BURNING REGULATIONS

TO REPORT A FIRE DIAL 483-2521

The State of New Hampshire requires that written permits be obtained for all open fires at all times when the ground is not snow covered.

Permits may be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden, Mr. Cedric Preston, for grass, brush, campfires, etc. Permits must be obtained on the day burning is to be accomplished.

Burn when there is no wind, on rainy days and damp days, in a safe place and in accordance with the terms of the permit. Burn before 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M. Keep some buckets of water close by; if wind develops, promptly extinguish the fire. All fires must be extinguished before you depart the scene.

Thirteenth: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any and/or all property acquired by tax deed, by public sale with the right to accept or reject all bids.

Fourteenth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) to add to a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the purchase of a fire truck. (By request of the Fire Department)(This money is included in the budget)

Fifteenth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) to add to the Police Cruiser Trust Fund. (This money is included in the Budget)

Sixteenth: To see if the Town will seek outside assistance in reappraising all real estate, including lands and buildings, in this Town and will raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) in the current year to be added to the ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) raised at the two previous town meetings. This reappraisal to commence this year and shall be done by one and the same individual.

Seventeenth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) to defray the expenses for a consultant relative to the so-called Rifle Range. (This money is included in the budget)

Eighteenth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to allow the Selectmen to pay up to this amount, to anyone giving information leading to the arrest

and conviction of any person or persons responsible for setting incendiary fires, depending upon the severity of the fire.

Nineteenth: To see if the Town will vote to change the name of Spofford Road to Pingree Hill Road from the intersection of Wilson's Crossing Road to the present Pingree Hill Road. (By request of the Vol. Fire Dept.)

Twentieth: To see if the Town will vote to accept the following by-law:

PARKING DURING SNOW STORM

A. From November 1 to April 1 of each year no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public highway between the hours of 11 p.m. and 8 a.m. or at any other time in such a manner as to impede snow removal operations.

B. Any vehicle parked in violation of section A hereof may be towed by the road agent, the chief of police or their agents or by independent contractors engaged by the road agent or the chief of police; any vehicles so towed shall be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing as established from time to time by the board of selectmen.

C. Any person violating section A hereof shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed twenty-five dollars for each offense.

Twenty-First: To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Twenty-Second: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The meeting was called to order at 2 P.M. on Saturday, March 13, 1971, by the Moderator, Herbert J. Moore, Pastor of the Longmeadow Church gave the invocation. The Moderator read the results of the election on Tuesday, March 9, 1971. We then proceeded to the articles of the warrant as follows:

ARTICLE 3 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO INCUR DEBT FOR TEMPORARY LOANS IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES

Wayne Marshall moved to adopt the Article as read from the warrant. Passed.

ARTICLE 4 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO ACCEPT SUCH TRUST FUNDS AS MAY HAVE COME IN DURING THE YEAR AND TRUST FUNDS AS HAVE NOT BEEN PREVIOUSLY ACCEPTED.

Charlotte MacDonald moved that the article be accepted as in the warrant. Passed.

ARTICLE 5 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO USE THE INCOME OF THE H.B. BURNHAM FUND FOR SCHOOLS OR LIBRARY.

Margaret Griffin moved that the H.B. Burnham Fund be given to the library. Passed.

ARTICLE 6 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO DISPOSE OF ANY AND/OR ALL PROPERTY ACQUIRED BY TAX DEED, BY PUBLIC SALE WITH THE RIGHT TO ACCEPT OR REJECT ALL BIDS.

Russell Dutka moved that the article be adopted. Passed.

ARTICLE 7 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF TWO THOUSAND (\$2,000.00) TO ADD TO A CAPITAL RESERVE FUND TO BE USED FOR THE PURCHASE OF A FIRE TRUCK. (BY REQUEST OF THE FIRE DEPT.)

Richard Davis moved that the article be adopted as printed in the warrant. Passed.

ARTICLE 8 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO WITHDRAW THE NECESSARY FUNDS FROM THE FIRE TRUCK CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR THE PURCHASE OF A FIRE TRUCK.

Donald Dollard moved that the article be adopted as printed in the warrant. Passed.

ARTICLE 9 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF FIFTEEN HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$1,500.00) TO ADD TO THE POLICE CRUISER TRUST FUND.

Emerson Heald moved that this article be adopted as printed in the warrant. Passed.

ARTICLE 10 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL REQUEST THE ASSISTANCE OF THE STATE TAX COMMISSION IN REAPPRAISING ALL REAL ESTATE, INCLUDING LANDS AND BUILDINGS, IN THIS TOWN AND WILL RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$5,000.00) IN THE CURRENT

YEAR. THIS REAPPRAISAL SHALL BE DONE BY ONE AND THE SAME INDIVIDUAL.

Wayne Marshall moved that article be adopted as read. Seconded. Mr. Burt moved that article be amended to delete the phrase "request the assistance of the State Tax Commission" and substitute the words "seek outside assistance". Seconded. Mr. H. Peabody moved that the article be tabled. Seconded. Motion failed. Article 10 as amended was read as follows: "To see if the Town will seek outside assistance in reappraising all real estate, including lands and buildings, in this Town, and will raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) in the current year. This reappraisal shall be done by one and the same individual". Amendment was adopted. Article 10 was passed as amended.

ARTICLE 11 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF TWO THOUSAND (\$2,000.00) TO DEFRAY THE EXPENSES FOR A CONSULTANT RELATIVE TO THE SO-CALLED RIFLE RANGE.

Donald Dollard moved that the article be adopted as printed. Mr. Staby gave an excellent report on same. Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 12 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,000.00) TO HOLD IN ESCROW TO BE PAID TO ANYONE GIVING INFORMATION LEADING TO THE ARREST AND CONVICTION OF ANY PERSON OR PERSONS RESPONSIBLE FOR SETTING INCENDIARY FIRES.

Donald Dollard moved that the article be adopted as read. Seconded. Mr. Eaton moved that the article be amended to read the same as last year. Seconded. Passed. Article 12 passed with amendment as follows: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to allow the Selectmen to pay up to this amount, to anyone giving information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons responsible for setting incendiary fires, depending upon the severity of the fire".

ARTICLE 13 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO PASS THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCE: (DOG ORDINANCE)

A. RESTRAINT: ALL DOGS SHALL BE RESTRAINED FROM RUNNING AT LARGE WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE TOWN, EXCEPT WHEN THEY ARE ON THE OWNER'S OR KEEPER'S PROPERTY OR BEING USED FOR HUNTING OR TRAINING PURPOSES.

B. PENALTY: ANY PERSON OR PERSONS, FIRM OR CORPORATION VIOLATING ANY PROVISION OF THIS ORDINANCE SHALL, UPON CONVICTION, BE FINED NOT MORE THAN FIFTEEN DOLLARS (\$15.00) FOR EACH OFFENSE.

Russell Dutka moved that Article 13 be accepted as read. Seconded. A show of hands was requested with the following results.

Part A For: 87 Against: 36
Part B For: 89 Against: 14

Article was adopted.

ARTICLE 14 – TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO ADOPT THE NON-PARTISAN BALLOT SYSTEM OF ELECTION OF TOWN OFFICERS.

Motion made by Donald MacDonald that article be adopted. Passed.

ARTICLE 15 – TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO WITHDRAW UP TO ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (1,000) FROM THE GRADER FUND FOR THE PURCHASE OF A YORK RAKE.

Mr. Dollard moved that Article 15 be accepted. Motion defeated.

ARTICLE 16 – TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO PERMIT A 1% DISCOUNT TO BE GIVEN FOR TAXES PAID WITHIN 15 DAYS FROM THE DATE OF TAX BILL.

Wayne Marshall moved that this article be adopted. Motion defeated.

ARTICLE 17 – TO HEAR THE REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE AND ACT THEREON.

Albert H. Bourque moved the adoption of the budget figure of \$100,365.66. The other items already having been approved in prior articles. Passed.

ARTICLE 18 – TO TRANSACT ANY OTHER BUSINESS THAT MAY LEGALLY COME BEFORE THE MEETING.

Mary Griffin read excerpts from the first Town record book in honor of this being the 125th anniversary of the Town.

Margaret Griffin spoke on the legislature and asked for consensus on the tax question.

Mr. St. Cyr asked for suggestions to look into a swimming place for the Town. It was recommended that the Selectmen bring in a report for next town meeting.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Mr. Wayne Marshall for his three years as a Selectman. Mr. Marshall asked for a hand for the Planning Board, Zoning Board and the Fire Department for the many hours put in without reimbursement.

James Trombly suggested that the Selectmen consider the establishment of an industrial authority to take care of any town property. The meeting was favorable to this suggestion.

Meeting adjourned at 5:05 P.M.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board meeting takes place on the second Wednesday of each month at 7:30 P.M. at the Town Hall. All meetings are open to the general public.

The Zoning Ordinances and Subdivision Regulations have been printed in a compact form and are now available through the Town Clerk's Office at a fee of \$2.00 per copy.

Parties that are planning to subdivide their property should be aware that approval by the N.H. Water Pollution Board is necessary in accordance with State requirements prior to receiving any approval from the Planning Board. The State Water Pollution Board will provide the applicant with a Water Pollution Board number. That number will be inserted in any plot plans that are submitted to the town.

The Town Clerk has available for any interested parties a list of requirements that will enable the Planning Board to expedite the processing of subdivision requests.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN N.H. PLANNING COMMISSION

Since 1966, the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has actively served the Town of Auburn. Auburn's representatives on the SNHPC Board are Mr. A. J. Staby and Mr. Philip Hujar. Mr. Hujar also serves on the Commission's Executive Committee.

The primary function of the SNHPC is to provide member communities with administrative and technical mechanisms that are necessary to identify and resolve "area-wide" problems; develop programs to carry out "area-wide" comprehensive plans; and effect cooperation among local governments in order to implement a planning program that will assure coordinated, progressive development in a regional perspective.

Through communication, planning, policy-making, coordination and technical assistance, the Commission serves local governments and citizens in the region by dealing with needs and issues which cross city, town and county boundaries.

In order to meet its obligations, the Commission has established both local planning assistance and regional planning programs. Under the local planning assistance program, the SNHPC provides direct services to municipal members on an individual basis. Among these are the attendance of a professional planner at local planning board meetings to assist with subdivision review; advisory services to the Board of Selectmen concerning industrial development programs; the preparation of materials for subdivision regulations and zoning ordinance changes; and other direct services to the planning board on a contract basis. In addition, the Commission's informational resources are made available to other municipal agencies, commissions and departments.

Under the regional planning program, the SNHPC is charged with the responsibility of developing "area-wide" plans for land use; water supply and water pollution abatement facilities; storm drainage facilities; highways, public transportation systems; solid waste management; housing and other services of regional significance. In a related capacity, the Commission is responsible for the review of applications for Federal financial aid for such programs as those noted above and a wide variety of others for which member communities may be eligible.

LOCAL PLANNING ASSISTANCE

Mr. W. Ray Walker, Executive Director regularly attended meetings of the Planning Board to assist with local development problems and coordinate local and regional planning activities.

SNHPC professional staff members attended over 12 meetings in Auburn and provided the Planning Board and Selectmen with numerous administrative and technical services among which were:

- subdivision site inspections
- subdivision plan review and recommendations
- clarification of state regulations
- update of Planning Enabling Legislation
- update of land use plan
- preparation of zoning map
- preparation of existing land use map

REGIONAL PLANNING

The SNHPC worked to coordinate activities of the Auburn Planning Board and relate their programs to regional, state and federal agencies. SNHPC programs of a regional nature completed during 1971 were:

- A Report on Social Planning
- Metropolitan Manchester Community Shelter Plan
- Metropolitan Review A-95 Handbook
- Roles and Responsibilities for Update of Transportation Plan

Regional planning activities initiated during 1971 were:

- Final report on the water and sewerage facilities program
- Regional housing study
- Regional land use plan proposal
- Update of the transportation study
- Forum of local elected officials
- Storm drainage facilities
- Recreation and open space plan
- Capital improvements program

LOOKING AHEAD

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has witnessed significant developmental activity in Auburn and shares with your officials the optimism for a bright future.

Coincident with coordinated and planned development is an increase in local demand for professional services as occurred this past year. In response to these demands, the SNHPC, in 1972, will strengthen its capabilities to respond to local problems.

Local Planning

The Commission is currently developing an expanded scope of professional planning services to be made available to Auburn. It is our hope that implementation of this program will relieve the Auburn Planning Board of some of the more routine duties, thereby enabling your planning board to become more involved in advance planning activities.

Regional Planning

Growing functional responsibilities have placed increased pressure on the SNHPC to raise and act on controversial and sensitive issues. The Commission accepts this challenge, but it is going to insist upon local commitments to support regional planning.

There must be a consensus and willingness to innovate to solve some of our regional challenges. Local government officials cannot simply raise issues and react to proposals. They must make a commitment to allocate local resources to regional issues; formulate regional policies; and openly support regional planning.

REPORT of the FOREST FIRE WARDEN and DISTRICT CHIEF

LEST WE FORGET — IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellarholes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947. Nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand—a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them dead out when leaving.
4. Most important—instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The services of the Visiting Nurse Association, a United Fund Agency, are available for all of the residents of Auburn regardless of race, creed or ability to pay. The Association is a home health agency certified to care for Medicare patients.

The Visiting Nurse provides bedside nursing care, treatment and health guidance and the Registered Physical Therapist provides physical therapy; all services are carried out on a part-time basis according to directions by the patient's physician. Home Health Aides are available on the same basis.

Maternal and child health guidance and instruction is given before and after the arrival of new babies and classes for instruction of expectant parents are held twice yearly in Manchester.

Family health guidance is also given with special emphasis on prevention of disease and promotion of health.

Seven clinics with Dr. Hermann Sander officiating were held in Candia in 1971 with an attendance of 107 children. These clinics were for children from Auburn and Candia. Diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, measles, rubella, polio and smallpox vaccines were given. Physical exams were also done.

144 visits, including 13 new calls, to Auburn residents were made in 1971. Miss Judith Filleul, R.N. is the nurse in the area.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the citizens of Auburn, I hereby submit my report as Superintendent of Schools.

The program of curriculum development has continued over this past year under the direction of Arthur Mitchell, Assistant Superintendent of Schools. An individualized mathematics program has been developed in grades four and six. Teachers from the above-mentioned grade levels have taken part in Union workshops and study groups to develop this program. The Language Arts Curriculum Committee has completed a guide for grades one through eight. This guide was designed to provide the teachers in Supervisory Union #10 with a breakdown of the various Language Art skills to be covered at each grade level. Through this curriculum study, teachers are also provided with lists of materials that can be used to foster a program to meet the needs of a particular classroom.

The principals in Union #10 are currently involved in an independent study program with Dr. Paul Warren and Dr. Phyllis Henry of Boston University. The purpose of this study is to review the curriculum materials in Union #10 and to make recommendations to the various school boards for revisions or additions in the curriculum.

The classroom facilities of Auburn are currently adequate to provide for our student population. The school population is growing at the rate of about 2% per year. This has remained constant over the past few years. Other school districts in the area have population increases that total over 10% annually. The Auburn School District should begin to plan for an upsurge in growth by the middle of the 1970's. With this in mind, the School Board should formulate a long-range study program for building needs in Auburn.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Auburn School Board for their understanding and cooperation over the past year.

I would like also to thank Mr. John Larkin, Principal of the Village School, and his staff for their many efforts to provide the students in Auburn with a truly individualized school program.

AUBURN VILLAGE SCHOOL AUBURN, NEW HAMPSHIRE

Annual Report of the Principal—June, 1971.

To the School Board, citizens of Auburn, and the Superintendent of Schools, I hereby submit my annual report for the school year 1970-1971.

The school population as of June 25, 1971—the final school day—was 382 pupils. This is an increase of 13 students as compared to June of 1970.

The graduation ceremony was brief but impressive. Forty-nine students received diplomas. The Reverend Mr. Kenneth Sanford was the guest speaker. Mr. Philip Hujar, Chairman of the School Board, also addressed the graduates.

The DAR Awards were presented by Mrs. William Blunt to Sharon Willey and James Dollard.

In May of 1970, twenty seven children registered in the multi-purpose room for the first grade attendance in September of the same year. During the week of August 24th, there were ten more registrations. On the opening day of school our first grade totaled 47 pupils which gave us a school population of 370 students.

During the summer months, painting, cleaning and repairing was done in a very workmanlike manner under the supervision of the new head custodian, Mr. Charles Blossom.

New playground equipment, a storage shed for the school tractor, a cement platform for the incinerator, drainage for the playground and asphaltting a portion of the playing area were the main items of concern to the custodians. The additional asphalt provided more parking facilities, more dry play area, and two outside basketball courts.

New ceilings in the boys and girls basements gave these rooms a much needed modern appearance.

THE STAFF:

During the first two weeks of August, teachers represented Auburn in Curriculum Development held in Derry and a Workshop—the fourth week in August—in Londonderry.

Ten of our staff completed a course in Individualization of Instruction conducted at Londonderry North in cooperation with the University of New Hampshire.

During the month of July, a Title I project—remedial math and reading—under the supervision of Miss Mary Jean Aylward with the help of Auburn teachers; Miss Lynda Mullen, Miss Beverly Timme,

Miss Judith Yeaton, Mr. Warren Nightingale, and Miss Thomascina MacKenzie of Londonderry North, was held at the Auburn Village School.

Mrs. Judith Szot attended a two day Audio Visual Workshop held at Londonderry North.

An empty classroom provided space for a special class for pupils of Supervisory Union #10 who were in need of this type of education. The project was funded under Title I at no additional cost to the community.

ACTIVITIES:

All grades visited Concord, N.H. where pupils were permitted to visit the space vehicle and observe moon objects returned to earth by our astronauts.

Educational trips were taken by all grades during the school year.

The annual Jr. High Science Fair was held in the multi-purpose room. Gail Ladew, 7th and 8th grade science teacher did an excellent job of organizing and coordinating the judging by U.N.H. professors, visits by the entire student body and parents, and the presentation of awards.

Mrs. Beatrice Taylor, 3rd grade teacher, again this year did an excellent job with the Primary Science Fair. Over 100 parents visited the displays originated by the 2nd and 3rd grade pupils.

Each of the Jr. High teachers with their pupils celebrated Earth Day by conducting a litter clean-up that included the nearby road network and the school grounds. The cooperation of Mr. C. Blossom, school custodian, and the Manchester Water Works personnel transporting the litter helped to make this a very successful affair.

"Washington Never Slept Here," a play directed by Mr. W. Nightingale, 8th grade teacher, was presented to the assembled student body and the general public on separate occasions by his 8th grade pupils.

CURRICULUM:

Grade 4-6 became non-graded and for the first time grades 1-6 utilized achievement in math and reading.

The work of the math and language arts summer workshop committees provided us with a means of improving our curriculum. It was through the math personnel that math levels were developed and standardized throughout the Union.

The language arts committee produced a language resource kit which greatly influenced one of our aims—individualization of instruction.

Again the library played an important role in making our program successful. We now have over 3400 library books. Junior High pupils availed themselves of the numerous library resources for independent study—again one of our educational objectives.

CONCLUSION:

As usual in the improving our curriculum the principal and staff received the full cooperation and advice of Mr. Bernard Ellis, Superintendent of Schools, and Mr. Arthur Mitchell, Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

For the sincere cooperation of the School Board, the teachers, our reading consultant, Mrs. Marion Pounder, Mrs. Marion Heald, nurse-teacher, Mrs. Joan Beuque, music supervisor, Mrs. Elizabeth O'Brien, librarian, Mrs. Mildred Preston, secretary, the cafeteria personnel, bus drivers, custodians, and the P.T.A., I express my thanks.

Andrew Canon, Conservation Officer, talked to all grades on survival in the woods and showed a film on lost hunter. Canon also provided three other films during the year.

Robert Duvernay, of the Public Service Company, demonstrated resuscitation and showed a movie "Breath of Life".

Mr. Lebel, state employee, showed slides and talked on Air Pollution.

As school nurse I presented programs on drugs, safety, poisons, dental health and alcohol.

I spent one day at the Easter Seal Rehabilitation Center evaluating 5 children from Auburn who attend the Center. Also, spent two days at the University of New Hampshire on "Learning Disabilities". I attended a speech therapy workshop in Londonderry.

I took a 3 credit course "Advanced School Nursing" at Concord Technical and a 3 credit course "School-Family Nurse" at Laconia.

On May 1 a pre-school registration program clinic was held and 25 children were registered for first grade next fall. I feel this program is very important because certain health defects might be found at this time and could be corrected during the summer months.

REPORT OF THE READING CONSULTANT

To the Auburn School Board and the Superintendent of Schools:

During the school year 1970-71 the non-graded approach to instruction in Reading was expanded to include children in the Intermediate Unit. A curriculum guide, *Reading in Proper Perspective*, prepared during the summer of 1970 by the Language Arts curriculum committee for the Supervisory Union, was of great assistance to the staff. Specific levels of achievement are designated in the guide, accompanied by lists of skills for each level. In addition, the use of a variety of materials, including instructional tapes, programed materials, basal and supplementary readers, was an important factor in the development of skills. The fine school library encouraged students to pursue independent reading, one of the ultimate goals of any reading program.

Pupils in the Primary and Intermediate Units attended classes for Language Arts at their instructional level in a continuous block of time. As the year progressed, many activities could be seen in the classrooms which involved the integration of all the Language Arts. More flexibility in grouping of pupils and creativity in teaching were the results of this method.

Federal funds under ESEA Title I were used during the summer of 1970 to provide a Reading and Math Clinic under the direction of Miss Aylward. Children selected to participate were given individual attention and tutoring by their instructors. This was a rewarding experience for those who attended.

At this time I would like to thank the following: Mr. Ellis, Superintendent of Schools, and Mr. Mitchell, Assistant Superintendent, for their guidance; Mr. Larkin, Principal, for his confidence and cooperation; and the teaching staff, for their untiring efforts.

ROLE OF THE READING CONSULTANT

1. As a resource person –
supplies materials on request, helps select and evaluate materials, suggests methods appropriate to individual needs, answers questions about reading asked by staff members and members of the community.
2. As an advisor –
advises administrators, teachers, and other members of the staff about the teaching of reading within the school, informs the staff about new developments in reading and experimentation in other school districts.
3. As an in-service leader –
conducts demonstration lessons on request, arranges for short-term informal sessions or meetings pertaining to specific areas in the instructional program in reading, helps to implement the total school in-service program, especially aspects directed toward the training of new teachers.
4. As a diagnostician –
directs or conducts diagnoses of individual students who appear to be severely retarded in reading, helps teachers learn to diagnose more effectively, interprets the results of diagnoses to staff members, parents, and sometimes to students themselves, attempts to help teachers make use of information from diagnoses in their teaching.
5. As an instructor –
helps teachers, formally and informally, to learn about methods and materials that will be useful to them, helps specific students at times, may teach a group in order to try out new ideas or demonstrate certain procedures as a part of teacher training.
6. As an evaluator –
supervises schoolwide testing programs involving reading achievement, interprets test results to the staff, assists in the selection of new tests to be used in a school program.
7. As a member of pupil personnel services –
works cooperatively with other specialists within the school union for the improvement of the reading/language arts program as a whole.

**SPEECH THERAPY PROGRAM
SUPERVISORY UNION #10**

To the Superintendent of Schools and members of the School Board:

Federally funded through Title I, ESEA, in 1970-71, the Speech Therapy provided 2 full-time speech therapists, Mrs. Judy Reed and Mrs. Deborah Gratton, to serve the towns of Auburn, Chester, Derry, Londonderry, and Windham. 205 children in 12 schools were seen for therapy. A 4-week Summer Speech Clinic was held in July, 1971.

Approximately 1000 children, including all third-graders, were screened in Fall, 1970, for early identification of speech problems of voice, articulation, hearing loss, auditory perception, stuttering, and language development. Referrals were also received from school personnel for evaluation of possible speech problems.

Video-tape equipment was purchased with Title I funds for language activities in the special education classrooms. The equipment was used in April to tape an information session which was held with teacher representatives present to hear 4 speakers from the field of speech pathology. The purpose of this session was to make teachers aware of types of speech problems, of making referrals, and of follow-up speech activities in the classroom. The video-tape will be presented to the staffs of each school in the Fall, 1971. The session also provided information for a teachers' handbook to aid in these areas.

Through the coordinated efforts of Mr. Anastas Christo, Pupil Personnel Director, Mr. Hugh Holt, Elementary Guidance Counselor for Derry, the speech therapists were involved in case studies with the Manchester Rehabilitation Center and the Greater Salem Mental Health Clinic. In these team evaluations, the efforts of the staff established objective goals, recommendations, and follow-through for the children concerned.

With better school coverage because of 2 full-time speech therapists, the number of children seen this year increased, and they were seen more often. This increase in service was beneficial since it offered the children frequent, consistent therapy that was important to their speech improvement.

The Special Education classes participated in a language development program carried out by the therapists one hour a week. In these language activities the children showed improvement in oral self-expression.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, his administrative staff, the School Boards, principals, teachers and staffs of all schools for their participation and help in the program.

Amend RSA 36:27 (supp) as amended by 1963, 163:3 and 1969, 185:1 by striking out said section and inserting in place thereof the following: **36:27 Penalties for Transferring Lots in Unapproved Subdivisions.** Any owner, or agent of the owner, of any land located within a subdivision in a municipality that has adopted subdivision regulations, who transfers or sells any land before a plat of the said subdivision has been approved by the planning board and recorded or filed in the office of the appropriate register of deeds shall forfeit and pay a penalty of five hundred dollars for each lot or parcel so transferred or sold; and the description by metes and bounds in the instrument of transfer or other document used in the process of selling or transferring shall not exempt the transaction from such penalties. Said municipality may enjoin such transfer or sale and may recover said penalty by civil action. In any such action the prevailing party may recover reasonable court costs and attorneys fees as same may be ordered by the court.

21:2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect sixty days after its passage.

The New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission hereby gives notice that Governor Peterson has signed Senate Bill 233 which broadens the jurisdiction of the Commission under Chapter 149-E, Revised Statutes Annotated relating to sewage disposal systems and subdivision of land.

Effective July 1, 1971 all land being subdivided for the purpose of sale, rent, lease, building construction or any other purpose must have prior approval of the Commission.

No building from which waste will be discharged and no waste disposal system can be constructed in the state without prior approval of the plans of the waste disposal system by the Commission.

Previously the law applied only to land located within 1000 feet of any surface water. The amended law now covers the entire state.

Lots in previously laid out subdivisions which are still owned by the developer must be approved by the Commission before they can be sold.

No plans of subdivisions or individual lots need be submitted when municipal sewerage is available, however, plans for extensions of sewerage systems must be submitted by the municipality and approved by the Commission.

To Whom It May Concern:

Misunderstandings have developed regarding the requirements of the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission in case (a) where the sale or other conveyance of property involves merely an exchange of land among two or more owners which does not increase the number of owners and on which no sewage disposal system is to be constructed; and case (b) where an individual intends to divide his land and there is no intent to undertake any building construction involving sewage disposal.

Please be advised (despite any contrary advice you may have received) that the only requirements are as follows:

Case (a) — No requirement to submit any information to the Commission.

Case (b) — Where no construction is contemplated within two (2) years and the lot size of the subdivided portion is in excess of five (5) acres, only a plan showing how the property is being divided, drawn to scale (lot lines and property boundaries), and information regarding the nature of the soil in the area is required. The required soil data are available from the U. S. Soil Conservation Service which maintains an office in each county.

Where the subdivided portion is less than five (5) acres in size, additional information may be required, and persons should contact the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission at 105 Loudon Road, Concord, regarding that information.
