovernmental revenues, charges for services and interest revenue. Licenses and permits and most other local source revenues are not susceptible to accrual, because generally they are not known until received in cash. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred. Under this method, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred.

# FINANCIAL CLARIFICATIONS continued

The Schedule of Town Property is used to establish accounting control and accountability for the Town's general fixed assets.

### C. BUDGETARY ACCOUNTING:

At its annual meeting, the Town adopts a budget for the current year for the General and all Special Revenue Funds. This budget is adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles. The budget is used by the Department of Revenue Administration each Fall to set the tax rate for the municipality. All annual appropriations lapse at year-end unless encumbered. Expenditures may not legally exceed budgeted appropriations in total.

The Town uses encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year end) are recognized. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures and are therefore reported as part of the fund balance at December 31 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year.

### D. PROPERTY TAXES:

The property tax year is from April 1 to March 31 and all property taxes are assessed on the inventory taken in April of that year.

The town subscribes to the semi-annual method of tax collection as provided for by RSA 76:15-a. Under this method, tax bills are sent on or around June 1 and November 1 of each year, with interest accruing at a rate of 12% on bills outstanding for more than thirty days.

The June 1 billing is considered an <u>estimate only</u> and is one half of the previous year's tax billing. The remaining balance of taxes due is billed in the Fall after the State Department of Revenue Administration has calculated and approved the Town's tax rate for the fiscal year.

Annually, the Town establishes and raises through taxation an amount for abatements and refunds of property taxes, known as overlay. All abatements and refunds are charged to this account.

The property taxes collected by the Town include taxes levied for the Hillsboro-Deering School District and Hillsboro County, which are remitted to these

governmental units as required by law. The ultimate responsibility for the collection of taxes rest with the Town.

### E. ASSETS, LIABILITIES AND FUND EQUITY:

### 1. ASSETS:

a) Cash and Equivalents:

State Statutes authorize the Town to invest excess funds in the custody of the Treasurer in obligations of the United States Government, in savings bank deposits of banks incorporated under the law of the state of New Hampshire, in certificates of deposit of banks incorporated under laws of the State of New Hampshire, or in national banks located within this State or the State of Massachusetts. These financial statements report investments in certificates of deposit and savings bank deposits under the caption Cash and Equivalents.

### b) Receivables:

Revenues for the most part are recorded when received, except for the following items for which receivables have been recorded:

- 1) Tax revenue is recorded when a warrant for collection is committed to the Tax Collector. As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector places a lien on properties for all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due. The lien on these properties has priority over other liens and accrues interest at 18% per annum. If property is not redeemed within the two-year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the town. A receivable for such liens is recognized.
- 2) Interest on investments is recorded as revenue in the year earned.

### LIABILITIES:

School District Payable represents the balance of the school district assessment due to be paid to the Hillsboro-Deering School District.

### 3. FUND EQUITY:

a) Reserved Fund Balance:

Reserved fund balance indicates that portion of fund equity which has been legally segregated for specific purposes.

b) Undesignated Fund Balance:

Undesignated fund balance indicates that portion of fund equity which is available to reduce taxes of the subsequent year.

### 1991 AUDITOR'S REPORT

Department of Revenue Administration rules, Rev. 505.01 thru 505.9, were followed in the audit of the Town of Deering's fiscal accounts for the year of 1991. The majority of recommendations made by the auditors in the 1990 report were implemented.

The following recommendations for 1991 are made:

- If the policy in reference to purchase orders is not consistently implemented, it should be rescinded.
- That all fiscal policies and all fees promulgated by the selectmen be reviewed annually and posted.
- That the selectmen look into the feasibility of having auditors appointed, which could include the hiring of an outside Auditing Firm, (also recommended in the 1990 report.)

### GENERAL COMMENTS

There are no workshops or orientation programs set up specifically for Auditors. Assistance may be sought from the Department of Revenue Administration. However, there are detailed instructions specifying the steps to be taken in auditing the accounts of the town.

The requirements of auditors indicated that they shall:

- determine whether all revenues to which the town is entitled, have been collected and remitted to the treasurer, or properly verified as outstanding accounts.
- 2) determine whether all expenditures have been properly authorized, conform to law, and are supported by appropriated invoices and payrolls.
- 3) examine the accounts of all town departments and agencies. (Rev. 501.01)

The Deering Library may well be the best bargain in town! Run entirely by volunteers, on the same annual Town contribution of \$200 since 1984, it offers Deering residents a continually updated collection of books for all ages and public service information.

The Library at the Old Schoolhouse is open Wednesdays 10:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 3:00, and Thursdays 5:00 to 7:00 in June, July, August, and September. During the colder months, the Library moves its most popular books to the heated Town Hall and continues service on Wednesdays 11:00 to 12:00, and Thursdays 5:00 to 7:00. Books can now be returned even when we are closed; just drop them in the new Book Return (donated by the East Derry Library) on the Library porch.

The Library Trustees are thankful for the generous donations of new and books which helped increase the collection and provided a windfall of \$85 at our July 7 book sale. Thanks are also due to Joe McLaughlin who donated his time for the installation of the new ceiling lights in the Library.

A baker's dozen of terrific volunteers, some of them mothers with young children, assisted with the new and popular alternate story hours for preschoolers and school children during July and August, or worked as substitute librarians. The trustees were pleased to honor them at a luncheon at Nancy Mooney's. Such community support is truly rewarding, but the best recognition of the Library's efforts comes from its readers who checked out 22% more books in 1991 than during the previous year.

### TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUND

The trustees would like to first thank those workers in the cemeteries for the superb effort this year.

The main project completed this year was the creation of the new entrance and exit roadways in Wilkins Cemetery. Approximately 400 feet of old roadway was excavated and filled with gravel to prevent the annual drainage problem of both roadways.

A portion of the proceeds of the Gove Fund was used for the restoration of the Town Hall area. In addition, the Hotel lot was maintained by the Gove Fund. The Gove Fund is the only fund not completely restricted by the donors. Every other fund, under our responsibility, is clearly identified as to the uses of such.

The restoration of grave stones in the Patten and Goodall cemeteries will be completed in conjunction with the restoration to the Gove cemetery during the summer of 1992

Due to the banking crisis in the state, the trust funds find their income cut by over 25% from previous years. The reduce funds might mean a cutback in the normal maintenance of the cemeteries.

Normal maintenance (mowing, raking, trimming) of the cemeteries is funded by those individuals purchasing perpetual care for their individual and family lots. The interest from these funds covers the maintenance costs for the following cemeteries under our town, and East Deering. The remainder of the cemeteries under out jurisdiction are maintained by the town appropriated moneys, as perpetual funds were not created in the past. Purchase and equipment repair are paid for with town funds.

At the present time, the only cemeteries with lots available are Wilkins and East Deering annex sections. When all lots are sold in the presently mapped section of Wilkins, the annex portions will be surveyed, mapped, and marked out. East Deering annex section will be mapped this spring. It is anticipated that the cost for lots this year will be increased to match those in the surrounding area.

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The past year has been an interesting one, to say the least!

Our sincere appreciation is extended to all who have served on the various boards. Many hours of valuable time are expended by members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, Planning Board, Conservation Commission, and the Historic District Commission. We wish to express our special gratitude to the chairpersons of each board and committee appointed by the selectmen. Those who serve as volunteers on these boards are truly the backbone of our community and embody what is good about Deering.

This past year has seen the town portion of the tax rate decrease by \$2.43/1000, school portion down by \$2.04/1000 while the county increased by \$.19/1000. However, citizens personal financial circumstances are obviously quite strained.

Two major projects were essentially completed in 1991. The new firehouse is almost completed. Much appreciation goes to the building committee headed up by Ed Naile. The other project was the Bartlett Hill bridge. The town can be proud of a high quality bridge completed on schedule at a cost that has saved the town substantially. Hopefully, our bridge will set a standard for an aesthetically pleasing alternative to the may rather ugly bridges that have been built elsewhere in the state.

The Town suffered unfortunate division and discouragement due to the rumors and false charges associated with the construction of the Bartlett Hill bridge. These charges were leveled against the highway foreman and the three selectmen, by a former police chief. None of the charges had sufficient substance to be heard. As it turned out, neither the State nor County were ever involved in any investigation, the Deering police chief alone pressed charges.

Budget constraints led to the laying off of the Town's police officers and clerical staff, and subsequently the chief resigned. Hopefully as selectmen, we've learned from poor judgment in hiring and management within the police department, that will help us to set up a mature and responsible department this coming year.

This last year a group known as the Deering Taxpayer Association was quite active. The Selectmen unanimously endorsed the formation of this group, believing that conceptually, such associations can be extremely helpful to all involved. Unfortunately, this particular group

- ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300 for stabilization and calcium chloride treatment of Longwoods Road (1.3 miles), or to take any other action relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 for the excavating, backfilling, compacting, and calcium chloride treatment on 3/10 mile of 2nd NH Turnpike, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for the purchase and modification of a used truck to replace the 1970 GMC truck, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to rescind article #15 from 1991 Town Meeting which created a full time police chief position, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45,000 for a part time Police Department current operating expense, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$68,489 for a full time Police Department current operating expense, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$58,000 for a full time Police Department or take any other action relating thereto. SUBMITTED BY PETITION.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,000 for a part time Police Department or take any other action relating thereto. SUBMITTED BY PETITION.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$76,443.50 for the following solid waste expenses:

or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$6,400 for the costs incurred for the project of demolition and removal of the old fire company #3 shed and the disposal of the gravel from the old tanks, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 for a landfill closing capital reserve fund or take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen that starting April 1, 1992 that all employees shall be charged 20% of their employee medical & surgical insurance plans and 100% of all dependent coverage or take any other action relating thereto. SUB-MITTED BY PETITION.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to have the property appraisal division of the department of revenue administration conduct a reappraisal and valuation of all taxable property in the Town of Deering or take other action relating thereto. SUBMITTED BY PETITION.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,000 for a Town reappraisal capital reserve fund or take any other action relating thereto. SUBMITTED BY PETITION.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the combined salary of Tax Collector/Town Clerk and Deputy Town Clerk/Tax Collector, if one is appointed, in lieu of the existing salary plus fee compensation. All money collected via fees, licenses, tax leins and motor vehicle registrations to be turned into town treasury on a monthly basis. SUBMITTED BY PETITION.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to rescind Article #30 that was voted at the 1990 Town Meeting, concerning the acceptance of the roads in the Deering Green subdivision, or take any other action related thereto.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept as Class V, Ridgeview Road in the Deering Green subdivision on the condition that said road meet a set of specifications recommended by a certified engineering firm and approved by the highway foreman, planning board,

and board of selectmen. Any costs incurred in the upgrade and engineering fees will NOT be borne by the Town of Deering.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will accept an additional 763' of Tubbs Hill Road (between the Beideman barn to Continental Cablevision's new driveway) as Class V town highway, or to take any other action relating thereto. SUBMITTED BY PETITION.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote pursuant to NH RSA 80:80 to authorize the Board of Selectmen to retain for public use or to sell, either by private sale to the previous owner form which title was obtained through the Tax Collector's Deed or by public auction, and for such price and upon such terms as in their judgment may seem best, any real estate or interest therein, to which the Town has obtained or shall obtain title by Tax Collector's Deed for the nonpayment of taxes, and further that during the period when title to said property shall be held by the Town, that the Selectmen be given authority to rent, use or administer the same as in their judgment may seem best. This vote shall supercede any previous votes of the Town inconsistent with the powers conferred herein, and shall remain in full force and effect until rescinded by future action of the Town Meeting, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to accept or purchase, with appropriated moneys, on behalf of the town any federal or state surplus fire, police, or highway equipment, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus town property, such moneys to be deposited into the general fund, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will authorize the board of selectmen to accept any land or interest in land donated to the town, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to accept on behalf of the town gifts, legacies and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will authorize the board of selectmen to accept on behalf of the town, donations of conservation land or interest in conservation land to be used as the local matching funds required under the NH Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A; and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP and appropriate these funds for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. SUB-MITTED BY CONSERVATION COMMISSION.

ARTICLE 42. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of an Amendment to the Deering Zoning Ordinance to qualify the Town of Deering for the National Flood Insurance Program. Submitted by Planning Board and supported by Selectmen. (Copies available at Town Office - Ordinance #1) Yes - 171, No - 64

At 7:30 P.M. Charles A. Gaides, Moderator, opened the meeting with a salute to the flag. The Moderator then read the following Rules for the Town Meeting:

- If you wish to be recognized, just raise your hand.
- When you are recognized, please stand and state your full name.
- You now have the floor and may speak without interruptions.
- 4. You must address the issue at hand or you will be considered out of order.
- 5. If others desire to comment on what is being said they should raise their hands and when the person speaking is finished they will be recognized.
- 6. Everyone will have an opportunity to speak and with this in mind the motion to close debate will not be recognized.
- 7. If you are making a motion or an amendment the Moderator must receive a printed copy.

- 8. There shall be no more than two (2) amendments at one time. Once we have two we will vote on them.
- 9. To question a ruling of the Moderator requires seven (7) voters.
- 10. Only one (1) reconsideration of an article will be recognized.
- 11. There shall be no substantive motions on the last article.
- ARTICLE 3. By a ballot vote (Yes 50; No 129) this article for Highway bonding was defeated.

ARTICLE 4. The Town voted not to accept the reports of the town officials, agents, committees and auditors for the year 1990 as the income figures on the financial report were questioned.

ARTICLE 5. By amendment it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$181,797 for general town operations:

ARTICLE 6. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for payment of interest expense.

ARTICLE 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,900 for the Fire Department current operating expenses.

ARTICLE 8. There was no motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250 for snow removal from the three (3) fire stations, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800 for the replacement of two (2) overhead doors in CO 1 station.

ARTICLE 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 11. By amendment it was voted by ballot vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$220,000 for the maintenance and general expenses of the Highway Department.

At 12 midnight, it was voted to adjourn and reconvene on Tuesday, March 19th at 7:30 P.M.. It was also voted not to reconsider at that time any articles already considered.

Temporary moderator Robert McWalters reconvened the meeting on Tuesday, March 19, 1990 at 7:30 P.M..

ARTICLE 12. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,800 for the leasing, lease purchase, or any other type acquisition of a pick-up truck for the use of the highway department. Show of hands Yes - 74; No - 52.

ARTICLE 13. This article was defeated.

ARTICLE 14. This article was defeated by ballot vote Yes -61; No -87.

ARTICLE 15. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$52,500 for a full time Police Department current operating expense. Yes - 97; No - 51.

ARTICLE 16. It was voted to table this article.

ARTICLE 17. By amendment it was voted to authorize the withdrawal of \$11,367.18 plus accrued interest from the Capital Reserve Fund to be added to the trade-in value of the old cruiser to purchase a new or used 4-wheel drive police cruiser.

ARTICLE 18. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,969 for the following solid waste expenses:

1. Penacook tipping fees 22,000.00

(Guaranteed Annual Tonnage x Tipping fee)

2. 1991 Hillsboro Transfer Station 48,544.00 (Deering's share to be determined by dividing the sum of the equalized evaluation of both Deering & Hillsboro into the cost of the landfill's operation and multiplying the result by Deering's equalized evaluation)

3. 1990 Hillsboro Transfer Station 2,725.00
4. Lake refuse removal & expenses 600.00
5. Hillsboro Septic Contract fee 2,000.00
6. CNH Solid Waste District dues 100.00

ARTICLE 19. It was voted to raise and appropriate \$1.00 for the demolition and removal of the old fire company #3 shed.

ARTICLE 20. This article was defeated.

ARTICLE 21. This article was defeated.

ARTICLE 22. It was voted to amend the Town of Deering ordinances by adding thereto the following: "Notwithstanding any provision herein to the contrary, no permit shall be required for any construction, reconstruction, repair, alteration or similar activity, if the reasonable cost to complete such activity shall be One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) or less.

ARTICLE 23. It was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 24. It was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to accept or purchase, with appropriated moneys, on behalf of the town any federal or state surplus fire, police, or highway equipment.

ARTICLE 25. It was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus town property, such moneys to be deposited into the general fund.

ARTICLE 26. It was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to accept any land or interest in land donated to the town.

ARTICLE 27. It was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to accept on behalf of the town gifts, legacies and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

ARTICLE 28. It was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to accept on behalf of the town, donations of conservation land or interest in conservation land to be used as the local matching funds required under the NH Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A; and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP and appropriate these funds for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land.

### ARTICLE 29.:

- 1. Denise Incao was thanked for serving as Selectwoman for three years, and for the work she had done on the new fire house.
- 2. The selectmen thanked  $\operatorname{Ed}$  Naile for his work on the fire station.
- 3. Report by Evangeline Klee Poling of Friends of Deering activities.
- 4. Thanks to the firemen and local contractors from  $\operatorname{Ed}$  Naile on working on the fire station.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:30 P.M.

### DEERING FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Deering Fire & Rescue has had an increased number of calls again this year. We had twice the number of structure fires that occurred last year. Mutual aid was given and received from Hillsboro, Weare, Antrim, Bennington, and Francestown.

The breakdown of the types of calls we responded to are as follows: Structure Fires - 9, Bush Fires - 7, Mutual Aid - 11, Motor Vehicle Accidents - 3, Chimney Fires - 3, Wires Down - 3, and False Alarms - 2.

We also manned the fire stations for a period of time during hurricane Bob as a precaution in case residents needed a place to evacuate to, and to answer the calls for downed power lines and trees in the road. Myself and other department members responded to 14 other calls that were not toned to check illegal burns, and reports of smoke.

The department moved into the new station, and was able to get the old station removed thanks to the highway department, and Beverly Yeaple and Louellen Beard who provided food, drink, and moral support. We still have a number of items to complete at the new station. If anyone is interested in helping please give myself or Ed Naile a call.

The fire department, as always, depends on the support of the community, and your input. The Deering Fire & Rescue wishes to thank everyone in town for their help in making this a safer place to live. We look forward to working with you in this upcoming year. This is your department, and as in the past, if you have any questions, or input, please feel free to call me, the board of selectman, or the board of fire wards.

### DEERING RESCUE SQUAD REPORT

The Deering Rescue Squad responded to 72 calls in 1991, our busiest year ever. Of these calls, 29 were the result of Trauma, 27 Medical Emergencies, and 16 in support of the Fire Department at various incidents not requiring transportation to the hospital. As you can see, these numbers reflect a 50% increase in activity over the previous year.

We took delivery of our Heart Monitor/Defibrillator early in the Spring, and the unit was placed in service in May, with seven of our thirteen rescue members licensed to operate the machine. This single item has proven to be one of our best equipment purchases to date.

During 1991, our members continued to train in various subjects, including Wilderness Search and Rescue, Electrical Emergencies, Incident Command, and Cardiac Rhythm Interpretation. While six of our EMT's participated in their Refresher Training Program in October and their NH State Exams in December, three other members completed their initial courses at various points throughout the year.

Presently, we have two CPR Instructors on the squad, enabling us to do our own in-house recertification, with plans to certify the entire Fire Department in CPR in 1992. Also, looking forward to '92, several members have expressed an interest in advancing to the EMT-Intermediate level. This level of certification, coupled with equipment we already have on the ambulance, would greatly enhance our capabilities and help us to stretch the "golden hour" for our critical need patients.

We will again be actively fundraising this year, with a newer ambulance our ultimate goal. Our 1978 Ford, that has served us faithfully since 1986, is nearing the end of it's useful service as a primary ambulance. As we noted an increase in calls around the middle of '91, we formed a committee to begin the search for another vehicle. While on the subject of fundraising, we would like to thank everyone for their generous donations during the past year. We will certainly strive to be worthy of your continued support.

In closing, just a reminder to keep your emergency phone numbers posted near your phones and to teach everyone in the family how to use them. Do not hesitate to call us. We are there to provide you with around the clock emergency care, as we remain your Rescue Squad.

### REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

1991 was a very dry and busy year for the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service as well as local fire departments due to our increase in the number of fires. Our three major causes of fires in 1991 were non-permit, children and smoking materials. 450 wildland fires in New Hampshire burned approximately 150 acres for an average fire size of one-third acre.

Primarily, the local fire department is responsible for extinguishing these fires. Keeping the average fire size this small is a tribute to early detection by citizens, our fire tower lookout system and the quick response of our trained local fire departments.

In every municipality, there is a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens that are responsible for directing suppression action on wildland fires. They work with other fire department members, under the direction of the N.H. Forest Fire Service, to make sure that all fire department members are properly trained and equipped for suppressing wildland fires.

Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Wardens receive specialized training each year, presented by the N.H. Forest Fire Service, to keep their skill level and knowledge of forest fire laws up to date.

The local Warden and selected Deputy Wardens are also responsible for issuing burning permits for any open burning that is to be done in their community. In New Hampshire, any open burning, except when the ground is completely covered with snow, requires a written fire permit prior to lighting the fire.

Before doing any open burning, it is recommended that your contact your local fire department to see if a permit is required and to save your community the cost of sending fire equipment on a false alarm. Any person violating the permit law (RSA 224:27) shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Please help your local Warden and fire department by requesting a fire permit before kindling a fire, be understanding if they tell you it is not a safe day to burn and help keep New Hampshire green! Thank you for being fire safe.

### HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

One of my responsibilities as road agent is to be aware of on going needs; whether the town can afford or is willing to do anything about them. As citizens of Deering you deserve to be informed of the conditions of roads, bridges and equipment; this is what this report intends to do.

In 1983 the Highway department inventory of capital equipment consisted of an obsolete road grader - a york rake and two surplus army trucks. Today Deering is respectably equipped. We have been sensible in our expansion. However it has been a sizable investment. To not take good care of equipment is to ruin a good investment. There is a lot to be done to bring present equipment up to standards in the next few years. However this is necessary if we are expected to continue to perform in a timely fashion the services that the people of Deering have grown to expect.

A few years ago we began feeling the economic realities of higher taxes and a failing economy. In reaction to this, the town chose to limit spending, to eliminate not only capital projects, but a significant amount of preventive maintenance. I do not contest the people's decisions but I would like to point out that this action simply borrows against the future. Things cannot and will not improve due to inactivity. Use wears and time reclaims, and it is happening in our town.

We wisely have upgraded the Bartlett Hill bridge. This was, as it has obviously turned out, a good investment. We have a state approved bridge that is environmentally and aesthetically pleasing, as well as a good value for the town.

At this time the bridge on Pleasant Pond road has been downgraded to a 3 ton load limit and placed on the red list, due to deterioration and low capacity stringers. It should be replaced. My recommendation is that when we replace it, we do so with another laminated bridge.

Presently, as well as a small reconstruction project in West Deering (addressed in the warrant) I am committed to another project (also addressed in the warrant) to process 4,000, cubic yards of crusted gravel to address the most critical spots on our gravel roads. It is my opinion that our roads are deteriorating at a rate faster than we are able to upgrade, but this is an economic matter, not due to an inability to physically do them.

I have not, in the budget proposal even spoke to the fact that major pieces of equipment such as the loader will need major attention if not replacement in the next

few years. Few towns attempt to do routine tasks as we do without a backhoe, fortunately Al Kelley lease's time to us at a very generous hourly rate. However this cannot be counted on indefinitely, and I think you should be aware of this.

Every attempt will be made as it has to keep our roads passable and safe within the economic bounds dictated by the town. I myself am sensitive, as a fellow taxpayer, of the realities we face. However I am as your road agent acutely aware that we are borrowing big time against the inevitable. To say otherwise would be to admit blindness for the sake of letting everyone feel good.

### PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Deering Planning Board is a volunteer group of concerned individuals who have an interest in the development of the Deering community. During the past year, it has been involved with a number of public hearings, site reviews, and subdivision evaluations.

The Board received five applications for review in 1991:

  After a site review in conjunction with the Conservation Commission, additional information is required.

Three surveyed plot plans were submitted for recording purposes per NH RSA:676:18 IV

Two major subdivisions are currently under construction: Shepherds Crossing & Deering Green Subdivisions.

The Board provided the selectmen with information regarding bonding issues and how the number of allowable housing units in the Shepherds Crossing subdivision were calculated.

The March 1990 Town Meeting's Warrant Article 30, recommended that the roads in the Deering Green subdivision be accepted by the town, provided that these roads met Class V standards as set forth in the Deering Subdivision regulations.

An engineering study found that the roads were not built to specification. The issuing of building permits on the undeveloped lots has been stopped. Further action in this matter is still pending.

The National Flood Plain Development Ordinance was adopted into the Zoning Ordinance in March (last town meeting) to comply with a federal mandate.

Master Plan sections (Goals and Objectives, Community Facilities, Land Use, Housing, Capital Improvements Program, Population and Economics, and Transportation) were adopted in April. Appreciation is extended to the Conservation Commission for their efforts in completion the Water Resources Management section. The Conservation and Recreation section is still under review.

Public hearings on the Zoning Ordinance, Home Businesses, Section 2E were held with the board providing input to the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Various members were active attending meetings on the Route 9 ByPass. At this point it looks as if the Deering routes will be eliminated due to environmental and engineering factors.

A Land Use and Zoning seminar, led by land planner Robert Lemire, was attended by representatives from the Planning and Zoning Boards. It provided information and ideas in the areas of: analysis and tactical strategies for long range community planning, cluster zoning, use of private sector techniques in management and the concept of owner friendly development in which both the landowner's and communities' needs are met.

The Planning Board presently has a full compliment of members, however only one of five alternate positions are filled. The board encourages any interested persons who would like to become involved to join us at our regularly scheduled meetings; held the second wednesday of the month. Your input is vital to the planning decisions of our town.

### CENTRAL NH REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

The purpose of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is to prepare a coordinated plan for the development of the region. (RSA 36:45-53)

CNHRPC is the only organization which can do regional planning. It assists towns providing: technical expertise, models and guidelines, educational workshops, assistance in preparation and review of plans, ordinances, regulations, special studies and grant applications.

In 1991 the CNHRPC accomplishments include adoption of the Land Use Element of the Regional Master Plan, Regional Truck Route Study and Steeplegate Mall Traffic and Land Use Study.

It provided support for public participation and environmental reviews for the Concord to Spaulding Turnpike and Hillsboro Bypass Environmental Impact Studies. It is also involved with assisting towns in the areas of solid waste management of geographic information.

### CNHRPC WORKS FOR DEERING

The Deering Planning Board utilized the professional experience, training and knowledge of the CNHRPC in 1991 to help it function more effectively for the following reasons:

- \* To increase its' understanding of regulatory powers and RSA's governing local planning. Clarification of RSA's assisted the board in applying the various regulations to sound decisions.
- \* To keep updated of legislation which is related to local planning issues and procedures: Two examples are Impact Fees and Revocation of Recorded Plats.

- \* To help evaluate materials currently in use including Board Protocol and Rules of Procedure, Subdivision Regulations, Application and Checklist. CNHRPC not only provided data and resources for our review, they also conducted a review of our materials and made suggestions for change.
- \* To discuss general areas where Deering needs assistance: Bonding, permits, and professional expertise. Suggestions and sample drafts were supplied as well as referral to other agencies which can provide free assistance.
- \* To better respond to current issues before the board: The provision of professional expertise and knowledge aided the review and clarification of facts and information needed to make informed decisions in the best interest of the public. It has provided both general and specific information, guidance and review in many areas. These areas include Board minutes, submitted subdivision plans, approved plats, both past and present Zoning and Subdivision regulations and information on NH local highway law.
- \* To increase knowledge in the area of Planning as it relates to the Regional Master Plan and voice local concerns.

Bill Klubben came to a regularly scheduled meeting to discuss issues facing the town, recommendations for utilization of regional reports, key legislation, possibility of board member education, seminars and ways the CNHRPC can serve our community.

Overall, the CNHPRC has been an invaluable asset to the Deering Community. It's resources and tools which the Planning Board utilizes provides cost effective services which help save the town costly dollars and errors in the decision making process.

### DEERING POLICE DEPARTMENT 1991 REPORT

WOW, what a year, we had more than 2057 calls to service. The highest month was March with 256 calls. The DEERING POLICE DEPARTMENT would like to thank all of you for making it possible to purchase the new cruiser, and all the people who made it possible to complete the DEERING LAKE PROJECT. We now have a complete listing of all the lots, along with names and a emergency recall roster, what a step forward in providing services to all of you.

The DEERING POLICE DEPARTMENT is planning for an index of all the roads with individual maps, to help speed the service to calls, a copy will be given to Hillsboro Dispatch for the State Police to use. Again we would like to thank all of the people of DEERING for their support.

### ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 1991

The Deering Board of Adjustment received only two petitions during 1991, one for a special exception (granted) and one appeal of an administrative decision. The application for appeal of a decision by the Selectmen was rejected as incomplete. Several conferences were held with property owners and prospective owners, some of whose plans have not to date materialized.

The Board has worked on a revised home business section of the Zoning Ordinance for presentation to the voters. The revised section would clarify the types of home businesses, including production or sale of articles, services and professional activities, ordinarily permitted in the residential district.

The Board reaffirmed its function to hear certain appeals, as provided in State law, and its lack of jurisdiction otherwise in the enforcement of the Zoning Ordinance. Specifically, the Board declined to give its approval on building permits, which, if denied, could subsequently come before it under appeal. A by-law amendment initiated in 1991 will require prospective purchasers of property who apply for a special exception or variance to have written consent of the owner.
