TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lee, in the County of Strafford in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: (L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lee on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at eleven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for fire protection.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1500) for Old Age Assistance and Relief.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000) for State Aid Construction on the Bennett Road, the State to contribute four thousand dollars (\$4,000).
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for the construction of a State Aid Bridge to replace the present structure over Little River at the Foot of Widow Mathis Hill on State Aid Highway, Route number 155.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in addition to the five hundred dollars (\$500) unexpended from last year for repair and construction of the Lee Hook Road.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to elect one Road Agent to have entire charge of the Town highways and snow removal.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to purchase fire equipment with funds furnished by the Lee Volunteer Fire Department, such equipment to be selected and supervised by said Fire Department.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to divert to the Lee Volunteer Fire Department the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) raised for fire protection and if this amount has not been raised, to raise and appropriate the same, all provided the previous article is approved.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES — IT PAYS!

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves man power and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire fighting

equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. Appointed by the State Forester, upon recommendation of the Selectmen, he is charged by law with the responsibility of local administration of forest fire laws, fire prevention and suppression. In his work he is aided by deputy forest fire wardens who, in emergency, may assume his power and authority. The warden is guided in his work by instructions received from the State Forester and by the District Fire Chief who represents the State Forester.

The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matters of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record

shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer. This is not as difficult of accomplishment as it might appear at first glance. Let each one who reads this—

- 1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
- 2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
- 3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
- 4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.
- 5. Help your forest fire warden prevent fires his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Lee, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 11th day of March, 1947, at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years, and one for two years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for School Hot Lunch Program.
 - 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and ap-

propriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for new equipment.

- 11. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make tuition contracts with Epping and Newmarket.
- 12. To see if the district in addition to \$6,000 otherwise raised in 1946, will vote to raise the sum of \$25,000 in the name and on the credit of the district through the issuance of serial bonds or notes, for the purpose of purchasing land, grading the same, and constructing thereon a consolidated elementary school building.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to appropriate \$25,000.00 in addition to \$6,000 raised in 1946, for the purpose of purchasing land, grading the same, and constructing and equipping thereon a consolidated elementary school building.
- 14. To see if the district will authorize the school board to take any steps in order to increase the debt limit of the district for the purpose of carrying out article 12.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Lee:

By adopting articles 9 to 12 in the Warrant at the school district meeting held March 12, 1946, the district voted to construct and equip a new central school building, also to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 toward building the same, in addition to any grant or balance available, also to continue the special committee as a School Planning Committee with power to enter into contracts and make necessary agreements for the district pertaining to new school construction.

The selectmen, as authorized by the town, have turned over to the school district a tract of level land about five acres in extent, centrally located, with a desirable exposure, of standard size for an elementary school and admirably suited for the purpose. This land has been surveyed under the direction of the architect, and partially cleared by the men of the community. The town meeting also voted, under article 10 of the town warrant that "in the event the school district votes a sum of money for school construction, to allow the selectmen to obtain such money partly from the town's surplus, not to exceed 50 per cent of same, the balance in a manner as is deemed most advisable to the interests of the town.

With this enrollment, which has been even larger at times during the year, it seems evident that plans for the new building should provide for an expansion to three rooms, possibly even four later.

Hot lunches are being served in the school. It is planned to continue these for a period of about 13 weeks, during the cold weather,. The food is prepared outside and brought into the schools. This activity is made possible by the district appropriation last year. Additional funds for equipment and supplies have been made available by the federal government by contract between the school board and the state board of education to furnish to every child a certain type of lunch. Surplus food products are also available from the Department of Agriculture. The working out of these plans has meant much work and thought on the part of the school board and interested friends.

The local branch of the Red Cross has been quite active in considering matters of school interest and policy, and also served as sponsor for the dental clinic held last January as conducted by Dr. Charles Manning of Newmarket, assisted by Miss Myrtle Fletcher, school nurse.

Miss Martha B. Walker, for many years teacher of music in Lee and neighboring towns, died March 27, 1946. Even as age advanced, her enthusiasm for music inspired boys and girls alike to sing heartily and with enjoyment the songs that she taught.

New Hampshire is the only state in the Union not giving state aid to local communities for high schools. Our state is also low on the list for the proportion of school expense furnished by the state.

To remedy this situation and provide more adequately for public education, the state board of education and the legislative interim commission are proposing plans for greatly extended state aid in New Hampshire. A bill recently introduced in the legislature would give Lee (on the basis of this year's figures)

the sum of \$4,371.88 instead of the \$1,818.58 of state aid actually received this year. The State Board's plan would call for \$2,080,000 of state aid, from state revenues not available for local taxation. Of this, 55 per cent would be distributed as equalization aid, based on the need and effort of the district, beginning at \$6 on \$1,000 of equalized valuation, with a maximum aid of \$10,000, at the rate of \$75 per elementary pupil anl \$100 per high school pupil of average membership. The 45 per cent General Aid would be distributed to all communities, at a rate not to exceed \$37.50 per elementary and \$50 per secondary pupil. The appropriation mentioned above would figure \$14 and \$21 respectively. Furthermore this increased state aid would be attended with less detailed state requirements and more local discretion as to expenditures, in fact part of the aid could be used toward the new building, and it would cost even less than at present to administer in the state office. The only control contemplated at present might be a minimum teachers' salary of \$1500, to which Lee has been wise enough to attain already.

The new Commissioner of Education for New Hampshire is Doctor Edgar Fuller. He is thoroughly familiar with all sections of the nation, having organized aeronautics education for the government in all states. He has also served as a superintendent of schools and university professor of educational administration. With his encouragement, lay-professional councils have been formed in the various parts of the state to discuss the educational policies that should prevail in New Hampshire. Mrs. Helen Saulnier, as a teacher representing Lee, served on the Strafford County group, also on the sub-committee meeting in Durham for more intensive study. A New Hampshire School Boards Association has also been organized, with a statewide

meeting already held in the State House.

The School Calendar

The School Calendar, as adopted by the school board, provides for schools to be in session 180 days, which is the generally accepted standard in well-regulated school districts. From this total are deducted the days of official state institutes, attended by the teachers. These include the county or regional institute, and (in the smaller districts) the rural institute, but not the state convention, which is a voluntary organization. As the school year can not be shortened beyond the required limit except by permission of the State Board of Education, any excess of no-school days is liable to prolong school in June. The calendar as arranged is designed to secure for the district the services of the teachers, transporters, and other employes of the district for the full term for which they are employed.
