#### WARRENT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 10, 1931
Two Hundredth Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Durham on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, A. D., 1931, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk (Chas. Wentworth), one Selectman for a term of three years (E. L. Getchell), a Town Treasurer (George D. Stevens), a Collector of Taxes (Esther Y. Burnham), two Auditors (L. W. Hitchcock and Clement Moran), and all other Town officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years (Stephen P. Chesley).

- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:
  - (1) Trunk Line Maintenance (\$4,625.00).
  - (2) State Aid Maintenance (\$400.00)
  - (3) State Aid Construction (\$2,512.50)
- 4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges ((\$6,000.00).
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to resurface and apply Tarvia to Ballard Street and Mill Road (\$1,000.00 raised for Ballard Street and \$1,000.00 to be taken from the amount raised in article 4 for Mill Road).
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenditures, including State and County taxes as required (\$13,905.00).
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvements in the Durham Cemetery (\$300.00).
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for planting and improving shade trees in the Town (Carried).
- 9. To see if the Town will cooperate with the University in the purchase of a fire engine and raise and appropriate money for the same (Voted \$3,000.00).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by the law. (Carried)
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. (Carried.)

12. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2% if paid on or before July 1.

1% if paid on or before September 1. (Carried.)

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

#### March 9, 1932

Two Hundredth and First Annual Meeting
To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of
Strafford and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town
Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Durham on Tuesday the eighth day of March, A. D. 1932 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

- \*2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:
  - (1) Trunk Line Maintenance (see budget).
  - (2) State Aid Maintenance (see budget).
  - (3) State Aid Construction (see budget).
- 4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and bridges.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for curent maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the use of the Tree Warden during the coming year.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed to the road by the residence of E. T. Donovan and C. L. Follansbee and will accept and maintain said road as a town highway. Said deed to cover a length of about five hundred and ninety feet.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a suitable amount of money to build a state highway on the Packer's Falls Road from the Newmarket town line to the Durham Village-Lee Hill road. The first two miles to be built in 1932 and the remaining mile in 1933.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to put in additional street lights on that part of Mast Road by the the residence of Max Abell and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to complete the purchase of the "Quarry lot" so called and raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to pay for same.
- 12. To see what action the Town will take relative to approval of by-laws adopted by the Selectmen permitting and regulating retail business, plays, games, sports, and exhibitions on the Lord's Day.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of extending the hydrant service on Madbury Road from Garrison Avenue to Bagdad Road.



#### HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

To the Town of Durham:

This year the University purchased for the Children's Room two tables and eight chairs. Hence we now have furniture suitable for children. The Librarian hopes the Town will see fit to match this amount, the furniture cost \$90.00, by appropriating an equal additional amount for books during the coming year.

#### REPORT OF THE CEMETERY COMMITTEE

During the year 1931 the Committee constructed about 500 feet of gravel road across the ends and north side of Section F. The cement foundation was put in for 165 feet of rubble wall along the turnpike, and about half of this wall was laid up with rocks. The construction work on this wall, amounting to \$178.75 was made possible through the sale of four lots during the year. Two lots were spaded up, graded, fertilized and reseeded.

All lots which have been sold, together with one or two additional, have been top-dressed with fertilizer and kept closely cropped during the summer. All of these now have a good strong turf. No sale of standing grass was made, and it was finally given away for the cutting.

Three new memorial stones were erected last year—one on the lot of Mrs. Charles James, and two on the lot of the estates of D. W. and D. A. Watson. Twelve old stones were removed from the family burying lot on the Lucien Thompson farm and set up in the new lot purchased by the estate.

At the urgent and repeated request of Mrs. Belle S. Mathes, the Trustees of Trust Funds have for two years used a portion of the ample income of the Abbie Mathes trust fund for the care of the Mooney Cemetery situated on the left side of the main road from Durham to Newmarket.

Mrs. Belle S. Mathes asserts that she knows, by personal conversation with Miss Abbie Mathes a short time before her death, that it was the full intention of Miss Mathes to change her will and to provide for the care of said Mooney cemetery; that the death of said Abbie Mathes before arrival home prevented said change in the will and that it would be the wish of said

Abbie Mathes that some portion of the ample income from her former bequest be used as above indicated. Relatives of Miss Mathes on her mother's side are buried in the Mooney Cemetery.

#### REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

To the Town of Durham:

The Durham water was sampled at regular intervals during the year ending January 1932 and was found in good condition at each analysis.

All the children both in the Durham Village and the Packers Falls schools were vaccinated or presented certificates.

There were very few cases of contagious diseases in Durham. A Child Health Conference was held in Durham on May 5th, 1931, under the supervision of the State Board of Health, Division of Maturity, Infancy and Child Hygiene with a local committee including the Women's Club, the Parent—Teacher Association and Students from the University.

Dr. Anna Rudd, Dr. Grant of Durham and Dr. C. McGill of Portsmouth were the examining physicians.

# REPORT OF THE TREE WARDEN FOR 1931

The planting of shade tree along the road from Concord to Newmarket was practically completed this last season by the planting of 200 elm trees. 350 trees have been planted all told now and for the present the most important part of the planting has been completed.

About \$50 of the money appropriated was used to prune the trees in the village. The pruning consisted merely in cutting dead limbs and making them safe for both foot and vehicle travel, and cutting off the lower limbs which hung into the road. Considerable more work of this kind ought to be done in order to preserve the health of our village trees and in order to make them safe for traffic.

The Tree Warden cooperated with the Electric Light Company in pruning certain trees in such a way as to improve radio conditions in town and make the trees safer for the electric light wires.

The triangle around the monument in front of the town hall has also been fixed up and looked after from the Tree Warden's funds.

I would like to call the attention of the citizens of Durham to the fact that all trees standing on the road line outside of property lines, excepting those on the Turnpike, belong to the abutters. If the trees are to be taken care of through town funds they should be deeded to the town. This may be done by a very simple and inexpensive process of signing and recording a regular form deed. If all the trees along the roadside are to be pruned by the tree warden's office they should be turned over to the town.

In view of the necessity of lowering the tax rate the Tree Warden is asking for only \$50 in the 1932-33 budget, or just enough to take care of what pruning work is absolutely necessary through storms or the changing of road grades. There are also a few trees to be replaced that did not grow and a little fertilizer should be bought and applied to the trees already planted.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Somersworth, N. H.

February, 1932.

To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

I have the honor to submit my third annual report.

When final arrangements had been completed with Dover High School and the Boston & Maine Transportation Company, thirty six pupils were attending Dover High School at the expense of Durham. Two busses were needed to carry this number, since the New Hampshire law limits the size of the bus. Minor difficulties were adjusted and now the transportation is being well done and the pupils are doing good work at Dover.

The superintendent felt himself fortunate in retaining the services of Mr. William B. Hounsell as Principal of the Junior High School in this year of readjustment. Considerable difficulty was experienced in working out a program which would accomodate three cadets and their work at the University and also enable the Manuel Training pupils to have the standard time required by the State Board of Education. The program as finally adopted has the approval of the State Board of Education and is working well. The University has supplied us with unusually good cadets and they will remain with us throughout the year. Keeping the same cadets for the entire year is beneficial to all concerned. Last summer the cadets from our school were among the first to obtain permanent positions. The schedule of this year enables Mr. Hounsell to do more supervision.

No changes were made in the regular teaching force except those contemplated by the discontinuance of grades nine and ten. Mrs. Wilcox takes charge of Grades five and six when Miss Talbot teaches music in the other schools. It was impossible to divide the grades in Domestic Arts but the class has not been too large to be well handled. I wish to commend the girls of the eighth grade and Mrs. Wilcox on the excellent manner in which the noon lunch

is being managed. Twenty one pupils are regularly taking milk at the morning recess and graham crackers are being served with the milk.

Mr. Batchelder offered to supervise the work in Manuel Training and to use his pupils in cadet training. This gives even better results than the method previously used and saves the district some money.

No change is contemplated in the seating arrangements at the Village Schools. There are now 35 pupils enrolled in grades seven and eight and 30 in grades five and six. The second grade room is full but there is not an unusual shifting of pupils or an unseen influx of lower grade pupils, the buildings should adequately house our schools next year. The school grounds should receive some attention next summer but the building itself will need little repair. Through advantageous purchase more slate blackboards were installed last summer than we expected possible.

The school house at Packer's Falls has been further improved by paint. A new water tank with bubbler attacher has been secured and a primary table and chairs furnished for library purposes. We wish to thank the Durham Library for supplying books to this school. The Parent Teachers Association has continued to be helpful and the first aid kit provided by this Association has been of great service. The Woman's Club also receives our thanks for books given to the Village School.

In November we asked the pupils to bring to the school outgrown garments and shoes. Durham is more fortunate than some of the districts in the supervisory union so the Nurse used some of this clothing elsewhere. Only those closely connected with the schools know how much good is done by this act. Pupils are kept regularly in school who might otherwise have to be absent at times for lack of shoes and clothing.

The Sons of the American Revolution medal for good citizenship was awarded last June to Henry Polk of the tenth grade. Plans are underway for the celebration of the Bicentennial of George Washington's Birth. You will be asked to cooperate in this enterprise.

The report of the School Nurse follows my own and the usual statistics are appended.

There has been good cooperation among the educational forces of the district and our continued thanks are due to the School Board who has made this possible.
