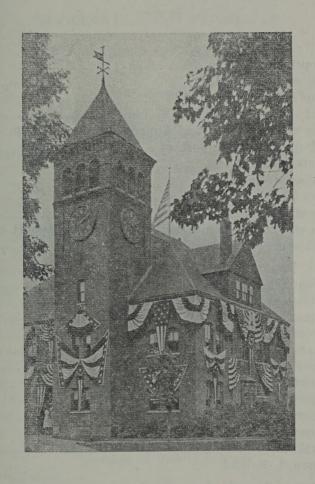

#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the county of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. for the purchase and installation of an oil burner for the small furnace in the Town Hall.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote for the appointment of five citizens for a permanent committee to work with the selectmen for further investigation of a Town Water System. These five citizens to be appointed by the moderator.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of having the town assessed by the State Tax Commission.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30. for the installation and maintenance of one street light on Elm Street near overpass.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30. for the installation and maintenance of one street light on Standwood Avenue.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30. for the installation and maintenance of one street light on Danville Road near Holy Angel's Church.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$90. for the installation and maintenance of 3 street lights on the Newton Road, from Brandy Brow toward the Newton Line.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$120. for the installation and maintenance of 4 street lights on the Kelly Road. (By petition)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30. for the installation and maintenance of one street light on Congregational Lane.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000. for exploration, drilling and testing wells in anticipation of a future water supply system for the Town of Plaistow, N. H. (By petition)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of improving the grounds of the Veteran's Memorial Park. (By petition)

Article 14 To see what action the Town will take regarding the formation of a Citizens Advisory Committee. (By petition)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept and adopt the provisions of the subdivision of Chapter 441, of the Revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire relative to curfew regulations.

Article 16. To see what action the Town will take on a petition of George Thurlo and others, relative to a new (not repaired) bridge on Kelly Road, Plaistow, N. H., crossing Kelly Road, between Daniels and Seel homesteads.

Article 17. Shall the provisions of chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town? (To be acted upon by ballot)

Article 18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the following Trust Funds:

Daniel and Mary Sylvester Fund \$200.00 E. F. Shannon Fund \$100.00 Ralph E. Knights Fund \$200.00 Lalumiere Fund \$300.00 Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following amendments to the Building Zone Ordinances.

Amend Article II Section 1 by adding the words, "Or additions made thereto" and "Or addition", so that

said Section will read:

"No buildings or structure shall be erected, or additions made thereto, and no existing structure shall be altered to an extent affecting more than 30% of the total area, without the approval of the Town Building Inspector, to whom adequate plans of the proposed building, alteration or addition shall be submitted. A fee of not more than two (2.00) dollars shall accompany each application submitted."

#### ADDITION TO ARTICLE II

Section 6

No permit shall be issued without a Public Hearing, due notice of which shall be given, for the erection of a building or structure, altering or moving any existing building or structure for commercial purposes, which changes the landscape or otherwise affects the abutters

Nothing in the section shall affect or change in any way existing provisions as contained in Section 3 of

Article II.

Amend Article II Section II Paragraph C by striking out the word "Homosote" and adding cinder or cement blocks so that said paragraph will read, "Outside walls shall be constructed of wood or fire resistant shingles, siding, clapboards, brick, stucco, cinder or cement blocks."

Amend Article II Section II Paragraph D by striking out the words, "Constructed of", and inserting in place thereof the words, "covered with" so that the paragraph will read:

"Roofs shall be covered with wood or fire resistant shingles, metal or fire resisting composition."

Amend Article II Section II Paragraph E by striking out the figure "400" and inserting in place thereof the figure of "500" so that the paragraph will read: "Every dwelling shall have a minimum ground floor area of "500" Sq. Ft. for each family unit."

Amend Article III Paragraph B by adding the words "and lined with tile" so that the paragraph will read:

"Chimneys shall be constructed of stone or brick, cement or cinder blocks, to the ground and lined with tile; all entrances shall be of fireproof construction."

Amend Article III Paragraph C by striking out the words "constructed of" and "Homosote" inserting in place thereof the words "covered with" and add the words cement or cinder blocks so that the paragraph will read:

"Outside walls shall be covered with wood or fire resistant shingles, siding, clapboards, brick, stucco.

logs, log siding, cement or cinder blocks."

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to pass the tollowing ordinance relative to the use of "House Trailers or Trailer Homes" in the Town of Paistow Viz:

It shall be unlawful to park an occupied Trailer Home or House Trailer within the limits of the Town of Plaistow without first obtaining a permit from the Board of Selectmen so to do.

No permit to park an occupied Trailer Home of House Trailer, shall be issued for more than a ninety (90) day period.

The fee for such permit shall be five (5.00) dollars payable to the town of Plaistow.

Nothing in this ordinance shall affect existing occupied Trailer Homes or House Trailers except that such Trailer Homes or House Trailers now established and occupied shall not be moved to a new or different location in said Town of Plaistow without a permit so to do. This ordinance shall become effective on its passage.

Article 21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of tax collections.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted, the reports of Agents, Auditors and other officers and Committees heretofore appointed.

provement of the interior of the Fire House by all voluntary labor and hope to have the work completed by April first.

I would like to thank the citizens of Plaistow for having been extremely careful during our very dry summer season and keeping our fire calls at a minimum.

# **PLAISTOW 200th ANNIVERSARY** CELEBRATION

It will probably be a long time before Plaistow will have an event that will be anymore of a success than the 200th Anniversary Celebration of the town on July 2-3-4, 1949.

It was a thrill to most of us to see the thousands of people who came here to be with us and enjoy the weekend. "Home Coming Day" "Go to Church Day" and "Celebration Day" each with its own special program. A Children's Parade, Sporting events, Entertainment, Dancing, Church Services, two Band Concerts, a mammoth Bonfire, Speakers and Music, topped off by a marvelous display of fireworks. Not often can one enjoy such a varied and entertaining program without cost to themselves.

Our expenses were heavy, but the sale of Souvenir Programs, and the cooperation of our advertisers, refreshments and raffle tickets together with the \$1,000.00 appropriated by the Town took care of most of the expenses of the three days including police, cleaning the streets afterwards and clearing up after the bonfire, leaving an unexpended balance of \$2.19 to turn back to the Town.

In making our plans we wished to divide the responsibility as much as possible. Therefore, we made a diagram of the committees we thought would be necessary and using a check list allotted the different ones in such a manner as in our best judgment would make a congenial, interested and good working committee. We endeavored to have a representative from each family on some committee. Of course, this could not work out 100% but we believe that a committee of three hundred people could never be chosen who would work together and cooperate in a more splendid and efficient manner and thereby accomplish more satisfactory results than did these different committees.

While the results of some committees were almost unbelievable, no one committee can be singled out as having actually accomplished more than another, as every committee worked to its utmost capacity and produced all or more than was expected of it. Many thanks are due them for the thousands of hours spent in planning, preparing and officiating at the different events. Many thanks are also due those who, while not assigned to any special committee, gave hours of their time and much labor toward making a success of the Celebration.

The unprecedented cooperation of nearly every citizen in Town, the general feeling of friendship that prevailed and the spirit of friendly memories that greeted you on all sides, made this weekend one long to be remembered happily.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Board of Education and Citizens of Plaistow:

I hereby submit my third annual report. This report will include supplementary staff reports from the Supervisor of Music Instruction, the Supervisor of Art Instruction, and the Director of Health Services. This report will cover statistical information concerning the school year beginning July 1, 1948 and ending June 30, 1949, with additional information concerning the statistics for the schools from July 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949.

#### I. GENERAL INFORMATION

The school enrollment reached a total of 253 pupils registered for 1948-49. During the present school year our total enrollment shows 267 pupils registered with an additional 83 in the surrounding high schools.

Our present teaching staff remains intact with one exception. Mr. Arthur Enman was appointed principal and teacher to fill the position left vacant by the resignation of Mrs. Anne McAllister who accepted a position in the Concord New Hampshire Public School System.

Mr. Enman, a Veteran of World War II, comes to us well qualified with experience in the Epping Schools. He was graduated from the University of New Hampshire with a Bachelor of Science Degree and has done graduate work at the University for credit toward a Master's Degree in Education.

#### A. The Good Citizenship Medal:

This award is made annually by the Sons of the American Revolution to that student who, in the opinion of his teachers and fellow students has best exemplified the principles of good citizenship.

#### II. CURRICULUM

The general aims of education for all children, youth and adults, give direction to the development of the school curriculum. It follows then, that all school activities and specific objectives should be closely related to the general aims of education. An educational program thus con-

ceived provides opportunity for continuous guidance throughout life.

Education should help people control their physical and social environment, and adjust themselves to it by providing opportunities for:

(1) Discovering, developing to the greatest possible extent and utilizing for personal and social benefit the unique abilities and talents of all persons.

(2) Making minds and bodies function as effi-

ciently as possible.

(3) Participating in the activities of community groups which contribute to the general welfare.

(4) Living wholesomely and fully day by day so that there will be established important habits of emotional health which will help in later life to choose and live with a mate and rear children, and to earn and acquire materials necessary for needs and comforts.

A. Program of Studies

The Curriculum implemented by our teaching force and community continues to strive for the above mentioned ends. Our graduates are performing well in the secondary schools they chose to attend. The adjustment to the departmentalized secondary school is difficult at best. To make this transition less abrupt have departmentalized our work in the seventh and eighth grades to a small degree whereby the pupils come in contact with different teachers at certain periods during the day.

B. Audio-Visual Education

This important field in education continues to expand and the use of films, records, radio and other visual material has become an integral part of our program.

C. Testing Program

We are beginning to feel the results of our testing program in aiding our children in areas of difficulty. A permanent record of each child has been instituted so that a complete educational, social and mental history is kept on file during his tenture at the Pollard School.

D. Arts and Crafts, and Vocational Subjects
Progress has been made in this area, and under the
direction of Mr. Enman our Manual Arts program
gives practical experience in home carpentry and
the use of fundamental tools.

### E. Art and Music

Our fine music program continues. Much progress can be seen in the development of skills and appreciations through the medium of Art. This program has been closely correlated with the work of the classroom and activities of the school.

#### III. TEACHERS AND INCREASED CLASS LOADS

Plaistow is exceedingly fortunate to have such a strong force of experienced teachers who daily are directing and aiding pupils to develop their individual capacities.

Enrollments have increased, and along with these increases the generally accepted concept as to teacher load has decreased. I believe it has been established beyond reasonable doubt that the amount of time available for individual help by the teacher decreases as the number of pupils under her charge increases.

The increase in our enrollment in the Pollard School presents a problem where many pupils who need additional help, fail to receive it due to our large teacher load,

especially in the primary grades.

From 1921 to 1939 this problem was met in part by the employment of nine teachers instead of the present eight, using a school house at Westville to house grades 1-4 in that area.

The following will give a comparative view of this

picture:

#### IV. SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

The excellent school and community relations continue and I am sure produces better educational and Community opportunity for our youth. The boy or girl is indeed fortunate to be reared in a community which is characterized by this teamwork.

#### A. Parent Teacher Association

This organization continues to contribute its efforts and resources to the end that Plaistow schools serve its

youth well. The Parent Teacher Association sponsored a Dental Clinic whereby a Dental Trailer and Hygienist examined and gave "Flourine Treatment" to the large majority of the pupils in the Pollard School. The hot Lunch and Summer Recreational Programs have continued along with close teamwork among the teacher, parent and child.

Plaistow Public Library

Few school committees show a closer coordination between the public library program and the school program. The Plaistow library program has made itself a part of the regular school curriculm to the end that desirable reading tastes are being developed to the fullest.

#### The Lions Club

This new organization has shown its interest in the activities of the young people of Plaistow in that they have sponsored an essay contest in the School on the topic of what Plaistow needs most for the school people in the way of recreation. They contributed the money for the procurement of the School Safety Figurines in use in the front of the Pollard School.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS AND CONCLUSIONS

In my opinion you, the citizens of Plaistow, are to be congratulated on the material way in which you have supported your school in the past. This section is presented for your consideration and in no way should it be implied that these recommendations are musts, but are problems on which you the public must decide for yourselves. I realize that some will be long in their realization, and some may never reach completion.

#### Teacher Status

We are still below the state average in the payment of teachers' salaries. Replacements during this period of teacher shortage would be difficult. I feel, therefore, that some raises are indicated.

If enrollments continue, and census figures indicate increases, an additional teacher would relieve the already heavy teacher load in the primary grades.

## Text Books and Scholars' Supplies

I recommend that the policy of gradual replacement of text books, supplies, and equipment be continued so that in no one year unusual expenditures in this area will be necessary.

C. Maintenance and Repair

The Pollard School at present is in an excellent condition of maintenance, following the program recommended by the School Board and Educational Survey Committee. It is hoped that the large sum of money expended to complete the program will be insured by thoughtful and careful upkeep.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC SERVICES

To Mr. L. Munro Grandy, Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my annual report as Supervisor of Music in the Pollard School.

Music education in our schools during the past year has developed a genuine enthusiasm and love for music through vocal and appreciation courses.

The children learn to sing many attractive and worthwhile songs before any music reading is taught. During the latter part of the first year staff notation is introduced; from this grade through the eighth the pupils progress step by step easily and effectively. Recognition of musical instruments is taught by sight and sound with the help of records and picture charts. This work begins in grade one where the children learn the violin, trumpet, and piano. Each year new instruments are introduced, and at the end of the eighth year the entire symphony orchestra is completed.

A singing group, the "Pollard Treble Clef Choir," was organized in October. There are seventeen voices in the choir, which is a well balanced three-part singing group. The pupils are from grades four through seven. The Choristers appeared for the first time at the Christmas Assembly held in the Town Hall on December 19. I am being ably assisted in this project by Mrs. Louise Jackson who rehearses with the pupils once a week after school.

In closing I wish to express my thanks to you and the teachers for the hearty cooperation extended me through-

out the year.

In cooperation with the graduating classes trip to "Pops" they were able to see the very famous glass flowers at the Harvard Museum and, also, tour the Boston Public Library.

At a P. T. A. meeting in March an exhibition was held in the Pollard School. It represented the work of the children of that school. At that meeting I had the opportunity to address the group of adults on ceramics. A film was also shown on the same subject.

Placemats, nut cups, and favors are being made for the Junior Red Cross in Haverhill, Massachusetts for the various holidays, and sent to the many hospitals.

The Art Department sponsored the traffic signs located at the Pollard School.

The State Dental Trailer under the direction of Dr. S. Dwyer and Miss Elisabeth O'Brien, Dental Hygienist, came to the Pollard School, March 28 through April 22.

The Parent Teachers Association sponsored this Dental clinic. 181 pupils had their teeth cleaned and four applications of Sodium Flourine were applied as a pre-

ventive measure against tooth decay.

Parents are asked to co-operate in carrying out these helpful health suggestions offered by the State dental clinic. "A child should start going to the dentist as soon as twenty baby teeth are through the gums and should make regular, frequent visits to the dentist every year especially through adolescence. Early treatment for dental defects before the damage to the tooth is extensive takes less time, hurts less, and costs less to correct."

On May 16, Miss Constance Martin, R. N. staff worker of the Tuberculosis Association, assisted in giving the Tuberculin Test (Vollmer) to twenty pupils, one of whom reacted positive. A chest X-Ray was taken which showed a healed tuberculosis infection.

The tests, which are financed by the sale of Christmas Seals in New Hampshire, are for the purpose of screening those children who have come in contact with the disease. Positive reaction does not mean that the person has active tuberculosis, but that he or she has come in contact with the disease, and the body has set up a defense against it.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, members of the school board, the teaching staff, and parents, who, by their kindly assistance and co-operation, helped to make the year a success.
