SELECTMEN'S REPORT-1992

Nineteen-Ninety-Two has been an eventful year. All-in-all it's been a good year. We note with regret, the passing of an exemplary "citizen": Marguerite Dutton. Marguerite served in many capacities in the town, but more than that, was a model of steadfastness, straight-forwardness and strong "Yankee" character.

The single outstanding evidence of the revival of public *esprit de corps*, is the repainting and decorating of the Town Hall. "Thank you, and well done" to the Friends of Deering and other volunteers for their labor of love for the Town of Deering in accomplishing this excellent work.

The selectmen have, in answer to the Town's wishes, hired a full time Chief of Police, Michael La Chappelle, and are back on a healthy patrol schedule. The new Chief is a professional law enforcement officer in every way and it has reflected well on the town. Today we have strong mutual aid agreements and Deering enjoys the respect of Fire and Police personnel in surrounding towns. The Deering Volunteer Fire and Rescue continues to earn the gratitude and respect of our citizens.

The erection of a cellular-One tower on Clarke Summit was an event of concern to many citizens and was handled by the Zoning Board of Appeals in such a way as to benefit all parties involved. The ZBA seems to have matured and has a responsible handle on Land Use.

A new secretary has taken charge of many of the administrative duties of the town office. The atmosphere of cooperation, professionalism and friendliness in the office has been noted by a number of regular clientele having business there. The new secretary has overseen the installation and implementation of several advanced programs that will continue to help the town track and conserve money.

While the working relationships among town personnel has vastly improved, there is much in the infrastructure of the town that has not. The Town roads continue to deteriorate. This is not due to inadequate care by the town Highway Department, within the limits of our budget, but is largely due to choices we have made to reduce or limit tax burdens. It must be noted, however, that some of the town's roads are borderline and may beg action from residents and travelers utilizing these roads.

The Town voted to vinyl-side the front face of the building and it has been completed. There's little question but that it made the building look better. The issue of doing something about the remainder of the building looms before us.

Every effort to hold down spending, in light of increased taxes, has been made by the selectmen and heads of departments. This has resulted in a surplus of approximately, one hundred thousand dollars.

Perhaps the most encouraging item to note is the high level of mutual respect and cooperation among Town officials and employees: this in spite of being nailed week after week in one or more of the local papers. Public service can be a rewarding experience, but it's not without a price. It is our conclusion that every citizen ought to be encouraged to serve in some way. If everyone contributes in a *constructive* way, our Town can become an even better place to live.

Work at Goodall has progressed so that more regular maintenance will be possible. Scheduled for brush work and some stone restoration will be the Gove Cemetery, near Wolf Hill.

DEERING CONSERVATION COMMISSION
REPORT FOR 1992

The Deering Conservation Commission (DCC) was very active in 1992 despite the fact that commission appointments remained unfilled for the entire year. The commission's charge is to conserve, protect and enhance the natural resources of the Town of Deering. It is the commission's feeling that education and public involvement in the process are essential elements required to achieve this goal.

The DCC has continued its annual duties which include; reviewing Dredge and Fill Permits, investigating wetlands violations, sponsorship of the annual spring cleanup day, sponsorship, coordination and participation in the Lay Lakes Monitoring Program for Deering Reservoir, continuation of the Wood Duck Restoration Program, participation in the Monadnock Regional Conservation Committee, participation on the Contoocook River Management Committee, Monitoring Conservation easements and providing information and guidance to private citizens, organizations and various town agencies.

The year of 1992 also saw the DCC involved with the nomination of the Piscataquoq River into the New Hampshire Rivers Management Program, investigating a possible public access site to the Contoocook River and initiation of negotiations with state agencies and citizens to develop a recreational use management plan for land in West Deering. The commission also sponsored a science teacher from the Hillsboro-Deering Middle School to attend a teachers conservation education camp. It is our hope that this camp will enable the teacher to more effectively convey the principles and values of conservation to our children..

The DCC looks forward to continued progress in 1993 and hopes that interested citizens of the Town of Deering will step forward to fill the vacancies on the commission. The natural resources of the Town of Deering are what makes it a special and unique place and protection and proper use of these resources are paramount to maintaining our towns character and sustaining our way of life.

DEERING POLICE DEPARTMENT

There has been a lot of changes in your Police Department since I was hired as your Chief in July of 1992. February of 1993 the Police Department moved from its crowded one room office to a larger two-room facility located upstairs in the Town Hall. The man power used to construct the new facility was donated by members of the Deering Police Department.

I have also initiated a change in the way the scheduling of patrol hours had been conducted. This change has enabled the Deering Police Department to respond to your calls for service in a timely fashion. This change has also cut down on the times the Department had to rely on the State Police to answer your calls, which at times would be over an hour response time simply because of the location of the State Police unit when it received the call. I have checked the records for the month of January 1991, 1992 and January 1993, and found that the State Police had been called 17 times in 1991, 20 times in 1992 and only 4 times in 1993. I hope to make further strides in this area.

The Department is also in the process of making major improvements on its policies and procedures. The new policies and procedures are designed to provide workable guidelines that will help your officers deal with critical situations they encounter in the course of their duties. Also through this process the department is hoping to become accredited in the future.

On behalf of the Deering Police Department, I would like to thank the residents of Deering for their continued support and involvement. The Police Department can not accomplish the mission with which it is charged unless the community it serves supports and involves it self with the problems we face.

The Deering Police Departments "MISSION STATEMENT" is stated as follows:

The essential purpose of the Deering Police Department is to protect life and the rights of all persons within its jurisdiction to be free from criminal attack, to be secure in their possessions, and to live in peace. The Department serves the people of Deering, New Hampshire, by performing the law enforcement function in a professional manner, and it is to these people that the Department is ultimately responsible.

I would also like to thank all the members of the Department for their devotion to service, integrity, and pursuit of professionalism with the training and resources available.

1992 DEERING FIRE & RESCUE REPORT

The Deering Fire and Rescue has responded to a reduced number of calls this year. We hope this trend continues in the following year. The decrease was in all types of calls except, rescues. Mutual aid was given, and also received from Hillsborough, Weare, Antrim, Bennington, and Francestown.

The breakdown of the types of calls we responded to are as follows: Structures-3, Brush Fires-3, Mutual Aid calls-7, Motor Vehicle Accidents-3, Chimney Fires-4, Wires Down-2, Car Fire-1, Service Call-1, and False Alarms-2. This is a total of 26 calls that were toned. Myself, and other members of the Department also were called to check another 17 calls for reports of smoke, illegal burns, and other non-toned problems called in by dispatch, police or residents of town.

We purchased the tanker chasis, and the tanker will be in service by mid January. The Department has had a full year, with much training going on in all phases of Fire and Rescue. The Deering Fire, and Rescue is losing a great asset this year in the form of Deputy Chief Joe McLaughlin. Joe is moving out of the area in January to pursue his career. He has served the Town on the Fire and Rescue for over eleven years in various positions. The Department, and the Town thank Joe for his years of dedicated service.

The Deering Fire and Rescue depend on your input and support to make this a Department you can all be proud of. The Department wishes to thank everyone for making this a fire safe year. This is your Fire and Rescue, and as in the past, if you have any questions or input, please feel free to call me, the Board of Selectmen or the Board of Fire Wards. The members of the Deering Fire and Rescue hope you will all have a healthy, and fire safe 1993 year.

DEERING RESCUE SQUAD REPORT

The Deering Rescue Squad responded to 79 calls in 1992, a 9.7% increase in runs from the previous year. This continues a trend established in 1990 of a rising number of calls per year. Of these calls, 24 were the result of Trauma, 44 Medical Emergencies, and 11 Fire Calls.

While responses were on the rise, some of our expectations fell short. For instance, none of our members were able to complete the EMT-Intermediate program as we had hoped, and our goal of certifying the entire Fire Department in CPR was not attained. However, our members participated in hours of In-House training, as well as attending various classes including High Angle Rescue, Advanced High Angle Rescue, Below Grade/Confined Space Rescue, Auto Extrication, and an Ambulance Operator's class. Those with Advanced Life Support qualifications re-certified with the Esophageal Obturator Airway (EDA) and every six months take part in their Defibrillation re-certification. The majority of Firefighters successfully completed the CPR class, and in addition, all but our newest member received the Hepatitis B vaccine.

Our membership has dropped somewhat, leaving us with only eight Licensee Attendants. Attempting to add to this number of EMS Providers will be one of our objectives for the upcoming year.

In closing, on behalf of the Rescue Squad members, I would like to thank all of the townspeople of Deering for their continued generous support, and to remind all of you to keep your emergency phone numbers handy and do not hesitate to call upon us at any time, day or night.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND
STATE FOREST RANGER

1992 was below average for wildfires reported in our state. Our largest fire was in May in Rumney where a suspicious origin fire burned approximately 150 acres with a total cost of approximately \$30,000. The N.H. Division of Forests and Lands assisted many other communities in wildland fire suppression as well.

Our fire lookout towers reported 289 fires, burning a total of 136 acres. Our major causes of fires were fires kindled without a permit, unknown causes and children.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done. Violation of this statute is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are liable for all fire suppression cost.

Local fire departments are responsible for suppressing fires. The small average fire size of .47 acre/fire is a tribute to early detection by the public or our fire tower system and the quick response of our trained local fire departments. Please help your Warden and fire department by requesting and obtaining a fire permit before kindling an open fire.

The N.H. Division of Forests and Lands assisted 28 towns with a total of \$20,000 in 50/50 cost share grants for fire fighter safety items and wildland suppression equipment in 1992.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT
1992

The Deering Board of Adjustment received seven petitions during 1992. Three special exceptions for a convenience store, a non-profit elementary school, and a cellular communications tower, were granted, each with conditions. The communications tower petition received particular public attention and required a rehearing to consider changes in specifications reducing overall height from 198' to 135'. The ZBA denied one petition for variance and granted three. One variance was appealed for rehearing suspended, and ordered reheard (in 1993). Informational conferences were held with several owners and prospective lessees or owners.

The tower special exception and the appealed variance involved legal issues requiring advice of Town counsel. As a result, the Board exceeded its budget for 1992 and probably 1993, despite a by-law change in 1992 increasing application fees. Provision for future legal costs will have to be considered, either through an increased budget or through higher or special fees for interested parties.

A revised home business section of the Zoning Ordinance which would have clarified the types of home businesses ordinarily permitted in the residential district, including production or sale of articles, services and professional activities, was developed by the ZBA but rejected by the Planning Board.

CENTRAL NEW HAMPSHIRE REGIONAL
PLANNING COMMISSION

The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is a voluntary association of 19 towns and the City of Concord in Merrimack and Hillsborough Counties. The Town of Deering is a member in good standing of the Commission.

Our principle charge is to prepare a coordinated plan for the region, while providing planning assistance to member communities.

Our accomplishments over the last year include:

The Commission adopted the Housing Element of the Regional Master Plan in September. The plan identifies housing needs in the region, the role of the CNHRPC in housing, and methods to address housing in towns and cities.

The regional transportation plan is the focus of our current fiscal year. We intend to complete the plan and our first ever transportation improvement program (TIP), the capital improvement plan for transportation in the region.

The plans of the nine regions form the basis for the state transportation plan. The state plan will become increasingly dependent on regional plans for data, public involvement, and transportation alternatives.

If the region and its communities are to maintain and improve its transportation infrastructure, we must approach consensus on our transportation priorities, both in terms of general objectives and in terms of specific projects. The input of every community is therefore critical, so we intend to devote considerable effort to public input on the plan and TIP.

In 1992 the CNHRPC published, the Cooperative Purchases and Municipal Services Study in which we identified the range of services provided by our communities, the general purchasing methods used, sources of information on improved purchasing methods, and the level of interest in cooperative purchases and services delivery in each community.

The Commission continues to provide high quality and timely services to member municipalities through circuit riding, master plan assistance, research, and other technical assistance.

Specific activities in Deering included: providing copies of legislation, CNHRPC model zoning, subdivision, site plan regulations, zoning amendment schedule for 1993, consulting on revocation of approval of subdivision with uncompleted road planning board training for the review and processing of development applications, consulting with ZBA on proposed communications tower, providing information of commuting patterns and population projections.

March 10, 1992

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Deering qualified to vote in Town Affairs was called to order at 11:00 AM in the morning of March 10, 1992.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Total ballots cast - 375.

ARTICLE 2. Do you approve of having 2 sessions for the annual Town Meeting of this town, the first session for choice of town officers elected by an official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the selectmen, for transaction of other business? Yes - 185, No - 165.

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of increasing the board of selectmen to 5 members? Yes - 116; No - 250.

At 7:30 P.M. Charles A. Gaides, Moderator, opened the meeting with a salute to the flag, followed by a moment of silence. The Moderator then read the following Rules for the Town Meeting:

1. If you wish to be recognized, just raise your hand.
2. When you are recognized, please stand and state your full name.
3. You now have the floor and may speak without interruptions.
4. You must address the issue at hand or you will be considered out of order.

5. If others desire to comment on what is being said they should raise their hands and when the person speaking is finished they will be recognized.

6. Everyone will have an opportunity to speak and with this in mind the motion to close debate will not be recognized.

7. If you are making a motion or an amendment the Moderator must receive a printed copy.

8. There shall be no more than two (2) amendments at one time. Once we have two we will vote on them.

9. To question a ruling of the Moderator requires seven (7) voters.

10. Only one (1) reconsideration of an article will be recognized.

11. There shall be no substantive motions on the last article.

It was voted to complete the article under consideration at 11:00 PM and to adjourn the meeting at that time.

ARTICLE 4. It was voted to accept the reports of the town officials, agents, committees and auditors for the year 1991, after an amendment to delete the Selectmen's report was defeated.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to indemnify and save harmless all employees of the Town, (per RSA 31:105), and any member or officer of its governing board, administrative staff or agencies including but not limited to selectmen, school board members, city councilors and aldermen, town and city managers, regional planning commissioners, and superintendents of schools from personal financial loss and expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to or destruction of property if the indemnified person at the time of the accident resulting in the injury, damage or destruction was acting in the scope of his/her employment or office. No motion was made on this thus the article was dead.

ARTICLE 6. It was voted to go through each item separately. Item 1 was amended to read \$42,000. Item 2 was amended to \$17,000, which was later reconsidered and voted \$23,704. Item 11 was amended to \$500. By a paper ballot, (Yes - 110; No - 75), it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$161,045 for general town operations:

At 11:00 PM it was voted to adjourn and reconvene on Wednesday, March 11th at 7:00 PM.

Moderator, Charles Gaides reconvened the meeting at 7:00 PM on Wednesday, March 11, 1992 with a salute to the flag and a moment of silence.

A move to reconsider Article 6 was defeated.

ARTICLE 7. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,000 for payment of interest expense.

ARTICLE 8. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400 for covering the front of the town hall with vinyl siding.

ARTICLE 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,975 for the Fire and Rescue Department current operating expenses.

ARTICLE 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800 for the replacement of two (2) overhead doors in CO 2 station.

ARTICLE 11. By a paper ballot, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45,000 for the replacement of 84K2 tanker and authorize the withdrawal of \$10,000 plus accrued interest from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of \$35,000 to come from general taxation. Yes - 112; No - 39.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, or to take any other action relating thereto. Chief Edes recommended withdrawal of Article 12, which was done.

ARTICLE 13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$243,301 for the maintenance and general expenses of the highway department.

ARTICLE 14. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,542 for the second year lease of a pick-up truck for the use of the highway department.

At this time a motion to adjourn at 11:00 PM was defeated.

ARTICLE 15. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500 for the upgrading and repairs to the Osh Kosh.

ARTICLE 16. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000 for gravel purchase/crushing/ screening.

ARTICLE 17. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300 for stabilization and calcium chloride treatment of Longwoods road (1.3 miles).

ARTICLE 18. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$36,000 for the excavating, back-filling, compacting, calcium chloride treatment, and paving of 3/10 mile of 2nd N.H. Turnpike.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for the purchase and modification of a used truck to replace the 1970 GMC truck. This article was defeated.

At this time it was voted to adjourn at 11:00 PM to reconvene at 7:00 PM on Wednesday, March 18th.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 18, 1992

The Moderator reconvened the Town Meeting at 7:00 PM, with a salute to the flag and a moment of silent prayer.

A motion was made and voted in the affirmative not to reconsider any articles from previous meetings.

A motion was made to allow a non-registered resident to participate in the meeting. After RSA 669:5 was read which made this motion illegal, it was withdrawn.

A motion was then made to change the Moderator's rules regarding reconsideration. This was defeated.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to rescind article #15 from 1991 Town Meeting which created a full time police chief position. This article was defeated.

It was voted at this time to consider Articles 21, 22, 23, and 24 at the same time since all these articles pertained to the Police Dept.

A motion was made to pass over Articles 21 and 24 relating to a part-time Police Department.

It was voted to pass over Article 23 relating to a full time Police Department.

ARTICLE 22. By amendment it was voted to raise and appropriate \$62,110 for a full time Police Department current operating expense.

A motion to reconsider Article 22 was defeated.

At this time it was voted to ask one of the part time officers present to answer questions regarding their duties. Officer Mark Plummer came forward to address the meeting.

ARTICLE 25. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$76,443.50 for the following solid waste expenses:

1. Penacook tipping fees	22,000.00
(Guaranteed Annual Tonnage x Tipping fee)	
2. 1992 Hillsboro Transfer Station	51,489.00
(Deering's share to be determined by dividing the sum of the equalized evaluation of both Deering & Hillsboro into the cost of the landfill's operation and multiplying the result by Deering's equalized evaluation)	
3. Trash & refuse removal expenses	800.00
4. Hillsboro Septic Contract fee	2,000.00
5. NH Resource Recovery Assoc.	154.50

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$6,400 for the costs incurred for the project of demolition and removal of the old fire company #3 shed and the disposal of the gravel from the old tanks. This article was defeated with the recommendation that trucking the fill to the Hillsboro Landfill be done on regular Road Crew time.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 for a landfill closing capital reserve fund. This article was defeated with the recommendation that the Selectmen consider bonding for the Landfill closing.

ARTICLE 28. It was voted to instruct the Selectmen that starting July 1, 1992, that all employees shall be charged 20% of their employee medical & surgical insurance plans and 20% of all dependent coverage or to change to another plan that effects a 20% reduction.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to have the property appraisal division of the department of revenue administration conduct a reappraisal and valuation of all taxable property in the Town of Deering. By a hand vote, (Yes 74, No 88) this article was defeated.

ARTICLE 30. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for a Town reappraisal capital reserve fund.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the combined salary of Tax Collector/Town Clerk and Deputy Town Clerk/Tax Collector, if one is appointed, in lieu of the existing salary plus fee compensation. All money collected via fees, licenses, tax liens and motor vehicle registrations to be turned into town treasury on a monthly basis.

Since this article was not a binding one until the present term of the Town Clerk/Tax Collector ends, the Moderator suggested it be passed over. It was voted that the article be considered, and was defeated by a ballot vote (Yes 102, No 43). It was also suggested that an advisory committee be chosen by the Selectmen to study general town operations.

ARTICLE 32. It was voted that the Town will not rescind Article #30 that was voted at the 1990 Town Meeting, concerning the acceptance of the roads in the Deering Green subdivision, and recommend the Deering Green Subdivision revocation.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept as Class V, Ridgeview Road in the Deering Green subdivision on the condition that said road meet a set of specifications recommended by a certified engineering firm and approved by the highway foreman, planning board, and board of selectmen. Any costs incurred in the upgrade and engineering fees will NOT be borne by the Town of Deering. It was voted to pass over this article.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will accept an additional 763' of Tubbs Hill Road (between the Beideman barn to Continental Cablevision's new driveway) as Class V town highway. This article was lost for want of motion.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote pursuant to NH RSA 80:80 to authorize the Board of Selectmen to retain for public use or to sell, either by private sale to the previous owner form which title was obtained through the Tax Collector's Deed or by public auction, and for such price and upon such terms as in their judgment may seem best, any real estate or interest therein, to which the Town has obtained or shall obtain title by Tax Collector's Deed for the nonpayment of taxes, and further that during the period when title to said property

shall be held by the Town, that the Selectmen be given authority to rent, use or administer the same as in their judgment may seem best. This vote shall supercede any previous votes of the Town inconsistent with the powers conferred herein, and shall remain in full force and effect until rescinded by future action of the Town Meeting. Negative Vote.

ARTICLE 36. It was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 37. By amendment, it was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to accept or purchase, with appropriated moneys, on behalf of the town any federal or state surplus equipment.

ARTICLE 38. By amendment it was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to sell any surplus town property by public auction, such moneys to be deposited into the general fund.

ARTICLE 39. By amendment it was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to accept any land or interest in land donated to the town, subject to environmental hazard assessment.

ARTICLE 40. It was voted to authorize the board of selectmen to accept on behalf of the town, gifts, legacies and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will authorize the board of selectmen to accept on behalf of the town, donations of conservation land or interest in conservation land to be used as the local matching funds required under the NH Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A; and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP and appropriate these funds for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. This article was withdrawn by the Conservation Commission chairman.

ARTICLE 42.


