

This necessitated purchasing one Thompson machine gun with the latest improvements, two riot guns, ammunition, gas shells and bombs, together with extra traffic officers for our ever increasing summer travel of tourists, and winter recreation for the children sliding.

The activities of the department at all times, we feel, have been handled and discharged in a very commendable and satisfactory manner. His Honor, Mayor F. Clyde Keefe, sent a very complimentary letter of praise and appreciation to the department for the assistance that was rendered by the officers at the dedication exercises and opening of the new Dover Point Bridge and parade September 5, 1934.

At the laying of the corner stone for the new City Hall building a general invitation was extended to all the different departments, so desiring, to place records with former ones in container, for future generations. The police department placed several records for the year 1933, city hall fire, and of the present board of police commissioners and personnel of the department members, September 19, 1934, exercises at three fifteen o'clock in the afternoon.

Total loads of gravel hauled 1,307. The street department hauled 348 of these loads, the remainder was hauled by the district surveyors.

The cost of this work was \$5,306.23; 1,182 loads of gravel, 43 loads of stone, 19 loads of sand, 17 loads of rock, 181 loads of cinders and 400 brick.

The streets, roads and sidewalks have been broken out when necessary at a cost of \$3,121.99.

The snow was hauled from the streets, 5,990 loads, costing \$5,391.54.

Sixteen catch basins have been repaired and rebuilt and seven new catch basins put in at a cost of \$1,074.48.

One drain repaired on Oak street at a cost of \$5.89.

Guard rails have been put up on Sixth street at a cost of \$63.90.

The sidewalks were sanded and cinders and gravel put on the streets where necessary, using 570 loads of sand and 105 loads of cinders at a cost of \$2,482.13.

The streets have been cleaned, hauling off 1,372 loads at a cost of \$380.64.

Sixty-one loads of leaves were hauled off at a cost of \$90.05.

The gutters were cleaned, hauling off 82 loads at a cost of \$273.48. One gutter paved at a cost of \$11.71.

Sand and cinders have been stored for use on streets during the winter.

The streets have been patched with cold patch and hot top patch, using 279 loads of patch, 55 or cinders, 100 of sand and fill, 104 of gravel and 4 of stone dust in the work, at a cost of \$4,092.59.

In maintenance of oiling of the streets, 12 loads of stone, 29 loads of gravel, 17 loads of fill, 317 loads of sand, 6 tons calcium chloride and 52,459 gallons of oil were used at a cost of \$8,007.25.

The road machine was used at a cost of \$351.15.

New culverts have been put in on Dover street, Portland avenue and Sixth street, at a cost of \$50.46.

ANNUAL REPORT
of the
SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE HONORABLE, THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF DOVER,
N. H.:

I am pleased to submit my first annual report, it being the sixty-third in the series of reports of the

On assuming the position as superintendent of schools, in July, I was greatly interested and gratified to find permanent improvements being made in the physical conditions of some schools. This, no doubt, had been brought about by the urgent needs of the schools to accommodate the increasing enrollment of students in the High School, and to the personal comfort and accommodations of Elementary school pupils.

In July, the alteration of the assembly hall, on the third floor of the older part of the High School Building, was under way to provide modern and adequate facilities for the advancement in the teaching of domestic science and to accommodate the increasing number of girls who wished to further their knowledge of this most important part of their future life's work—that of homemakers.

This department now occupies the entire old assembly hall, which has been divided into two distinct sections; one for the teaching of Foods and Nutrition, the other for Textiles and Clothing. The Foods and Nutrition department is furnished with the most modern equipment, including new gas ranges, stain-

less steel sinks, work tables, demonstration tables, and an extensive cooking equipment. The other half has been divided so as to accommodate classes in sewing and table and bedroom etiquette. The bedroom also serves as a fitting-room in which dresses may be fitted to living models. The tables for sewing, sewing machines, display case and ironing board are modern and serve their purpose most admirably. The dining-room is complete with its rug, table, chairs, dishes and other appurtenances which furnish ample opportunity for the teaching of correct modes of table service. The bedroom offers the same sort of an opportunity in the care and maintenance of such a room.

At about the same time in July, the alteration of the former State Armory was undertaken to accommodate the so-called Central School, which had occupied rooms in the High School Annex. This building has been remodeled into a modern four room school building furnishing seating accommodations for approximately 160 pupils. When opened and occupied by the 7th and 8th grade pupils on September 20, it released four rooms in the High School Annex, which were immediately occupied by High School classes. These High School classes had made use of the auditorium for home room and recitation purposes, which was a handicap for the best teaching practices.

November 12, 1934, was a gala day in the lives of many of our school pupils, for on this date the City honored Armistice Day. The children from all schools, including those from the first grade through the twelfth, were invited to participate in its celebration. The results were most gratifying, in that approximately two thousand children were in line of march.

As a fitting climax to the morning's celebration, all participants assembled in front of the remodeled Armory, where dedicatory exercises were held naming the new school in honor of a retired and beloved teacher, Miss Ida B. Hanson.

The Hale School has had a new heating system installed, which has proven itself as a necessary permanent improvement in its economical and efficient results.

HIGH SCHOOL CAFETERIA

Prior to the opening of school, the old system of supplying lunches at recess to High School students was investigated and condemned as inefficient and unsanitary. As a result of the above, a modern and sanitary equipment was installed in the basement of the annex, remodeling the storage and staining rooms of the Manual Arts Department, where the desired result has been obtained. Operated under the control of the school department, it has proven itself self-supporting and providing satisfactory and economical lunches.

ENROLLMENTS

Dover has kept in line with the fact that there is an ever increasing number of pupils remaining in both elementary and secondary schools. The "Code" under which many Commercial and Industrial plants are working, demands that certain rules and regulations be adhered to and followed. This means that many persons under sixteen years of age cannot be employed. The natural reaction is an increased pupil enrollment in schools, for where can these persons spend their time to a better advantage? These students, who would have sought employment when times were normal, have led us to a different

problem in education than ever before.

The elementary schools have increased in enrollments over last year by 55; the senior high has increased in enrollment by 73; making a total increased enrollment for all school, 128. These facts make additional housing facilities self-evident.

TEACHERS

Miss Ida B. Hanson, teacher and principal of over fifty years' service to Dover, tendered her resignation to the Board of Education in June. Her position as principal of the Belknap School was filled by Mrs. Ella M. Folsom. Miss Irene J. Couser was elected to fill the 8th grade position in the Hanson School left vacant when Mrs. Folsom was transferred.

It was necessary to add two teachers to the High School faculty. Miss Louise O'Brien was elected as an additional teacher in the commercial department and Miss Frances Platts was elected as an additional teacher in the domestic science department.

Miss Ruth Morrison resigned her position at the Sawyer School in August. It was not necessary to elect a new teacher to fill her position, as Miss Margaret Page was transferred from the Sherman School, 3rd grade, to the Sawyer, 2nd grade.

It became necessary to retain an eighth grade in the Sherman School because of inadequate accommodations in other buildings. Miss Charlotte Smith was transferred from the seventh grade to the eighth grade in the same school and Miss Mildred Pigott was elected to fill the position left vacant in the seventh grade.

In October Mrs. Pauline Stimson requested that she be released from her contract as a teacher in the High School commercial department. This request

was granted and Miss Dorothy McDonough was elected to fill her position on November the first.

ADULT SCHOOLS

An Americanization class for those wishing to prepare themselves for citizenship was opened under the tutelage of Miss Katherine Mone on November the fifth.

Adult schools, sponsored by the Federal Educational Employment Program, were opened in the High School building on November 14. Opportunity for study was offered in the following subjects: Shorthand, Typewriting, Bookkeeping and Business English, Cooking, Sewing, Arts, Crafts, and Art Appreciation.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I. The seating capacity of High School pupils in the present building appears inadequate. A survey of the actual pupil-sittings now totals 704. With an estimated enrollment for next year of 785, the problem of seating presents itself most vividly. As a plan for accommodating this increased enrollment, I recommend as follows: The domestic science room, now used by the grades in the High School building, be moved to the first floor of the Orchard Street building. This additional room would accommodate perhaps 40 pupils and at the same time devote this space for the ever increasing demand for commercial work. With the transfer of the superintendent's office to the new City Hall, two small rooms will be available for small class rooms. Possibly these alterations will take care of the anticipated increased enrollment for the coming year.

II. Dover, like other school departments, is faced with the question: What are we to do with our

“atypical” or “maladjusted” children? These pupils need extra or differentiated training so as to become useful citizens. A study of this question shows an imminent need in our present educational system. Special accommodations, centrally located and taught by a competent and specially trained person, should be provided. This type of school I strongly recommend for your sincere consideration.

III. Kindergartens, as an adjunct to the pre-school training of potential school pupils, should be added to our system of education, preparing these children in a social and educational way to accept the drill methods of the primary school. Ward houses, now used only for voting purposes, could be adapted and used for schools. The city might be divided into four districts; the children between the ages of four and a half, and five and a half years, living in each district, could attend one of these schools for a half-day respectively. Two such schools, one located on the north side and one on the south side of the river, would serve the present needs of the city.

IV. Whenever vacancies occur in the teaching force of the High School, I recommend the employment of more male teachers in the academic departments, and from these departments select a sub-master who would serve as faculty-manager of athletics.

V. I believe the mechanics arts department should be consolidated under the supervision of one head, whose duties should be those of a teacher and supervisor. The present set up makes two distinct departments, one for the High School and one for the Elementary Schools, which, from an economic point of view, has disadvantages.

VI. The same conditions exist in the domestic

Arts department and the same consolidation is recommended.

VII. Our music department, particularly the High School choral and instrumental work, should be strengthened. This could be accomplished by Miss Eaton supervising the music of the first six grades, and employing Mr. Wilson another day during the week for choral and instrumental work in grades seven and eight and through the twelfth.

VIII. I also recommend that our present athletic coach devote his time to the high school as a teacher-coach. His field in the Academic line would be that of an assistant; in the Athletic line, that of coach in boys' sports, including the seventh and eighth grades, and through the high school.

IX. A lady assistant in Physical Education would handle the duties of such a teacher beginning at the first grade and continuing through the sixth grade. She would be required to handle the girls' sports beginning with the seventh grade and continuing through the high school.

X. The Varney School heating system, now consisting of two hot-air furnaces and one small steam-heater, should be changed to one low pressure steam heating system. It is believed that an economical saving in coal would result and a more efficient heating system should be installed during the coming summer.

XI. It is recommended that the Elementary School housing situation be thoroughly surveyed, particularly in that section of the city to the north of the river. The Sherman School, one or more times condemned, still serves as a school house; inadequate in sanitary, lighting and playground facilities, presents a problem that can not be taken too lightly. For the purpose of focusing attention on

school-house needs, I suggest a special committee be appointed for the specific purpose of investigating the existing conditions, and also serve as a ways and means committee to suggest remedies for the betterment of school-house facilities.

XII. Now that water is available at the Dover Point School, it is recommended that a sink be installed with water connections. As this building possesses a good basement, and the present stove, located in one corner of the room, needs repairs, I recommend the installation of a one pipe hot-air heater to be located in the basement.

XIII. In keeping with the custom as followed in many school systems, I suggest, for your consideration, a change in the method of payment to teachers who must remain out of school because of illness; or illness or death in the immediate family. I recommend that a teacher be granted full pay for absence during the first ten actual school days caused by the above reasons; and half pay for the next fifteen actual school days. Remuneration for absence, for the above reasons, beyond the above stipulated time, to be at the discretion of the Committee on Finance and Claims.

CONCLUSION

In recognition of the cooperation and assistance rendered by the teachers and members of the School Committee, I extend my sincerest appreciation.

The enrollment continues to increase rapidly. This is shown by the following tabulation:

Added to the one hundred and eighteen city Grammar School graduates who entered the ninth grade are thirty-four pupils from the St. Mary's Academy, sixteen from St. Charles and thirty-four from bordering towns. The present freshman class of two hundred and thirty-four is ten less than the class of last year.

Attendance during the fall term has been satisfactory. Since the opening of school we have lost twenty-six pupils for the following reasons: eight have secured employment, eight lost interest, four were obliged to withdraw because of home conditions, three were out-classed, one moved from the state, one transferred to another school and one left because of illness. The percentage of loss during this fall term was 3.8 per cent, nearly 1 per cent lower than during the fall term a year ago.

The use of four additional rooms in the annex relieved the crowded conditions of a year ago. Additional increase in the enrollment for the next year will again tax the seating capacity of the High School.

Another problem that will prove serious for the next year will be the increased enrollment in typewriting classes. This year the typewriters are used to full capacity throughout the day. To an equal load next year will be added another division in typewriting.

The program of studies approved a year ago seems to be working out satisfactorily. The opportunity to choose electives serves as a distinct advantage to many pupils.

The new facilities furnished the Home Economics Department is proving very satisfactory and is greatly appreciated and enjoyed by the pupils taking this work.

The new arrangement for lunch service is proving much superior to that of last year. It is well patronized and enjoyed by the pupils.

The Industrial Department continues to serve the needs of a large number of pupils who are not preparing for college and who will enter employment after graduation from High School. These pupils are doing a large amount of repair work about the school, as well as completing numerous individual projects.

We are proud of the excellent work being done

by our musical organizations. Miss Eaton is reporting fully on their activities.

Routine school work is carried on this year very much the same as last. A reasonable amount of social life is provided through school dances, socials, athletic and club activities. We have organized for the first time a Home Economics Club, and a Dramatic Club, and Latin Club. Club activities are carried on under the supervision of the teachers in the respective departments. Probably other clubs will be added in the future.

I desire to express my appreciation to the school committee, superintendent and teachers for their support and cooperation.

MILK

State Laws require that all milk producers and dealers who make a business of selling milk, skim milk, or cream, unless a license has first been obtained, shall be fined not more than ten dollars for the first offense, and for any subsequent offense he shall be fined fifty dollars.

The sum of two dollars is required for a dealer's license.

Any person selling the product of his own cows shall be exempt from paying any fee for such license.

DENTAL CLINIC

During this past year the Clinic moved from the old location in the Union Block to the remodeled Central Fire Station on Orchard street, which now houses the Police Department, Water Department, Street Commissioner and Health Department. The present Clinic rooms are probably the finest in the state and are very much appreciated by the staff and children.

N. H. TUBERCULOSIS ASSOCIATION, INC.,

REPORT FOR DOVER, N. H., 1934

The New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association held clinics in Dover during 1934, with an average attendance of 16 patients at a clinic. Of the pa-

tients examined for the first time, nine were classified as "suspicious" cases of active tuberculosis, six were diagnosed as "incipient," five as "moderately advanced" and two were in an "advanced" stage of the disease. Several of these patients were admitted to sanatoria, while others were treated at home.

During 1934, the city of Dover moved the clinic rooms which it maintained on Washington street to Orchard street. The new arrangement was a great improvement in all ways.

It is our wish at this time to thank the citizens of Dover for the ideal conditions under which we are able to hold our clinics in this city.

DIPHTHERIA

It is agreed medically, and gone through actual observation, that diphtheria can be stamped out by active immunization of children.

Over 1,400 children were immunized by the local board, with the assistance of the State board of health, in 1933. From an average of about 10 cases a year, there was no reported case in 1934.

It would be a simple matter to immunize with an injection the children missed at the first clinic.

A relatively small sum, which parents cannot or will not pay in these times, would further remove the possibility of the disease in Dover.

Two hundred dollars towards this purpose I would urge be appropriated.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE DOVER PUBLIC LIBRARY:

GENTLEMEN:—The report of the librarian showing the work of the library for the year 1934 is herewith presented.

THE YEAR'S WORK

Again the circulation of the Library is the largest in its history, the 79,802 volumes sent out for home use exceeding those of last year by 297. This

achievement is somewhat remarkable, considering that except for January there was a steady loss until October, when the tide turned and rose steadily through the rest of the year. This greatly increased the work of the assistants during the last months, but especially that of Miss Morrison, in charge of the Delivery Department, and Miss Parker, in charge of the Children's Room. That these heavier demands were met with unfailing cheerfulness and efficiency is something that the Library may feel as proud of as of the gain in its circulation.

Fortunately, through the interest of the New Hampshire Public Library Commission, two extra assistants, Miss Helen J. Junkins and Miss Helen Virginia Hall, who were paid from Federal funds, were added to the staff for November and December. Miss Junkins had previously been assigned to the library for ten weeks in the earlier part of the year. This additional help was of great value.

With the larger use of books there came also an increase in registration, a total of 690 applicants taking out cards for the first time. This was eleven more than for last year.

The attendance was correspondingly large, showing a greater use of the Library by the High School students and children of the grammar grades. Of the total 27,939 visitors who came to the building, 13,346 came to the Children's Room.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS AND CHILDREN

The work with the schools has shown expansion. As classes have become larger and the supplementary reading and study requirements have grown wider there has been an increased need of supervision and help. This has been considered one of the most important phases of the work of the li-

brary and every effort has been made to meet it. At the beginning of the school year a longer time was given to the freshman class of the High School for talks on the use of books of reference and those in the stack room. In addition, each group was taken over the building and given some idea of departments with which they were unfamiliar, especially the Historical Room. Later in the year a talk on the books in the children's room was given to one of the classes from a grammar school by Miss Parker, the children's librarian.

A reading club for children, conducted by Miss Parker, with occasional aid from some of the other assistants, was begun the first week of October and ended in the middle of December. It noticeably stimulated an interest in reading, and from the attractive collection of books selected and placed on a special shelf for them, the children made 309 reports. Twenty finished the course, during which several had read over eighteen books, and one boy had read fifty-four. At a final meeting of the club certificates signed by the mayor, the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, the Librarian and the Children's librarian were presented to the children, stories were told and refreshments served.

This effort to put worth-while books in the hands of young readers had one unexpected but interesting result. Many of the children reported that they had told the stories to their home people, thus extending the pleasure and profit of the club.

Book Week was one of much activity and interest. Never have there been more delightful juvenile books to select from than at the present time, and from among them the library purchased a generous number which were displayed in the Children's Room. Many colorful posters and book jackets, received

through the courtesy of publishers, were placed about the room, adding to its attractiveness and increasing the appeal to young imaginations. On the closing Saturday a children's play was given under the direction of Miss Parker and Mrs. Robert S. Crosby, which called out one of the largest audiences that the Lecture room has seen. This popular response was exceeded two weeks later when the age-old drama of Punch and Judy, with accompanying ventriloquil marvels, was presented by Mr. Theo T. Glass. So many children had to be turned away that they were given permission to attend the entertainment which was repeated in the evening for an older audience.

HISTORICAL ROOM

The Reading Room has called for such close supervision by Miss Leach, who has it in charge, especially during the afternoons and evenings when it is used by the students, that much of her work in this Historical Room has had to be done in a limited number of morning hours or under many interruptions at other times.

In spite of this, however, much has been accomplished. Letters of genealogical enquiry have been answered, information requiring research furnished, visitors looking up ancestors in local records or newspapers have been helped, books from the Shackford collection have been added, the annual examination of shelves has been carried out, and a general supervision of the room has been maintained with an ability and courtesy that have served to keep it one of the valued historical and genealogical libraries of the state.

Its register shows that there were 141 visitors during the year. While the largest number were resi-

dents of New Hampshire, there were those who came from such distant states as Ohio, Wisconsin, Missouri, Florida and California. In all, thirteen states were represented.

READING ROOM

In the Reading Room, in addition to the usual routine of looking out for newspapers and magazines, accessioning books, and helping students and others who come with reference questions, an accomplishment of much importance is the work done on a vertical file of clippings. The preservation of clippings is not a new practice in the Library, as a limited one has been in use for some time. But this source of information has in recent years come to be more widely appreciated and systematized. Regular filing cases are now a part of all large and many small libraries. This Library was very glad when it received as part of the gift from Miss Martha Hale Shackford and Mr. Moses A. C. Shackford several wooden cases that could be used for this purpose. In these a large number of clippings have been arranged alphabetically, by subject, and have already demonstrated their usefulness.

CATALOGUING

No part of the library is more important than the card catalogue. As Miss Garland has said in an early report, it is "the key which opens to practical use the material hidden between book covers."

To have it fulfill its functions adequately a great amount of work has to be done. New subjects are frequently called for, and in the course of the year hundreds of cards have to be typewritten and filed. Some of the cards are made for the children's room by Miss Parker, and those for the Historical Room

by Miss Leach. But the greater number are the work of Miss Morrill, who has charge of cataloguing. She also serves at the delivery desk in the Children's Room during certain hours of each week. In the execution of these duties she has shown the same efficiency and industry as in previous years.

EXHIBITS

Besides many minor timely displays of books, magazines and photographs, there have been two of more than usual interest. One was an exhibit of large, beautifully colored posters, received through the Library Journal or directly from travel bureaus and railroad agencies. With the posters the library assembled a great many travel booklets, also received from railroad companies and travel agencies. To these were added books about many countries from its own shelves. The posters remained on display, and the booklets were kept where the public might consult them during the summer months.

The exhibit that attracted most attention was one of dolls and ship models. It was planned at first for children as a part of the observance of Book Week, during which libraries all over the country were to specialize in hobbies. But as the dolls and ship models came in it was felt that the offerings were likely to make quite as strong an appeal to older people as to children, and such proved to be the case.

Over ninety dolls were loaned to the library and many ship models. Among the dolls some were of the delightfully life-like type popular today, while others were of the kinds dear to the hearts of the children of the fifties, sixties, and seventies — wax dolls with fluffy golden hair or curly locks, hidden beneath hand-trimmed caps and bonnets, and china

dolls with rosy cheeks and hair parted demurely in the middle. Many were dressed in quaint dresses that represented the fashions of earlier days. Particularly interesting were several wooden dolls, a few of them over one hundred years old, and having historic associations, and, rarest of all, a long wooden doll brought from London more than two hundred and fifty years ago. This had been the beloved possession of the mother of Jeremy Belknap, New Hampshire's famous historian, when she was a little girl. The doll was still dressed in the low-cut silk gown she had worn when she crossed the ocean to America.

In addition to these there were funny clowns and rubber pickaninnies, a realistic Micky Mouse, an old-time doll that would take jerky steps if properly manipulated, a sweet-faced nun made in a Canadian convent, and—without which an exhibit such as this would be incomplete—a comfortable rag-doll, showing evidences of much affectionate handling.

Foreign countries were represented by charming dolls from Korea, Germany, China, Japan, Canada, Holland and Java.

While the ship models were less in number, there were some that were unusual, and all were of fine workmanship. Besides several schooners there were other types of ships, including a high-prowed galley with banks of oars, and a model of the Mayflower. Of much interest as reminders of watercraft now no longer in use were models of a gundalow such as formerly carried bricks and wood on our local rivers, and a flat-bottomed ferry worked by horse power, a type of carrier at one time a familiar sight on Lake Winnepesaukee.

A number of instruments for taking a ship's reckoning at sea illustrated the changes that have

taken place in the science of navigation. Beginning with the heavy astrolabe, used in the days of Columbus, there were examples of the successive stages through which instrument-making passed until the modern naval sextant was developed.

Visitors crowded the room daily, and many people came several times to look again at some part of the exhibit that especially attracted them.

The last display of books and magazines was made in connection with a talk on Christmas decorations, given in the lecture room, December 14th, by Prof. Henry S. Clapp of New Hampshire University, under the auspices of the Pioneer Garden Club of Dover.

BUILDING RENOVATION

One of the most important and welcome developments of the year was the renovation given several rooms of the Library. The walls and ceilings were painted, the woodwork and some of the shelves varnished, and the floors given a freshening with an oil finish. This not only added to the attractiveness of the rooms but made them, especially the stack room, much lighter.

It necessitated a great deal of moving of books and furniture, but this was done by the janitor, Mr. Alonzo G. Willand, with very little outside help. That these changes were accomplished with no inconvenience to the public, and a very brief interference with the working conditions of the library was due in large part to Mr. Willand. His readiness and efficiency during this and other times of needed assistance has been fully appreciated by the Librarian and the assistants.

GIFTS

Many gifts have been received through the year.

Noteworthy among them are the following bequests:

From the estate of Mr. George H. Williams \$1,-997.04, the income of which is to be spent for the beautifying and improvement of the library grounds.

From the estate of Miss Abbie F. Lane \$125, the remaining part of the bequest received last year. The income of this is to be used for the purchase of books.

From the estate of Caroline H. Garland, librarian of this library for nearly fifty years, \$100 to be expended by the Librarian and assistants in the purchase of pictures useful to the children of the public schools.

An important addition to the music department was received early in the year from Mr. Josiah Kirby Lilly of Indianapolis, Indiana, who has done so much to preserve the memory of Stephen Foster, whose music is a rich American heritage, but whose name is not always associated with those familiar melodies, My Old Kentucky Home, Oh, Susanna, Nelly Was a Lady, and countless other songs once so widely sung. A complete set of the Foster Hall reproductions of the songs, compositions, and arrangements of this composer, numbering two hundred, were sent to the Library most attractively arranged in slip cases placed in a metal cabinet.

From the Dover Woman's Club five large and artistic scrap books were received. They cover the years from 1928 to 1933-34, and contain many photographs of its officers, clippings of club activities, programs and year books. As a record of an important organization of the City these volumes will be of increasing value as time goes on.

Through the courtesy of the Mayor, Mr. F. Clyde Keefe, a large perspective sketch of the new City Hall and a set of smaller plans of the building have

been placed in the Historical Room. These will be added to the photographs and other pictorial material already preserved and will help to illustrate the growth of the city.

Many magazines received from various societies, cities and other sources have increased the range or reading matter in the Reading Room.

The Library is fortunate in the cooperation it receives from the local papers, the Tribune and Foster's Daily and Weekly. These papers are furnished free, and notices of new books and reports of library activities are given a place in their columns. This is regarded as an important aid in serving the public.

Many gifts of books have been received from authors, publishing houses and others. Among them were forty volumes from Miss Frances Hyde, former school nurse of Dover, dealing with public and private nursing, sanitation, civics and education.

The largest and most valuable gift of books came from the library of the late Samuel B. Shackford, through the kindness of his sister, Miss Martha Hale Shackford, Professor of English literature in Wellesley College, and his brother, Mr. Moses A. C. Shackford of this city.

There were over fourteen hundred volumes in the collection, and approximately one thousand pamphlets. While some of the books are duplicates of those already in the library, and with the approval of the donors will be offered to smaller libraries in the state, the remainder will make an addition of great value.

Among them are standard books of reference that have found a welcome place on the shelves in the Reading Room, many whose importance to this Library is increased by the local imprints or bookplates;

expensive sets of biography and literature; and a number of first and other rare editions.

One of the choicest is a volume bound in vellum and printed in Latin. It is entitled *Novellarum Constitutionum*, and gives the ordinances compiled and annotated at the command of Justinian, Byzantine emperor, 537-565 A. D. A quarto bound in calf has a local bearing, as in it Dover is mentioned a number of times. It is the *Journal of the Life of Thomas Story*, a traveling Quaker preacher. It was published in 1797 and records meetings held in Dover on several occasions.

A few of the other rare volumes, large and small, bearing on their worn and darkened bindings the marks of age and use, are: *The Laws of Ecclesiastical Polity*, by Richard Hooker, London, 1638; *Art of Rhetoric with a Discourse on the Laws of England*, by Thomas Hobbs, printed in London, 1681; a first edition of *Dwight's System of Geography*, published in Hartford, 1795; and a copy of the first American *Arithmetic*, written by Nicholas Pike and printed at Newburyport, 1688.

Of interest in connection with the early history of Dover and New Hampshire are two sets of plans, one a blue-print giving the original grants of land in Barrington with the names of the families who first settled there, the other showing the sites of some of the oldest houses on Tuttle Square, Dover.

Of immediate use was a dictionary stand and an accompanying dictionary, which were placed in the Reading Room, and met with a quick appreciation from the High School students and other visitors.

A list of the books was made at once and many were catalogued and added to the shelves. Others will be added as soon as possible.

Increasing growth brings with it increasing needs, and while the library building has had much done for it in the past year, there are requirements that it is hoped may be considered in the near future. More shelving is needed in the basement and the Historical Room, and some readjusting of the lights in the Reading Room would greatly facilitate the use of its books of reference at night.

The librarian wishes to express to the assistants her warm appreciation of their efficiency and spirit of helpfulness, and desires to make to the Trustees a grateful acknowledgement of their kindness and consideration.
