Fellow Citizens and Taxpayers:

As in recent years, 1987 was another very busy year. Completion of the sewer project is anticipated for Spring/Summer of 1988 and individual hookups required should be planned for summer/fall. We will require inspection of the individual connections and cannot allow cellar drains, sump pumps or gutters to discharge into the new sewer lines. We will have information packets available and plan informational meetings later in the year to provide more information.

There are a number of items on the warrant which we hope will be supported:

A Special Flood Hazard Area zoning amendment is on the official ballot. Approval will allow continued participation in the National Flood Insurance Program and allow eligiblity to receive disaster relief funds (we received \$15,572 through the program in 1987 for flood damage).

An article requests approval for a Town Wide Revaluation in 1989 or soon thereafter. This requires 2/3 written ballot approval for borrowing; the much needed Town Wide Revaluation would address inequities created with a much changed real estate market since our last revaluation in 1973.

We also are asking your approval to borrow up to \$50,000 to purchase a new backhoe for the Town and trade in our 1973 model.

We are requesting your approval to change the use of the Lakeview Cemetery Capital Reserve to allow us to utilize the funds to search for new cemetery land; we have very few lots left available.

A tax lien process is being proposed to replace the tax sale process. This allows a lien to be held by a governmental unit rather than to potential outsiders who may be inclined to force people from their property as quickly as possible.

The purchase of a new Police Cruiser and trading our 1986 model was supported by a 2 to 1 vote of the Selectmen.

We are asking for a statement of interest from the voters on the Laramie parcel on Flanders Street as a potential future purchase for recreational or other uses.

Appropriations to and from Capital Reserve have been recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

The budget has been proposed and supported by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

We hope citizens will continue to become involved with various committees to help find or implement solutions to questions or problems important to us all as Townspeople and Taxpayers.

Your interest and involvement in the community is appreciated.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Enfield qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Enfield Elementary School in said Town of Enfield on the EIGHTH day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, 1988, to act upon the following subjects:

Polls will open at ten A.M. and will not be closed before eight P.M.

Articles in warrant will be taken up beginning at seven P.M.

ARTICLE 1. To choose by ballot to serve for:

And also to bring in your ballots on the following questions:

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town zoning ordinance as follows: Special Flood Hazard Areas, as required to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program and receive disaster relief funds?

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town zoning ordinance as follows: Zoning Ordinance for the Town of Enfield, N.H. prepared by the Enfield Land Use Committee and the Enfield Planning Board, Proposal II, which divides the community into seven (7) Zoning Districts?

- ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into Contracts for and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$90,000 to complete a Town Wide Revaluation in 1989 or thereafter; and further to borrow in the name of the Town, a sum not to exceed \$80,000 of the foregoing appropriation by issuance of serial notes or bonds, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and amendments thereto; and further, to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest of such notes or bonds and take such other action as may be necessary to effect their issuance and sale; and further to authorize placement of the \$10,000 1988 appropriation into the existing Reappraisal Capital Reserve. (2/3 paper ballot passage required)
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$50,000 and fund such appropriation by authorizing the borrowing of a sum not to exceed \$50,000 in the name of the Town by the issuance of serial notes or bonds, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and amendments thereto; and further, to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest of such notes or bonds and take such other action as may be necessary to effect their issuance and sale. (2/3 paper ballot passage required)

- ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to change the usc of the Lakeview Cemetery Capital Reserve Fund to "New Cemetery Acquisition Fund" and appropriate the withdrawl amount of \$38,615.29 plus accumulated earnings and interest for the purchase of new cemetery land and authorize the Selectmen to purchase such land, if possible. (2/3 hand vote required for passage)
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in the anticipation of taxes, as provided under RSA Chapter 33.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawl and closing out of the Revenue Sharing Fund for use as a set-off against budget appropriations or pro rata thereon:

- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to receive and expend, in the name of the Town, such gifts, advances, grants-in-aid, Federal Revenue Sharing Funds, HUD, EDA, EPA, FHA, BOR, N.H. Highway Safety, or other funds for any Town purposes as may be forthcoming from the United States Government, The State of New Hampshire, or any other Federal, State or local agency or person.
- ARTICLE 8. Shall the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that the tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes. (2/3 paper ballot passage required)
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or lease any or all parcels of real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed for non-payment of taxes, or any or all parcels not in public use; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver in the name of the Town suitable deeds or leases of such real estate. The Selectmen may sell any real estate acquired by a Tax Collector's deed to the person to whom the taxes were assessed, at private sale; but all other sales shall be by public sale to be advertised by suitable public notice.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote an additional appropriation of \$12,600 to the Police Budget for the purpose of buying a new Police Cruiser; and further add \$4,000 to the anticipated revenues of the Town by the trade or sale of the 1986 unit.
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote an appropriation not to exceed \$500 for an independent appraisal of the 3.78 acre Laramie lot on Flanders Street (Tax Map 33, Lot 50) for future purchase consideration.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to place the following payments (as included in the Budget) into their respective Capital Reserve Funds:

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw up to \$186,150 from the following Capital Reserve Funds as included in the Budget:

- ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,951,726.00 which represents the bottom line of the posted budget. Said sum is exclusive of Warrant Articles 4, 10 and 11 (the total appropriation should be amended if any of these additional articles are approved).
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote that if the purpose or objects hereinafter designated, for which appropriations for the year 1988 may not have been fully accomplished during the fiscal year, the funds so appropraited or unexpended on the unfinished portion of such object shall be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund, dedicated to the purpose or object of its conception, until such time as the Board of Selectmen, acting as agents of the Town shall have the opportunity or occasion for fulfilling or completion of the purpose for which said appropriation was created.
- ARTICLE 16. Pursuant to a petition of ten (10) or more legal voters. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money to be deposited into the Conservation Fund for the purposes of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the N.H. Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriated or donated funds and state matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the Conservation Commission.
- ARTICLE 17. Pursuant to a petition of ten (10) or more legal voters. To see if the Town will vote to designate Eastman Hill Road as a scenic road for the purpose of preserving the trees and stone walls, along the Eastman Hill Road, which give the road its country appearance.
- ARTICLE 18. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or any other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Criminal activity remained at the same low level as in years past. However, the number of arrests skyrocketed to an all time high of 171. This compares with our yearly norm of 60 arrests. Alcohol related offenses were the causation of this dramatic increase. As reported in prior years, drunk driving remains our number one public safety concern. Sadly, the loss of a popular young man to an alcohol related highway death in May gave witness to this horror. There were 94 DWI arrests in this report period, 22 of which were repeat offenders. A number of arrests were brought about by concerned citizens who immediately reported incidents of erratic driving.

The Department has taken a very strong pro-active stance on providing security and crime prevention information to the community. During the year we presented a wide range of programs to the community. Our objectives are to promote timely educational programs to all of our citizens. In May, we conducted a firearms training program which stressed safety and the legal responsibilities incurred when using firearms or deadly force. The Department was assisted by Mr. Donald E. Cantlin, Jr., a certified New Hampshire Senior Hunter Safety Instructor, Officer Vernon L.Bond, Jr., and Canaan Police Chief Jonathon E. Putnam, state certified police firearms instructors. John B. Eames, Esquire, Grafton County Attorney, provided an excellent workshop on the legal responsibilities in the use of deadly force. Hands-on training was conducted at the police firing range under the direction of Mr. Cantlin and Officer Bond. During July, the Department, with the able assistance of Mrs. Gladys Adams, President, Mascoma Lake Community Association, provided a program on personal safety. We were assisted by a staff member of the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council, Mr. John Clark, who gave an excellent presentation on the use of non-deadly force in defending oneself. Officer Philip Corliss developed and presented a bicycle safety program in the Enfield Elementary School. This successful program will become an annual event for our younger citizens.

An area of growing concern is the number of child abuse cases being reported. During the past year, the department investigated 11 cases of criminal child abuse in the community. With the forming of a local task force to address this problem, we should expect to have an increasing number of cases in the coming year. Anyone who suspects incidents of child abuse should immediately contact the department at 448-1212.

We look forward to 1988 with a real sense of optimism. Incidents of criminal behavior remain very low in the community. For all things considered, Enfield is truely a delightful place to live and work. This wonderful quality of life emerges from but one source- that is good people.

ENFIELD FIRE DEPARTMENT

On May 9, 1987 the Enfield Firefighters had the Enfield Fire Station dedicated to Chief Donald A. Crate because of his dedication to the Town of Enfield, the Fire Department and the Fire Service. He is a well-respected man by all firefighters past and present.

The Enfield Fire Officers have set up a training schedule for all Fire Department personnel. The Department now has 18 certified fire fighters, 2 certified instructors, 4 certified in C.P.R. with the help of the Enfield FAST Squad, 1 certified first responder, 1 certified E.M.T., 2 certified in L.P. gas firefighting, 4 certified in commanding the Initial Response and 1 man participating in the Officers' Development Program.

The department has given tours of the fire station and talks to the school children and Scouts about fire prevention.

During Fire Prevention Week, Firefighter Christopher Dube and Lieut. Wayne Claflin went to the Elementary School to talk to the children and showed slides and a video tape about fire prevention. After the presentation each child was given a fire prevention coloring and fun book.

Sept. 8, 1987-Nov. 22, 1987 the Training Officers put on a State Certification course which consisted of lectures and practical training.

Enfield F.A.S.T. Squad has been in service 11 years now and currently has 13 active members. Among the members we have one Registered Nurse, two Paramedics, one Emergency Medical Technician-Intermediate and nine Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians.

The ambulance responded to 139 runs this year resulting in the transportation of 152 patients to the hospital. This alone represents over 700 hours of volunteer time in direct patient care. All members are also asked to be available for two twelve hour shifts every week in order to be "on call". Each member is required to do a minimum of 2-4 hours of training every month as well as to complete a 24 hour refresher course every two years in order to maintain certification.

Our Squad has also provided a C.P.R. Course for the public last Spring and is planning to do so again this Spring. We have also purchased a First Aid Video for use by any organization. Our Fund Drive continues with the hope of purchasing a cardiac monitor/ defibrillator for the treatment of cardiac arrest victims. Once again we appeal to anyone wishing to join us to please contact any of the members listed below.

ENFIELD PLANNING BOARD

During 1987 the Planning Board approved 7 Major Subdivisions, 5 Minor Subdivisions, 3 Exclusions, and 5 Site Plan Reviews. There were 53 new Building lots created through subdivisions and exclusions.

The Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council greatly assisted the Board with development impact studies.

In August John R. Goodwin was appointed by the Selectmen to the position of Planning Board Administrator, a part-time position to aide the Board in reviewing and accepting applications.

During the year the Board worked with the Enfield Land Use Committee drafting a new amendment to the zoning ordinance to divide the community into 7 zoning districts. The amendment will be voted upon on the Town Meeting ballot on March 8, 1988.

ENFIELD PUBLIC LIBRARY

Increased awareness and use of the library continued in 1987 with a record high for new registrations. To support this additional patronage over 800 new volumes were purchased during the year. To enhance the reference collection the McGraw-Hill Encyclopedia of Science and Technology was replaced. This work is most useful for science related topics. The purchase of another set of general encyclopedias, which will make the third in the collection, is planned for 1988 establishing a base for more frequent replacement.

After several years of searching, a complete four volume set of "Granite State of the United States" was acquired. This is still considered one of the most definitive works on the history of New Hampshire.

In addition to established and continuing regular programs a number of small changes were made during the year to provide easier access to information. Lighting was added to the Relief Corps Room and an electrical outlet was installed to power the microfilm reader. A double faced bookcase was moved into the reference area to allow for an expanding collection.

A special note of thanks to the Friends of the Library for their assistance with the school children; the Mascoma Valley Snowtravelers for their continued support and Girl Scout Troop # 242 for the outside flowers and the gift of children's books. Gratitude is also extended to Edna McKenney who retired from the staff after a long association.

MASCOMA HOME HEALTH SERVICES

For nineteen years Mascoma Home Health Services has provided home and community health care. We have attempted to meet the needs of the residents of the communities we provide care to, but also to be circumspect in how resources were used to accomplish this goal.

The Maternal and Child Health Program grows each year as young families move into the area. Enrollment in the well child clinic which is held monthly was 181 this year, and a total of 314 clinic visits. The Dental Clinic held twice yearly made preventive dental care available to 120. The child health nurse made 57 home visits to newborns, and 90 home visits to follow-up care for other children. Three Parent Aides are now available to assist young mothers as well as Mother's Support Groups which include group activities for the children. Thirty-one families and 55 children are or have been involved in the groups. A Pediatric Nurse Practitioner is available for consultation, counseling and also works in the other programs.

Other health promotion activities include Blood Pressure Clinics at which 1240 readings have been made this year. Referrals are made for medical help if needed. At the Flu Clinic 80 people received the vaccine, another 45 in their homes or at the office. In November of this year monthly Foot Care Clinics were started at the office in Canaan. Medical Equipment Loans, and an Emergency Food Pantry is also offered. Supplies are donated by groups and individuals, otherwise this service would not be possible.

The visiting nurse, therapists, home health aides and homemakers have made 5755 home visits to 177 individuals and have traveled over 47,000 miles. It is this kind of care that has delayed and often prevented the need for institutional care, and allowed people to remain independent as we all like to be.

One of our most valuable resources are our volunteers. We have twenty-two who do a variety of tasks in most of the programs and some transportation of patients. This year they have contributed over 850 hours.

Thank you for your continued support of the agency programs. Working together to provide quality care for the community is what we strive to do.

Janet G. Knight Executive Director Budget for the current fiscal year is \$8,947,343. Town taxes to the County average 6.7% or \$2.21 per \$1,000, of the property owner's tax bill. The major portion of county expenses goes to the operation of the Nursing Home (39.69%) and to human services programs for the elderly, disabled, nursing care and children (26.86%).

REGISTRY OF DEEDS had gross income of \$3,630,159 in 1987. The total number of documents processed in 1987 was 29,983. \$3,184,982 was received in transfer tax, of which 96% or \$3,057,584 went to the State of NH and 4% or \$127,398 was retained as county income. Other receipts include recording and copy fees in the amount of \$445,177. Total income to the County was \$572,575 compared to a total of \$3,057,584 paid to the State, although the County is liable for 100% of all operating costs.

HUMAN SERVICES: <u>Old Age & Disabled</u> grant programs remain fairly constant with the elderly program averaging 100 cases at \$4,800 per month and the disabled averaging 225 cases at \$21,000 per month.

<u>Intermediate Nursing Care</u> caseload increased with SB-1 where the County became responsible for all INC cases and eliminated town liability. INC cases now average 255 at \$110,000 per month, a rapidly increasing cost to the counties with savings to the towns.

<u>Children and Youth Services</u> also became a county liability under Senate Bill 1, with counties reimbursing the State 25% for all child service costs. It is impossible to give accurate figures for child expenses, as they are rapidly increasing monthly. Current accounts reflect 130 to 150 cases costing from \$64,000 to \$75,000 per month. (At the beginning of this fiscal year, we had approximately 120 cases at about \$50,000 per month.) The County has 25% funding liability of child placement costs and we are taking an active interest in the needs of children in Grafton County.

<u>Social Service</u> agencies receive \$247,217 or \$4.03 per capita, to provide much needed services for home health, mental bealth, developmentally disabled, senior citizens transportation and nutrition and many other valuable programs.

CORRECTIONAL FACILITY is increasingly overpopulated, now averaging 58 inmates per day and frequently housing 60+. The current cost of operation is \$28.63 per inmate day. We have contracted with an architect to present design and cost for a 34 bed addition. Schematic designs and price estimates are expected by mid-January to go out for bid by late Janaury with bid results due in by the end of February. Funding issues should go to the delegation and public in March with anticipated ground breaking in April.

GRAFTON COUNTY NURSING HOME for intermediate nursing care is licensed for 136 beds and is about 80% reimbursable. FY 87 cost per patient day was \$68.78 with \$58.87 reimbursed by Medicaid.

GRAFTON COUNTY FARM continues to be self-supporting and provides work for inmates as well as offering access for experimental agricultural projects. This is primarily a dairy farm with an average herd of 170, but also grows produce for the nursing home.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS meet weekly on Wednesdays. We encourage public attendance and welcome facility tours. We were deeply saddened by the deaths of Commissioner Arthur E. Snell, Dist. #2, and Commissioner Leonard Anderson, Dist. #3, early this year.

<u>HELP IN A CRISIS</u>: If it's an emergency there's someone immediately available at Headrest to give you personal support and help you contact additional resources. We are a suicide prevention hotline, and have special expertise in handling crises involving the use of alcohol and other drugs.

EMERGENCY LODGING: Temporary emergency shelter is offered to local and transient people referred to us by the police, hospitals, churches, and mental health centers. Supervised overnight lodging for intoxicated persons is funded by the NH₄Offices of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention.

UPPER VALLEY HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COMMITTEE

The Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Committee, an organization representing several organizations has been providing Household Hazardous Waste Collection services and taking the lead in a substantial public education project in the Upper Valley for the last four years.

Collections began with a grant from the state of Vermont. With only a few months of planning time, the Committee organized the event, which was held at the Hartford Fire Station on November 3, 1984. One hundred nine (109) households participated in the Collection, and 24 drums of materials were collected from 9 AM to 1 PM.

Recent collections have been funded primarily by the Lebanon Landfill and by the State of New Hampshire. Some private donations have also been received.

In 1985, the Collection was held at the former Pringle-Lester Chevrolet Dealership lot on Route 120 in Lebanon, New Hampshire on Green-Up Day, May 4th. One hundred thirty two (132) households participated, and 25 drums were collected.

The "first weekend in May" tradition continued with the 1986 Collection being held at the same site on May 3rd. Compared with the previous year, almost twice as many households, 250, participated, with 32 drums collected.

The fourth Household Hazardous Waste Collection was held on May 2, 1987 at the Hanover Shuttle Bus Site on Route 120 in Hanover. This collection far exceeded the Committee's expectations of household participation and after 30 drums of materials were filled, the Committee had to close down the collection, 1 and 1/2 hours early. The car count exceeded 300, excluding the approximately 75 cars that had to be turned away.

The Committee is once again preparing for the annual household hazardous waste collection, to be held on "Green-Up Day", 1988. Our organization has matured and is stronger than ever, and we are prepared for substantially increased household participation this year. All area residents are invited to partake in the annual collection. Let's keep our landfills and groundwater free from contamination. See you in May!

- Article 2. Passed as Printed (To appropriate and expend a sum not to exceed \$446,000 for the purpose of refunding the water improvement program bonds.)
- Article 3. Passed as Printed (Authorized Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.)
- Article 4. Passed as Printed (Authorized sale of land acquired by tax sale.)
- Article 5. Passed as Printed (Authorized Selectmen to apply for and receive funds.)
- Article 6. Passed as Printed 111 Yes 1 No (Authorized Selectmen to withdraw from the Revenue Sharing Fund and further authorize them to make pro-rata reductions if the amounts of estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action thereon.)
- Article 7. Passed 127 Yes 0 No (To raise and appropriate an additional sum not to exceed \$1,313,726 for the purpose of constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements in the federal Water Pollution Control Act and which will qualify the Town for additional federal funds.)
- Article 8. Passed (To instruct the Town's Representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no radioactive waste from nuclear plants shall be stored or disposed of within this Town of Enfield unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot.)
- Article 9. Passed 102 Yes 14 No (To see if the Town will vote to authorize the borrowing of an amount not to exceed \$22,500 for the purpose of puchasing a new 6 wheel Dump Truck.)

- Article 10. Passed 86 Yes 14 No (To see if the Town will vote to raise and expend \$10,000 for the reconstruction of the Town Clock on the Whitney Hall tower.)
- Article 11. Passed 106 Yes 0 No (To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Budget and raise and appropriate the various sums recommended and posted by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 12. Passed as Printed (To see if the Town will vote that if appropriations for the year 1987 are not fully accomplished during the fiscal year the unfinished portion shall be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund until the Board of Selectmen will have the occasion for completeing the purpose for which the appropriation was created.)
- Article 13. Failed 38 Yes 85 No (Pursuant to a petition of ten or more legal voters: To see if the Town would vote to allow David & Judy Crate to construct no more than a 9 unit Mobile Home Park.)
- Article 14. Passed as Printed (Accepted reports of various agents, auditors, committees.)
