To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet AT THE TOWN HALL in said WAKEFIELD on Tuesday, the EIGHTH day of March, next at TEN of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2 - Shall we adopt the provision of RSA 72:70 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a wood heating energy system which exemption shall be in the amount of \$1000.00?

You are notified hereby to meet in the Town Hall in said Wakefield on Saturday, the twelfth day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 3 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,424,000. for the purpose of designing and constructing sewerage and sewerage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U. S. C.:1251 et. seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal Funds, such sums to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds and Notes, not to exceed \$634,000. under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N. H. RSA 33:1 et. seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to affect the issuance,

negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Wakefield, N.H. and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C.: 1251 et. seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto. (APPROVED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) (Discussion at 2:00 P.M. - Polls open from 3:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M.)

THE REST OF THE BUSINESS MEETING WILL RESUME AT 7:00 P.M.

ARTICLE 4 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,424,000, for the purpose of designing and constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seg.) and will qualify the Town for Federal Funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$634,000, under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. RSA 33:1, et seg. as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Wakefield, N.H., and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

The total cost of the portion of the total appropriation allocated to the Town amounting to an estimated \$291,000. is to be assessed to the residences and business establishments designated as users of the system over a period of time to be determined by the Selectmen. The

Town will assume the cost of any Town owned public buildings.

(BY PETITION) (DISAPPROVED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 5 - To see if the Town will vote to assess the cost of the Sewer Bond issue in the amount determined in Article Three, to all of the Taxpayers in the Town of Wakefield, on a 100 per cent ratio, or whatever other proportion that the Town may choose.

ARTICLE 6 - To see if the Town will vote to appropriate withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the use as set offs against budget appropriations in the amounts indicated:

For General Government \$7,000. For General Government Bldgs. 7,000. For Office Expense 20,000.

\$34,000.

(APPROVED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 7 - Are you in favor of entering into a contract with the Sanbornville Fire Precinct to furnish fire protection for the rest of the Town outside of the precinct in the amount of twelve thousand four hundred fifty dollars (\$12,450.)? (APPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 8 - Are you in favor of entering into a contract with the Union Fire Precinct to furnish fire protection for the rest of the Town outside of the precinct in the amount of nine thousand six hundred forty-three dollars (\$9,643)? (APPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 9 - To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from Additional Highway Subsidy Funds the sum of ten thousand one hundred ninety-three dollars (\$10,193.) to be spent on Bonnyman Road and Oak Hill Road. (APPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 10 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand six hundred dollars (\$8,600.) to purchase a new cruiser fully equipped for the Police Department. (APPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 11 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty-seven thousand eight hundred dollars (\$47,800.) to purchase a new truck for the Highway Department. (DISAPPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 12 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.) for radios for the Highway Department. (APPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 13 - Add to the Highway Department budget of above mentioned town of Wakefield the following item under Capital Purchases:

One four wheel drive 1 ton truck equipped with dual rear wheels, 9 ft. fisher quick-switch snow plow and 2 yard dump body with 3 yard ends. Eighteen thousand dollars. (\$18,000). (BY PETITION) (DISAPPROVED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 14 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.) for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. (BY PETITION) (DISAPPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 15 - That the Access Road in the Town of Wakefield, New Hampshire, as it runs from Governor's Road up to and past the home of Winslow Curtis, being approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ mile, be reclassified from Class VI to a Class V highway and then maintained as a Town Road. (BY PETITION)

ARTICLE 16 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000.) to install a Town fuel depot to supply fuel for the Highway Department vehicles, Police Cruisers, Ambulance, Fire Trucks, School Buses and any other Town equipment. (BY PETITION) (APPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 17 - To see if the Town will vote to place in a capital reserve fund any monies appropriated but not spent in the ambulance account (#1201), together with any excess in revenues over those monies budgeted and actually spent for the ambulance service. This article is intended to help accumulate funds for the future purchase of a new ambulance. (BY PETITION)

ARTICLE 18 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500.) to be set aside for the future purchase of a new ambulance, the purpose of this article being to spread the cost of the vehicle over several years. This is to establish a Capital Reserve Fund. (BY PETITION) (AP-PROVED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 19 - We the undersigned registered voters of Wakefield being aware of the need of fire protection in East Wakefield hereby petition the Town of Wakefield to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.) for the construction of a fire station on town owned land on Sanborn Road in East Wakefield. This \$6,000. to be added to the \$6,000, raised and appropriated at the 1982 town meeting. This fire station to be built by volunteer labor as far as it is deemed practical. (BY PETITION) (APPROVED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 20 - To see if the Town of Wakefield will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.) for the Center of Hope, Inc. (BY PETITION) (DISAPPROVED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 21 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.) to prepare for paving and to pave Brackett Road, a heavily traveled, town approved Class V highway serving some 30 registered voters of the Town and some 218 seasonal residents, from the end of the present paving to the land of Burdicks or Johnsons or as far as the funds will permit. (BY PETITION) (DISAPPROVED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 22 - We the undersigned citizens of the Town of Wakefield would like to see if the town would appropriate \$500.00 from the current tax levy. Said monies to be used for town ballfield improvements. And that the Selectmen appoint a committee of five (5) interested citizens to supervise and administrate said field. (BY PETITION) (DISAPPROVED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 23 - To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Wakefield and to the health and welfare of the people of Wakefield.

ARTICLE 24 - To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

ARTICLE 25 - To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town Bills in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 26 - To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to receive and expend, in the name of the Town, such advances, grant-in-aid or other funds for municipal purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or separate agencies and/or other sources.

ARTICLE 27 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million two hundred sixty-three thousand four hundred three dollars. (\$1,263,403.) to defray town charges as submitted by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 28 - To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

1982 REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board increased its role in this growing community in 1983 through a series of accomplishments. Most notable was the completion and adoption of the Master Plan, done with the assistance of the Planning Advisory Committee and the Lakes Region Planning Commission. The Board also developed and proposed Building and Zoning ordinances which were put through the public hearing process and considered at Town Meeting votes. The zoning ordinance was presented on two separate occasions, being defeated both times. In addition, the Board has stepped up enforcement of the various ordinances and regulations that it is empowered to enforce. This has been particularly evident in the area of Building permit regulation.

In 1983, the Board plans to present similar ordinances for consideration by the Town and to streamline enforcement procedures even further. It is a goal of the Board to begin implementation of the Master Plan recommendations such as improved subdivision regulations, sign ordinance, building code, creation of an historic district and strengthening of the Sanbornville village area. A sum of seed money has been inserted into the 1983 proposal to finance preliminary exploration and cover incidental costs in this work.

WAKEFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT Town Report - 1982

Since 1979 when this Department had its beginning, the continuing goals have been to develop and maintain professional standards. Each year progress has been carefully evaluated to determine the ongoing needs of the community. Priorities have been set and met accordingly, but not without difficulty.

It has always been my policy to openly relate the activity of the Department to the people. This honesty has gained the continuing support of the community. The following areas of concern are outlined for purposes of awareness and accountability.

ADMINISTRATION: I have established high standards for the Department. My professional background has enabled me to develop Department Policies, Rules and Procedures, to implement and maintain them diligently. The responsibility for police action is a demanding burden, costly to the Town if inappropriate. Administration must be provided in a firm, fair, positive manner, free from interference, with service to the community as the foremost priority.

A detailed record system is kept of provide accountability for time and activity of Department members, and vehicle activity.

PERSONNEL: There has been a turnover in personnel this year, some of which was necessary to maintain the high standards set by Department Policy and Procedures. Officers who have not demonstrated qualities basic to professional performance have been eliminated. Finding and stimulating good officers to dedicate themselves to serving the community is a constant challenge to this and surrounding local Departments.

DRUGS: Drugs are a National problem and our community is not immune to its existence. Curbing or

eliminating this scourge is most difficult because of the laws of search, seizure and arrest. The Department has a constant flow of information in this area, but unless this information is accompanied by a signed statement by the informant, we cannot, without legal consequences, search premises or persons and effect an arrest. The offenders are aware of the legalities and as long as citizens refuse, out of fear or intimidation, to sign the necessary statements, we have no recourse but to pass the information on to higher State and Federal Drug Agencies and hope they can gain additional information to effect an arrest. What might appear as a lack of action on the part of this Department is, in reality, part of a total plan to allow undercover people to do their job without local interference.

We have made continuous efforts to educate our youth on the hazards of drug addiction. Again we encounter difficulty. Example and parental concern are necessary ingredients for a successful program, and the drug problem does not only address itself to the youth of the community. We are doing all we can, but we cannot eradicate this problem alone. It must be met with a cooperative effort of everyone in the community.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record by maintained.
