That the citizens of Dover should become familiar with the slight deficit of the year 1935 we wish to make known the attributable cause, namely; insufficient appropriation of funds for the necessary expenditures for maintenance.

On recommendations of the City Councils May 20, 1935, the board of police commissioners were authorized to purchase a police car suitable for cruising purposes, not to exceed seven hundred dollars. Bids were open to all local dealers to submit prices. Dewhirst motor sales being within this confined amount submitted six hundred and eighty dollars and forty-one cents, and sale was awarded this company in purchasing a Ford tudor sedan equipped. The delivery was made June 8, 1935, approved and accepted by the board of police commissioners, this extra and unforeseen expense being taken from the regular appropriation that had already been made and no special provision provided to meet this expenditure. Sliding recreation for children amounted to two hundred and eighty-six dollars and fifty cents.

The Buick ambulance several years of service and practically unfit for further use as such is now used exclusively on raids, and for drunkenness.

As an added improvement for safety there have been installed cross walk markers from the J. J. Newberry store to Grant's, as a protected area for pedestrians crossing to and from these stores.

During the week of August 9-10-11, 1935; Veterans of Foreign Wars' celebration was held and the city honored by many distinguished guests. Hon. F. Clyde Keefe, mayor of the city, being honored by His Excellency, H. Styles Bridges, Governor of New Hampshire, Commander Van Zandt, and General Butler. Valuable assistance was rendered the local police by Lieut. E. H. Hiller of Company 1137, C. C. C. Camp of this city.

Police department vacated temporary headquarters on Orchard Street to the new Municipal building at two o'clock in the afternoon, September 30, 1935. In conclusion the board of police commissioners feel that all business transacted has been accomplished in a conscientious, efficient, and commendable manner by all department members.

The cost of this work was \$4,858.11. Stone 23 loads, gravel 876 loads, fill 12 loads, cinders 216 loads and cold patch 4 loads.

The streets, roads and sidewalks have been broken out when necessary at a cost of \$4,653.96.

The snow was hauled from the streets, 11,154 loads costing \$14,523.33.

Fifteen catch basins have been repaired, five have been rebuilt and six new catch basins put in at a cost of \$973.05.

The sidewalks were sanded and cinders and gravel put on the streets where necessary, using 385 loads sand, 116 loads cinders at a cost of \$2,774.11.

The streets have been cleaned, hauling off 1,157 loads at a cost of \$3,977.26.

There were 834 loads of leaves hauled off costing \$1,001.36.

The gutters were cleaned, hauling off 86 loads at a cost of \$275.05. One gutter patched costing \$25.19.

Sand and cinders have been stored for winter use.

The City buildings and tractor shed were repaired at a cost of \$1,223.51.

The streets have been patched with cold patch and hot top patch, using 8 loads stone dust, 88 loads gravel, 116 loads fill, 10 loads cinders, 367 loads cold patch and 6,885 gals. Bitumuls, at a cost of \$6,470.73.

In maintenance oiling of the streets, 121 loads of gravel, 27 loads of fill, 387 loads of sand and 97 bags of calcium chloride were used at a cost of \$3,139.85.

The road machine was used at a cost of \$819.81.

One new culvert was put in and two repaired, costing \$132.36.

ANNUAL REPORT
of the
SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE HONORABLE, THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF DOVER,
NEW HAMPSHIRE:

I take pleasure in submitting my second annual report, it being the sixty-fourth in the series.

Education, as viewed today in comparison with that of yesterday, has not changed in its ulterior motives and pending results. Parents are demanding that their children secure a more liberal and broadening knowledge of things pertaining to events which make our lives so full and complete.

The complexity of our American life of today causes the educational standards to be as complex. This complexity has caused the educators of today to experiment and advance contrasting views and ideas as to the best procedures in teaching. Some of these views have been accepted and found to be beneficial, others have been tried and found to be wanting.

During the past year, Dover has accepted only those views believed to be of permanent value to the future citizens of our democracy.

Radical advocates of experimenting in education represent the left wing, where as conservatives in education represent the right wing. Somewhere between the two wings there is a median which is applicable to the average student in our schools and to this median we must build our educational procedures.

When we build our educational program for the median class of pupils it leaves two types of pupils which Dover, like many other cities and towns have failed to recognize; that is, the superior child and the inferior child.

As recommended in my last report, I again, urge the facilities to handle the 'Atypical' or handicapped child.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS—HIGH SCHOOL

It was apparent that accommodations in the high school for the year 1935-1936 would be unequal to the estimated demand for sittings. Consequently by combining grades in a primary school it was possible to remove a sixth grade from a room in the high school building. This room was refurnished with seats and desks to accommodate pupils of high school age. Even this change would not accommodate the increased enrollment.

Two small rooms once used by the high school principal as an office were altered during the summer into a single class room now accommodating 30 pupils.

The typewriting room equipped with small tables offered no opportunity for a home room or a study-room, thus rendering it a single purpose room. The purchase of drop-head typewriting desks has altered the above room and another room into rooms of a four-fold purpose; that is, home-rooms, study rooms, recitation-rooms, and typewriting rooms. Even with these alterations and additions, it is still necessary to use a basement room in the Annex for class purposes. This, from a health point of view, is not commendable.

With the estimated increase in enrollment for the school year 1936-37 of at least 50, the problem of pupils sittings again confronts us as imminent.

This problem may be somewhat alleviated by a re-arrangement of the Domestic Arts Courses in the Elementary Schools. Under the present program the Domestic Arts rooms in the High School are not regularly assigned after 1:30 in the afternoon for recitation purposes. The proposed plan would utilize the Cooking Room during the afternoon for elementary school purposes in the instruction of cooking. The sewing classes of the Elementary School could well be taught in the different elementary schools during the morning when the boys were being instructed in wood-working, as at the present time. This arrangement would allow the present elementary school Domestic Arts room, now located in the high school building to be divided into two class rooms for the accommodation of senior high school pupils.

The Auditorium of the High School continues to serve its purpose as a place for recreation and instruction. The floor needs to be refinished and treated with a hard non-slippery surface. The seating capacity, normally around 1100, has greatly diminished due to the breakage of chairs. This breakage must be expected as it is necessary to move them from the main floor when athletic contests or dancing takes place. High School assemblies tax the present seating capacity, even when using bleachers to supplement the chairs. It is recommended that new chairs be purchased.

The main entrance of the Auditorium is inadequate in its present location. It is recommended that the entrance, now arranged on the side of the building, be changed so as to face St. Thomas Street, and enlarged to accommodate a more easy exit in case of emergency.

SHERMAN SCHOOL

In a survey of the elementary and primary buildings, we find the Sherman School was opened as a school

building in 1827, fire destroying part of it in 1884. On being repaired, it was again opened to serve school purposes. It is still serving that purpose from an educational point of view, but from health and sanitary standards, most unsatisfactorily. It would appear then, with unsanitary toilet facilities, an incorrect heating and ventilating system, incorrect lighting from the outside, and insufficient playground space for 160 pupils, that this building should be replaced or abandoned in favor of a new and modern structure.

OTHER SCHOOL BUILDINGS

So, we might go through the buildings and note their erections, namely: Sawyer 1870, Varney 1861, Belknap 1857, Hale 1872, Pierce 1858-59.

Needless to say, some of these buildings have served their purpose well and effectively, however, the time arrives when effectiveness secured through repairs, alterations and additions render a school building less economical to operate physically than a new structure.

This City has not improved the elementary school housing facilities, on either side of the River, since 1872, with the exception of the Ida B. Hanson School. I recommend the building of two new elementary schools, one on the North side of the City, and the other on the South.

ENROLLMENTS

We had every reason to believe that the abandonment of the "Code" which had been effective during the previous year in Commercial and Industrial plants, would reduce the enrollments in the public schools, particularly in the High School. This we found to be untrue for the High School has enrolled more pupils than in any previous year or years. The following enrollment table is worthy of study, showing the de-

creases and increases in both elementary and secondary schools as of September 1934 and 1935.

The above tables show a decrease of 21 in elementary grades, an increase of 82 in high school; a total increase of 61 in all of the City's Schools.

TEACHERS

It has been most gratifying that the School Committee agreed with my views, relative to the employing of more men to teach in the high school, in that we were able to secure two during the Summer.

In October, Dover lost one of its oldest teachers through death. Miss Aletta Foss had taught for over a period of fifty years serving with efficiency and fidelity during the best years of her life. This position left vacant caused transfers to be made at the Belknap and Varney Schools. Miss Isabelle Smart was transferred from the Belknap sixth grade to the fifth; Miss Martha Sherry, from the Varney fifth to the Belknap sixth; and Miss Eleanor Redden, from the Varney first to the fifth. These transfers rendered the teaching position in the first grade at the Varney School vacant. Miss Wilma Roberts was elected to fill the vacancy.

EVENING SCHOOLS

During the school year 1934-35, the City operated, at its expense, an adult class in Americanization taught by Miss Katherine Mone.

The City also operated three adult schools in cooperation with Federal Funds which paid for teachers' salaries and scholars' supplies, the City furnishing heat, light and janitorial services.

KINDERGARTEN AND OPPORTUNITY ROOM

In last year's report, the superintendent made recommendation for kindergartens and an opportunity-class for the "Atypical Child." The School Committee was favorable to the idea and the necessity of such organizations, but owing to the nature and subsequent costs attached, it was thought advisable to delay the movement until a future and more opportune time.

It, however, is most gratifying to note that many of the recommendations of last year have been complied with, and put into operation in so far as appropriations would allow.

NEW EXECUTIVE QUARTERS

The fire which destroyed the old City Hall and the offices located therein caused the superintendent's office

to be located in the high school building. The completion of the new City Hall, with its accommodations for a committee room and superintendent's office, has provided commodious and adequate quarters. The mahogany trim and furniture to match causes us to feel justly proud in keeping it as a model in taste and neatness.

EDUCATIONAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

During the past school year it has been possible to unify the first grade reading by the use of new and up-to-date reading material for each pupil.

English and Spelling have been unified and brought up to date by the use of work-books placed in the hands of each teacher.

The recommended State Course of Study is being followed in the graded schools so far as is practical and possible.

The High School is following the requirements set forth by the State Board of Education and has been accepted as a Class A approved secondary school.

An important fact that I wish to emphasize is that the greater number of our high school graduates attend the University of New Hampshire, where they are admitted on the high school principal's certificate; and the relative small number attending colleges or universities which require examinations before entrance, and those colleges which admit students under the College Entrance Board requirements. The quality of work required by the high school administrators is high. Casual remarks that our high school students are inadequately prepared may be heard from time to time. Such remarks are not new nor are they original in any city or town. We are only too happy and proud to say that Dover's college students rank as well as the majority of high school students. Simmering the situation to potent facts; is it not the use and application of one's energy in any

line of endeavor that makes one outstanding; and then is not the reverse true?

HIGH SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION

On October the 15th free transportation was furnished to pupils of the high school, residing two or more miles, actual road measurement, from their respective homes and the high school building. This innovation

has, without doubt, been the means of more pupils, from the outlying sections attending the high school.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I. As in my report of last year, I again recommend the establishment of kindergartens, and rooms for the teaching of handicapped children. We must realize that the proper education of handicapped children is a more serious problem than that of educating a normal child. These so-called, "Atypical Children" are among us, constituting a part of our citizenry, thus their education is and should be an integral part of the City's duty toward making these persons useful citizens.

II. Careful consideration should be given to the housing in sanitary and modern school buildings for elementary and grammar school pupils. It is recommended that two new school buildings be erected in the City, one on the North Side and the other on the South Side of the City, each equipped with accommodations for kindergartens, opportunity rooms, and auditoriums.

III. It is recommended that physical education be instituted in the high school as a part of the educational system.

IV. Since man is coming to have more and more leisure time, it behooves us, as educators and promoters of education, to recognize the value of Art and Music Appreciation. We should be able to institute into the high school an elective course in the appreciation of such subjects.

V. I would call your attention to the heating system or systems in the Varney School—two hot-air heaters and a small steam-boiler are used to heat a four-room building. If this building is to be used for school purposes for a number of years, a saving in coal

consumption would occur should a single steam-boiler be installed.

VI. The health of our school pupils has, during the past year, been carefully and efficiently cared for, yet I feel that the work of this department should be supplemented by the assistance of a regularly employed "school physician" and a "school dentist," to whom the "school nurse" could without hesitancy call upon for such advice as is impossible to obtain at the present time.

VII. It is recommended that in carrying out the idea of visual-education, to supplement the older type of recitative-education, that a sound projector machine be purchased and installed in the high school. This type of education is rapidly becoming a recognized adjunct to progressive forms of education.

CONCLUSION

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation of the cooperation which the School Committee has extended during the past school year.

ANNUAL REPORT

HEADMASTER OF THE DOVER HIGH SCHOOL

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

I submit herewith my annual report as Headmaster of the Dover High School.

Our enrollment continues to increase, having doubled in the last eleven years. When the annex was occupied for the first time in September, 1927, only one of the seven classrooms on the first and second floors was used for high school purposes. A year or so later a second room was taken for high school use. During the school year of 1934-35 only one grade remained in the annex. Last September saw not only this remaining grade transferred but an additional classroom remodeled from space formerly used for office purposes. The end of this increasing enrollment does not appear in the immediate future.

The enrollment increase is shown in the following tabulation:

September, 1934, showed an increase of 11.5% in enrollment over that of the year previous. This year there is another increase of 11.5% over that of last year.

At the present time registrations indicate another increase for next year of about 10%. This will bring our total enrollment up to approximately 850 and unless some changes can be made, the school can not accommodate this number.

Last September 92% of the city grammar school graduates entered high school. This compares with 90% of a year ago. The following tabulation shows the percentage of admissions for the last eight years:

Added to the 92% or one hundred and forty-six grammar school graduates are forty-one from St. Mary's, twenty-two from St. Charles, and fifty-four from outside of the city. The present freshman class of two hundred and seventy-seven is the largest in the history of the school.

Since the opening of school in September we have lost twenty-six pupils for the following reasons: fifteen have gone to work, twelve moved and transferred to other schools, two

moved away, two lost interest, one left because of illness, and two left because of change in home conditions.

The percentage of loss during the fall term is 3.4%, the lowest in several years. The tabulation below shows a comparison in the percentage of pupils leaving school during the fall term for the last few years.

The extra typewriters and tables and the use of another room for typewriting purposes relieved what a year ago promised to be a serious situation this fall. Class loads in the commercial department are not excessive and the office practice groups continue to do a large amount of clerical work for both the high school and grades.

Mr. Adams, Athletic Director, in his report will cover the major sports which make up our athletic program. Within a year a few changes have been made. Hockey was approved by the Athletic Council and became a regular sport for the first time last year. Under Mr. Bailey's coaching, a satisfactory season was enjoyed. The addition of Mr. Walker to the teaching force will this spring correct the situation which has required Mr. Adams to divide his time. Mr. Walker will take over the coaching of the boys' baseball team, permitting Mr. Adams to give his full time to track. It is expected that Mr. Bailey will continue to coach the girls' baseball team.

It is hoped that eventually a teacher with the ability to coach girls' baseball, may be added to the force. This will relieve Mr. Adams of dividing his time between boys' and girls' teams, as he is now doing. It is also suggested that Field Hockey be considered as another sport for the girls.

Our orchestra and band continue to do good work under the guidance of Mr. Wilson. Our orchestra made nine public appearances, while the band made thirteen public appear-

ances during the last school year. Members of the orchestra went to Laconia to play with the All-State orchestra. It is unfortunate that we cannot have the services of Mr. Wilson an additional day in order that he might give more time to the orchestra and to choral groups.

A large number of pupils continue to find the course offered in the Industrial Department suitable to their needs. The boys taking this course plan to enter employment upon graduation from high school. This group completes many individual projects and does a creditable amount of construction and repair work about the school building. Mr. Avery is reporting fully on this department.

The social life is carried on through class and club socials, school dances, athletics, and group meetings. Active clubs, meeting regularly, consist of the following: Home Economics, Dramatic, Latin, French, and Radio.

It is hoped that in the near future a room can be set aside for reference and library purposes. During the last ten years enrollments have increased rapidly and additions to the teaching force have lagged to such an extent that the teaching load of all teachers has increased considerably. When the number of teachers can be increased to a point where teacher loads will be reduced to what they were eight or ten years ago, a program might be arranged so that English teachers could devote one period a day to the supervision of a library room. In such a room magazine and reference material might be assembled and made accessible to all pupils.

School officials, parents, and the public are well aware of the dramatic and musical productions, the school paper, assemblies and such activities as are a part of the general administration of the school.

The new teachers who entered upon their duties this fall quickly and whole-heartedly associated themselves with the school and its life.

The morale of the school is good and a fine spirit of co-operation exists between teachers and pupils.

I wish to express my appreciation to school committee, superintendent, teachers, and pupils for their loyalty and support in the management of the school.

PINE HILL CEMETERY

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PINE HILL CEMETERY :

GENTLEMEN :—I am pleased to submit the annual report of the Superintendent of this department for the year 1935.

The year has been a busy one, in addition to the usual care given to the various lots, we have put in 122 foundations for monuments and markers, also we have graded 64 lots.

An effort has been made to reset all the stones that were either down or badly tipped. All of those on the front from Central Avenue to Avenue C, have been taken care of and this greatly improves the appearance of the cemetery to all who are passing by. Other sections also have been given attention and it is hoped that another year will find all of the stones taken care of.

The water mains have been extended as follows :

Ave. I 200 ft. North and 200 ft. South

Ave. O 200 ft. North and 350 ft. South

Ave. R 150 ft. North

This allows for 6 new faucets in sections which have never had any water supply.

The low section of the Main Avenue, between the Tomb and Avenue I, has been relieved of the muddy condition by installing 2 manholes and 350 ft. of 6 inch pipe which extends from Avenue I to below Avenue M, also at the lower end of the Main Avenue we have installed a manhole and 75 ft. of 8 inch pipe to take care of the surface water which has given the department much trouble in the past. Another place

remedied by a manhole and 30 ft. of 8 inch pipe is at the junction of the path between Avenue S, Avenue T and the North Avenue.

We were fortunate this year in receiving two W.P.A. grants, one to grade the section known as the "Old Pines," which has been halted because of the weather conditions; the other to complete grading in the new part. This is a very large job and is still under way but, owing to the heavy frost in the ground the progress is very slow and it is using the appropriation very fast so that it is doubtful if the job will be completed unless another grant is received.

Statements have been presented to each of you showing various comparisons of the work done and attached you will find a list of bodies placed in my care, showing the exact location of each interment.

GENTLEMEN :—I have the pleasure of presenting the forty-eighth annual report of the Superintendent, showing the present condition of the department, the extensions and improvements made, together with a statement in detail of the financial condition of the department for the year ending December 31, 1935.

The extensions of the mains for the year were as follows:

Littleworth Road (complete project to the Madbury line)—8,575 feet of 8-inch pipe with 11 hydrants.

Clifford Street—166 feet of 6-inch pipe.

Keelty Street—280 feet of 6-inch pipe.

Grove Street—One steamer hydrant set.

The Ames Construction Company, of Somersworth, laid 500 feet of 6-inch pipe and set one hydrant on Broadway, for the Town of Rollinsford.

Samples of water have been tested by the State Chemistry Department, at various times during the year and were found to be of excellent quality.

Many improvements have been made on the buildings and grounds, among which may be cited, a new cement wall around the whole building, the painting of all wood work on the outside of the building and changes in the lighting of the Reading and Stack Rooms, which add much to the convenience of these rooms. With all this extra expense we have, this year as in the past, not exceeded our income. The use of the Library has increased materially. Before giving some account of the year's activities it is fitting that appreciation should be expressed to the Board of Trustees for the action taken at their November meeting, authorizing a memorial tablet for Miss Caroline Harwood Garland, librarian of the Dover Public Library for nearly fifty years.

In the annual reports extending from 1884 to 1932 which were presented by Miss Garland there is furnished a record of the steady progress and ever-widening use-

fulness of the library under her supervision which ended only with her death on June 24, 1933. They reflect a distinguished service, and it is especially appropriate that the bronze tablet should be placed in the Delivery Room where so many visitors knew her gracious presence and shared her unflinching interest and assistance.

THE YEAR'S WORK

While many libraries have reported a falling off in circulation, due in part to shrinkage of funds, and consequently fewer purchases of new books, this library, which has been most fortunate in having a generous appropriation, is able to report a modest gain of 287, as 80,089 volumes were sent out in 1935 against 79,802 in 1934. Of these 13,159 went from the Children's Room. Thus has been continued a record of gain made in each of the last ten years, indicating a healthy growth.

Registration for that period has shown a similar expansion, although in the present year there has been a slight drop as the 601 applications for first cards were 89 less than those for last year. This difference was in the adult department and no doubt was partly due to increased employment.

Visitors who used the library for reading and study numbered 30,834. Of these 14,532 came to the Children's Room, and 565 made use of the Reading Room on Sundays.

In the registrations of the children there has been a noticeable increase in names of foreign nationalities, especially Syrian and Greek. It is hoped that the large collection of books in the attractive Children's Room may have a share in helping these young Americans toward good and useful citizenship.

A shelf examination which was made last year was not considered finished until this year as books that are missing in one reading of the shelves sometimes mys-

teriously turn up in the next. It is therefore, a two year period that this survey covers. During that time the losses numbered 411 volumes. This number, while regrettable, is felt to be an unavoidable accompaniment of open shelves, and should be considered in connection with the advantages of free access to the stacks, and the satisfaction felt by many readers who like to select books for themselves. And our losses, as statistics from other libraries show, are not unduly large in proportion to our circulation.

This lessening of the library's resources by the unaccountable disappearance of books is not the only factor to be taken into account in estimating its working value. Due to the advancements made in the various branches of knowledge, and in the manner of presenting newer theories and freshly discovered facts, the usefulness of many books is much impaired. Books on aviation, for instance, and television, and radio which were entirely adequate not so long ago do not now meet the need of enquirers. Especially is the usefulness of encyclopedias and scientific works affected by these developments.

This library has tried to meet the problem by keeping its year books, almanacs, and other annual publications up to date. And with the invaluable "Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature" it utilizes the wide range of information to be found in its files of magazines. Also of much help in meeting questions of current interest has been its vertical file with its fund of pamphlets and clippings from newspapers and other sources. This increasingly useful adjunct now has material on over five hundred subjects, including many of such present day importance as Abyssinia, the Supreme Court, Streamlining, Emergency Relief, and Child Labor, besides a large number of biographical sketches not yet to be found in published volumes. One of its advantages is that it can

be kept up to date with little expense and although much time is needed to weed out old items and substitute new the result makes a valuable addition to the reference resources of the library.

MOUNTED PICTURES

Much work has been done on the collection of mounted pictures which now numbers over 5,000, and some changes have been made in the alcove where they are gathered. Four wooden filing cases which formerly contained the pamphlets and newspaper clippings have been placed in the alcove and in them have been arranged alphabetically the smaller mounted portraits. The larger pictures, already shelved in an admirable case, have been made easier to handle by portfolio holders and their value increased by the addition of new subjects. The old and much worn boxes in which the pictures of travel were kept have been replaced by new ones, dark green in color. This change gives more room for the pictures and adds greatly to the attractiveness of the alcove.

With the purpose of increasing the supply of pictures that might be useful to teachers in their school work, a number of post cards and pictures from magazines have been mounted in groups, illustrating industrial, historical and other subjects. For example, one set shows the growing of cotton, others, the culture of coffee and rice, and another gives the manufacturing, architectural, and commercial development of Dover. Two especially attractive sets give views of the homes of Sarah Orne Jewett and Thomas Bailey Aldrich. A number of sets have been made ready for birthdays of famous people, and some very lovely pictures suitable for Thanksgiving and Christmas have been added to those already mounted. Over 500 post cards, many with beautiful coloring, of famous places and paintings have been arranged by countries and artists and can be easily found and mounted as

required. The prints, previously sorted, furnish many and valuable examples of steel and wood engraving, mezzotints, India prints, and various other forms of modern reproduction.

It is a collection that offers a wealth of material not only to the teacher who wishes to make classroom studies richer in meaning to her pupils but to all those who are interested in history, literature and the arts.

SCHOOLS AND REFERENCE WORK

The close connection between the library and the schools makes itself increasingly felt. The talks to the groups of the Freshman class of the High School on the use of the library which are given regularly at the beginning of each school year had a longer period allotted to each group in 1935, and a talk on the Historical Room was added to the instruction. Also the use of the Children's Room upon request of the teacher was explained to one of the classes of the grade schools by Miss Parker.

As the High School has no library of its own for the use of the students the Public Library is called upon not only for books on the reading lists but for information needed in the preparation of themes, debates, and on the many subjects connected with daily studies.

The crowded moments at the charging desk which come at the close of each High School session are only the beginning of the work with the students. To both the Circulating Department and the Reading Room requests for assistance come all through the afternoon and evening, but especially is the Reading Room with its books of reference a scene of continued activity. The seating capacity of this room is fifty, and not infrequently pupils occupy nearly all of the chairs, while many more stand at the shelves, consulting encyclopedias, or dictionaries of various kinds. Since the opening of school 3058 slips have been signed by students using the room. On

an especially large afternoon there were 101 signatures.

No record of reference requests has been kept until lately, but since its beginning less than three months ago 125 questions have been brought to the reference librarian. Most of these questions were asked by the students and their range is wide. The simpler and more frequent were for lives of authors. Others were on such diverse subjects as "Something about the Sun god's chariot," "Who is the Alpha of the Plow?" "Acts of the pirates of old days," "Textile conditions in New Hampshire" "Something about the Perkins Institution for the Blind" and from one hopeful lad who trusted to the omniscience of the librarian, "I want a black book on invention that I had the other day."

When the season of debates arrives magazines and books with the best information on the subjects considered for debate are placed in the Reading Room where they may be easily consulted. In 1935 more than one hundred such references were selected. In addition many books were furnished directly from the Circulating Department, and further information was supplied from the vertical file.

With the help given to pupils of the High School, and the services rendered the older members of the community the Reading Room is a busy center and to meet the many calls made upon it requires a high type of supervision which Miss Leach, who has charge of it admirably maintains.

THE CIRCULATION DEPARTMENT

This is the department with which the general public is most familiar, as its charging desk is the point to which those who regularly bring books to exchange, and many who seek information come. And yet it is quite probable that few people realize how much skill and accuracy are necessary to maintain the service received here, or how

varied are the details that underlie its smooth running. During the past year 66,980 volumes were sent out for home use and as many more were returned. Besides the charging and discharging of so many volumes, hundreds of books were mended or covered or handled upon other requirements; frequent telephone calls for information or for book renewals were answered each day; forgetful borrowers were reminded by postal notice or visit of over-due books; an examination of the shelves was supervised; and readers desiring suggestions in the selection of books were helped with a ready and kindly interest. These and other duties, making up the routine of this department have been ably carried on by Miss Morrison, in charge, and the assistants who helped at the charging desk as needed.

CHILDREN'S ROOM

This has been an especially busy year in the Children's Room. Open from 3 o'clock in the afternoon until 8 o'clock in the evening on all days of the week except Saturdays when it opens an hour earlier and closes an hour later it has sent out 13,159 volumes, and to it have come 14,532 visitors. There were 219 new applications for cards, 135 of which came in the last three months of the year. It has meant many strenuous hours during which the boys and girls crowded round the librarian's desk with books to exchange and requests for help of one kind or another. There were calls for picture puzzles of which the children never tire, or books whose jackets on the bulletin board had awakened interest, or the perennially popular stereoscope with its pictures of foreign life, or for stories brought to their attention at school or suggested to them by other children. Newcomers had to be instructed in the rules of the room, and the proper care of library books and cards. And through it all an alert eye had to be kept on hands that might be grubby,

and small occupants of the tables who were showing signs of undue restlessness. In the intervals when there was a lull in the circulation or in the hours before the room was opened to the children repair and other work was carried on.

This year for Book Week a generous number of new books were prepared for display on tables where the children might look them over, and on Saturday a Book Party was given in the Lecture Room. This was under the supervision of Miss Parker, the children's librarian, who was assisted by Mrs. Robert S. Crosby. Seventeen books were represented, including some of the old favorites. The plan of letting the children themselves write some of the character parts of the newer books added to the interest of the entertainment.

The story hour which was discontinued early in the summer was resumed in December and met with warm welcome, especially from the younger children. The work of the Room has required not only industry but an understanding of children and children's reading and a cheerful patience that have been shown by Miss Parker, who has charge of it, and the assistants who have helped during certain hours of each day.

CATALOGING

Although carried on unobtrusively the work of cataloguing is one of the most important branches of library service. An adequate card catalogue with plentiful subject headings offers a key to the resources of the library whose practical value is shown constantly by the use made of it by the public.

In the past year 1167 volumes were added to the library and for each book at least three cards had to be made and frequently many more. Besides typewriting the greater number of these cards, and doing much of the classifying, Miss Morrill, who carries on this work

most efficiently, has had charge of the magazines, preparing them for the binder or for filing; has done much clerical work; and has assisted at the charging desk and in the Children's Room.

HISTORICAL ROOM

A somewhat larger number of visitors have used the Historical Room in 1935 than did in 1934, as there have been 174 registrations in comparison with 141 in the previous year. Naturally the largest use of it has been made by the citizens of Dover and near-by towns, but many letters of enquiry have come from distant states, and during the summer months among the visitors to this section from the West and the South many have taken the opportunity to consult the genealogical and historical records to be found in the room.

One visitor who was spending his vacation in New England came to the library after some previous correspondence, to see an edition of a pamphlet that he had not been able to find elsewhere, not even in the Library of Congress. This was "The Remarkable Captivity and Surprising Deliverance of Elizabeth Hanson." It had been printed in the Dover Enquirer of October 25th, 1883, from the 1824 edition, and later issued in pamphlet form. While it was not of great value because of its rarity, it afforded much satisfaction to one who was making a study of the many editions of this story.

Another request, somewhat out of the usual line of research was for a large and yellow handbill announcing an exhibition in the City Hall, October 16, 1847, of an electro-magnetic engine and railroad constructed by Mr. Moses G. Farmer of Eliot, Maine, who had been an electrician for some years in the Government Topelo station. An account of this notable event, given in a local paper of the time states that the car, carrying two passengers was successfully operated on the stage of the City Hall.

The handbill was the gift of Dr. Fred Hooper Hayes, a trustee of the library.

MEETINGS OF LIBRARIANS AND TEACHERS

Some of the pleasantest days of activity in the past year were spent in connection with a regional meeting of New Hampshire librarians held on the afternoon and evening of October 29th when librarians from Somersworth, Rochester, Durham, Portsmouth and Concord were guests of this library; and on the following day when a tea was given for the teachers of the public schools.

On Tuesday, in the afternoon, Miss Catherine Pratt, field worker of the Library Commission of New Hampshire, conducted a round table discussion on several phases of library work, and in the evening Miss Dorothy Annable, Executive Secretary of the Commission spoke to an interested audience on "New Hampshire Libraries, past, present and future" and Miss Mabel E. Hayes of the English Department of the High School spoke on the "Relation of the Dover Public Library to the Dover High School."

At the close of the round table session, tea was served in the Trustees' Room with Mrs. Dwight Hall, wife of a member of the Board of Trustees presiding.

On Wednesday afternoon over fifty teachers attended the tea given for them, and visited the exhibit of mounted pictures displayed in the Fine Arts Room. Mrs. Dwight Hall and Miss Alice Morrill presided and for both afternoons the very lovely china and silver services used were loaned by Mrs. Hall. A richly blooming chrysanthemum was given by Mrs. Clarence I. Hurd, wife of a member of the Board of Trustees, and other potted plants were loaned by Mr. Herbert E. Meader.

EXTRA ASSISTANTS

From January until July, two extra assistants, Miss Margaret Doe, and Miss Virginia Hall, paid from Federal funds, were allotted to the library through the interest of the Public Library Commission of New Hampshire. Miss Doe left late in January to take a position in the Wakefield, Massachusetts library. She was succeeded by Mrs. Marjorie Gilbert who with Miss Hall remained until the Government project was discontinued. This temporary addition to the library staff helped not only to meet the increased circulation but was of great assistance in other lines of work.

GIFTS

Among the many welcome gifts of the year was a framed portrait of Andrew Carnegie which came from the Carnegie Corporation of New York. It was one of those sent to all libraries that had been beneficiaries of the great philanthropist, and served as part of a nationwide observance of the one-hundredth anniversary of his birth. This library which has its home in a building made possible by a gift of \$30,000 from the Carnegie Fund for public library buildings, prepared an appropriate exhibit of the portrait and many books and magazines relating to the life of Mr. Carnegie.

From the State have been received reports of many of the departments, and from the Government have come over fifteen hundred bound volumes and pamphlets. The publications, of the Government especially, are sometimes of great value in meeting unusual requests. Their usefulness was illustrated last summer when a visitor from out of town who was doing research work in relation to national industry spent two weeks consulting reports of the United States Senate and House of Representatives which the library was able to furnish him.

Of great historical value is the third volume of the "Virginia Company of London," edited by Miss Susan Myra Kingsbury, professor of Social Economics in Bryn Mawr College. It was received from the Library of Congress and contains the records of the Company from 1607 to 1622. It has been added to the two previous volumes already in the Historical Room.

The publishers of Foster's Daily and Weekly Democrat besides furnishing these papers free to the library and giving generous space to book and other notices have this year added, upon request, a second copy each night of the daily. This will make it possible to have fresh copies for binding.

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS

Greatly to the advantage of patrons and assistants, the central lights in the Reading Room have been lowered, and those in the Stack Room have been made easier to turn on and off by the substitution of chain-bulb sockets for the button-sockets so long in use. This room has been further improved by new rubber matting which has taken the place of the old matting on the main passages between the stacks. On the outside of the building a new cement walk has been built around the foundations; bricks have been touched up in many places, and all of the woodwork repainted.

While these changes and repairs are of the utmost importance others are still urgent. Additional shelving would relieve the crowded state of the books in several rooms and greatly aid in their use. A light is much needed between the library and the high school. It would be of advantage not only to those using the grounds back of the library, which are prepared each winter for outdoor skating, but would be of benefit to the police who guard the buildings at night.

In concluding her report, the librarian desires to express her appreciation of the high ideals of service maintained by the assistants in the year's work, and to gratefully acknowledge the interest and kindness of the Board of Trustees.
