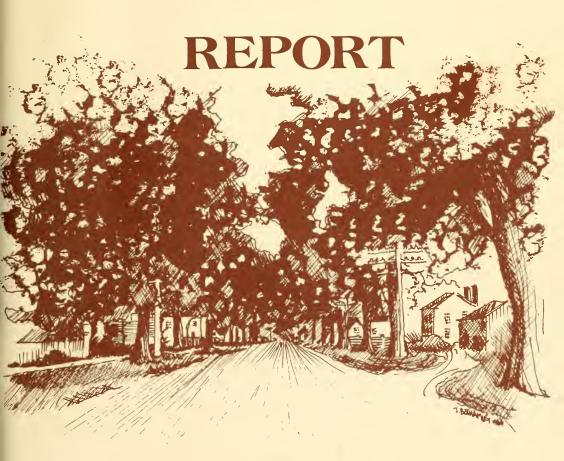

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act for use as a setoff against the following departments.

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$380 to reimburse HUD for the Town's share of a planning grant for sewer facilities.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4,514 to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500 to help support the Penacook Rescue Squad for its emergency medical services and rescue operations for the Town.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$6,800 to purchase a new police cruiser for the Police Department.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$18,000 to purchase a new highway dump truck for the Highway Department.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,500 for the Penacook Youth Center.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,523.41 for services to low-income residents of Boscawen through the Concord Area Center, Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500 to purchase an office copier.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to extend the term of the five-member Study Committee on Town Offices Building until the next annual meeting.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town until the taxes are paid to the Treasurer.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer or sell property taken by the Town in default of Redemption from the Tax Sale or otherwise acquired and such sale to be at public auction with Selectmen reserving the right to accept or reject any or all bids.
- 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the Haase property located south of Walker Pond to Martin T. and Alan H. Haase for all back taxes, interest and costs. The Boscawen Conservation Commission has recommended that this property be disposed of in this manner.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to request the Selectmen to reconsider the rent rates they set on the Town Hall, and their policy on dump collection, and other concerns of the Town Hall facilities. (By Petition)
- 17. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

For the third year in a row, we have been able to pass along to our tax-payers a substantial tax reduction. This was caused in part by a concerted effort to maintain a level of services to the Town without drastically increasing the various budgets. It was also caused in part by a gain in tax base as a result of new construction. It should be pointed out, however, that our base has been eroded by various exemptions allowed by statute. It is the feeling of the Selectmen that this situation has peaked out and that new construction should help us considerably in maintaining a respectable base.

Unlike many towns and municipalities throughout our area, we are still in a good position to provide a level of services commensurate with the size of the Town. It is significant that through good management practice the Town is virtually debt free. The only remaining debt at the present time are the interceptor sewer bonds which will be paid in full in February of 1984. At the present time, the Selectmen do not anticipate a need for bonded indebtedness other than your normal tax anticipation notes.

The combination of inflation and high cost of energy have again had an impact on the Town and all phases of the budgetary process. Through the full cooperation of our dedicated Town employees, we have been able to keep the Town on an even keel. During the year, the Selectmen initiated a program to conserve energy by tightening up town buildings, adding insulation, storm windows and maintaining lower temperatures in all buildings. In the last quarter of 1979, we were advised by our fuel suppliers that we were again placed on an allocation for both gasoline and diesel fuel. Immediate steps were taken to maintain a level of supply that should prevent any shortage problems in an emergency.

We continue to have problems maintaining a reasonable operating cost for our sewer users. The Selectmen have worked very closely with the City of Concord on obtaining a reduction in operating cost of the treatment plant. However, during the year, two major industrial users cancelled the use of this system which in turn may have a considerable impact on the overall cost to operate the plant. We are continuing to work with the City of Concord on this subject, and it is our hope that we can minimize the impact.

As a result of recent legislation, it has become necessary for the Town to provide unemployment compensation benefits which are an added expense to the Town. Through the N. H. Municipal Association, we have joined in with other municipalities in the state in a self-insurance fund for both unemployment benefits and workmen's compensation. This should provide significant savings in the future.

As a result of the action by the voters of the 1979 annual meeting, the Parks and Recreation Committee proceeded to apply for Federal matching funds for the development of the Town park located on Depot Street. As of this writing, the project has been approved and we should be in a position to start construction this spring.

TOWN OF BOSCAWEN

During the fall, we cleaned up the building to be used for recreational purposes at the site and painted the exterior. In addition, considerable outside clearing work was completed including: cutting brush and grading the field. We appreciate the considerable effort and time spent by the Parks and Recreation Committee in undertaking this project, and we feel certain that the townspeople will be proud of this facility.

Also, in accordance with the vote of the 1979 annual meeting, a certified public accounting firm has been retained to conduct the year-end audit. This will not be completed until late spring and the results will be made available to interested parties. This will be a complete audit of all Town financial records and will be available in the Selectmen's Office when complete.

AUDITORS' REPORT

May 14, 1979

Board of Selectmen Town of Boscawen Post Office Box 24 Penacook, New Hampshire 03303

We, the undersigned Auditors of the Town of Boscawen, certify that we have examined, checked and verified the records of Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Treasurer of the Library Trustees, and Treasurer of the Trust Funds in accordance with the guidelines furnished by Municipal Services Division, Department of Revenue Administration. Some corrections were noted.

We did not complete our audit of the records of the Selectmen and Treasurer because the records were removed from the Town Offices on February 27th contrary to our agreement with Mr. Plourde. Prior to this date we were delayed on February 16 and again on the 23rd because not all the Treasurer's records were available in the office as promised. We have waited two and one-half months for word from you that the records have been returned for us to complete our audit but to no avail.

We would call your attention to RSA 41:29 Duties (Town Treasurer) "... He shall furnish to the selectmen statements from his books, and submit his books and vouchers to them and to the town auditors for examination, whenever so requested." This is the second year we have encountered difficulties auditing the Treasurer's records.

Under RSA 41:31 Choice; Duties (Town Auditors) "... shall at the annual meeting choose one or more auditors who shall carefully examine the accounts of the selectmen, town treasurer, town clerk, clerk or other person acting as clerk of a municipal court, collector, of taxes and any other officer or agent handling funds of a town, at the close of each fiscal year and at other times whenever necessary, and report to the town whether the same are correctly cast and well vouched." Our report for the year 1977 called your attention to the fact that the person responsible for collecting Trailer Park fees should keep a separate ledger showing amounts received. This is still not being done. We did find a few paid invoices in the Treasurer's receipts showing collection of trailer park fees but these receipts were far short of the total amount collected as shown in the Treasurer's statement.

We found again that all bills were not paid by invoice nor approved by a majority of the Selectmen which is contrary to RSA 24:29 and guidelines issued by Bureau of Business Administration.

On June 6, 1979 I talked to Mrs. Patricia Knight (Bookkeeper) for the Town of Boscawen and audited the books for Calendar Year 1978.

The accounting and record keeping system is set up that the (Highway Dept., Cemetery, Town Dump, Special Police, Volunteer Firemen, Elected & Appointed Officers, Janitor, Clerical Help, Part-time Help, Employees of the Town) submit time sheets to Mrs. Knight, who figures the gross wages and deductions. Then she posts to the payroll sheets, which are tallied quarterly and the OAR-S3 Wage Reports are made out and submitted to the State with the contribution. At the end of the year, W-2 Forms are made out. Records are readily available and maintained in a safe place for at least four years. Spot checked the payroll sheets, OAR-S3 Reports, and W-2 Forms. Wage Reports are completed properly and a-1 covered employees are reported with the following exceptions:

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

In 1979, the Boscawen Fire Department responded to 145 calls; this is a decrease of 14 calls over last year.

Chimney fires have decreased; I feel this is due to increased public awareness in using woodburning devices. If you are planning to install a woodstove, the Fire Department recommends that a minimum of 36 inches clear space on all sides of the stove be maintained. A properly installed stove that is used with common sense can be a safe and economical source of supplemental heat. The Mutual Fire Insurance Association of New England has a brochure entitled, "Don't Lose Lives Saving Energy" which covers stove installation; copies of this brochure are available at the Selectmens' Office.

Training for fire personnel is being conducted one night per week in addition to special training sessions at Fitzwilliams Drill Yard, Capital Area Compact and Twin Rivers Mutual Aid.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all fire personnel for their cooperation and effort during the past year.

If at any time you have any fire-related problems, please do not hestitate to call us.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municiple forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

CHIEF'S MESSAGE

Another year has passed and my department has experienced a greatly increased work load beginning in the later months of the year. The combination of the economic problems linked with a more complex judicial system has moved me to request an additional full-time officer in my 1980 proposed budget.

This officer will be used to maintain a full-time department year round instead of utilizing part-time personnel to fill in for vacations, schools, sick leave etc. which now takes up approximately five months of the year.

Thinking along those lines of being shorthanded for almost half a year to begin with and the State mandating us to train part-time personnel as well as full-time personnel, the Police Commission agrees with me that the full-time position would be money well spent and cost effective for the town in the long run.

My budget has passed the budget committee as of this writing and will be before you at the annual meeting for your approval.

The only other major item proposed for my department will be entered under a special article to buy a new cruiser. This cruiser will be to replace the 1975 Pontiac which has approximately 115,000 miles on it.

During the year Brian Estee was appointed to a full-time patrolman due to a vacancy created by the resignation of Thomas Edney. Brian had worked for the department on a part-time basis for approximately four years and is a graduate of St. Anselm's College where he majored in Criminal Justice.

The department also co-sponsored a Bicycle Safety Rodeo along with the Parks and Recreation Department, the Boy Scouts and the Cub Scouts at the Boscawen Main Street School this past year. This program was fully funded by the local merchants and was a great success. Hopefully this program can continue to be run annually and with a little luck the attendance could be even greater if somehow we could work it around all the other summer activities. (Thank you merchants for a worth-while program.)

In closing, I would like to thank you, the citizens, for your continued cooperation with my department and would like to stress to you that if something looks out of place, don't hesitate to call — no matter how small the problem might seem.

When the economic problem grows, so does the crime rate!

In preparing this report, we found that the Town aided 11 families on direct aid, which represents one more than last year. The amount of hours, the telephoning, the paper work and the listening would indicate that many more people had been aided. Actually, the number that applied for aid is considerably larger than the actual number assisted. Unfortunately, the selectmen receive requests for aid more frequently now from those who appear to believe "it's their right" that the town foot the bills which result from family quarrels or disagreements.

The Selectmen have resisted these pressures and have, instead, followed the laws and welfare guidelines. In some cases, our resistance has helped families remain together and to salvage the family pride.

We anticipated a deficit budget for welfare this year because of the sky-rocketing cost of home heating supplies. Fortunately, our winter was a record-breaking mild one. Also many more federal and private programs have been initiated to aid in this area. This, obviously, has helped the towns in their welfare endeavors. One of your selectmen is directly involved with a religious group that has set up a private and personal attempt at aiding people. Also, C.A.P. and other programs have expanded budgets to spend in aiding our poor and needy.

The temptation to reduce the welfare budget was very great indeed, but we realize that next year could very easily be a typical winter and this could easily deplete our available funds. We are therefore asking for the same amount and hoping for a prosperous economy and a mild winter.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission has been relatively active this past year, addressing itself in several areas. We have received most all our inventory of cataloguing material, and are presently working on a use map of the Weir property.

During the summer two members met with a representative of the Bureau of Solid Waste Management concerning the tannery waste site on the Weir property; this proved to be a very informative session in that we had the opportunity to view and understand the site closure plan set forth by that State agency. To date, one site has been closed in accordance with the plan, with the second being prepared for closing.

The Commission feels that the Weir property should be retained by the town as open space for future development as recreational and educational use. We have so recommended this to the Selectmen.

The Commission also discussed the possibility of transplanting wild turkeys in Boscawen and was in the process of talking with Fish and Game officials about our town land. It appears that the Fish & Game Department had also been looking at Boscawen and we now have a transplant in the N. Water St. area.

The coming year should be both challenging and informative; challenging for us in that we would like to become more visible in the community. By being informative, I believe we can accomplish this. There are areas of conservation education that can be brought to schools and public meetings, workshops can be developed and presented. Working closely with other groups can consolidate efforts and gain a more constructive use of our labors . . . i.e. we have met with the Recreation Committee discussing the possibility of a boat launching area on the Merrimack River as a cooperative venture.

In other plans for the year ahead is a survey of wet land in the town; noting location, size and uses. If anyone knows of an area they feel should be specifically noted or one that may have unique features, terrain, plant or animals, etc., please feel free to contact anyone on the Commission. Any amount will be helpful and greatly appreciated.

In closing, I would like to thank all the Commission members for their time, cooperation and the interest they have shown. I would also like to welcome our new member Rhoda Hardy, her ideas and participation have enhanced our group.

At the present time we are still lacking one member of the Commission, if you have a desire to get involved and you feel you have something to offer or if you know someone who may, contact the Selectmen's office or a member of the Commission. Thank you.

PLANNING BOARD

The Boscawen Planning Board met almost monthly during 1979 to act upon subdivision requests and requests for lot line adjustments. In addition, the Board held public hearings for the flood plain zoning amendment which was accepted by vote of the Town.

The Board is presently in the initial stages of updating the Master Plan for the future plan of the Town. We would welcome citizen volunteers to help with this important work. A questionnaire will be sent to each resident during the coming months in order to gather more information and input for the Master Plan.

The Board is working with the Selectmen and a space needs committee to help establish a plan for future town officers space.

The Planning Board will be republishing the subdivision and zoning regulations this year and will incorporate into them the recently passed regulations and other changes.

Because of recently passed state legislation, the time frame and procedures for subdivision requests have been noticeably altered. Citizens should be advised that subdivision deliberations require more time and expense than in the past.

We were fortunate to acquire the services of a capable and experienced planning board secretary, Carmen Osgood. She also is secretary for the Zoning Board of Adjustment, which makes for good communications between the two Boards.

The large increase in the Planning Board Proposed Budget is due to the inclusion this year of the dues of the Central N. H. Regional Planning Commission and printing costs.

PARKS & RECREATION COMMITTEE

In 1979 your recreation committee for the Town of Boscawen applied to the United States Department of Interior for a 50-50 Grant to develop the old New England Forestry Property. With this grant we plan to construct 2 Tennis Courts, 1 Basketball Court and a Parking Lot. As of this printing the project has not received final approval but the approval should be forthcoming. After approval we hope to see the project completed during the Spring of 1980.

A grant was also applied for and received from the CETA project to clean up the old Dorval property. With these funds the existing building on the property was cleaned of all refuse and a new coat of paint was applied to the exterior. The land was cleared of brush and debris and is ready for additional improvements over the next few years. This will depend on our ability to obtain financial help from government programs.

Bill Weir who directed our Summer Recreation Program reported that 1979's park program was successful with over 100 children enrolled and taking part in various summer activities. We are hoping with a little luck that we can have our summer program at our new facility in 1980.

The suggestion was made and approved by our committee that we name the Little League diamond after Jamie Welch. We sent a letter to the Selectmen with our recommendation upon which it was voted on and approved.

We, the committee for the Parks and Recreation for the Town of Boscawen, are pleased with the progress to date. We would also welcome any questions or suggestions that any of our townspeople may have. Please feel free to contact any of the following members of the committee.

STUDY COMMISSION FOR MUNICIPAL OFFICES

The Study Commission on town office space has concluded that it would not be cost effective to utilize any existing town building for town offices and meeting rooms and proposes a building be erected at the site of the Police Station and Much-I-Do Fire Station. This being town owned land, it would not necessitate the purchase of additional property. Additionally, according to the latest Regional Planning Study, it is within ½ mile of the center of population of Boscawen.

The Commission recommends the construction of a full basement building, large enough to house all town offices and meeting rooms under one roof.

A site study was requested of several architectural firms and at least one should be available to present at town meeting. This is intended to illustrate the best site for the building in relationship to other structures presently located on the property.

Due to the financial impact of an expenditure of this magnitude, the Commission requests an additional year to complete this study including energy efficiency, to come forth with a proposal.

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., continued to service Boscawen for the fourth year. They have provided skilled nursing care for anyone sick in the home, especially those needing continuity of care after discharge from the hospital. They are available to give hypodermic injections, change surgical dressings, and do other treatments prescribed by the attending physician. When indicated, family members have been instructed to give care between the nurse's visits.

Special services such as, physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, and nutritional guidance have been given the special staff and consultants in order to assist with the rehabilitation of an acute or chronic illness.

When family members are unable to supply all the needed care, a staff of homemaker — home health aides are available to give physical care, do light housekeeping, and assist with meal planning and meal preparation.

The nurses are delighted to advise new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies. They are also glad to work with families and individuals on normal nutrition, sickness, and accident prevention.

Anyone in Boscawen may request these services — doctor, family, pastor, friend, or the patient himself. Patients are also referred by clinics and other agencies. All calls are answered, but continuing care can be provided under a doctor's orders.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., (224-4093) between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10:30 p.m., seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. Fees may be scaled to those unable to pay the entire amount.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

The most significant event in 1979 as far as the Penacook-Boscawen Water Precinct is concerned was the completion of Environmental Engineers' study. The study covered many areas, but a few are particularly important as the Precinct faces the requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act.

An extensive groundwater exploration program was carried out to determine if groundwater were a viable source of good water. Although many holes were drilled, only one hole appeared to have enough water to be of any interest. Unfortunately, the little water the hole did produce contained too much iron to be useable. Therefore, the study recommends improving the situation at Walker Pond.

The main drawback to Walker Pond is suspended organic matter in the water. Fortunately, this defect is considered a violation of a secondary standard and not a severe threat to health. The suspended organic matter does inhibit the effectiveness of the chlorine used for purification and therefor must be dealt with. The study recommends installing a compressor and extending air lines to the intake area to both increase turbulence and oxygen in the water.

Another recommendation is upgrading safety aspects of the new pumping station. We cannot stress strongly enough the importance of carrying this out: chlorine gas is deadly even in small concentrations. By placing the ventilation fans on the same switch as the lights, any chlorine would be vented when the lights were turned on. The present fans are badly corroded because of their exposure to chlorine and therefore must be taken care of.

The replacement of the chlorination system is being held in abeyance until the Precinct can determine whether it has any legal recourse against the suppliers of the present equipment which has never performed satisfactorily.

The study contains other suggestions as to how the Precinct can improve its operations and these will be explained at the annual meeting.

Again the Precinct is faced with inflationary pressures on its costs. Salaries and wages have been increased in an attempt to soften the impact of rising prices on the Precinct employees. The Commissioners feel that these people have carried out their tasks very well. The cost for materials are anticipated to increase markedly this year so the Commissioners have increased budget items accordingly.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Assets, Liabilities, Income and Expenses

The above are recognized on the accrual basis of accounting. Inventories are stated at cost (first-in, first-out basis).

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are recorded at cost. Assets acquired by the Penacook and Boscawen Water Precinct are depreciated on the straightline method over their estimated useful lives. The range of annual depreciation rates is as follows:

Buildings and Structures		.40 Years
Standpipes		.30 Years
Mains, hydrants, Services	30	0-50 Years
Other Equipment	5	5-20 Years

Although still in use, assets that are fully depreciated are removed from the accounts.

NOTE 2 - PENSION FUNDS

The water precinct provides for pension benefits to substantially all employees through a contributory retirement system under New Hampshire law. The law prescribes the formula for computing retirement allowances and presently does not permit advance funding of pension liabilities. Retirement allowances are paid from water precinct funding and employee contributions, based on age and date of entry. Employee contributions constitute an annuity savings fund from which a portion of the retirement allowances is paid. Pension expense for the year totaled \$1,425 determined on an actuarial basis. The unfunded past service liability of the entire retirement system was approximately 19 million dollars (approximately 17 million dollars state liability) and is being amortized over a twenty year period terminating in 1993. The value of vested benefits has not been determined.

NOTE 3 - ACCUMULATED UNUSED EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Accumulated unused vacation and sick leave at year end is quite small and does not exceed a normal years accumulation.
