RECORD OF TOWN MEETING March 9, 1982

To the inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday, the ninth of March, A.D. 1982, at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of voting on Article 1 and 2, and at 7:30 o'clock in the evening for action on Articles 3 through 17. The polls which open at 1:00 P.M. for the purpose of voting on Articles 1 and 2 will close at 9:00 P.M. unless extended by vote of the meeting.

The annual meeting of the Town of Madbury was called to order at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon by Moderator Robert E. Houston, Jr. The warrant was read and certified to posting. The polls were declared open.

The following ballot clerks were sworn in by the Moderator:

ARTICLE 1: To choose the following Town Officers: Sample Ballot with totals

See Supplement #1.

Moderator for the ensuing two years, Robert E. Houston, Jr.

Selectman for the ensuing three years, Joseph B. Moriarty

Treasurer for the ensuing one year, John W. Printy

Two Auditors for the ensuing year, Barbara G. Houston and Kathleen Traut

Supervisor of the Checklist for the ensuing six years, Ruth K. Shirley Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years, Georgia G. Drew

- ARTICLE 2. Voted by ballot to adopt RSA 72-43-f providing for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax. Voters approved YES 114 NO -15. See Supplement #1.
- ARTICLE 3. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to choose and appoint all other Town Officers.
- ARTICLE 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow up to the sum of \$150,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.
- ARTICLE 5. Voted to raise and appropriate \$400.30 for Class IV and V highways to match the sum of \$2,668.67 to be contributed by the state CARRIED
- ARTICLE 6. Voted not to raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$20,000.00 for the purpose of having the Town appraised and further to authorize the Selectmen to choose an appraisal firm approved by the N.H. Department of Revenue Administration.

After approximately one hour of discussion of the pros and cons of a "professional" reappraisal, the Article was defeated with a secret ballot vote (petitioned by ten legal voters of the Town). 114 votes were cast YES - 33 NO - 80 Blank - 1 NOT CARRIED

- ARTICLE 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Madbury Conservation Fund.
- ARTICLE 8. Voted to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1982 appropriation, said funds to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5. CARRIED
- ARTICLE 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund. CARRIED
- ARTICLE 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$673.88 for dues assessments to support the Strafford Regional Planning Commission.

CARRIED

ARTICLE 11. Voted to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith:

ARTICLE 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of expansion and improvements to the Town Hall.

Selectman Houghton explained that meetings and hearings would be held during the ensuing year regarding plans for any and all Town Hall changes.

CARRIED

- ARTICLE 13. Voted to approve and accept the proposed budget as amended for the current year. Add \$673.88 for Strafford Regional Planning Commission (Art. 10) and add \$10,000.00 for Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund (Art. 12). Total Budget approved was \$127,843.18.
- ARTICLE 14. Voted to dissolve the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purpose of Tax Mapping. CARRIED
- ARTICLE 15. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for the purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money; provided, (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other Town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies; and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95-B.
- ARTICLE 16. There were no Committee reports to be heard this year.

ARTICLE 17. Madbury Beach resident Lorraine Morong highly commended the work done by Bob Jennison on the Hayes Road new construction.

Richard Schreiber asked for an update on the Landfill site. Selectman Houghton replied that as soon as the third test well is completed the whole operation will open. No recycling will be offered during the first year of operation. Hopefully some outlets for recyclables will come to the surface.

Water District Commissioner William Morong announced that the Annual Water District Meeting would be held at the Town hall on Tuesday, March 23, 1982 at 7:30 P.M. Representatives from Omega Labs will be guests discussing aspects of water testing.

Madbury Historical Society President James Irish reminded everyone of the Society's April 13th meeting.

4-H Leader Ellen Conklin announced a Drug Abuse Program to be sponsored by the Madbury 4-H at the Madbury Town Hall on March 10, 1982 at 7:00 P.M.

Since no other business was brought up at this time, the meeting was adjourned at 9:30 P.M. Ballots were counted and the Meeting was officially adjourned at 10:30 P.M.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING TOWN OF MADBURY, NEW HAMPSHIRE

March 8, 1983

To the inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday, the eighth of March, A.D. 1983, at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of voting on Articles 1 through 3, and at 7:30 o'clock in the evening for action on Articles 4 through 17. The polls which open at 1:00 PM for the purpose of voting on Articles 1 through 3 will close at 9:00 PM unless extended by vote of the meeting.

ARTICLE 1. To choose the following Town Officers:

A Selectman for the ensuing three years.

A Town Clerk-Tax Collector for the ensuing three years.

A Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Two Auditors for the ensuing year.

A Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.

A Supervisor of the Checklist for the ensuing year.

- ARTICLE 2. To vote on the amendments to the Zoning Ordinances and Building Regulations as printed on the Official Ballot, and as recommended by the Madbury Planning Board.
- ARTICLE 3. To vote, by ballot, to adopt the provisions of R.S.A. 156:4-b which grants the power of appeal in the Building Regulations to the Board of Adjustment.
- ARTICLE 4. To choose all other Town Officials.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies in anticipation of taxes.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$436.80 for Class IV and V highways to match the sum of \$2,912.00 to be contributed by the State.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Madbury Conservation Fund.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1983 appropriation, said funds to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund in accordance with R.S.A. 36-A:5.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the Town Hall Expansion Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

Appropriation Amount
Landfill Development \$1,000.00
Road Construction 2,000.00

- ARTICLE 12. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant one or more franchises to operate a cable television system in this town, said authorization to encompass the setting of such conditions as the Board deems necessary and appropriate. Said conditions may include the setting of subscription or service rates to citizens and franchising fees to the town or the extent that they are not inconsistent with N.H. RSA Chapter 53-C and the Rules and Regulations of the Federal Communications Commission.
- ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Madbury and to the health and welfare of the people of Madbury. These actions shall include: 1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfer dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.

 2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote on this article will be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an ordinance regulating the distribution of campaign materials and electioneering as follows: I. No person who is a candidate for office or who is representing or working for a candidate shall distribute or post at a polling place any campaign material in the form of a poster, card, handbill, placard, picture, or circular which is intended to influence the action of the voter:
 - (a) Within the building where the election is being held; or
 - (b) Within a radius of 100 feet of the building entrance/door of the building where the election is being held.
- ARTICLE 16. To hear the reports of the Committees chosen, and act on any motion thereto.
- ARTICLE 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

During 1982 the Board was involved with the following projects:

- As promised at the 1982 Town Meeting the Board reviewed and revalued all land in town, and assisted landowners who requested participation in Current Use Assessment. This process consumed far more of our time than we originally anticipated.
- 2. After a vote at the 1982 Town Meeting not to have a town wide reappraisal by an outside firm, the required number of taxpayers petitioned the State of New Hampshire for a state ordered reappraisal. The State subsequently ordered a reappraisal. This has been a time consuming project that included interviewing and contracting with a State approved firm to do the appraisal. A firm has been hired and is well along with it's work.
- 3. The Board has found it necessary to defend the town ordinances in a number of cases and as a result has been involved in litigation throughout this past year.
- The Board has continued it's program of road improvement projects on Hayes Road, Perkins Road, and Evans Road.
- Though we had to put off planning the eventual expansion of the Town Hall, the Board still views the expansion of the Town Hall as a priority.

MADBURY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1982

The commission held six regular meetings in 1982, and sponsored two informational programs. One was a panel discussion on gypsy moths, and the other a slide show on acid rain.

We have been active this year on two main fronts, Gerrish Brook Natural Area (GBNA), and the problem of acid deposition, or acid rain. In September we cohosted, with the Madbury Forum, a nature walk through the GBNA with Madbury resident and forester Dave Belford. Dave visited the area both before and after that walk, and has provided the commission with a report which will help in framing a policy statement for that piece of town-owned land. The report includes maps much more complete than those previously available, a statement of the condition of the boundaries, and a discussion of forest product potential and trail building possibilities and their implications for the area's natural character.

The commission continues to be interested in and informed on progress toward a solution to the acid rain problem. In April two members attended a jammed hearing, held in Concord by Congressmen Norm D'Amours and Judd Gregg. Testimony was taken at this hearing from all groups with a point of view on the problem, and a great deal of information was disseminated. Commissioners also attended other seminars on acid rain. In addition, we participated from April to November in the statewide acid rain monitoring project, thus placing Madbury on the isopleth map, by recording the pH of precipitation and sending the results to the Citizens' Task Force on Acid Rain for compilation.

The commission is working on other issues which directly affect Madbury. These include the bottle bill and ways to recycle the town's waste metals, glass, and paper.

We will greatly miss former chairmam Peg Wolcott, whose term expires this month, and who will not seek renomination to the commission. Appointed in 1977, Peg has served two terms on the commission, most of that time as its leader. During these six years the Conservation Fund was established, and has grown to 2500 dollars; land donated to the town has been studied and plans begun for its management; the commission has kept abreast of conservation issues on the local, regional, state, and national levels, and its voice has been heard on all of them. These and other accomplishments have been largely due to Peg Wolcott's vigor and dedication. We look forward to her continued interest in involvement in conservation affairs

We also thank Bob Salyers, Ken Morin, and Joannah Brunelli for their substantial contributions while on the commission. Peg Irish, James Jackson, and Richard Colprit have replaced them, and have been elected Secretary, Treasurer, and Vice-Chairman, respectively.

The commission is always open to comment and suggestions from the citizens of Madbury regarding conservation of resources.

Respectfully submitted, Craig Seaver, Chairman The study recommendations suggested strongly that the installation of a modular turbine and electric generator would result in the utilization of excess steam during the summer months, with a substantial payback from electric generation. Negotiations are presently underway to install a 25,000 lb/hour turbine to generate electricity year round and yet utilize the by-passed steam for normal heating purposes.

Arrangements are also being consummated with the N.H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission to incinerate oil spill debris where contamination occurs in the Seacoast area. A new concrete floor at the plant to insure protection against oil spillage will be funded under this program, and will be constructed in early spring.

The Town of South Berwick, Maine has voted to join the Cooperative as a member, and legal arrangements are under way in both states to permit the Maine town to join with us. A number of other communities have expressed an interest in bringing their household waste to Durham, while we still have capacity for additional refuse. We also have been working cooperatively with the City of Portsmouth's plant at Pease Air Force Base to the benefit of both plants.

The Directors of the Cooperative wish to express their deep appreciation for the assistance given their efforts by the University's staff as well as the officers and personnel of the cooperating towns. Every effort will be continued to keep the residents of the region informed of the progress in the collection, processing and disposal of the waste which is being handled at the plant.

In order to maintain the rural integrity of Madbury, the Board undertook the investigation of cluster zoning, a new concept in subdivisions. This investigation is still on-going. The valuable assistance of Tom Cooney and the staff of the Strafford Regional Planning Commission are most appreciated.

The Board also approved the indexing and duplicating of the records of the Board to be on file with the Town Clerk.

LAMPREY REGIONAL SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE JANUARY 26, 1983

The Directors of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative are pleased to report that the incinerator/energy recovery plant on the University of New Hampshire campus is operating on a continuing 24-hour, seven-day-a-week schedule. Since our last report in 1982, the Directors have continued to plan ahead for improvements in operation and economy, and are able to report a number of completed and on-going programs to that end.

The day-to-day operation is carried out under the supervision of the Cooperative's Administrator, under the general supervisory control of the three-member Operations Committee from the Joint Board of Directors. The plant personnel, in addition to the Administrator, includes two mechanics, a truck driver, two daily shifts of 12 hours each involving 8 persons, plus a daily cleanup crew. This organization operates the incineratory system, maintains records, and coordinates with the University's Power Plant staff to monitor the boiler and steam production elements of the plant. The Cooperative's organization also handles the collection of refuse from the transfer stations of five communities, and handles the ash removal and its transfer to the landfill site.

During the past year, under the supervision of the State Bureau of Solid Waste, and the Environmental Protection Agency, stack tests for air pollution control were conducted for all three furnaces and were quite successful in achieving emissions control well below required standards. Also, during the spring and summer, the study of potential alternate uses of energy was completed with funds obtained under a CEIP grant administered by the Office of State Planning in New Hampshire.

REPORT OF THE NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

The Newmarket Regional Health Center completed its eleventh year of service in 1982. The health center operates two medical offices, one in Newmarket and the other in Raymond, the Lamprey River Clinic. Both facilities provide general medical care, preventive health services, community outreach, social services, and short term counseling with referral to area mental health agencies.

In 1982, Maude Guerin, M.D., an obstetrician/gynecologist, joined the staff. Dr. Guerin now provides prenatal, delivery and post partum care. In addition, the health center offers nutritional counseling and prenatal classes.

Other members of the medical staff include Sarah Oxnard, M.D., Peter Friedensohn, M.D., Michael Lewis, R.P.A., Barbara Janeway, M.S.N., A.R.N.P., and Anne Fawcett, A.R.N.P. The medical team also includes registered nurses, medical assistants and community health workers. The community health workers coordinate a school health program and preventive screening clinics to detect potential health hazards. They hold informative workshops and act as liaison between the medical providers and the patient.

In November, 1982, the Newmarket Regional Health Center initiated a self-care program for the elderly in conjunction with the Occupational Therapy Department of the University of New Hampshire. The purpose of this program is to enable the elderly to stay in their home setting as well as to maintain a quality of life and independent status within their community. The focus of the program is to provide self-care skills before disability occurs and to anticipate problems with functional activities. The Newmarket Regional Health Center continues to operate the Senior Citizen Transportation Program. Three of the four busses are equipped with hydraulic lifts to provide services to the handicapped. The transportation service enables senior citizens to remain independent, self-sufficient and active by providing the needed services, including medical, food shopping and recreational trips. STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

The *Madbury Town Plan* was completed early in 1982. The Commission helped edit the final draft, wrote a short version and a five-page summary, typed the final plan and made arrangements for its printing.

Since then, the Commmission's work in Madbury has been focused on a major regional project affecting the town.

Part of the Strafford region is now a small "urbanized area," according to the U.S. Census Bureau. These urban communities must undertake a formal transportation planning process required by Congress (1967), or they cannot receive any federal funds for any highway improvements, bridge reconstruction, traffic signals, railroad crossings — anything that is transportation related. All such funds will cease if certain plans aren't completed by October 1, 1983.

The Commission is working with affected communities to complete the required work on time. Madbury is included in the urban area, and is represented on the Technical Advisory Committee and Transportation Policy Committee (as well as the SRPC), which are overseeing the development of the required work.

Besides this major undertaking, Commission staff researched questions on cluster housing and farmland preservation for the Planning Board, and made presentations at three Board meetings.

When Selectmen, Planning Board or Conservation Commission are ready to continue work on the plan's recommendations, the Commission is ready to help in any way it can.

MADBURY FORUM

The function of the Madbury Forum is to develop programs and activities that foster a sense of community among Madbury residents. The Forum offers three programs each year, in February, June and October.

The major event each year is Madbury Day, in June. Last year's program featured the first band concert held in Madbury within the memory of present residents. The concert was presented by the Air Force Band of New England, stationed at Pease Air Force Base.

The 1983 program for Madbury Day will feature an authentic 18th century encampment, with a parade, colonial crafts and demonstrations, a tomahawk throw, cannon firing demonstrations, and a mock battle. The day will be highlighted by another excellent chicken barbecue sponsored by the Madbury Fire Department.

The Madbury Historical Society has expanded to four meetings a year: the annual meeting in October, followed by general meetings in November, January and April. The meetings are held in the town hall on the second Tuesday of the month. All historical society activities are open to any interested residents and friends.
