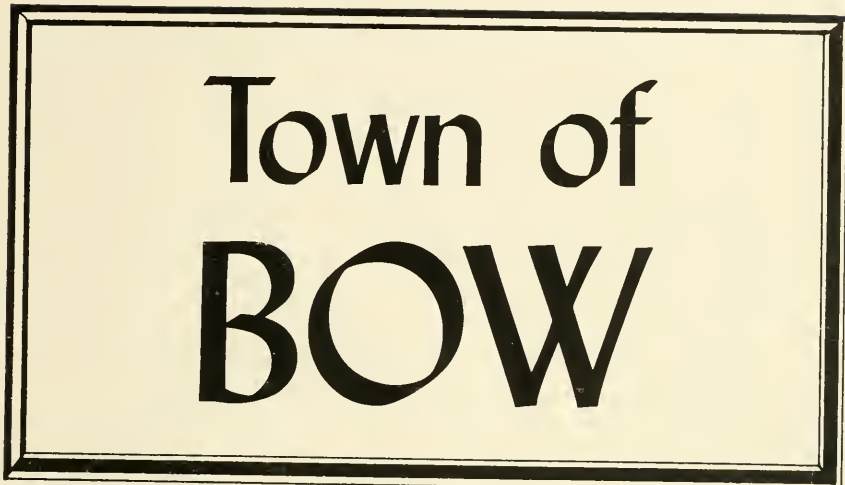

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bow, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Building in said Bow on Tuesday, the 9th of March 1971, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot, and the polls shall open for balloting at ten o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before eight o'clock in the evening. The remaining articles of the warrant shall be acted upon at eight o'clock in the evening or at the closing of the polls if the meeting shall vote to keep the polls open to a later hour.

1. To choose by Non-Partisan Ballot the following town officers:

One Selectman for three years

A Town Treasurer for one year

A Town Clerk for one year

Two members of the Budget Committee for three years

One Library Trustee for five years

One Trustee of Trust Funds for three years

A Sexton for one year

One Water Commissioner for three years

One Sewer Commissioner for three years

2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the Town Accounts.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand two hundred seventy-eight dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$1,278.39) for T. R. A. construction, the State to furnish the amount of eight thousand five hundred twenty-two dollars sixty-three cents (\$8,522.63) to be spent on Allen Road.*

6. To see if the Town will vote to improve the construction of the public highway known as Bow Center Road and Wood Hill Road and raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) for this purpose, the State to furnish matching funds.*

7. To see if the Town will vote to improve the construction of the public highway known as South Bow Road and raise and appropriate the sum of nineteen thousand dollars (\$19,000.00) for this purpose.*

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund

established for alteration, addition, improvement and acquisition of lands for the Baker Free Library.*

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer surplus funds not to exceed fifteen-thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of Highway Equipment.*

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$2,250.00) to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of replacing Police Department Equipment.*

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand six hundred eighty dollars and twenty-five cents (\$1,680.25) as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes.*

12. To see if the Town will vote raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for hiring a recreation director for the Town, and also finance some of the cost of programs under his direction.*

13. To see if the Town will vote to improve the construction of the public Highway known as the Dunklee Road and raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for this purpose.*

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the formation of a committee to investigate the feasibility of constructing an outdoor swimming pool and tennis courts. Members of the committee shall be comprised of the following; one Selectman, one member of the school board, one member of the planning board, and three members to be appointed by the moderator. Said committee shall have the authority to make application for federal "Land and Water Conservation Funds" through the appropriate state agency, it being understood that such application will not in any manner obligate the town. This committee shall issue its report and recommendations at the 1972 town meeting. (by petition)

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for engineering studies and/or architectural drawings which may be required by the committee mentioned in the previous article. (by petition)

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen and chief of police to purchase a cruiser, not to exceed thirty-two hundred and fifty dollars (\$3250.00), and to withdraw said money from the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purpose of replacing Police Department Equipment. Also any money received for the sale from the existing cruiser will be refunded to the said Capital Reserve Fund.*

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract a Sewerage Disposal system study for the Town, and to raise and appropriate the sum of five-thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for this purpose.*

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of the Library to

have an Artesian well and pump installed at the Library on South Street, and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund established for this purpose an amount not to exceed two-thousand dollars (\$2,000.00).*

19. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of composing and publishing a Town History for the Town of Bow, and to raise and appropriate twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for this purpose.*

20. To see if the Town will vote to improve the construction of the public highway known as Albin Road and raise and appropriate the sum of eighteen-thousand five hundred dollars (\$18,500.00) for this purpose.*

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed thirteen thousand six hundred dollars (\$13,600.00) to improve the construction of the bridge on Birchdale Road.*

22. To see if the Town will vote to reestablish a Building Advisory Committee composed of six members to be named by the moderator, two of which will serve for a term of three years, two for two years and two for one year: two members to serve for a term of three years to be named by the moderator annually hereafter beginning with town meeting 1972. This committee shall be active, meeting regularly throughout the year, its purpose being to oversee the Town buildings and advise the Board of Selectmen in the areas of remodeling, reconstructing, maintenance and repair.

23. To hear the reports of standing committees and take any action relating thereto.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOW FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1970, your Fire Department made 52 runs as follows; 4 out of Town assists, 4 house calls, 9 car fires, 7 dump runs, 9 grass and brush runs, 10 miscellaneous runs, Public Service 1, Rice Tire Company 2, Accidents 3, Resusitator runs 2, and Chimney Fires 2.

During 1970, The Department has had an intensive Training program as in the past years. The men have gone to Fire Schools and have had State Instructors in our Station to give different courses in Fire Fighting. Our Training Officer has put a lot of time into training the Firemen and we are pleased with the results.

We are in the process of starting a Fire Prevention Bureau within the Department, to see if we can visit the Industries in Town and inspect and make recommendations to them for any deficiencies they could have in their Buildings. We hope this will help them in keeping their Fire potential at a minimum.

Through a joint effort between the Fire Department, Highway and Police Departments, we installed a communications system that will serve the Town for many years to come. This includes new Base Station Equipment, and a new Radio for each Town Vehicle. The Antenna for this system is located on Wood Hill on Mrs. James Langley's Property. We also put our Alerting system on this new Frequency, and the whole system is working out very well.

Our Auxiliary has been active in our behalf during 1970 with a donation and a nice office chair for our radio room. Many thanks to them for their gifts to the Department.

With Fires on the increase, throughout the Country, and the many new families moving into Bow, our Fire potential keeps on the increase. Through your efforts at home, we hope to keep our fires on the decrease, and hope that if you have any problems, you will notify the Fire Department immediately so we can have a chance to take care of it while it is still small.

Thanks for your cooperation during 1970.

BOW PLANNING BOARD 1970 ANNUAL REPORT

It seems that each year is busier with ever increasing development. Such has been the case this year in Bow. Coupled with the completion of the comprehensive planning report, it has made the busiest year on record with the Board meeting nearly every week with few exceptions.

The major topics have been subdivision, subdivision regulations and zoning. A total of approximately 20 subdivisions of various sizes were approved by the Board last year. This amounts to approximately 51 lots available for sale by 18 different land owners. It is this type of statistics that support the 85% population growth in Bow over the last decade. The Board also reviewed and acted on about 6 industrial and commercial site plans.

In December the Board held a public hearing on newly drafted subdivision regulations. These regulations provide for an upgrading of standards for the layout of streets and lots and details for construction of streets and drainage for new streets. The results of the hearing are presently being evaluated for merit of inclusion in the regulations before adoption by the Board, probably early in 1971.

Two zoning information meetings were held in December, 1970 and January, 1971, and a public hearing on zoning on January 7, 1971. As a result of the hearing, the Board will take adequate time to present the new ordinance to all interested groups prior to a Special Town Meeting to be scheduled in mid 1971. The most controversial part of the new zoning proposal is the 3 acre lot requirement in the outlying parts of Town. The Board is evaluating this and other parts of the ordinance for modifications to an acceptable form. A second public hearing will be held before a vote by ballot at the Special Town Meeting.

The Board wishes to offer its sincere thanks to Mrs. Harold Wagner of Knox Road for the several years of dedicated attendance at Board Meetings while providing stenographic services to the Board.

As to what lies ahead – the coming year will present an ever increasing challenge to the Board and to the Town to provide the planning, guidance and controls needed to assure that the development taking place will become a long term asset to the Town and not a future liability. Adoption of an updated, more comprehensive, zoning proposal and new subdivision regulations would be a step in this direction.

To say the least, such subjects as ecology, environment, and pollution will become the guidelines for future development in Bow, as well as Statewide, and, as such, will require increasing responsibility and participation by all.

BOW HISTORY PROGRESS REPORT – 1970

Nine monthly meetings have been held in the Baker Room of the Baker Free Library. The meetings are usually held the second Monday of the month.

David Bundy was retained as technical assistant for this year. He is a History major at the University of New Hampshire, a third year student.

His endeavors have covered many areas this year, namely:

1. Finished Deeds up to book 239, up to the formation of Merrimack County. Made cards and filed them.
2. Updating of the Early Bow Map.
3. Took a trip to the Baker Library in Boston, at Harvard, concerning the Bow Canal Manuscripts.
4. Attempted to find the lay-out for the Londonderry Turnpike.
5. Copied lay-out of Bow roads at the Archives.
6. Researched the Bow Controversy. Provincial Court Records at New Hampshire Archives. Walker Papers at the New Hampshire Historical Society.

Mr. Fosher has given unstintingly of his time in working with David on the early town maps.

Mr. Blanchard has turned over to the Committee – all early maps from the Library of Congress (photostatic copies) and they are now in the map file. He has been working on “Canals” this year.

Out visitors have been Mr. & Mrs. Roland Barnes of Concord, Richard Hanson and Mrs. Richard Nichols. Interested folks are always welcome. The Bibliography is available to anyone desirous of assisting in one of the numerous categories.

Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Howard had a display at the regular Town Meeting in March. Mrs. Brown was carding and spinning wool, dressed in the mode of the era. Mrs. Howard had on display, many school pictures and other articles relative to schools. Mr. Fosher had a map display with the early lay-outs of the Suncook and Bow Proprietors. Several hundred home made old fashioned cookies were sampled through-out the day.

On March 17, Dr. William Taylor, Professor of American Economic History at Plymouth State College, accepted an invitation from the History Committee. Dr. Taylor was invited for guidance, constructive criticism, and any other suggestions. The two questions asked of Dr. Taylor were: 1. Are we doing what we should be doing? 2. Are we doing what or something we should not be doing?

Dr. Taylor stated; Histories must be written in comparison to events and in relation to its effects on surrounding areas – state and national. He felt we were certainly traveling the right road. The maps David Bundy and Mr. Fosher have been working on, were an integral part of any town history, very valuable. The

card file was definitely a valuable source of compiled data. Beginning this history at an early date is certainly advantageous.

Dr. Taylor noted that who-ever writes the history would want the collaborator close by and again stressed this should be done in relation to the state. These are but a few of his valued comments.

Mrs. Howard and Mrs. Brown re-played taped interviews they had made with Mr. John Foote, Mr. Harry Clough, Mrs. Millie White, Mrs. Eva Alexander, and Mrs. Edna McNamara.

Pictures of the Bow Brick Yard No. 2 were loaned by Dr. Ursula Sanders. Copies have been made.

Dr. and Mrs. J. Duane Squires, Dr. Squires recently retired from the Department of Social Studies at Colby Junior College, and an author of note in his own right, attended the July meeting at the invitation of the Committee.

Mr. Foshier gave Dr. Squires a brief resume of the several areas in which our efforts have been expended: Grantee-Grantor records, schools, mills, interviews, maps, cemeteries, newspapers, churches, canals, and houses; followed by the two questions asked of Dr. Taylor.

Dr. Squires stated the committee is definitely traveling the right road and has done an outstanding piece of work to date. He recommended that we have as many pictures as possible for interest sake. All town officers should be enumerated from 1727 to date. (Mrs. Howard's present project) There should be a judgement of the relationship of the Town of Bow to New Hampshire and the United States.

It will take at least a year to write this history. Our next problem is to find a person capable of writing this lengthy story. A true history of the town of Bow has never been written. Dr. and Mrs. Squires' visit was one of the highlights of the year.

Following these two interviews, the History Committee sees the need, and is requesting a Capital Reserve Account be established for the writing and printing.

Dr. Squires made a gift to the Committee, an autographed copy of "Mirror To America", a history of New London, N. H., 1900-1950. These Historians are not available for writing the history; but their interest will continue.

A synopsis of "History of Education in Bow", as compiled by Muriel C. Howard has been printed in booklet form and is available at a minimal price of \$2.00. First copies were available at the Dedication of the Bow Memorial School on September 19, 1970.

Mr. Paul Nadeau was present at the November meeting to project slides made from pictures made available by Mr. Robert Morgan of Concord, Mrs. James Langley, Miss Doris Tappan, Mrs. Millie White, and the Messrs. Henry Cheney, Harry Flanders, Hiel Albee, Donald Foote, Mrs. Nira Young and Mrs. Howard. Copies of these slides are being printed for projection at some future public meeting.

Your History Committee is still looking for volunteers with good eyes, lots of curiosity, and sheer determination. 1977 is the date for completion.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Bow Memorial School in said District on the 12th day of March, 1971, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
2. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
4. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to contract with the Concord Union School District and any other school districts for the tuition of Bow pupils of said District at an amount necessary to provide therefore.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Bow School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, which was made by this Division. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer, and the School Lunch Account.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets, as of June 30, 1969, and June 30, 1970, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the financial condition of the School District changed from a Surplus of \$6,896.86, to a Net Debt of \$1,190,177.79 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$1,921.66, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$7,587.43, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$9,509.09.

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer’s balance as of June 30, 1970, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

School Building Fund Account: (Exhibit B-3)

The Activity in the School Building Fund account for the fiscal year is disclosed in Exhibit B-3.

Statement of School Lunch Account: (Exhibit C)

A statement of the School Lunch account for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit C.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit D)

A statement of the School District Tax account with the Town of Bow for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, is presented in Exhibit D. As indicated therein, at June 30, 1970, the School District had received from the Town the total of the 1969-70 School Tax in the amount of \$794,111.55, plus an advance on the 1970-71 School Tax of \$335,000.00, for a total of \$1,129,111.55.

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit E)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1970, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit E.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$2,925.35, from \$6,896.86 to \$9,822.21, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, as shown herewith:

Treasurer:

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Bow:

I herewith submit my ninth annual report relative to the Bow Memorial School:

Enrollment

The September 1970 enrollment in the Bow Memorial School grades K – 8 was 535 students and the high school tuition students in the Concord School System numbered 202 in grades 9 – 12.

The following table indicates the growth in the last eight years:

Bow Memorial School Outstanding

Bow received outstanding recognition in that the Bow Memorial School Addition Plans have been selected from nation-wide entries to be exhibited at the Convention of the American Association of School Administrators which will be held in Convention Hall, Atlantic City, N. J. in February 1971.

The Bow Memorial School Addition Plans and exterior and interior photographs will be on exhibit in the Outstanding Schools of America Exhibit as selected by a committee of the American Institute of Architects.

The week long exhibit is the largest of its kind in the world and has world-wide participation of more than 35,000 educators, architects and exhibitors.

Bow Memorial School Addition

The year 1970 will be a memorable one in the history of Bow with the completion and dedication of the Bow Memorial School one and half million dollar addition. Roy W. Peaslee, Chairman of the School Board, served as Chairman of the dedication exercises on September 19, 1970. Attorney William S. Green Chairman of the N.H. State Board of Education in which he commended the building committee, the school board and the community for the planning and construction of a modern and flexible facility to well serve the educational needs of the youth of the community. The Honorable James C. Cleveland, Congressman, brought the greetings and congratulations of his office

and presented a flag, which had flown over the nation's capital, to the school. Carl B. Smith, Chairman of the Bow School Building Committee, expressed appreciation for the enthusiastic work of the committee members: Morris C. Foote, Anne Gwynne, Richard D. Hanson, Roy F. Person and Leonard C. Wood and the School Board Roy Peaslee Chairman, Muriel Howard and Richard Nichols and the administrators. He also acknowledged the participation of Dr. Robert Anderson of the Harvard Graduate School of Education, Educational Consultant, Warren H. Ashley, Architect, Blanchard Stebbins, Inc. Contractor and the citizens of Bow.

Six hundred citizens and guests attending the dedication inspected and endorsed the new open concept school – without walls which opened its doors to more than 500 eager and approving students in September 1970.

The Citizens of Bow are to be congratulated in providing a facility that is flexible in meeting the changing educational needs of the youth of Bow.

Resource Center

The Resource Center of the Bow Memorial School is designed to provide a warm attractive atmosphere where learning from a variety of materials and media can take place. The Resource Center contains thousands of volumes of books, yet is much more than just a library. The Resource Center under the direction of Nelson Evans, Resource Center Coordinator, is a center for all of the resources necessary to provide the student with information regarding a given topic. Aside from books, the Resource Center has available for student use, television, tape recordings, records, filmstrips, slides, study prints and realia. Students in the primary through the upper grade levels are able to use these materials, on their own, or with supervision, to extract information necessary to complete a given project. Student carrells provide for individual instruction and small group instruction takes place at the larger tabled areas. The Resource Center affords a multi-media approach to the individualization of instruction. Provision has been made for a balanced library complying in the near future with the American Library Association Standards for elementary school libraries and for proven up-to-date audio-visual equipment and materials.

Remedial Reading Program

Under the supervision of Mrs. Helen Sideris, Reading Specialist, students in the Bow Memorial School enjoy an opportunity to participate in the Remedial Reading Program.

The Program admitted 41 pupils in September of 1970. These pupils have average or above average ability and in the opinion of their teachers were not achieving commensurate with their abilities in May of 1970.

In groups of five to seven pupils, the children meet for approximately forty minutes each day. This instruction supplements the developmental reading instruction which is received daily in the regular classroom, and it includes levels two through six. Since it is essential that reading problems be recognized and

remediated as soon as possible, more than half of the remedial reading pupils are accepted from the primary grades.

Upon admittance in September, participants are given standardized achievement tests in reading as well as informal tests to determine the nature of their disabilities. Whenever additional information was needed, the Wechsler Intelligence Scale for Children was administered individually.

Teachers and parents have been kept informed regarding individual progress through conferences, and written reports are sent to the parents at the end of each marking period. In addition, booklists and suggestions for parents were developed and sent home upon their request. To serve the best interests of the child, team conferences have included the principal, teachers, school nurse, the psychologist and any other staff members involved with the welfare of the child.

By November several pupils had been dismissed and new ones were admitted to replace them. At the time of this writing, mid-year testing is approaching, and it is expected that the results will show that additional pupils are ready to return to their regular classroom.

Mr. Sideris states that it is especially gratifying to report that the program is generously equipped with the necessary materials and the audio-visual aids required for remedial purposes, and that the cooperation of those persons involved with our children has been outstanding.

**Roy Peaslee, School Board Chairman
Honored**

The New Hampshire School Boards Association named Roy Peaslee, Bow School Board Chairman, as one of the outstanding N. H. School Board Members for 1970.

Mr. Peaslee received the honor for twelve years of dedicated service in behalf of the educational welfare of the children of Bow.

On behalf of the administration I wish to congratulate Mr. Peaslee upon receiving the honor and to express our appreciation for his untiring efforts, endless energy and realistic goals to be attained in the Bow educational effort. We further wish him every success and happiness as he retires from his school board duties.

VOTED: That Article 5 be accepted. – To authorize the school board to make application, for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States, provided such grants do not jeopardize local control of our system.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously

VOTED: That Article 6 be accepted as read – To authorize the sale of the Bow Mills School and land (including its sewage right of way and sewage field) to the Town of Bow for public uses for the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) and to authorize the Chairman of the School Board to sign, seal and deliver a suitable deed to carry out this article.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was

VOTED: That Article 7 be accepted. – To withdraw from the Capitol Reserve Fund for buses, the sum of Six Thousand Dollars, (\$6,000.00) to apply toward the purchase of buses.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was

VOTED: That Article 8 be accepted as read. – To raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Two Thousand One Hundred and Sixty Dollars and Four Cents. (\$1,002,160.04)

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was

VOTED: To Adjourn at 9:07 P. M.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Bow for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audits must be given the Town Clerk as part of the permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Baker Free Library, Fire Department and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1969 and December 31, 1970: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets, as of December 31, 1969 and December 31, 1970, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the surplus of the Town increased by \$17,041.19, from \$279.59 at December 31, 1969 to \$17,320.78 at December 31, 1970.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures – Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$10,425.36, plus a revenue surplus of \$11,610.47 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$22,035.83.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1970, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1970 is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the outstanding long term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1970, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$7,958.81 during the year, from \$38,219.53 to \$30,260.72, as shown herewith:

Sale of Real Estate for Delinquent Taxes:

The attention of the Tax Collector is directed to the provisions of R. S. A 80:20 which requires that real estate be sold by the Collector for all unpaid taxes. There should be no discrimination in this matter. Without exception, the real estate of every taxpayer whose taxes are delinquent should be sold at the Collector's tax sales.

Change Cash Funds:

The Town Clerk/Tax Collector should be provided with a change cash fund in accordance with accepted business practices. The creation of this fund will eliminate the necessity of withholding cash from tax collections and receipts of motor vehicle permit fees for the purpose of making change, and consequently receipts from these sources will be remitted intact to the Treasurer as required by law.

Withholding and Social Security Tax Deductions:

All wages paid by the Town are subject to deduction for withholding and social security taxes. This requirement applies to all employees equally, whether employment is on a permanent, part time or temporary basis.

Security Deposits or Advance Payment Recommended on Sales of Materials and Supplies:

To avert any loss of Town funds which could result because of the refusal or inability of customers to pay for goods or services received from various Town departments, it is

recommended that suitable deposits or advance payments be required in each case prior to delivery of goods or rendering of services requested.

Additionally, the Town should not act as a purchasing department for the acquisition of supplies, tools or equipment by Town officials, residents or private contractors. Federal regulations prohibit any resale by the Town of items on which federal excise taxes have been exempted due to the Town's municipal status.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955 require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in the audit report is optional, at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Bow for their assistance during the course of the audit.
