## GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE January 29, 1968

The Executive Committee of the Grafton County Delegation met in the County Commissioner's Office in Woodsville on Monday, January 29, 1968 at 10:30 a.m. Present were: Coms. Bell, Clement, Shores, Reps. Berringer, McGee, Merrill, Whipple and the Chairman, S. Smith.

Rep. Whipple moved that we borrow \$300,000 in anticipation of taxes. Seconded by Berringer. Passed.

Mr. Gordon Ingram and Charlotte Boynton were present with plans for hospital extension proposed for County Home. Addition to provide 80 beds at an estimated expense of \$850,000. Plans discussed. Rep. Merrill moved that plans be accepted in general, seconded by Rep. Whipple. Passed.

Rep. Berringer moved that the Extension Service be given \$2708.33 for the month of January, based on same amount received last year. Seconded by McGee. Passed.

Public hearing on the budget for coming year set for Feb. 12 at 2:00 p.m. at the Woodsville Court House.

Committee toured the Register of Probate's offices. Need of additional space was indicated.

Proposed budget was discussed.

Rep. Whipple moved that Register of Deeds be allowed to raise his office girls' salaries \$5 a week as of Jan. 1, 1968. Seconded by McGee. Passed.

#### PUBLIC HEARING ON GRAFTON COUNTY BUDGET FOR 1968

Woodsville, N.H. 2:00 p.m. Feb. 12, 1968 County Court House

Chairman of the Hearing: Rep. Stephen W. Smith of Plymouth

- 1. BUDGET OF THE COMMISSIONERS FOR 1968, presented by Kenneth Bell.
  - 1. County kept within its budget for 1967 with a balance of \$286.43.
  - 2. Increases in 1968 and explanations:

COURT HOUSE EXPENSES - up \$1000 - salaries, fuel costs, etc.

JURY PAYROLLS - per diem pay raised from \$10 to \$15.

COUNTY HOME - increases in salaries, cost of food, etc.

POOR OFF COUNTY HOME - cost of living increases.

OLD AGE ASSISTANCE - cost of living increases.

ON TEMPORARY LOANS - interest rates are up.

COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE - increase requested.

RETIREMENT AND SOCIAL SECURITY - salaries and increased percentage for Social Security.

- 3. \$538,402 to be raised by taxes, an increase of \$98,385.20.
- 2. COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE. Mr. Clark representing the Extension.

Service said that the \$4000 increase in their appropriation could be deleted. Grafton and Coos counties had planned to hire a man to do the agricultural projects for both counties. The money expected from the

- federal government would not be forthcoming and Coos County could not raise its share, so the plan had to be abandoned.
- 3. TRANSFER TAX ON PROPERTY. In reply to a question about the County's share of this tax by Rep. Foss, Mr. Wood said that the county would receive 4%. Total amount for a year is not yet known.
- 4. EXERCISE YARD FOR JAIL AND HOUSE OF CORRECTION, Mr. F. Edes, representing Peter Smith, Chairman of the Bar Association recommended the building of an exercise yard for inmates of the county jail and House of Correction, at an estimated cost of \$10,000. The yard should be 40' by 60' for an average of 26 inmates. Mr. Little favors the vard but said it would necessitate additional guards even with an enclosure of linked fence with electrified barbed wire. Mr. Little is of the opinion that the state needs 3 jails instead of 10. Coos, Carroll, Grafton. Cheshire and Sullivan should share one. Mr. William Baker of the Bar Association spoke of the inhumane treatment of inmates who are not allowed out of their cells for months on end. He said that most of them would be better off in the state prison.

#### 5. NEW COUNTY COURT HOUSE.

Robert Jones of Lebanon, Grafton County Probate Judge, representing the Grafton County Bar Association urged the need for one good court house to replace the three now in use. In 1954 Grafton County delegation voted to build one court house, but the site was not agreed upon and nothing has been done. The new facility, which would service the county for the next fifty years should be built where there is adequate space for offices and court and where there is adequate parking. The Bar Association has agreed that it should be built in Haverhill area. It should have two court rooms so that two judges could sit at the

same time and clear the docket quickly. Mr. George Ray of Plymouth, President of the Bar Association suggested that a sub-committee of the delegation be appointed to work on the problem with the Bar Association.

- 6. NEW NURSING HOME UNIT AT COUNTY HOME. Gordon Ingram, the architect from Hanover, presented the proposed plans for a nursing home addition at the County Home. It would be a two-winged, two floor unit with 80 beds. A new sewage disposal system, alteration of the boiler to carry the additional load, the architect's fee, a new sterilizer and added kitchen equipment would bring the total cost to \$850,000. Reducing the size to 60 beds would result in a reduction of \$150,000. At the moment there is no Federal money available for construction of this kind. Mr. Ingram said there is a Federal bill under consideration, but not vet in the Congress, that would provide 66 2/3% of the cost of building and would allow borrowing up to 90% of the cost at 2½%. There is need for these additional beds and Medicare and state welfare funds would cover the operating costs.
- 7. RADIO COMMUNICATION SERVICE FOR THE SHERIFF.

Sheriff Ash reported that as of July 1, 1968 the state was phasing out its radio communication system. This would leave the county without such service. Mr. Dumont of Lewiston, Maine presented a plan for the county that would connect the towns with the sheriff and also allow communication with the state police. Motorola would service the system on a 24 hour basis. The equipment would last from 10 to 20 years and would cost \$13,269.30.

Meeting adjourned at 4 o'clock.

## GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE March 4. 1968

The Executive Committee of the Grafton County Delegation met in the Commissioners' Office in Woodsville on Monday, March 4 at 10:30 a.m. with Chairman Stephen W. Smith presiding. Present were: The Chairman, Coms. Bell, Clement and Shores, Reps. Berringer, McGee, Merrill, Scott-Craig and Whipple and County Attorney William J. Deachman.

Com. Bell reported that the January bills for Old Age Assistance due to the transfer of cases from the towns to the county were up and that the budget for the year would have to be increased by \$12,000 to take care of this item. Rep. Whipple moved that this amount be added to the amount to be raised by taxes, bringing the total to \$546,433.50. Seconded by Berringer. Vote 6 Yes. 1 No.

Com. Clement advised the Committee that the President of the Sheriffs and Law Officers Association said that the state police can give us a frequency so all we would have to buy is a mobile unit. Agreed that this matter should be investigated.

It was decided that if the Delegation voted in favor of building an Extended Care unit at the County Home, a public hearing would then be advertised and held before

any final action was taken by the Delegation.

Mr. Deachman discussed the Arthur Clough property adjoining the County Home as a possible site for the new Court House. Water and sewage would be available on the 90 acre farm as well as a house that could be moved. The state is building a road that would take part of the land where the house now stands. Com. Clement and Deachman were instructed to get information on the price of the farm and the state's intentions and report to the Delegation after dinner.

## GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION MEETING March 4, 1968

The Grafton County Delegation met on Monday, March 4, 1968 at the County Farm at 1:30 p.m. Present were: Coms. Bell, Clement, Shores, Chairman Stephen Smith, Reps. Gardner, Rich, Tilton, Stevenson, Berringer, McGee, Foss, Frazer, McMeekin, Park, Manchester, Scott-Craig, Manson Smith, Beard, Merrill, Whipple, Morse and Bradley.

Com. Bell presented the budget as recommended by the commissioners for the coming year. He reported that three changes should be made:

- 1. OLD AGE ASSISTANCE. 28 cases were transferred from the towns to the county in January, so the \$40,000 budgeted should be increased to \$52,000 to cover the cost of these new cases for the next eleven months.
- 2. ON SERIAL NOTE. Because of higher interest rates this item should be increased by \$31.50 so that it reads \$2551.50.
- 3. COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE. This item can be reduced by \$4,000 since Coos County decided it could not finance half the cost of the salary of an additional staff member as planned. That figure will

be revised to \$34,300.

The gross appropriation for expenditures will be \$835,701.50 less anticipated income of \$289,268.00,

leaving \$546,433.50 to be raised by taxes.

Rep. Foss inquired whether or not any income could be generated in the Office of Register of Probate, comparable to that in the Office of Register of Deeds. It has been considered. Legislation would have to be passed to make it possible. Rep. McMeekin advised (based on our experience with the Register of Deeds legislation) that any bill introduced should apply to one county. Once it proves feasible, other counties will adopt similar measures.

COUNTY RADIO SYSTEM. Sheriff Ash presented a plan for a new county radio communication system, since the present one is being phased out by the state on July 1, 1968. He has asked several radio companies to survey the county and recommend a system. Only Motorola replied. Mr. Dumont of Motorola explained how the system would work. The cost is \$13,500 with a ten year guarantee. A maintenance contract would cost an additional \$75 per month. Whether this should be financed by serial notes or as part of the Operating budget was discussed. Opinion seemed to favor putting it in the Operating budget. Rep. Merrill inquired if our present frequency could be extended. Sheriff Ash replied that the present frequency is not a good one even now.

NEW COURT HOUSE FOR GRAFTON. John Stebbins, an attorney from Hanover, spoke of the need for a new court House to replace the three now in use. It is only a matter of time when we will need more space for records of both the Register of Deeds and Probate offices. There is an increasing amount of litigation in the county and we should have two courtrooms working simultaneously. In time, he said, district courts will be discontinued. Lawyers in the county are unanimous in support of having one Court House instead of three and favor its location in the Haverhill area. He asked for its implementation and the formation of a committee of the Delegation to work on the plan. George Ray of

Plymouth, President of the Grafton Bar Association, urged the appointment of the Delegation committee to work with the Bar Association on plans. He also recommended two rather than three court terms. He noted the absence of space for private consultation with clients and the impossibility and undesirability of improving any of the three present Court Houses. He suggested that the county appropriate \$1,000 for fees likely to be needed in planning. Rep. Foss inquired if two counties might use one good facility. This has not been considered. Mr. Batchelder reminded the Delegation that 14 years ago the Delegation voted to build a Court House. He urged the cooperation of the Delegation with the Bar Association to provide this needed facility both offices for the county and court rooms.

EXTENDED CARE FACILITY AT COUNTY HOME. Com. Bell stated the reasons for considering the construction of this 80 bed unit. We now have 33 beds and a waiting list. We do not qualify for Medicare, but would with the new building. The income would appreciably increase if we could take Medicare patients. Mr. Lester Billings of the State Department of Public Health said that the plan being considered was a sound one, providing not only for Extended Care but for Skilled Nursing Care of Welfare cases. Asked about the costs in such a facility, he said that we now have no basis for estimating costs, but two or three counties are building facilities like this and should soon know what good care costs in county hospitals.

Mr. Gordon Ingram, Architect from Hanover, showed the Delegation the plans for the two-story 80 bed unit with treatment rooms, lockers and single rooms for House of Correction and Jail patients. The breakdown in the total cost of \$850,000 is: building, \$690,000; boiler enlargement (two new oil boilers) \$50,000; Sewage disposal, \$40,000; sterilizer, kitchen equipment and furniture, \$70,000. Rep. Foss asked if electric heat had been considered. Ingram said it had proved too costly when investigated for a new hospital in Colebrook, Rep. Stevenson asked if we could build a 40

bed unit now and add later. Supt. Little said we now need about 50 beds and the numbers asking for admission has been increasing. The total cost of doing it in stages would be higher.

### 3:45 p.m. DELEGATION WENT INTO EXECUTIVE SESSION

Chairman Smith asked for nomination for a vacancy on Executive Committee caused by the death of Thomas Pryor. Rep. Whipple nominated Van Gardner of Littleton. Seconded by Stevenson. Rep. Tilton moved that nominations be closed. Seconded by Stevenson. Rep. Stevenson moved that the Clerk cast one ballot for Van Gardner. Seconded by Frazer. Voted.

BUDGET AS PRESENTED BY THE COMMISSION-ERS. Rep. Merrill moved that the item for County Home of \$365,000 be reduced to \$350,000. Seconded by Beard. Rep. Stevenson asked how this reduction would affect the budget, what things would come out. One item suggested was the milking parlor at a cost of \$10,000. Rep. McMeekin asked for a breakdown in the increase for County Home. Com. Clement said that a necessary sprinkler system would cost \$12,000, the milking parlor, \$10,000 (reason for asking for this few if any good milkers now on the farm). He also noted that Supt. Little had asked for \$390,000 and that the Home had gone over its budget in 1967 by \$30,689.66 largely because of necessary increases in salaries. Rep. Merrill withdrew her motion and moved that the budget be reduced from \$365,000 to \$355,000 with the milking parlor deleted. Seconded by Beard. Rep. Stevenson said he was in favor of both the milking parlor and the Sheriff's Radio system if they could be financed by serial notes. Rep. Stevenson offered an amendment to the Merrill motion: that a further reduction of \$12,000 (for the sprinkler system) be made in the same item. Seconded by Tilton. Vote on the amendment: Yes 5, No 12. Amendment defeated. The vote on the Merrill motion (\$10,000) reduction for milking parlor was negative.

Rep. Stevenson moved that the figure for Social Security and Retirement be reduced from \$20,000 to \$18,000. Seconded by Gardner. Com. Bell agreed that this figure was acceptable. Voted.

Com. Bell then moved that under the item for Old Age Assistance the figure of \$40,000 be changed to \$52,000 to take care of the cases transferred to the county in January. He also moved that the figure of \$2,520 for Interest Serial Note be changed to \$2551.50. Seconded by Manson Smith. Voted. Rep. Scott-Craig moved that the appropriation for County Extension Service be reduced from \$38,300 to \$34,300 since Coos County has withdrawn from the plan for a joint addition to the staff. Seconded by Foss. Voted.

Com. Bell then moved that the County budget total be revised as follows:

Total for Expenditures \$833,701.50
Anticipated income \$289,268.00
Amount to be raised by taxes \$544,433.50
Seconded by McMeekin, Voted.

SHERIFF'S RADIO SYSTEM. Rep. Stevenson moved that the County also raise by taxes \$13,500 to be expended for a radio transmission system for the Sheriff, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Delegation. Seconded by Gardner. Voted. Rep. Foss suggested that the system be open for bids.

EXTENDED CARE FACILITY AT COUNTY HOME. Rep. Merrill moved that the County Commissioners be authorized to hold a public hearing on the proposed 80 bed two story Extended Care Facility to be constructed adjacent to the County Home at a cost of \$850,000. Seconded by Foss. Voted.

Rep. Stevenson suggested that at the hearing the cost of maintenance and services be presented as well as building costs. It was also suggested that the demand for the 80 bed facility be fully explored.

COURT HOUSE. Rep. McMeekin moved that the County Commissioners be authorized to negotiate for and take an option on the Arthur Clough property in

Haverhill, adjacent to the County Home as a possible site for the new Court House, and to do all things incidental thereto and report back to the County Dele-

gation. Seconded by Gardner. Voted.

Rep. McMeekin moved that the Chairman be empowered to appoint a committee from the Delegation to work with the Grafton Bar Association to study and make plans for a new Court House. Seconded by Stevenson. Voted.

## GRAFTON COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE March 18, 1968

The Grafton County Executive Committee met in the office of the Commissioners in Woodsville, N.H. at 10:30 a.m. on Monday, March 18, 1968. Present were: Coms. Bell, Clement and Shores, Chairman Smith, Reps. Bennett, Berringer, Gardner, McGee and Scott-

Craig.

OPTION ON CLOUGH FARM. Acting on the vote of the Delegation the Commissioners have secured an option on the 90 acres and the buildings thereon, known as the Clough Farm in Haverhill. Com. Bell and Chairman Smith have discussed with the N.H. Highway Department plans for the construction of the new road. affecting land on both the Clough property and the County Farm. The Highway Department indicated that if the County should buy the Clough farm, they would prefer that the county move the house to its new site and the costs of moving and building a new foundation and installation of utilities would be negotiated with the state. In addition the state would pay the county \$9,500 damages for land to be taken from the County Farm for road construction. In return the county would not interest itself in the construction of an underpass.

Rep. Bennett moved that the Commissioners proceed on the option by obtaining complete costs of moving the house and resettling it on a new site and to negotiate a settlement with the state. Seconded by Gardner. Carried. Com. Bell advised the committee that if any of the Clough land were to be sold, a decision should be made early enough so that a smaller bond issue could be suggested.

EXTENDED CARE FACILITY AT COUNTY HOME. In accordance with the wishes of the Delegation the Chairman is making wide inquiries in hospitals, nursing homes, welfare departments and professional groups to estimate the demand for this addition to our hospital. Members of the committee were asked to find out the needs of their own areas and report them. Com. Bell will get estimates of the operating costs of similar facilities in Merrimack County and at Blue Cross and Blue Shield.

SHERIFF'S RADIO SYSTEM. Chairman Smith agreed to ask Sheriff Ash to put in a letter information about the companies he asked to suggest radio systems and what, if any, specifications he made to them.

NEXT DELEGATION MEETING. (Date not decided) Two questions will be discussed and acted upon: 1. the purchase of the Clough Farm as a possible site for the new County Court House; 2. the bond issue for the construction of the Extended Care Facility at the County Home.

### JOINT COMMITTEE OF GRAFTON COUNTY BAR ASSOCIATION AND DELEGATION

Representatives of the Grafton County Bar Association and the Delegation met in the Courthouse in Woodsville on Monday, April 8 at 1:30 p.m. for the purpose of organization and planning of the single court-

house for the county.

Present were: Coms. Bell and Clement, Reps. Gardner, McGee, Merrill, Scott-Craig, Chairman Stephen Smith and Messrs. Robert Jones, Charles Tesreau, William Lovejoy, Peter Smith (representing the Bar), Herbert Ash, William Deachman, Charles A. Wood, Anna D. Proctor and Mrs. Fortier.

Chairman Smith presided. He stated that the Committee should report on: 1) the need for a single courthouse, and 2) plans for satisfying the needs of the

county officers and our courtroom needs.

Mr. Robert Jones opened the discussion by asking whether more than one site had been considered. He expressed the hope that several would be investigated and that an architect should see the site to ascertain whether or not a courthouse could be erected there with good results. The Clough property and the costs were discussed including the proposed highway changes and their effect on the property. It was agreed that at the close of this meeting the committee would examine the Clough site and walk over it.

In planning space for county offices and in planning for courtroom needs the new Rockingham Courthouse might offer us some helpful suggestions. Space for records as well as offices, a jury room and deliberation

rooms will have to be considered.

Next meeting on Thursday, May 2 at 1:30 p.m.

Mr. Tesreau moved that Stephen W. Smith be elected chairman and Mary M. Scott-Craig, Clerk. Seconded by Ash. Adopted.

Meeting adjourned at 3:15 p.m.

## GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION PUBLIC HEARING ON EXTENDED CARE UNIT AT COUNTY HOSPITAL

April 15, 1968

The Public Hearing on the construction of an extended care unit at the County Hospital in Woodsville, N.H. was held at the Woodsville Court House on Monday, April 15, 1968 at 1:30 p.m. Present were: Reps. Bennett, Gardner, Merrill, Manson Smith, Stephen W. Smith, Whipple, Scott-Craig, Tilton and Stevenson; Coms. Bell, Clement and Shores; Superintendent Little and Mrs. Little; Mr. Deachman. Com. Bell presided.

Supt. Little testified that the need had been discussed in 1964 and voted down by the Delegation. The Hospital is now full to capacity and we have a waiting list. Present hospital is not approved for Medicare or Medicaid. With new accredited unit we could get costs from Medicaid patients and from some under Medicare.

Rep. Stephen W. Smith said that the Executive Committee of the County favored the construction of such a unit as imperative. The State will not allow the County to house patients in the basement as we are now doing. With this new unit, those patients could be housed in the present hospital area.

Rep. Stevenson said that he was not satisfied with the method used to plan the facility, since there was not aid available from the Federal or State. Inquired if it was possible to use private facilities for these county patients with the county paying for them. Expressed the hope that the Legislature would provide funds for hospital construction in 1969. Concerned about the cost of maintenance of this new facility.

Mrs. Frances Lyng, Social Service Department of the Mary Hitchcock Hospital, testified that in the state there are only 12 accredited nursing homes that can take Medicare and Medicaid patients. In Grafton County there is not one. In Vermont, only 8. There are some in the process of construction. Need for this unit is great.

Mr. Lester Billings, Department of Public Health of N.H. said there was no question of the basic need for this unit. Our present hospital is not structured for accreditation standards. We have 33 beds in an area large enough for 20. At present there is not enough money appropriated for Medicaid by the State. Medicaid patients would pay all costs including depreciation. No Hill-Burton funds for construction now available committed to Mt. Carmel and Strafford County. May be some later if Congress appropriates funds for Hill-Burton. Rep. Stevenson asked why private nursing homes were not built if the need is so great. Billings cited high construction costs, the sparse population of Grafton County and the large number of Welfare patients in need of this care, who could not pay private hospital charges.

Mr. Merrill, Overseer of the Poor, testified that he thought the nearer the facility was to the people served,

the better.

Dr. Eastman, The County Physician presented good evidence of the need for this unit. He said the rooms were too small. All patients are long-term and would get Medicaid. 20-25 patients are refused each year.

Mr. Albert Beaulieu, administrator of the Plymouth Hospital, said the doctors were in favor of the construction of a new unit now. With rising costs and the fire hazard of the present unit, the work should begin as

soon as possible.

Jack Davis, Caseworker from the Welfare Department cited the need for this addition by recalling the case of a man who should have been in the County Hospital, but was refused because of lack of space. He subsequently fell and had a serious injury in his rooming house.

Gordon Ingram, Architect for the unit, presented the plan for the addition citing its location and its plan in some detail. The cost has risen from \$17.50 per square foot in 1964 to \$22.50 per square foot. The total cost of the 80 bed facility is \$850,000. This includes alterations to the boiler and steam system,

a sewage disposal plant for the whole complex, equipment, furnishings and fees for architect and engineers.

Rep. Stephen W. Smith asked Com. Bell to call for a show of hands to indicate the sense of the hearing on the desirability of constructing this facility. There was no one opposed. Rep. Stevenson said he had abstained from voting, but would approve if the State appropriated enough money for Medicaid in 1969.

Meeting adjourned at 3:00 p.m.

radio equipment for the County, his solicitation of bids, and his intention of inviting bids from both companies. The Committee awaits the results of the bids before making approval of the purchase. Seconded by Whipple. Voted.

PURPOSE: To consider the following items:

- 1. Shall a County Nursing Home and/or Hospital be constructed on the County Home Property now owned by Grafton County in the Town of Haverhill.
- 2. Shall serial bonds or notes not exceeding Eight Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$850,000) be issued for the construction of Item 1, and for the purpose of equipment, furnishings and related facilities incidental thereto.
- 3. Shall the County Commissioners be authorized to issue or negotiate the bonds or notes as referred to in item 2 and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effectuate the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as may be in the best interests of Grafton County and pass any vote relating thereto.

Chairman Stephen W. Smith called the Convention to order at 1:30 p.m. in the Courthouse at Woodsville, N.H. on Friday, April 26, 1968.

The Chairman asked the Clerk to call the roll to ascertain that a quorum was present. Present were: Reps. Van H. Gardner, Marcia T. Rich, John H. Tilton, St. Clair A. Berringer, Edna B. McGee, Phil A. Bennett, Norman A. McMeekin, Fayne E. Anderson, Hazel I. Park, Mary M. Scott-Craig, George H. Beard, Roger M.

Duhaime, Lucina A. Dulac, Gladys L. Whipple, Kenneth G. Bell, Stephen W. Smith, Richard Bradley. Seventeen of the twenty-eight members of the Convention answered the roll and the Chair declared a quorum present.

Rep. Rich asked if the 80 bed unit could be staffed. The answer was affirmative. Rep. Bradley inquired if the heating and sewage facilities could take care of the Court House if it were built on the Clough property. Mr. Ingram, the Architect, said "yes." Rep. McMeekin asked if the phrase "not to exceed \$850,000" was in the motion. Rep. Bell said it was not. Rep. Tilton said he would vote for the motion if we could be sure of getting Federal funds for half of the cost.

- (a) authorize the County Commissioners to procure all or any portion of the land and buildings now owned by Arthur W. Clough and Hazel W. Clough located on both sides of Route 10 in Haverhill for public use as an addition to the County Farm and/or a site for a proposed new County building, by contract, purchase, condemnation or any other methods;
- (b) appropriate the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars for the foregoing purposes;
- (c) to borrow in the name of Grafton County by the issue of serial notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and amendments thereto and any other statute thereto enabling, the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars for the purpose of defraying the cost of the foregoing, authorize the County Commissioners to determine maturities, rate of interest, place of payment and other particulars of said notes and to do whatever may be necessary to the issuance and sale thereof;
- (d) authorize the County Commissioners to sell the buildings and/or any part of the land which in their judgment is not needed by the County, to negotiate with the State of New Hampshire in regard to the acquisition by the State of the buildings and/or land required by the State for the relocation of Route 10, and to execute and

deliver in the name of the County any deeds or other instruments that may be required;

(e) authorize the County Commissioners to do all things necessary or convenient to carry the foregoing into effect, including the execution of Option, Contracts, and Deeds.

Present were: Reps. Tilton, Gardner, Rich, Berringer, McGee, Foss, Bennett, McMeekin, Park, Scott-Craig, Beard, Duhaime, Dulac, Merrill, Whipple, Morse, Bell, Stephen W. Smith, Bradley. Coms. Shores and Clement, Wm. Batchelder.

Com. Bell will ask Warden Parker Hancock whether it is possible for new jailers to have some training at the prison in preparation for their work. Chairman Smith will talk with Dr. Bramwell about the availability of mental health personnel to do the testing that is indicated especially for the men in the House of Correction. The Mary Hitchcock facility might also be investigated.

Mr. Smith suggested that it might be a way of promoting better understanding of county facilities, if newspaper reporters and radio announcers were invited to lunch at the Farm and given a tour of the hospital, House of Correction and Jail. The time would probab-

Mr. Ingram and Com. Bell will discuss with Mrs. Bigelow and Dr. Eastman, the use of a portable X ray and the conversion of the present X ray room into one for Physiotherapy, required for Medicaid patients. Mr. Ingram will also discuss with Mr. Billings and with Dr. Eastman the number of rooms in the new Extended Care Facility that should be piped with oxygen. Mr. Smith raised the question of the advisability of having a Clerk of the Works for this project, to make sure that all details were checked.

Com. Bell asked the committee to grant the Commissioners permission to borrow \$50,000 in anticipation of taxes if needed. Rep. Merrill moved that the Commissioners be given permission to borrow \$50,000 in anticipation of taxes if needed. Seconded by Gardner. Voted.

The bid for the Extended Care Facility was \$715,298.

The committee was joined for lunch at the Farm by four members of the press: Jack Colby of the Littleton Courier, Gloria Pologuin of the Caledonian Record, Lew Powell, of the River News and Jeff McLaughlin of the Valley News. After a statement by the Chairman of plans for the 80 bed Extended Care Unit and the new County Building that will house both court facilities for the whole county and offices for county officers, the press asked some questions. Mr. Smith said that he thought of county government as a bridge between the towns and the state and saw a future place for it in New Hampshire. He cited evidence presented at our hearing of the great need for more nursing home facilities that met Medicare and Medicaid standards in Grafton County. In the discussion of the Jail and House of Correction, he pointed to the need for more rehabilitative services in both, but called attention to the lack of such a program at the state level at present.

The Chairman conducted a tour of the Jail, the House of Correction, the hospital and other sectors of the County Home including the barns and milking facilities.

### REPORT OF GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

As required by Statute, the Commissioners of Grafton County submit herewith the report of the various County Officials for the year ending December 31, 1968.

Grafton County ended the year 1968 with cash on hand of \$90,207.92 which was due to an increase in revenue and money unexpended from the appropriations.

In May of this year the County purchased the Arthur Clough property, adjacent to the County Home, as a possible site for a new Court House, which is now being considered; eliminating the ones in Plymouth and Lebanon.

In September, construction was started on the new Nursing Home. Our present hospital is not approved for Medicare and Medicaid. This unit has been needed for a long time and will make necessary facilities available for our Senior Citizens.

A new County radio communication system has been set up for the sheriff. This was a necessity as the present one was phased out by the State on July 1, 1968.

Grafton County was saddened in July by the untimely death of Frank Little, Superintendent at the County Home, where he had faithfully served for the past seven years. His wife, Rita, became the Acting Superintendent for the remainder of the year and this position she carried on in a very efficient and capable manner.

The number of children in foster homes continues to increase, many having been transferred from towns, due to new Settlement Laws.

Surplus foods are still being distributed in Grafton County; many towns taking part in this program.

We wish to express our appreciation to our staff of employees, the County Delegation, the various town officials and State Welfare Department for their continued cooperation.

Several church groups, organizations, clubs, schools and individuals have shown much interest by providing church services and programs, giving gifts, clothing, money, subscriptions to magazines and books. We are indeed grateful for their thoughtfulness.

In closing I wish to thank the Commissioners, Mrs. Madeline Kirk, Mrs. Doris Hobbs, Dr. C. D. Eastman, Evelyn Bigelow R.N., the chaplains and staff for their cooperation and help during the past year. Especially I want to thank all individuals who have been so helpful and considerate since the death of my husband in July.

# REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY ATTORNEY For the Year 1968

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

I hereby submit the following report of my activities for the year 1968:

Processed through this office were 74 felonies and 80 appeal cases, numerous Petitions under the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act, together with a number of miscellaneous matters.

The County at this time is neither party plaintiff nor

party defendant in any civil action.

Under the provisions of RSA Chapter 7:38, the County Attorney shall include in his annual report statistics regarding crime and "such recommendations as in [his] judgment the public good requires."

Acting within the spirit of that statute, I again bring to your attention the continuing increase in all categories of crime. For example, in Grafton County narcotics violations alone this year amount to fifteen cases

as against none in 1967.

The workload of the enforcement officials increases proportionately with the rising crime rate. In addition to apprehending accused criminals, enforcement officials are confronted with the formidable burden of prosecution on the district and municipal court level. This burden has become particularly acute during the past year. While the accused is entitled to a lawyer to defend him, the officer is without a lawyer to prosecute in behalf of the public. It is an uneven proceeding to match a police officer, representing the public against a trained attorney representing the accused.

With the multitude of recent cases defining the rights of the accused, officers are at an even greater disadvantage in the courtroom. Well over half the towns in Grafton County have only part-time police officers whose knowledge of the law and courtroom procedure

is necessarily limited.

If law and order is as important and imperative to society as current events would indicate, then some serious consideration should be given to accomplishing that result. It is my recommendation therefore, that the time has arrived when the public good requires a full time county attorney, whose additional duties would include appearing in all district and municipal courts throughout the county wherever there is a felony bind-over and in cases involving serious misdemeanors.

In conclusion I wish to thank the County Commissioners and all law enforcement officials for their cooperation and assistance during my tenure as county attorney.

#### PROTESTANT CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

It is my privilege to submit this report as Protestant Chaplain to the Grafton County Home. It has also been my privilege to have the opportunity of serving in the name of Christ many of the residents of the Home, Hospital, Jail and House of Correction. A feeling of warmth and acceptance of the Christian ministry on the part of the residents and staff of the Farm has made this aspect of my ministry very satisfying.

The past year has been marked by a variety of services and activities. Worship services of an informal nature are held on the first and third Sundays of each month. In these services the old Gospel hymns of the church are sung, mostly selected by the worshippers, prayers are said, and Scripture is read, accompanied with a lesson or a message. At times, discussions, questions and answers are pursued with interest. At various times, members of the congregation are called upon for special readings, even hymn solos. At appropriate occasions, Holy Communion is served. A religious film strip on "Our Bible" was enjoyed on one occasion. Young people from Woodsville have come to the Home with the Chaplain several times to read to, and share experiences with, some of the ladies. Also, an increase in the number of men who attend the Sunday services has been noted with interest.

I have collected copies of the daily devotional booklet, The Upper Room, and other literature of an inspirational nature, along with Sunday School materials, and made available for the enjoyment of the Protestant residents.

The Chaplain has attempted to make faithful pastoral visits to the Home and the Hospital. Visits, involving counseling, have been made on a less frequent basis to the Jail and House of Correction.

My family and I also enjoyed participating in the Halloween Party put on by Mr. and Mrs. John Farnham

with the guidance of Mrs. Rita Little. We were very sorry to have missed out of necessity the annual Christmas Party.

A sad incidence occurred during the year with the death of Mr. Frank Little, then Superintendent of the Farm. His loss was deeply felt among all of the residents and the staff.

I want to deeply express my appreciation to Mrs. Little, the staff and turnkeys for their friendly cooperation and assistance.

#### REPORT OF COUNTY PHYSICIAN

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

I hereby submit my report of 1968:

Another busy year has passed at the Grafton County Hospital Unit. We were filled to capacity most of the year. Daily average 32.5 patients in a 32 bed hospital unit. The 33rd bed is in a locked room which we try and keep for a sick prisoner or a psychotic case brought in the night.

This year we purchased a second bath lift in order to ease the confusion in the A.M. with patient's baths.

We had more patient days than ever before. We had fewer admissions, deaths, and discharges than the previous year.

In September of this year we started an eighty bed addition to the hospital unit. This should relieve much of our over crowded conditions, giving us adequate storage for our everyday equipment as wheel chairs, stretchers, etc., which are now kept in the halls. We expect this will be open and functioning October 1, 1969.

Under policies of the State Board of Health all obstetrical and major surgical cases are still being sent to nearby General hospitals and that will still be the policy when our addition is completed.
