## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

---

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Music Hall in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the support of the Free Public Library.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the maintenance and construction of highways.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the oiling of streets.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for state aid construction of highways.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for Memorial Day.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for cemeteries.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for defraying the expenses of the district nurse.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the aid of the Emily Balch Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hospital.



11. To see if the town will vote to ratify and approve any action taken at the special town meeting held December 19, 1933.
12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell and convey any land acquired by the town from Edward O. Sanborn and Anthony B. Chase in the year 1931, occasioned by the construction of Federal Aid project No. 228 F in said Plymouth and to ratify and confirm any conveyance heretofore made by the selectmen of the Town of Plymouth, to Patrick Drouin and Nellie Drouin and/or Henry W. Welch.
13. To choose a Library Trustee for a term of three years.
14. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money to pay the debts of the town and give notes therefore, countersigned by the town treasurer.
16. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on the early payment of taxes.
17. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be sold locally.
18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## MEDICAL EXAMINER'S REPORT

---

20 Highland, St., Plymouth, N. H.

To the School Board of Plymouth:

Another year of work among the school children has passed and here is my report for the season of 1933.

I have examined and looked after 685 pupils, there were only 10 absent at the time of my examination. I will not specify each school separately, but will say that in all of the schools I found the following defects:

Underweight 12.

Defective vision 100. This is a large number but not all of them need glasses but quite a large percent do, and I think we may get some help from the state for some that need them the most.

Defective hearing 28.

Anemia 8.

Nervous conditions 2.

Cardiac (heart) 13.

Pulmonary (lung) 3.

Skin 24. A few of them of the contagious type.

Deformity 4.

Teeth 53. A large number need treatment, and as with the eyes we may get aid from the state.

Pediculosis 4.

Tonsils 36. Several of these need tonsillotomy but all should have surgical or medical treatment.

Breathing 3.

Adenoids 8.

Glands 35.

Defects reported to parents 187. Pupils receiving treatment 10. Corrected in the past year 61. There remain at the present time unvaccinated 22. Of that number 10 have been excused by the Board of Health.

In reviewing the past twelve years since medical inspection was adopted by the district we find a very large improvement in the physical condition from schools which certainly is an aid to mental development.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board:

I submit the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

### Statistics

School year 1932-1933. Total enrollment, 764; 394 boys; 370 girls. Rural schools, 138, Model School 261; High School, 365. Non-resident pupils, 203; Plymouth resident pupils, 561. Average membership 712; per cent of attendance 95; pupils promoted, 672; not promoted, 26. Visits by the superintendent, 1051, by citizens, 583, by members of the school board, 22.

School year 1933-1934 to February 1934. Total enrollment, 761; rural schools, 137; Model school, 276; High School, 348. Unrepeated registration, 753 381 boys, 372 girls; non-residents, 176; Plymouth residents, 577.

Our rural school population remains nearly constant; high school membership is less than last year;

the Model School has made a slight gain in number of pupils; resident pupils have increased. Boys still outnumber the girls.

### **Health Service**

In his report Dr. Chase gives a brief account of medical inspection. His examination was done conscientiously and thoroughly. Mrs. Chase assisted him. The services of both have been invaluable. They have responded to emergency calls from the schools. Through their efforts much remedial work has been accomplished, and one little girl is now at Pembroke making a happy recovery from tuberculosis.

The local Red Cross Chapter, the Community Chest, private donors, and the teachers have supplied food, clothing, and equipment to many children, and have met expenses for medical treatment. State and federal funds are furnishing daily milk for children most in need of it. Substantial progress is improving health conditions is being made, though much remains to be done.

### **The Rural Schools**

Last June ten pupils were graduated from the eighth grades of the rural schools. Nine entered high school where six are still attending. One dropped out from lack of interest, and two because of illness. Our graduates have shown their ability to do high school work satisfactory. Next June eleven more will probably receive their diplomas.

Fortunately there has been no change in the teaching staff of the rural schools. Our teachers are doing highly satisfactory service. Their schoolrooms are places of homelike living and of real accomplishment.

I recommend that at least two more rural schools be equipped with chemical toilets.

### **The High School**

I am pleased to attest the high quality of teaching and management of our high school. Five of our eleven teachers worked last summer toward advanced degrees in well known universities. The staff is of

the same personnel as last year and is a highly professional body constantly growing in teaching power. Our teachers are notably successful in reaching individual pupils through classroom teaching and a program of guidance. Athletics and other extra-class activities are being so administered as to contribute to growth in qualities of character and citizenship. The headmaster and the teachers have cooperated loyally and professionally in all supervisory activities. A total of 79 visits were made to the high school by the superintendent during the school year 1932-1933.

One need is apparent. Some arrangement should be made to assure adequate instruction in chorus singing in Plymouth High School. This important activity should no longer be neglected.

You are referred to the report of headmaster for further details.

### **The Model School**

Last June thirty-four pupils were graduated from the Junior High School. Twenty-nine of these young people are now in Plymouth High School while three more are attending elsewhere. Their records show them adequately prepared for High School. This year twenty-nine pupils are in the eighth grade.

Since the five year contract with the State Normal School expires next June certain advantages of the relationship between the Normal School and the Model School should be clear.

1. A separate kindergarten under a specially trained teacher is being maintained at a time when all too many communities are dropping this type of school because of the depression. The State has borne the expense of remodeling and equipping a beautiful new kindergarten schoolroom in the building just opposite the Model School.

2. The Normal School provides a schoolroom for the third grade in the Normal School building known as Livermore Hall.

3. Drawing, music, household arts, and manual arts are being taught under the supervision of competent instructors from the Normal School faculty. The gymnasium is used for physical education.



4. The achievement of model school pupils is satisfactory. They are receiving many wholesome opportunities and their welfare is safeguarded.

5. The Normal School is liberal in supplying textbooks and equipment.

6. A teaching staff of superior qualifications is maintained in the Model School. The critic teachers are graduates of four year college curriculums; many of them are seeking advanced degrees through summer school study.

The prestige of our community is vitally linked with the Normal School which has served us excellently through many years. I earnestly recommend a renewal of the contract on terms satisfactory to both the town and the state.

### **Supervision**

Our school system is one from kindergarten through high school. The activities of supervision are centered in helping the children to real achievement, growth in character and citizenship, and happy living. Tests, visits, conferences, and teachers' meetings are employed in directing the work of the schools. The superintendent teaches elementary education three times a week in the Normal School and supervises student teaching in the Model School. Parents have been helpful but more contacts with them would be welcome. Cooperation of all factors is essential for the success of our schools.

### **Summary of Recommendations**

1. Salaries sufficient to hold our teachers.
2. Provision for instruction in chorus singing in the high school.
3. A new sidewalk connecting High St., and School St., running in front of the Model and High School buildings. (This is a much traveled thoroughfare but is at present both a disgrace and a menace. The appropriate local agency should vote this improvement.)
4. New chemical toilets in two more of our rural schoolhouses.

5. Renewal of the contract with the Normal School.

I wish to express my gratitude to pupils, teachers, and parents, for their excellent spirit of cooperation. I thank you, members of the school board, for your helpful kindness.

## HEADMASTER'S REPORT

---

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit, herewith my fifth annual report as the Headmaster of the Plymouth High School.

### Class of 1933

The graduating class of 1933 was the largest that ever graduated from the school. It consisted of 57 members, but due to the conditions of the times with a shortage of money and work, a smaller number than usual entered post-secondary institutions. However, 17 of the number are distributed as follows:

Plymouth Normal	7
Concord Business College	2
Hesser Business College	1
Northampton Business College	1
Schools for Hairdressing	2
Post Graduates	4

One member of the class of 1932, who studied at Plymouth High School last year, entered the New Hampshire University last fall. The Headmaster receives the reports twice a year of those attending the different institutions. He makes a careful study of the same and in case of failure or poor work, writes or has conferences with the students. It is the aim of this school to send the boys and girls to these institutions that they may be on equal footing with those going from other high schools.

## Enrollment

The enrollment has been 348 pupils so far this year. This is a slight decrease from last year, due, first, to the large graduating class of last June; second, to the smaller entering class; and, third, to the moving of several families from this immediate locality. One interesting thing about the enrollment is that there are 174 boys and 174 girls. The average attendance for the last scholastic year was good but it will be much lower this year, due to the very severe winter. The tardiness record will not be as good as last year due to the weather conditions.

## School Activities

The annual Prize Speaking Contest was held on March 24, 1933, with nine contestants, five girls and four boys. They were coached by Miss Effie L. Muchmore and Miss Ruth L. Frye, of the English Department. The prizes were awarded as follows: First Girls' Prize, Helen Moors '35; Second Girls' Prize, Agatha O'Brien; First Boys' Prize, Herbert Person '36; Second Boys' Prize, Floyd Colby.

Mrs. Harl Pease has continued her work with the school orchestra this year. Most of the players were members last year so that great progress has been made in its development.

The Girls' Club has not only carried out its regular program but has added this year a systematic study of girl problems. The members have met in the School Auditorium, where they have been presented with outlines and engaged in a thorough discussion of the topics.

School parties have been held once a month, school news has been sent to the Plymouth Record, and assemblies have been held, at which pupils have taken part under the supervision of the teachers. Several outside speakers have also appeared before the school.

## Athletics

The Football team, while not as successful in victories as the other teams, was enjoyed by a large squad. The members were earnest workers, clean players and learned many valuable lessons of good

sportsmanship. This was showed by the great improvement in their playing at the close of the season.

The Baseball team had a successful season last spring. It won the championship of the Pemigewasset League.

The Basketball teams are both having a very successful season. The Girls' team is leading the league with no games lost, while the Boys' team has lost only one.

This year, a team of four boys went to New Hampton to take part in a Winter Sports Meet. They made a very good showing for the first time.

To my mind, the thing that has made the athletics in the school a success, is not the victories gained but the fact that so large a number of pupils have taken part in these activities. During the basketball season, Mr. Dawson, the coach, has had four teams of girls and the same number of teams of boys which means that Mr. Dawson has worked hard and long to give as many as possible an opportunity to participate.

### **Plymouth High School**

The aim of the school is to furnish an education to all who enter its doors. Its courses are arranged and the instruction is adapted to fulfill the needs and the abilities of the pupils. It can, if the pupils are willing to do their part by good hard conscientious work, certify them into colleges which admit by certificate and prepare them to take the examination to those which do not. It can prepare them to take a place in a business office. It also can furnish an opportunity to acquire qualities that will enable them to live with their fellow men. It realizes that the most intelligent pupil does not always make the highest marks in school, nor the pupil with the highest marks the most intelligent child. Industry, good health, regular attendance, and other school conditions are important factors in school success.

## Conclusion

I wish to thank you Superintendent Speare, the members of our School Board, the citizens of Plymouth and surrounding towns, and my very excellent staff of teachers for the wonderful support that has been given me during the past year.
