TOWN WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

The Polls Will Be Open From 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tuftonboro in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Town House in said Tuftonboro on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the subjects listed below. (It is anticipated that the meeting will proceed with Article 1 at that time, with the remainder of the articles adjourned until 8:00 P.M. of that day at the Tuftonboro Central School.)

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officials for the year ensuing (by official town ballot.)
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as of May 1, 1979, the practice of snowplowing private driveways. For purposes of this article, the word "driveway" is used in its customary sense, as a private way providing access to a house, garage or other building, and is not intended to include town or private roads to which such driveways have access. A number of private driveways (a relative few) are currently plowed by the Town at town expense on a low priority basis. In the interests of equity and benefit to the majority of the taxpayers, it is desired by the Selectmen and the Road Agent to apply the resources required for this activity to the maintenance of town roads during the winter season.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to require an application to, and approval by, the Selectmen and the Road Agent prior to November 1 of each year for the snowplowing of private roads. In reviewing such applications, consideration will be given to, among other factors, (1) the extent to which the road conforms to town standards, (2) the condition of the road, (3) the quality of normal maintenance, (4) the existence of obstacles to plowing, (5) adequacy of turn-around space, (6) extent of usage by year-round residents on the road and the general public, etc.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to formally and officially classify as Class VI roads all town roads currently considered as such by the State of New Hampshire and the Town of Tuftonboro. Class VI roads (unmaintained highways) consist of all existing public ways, other than those in the first five classes as defined by the State of New Hampshire, including highways discontinued as open highways, highways closed subject to gates and bars, and highways not maintained in suitable condition for travel for five years or more. Such roads in the Town include, but are not limited to, the following: Sandy Knoll Road, North Line Road, Bassett Road and Piper Road.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the publication in the Town Report every three years of a complete listing of taypayers' names, descriptions of property owned, and assessed valuations in order to eliminate the cost of this service. There would be no decrease in the information available to the taxpayers, since the recently-completed Town Map and full tax information are available to the public at the Town House during the Selectmen's office hours and at other times by appointment.

- 6. To see if the Town wishes to exempt itself, as provided by RSA 55:9-c, from the provisions of the law granting the Town Clerk authority to accept applications for additions to the checklist as provided in RSA 55:9-a and 55:9-b. This item is on the warrant by voter petition.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Sixty-two and 67/100 Dollars (\$762.67) to assist Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc. This item is on the warrant by voter petition and is approved by the Budget Committee.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Twenty-five and 52/100 Dollars (\$825.52) for town road aid as approved by the Budget Committee. The State, in turn, will contribute Five Thousand Five Hundred Three and 50/100 Dolars (\$5,503.50).
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Four Hundred Eighty-eight and 01/100 Dollars (\$10,488.01) as approved by the Budget Committee, and authorize its withdrawal from state highway subsidy (Chapter 241, Section 14 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended). This money is to be applied to maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class V highways in the Town.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount forthcoming from State additional highway subsidy (Chapter 241, Section 15 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended) and authorize its withdrawal from said fund as approved by the Budget Committee. This amount is currently estimated at Six Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety-nine and 97/100 Dollars (\$6,799.97). This money may be used only for construction and reconstruction of Class V highways in the Town.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred Four Dollars (\$1,704.00) to pay to the Lakes Region Planning Commission in order for the Town to retain its active membership in said commission and avail itself of the services offered. This item is submitted by the Budget Committee without recomendation.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) for interest charges, as approved by the Budget Committee, and authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year and issue notes therefor, said notes to be repaid from taxes.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$16,100.00) for improvements to the Town House, including but not limited to, a well, septic system, toilet facilities, and related building reconstruction, and authorize the use for this purpose of the proceeds of the sale of the lot on Little Bear Island amounting to Fifteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$15,500.00) plus interest of Five Hundred Ninetysix and 63/100 Dollars (\$596.63) earned to date of maturity (February 28, 1979) on the certificate of deposit purchased with these proceeds. This item has the approval of the Budget Committee.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) to acquire a town-owned sander for the use of the Road Agent in the sanding of town-maintained roads. This equipment would permit the sanding work to be done more thoroughly and quickly when urgently required and would serve as back-up equipment in case the Road Agent's one sander was out of operation. This item is submitted by the Budget Committee without recommendation.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$1,700.00) for the purposes of (1) creating approximately ninety (90) new burial sites on the town-owned land between the Town House cemetery and the vault, and (2) grading and landscaping the area in front of the vault for improvement in appearance. It should be noted that the costs involved will be more than offset by sales of the burial sites. This item has the approval of the Budget Committee.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to purchase and install carpeting in the library building. This item is requested by the Library Trustees for the purpose of conserving electricity used for heating and has the approval of the Budget Committee.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to acquire an electric radar unit for use of the police department in enforcing State laws and town ordinances relating to speed limits within the Town in the interests of public safety. This item has the approval of the Budget Committee.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) from the revenue sharing fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a partial setoff against long term notes in the total amount of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00). This item has the approval of the Budget Committee.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of Four Hundred Forty-six Dollars (\$446.00) of principal and interest from the Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Program Fund established under the provisions of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976 for use as a partial setoff against the budgeted appropriation for town highway maintenance. This item has the approval of the Budget Committee.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such additional sums as become necessary for winter maintenance of raods, increasing the budget item for town maintenance, winter and summer, and total budget, by such amounts. (This item is included in the warrant by the Selectmen for consideration by the Town in the event that winter maintenance funds for 1979 remaining at the time of the Town Meeting appear inadequate for the balance of the year.)
- 21. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, the sum of Two Hun-

dred Fifty-six Thousand Seventy-four Dollars (\$256,274.00) as recommended by the Budget Committee, plus such additional sums as may be required to cover the cost of additional items voted at the meeting.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 14, 1978 TUFTONBORO, NEW HAMPSHIRE

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Tuftonboro, County of Carroll, State of New Hampshire on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March, 1978, in said Town at ten of the clock in the forenoon; the meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Richard H. Lester. The motion was made by Edward R. Whitten and seconded by Elizabeth Coleman to dispense with the reading of the entire Warrant at this time. Voted. It was moved and seconded to proceed with Article 1 through Article 5 at this time, the polls to be open until 6 P.M. with the balance of the Articles adjourned until 8 P.M. at the Tuftonboro Central School.

There were 356 ballots cast, 340 regular ballots and 16 absentee ballots.

Recessed Town Meeting Tuftonboro Central School 8 P.M. March 14, 1978 The recessed town meeting was called to order at the Tuftonboro School at 8 P.M. by the Moderator, Richard H. Lester with a salute to the Flag. Prayer was offered by Wills Clinton. Before the business of the meeting Selectman Roy L. Johnson expressed thanks to Edward R. Whitten for his service to the Town as Selectman. A Rising Vote of appreciation was shown to retiring Selectman "Rus" Whitten by those present. The Moderator announced the results of balloting for Town Officers. All elected town officers were sworn in by the Moderator: Town Clerk for One Year, Mary B. Craigue; Selectman for Three Years, Robert W. Straw; Treasurer for One Year, Susan H. Ramsbotham; Collector of Taxes for One Year, Ethelwyn L. Steadman: Road Agent for One Year, Walter R. Smith: Budget Committee for Three Years, Thomas W. Hunter and Arnold Schaier; Trustee of Trust Funds for Three Years, Beverly Willard; Library Trustee for Three Years, Edith K. Clinton; Auditors for One Year, John P. Bolton and Carol Appleton; Supervisor of Check-List for Six Years, Carol A. Appleton. The Moderator for Two Years, Richard H. Lester, was sworn in by Mary B. Craigue, Town Clerk.

ARTICLE 2. Shall the non-partisan ballot system for the election of town officers be adopted by the town?

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty (\$750.00) Dollars to aid the Abenaki Tower and Trail Association, a non-profit corporation of the State of New Hampshire, in the reconstruction of Abenaki Tower. (This item on warrant by voter petition.) The motion was made by Daniel Lewis and seconded by Chester Fernald to adopt Article 6 as read. This was a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to enact town ordinances or bylaws as provided by State statutes, relating to public safety, health and welfare, which ordinances or bylaws shall continue in effect until altered or annulled by town vote or amendment, or until the next annual Town Meeting when such ordinances or bylaws shall be placed on the warrant for voter consideration. (By statute, Selectmen may not adopt ordinances appropriating funds or promulgating zoning changes.) The motion was made by John Warren to adopt Article 7 as read. Seconded by Elizabeth Coleman. Voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell lot no. 11 on Little Bear Island and the six (6) acre Edgerly lot on Union Wharf Road. If approved, such sales would be made at public auction or by advertised sealed bids, with the Selectmen authorized to determine the minimum amounts for which the properties would be sold and the terms and conditions of the sales. Net proceeds of these sales would be deposited in a separate interest-bearing account or certificate of deposit to be expended only upon approval by a Town Meeting. Thomas Hunter made the motion to adopt Article 8 as read. Seconded by Brad-

bury Hunter, Jr. Voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to require the printing of the report of the trustees of the trust funds in summary form only, rather than in full detail in the Annual Town Report. The detailed report will continue to be available for inspection at the Town House. In the year in which trusts are created, the names of donors and the value of the trust corpus would be printed in the Town Report. The motion was made by Marjorie Stickle to adopt Article 9 as read. Seconded by Jacquelyn Rollins. Voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars, plus expenses, to acquire a certain parcel of land, known as Lot No. 2, in Tuftonboro Colony, abutting the Town House property, for the purpose of possible future expansion such as access area, parking, septic system drainage, driven well, etc., and authorize the withdrawal of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. This item has the approval of the Budget Committee.

The motion was made by Wills Clinton and seconded by William Rollins to adopt Article 10 as read. The motion was made by Albert Dow, Jr. to amend the article; to strike the phrase plus expenses from this article. Amended article seconded by Bradbury Hunter, Jr. This amendment to the article was defeated by a standing vote, with an over-whelming majority voting No. Article 10 was passed by a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and apropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Five and 51/100 (\$705.51) Dolars for town road aid as approved by the Budget Committee. The State, in turn, will contribute Four Thousand Seven Hundred Three and 41/100 (\$4,703.41) Dollars.

Motion was made by Daniel Lewisand seconded by William Rollins to adopt Article 11 as read. Voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-two and 50/100 (\$10,332.50 Dollars as approved by the Budget Committee, and authorize its withdrawal from State Highway Subsidy (Chapter 241, Section 14). This money is to be applied to maintenance, construction and reconstruction of class IV and V highways in the town.

The motion was made by Marjorie Stickle and seconded by Thomas Hunter to adopt Article 12 as read. Unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount forthcoming from the State Additional Highway Subsidy (Chapter 241, Section 15) and authorize its withdrawal from said fund as approved by the Budget Committee. This amount is currently estimated at Five Thousand Twenty-one and 19/100 (\$5,921.19) Dollars. This money is to be used only for construction or reconstruction of class IV and V highways in the town.

The motion was made by Thomas Hunter to accept Article 13 as read. Seconded by Thaddeus Coleman. Unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars for interest charges and authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year and issue notes therefore, said notes to be repaid from taxes.

The motion was made by Chester Fernald to adopt Article 14 as read. Seconded by Daniel Lewis. Unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set offs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith as approved by the Budget Committee:

Bridge Maintenance \$500.00

Dock Maintenance 500.00

Office and fire department equipment 4,200.00

Special for tar \$6.000.00

*remainder of \$19,200.00 to be raised by taxation.

The motion was made by Roger Conant, Jr. to adopt Article 15 as read. Seconded by Kenneth Craigue. This passed by a unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of One Thousand Two Hundred Forty-one (\$1,241.00) Dollars, plus such other monies as may be received during 1978, from the Antirecessional Fiscal Assistance Program Fund established under the provisions of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976 for use for improvements to and expansion of police department services. This item has the approval of the Budget Committee.

The motion was made and seconded to adopt Article 16 as read. Chester Chellman made the motion to amend this article to use these funds for maintenance of town roads and highways. Seconded by Susan Ramsbotham. Voice vote in the negative and amendment thus defeated. Voice vote in the affirmative to accept this article as read.

ARTICLE 17. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same; the sum of Two Hundred Thirty-seven Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty-seven (\$237,827.00) Dollars as approved by the Budget Committee. If item No. 6 is approved, this sum will increase to Two Hundred Thirty-eight Thousand Five Hundred Seventy-seven (\$238,577.00) Dollars.

The motion was made by Daniel Lewis to accept this article as read making the appropriation of \$238,577.00, as approved by the Budget Committee. Seconded by John Warren. The motion was made by Edith Clinton to increase the library appropriation \$700.00; to increase library appropriation from \$4,500 to \$5,200. This amendment was seconded by Henry Clapp and defeated by a voice vote in the negative. The article as read was passed by a unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to ratify and approve the action of the Selectmen in expending funds during 1978 to repay notes taken in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the year 1977 and to have been repaid during 1977. The inability of the Selectmen to repay said notes during 1977 was occasioned by the failure of the State to enact its budget.

The motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by Chester Fernald to adopt Article 18 as read. Voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting. As there was no other business to come before this meeting the motion to adjourn was made by Kenneth Craigue and seconded by Thomas Hunter. Meeting adjourned at 9:40 P.M. with a rising vote in the affirmative.

There were approximately 160 persons in attendance.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

This past year we used our Highway Subsidy money on Sodam Road and Ken Dow Road (North Line Road). We put a second coat of asphalt on the Sodom Road and cut trees and put 6 inches of crushed gravel on the remaining unpaved section of the road. On the Dow Road, we removed trees and some stumps to widen the road and added a layer of bank-run gravel. In addition to normal maintenance of the Town roads, the following are some of the improvements made in 1978: purchased and spread gravel on Lang Pond Road (to complete the 1977 appropriation); installed guard posts and paved the surface over the new High Street Bridge; installed new culvert and repaired damage to Chandler Road as a result of a beaver dam; filled the low spot on Tuftonboro Neck Road near the boat shed with two loads of coldpatch.

1978 REPORT OF THE TUFTONBORO POLICE DEPARTMENT

The incidence of criminal activity and the number of serious motor vehicle accidents are lower in the Town of Tuftonboro than in the surrounding areas. I know that this department has created a very uncomfortable environment for those contemplating criminal and motor vehicle offenses.

Here are some random facts for consideration:-

Burglary—Four of the six resulted in apprehension of perpetrators. Total value of the property was less than \$1,000. Victims utilized little or no "Crime Prevention Resistance."

Traffic Accidents—One incident resulted in serious personal injury. 75% resulted in citation for serious violations.

Court Activity—65 cases presented in Wolfeboro District Court, which resulted in 65 convictions; this represents a 300% decrease in court activity from the prior year. The majority of these cases involved speed violations, drug related cases, and drunken drivers.

The deterring factors which contribute to the above statistics are:—(1) Citizen Cooperation and confidence in our police department; (2) Crime Prevention techniques and target hardening; (3) Visibility—marked cruiser, uniformed officers and aggressive partol procedures.

We apparently have an effective, economical and efficient system which utilizes the Carroll County Sheriff's Office as a 24-hour dispatch, providing a deputy sheriff or state trooper in the event one of our own officers is not available.

Our goal for the present year will be to place special emphasis on Crime Prevention as a method to keep the number of burglary and theft cases to a minimum. A more aggressive approach in the area of juvenile delinquency should show a marked reduction in the number of vandalism and criminal mischief type

incidents. The situation on our highways will be dealt with by an all-out effort to deter the speeding driver. This department's policy toward the DWI or drunken driver will include a vigorous program of apprehension, conviction and reeducation. I am confident that this is the best approach to combat motor vehicle accidents and the resulting injuries.

The Fire Chief expresses his thanks to the officers and members of the department for their professional conduct and assistance throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT FOREST FIRE CHIEF AND YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For more than 80 years, a cooperative effort between the State of New Hampshire and local forest fire authorities has created a forest fire prevention and supression program that is recognized as superior throughout the United Strates.

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community governments have worked together to prevent and combat forest fires.

Today, 249 forest fire wardens and more than 1,000 deputy wardens are appointed every three years by the State Forester to work with the members of the State Forest Fire staff in this effort. State funds are used to pay one-half the cost of forest fire supression costs incurred by local forest fire organizations, within pay rates established by the Governor and Council. State funds matched by local funds are used to purchase hand tools to supress forest fires, to train local forest fire crews and in forest fire prevention work.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from your local Forest Fire Warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or a jail term of up to one year or both.

REPORT OF THE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION OF WOLFEBORO AND VICINITY, INC. 1978

The amount of service our agency is providing continues to increase. In 1978 a total of 4,895 visits were made; 4,057 of these were nursing visits, while 838 were made by our physical therapist. This is an increase of 1,141 over the total visits made in 1977. Our contract with the Carroll County Health and Home Care Services remains in effect. A contract was signed with the Lakes Region Community Health Agency enabling us to work with them in providing Home Health Aide services in Alton.

Our immunization clinics are very well attended. Clinics are now being held on a regularly scheduled basis throughout our district. Adult Health Screening Clinics were held in cooperation with local Lions Clubs in four locations during the Fall and early winter months.

In April we moved into new office space in the Nurse's Residence across the street from Huggins Hospital. We now have adequate space for more efficient office operations.

The Agency staff presently includes a full time Nurse Administrator, four Registered Nurses, a Registered Physical Therapist, and a full time Secretary-Bookkeeper.

We gratefully acknowledge all contributions made during the past year. Your financial support is vital if we are to continue our policy of offering care to residents of our district regardless of their ability to pay. We are grateful for the support of the many individuals and organizations who assisted us with our clinics. We look forward to continuing our health care services in your homes and communities.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

This past year we have made some worthwhile gains in the operation of this phase of town responsibilities.

As many of you know the Selectmen very graciously turned over the care of all cemeteries to us as trustees.

We were very fortunate this year to have elected to the board Beverly Willard. Beverly has assumed the keeping of all records and is grasping our bookkeeping program which is now in good working order, so we know where all monies are and how spent so all town people can inquire at most any time, should they want information.

This past year there has been vast improvement on many of the major cemeteries, the gate at the entrance to Town Hall Cemetery has been scraped and painted. The Tomb has had stone front repaired, 11 signs have been painted. 3 placed in position and the 8 remaining will be installed this coming spring.

The Tomb is being reactivated and will shortly be in use. We have only to improve inside surface and 2 new racks will soon be installed. These racks will accommodate 6 bodies.

This is only a brief outline of the many things that have been accomplished this past year.

By another year we should have blended in the accounts of the Town House Cemetery Association as they are in the process of dissolving. The reason this is not in effect is due to a law procedure.

A brief resume of things to come that are being considered: the field in front of tomb at Town House Cemetery is to be properly graded, top soil added, seeded and in time this will be a sloping lawn to help endear the hallowed grounds beyond.

We are also entertaining fences here and there, repairing gates in various places, painting both wood and metal fences and much needed at Town House Cemetery a well so water will be available during the needed season.
