THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bristol, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bristol on Tuesday, the ninth (9th) day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years and choose all other necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Highways and Bridges for the year ensuing and make appropriation of the same.

4. To see if the Town will ask for Town Aid Road, and if so raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and fifty-nine dollars and sixty-five cents (\$359.65).

(Provided this amount is raised by the Town, the State will contribute the sum of one thousand four hundred and thirty-eight dollars and sixty cents (\$1,438.60).

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand four hundred dollars (\$1,400.00) to replank Bristol's half of the lower bridge across the Pemigewasset River.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Construction and Maintenance of Side-

walks for the year ensuing, and make appropriation of the same.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Construction and Maintenance of Sewers for the year ensuing and make appropriation of the same.

8. Agreeably to the vote of the Town at the annual Town Meeting, March 8, 1921, to elect five (5) members of the Budget Committee for the term of three years, and fill any vacancies in said committee.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) for the observance of Memorial Day, and make appropriation of the same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and forty-eight dollars (\$248.00) to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire to assist in Planning and Development of the Town and for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and newspaper and magazine advertising calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Civilian Defense purposes.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to employ a part-time playground director and purchase necessary equipment for summer playground activities.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) each for the Laconia Hospital and the Franklin Hospital.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to buy a truck to be used for transporting forest fire fighting equipment.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to buying or renting equipment for snow removal.

17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue full time police protection and instruct the selectmen to make such arrangements as they see fit, as to terms and conditions.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

As the tempo of America's war effort mounts, demands upon its citizens for service become more numerous and exacting. To some comes the call to arms; others to public service and still others to defense industries and organizations. No one can possibly escape if he would. All must bear a proportionate share of the burden and the sacrifice. Strong first line fronts on land, sea and in the air are needed and can be developed and maintained **only if there is unity of purpose and common determination behind the home front.**

As men are drawn into service the burden of carrying on rests more heavily upon those who remain at home. Here, team work becomes increasingly important because of constantly diminishing manpower. A general breakdown in essential local activities and law observance can only be prevented by whole hearted cooperation between citizens and leaders.

There is no field of endeavor where cooperation and compliance with law and regulation are more needed than that of forest fire control. The most effective and economical effort in this field of activity is that of prevention. The old adage "an ounce of prevention" being "worth a pound of cure" was never more aptly applied than to forest fire control.

The forest fire warden is, by law, the designated local leader in forest fire matters. He exercises his prerogatives and discharges his duties as such under the direction of the District Chief and the State Forester.

The State Forester is the State Coordinator; the District Chiefs are District Coordinators and the Warden is the Local Coordinator. The Forest Fire Fighters Service personnel will be registered under the direction of the Office of Civilian Defense; it will be trained by the warden and other assistants, aided by

the District Chief. Individual citizens are urged to join this service group by applying to the forest fire warden or to the Civilian Defense Chairman. By becoming a part of this organization locally, individuals can contribute their share toward the protection of our forest resources which are so vital to the war job.

It is recommended that the small amount of \$25.00 be made available for the purchase and keeping in repair small forest fire hand tools. These small tools can be obtained through the State Department at one half the cost to the state.

During this critical period it is more than ever the part of good and prudent citizenship to remember

1. That permission to burn in or near woodland or where fire may be communicated to woodland must be secured from the forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

2. To be careful when smoking in or near the woods and not to throw or drop lighted cigars, cigarettes or matches.

3. To notify your local warden promptly of any fire you see.

4. That fire prevention is the best and cheapest fire insurance.

5. To be fire-minded; be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden prevent forest fires. **This is patriotism at work.**

MINOT-SLEEPER LIBRARY—REPORT OF TRUSTEES

This year Minot-Sleeper Library has felt, in a slight degree, the unsettled conditions of the country and has endeavored in every way possible to conform to such government regulations as are required and at the same time serve its patrons with a minimum of inconvenience. The doors and windows of the library building have been completely weather stripped, making it more resistant to cold and inclement weather and effecting a saving in fuel. Arrangements have been made to convert the heating equipment from oil to wood as soon as it becomes necessary to do so. Also as an aid in fuel conservation it was thought advisable to close the library on Mondays during the cold weather. The trustees are grateful to the public for their cooperation in meeting this emergency.

The library has greatly benefited from the donations from the Agnes M. Lindsay Residuary Trust, for which it is most grateful. The amount of \$200 received in January last year for the purchase of books has made possible the addition of some new reference books and an unusual number of fiction and non-fiction reading. A second gift of \$200 was received in August. This has been invested for the present and will be known as the Lindsay Fund.

Miss Catharine Pratt, secretary of the State Library Commission, came to the library on November 4 and gave valuable assistance to the Book Committee in the discarding and rearranging of books. This is necessary from time to time that the reading material may be kept as up to date and workable as possible.

The magazines supplied from the Minnie Maria Day—Jackman Fund are Field and Stream, Boy's Life,

American Girl, American Magazine, Atlantic Monthly, Child Life, Good Housekeeping, National Geographic, Time, Jack and Jill, Popular Science, Reader's Digest, Ladies' Home Journal, Cosmopolitan, Better Homes and Gardens, Modern Mechanics and Invention, Life, Harpers, Saturday Evening Post, Liberty, Christian Century.

The trustees are endeavoring to conduct the management of the library in a way that will best serve the readers of Bristol and vicinity and gladly welcome any suggestions and requests from its patrons.
