# SALISBURY TOWN POUND EST. 1794



In 1794, land was purchased by the Town of Salisbury from Ensign Moses Garland for \$200—"to build a sufficient pound on a hill; that said pound be built with good and sufficient posts and rails."

Ensign Garland was the first pound keeper, tending the cattle and other livestock that were kept there until overdue taxes were paid by their owners. If the taxes were not paid in a customary amount of time, the animals could be sold in an auction. The pound also housed stray livestock until claimed.

In the early 1800s the pound went into decay and a stone pound was erected in 1819 on the same site, now known as the corner of Whittemore and Center Roads.

In 1997, the site could still be seen—just barely. Meaghan Walsh decided to make the cleanup of the badly overgrown pound a personal endeavor. After requesting permission from the owner of the property, she enlisted the aid of her family and a friend to begin the slow process of cutting the underbrush, and the raking and bagging of years of accumulated leaves and trash.

Daffodils were planted along its borders as well as in its interior. Meaghan has worked to maintain the pound since, and still has more yet to do. A sign was recently donated and erected on the site by Salisbury Forge/John DeGrassie. The pound has been photographed and will be included in a forthcoming book of historic town pounds in New England.

# WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

# THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 1:00 PM TO THE CLOSE OF BUSINESS MEETING ABSENTEE BALLOTS WILL BE PROCESSED AND CAST AT 3:00 PM BUSINESS MEETING AT 7:30 PM

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury, in the County of Merrimack, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Salisbury on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, 1999 at one o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects by ballot. Polls will close for balloting no earlier than the close of the Business Meeting.

1. To choose the following Town Officers: Selectman, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent, Library Trustee, Trustee of the Trust Funds, (3) Planning Board, Cemetery Trustee, (3) Budget Committee, and (5) Recreation Committee members.

And to act upon the following subjects at the Business Meeting at 7:30 PM:

- 2. To hear the reports of the Officers of the town, agents, auditors and committees appointed and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote pursuant to RSA 231:22-a to reclassify sixteen hundred feet (1600') of Buckhorn Road, beginning at the west end of Scribner Road and ending at a point two hundred feet (200') west of so called Tuttle Road, from its current status as a class VI road to a class V road; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) for the purpose of bringing the road up to Town road standards. The effective date of the reclassification of the road shall be determined by the Selectmen when the road upgrade or appropriate portions thereof are completed. (By petition.) (The Selectmen and Budget Committee do not recommend this appropriation.)
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000) to be added to the Police Emergency Services Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, established in 1994. (The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.)
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) to be added to the Reassessment of the Town Capital Reserve Fund, established in 1986. (The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.)

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Town Buildings and Grounds Capital Reserve Fund, established in 1972 and renamed in 1992. (The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.)
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) to be added to the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund established in 1971. (The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the E-911/Tax Map Capital Reserve Fund established in 1993. (The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.)
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) to be added to the Town Land Acquisition Capital Reserve Fund established in 1996. (The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.)
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) to be added to the Rescue Emergency Services Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, established in 1994. (Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw Fifty Nine Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$59,400) from the Road Maintenance Capital Reserve Fund, and to appropriate said sum for maintenance of and repairs of the Flood Control Basin roads and bridges. (The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.)
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Hensmith Road Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of paving Hensmith Road and straightening the "S" curve and related work thereto; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) to be placed into this Capital Reserve Fund. (By petition) (The Selectmen and Budget Committee do not recommend this appropriation.)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$559,275. which represents the operating budget. This sum does not include the amounts appropriated in special or individual warrant articles in this warrant.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote pursuant to RSA 231:79-: 81 to designate Little Hill Road, for its entire length, an existing class V highway, as a summer road only, to be maintained and kept open only from April 10 to December 10 of each year.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 80:80, to authorize the Selectmen to convey real estate tax liens or property acquired in default of redemption of tax liens, by sealed bid, public auction or in such manner as justice may require. This authority shall continue indefinitely until rescinded by future action of the Town Meeting.
- 16. Polling hours in the Town of Salisbury are now 8:00 AM to 7:00 PM. Shall we place a question on the state election ballot to change polling hours so that polls shall open at 11 AM and close at 7 PM for all regular state elections, beginning in November 2000.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Town property with a value under Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000).
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Your Board of Selectmen have worked diligently throughout the year on projects ranging from bridge replacement and road work, to removal of underground oil storage tanks, and architectural/engineering studies of three town buildings. Our regular and special meetings have taken place in the office, and in the field - trying to obtain the best information - first hand - to make the best decisions. It has been important to the Board to listen to our residents and provide them the opportunity to express their opinions and offer suggestions for improvement of our Town.

As stated in last year's report, our projects this year include the following: the North Road Bridge has been replaced; the two underground oil storage tanks (one at the Town Hall and the other at the Fire Station) have been removed - both without any contamination; architectural/engineering studies of the Town Hall, Library and Fire Station have been completed and we will have the final reports available by Town Meeting; and selective roadside cutting and general road improvements to the Warner Road.

In addition to these large projects, the Board has been involved with several issues concerning zoning and unpermitted uses of residential areas. It is important that EVERY resident be responsible to become familiar with the zoning regulations and permitted uses of your property; if you have any questions, please call the Administrative Assistant, the Board of Selectmen, or attend a meeting. The process the Board is forced to administer for non-compliance issues can be uncomfortable, time-consuming and costly but the Board will take necessary action to uphold the regulations our residents have adopted.

The Board is extremely proud of its many devoted committee members and town officials. We would like to bring particular attention to our Road Agent, William MacDuffie, Sr.. Bill has held the office of Road Agent since 1993. The past year has probably been his most difficult, beginning with the Ice Storm in January to the completion of improvements to Warner Road and winter storms ending in December. Bill met all the challenges and went about his work in his usual manner - always striving to keep the Town's best interest in mind. He spent many hours with FEMA representatives to obtain Federal and State money to recoup some of the expenses our Town incurred as a result of the ice storm; he walked up and down Warner Road numerous times, explaining to landowners the Town's objectives for improvements. Bill's advice and suggestions are always sought by the Selectmen - his experience has been invaluable in our search for wells, septic systems, boundaries, culverts, signs, road usage by loggers and others, not to mention his regular duties of plowing, sanding, grading, sweeping, ditching, etc. His job is often thankless, but we take this opportunity to publicly acknowledge Bill's dedication to keeping our roads as safe as possible with the money allocated in the budget. His work is often 'washed away' by the summer rains, speeding vehicles and winter's harsh snow and ice storms, but he keeps his equipment rolling for us.

Our 1998 Citizen of the Year was Mary Phillips. Although Mary was reluctant to receive this honor, her many contributions to the Town certainly qualify her for this honor. Mary has been Deputy Treasurer in the town office since 1990. And as Chairman of the Town Decorating Committee, with help from so many other townspeople, she has been the motivation and organizer behind this committee and all its efforts. The Christmas decorations are beautiful, and the daffodils certainly add the color we all are looking for after our long New England winters. Thank you Mary for everything you've given to us.

Our tax rate was set in October at \$23.47, an increase of ninety three cents from last year. The school portion increased by twenty-eight cents (to 16.84), the County portion increased by five cents (to 2.20), and the Town portion increased by sixty cents (to 4.43).

The Board also faced the challenge of disposing of our metal pile at the Transfer Station. With the everchanging prices of the metal market we had a difficult decision to face concerning whether to remove the pile this year or to let it accumulate one more year. With the decision made to dispose of the pile, we were very lucky, and happy, to actually have made money on the disposal.

Areas the Selectmen hope to focus on in 1999 include:

- \* Further review and consideration of recommendations by the building architectural and engineering study.
- \* Improvements on Warner Road, especially at the Transfer Station entrance.
- \* Contracting for new town tax maps.
- \* Purchasing a new police department vehicle.
- \* Installation of a well at the Maplewood Recreation Field for use by the ballfield and the cemetery.

Please read the various department/committee reports in this Town Report; the members have spent many hours working towards our common goal - making Salisbury the best Town in New Hampshire to live and raise our families. Whether we call Tucker Pond or North Road or West Salisbury, or the Heights our home, we are still neighbors and deserve fair and equal treatment and the Board of Selectmen will continue to meet that challenge.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Salisbury Salisbury, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Salisbury as of and for the year ended December 31, 1998 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

Except as discussed in the following paragraphs, we conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

Government Accounting Standards Board Technical Bulletin 98-1, Disclosures about Year 2000 Issues, requires disclosure of certain matters regarding the year 2000 issue. The Town of Salisbury has included such disclosures in Note 5B. Because of the unprecedented nature of the year 2000 issue, its effects and the success of related remediation efforts will not be fully determinable until the year 2000 and thereafter. Accordingly, insufficient audit evidence exists to support the Town of Salisbury's disclosures with respect to the year 2000 issue made in Note 5B. Further we do not provide assurance that the Town of Salisbury is or will be year 2000 ready, that the Town of Salisbury's year 2000 remediation efforts will be successful in whole or in part, or that parties with which the Town of Salisbury does business will be year 2000 ready.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Salisbury has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, along with the effects of such adjustments, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to examine evidence regarding year 2000 disclosures, as noted above, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Salisbury, as of December 31, 1998, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Salisbury taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Salisbury. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

#### 1998 HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

January of 1998 started out with an ice storm and we had downed trees and wires and a really big mess. Spring came early with the usual mud. Then we had to clean up from the ice storm which was paid for by the State and FEMA. We will not be cleaning up brush this year.

Culverts were changed and added to on Oak Hill Road, Gerrish Road, Mill Road and West Salisbury Road and a short section was widened.

Warner Road, by Tucker Pond, had extensive tree cutting done as well as stumps and rocks removed. A lot of dirt was hauled away to create ditches. Culverts were replaced and it was shimmed with an average one inch asphalt.

Also, Warner Road, Mill Road and Little Hill Road had a lot of trees cut, all within the flood control area. This was done by the State of New Hampshire, at the Town's request. This is a very big improvement to these roads, providing much better sight distance and more room for snow.

In response to a statement made at last Town Meeting, 'that the Highway Budget keeps going up'. The roads are no different than the cars that drive on them, or anything else for that matter - the older they get the more it costs to maintain them. Most of our roads are in poor condition with a lot of cracks, ruts and rocks sticking out of them. It is time to start thinking about reclaiming some of them. It is expensive, but it is not going to get any cheaper as time goes on.

#### SALISBURY FREE LIBRARY

Our Library is being used more and more and the effects of use and crowding are starting to show. We have just begun the lengthy process of addressing our critical need for additional space, and are working with the Selectmen and the architectural firm of Sherman Greiner and Halle Ltd. of Concord. The first step is to identify the exact amount of space needed for access to our different collections of books, for storage, and for the many library functions and activities. Only then can we evolve a plan. We hope to arrive at a solution that will not only meet our spacial requirements but will also maintain the historical integrity of the building without creating a financial burden for the town.

Due to the overwhelming increase in participation in our Summer Story Time program, and because of many requests, we have instituted a "Circle Time" program for preschoolers every Thursday morning from 9:15 to 10:00. Theresa Pillsbury has led a wonderful collection of stories, songs, and activities, and we are a popular place to be on Thursday mornings. Parents and kids are welcome to join us any time.

This August the Library Trustees, in conjunction with the Old Home Day Committee, sponsored a performance by Carolyn Parrot, a well-known musician and storyteller. The performance was very well attended (almost 100 in the audience) and enjoyed by all. A special thanks to the Historical Society for sharing their building for this presentation.

New Hampshire State Library standards are changing, necessitating some additions to our hours of operation. Among other things, we will need to open our library for 22 hours each week, and two people will be required to staff the library. In an effort to minimize the effects of these requirements, we have budgeted to be open 15 hours each week this year. Our intent is to be open 18 hours each week in 2000-2001, and 22 hours each week in 2001-2002. Hopefully the State will consider this a good-faith attempt to meet their requirements.

The Friends of the Salisbury Free Library are strong and active in supporting and creating Library programs. They continue to buy "new baby" books as births occur. They fund our Summer Story Times. They have organized several successful book sales. A book discussion group has formed and meets monthly, and has been very enthusiastically attended. The Friends contributions are truly the "Cherry on Top" for our library, and we most sincerely thank you.

Every year we start to add up the many contributions of our many volunteers, in terms of books, audiotapes, videotapes, but most especially in time, and we are overwhelmed with the value of these services. Our volunteers tend to be too modest to accept personal thank yous, but we know who you are and we THANK YOU!

#### FIRE - RESCUE - FORESTRY

We end 1998 with 81 calls. The members have spent 300 to 400 hours training with the new truck, which has been a great asset to the department. Phil Tucker has become the new Captain of the Rescue Squad. Captain Rouleen Koelb has taken a year leave of absence and will be returning.

The Ladies Auxiliary has bought the department a (used) Hurst Tool (jaws of life). It was purchased from the Tilton-Northfield Fire Department, and was recently used in a serious accident.

Community CPR classes are available (at no cost to residents of Salisbury), please contact Phil Tucker at 648-2662 if you are interested in taking a class. We are sending six people to advanced ice rescue tech classes. We are also starting a heavy rescue team to improve our ability to do auto extraction, search and rescue, water and ice rescue, etc.

The department is working on a pre-plan for all the roads in town. We will be better prepared for fires and rescues.

Dennis Patten has retired from the Salisbury Fire Department this year after nearly 50 years of service to the town. He also retired as Fire Warden. Laury Clark is now Fire Warden and fire permits are required for all outside burning, unless there is two inches of snow on the ground. We would appreciate it if you would notify someone on the department if you are going to burn, (even with no permit needed) so if smoke is reported we will know what it is. There were 193 permits issued in 1998. For permits call Laury Clark at 648-2740, or Deputy Warden Walter Scott at 648-2647.

If you are 14 to 21 and would like to become an Explorer or join the department at age 18, please contact Chief Ed Bowne at 648-2553 or Peter Miner at 648-2673. We would like to thank the town for all their support and all those who made contributions and memorial contributions this year. It enables us to do so much more to service our community.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. Early in 1998 we experienced an ice storm, which caused severe damage to forests of New Hampshire. This damage created a greater potential fire hazard as well as safety hazards to many areas of the state. Your local Fire Wardens and Forest Rangers need your assistance in preventing wildfires in these hard hit areas and throughout the State. If you need assistance or information dealing with ice damaged woodlands, please call 1-800-444-8978.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

#### UNH COOPERATIVE EXTENSION

UNH Cooperative Extension provides Merrimack County residents with research-based education and practical information, enhancing their ability to make informed decisions that strengthen youth, families, and communities, sustain natural resources, forests, wildlife and agriculture, and improve the economy.

Because of our partnership with Merrimack County, the State of New Hampshire and the federal government, we go by the special name of UNH Cooperative Extension. In every Merrimack County community, this partnership is at work, increasing economic development, enhancing the environment and developing human potential.

Merrimack County residents also benefit from state-wide Extension programming. Among these many local and state efforts are monitoring water quality in our lakes and rivers, reducing the use of pesticides, parenting programs, 4-H and Youth Development programs, land use management, food safety, forest stewardship, family finances, meeting the needs of low income families, strengthening our communities, developing a strong volunteer base through our local Advisory Council, Master Gardeners, Family Focus parenting volunteers and 4-H leaders, and providing research-based information to citizens.

A major statewide Extension initiative, Strengthening New Hampshire Communities, has impacted Merrimack County. County staff have worked with many communities in a variety of ways. Community Profiles have been held in Henniker, Loudon and Pittsfield within the past two years. This community event helps community members create a vision about what they want their community to be like and then helps form action groups to work toward their goals. Follow up support is available from UNH Cooperative Extension staff. If this community process might be of interest to your community, contact the Merrimack County office for more information.

Other community efforts include after-school programs, teen assessment projects, land use management planning, wellness teams, town office visits, master gardeners, working with schools on maintenance of landscaped areas, and providing updated Extension publication notebooks to all town libraries. A family resource center and after-school project in Boscawen sees staff working with the community.

The staff in Merrimack County includes these Extension educators: Judith Bush, Debbie Cheever, Nancy Evans, Tim Fleury, Kathleen Jaworski, Debbie Luppold, John Porter, David Seavey, Marilyn Sullivan and three support staff. Educators reach approximately 1.5 out of every four families in the county.

#### VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION OF FRANKLIN

The VNA of Franklin is completing 53 years of service to the community of Franklin and its neighbors. Those years of experience have served us well in 1998 as we have maintained our focus and direction despite an ever-changing regulatory environment in home care. We have determined to take a conservative route, doing what we do well and not trying to take on programs and services which are not financially viable.

This has been a year of constantly changing mandates and regulatory schedules which began with a deadline requirement for a surety bond only to have that requirement dropped mid-year until 1999. The Balanced Budget Act certainly changed the way we operate, as we are no longer reimbursed on a fee for service basis, but on a capitated rate per patient per year based on our 1993 costs. Medicare regulations also changed regarding reimbursement for certain skilled nursing procedures. All of these changes have had a major impact on home care agencies across the country resulting in closure of more than 2000 agencies.

The challenge for the Board of Directors and the management team was to stay flexible and focused in the face of the unknown. Working cohesively we faced difficult decisions together, downsizing, changing the organizational structure, cutting all program costs and lowering the agency overhead. Through this process we are now in a strong position to respond to technological demands and new opportunities in 1999. We have upgraded our hardware and software in response to federally mandated reporting requirements as well as preparing for the year 2000.

During 1998 the VNA of Franklin provided over 1,200 homecare visits to residents of Salisbury. We have continued our blood pressure monitoring clinic at the Senior Luncheon each month as well as flu clinics annually. We are honored to have Salisbury representation on our Board of Directors by Sara Jones who has been the Chairperson as well as serving as a Hospice volunteer. We look forward to continuing to serve the residents of Salisbury as we begin our 54th year of home care.

#### SALISBURY CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Conservation Commission activity this year included monitoring of wetland permits for construction of new homes and for logging operations. We also offered advice to citizens on how to apply for permits as well as information as to when they were required and on interpreting the meaning of the rules.

Several calls were handled dealing with possible violations involving logging operation damage to Class VI roads. These issues were resolved by working with the responsible loggers. Logging, by nature, is rough on the roads. The general rule is that the loggers, when the cut is completed, are to leave the roads in a condition equal to or better than they found them.

The Commission continues to encourage citizens who want to preserve their land as woodland or fields, to consider donating land or easements of the development rights. The latter allows the owners continued use of their land as woodlands, managing timber cuts, or other agricultural uses as they wish.

The Commission, on behalf of all the citizens, once again wishes to thank all the landowners who graciously keep their land open, (not posted), allowing for their neighbor's enjoyment. Whether we are hunting, fishing, snowmobiling, bird watching, hiking, bicycling or studying nature, we respect that we are guests on other's lands. We have a beautiful town to enjoy.

We would like to praise the work of the Planning Board and cooperative landowners involved in the 1998 subdivision of 500+/- acres on Searles Hill/Bog Roads. This land was subdivided into just five large parcels. Almost two miles of beautiful bogs are now under the care of very responsible longtime Salisbury landowners.

The Conservation Commission sponsored "Walks About Town" program was cut short in 1998 due to conflicts in schedules. They will resume in 1999. About eight walks are planned. They will combine views of Salisbury's old back roads, bogs, and woods, with historic points of interest. Walks will be posted at the library and post office.

The Commission's mission is to improve, through education, training, and planning assistance, the ability of the municipalities of the region to prepare and implement municipal plans; to prepare a plan for effective and appropriate development and utilization of the resources of the region; and to assist municipalities in carrying out the regional plan.

The Commission provides a variety of planning services, including telephone consultations on planning issues; planning research; sample ordinances, regulations, and planning documents; models; data and access to data sources; grant information; review and comment on planning documents; development review; and educational programs. Membership also entitles a community to affordable master planning assistance, GIS mapping, and grant preparation. During 1998, our services in Salisbury included:

Responding to questions and concerns regarding traffic impacts of a new racetrack proposal; Staff attended a Selectmen's meeting to review the FEMA Community Assistance Visit (CAV) for submittal to the Office of State Planning.

During 1998, the Regional Planning Commission:

\* Continued to make substantial progress on ongoing activities associated with the Regional Transportation Plan. Inclusion of a project in the regional Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) is a requirement for Federal and/or State Highway assistance;

- \* Initiated a Natural Resources Planning program which includes assistance with river corridor planning and an environmental planning program focusing on identification of natural, cultural and historical resources of the community and region. As part of this effort, the Commission sponsored several workshops and conferences;
- \* Participated in the review of several proposals classified as a "development of regional impact" and provided comments on the proposals;
- \* Coordinated with FEMA and the NH Office of Emergency Management regarding the requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program;
- \* Assisted community representatives with implementing management plans for the Contoocook and Merrimack Rivers;
- \* Presented and sponsored educational programs on economic development;
- \* Distributed informational newsbriefs and announcements on current planning topics;
- \* Distributed the zoning amendment calendar to assist Towns with the amendment process;
- \* Conducted about 100 traffic counts on state and local highways;
- \* Created a new informational brochure about CNHRPC and its services; and
- \* Enhanced its Geographic Information System program to better serve the needs of member Towns.
