

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Raymond in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at I.O.O.F. Hall in said Raymond on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what action the town will take relative to the playing of Beano in the Town of Raymond.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town maintenance including snow.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Dudley-Tucker Library.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums for State Highways as recommended by the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways.

- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for tarring.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining the dump.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cleaning Main Street.
- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Parks and Playgrounds.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction any property acquired by Tax Collector deeds.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.
- 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the continuance of the Raymond Recreational Program.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for construction and repairing the Sidewalk on Epping Street from the common to School Street.
- 19. To see what action the town will take on installing new water holes for fire protection, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 20. To see what action the town will take on raising the salaries of the selectmen and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 21. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000.00 toward payment of debt.
- Adams Grader now being used by the Town at a cost not to exceed Eighty-five Hundred Dollars (\$8500.00) and to pay for the same by withdrawing and using Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) from the new equipment fund and by borrowing the sum of Forty-five Hundred Dollars (\$4500.00), and to issue and sell in connection with such borrowing notes of the Town of Raymond in the principal sum of Forty-five Hundred Dollars (\$4500.00) in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act as Amended, maturing during a three year period, principal payable in equal annual installments of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00) each year, the first installment to be payable one year from date of said notes, to be sold for not less than par, the time and place of payment of

principal and interest, the fixing of the rate of interest, and all matters in connection therewith to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen.

- 23. To see what action the town will take on constructing a building on the old town hall foundation for housing the highway equipment, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 24. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$15,500.00) for the purchase of a new motor pumper, and to authorize the issue and sale of bonds or notes of the Town therefor under and pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act.
- 25. To see if the town will vote on Article 24 pertaining to the purchase of the new pumper, by secret ballot: i. e.

YES — To purchase a new pumper. NO — Not to purchase a new pumper.

- 26. On petition of Robert E. Eccleston and ten others to see if the town will vote to dispose of the present Maxim Pumper within 30 days from date of delivery of the new fire pumper, by public auction, duly advertised, two weeks in advance of the sale; and the sale to be held at one o'clock P. M. on a Saturday and sold to the highest bidder with the proceeds from the sale to be applied to the cost of the new pumper.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift from the Raymond Fire Department, the Fire Station Building situated on Epping Street.
- 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4000.00) to make the necessary additions and alterations to the present fire station.
- 29. On petition of Fred Andrews and 34 others: To see if the town will raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money to fill in Harriman Road between Fred Andrew's driveway and Nell Sias' house so that it will be passable throughout the year.
- 30. On petition of Audley W. Browne and 16 others: To see if the town will raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to fix (tar or oil) the Ham Road.
- 31. On petition of George McMullen and 38 others: To see what action the town will take to continue tarring Batchelder Road to George McMullen's, and raise and appropriate money for same.

- 32. On petition of Robert E. Eccleston and 10 others: To see if the voters will instruct the selectmen, with the assistance of the Police, Fire and Highway Departments, to pass an ordinance regulating street parking from the corner of Fremont Street and Orchard Street at Dr. Fernald's office, through Main Street to Pecker Bridge and from the intersections of Main Street and Epping Street on both sides of the common through to Smart's Bridge, and pass any and all regulations relative there-to, with special attention given to winter parking and parking so as to endanger the movement of traffic and danger to pedestrians.
- 33. On petition of Robert E. Eccleston and 11 others: To see if the town will vote to accept the Christmas street lighting equipment and an unexpended balance of the donations collected of \$75.00 as a gift.
- 34. On petition of Robert E. Eccleston and 11 others: To see if the town will vote to use this gift, if accepted, of \$75.00, and raise and appropriate \$75.00 additional to erect a permanent Christmas tree on the common under the supervision of the board of selectmen.
- 35. On petition of Robert E. Eccleston and 11 others: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 yearly to defray the expense of erecting and maintaining the Christmas street lighting equipment and the Christmas tree on the common; if accepted, at the Christmas season under the supervision of the board of selectmen, any unexpended balance shall be deducted from the next year's appropriation.
- 36. On petition of Herman Wallace and 24 others: To see what action the town will take on extending the water main and facilities to the North side of Harriman Hill Road for approximately one quarter of a mile, for the use of homes and businesses located thereon, and for their protection in the event of fire, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 37. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 toward construction of a Marine Memorial statue at Hampton Beach.
- 38. To see if the town will vote to borrow a sum not exceeding \$14,000.00 for the extension of water mains on Epping Street a distance of approximately 2000 feet, and to issue and sell in connection with such borrowing notes of the Town of Raymond in the principal amount not exceeding \$14,000.00; such notes to be issued pursuant to Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws of 1942 as

amended, payable from funds to be raised by taxation, to bear interests at a rate not exceeding 5%, payable semi-annually, principal payable in equal annual installments of \$2,000.00 per year, the first payment being due one year from date of said notes, and all other matters in connection with said notes to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen.

39. To see if the town will vote to borrow a sum not exceeding \$8,000.00 for the purchase and installation of Water Meters, and to issue and sell in connection with such borrowing, notes of the Town of Raymond in the principal amount not exceeding \$8,000.00; such notes to be issued pursuant to Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws of 1942 as amended, payable from funds to be raised by taxation, to bear interest at a rate not exceeding 5%, payable semi-annually, principal payable in equal annual installments of \$1,000.00 per year, the first payment being due one year from date of said notes, and all other matters in connection with said notes to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY AGENT

To the Citizens, Town of Raymond:

This past year we had the misfortune of a fire in which we lost considerable equipment. We lost the grader, plow for crawler tractor, 50 gallon drum of oil, three drums grease, part of the culvert thawer, hydraulic hoses, and a few other smaller articles. This to replace amounts to quite a lot. We already had to replace quite a bit.

We did hire a grader until Town Meeting. The rental will be applied to the purchase price, if it is bought. So far we have not had to use it much. It does seem to be in good shape, and we still may have a chance to try it out more before Town Meeting.

We are also looking for a place to house the equipment.

I hope the people of Raymond will agree to purchase the grader on Town Meeting, as we do need it badly. Our tar roads this spring are badly heaved and cracked. The grader (when we tar this summer) can help smooth them out.

We haven't had as much plowing as usual but we have had to salt a great deal more. This has cost considerable. So far this year we have used about 36 tons of salt, compared to about 15 last year.

I appreciate the cooperation the citizens have given me this past year.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

To the Citizens of Raymond:

The School Board, in making this report to the town, wishes to call attention to the services rendered the School District by Mr. John Littlefield, Custodian of the school property for twenty-six years.

Mr. Littlefield became Custodian of School District property on July 1, 1929, and served under former Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Harmon, and our present Superintendent, Mr. Watson. During Mr. Littlefield's term of employment the following Headmasters were connected with the school system: Mr. Bagley, Mr. Young, Mr. White, Mr. Smith, Mr. Mirey and Mr. Callaghan.

When Mr. Littlefield began his employment with the school the building had eight rooms, with two hundred pupils in attendance. The shop building was built by Mr. Littlefield with the help of pupils in 1930. The addition to the main building, which includes the cafeteria, was built in 1931. The Auditorium was built in 1938-1939 and the latest four-room addition was built in 1948.

Mr. Littlefield's contribution to Raymond's educational program will be long remembered. His ability to repair and maintain equipment has saved the taxpayers of Raymond a considerable sum of money over a long period of years.

Mr. Littlefield takes with him into retirement the memories which come from association with the youth of Raymond for a quarter of a century.

The School Board extends to Mr. Littlefield, and we know the townspeople of Raymond, present and past pupils, former School Board members, teachers and officials, also extend to him, many happy years of retirement and sincere thanks for a job well done.

As mentioned in last year's report, our Home Economics room has been remodeled and work space provided by the installation of two sinks, counters and cupboards. It is now equipped to meet the requirements of the class, as well as qualifying for continued federal aid.

The Chemistry laboratory has been improved by the addition of a slate work bench, equipped with gas, electrical and water outlets, so that eight students may work at one time. Some additional work needs to be done, such as new lights, refinishing of the walls and painting, which the Board plans to complete this next year.

The septic tank, which serves the hot lunch kitchen, failed at the start of school in September. Investigation showed the old metal tank to be badly disintegrated and no longer functioning. A new tank was constructed of cement blocks and the dry well cleaned, so there should be adequate waste disposal for some years.

The Board wishes to express its sincere appreciation to Superintendent Watson, Headmaster Callaghan, teachers and citizens of the town for their interest and cooperation. Only through this close cooperation may we offer the best in education to future citizens.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1956

To the Members of the School Board of Raymond, New Hampshire:

May I present my ninth annual report of the schools of Raymond and at the same time thank those who have been understanding and desirous of improving and expanding the educational opportunities of the children of the town.

There have been changes in the personnel of the teaching staff since the last report. Of the fifteen teachers on the staff, seven returned — Mr. Callaghan, Mr. Hixon, Mrs. Cloutier, Mrs. Leonard, Mrs. Vining, Mrs. Clements, and Mrs. Houghton. To complete the faculty, eight were added — Mr. Chase in Science and Mathematics; Miss Remp in Home Economics; Mr. Wheeler and Mrs. Lord in Grades 7 and 8; and Mr. Muggleston, Miss Cronin, Mrs. Sullivan, and Mrs. Thomes in the elementary and primary grades.

It might be interesting to note that during the past five years there has been nearly a 50% turnover in the school each year. Of the 69 teachers contracted during the last five years, there have been 33 replacements (47%). May I point out that this fact alone would have a far-reaching educational bearing on the children of the town. And although the salary problem is probably the prime factor, other forces have contributed to such a situation including the teacher shortage.

Teacher Shortage

You may not realize it, but there are only 110 elementary teachers graduating from all the colleges in the state in June 1956 with a total of 256 teachers in both the elementary and secondary levels, and unless the town of Raymond can meet the rising cost of education for the next school year in teachers' salaries as well as other costs, more than 50% of your teachers will have to be replaced again. We are facing our greatest teacher shortage in the history of education in America. The only bright spot in the whole problem is that the school population will remain about the same for the next year in Raymond or until a great influx of new families with children. If this immigration does occur — and it could within the next two to three years — then we shall not

only need more teachers, but more building space, more transportation, more books and supplies, more everything.

Statistics

According to the latest figures released from the Office of Education in Washington, there will be 23% more elementary children in the country in 10 years than today or up 6.6 millions; 55% more high school children in 10 years than today or up to 4.2 million; 40% more college students in ten years than today up 1.1 million. If we project these figures and apply them to the Raymond schools we may expect 58 more children in the elementary schools or about 308 more children in ten years as compared with 250 today; and about 59 more children in the high school or 175 children in ten years as compared to 106 today. In terms of teachers, building space, and per pupil costs based on present day prices this increased school population will increase the Raymond School Budget nearly \$25,000 by 1965 or a budget of close to \$110,-000 by that time. And to make this picture more realistic, we know that present prices will be greater in 1965 than today which means that the budget will be increased considerably more than \$25,000.

We can assume, however, that when the above situation does happen the income will be greater including state aid, federal aid, and tuition receipts although income never seems to keep pace with expenditures as evidenced by the per pupil costs during the past five years.

Further data from Washington leads us to belive that more and more children will be seeking a higher education as shown by the statistical lifetime earnings of the educated person. For example — the average elementary school graduate in a lifetime will earn \$116,000; the average high school graduate in a lifetime will earn \$165,000; and the average college graduate in a lifetime will earn \$268,000. A college education costs on the average of \$9000 — compare the costs with the returns.

The Real Problem

The time is not too far distant when not only the public elementary and secondary schools will get government aid, but also the colleges. The land grant and other state colleges are now receiving aid and appropriations from state legislatures; why not all the colleges and other educational institutions? This is only another step in the direction of more and more education for more and more people.

The foregoing has been chiefly to place before the people of Raymond what, in my opinion, are the main objectives for the taxpayer to consider in the town. However, these problems will be solved in stride if we can face and solve the real problem in education today — the problem of aiding the public to understand the nature and magnitude of the educational challenges we face today.

We are unrealistic and lack an adequate understanding of the size of our educational tasks. People who believe that the problem can be solved at the local or state level are, generally, people who think that our present system of education is adequate in a very rapidly changing atomic ago. You are facing conditions in our schools in our towns for the next few years where budgets will be expanded out of all proportions to the taxable valuations of property and many communities will be unable to cope with our building, teacher, and other educational problems.

Why have we come to our present situation? First of all, perhaps, is the fact that it is the great American effort to educate everybody and to continue the education for as many people as possible even to the higher levels of learning. Those who believe that education for all is education for none seize upon our occasional failures, blow them to large proportions, and then use them to frighten and put doubts in the minds of the people with regard to the whole American system of education. The fact of the matter is that America has done what no other country in the world has ever done before and done a great job.

Progressive Education

A second problem is the problem which presents the argument over progressive education. Modern education has made an attempt to apply the method of science to the problems of educational practices. "Narrow-minded, highly specialized, but educationally ignorant individuals have distorted what modern education is attempting to do." All this is confusing to the public.

A third factor cannot be overlooked. It is within the profession itself. No one can become a doctor without studying anatomy and learning a great deal about the physiology of the human organism. But a person can become a university teacher merely by studying mathematics and English literature although he may know nothing about the people he is to teach and very little

about the teaching process. Nevertheless as the owner of a Ph.D. degree he feels qualified to speak as an expert on education.

Finally, the education profession must share a considerable part of the blame for the public's lack of understanding. Probably the greatest single drawback to getting the educational program we need is the fact that not only the public, but a large proportion of the teaching profession believes that our present education is adequate for the needs of the atomic age. We as professional educators cannot escape the responsibility for having let the public oversimplify and underestimate its educational problems.

Atomic Age and Education

Let us look back for a moment to the end of World War II. When this war closed we could reflect upon two discoveries which were willed to us from the war period and the preceding decades. The first was the power of the atom. The second is the power of education. Hiroshima and Nagasaki showed us the power of the atom. Mussolini, Hitler, and Stalin demonstrated the power of education.

Our program in America has been all out for the power of the atom; no expense held too great, no uncertainty, no hesitation, no bottleneck.

In education the last ten years have been the most hesitant of the last century. There is no national program; it has suffered devastating attacks, it has been torn by conflicts over philosophy, program, and the responsibility of financial support.

While we moved full speed forward on the means of destruction, we hardly held our own in education which is the only means we have of so changing human beings that the weapons of self-destruction will not be used.

We need to understand and have understood the great need of education today before we can get the necessary means for making it realistic. Money and time is being spent year after year in our inability to cope with the problems of peace, of the corruption of government, and of the delinquency of our youth. We need a new education — one which is magnificent in design and dynamic in action. This, too, will cost money, a great deal of money. We must so educate the youth of the country to help us solve this all-important problem. It cannot be done through retrenchment or just "holding the line".

It is your problem and mine and it must be solved by you and me.

May I express my thanks for permission to place before you at least one or two phases of the educational problem in the hope that it will find life and understanding for a better education for the children and citizens of Raymond.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent and School Board:

We were informed by a recent directive from the State Department of Education that the Spring Institute will be concerned with the development of statement of educational policy at the local level. This raises questions like, Why are they needed? Who should develop them? What might they cover?

We shall attempt to answer these questions collectively. Our system of schools was founded to perpetuate the American way of life. This way of life has changed and the new demands being placed on the schools are ever increasing and much more complex. In addition to passing on the heritage of our way of life, we must meet the demands of preparing people to live in an atomic age; and we are asked to share the responsibilities of the Church and home in teaching moral, ethical and spiritual values; and finally, we are asked to provide educational leadership in the community.

So, as you can see, as the role of the school becomes more important, the need for a clearly defined educational policy (statement of objectives) cannot be overemphasized.

ADMINISTRATION

We feel that we are at present offering an improved curriculum in that we have an improved teaching staff. The teacher is basic to a sound program of education.

The elementary school provides the basic foundations of a good education with its carefully planned, continuous, integrated program of studies.

Special emphasis is given to reading and the three R's at the primary level.

These studies are intensified on the intermediate level, and the curriculum is broadened to include the social studies, science and the fine arts.

We have instituted a new report card on each of the above levels, which we feel will give you a clearer picture of your youngster's progress through the elementary school. However, we invite your observations and criticisms on these cards, in order that we may do the best possible job of reporting.

For the first time in the history of the school each and every youngster has been given a physical examination by the school doctor, and of this, we are extremely proud.

We are happy to report that approximately forty youngsters at the primary level have received their second Salk Polio vaccination.

We feel that the free dental clinic provided by the Parent-Teachers Association is worthy of commendation by all.

The transition from the self - contained elementary school classroom to the departmentalized system of the senior high school has been made easier through operating the seventh and eighth grades on a semi-departmentalized basis, using two teachers. We feel that instruction is improved and important opportunities for guidance are better capitalized on in this situation.

In the high school, we feel that our holding power would be increased with provision for a shop course of some kind. We submit for your consideration the fact that all youth should be held in school through the completion of the high school course.

At the high school level we have expanded our offerings in the social studies field to include: Youth Problems and Civics for freshmen; Problems of Democracy

for seniors (combines Economics, Sociology and Political Science); and Consumer Economics for juniors and seniors.

With additional facilities in Home Economics, we are able to teach cooking and sewing in the same all-purpose room at the same time. A new gas range was purchased with money earned by the youngsters at Deerfield Fair.

We have started to equip a new chemistry and physics laboratory which should be completed this year.

We have also developed a new permanent record folder, in order that we may better follow your youngster's progress from the time he enters, until the time he leaves school.

May we suggest the following improvements: new lighting in the old part of the building and improved facilities for our growing hot lunch program (dishwasher, freezer, mixer).

SUPERVISION

This area includes everything we do to improve the teaching-learning situation.

We are pretty generally agreed that the large number of pupils in school today requires that they be taught by group instructional procedures. This provides a flexibility in organization that allows the child to move from one group to another during the school year, making for greater teacher efficiency.

We feel that we are getting excellent results in the elementary school, since the adoption of a basic reading series and the aforementioned grouping practices.

We have started to build a library of professional materials for the teaching staff. Thus far we have been able to procure about a dozen books. It is hoped that we can enlarge on this, in order that we may be better able to keep the staff abreast of the times, in current thought, in the field of education.

The monthly teachers' meeting is being used as a professional meeting of in-service training for your teachers, in areas of their own choosing. Areas dealt with thus far include: Tests and Measurements, Audio-Visual Teaching Aids, and the Improvement of Reading.

We have augmented the guidance program in the junior and senior high school with a battery of tests administered by the testing service of the University of New Hampshire.

With an improved program of office practice, and through the cooperation of Mrs. Georgianna Leonard, our Commercial teacher, teachers throughout the school have been provided with a secretarial service that has greatly multiplied the variety of teaching materials available.

Mrs. Leonard has also conducted an adult education class in typing, that has proved to be very popular and most worthwhile.

ACTIVITIES

We consider the so-called extra-curricular activities an important part of your youngster's education. Just as we strive for perfection in the classroom, so do we strive for the same perfection in these activities, and so do we use these activities to teach important lessons in living. We are especially proud of our athletic teams of the past season, and their Coach Wilbur Hixon, who brought honor and glory to the town of Raymond in the form of State Championships in Basketball and Baseball. May we take this opportunity to thank the Mother's C'ub for sponsoring a never-to-be forgotten testimonial. Thank you, so much.

We are justifiably proud of the group of youngsters comprising the Dramatic Club, and their directress, Mrs. Claudia Cloutier, for their splendid performance at the State Drama Festival at the University of New Hampshire, last spring. Raymond was well represented.

We have been very much pleased with the youngsters who have represented us at the Model United Nations Assembly, at Plymouth Teacher's College; and at Boy's State and Girl's State, at the University of New Hampshire. We are deeply grateful to the sponsoring organizations: The Women's Civic Club, The Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary, The Pilgrim Men's Club, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

We are also deeply appreciative of the financial gifts of Mr. Joseph Regis and Mr. Harold Berk which made it possible for us to build a hard surface court on the playground and to purchase a new backdrop for the stage.

May I also take this opportunity to express my gratitude to our hard working staff: to Mrs. Thomes, Mrs. Houghton, Mrs. Clements, Mrs. Sullivan, Mrs. Vining, Miss Cronin, Mr. Muggleston, Mrs. Lord, Mr. Wheeler, Mr. Hixon, Mrs. Cloutier, Miss Remp, Mr. Chase, Mrs. Leonard, Miss Cronin (School Nurse), Mrs. Fox, Mrs. Welch, and Mr. Edwards, thank you, sincerely.

And last, but by no means least, may I thank you, my fellow townspeople, for your continued cooperation and support.
