

The tabulations show a comparison of the various potentials in terms of yield in gallons per day, storage in acre feet, surface area of the impoundment, surface elevation of the pool, height of dam in feet, and approximate first costs.

It should be clearly understood that the costs shown are estimates based on preliminary data. They should be used to compare the relative merits of the several sites rather than be considered actual construction costs of the individual sites.

Estimates for land rights costs have been included for the sites on Dean and Roaring Brook, but not for the two Ames Brook sites. The Ames Brook area is owned by the Town; and, therefore, land costs are not an added expense.

The design heights of the dams at site 5-9A and 6-1 includes capacity for temporarily storing the equivalent of three inches of runoff from the drainage area above the structure. This is in lieu of the cost of constructing a spillway to safely pass the largest expected flood flow. In most cases these two costs are comparable. Conditions at the sites usually determine which type of structure is best adapted for construction and use.

It is to be pointed out that development on Ames Brook will not provide a large amount of water, the unit costs are high and additional sources would be needed to meet present demands.

Site 5-9A on Roaring Brook would provide all the water needed but the cost runs considerably higher than site 6-1 on Dean Brook.

It seems then, that site 6-1 on Dean Brook in Northumberland Village yielding 2 million gallons per day at a cost of \$126,000 is the most practical area to develop. This would mean an additional expense of pumping to Groveton. However, the possibility of having one source of water to supply both Groveton and the Village of Northumberland would more than offset this cost.

If and when the Town decides to develop a new source of water supply, it would be well to consider the installation of a filtration plant.

The estimated cost of a complete filter system capable of treating 1 million gallons per day is approximately \$56,000. This includes the complete filter delivered to site, mechanical and electrical construction, a building to house the equipment and put in operation.

The total overall estimated cost of site 6-1 on Dean Brook (\$126,000) and the filter plant (\$56,000) is \$182,000.

Under the so-called Aiken Bill, communities of 5,500 or less population may obtain federal grants up to 50% of the cost of a domestic water system. In addition, grants are also available for preparing comprehensive plans for development of water supplies. There is an article in the Town Warrant requesting you, the voters, to authorize the Selectmen to apply to United States Government for a planning assistance grant.

#### DANA R. KINGSTON

#### PRECINCT COMMITTEE REPORT

By the action taken at last year's town meeting, the undersigned were appointed by the selectmen to study the reasons, if any, of dissolving the present precinct district and absorbing these functions into the town's financial and administrative structure.

Three meetings were held, including meetings with Town Council, precinct commissioners and selectmen. The following are some facts that came out of this study:

- 1. No action can be taken at town meeting. The vote to dissolve must be taken at precinct meeting.
- 2. The total valuation of the town is \$7,839,355.00. The valuation of the precinct is \$7,473,029.00.
- 3. The precinct performs three functions (a). Fire department, the administration, purchase and repairs to equipment. (b). Garbage pick up. (c). Precinct building repairs and upkeep.
- 4. Water tax collection, water and sewer installations and repairs, town dump, village maintenance (village lights, street cleaning etc.) are a few of the precinct services carried by town taxation.
- 5. Many towns in the state have dissolved their precincts. Some of the reasons were for simpler administration of services and the elimination of duplicated reports.

It was also discussed that if the precinct was dissolved, the fire department would become a regular department of the Town the same as the police and highway departments, with the exception that the precinct commissioners would become fire commissioners and be appointed by the selectmen, one every three years.

#### **GROVETON PUBLIC LIBRARY**

The new Groveton Public Library opened in early September and indeed is a building we can all feel justly proud of. The new library is open daily, except Saturday, from 2:30-4:30 and from 6:30-8:30.

Our regular librarian, Miss Mary Chapman, has been ill a year and as of now it is not known whether she plans to return to the position or not. In the meantime, the trustees are fortunate in having Mrs. Meta Bennett as acting librarian. Mrs. Bennett is not a trained librarian but has been doing a very commendable job in her work. Since the opening of the new library, book circulation has risen from 475 to 1265 books, or an average of 850 books monthly.

The trustees have voted to wait awhile in replacing Miss Chapman as we are hoping she may return soon to work. In the meantime they are asking Miss Ruberta Smith, formerly a teacher of children's literature, and Mr. Chandler Matthews to assist Mrs. Bennett in selecting and cataloging books. Miss Smith's mother, the late Jennie Norcott Smith, was the librarian of the Groveton Public Library when it first opened.

The trustees also voted to join the Statewide Library Development Program. Under this program we can order books at larger discount and can have our entire supply of books cataloged for us according to the Dewey Decimal System which is in use in all libraries throughout the country. By joining the program, we will have available to us many professional services offered by the State Library which will make our beautiful new library much more functional than it is now. #### CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

Many classes were attended during the year, giving greater knowledge to all phases of CD. One of the outstanding courses was an instructor course in radiological monitoring (RADEF). This course gave us three instructors who will be used to instruct more monitors and refresher courses for our present monitors. This continued knowledge of radiation and its effects puts us in a better position to advise people as to the when and where of exposure.

We have added a fire coder to our warning system which when in operation will supplement the present fire warning horn. We have had a great deal of difficulty in getting the volume where we want it, but know we will be able to do so. Some of our problems have been the time elements as between factory for parts and between tests.

We were ready again this year for any rescue for lost hunters but were only alerted twice. We have added canteens to the rescue kits making them more applicable to use.

The budget for 1966 is purposed to take care of cost for power, telephone lines, and repairs for the warning systems, surplus program and administration control. I will need the continued support of everyone. This year many will be asked to do jobs that will be vital to our operations for emergency, as I have to update our present units and refresh present personnel as to their duties and possible added responsibilities.

Wrote 25 news releases for use in the local media and four news letters to our members. Wrote one article for N. H. Profiles on "Industrial Conway" and helped prepare other articles for use outside of the region.

Supported the 4-H awards program to encourage the role of agriculture and awarded Mrs. George Clement of Lisbon the "Outstanding Farm Wife of the year."

Have sent a weekly bulletin of lodging inquiries to member innkeepers who subscribed for them and a monthly real estate bulletin to the member real estate dealers.

Sent out a packet of ski area and lodging folders in response to inquiries on skiing.

Presently we are revising our White Mountains Map which lists nearly 200 points of interest in our region, which was designed to keep the tourists with us a little longer. Information booth people tell us it is very popular with tourists. The new edition will be printed this winter.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northumberland qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Groveton High School Auditorium in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, March 8, 1966, to act upon the subjects hereinafter mentioned. The polls will be open at said place and date from 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon until 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the reception of your ballots under the Australian Ballot Laws; furthermore, you are hereby warned that on the said date and place, at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon, the matters of appropriations and such other business properly coming before said meeting will be taken up for your consideration and action.

Article 1.\* To choose by ballot the following Town officers for the ensuing year: a Town Clerk, a Town Treasurer, and two Auditors.

Article 2.\* To choose by ballot the following Town officers for the ensuing three years: one Selectman, one Library Trustee, and one Trustee of the Trust Funds.

Article 3. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town officers as required by law.

Article 4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the following Town charges for the enusing year: (1) Town officers' salaries; (2) Town officers' expenses; (3) office furniture and equipment; (4) election and registration; (5) Municipal Court; (6) Town Hall and other Town buildings; (7) Police Department; (8) fire, including forest fire; (9) blister rust and care of trees; (10) planning and zoning; (11) insurance; (12) Civil Defense; (13) Health Department; (14) vital statistics; (15) sewer maintenance; (16) dump maintenance; (17) Northumberland rubbish collection; (18) highways and bridges (a) summer maintenance, (b) winter maintenance; (19) Town road aid; (20) street lighting; (21) parks and playgrounds; (22) general expenses of Highway Department; (23) Public Library; (24) Old Age Assistance; (25) Town poor; (26) Memorial Day; (27) band concerts; (28) Youth Center; (29) swimming pool; (30) water maintenance; (31) cemeteries; (32) damage and legal expenses; (33) advertising and regional associations; (34) retirement and Social Security; (35) interest; (36) long-term notes.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2500) for the Beatrice D. Weeks Memorial Hospital.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) to pave the parking area across from the High School commencing at the end of the sidewalk on the South and paving to the property line of Thomas Morris on the North, said area to be paved being approximately 24 feet by 355 feet.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift the lot of land adjacent to the new Post Office building, being the remainder of the former Union Hotel property, so-called, from the Groveton Chamber of Commerce, said land to be used as a Town parking lot.

Article 8. (If the vote on Article 7 is in the affirmative.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) for excavation, paving and lighting a parking lot to be acquired pursuant to Article 7 above.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) for street lighting (six lights) on the so-called Daffodil Road and Brown Road from the corner of said Daffodil Road at U.S. Route 3 to the cemetery and down Brown Road toward Vic Young's. (Inserted on petition of 13 voters.)

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500) to prepare (grade, drain, and seed) the triangular area situated between U.S. Route 3, the covered bridge path, and the Ammonoosuc River for the purpose of developing said triangular area as a site for an Information Booth, and in connection therewith to authorize the Selectmen to make whatever agreements are reasonably necessary with the Chamber of Commerce and Groveton Papers Company in order that this site may be so developed. (Inserted on petition of 10 voters.)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey by appropriate deed to Roland Stevens any and all right that the Town may have in and to land heretofore used for highway purposes which is now situated northeasterly of the right-of-way line of the present U.S. Route 3 as said present U.S. Route 3 now abutts property of Roland Stevens situated on the road to Stratford. (Inserted on petition of 10 voters.)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to establish an Aeronautical Fund in accordance with Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 423:6, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$3,680) and pay such sum into said Fund, and, further, to authorize the Selectmen, in accordance with Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 423:8, to transfer said sum from the Aeronautical Fund to the New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission, said sum to be expended by said New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission on the Whitefield Regional Airport, so-called, in connection with the expansion of said Airport facilities.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11,000) for the purchase of a 1963 H-30 Hough Payloader equipped with 1¼ yard Wain Roy backhoe and V plow.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to pay to the engineers on duty at Groveton Papers Company the amount of 10 cents per hour for 24 hours per day and seven days each week for their services in attending the police phone, fire phone, and Civil Defense alarm for the Town, and to raise and appropriate such sum of money as is necessary to meet this expenditure. (Inserted on petition of 34 voters.) Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6000) and authorize the Selectmen to purchase with such sum seven acres of land, more or less, adjoining the present town cemetery from A. A. Potter upon such terms and conditions as may be satisfactory to said Selectmen.

Article 16. (If the vote on Article 15 is in the affirmative.) To see if the town will vote to establish a Cemetery Commission to sell lots and make rules and regulations governing the Town cemetery, said Commission to consist of one member from the Board of Selectmen, one member from the Trustees of the Trust Funds, and a third member to be selected by the other two members. This Commission to serve without pay and to hold office from year to year. (Inserted on petition of 21 voters.)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application to any Federal Agency for any grants or other assistance which now or hereafter may become available to aid in defraying the cost of planning regarding the Town's water supply.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to establish a scale of discounts for the prepayment of real estate and personal property taxes as follows: 3% if paid on or before June 1, 1966; 2% if paid on or before August 1, 1966; and 1% if paid on or before October 1, 1966.

Article 19. (If the vote on Article 18 is in the affirmative.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-five Hundred Dollars (\$6500), which is the estimated amount that will be allowed in discounts in 1966, in order to balance the Town budget.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town of Northumberland a gift of lands from the Groveton Papers Company, and/or others for the purpose of providing a site for the construction of sewerage and sewage treatment facilities.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file on behalf of the Town an application (in

form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with P. L. 560, 83rd Congress), and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in the amount of \$383,000.00 to be made by the United States to the Town of Northumberland to aid in defraying the cost of final plan preparation for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Town of Northumberland, and further, to see if the Town will make necessary arrangements to provide such additional funds as may be required to defray the cost of preparation of the plans.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make applications on behalf of the Town of Northumberland, for any grants or other assistance (under P. L. 89-136 or any other Act) which now or hereafter may be available to aid in defraying the cost of constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities, from the United States of America, and to furnish such information and take such other action as may be necessary to complete said applications.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to incur debts in anticipation of taxes of the financial year such debts are incurred, in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses, and to issue notes therefor in accordance with the provisions of RSA 33:7.

Article 24. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relative thereto. Article 25. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before said meeting.

### **BRIEF COMMENTS-TOWN WARRANT ARTICLES**

### Article 4. (Operating Budget)

You will note that the operating costs for this year are \$2048.17 higher than the year 1965. This is due mainly to the increases recommended for sewer and water maintenance.

### Article 6. (Parking Area)

This will be a definite improvement to the pool, playground, school area. By installing a catch basin for drainage and paving the area, a badly needed parking space can be had at a minimum cost.

### Articles 7. & 8. (Parking Lot)

Acceptance of these articles will do much towards eliminating the congestion near the post office and at the intersections of State, Church and Rich Streets.

1. This will provide off street parking for both the post office and library.

- 2. Parking will not be permitted in front of the post office, thereby eliminating the necessity of backing out onto Church Street.
- 3. There is a right-of-way behind the post office. This means the lot would be entered from Church Street and exit onto Rich Street.

### Article 13. (Hough Loader)

This piece of equipment is in very good condition and is priced right (\$11,000). This machine equipped, including bucket, backhoe, cab, heater & defroster, directional lights, V plow and wing, counter weight and chains cost \$23,000.00 new.

From 1963 thru 1965, the Town paid out \$12,000 for loader hire. This figure will probably double in the next year or two if new houses are built in town as expected. This machine would be very valuable to the Town during construction of sewage disposal facilities.

### Article 14. (Telephone Answering Service)

This will cost the tax payers of Groveton \$876 per year, to start, for the privilege of having its fire & police phones answered.

### Articles 18. & 19. (Discount for Prepayment of Taxes)

I feel that this practice should be discontinued. Very few people pay their taxes in time to take advantage of the discounts. Out of the \$6,500.00 allowed in 1965, \$5,-050.00 was allowed the Groveton Papers Company. This leaves only \$1,450.00 spread over the balance of the Town. In other words, it's beneficial to a few but an extra burden to the majority of the Town's tax payers.

### **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

This year, our third year of operation, we have made many inroads pertaining to our academic and physical plant needs. This has, also, been a year of investigation and soul searching regarding the new proposed governmental programs. The Board and the Superintendent have spent many hours in going over all programs and with the advent of a Citizens Advisory Committee have many suggestions for our next year's program. We want to assuage you, the people of Groveton, that your prerogatives plus the Board's control will be kept foremost in the minds of this office regarding implementation of any governmental programs for the ensuing years. The controls of these programs and monies allocated for same must be in the hands of our local constituent Boards.

I would like to digress, if I may, and first take up the Elementary School System. We have been very fortunate in acquiring the services of a most dynamic, interested, and thoroughly capable and personable principal for the Elementary School, Mr. Adreani, as evidenced in the followup and inventive programs that we have implemented this year.

We have introduced a new Science Series, Grades 5 and 6, under the direction of Mrs. Boswell. We are bringing into the classroom new concepts with more student involvement regarding demonstrations and experiments.

In our Reading, the basic phonic approach has been extended to Grade 2. We intend to use the phonic approach to reading for Grade 3 next year. We have had a complete testing program using S.R.A. tests and have expanded the Reading program to achieve the necessary changes as indicated by these tests. We have now a co-basal Reading system through the Third Grade. We are correlated between Grades 1 to 6 and are correlated for the High School English program.

In Arithmetic, we are using the S.R.A. system Grades 1 and 2 which is the Cleveland Modern Math, or S.M.S.G. program. We would like to assuage the parents who are not familiar with the new Modern Math that the traditional Math approach has not been completely obliterated, but we are using both according to the individual's abilities and aptitudes.

In French, we are again happy to reiterate it is being offered in the 5th and 6th Grade and it is being given to students whom we feel can cope with the subject and who will in turn benefit by this enrichment program. The students whom we felt were not ready for Language will be scheduled for remedial programs and subjects more conducive to their needs.

We have enhanced our audio-visual program and enriched our Science, Literature, and Social Studies areas by the use of professionally made tapes to stimulate the students' interest in these areas. We are using a series "Our New Hampshire" which is beamed on Channel 8 which in turn is relayed from Education Channel 11 U.N.H. Our two 4th Grades view this TV Educational Program each week. It dovetails with our existing 4th Grade Social Studies curriculum. With the acquisition of a 60 millimeter projection machine, this has opened up the avenues of sound movies in the areas of Social Studies, Science, English and Mathematics.

Our present ratio is six reference books to each student. To meet American Library Association standards, we should have ten to one. However, in the next two or three years we hope to reach this lofty goal. The library has acquired research materials in the form of encyclopedias, reference books and filmstrips. These all add enrichment to each individual program. We would like to thank the many parents who so graciously volunteered to assist us in the workings of the library.

We have had the good fortune of receiving the services of Mr. Robertson, an expert from the Rinehart Handwriting System and we feel that everyone is now receiving like instruction regarding handwriting.

The Remedial Reading Program will start off February 1, with monies acquired from Title I of the Education Act of 1965. We feel we have been most fortunate in having Mrs. Dorothy Taylor to head up this program. No one could be more eminently qualified to take over this program than Mrs. Taylor and with her drive and enthusiasm we feel we will have one of the better programs in Remedial Reading.

After school, a study center has been inaugurated from 3:00 to 3:34 P.M. to allow the students in Grades 5 and 6 to use the library facilities Monday through Thursday. This, again, is assisted by volunteer parents. A new 70 page reference index has been completed and accolades go to Mrs. Micucci, Mrs. Theresa Gonyer and Mrs. Rita Burt.

With the cooperation and conscientious efforts of Mr. Merle Hawksley and Mr. Ralph Hersom, we have again an outstanding looking school. Their attention to details, sanding of floors, painting of classrooms, etc. make the building one to be proud of. New bulletin boards have been included in Grades 1 and 2, three new tables added to the library, and metal bookshelves in the library. We have added two new clocks, one in Mrs. McCowan's Room and one in the Teachers' Room. We have installed a three phase wiring system for the Elementary School boiler to cut down on maintenance and the usual trouble that has occurred every year with our present boiler motors.

Our faculty members and administration have been very active not only in conducting Workshops for the North Country schools, but have attended Workshops in Nashua and Boston.

We have inaugurated a new Steering Committee for the Elementary Grades headed up by Mrs. Dorothy Taylor, Mrs. Florence Currier, and Mr. Thomas Monohan. Some of their areas of responsibility are:

- (1) Report card evaluation
- (2) Curriculum needs
- (3) Various displays in the local store windows

We would like to take this opportunity to thank Rev. Lucien Dupont who has so graciously condescended to allow us the use of his very fine facility, the St. Francis Xavier Hall. Without this facility, we could not have carried on our present Physical Education Program for Grades 3-6 who convene there every Thursday and Friday afternoon.

### Guidance

With the advent of Mr. Nay's services, we feel that we have been able to put the Groveton Guidance Program into high gear. He has come to us from Brewster Academy where he has had some eight year's experience in Guidance in that institution and it is very evident that this has given us the depth and experience that were needed.

Weekly meetings have been held by members of the 7th Grade to help orientate new students coming into our High School. Individual conferences have been and are being scheduled for members of the 11th and 12th Grades relative to their post secondary plans. Also, individual conferences have been established for those students not achieving any satisfactory levels in their classrooms. Also, students have been counseled who are passing but could do a great deal better.

Mr. Nay has given unselfishly of his time in working with and helping organize the White Mountain Community Services Mental Health Clinic. He has been instrumental in getting these services for our students who need professional opinions and have emotional and educational maladjustments.

It has been our feeling that a review of our present Testing Program was needed. With this in mind, Mr. Nay has gone over the Aptitude and Achievement Tests offered in Grades 7, 8, 9, 10, and 11. It is not enough for us to give test results to the students and parents, but the real meat of the situation lies in the sympathetic and understanding counseling of the Guidance Department regarding what can be done to improve the academic conditions that are evidenced by low scores. This, Mr. Nay has done and is doing. We are encouraging the parents of these students to take an active interest and to assist us in their children's academic and social progress.

The High School has gotten its final face lifting as is easily evidenced by the new paneling and painting that was done this summer. This could never have been accomplished without the outstanding interest and abilities that are evidenced by our head custodian in the High School, Mr. Dollard LaRoche, who again has outdone himself in these areas. Accolades, also, go to John Connolly who is responsible for the building of new bookcases and shelving down at the Elementary School and the paneling in the High School and for the extremely fine way in which he has set up the new Mechanical Drawing Room and the storage of projects, tools, and supplies.

Groveton was singularly honored this year with receiving the number one Achievement Award from the New Hampshire Council for Better Schools for its orientation Guidance Project which received statewide notoriety. This program not only is used and shown to PTA groups, but to prospective students coming into our school from six grades in Vermont and Stark. In addition, this will be shown to prospective Colleges and Universities that might be accepting our graduates so that they may have a better perspective of Groveton, what we are, what we are trying to do, type of students, etc. Last year we received the First Honorable Mention Award for "Operation Bootstrap" at which time we specified our five and three year plan regarding curriculum development, building improvements and repairs. We are well along with our building repair program and replacement of equipment.

We would like to encourage and solicit the cooperation of our town citizenry to come in and visit the schools for only with your help and assistance can we adequately provide the necessary stimuli and physical plant that is needed to educate our young Americans for if you, the citizens of Groveton, understand what we are doing, you will understand why this is necessary.
