10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of installing pipe and catch basins in the triangle at the intersection of Mill Road and Main Street. Voted to take necessary funds from Highway appropriation.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended in the Town

Hall so that it may be used by the school children for basketball. Voted \$350.00.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to cooperate with the University in buying a fire engine and pump. Killed.

17. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2% if paid on or before July 1.

1% if paid on or before September 1. Voted.

18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapters 25 and 26 of the revised Laws of New Hampshire of 1925 so far as such acts refer to the election of town officers, and raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars, (\$25.00) to defray the

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expense of putting the same into operation at the Annual Town Meeting 1931; and to further instruct the Selectmen to thereafter include in the Annual Town Budget an amount sufficient to meet the expense involved. *Voted*.

19. To see if the Town will vote to establish and set the bounds to land belonging to the Town on a part of which stands the Sullivan Monument and raise and appropriate sufficient money for same. Voted to see what could be done without expense.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 10, 1931

Two Hundredth Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Durham on Tuesday the tenth day of March, A. D. 1931, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:

- (1) Trunk Line Maintenance (see budget).
- (2) State Aid Maintenance (see budget).
- (3) State Aid Construction (see budget).

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (see budget.)

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to resurface and apply Tarvia to Ballard Street and Mill Road. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required. (see budget.)

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvements in the Durham Cemetery.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for planting and improving shade trees in the Town.

9. To see if the Town will cooperate with the University in the purchase of a fire engine and raise and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by Law.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2% if paid on or before July 1.

1% if paid on or before September 1.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE CEMETERY COMMITTEE

During the year 1930 the Committee had nearly a quarter of a mile of the cemetery roads regraded and surfaced with gravel. Fairchild, former President of the University. No sale of the standing grass was made, and it was finally given away for the cutting.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

To the Town of Durham:

During the fiscal year ending January 31, 1931, 24 water samples were sent to the State Laboratory of Hygiene for analysis. The University and Hoitt systems were sampled at regular intervals and found in good condition at each inspection.

The State Vaccination Law was enforced in both the Durham Village and Packer's Falls School.

With the exception of the whooping cough there were very few cases of contagious diseases in Durham.

A Child Health Conference was held on June 4 under the supervision of the State Board of Health, Division of Maternity, Infancy and Child Hygiene with a local committee made up from the Parent-Teacher Association, Woman's Club and Red Cross cooperating. There were 34 children present at the Conference.

REPORT OF THE TOWN TREE WARDEN

A large share of the charm and beauty of the New England village is due to its wonderful elm and maple trees. Durham has perhaps fewer large trees than most New England villages and it is up to us as citizens of the town to protect our older trees and plant more. To this extent it is necessary to cut out dead, decaying, and broken limbs, and to do a certain amount of pruning absolutely necessary for the health of the tree and for traffic purposes. Then our main road from Newmarket to Dover needs more trees, the planting on the Turnpike should be finished, and some of the side roads might well be planted.

During the year 1930, 80 trees were purchased and set along the Turnpike. A small amount of pruning was done in the village, work that was absolutely necessary on account of the broken limbs that endangered traffic. Advice was given to private owners in a number of cases.

In 1931 a great deal more money should be spent on pruning our shade trees. This is expensive work, requiring a high degree of skill. The town warden was fortunate in finding students who worked for about half of what professional men charge, and who did just as good a job. In regard to street tree planting the street should not be planted until the road grades have been definitely established. When this is done we may avoid the necessity of taking out established trees as was done in several cases this last year.

There is some question on the ownership of the street trees and while all the trees to the middle of the

road are owned by the abutting property owners, it might be a good idea for the property owners to give such trees to the town for the sake of getting town supervision. In six towns in the state, private owners have given narrow strips of road land along the road to the town to perpetuate the trees growing along the road. These strips are usually from 100 to 150 feet in width. It would seem that this might be desirable in Durham, especially along some of our side roads. Undoubtedly there is no better way of preserving the scenic value of trees than by deeding them to the town for this purpose.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN FOR 1930

Durham was very fortunate and only had 10 small fires in 1930. The total expense to the Town on account of forest fires will not therefore be more than \$25, including fire fighting and prevention. The State, of course, pays half of all fire fighting bills and the Boston & Maine Railway meets all the charges in the case of fires for which it is responsible.

Since 2-3 of our fires occur in April and May especial precautions are taken during these months by patrolling dangerous areas and reminding everyone that permits are required for all fires when the snow is not on the ground.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Somersworth, New Hampshire, February 12, 1931. To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

I have the honor to present my second annual report.

The work of the year has gone forward with very few changes. The revised State Program of Studies, approved by the State Board of Education, was put into operation in September, but since its use was anticipated last year, no difficulty was experienced by the change. One more teacher was added, room being provided for the second grade by placing primary desks in one of the rooms previously used for recitation purposes. This gave adequate seating in the fall but more children have entered this grade since and some are now seated in movable seats in the aisles. The basement was remodeled and excellent accommodations made there for the Home Economics classes. Here are held also the recitation classes forced out of a recitation room by the second grade. Miss Nancy Tilton replaced Mrs. Delta G. Ham in grades three and four and remained just half of the year. On her resignation Miss Ruth L. Simonds was engaged to complete the year.

The school at Packer's Falls remains about the same. Some repairs were made on the interior of the building during the summer to make the room more cheerful and the grounds were graded by the help of the highway department. Some improvements were made in the village school building by the installation of a teachers' toilet on the landing of the second floor. New curtains are now in all of the rooms and some of the old blackboards have been replaced. The grounds here ought to be further improved and more playground apparatus added.

The radio secured through the efforts of the Parent-Teachers' Association is greatly appreciated, and when it is equipped with more loud speakers will be even better. Almost every afternoon between 2:30 and 3:00 o'clock some class is "listening in" on the program of the School of the Air. We cordially invite those interested to visit the school at this hour and see for themselves the possibility of the radio in teaching.

The Woman's Club of Durham have generously contributed several new reference books, which are a welcome addition. It is indeed a pleasure to work in a community where so many are interested in the equipment of the schools. This year, as last, the Sons of the American Revolution awarded a medal for good citizenship. The recipient last June was Ralph Rudd.

The employment of a full time and very efficient janitor has made the work of the teachers more pleasant. The Manual Training is again carried on at the University shops. The district owes Mr. Batchelder many thanks for the interest he personally takes in the boys who work under the instruction of a cadet teacher.

Miss Talbot has carried on the music teaching in all of the schools. Mrs. Helen Brettell, an experienced teacher, was engaged to take Miss Talbot's room a part of each afternoon, thus relieving Miss Talbot for music teaching. Miss Brettell also serves as a substitute whenever one is needed. This arrangement has kept the schools going very smoothly and the pupils have not been confused by getting acquainted with substitutes. The attendance has been good. As far as I know we have had no diphtheria or scarlet fever cases affecting school children. Miss Dorothy A. Kavanaugh of Somersworth replaced Miss Ina Marden as nurse. Miss Kavanaugh has all the schools, public and parochial of Somersworth, and those of Madbury and Durham. This arrangement keeps the superintendent in closer touch with the nurse than did the former arrangement. I have only words of praise for the work of our nurses. They are "teachers' helpers," and through their home visits help us all to avoid misunderstandings.

I present the usual statistics for the year ending June 30, 1930. A comparison of enrollment with last year is given. Tuition is being paid for ten pupils in the elementary schools of Newmarket. Tuition is paid in high school and academies as follows: Dover, 13; Newmarket, 3; Emerson School, in Exeter, 1; Austin-Cate Academy, 2; Robinson Female Seminary, 4. Eighteen pupils are attending schools in grades nine and ten elsewhere and paying their own tuition. If all the pupils of high school grade were in our school we should have an enrollment of 36 or, if in a four-year school, 61 instead of 18.

The cost of maintaining the high school last year, exclusive of repairs, and other building changes, such as janitor, water, light and janitors' supplies, fuel and health inspection was as follows:

There are now thirteen pupils in grade eight and thirteen in grade nine, and several paying their own tuition elsewhere. If they all entered a high school other than our own next year, we should be obliged to pay for the tuition of not more than thirty-five, or at the Dover rate, \$3,500. In my opinion no change in the present high school arrangements should be made which would deprive any child of high school privileges. That is, transportation elsewhere for all should be paid, as well as tuition. This would add about \$1,784 to the \$3,500 above or make the total extra cost \$5,284. There would be, however, the reduction on costs of two teachers, or \$2,500, and \$200 for books and supplies, making it necessary to add but the difference between \$5,284 and \$2,700, or \$2,584 to our present budget.

I respectfully submit these facts for your consideration. In closing I wish to thank the school board for their continued support of the teachers as well as myself.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

February 12, 1931.

To the Superintendent and Members of School Board, Durham, N. H.:

As school nurse, I submit my first annual report to the members of the School Board of Durham.

The attendance throughout the grades has been very good. I have examined 178 children. I weighed and measured them and then examined their eyes, teeth and throat. I found 42 underweights, 50 with defective teeth, 29 with enlarged tonsils, and 27 with defective vision.

I did not test their hearing because Miss Sexton, R. N. of the State Department of Education, will come later and use an audiometer, a device used to test hearing power.

I have advised the children, also parents whose homes I have visited, to have their children's defects remedied as soon as possible. I have tried to point out to these parents how these defects will alter the progress of the child, both in school and later life, if not attended to now.

Health talks have been given by me in the grades and the children enjoy them. I am beginning First Aid Talks which will be beneficial to them.

Clothes and food were furnished the needy families at Christmas time, and I wish to thank those who gave toward this good cause.

I wish to thank the School Board, Superintendent, Teachers and Parents, for their helpful cooperation during the year.
