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# Organization of the City Government for the Year 1951 Inaugural Address

The Franklin City Government for 1951 was organized on Jan. 3, 1951, at Franklin City Hall.

Mayor W. Frank Welch delivered the following address:

Reverend Father Daniszewski, Members of the old and new City Council, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am grateful and honored to be here tonight, on this occasion, my second inaugural. I wish to offer my sincere thanks to all of you who supported me with your overwhelming vote. The results will remain unforgettable to me. I am fully conscious of the great responsibility I have to all the citizens of Franklin. It is very evident to all of us that people are more community minded than they are politically minded. It is a wonderful feeling to realize that when it come right down to the issue of what is best for Franklin, the people showed by their vote that they think for themselves.

Our auditors are working on our books at this time and although they are not through, Mr. Riccio has been able to go over enough of the results to allow me to let you know tonight that we have kept substantially within our appropriations in the overall. In fact, the rough figures show that we have spent approximately \$16,000.00 less than planned. We ended the year with \$37,815.21 in cash, \$8,105.62 more than last year.

When we made up the appropriations which were approved by the council, we cut the expenditures from \$452,029.55 to \$437,234.44 as the actual expenses to run the city for the year. Then we took advantage of the new legislation that allows municipalities to put aside monies for capital improvements to the amount of \$12,555.00.

We figured every economy we could that was reasonable and everyone of us declared with determination that we would keep within these figures. We did, and with a tidy sum to spare. Hats off! to each and every department head and to the council committee for doing such a grand job.

Commissioner Zak in all his departments had a total appropriation of \$74,733.00. His net expenditures were some \$5,000.00 less. I wish at this point to publicly commend Commissioner Zak for the very fine job he has done for the city. He is a tremendous worker and he gets results. He is a careful buyer and his men know many instances where he has saved considerable in equipment and materials by his ingenuity. His job of snow removal in the business area is something to be proud of. Last year with one exception when the

snow came in the early hours of the morning, he and his highway crew were out all night during each storm removing all the snow clear to the sidewalks. It was a revelation to all who came down the street the next morning to find the snow gone from the street. This also put the parking meters right back into business and this revenue helps to pay for the snow removal costs.

The Welfare Department has made an excellent showing. We appropriated \$42,500.00. The net savings here is \$3,124.62. During this same period the cost of County Welfare in Franklin dropped about \$7,000.00 Both City and County Welfare were administered locally this last year by Overseer of the Poor, Albert Ayotte and his capable assistant Miss Eileen Ash, I say, Hats off! to both of them for their very fine work.

To the council committeemen Wiggin Gilman, Charles Slack, Arnold Bates and to Fire Chief Leslie Boomhower I give hearty approval for their fine job. It will be possible to carry over into 1951 and to apply to the new fire engine that is expected to be delivered in March or April, about \$2,100.00, a net savings in their department. And, at this time I want to commend the men of the Fire Department for the very fine Fire record they have had this last year. I believe that the Fire Prevention work that Robert Cunningham, his co-workers, the local Insurance men and John Lewis have done is one big reason why we have had less fires here in Franklin. They have instigated and caused investigation of all fire hazards and have so publicized the dangers, that Franklin has become fire prevention conscious. This is very good.

Our police department's appropriation for 1950 was \$17,278.70, which by the way was the lowest in total and per capita cost of all the cities in New Hampshire. Yet council committeemen Frank Gerry, Alcide LaBranche, Teofil Sokul and Chief John Dodge were able to cut this by \$500.00.

I shall recommend to the new council that as few changes as possible be made in the personnel of the city departments for I believe that we have a good team that is working together very well. We must realize that we have a very difficult year ahead and a great deal of work needs to be done.

In line with this thinking I have asked Councilmen Richard Clarenbach and Wiggin Gilman to serve again this year as chairmen of the Highway and Fire Committees respectively, and to serve again on the very important Finance Committee along with myself. These two councilmen have been a great help to me.

We have a number of serious problems ahead of us that must be contended with. Our first consideration must be our tax rate. You people have entrusted the affairs of the city



into our hands and have every right to expect that we do all in our power to keep the tax rate down. Therefore, you should be fully informed as to the problems that face us and methods used to deal with same.

We were fortunate in 1950 to hold the tax rate down to \$48.00 for although we cut down on appropriations and made up \$100,000.00 in valuations we lost approximately \$600,000.00 in valuations when the city lost the Public Service Company tax case. The fortunate part was that we were able to make a compromise agreement with the Company whereby they agreed not to collect the paid-in back taxes that amounted to over \$100,000.00. I would like to take this opportunity to let everyone know that our City Solicitor, Eugene S. Daniell, was very helpful to me in making this agreement. The problem that remains is that the City of Franklin has one half million dollars less in taxable property from which to realize taxes, based on the present tax rate of \$48.00 per thousand this figure represents \$24,000.00. Now, we are also faced with legal fees due to the Upton Law Firm. We have no idea how much this bill will be.

Next we have the problem of the education of the children at the Daniel Webster Home which has still been left undecided. There is no question in the minds of most people, especially here in Franklin, that problem is a responsibility of the State of New Hampshire, but at this moment the laws are not clear in defining where this responsibility lies. It is hoped that this coming legislature will deal with this matter and that our Franklin legislators will interest themselves completely in protecting Franklin's interest.

Our immediate attention must be given to the request for Cost of Living wage increases made by all members of the city's personnel. The Finance Committee and Council are working on this problem. We must be realistic and know that everyone is affected by rising costs since the start of the Korean War and that some equitable arrangement should be made to help each of the City employees meet this situation. The finance committee has already recommended to the council that members of the Fire, Police, and Highway departments receiving up to \$50.00 a week be given an increase of \$3.60 a week which amounts to (\$187.20 a year). This has been voted upon and went into effect November 21, 1950. This same cost of living affects everyone and the School Department, the Library employees, as well as all other salary department heads must be given consideration. The finance committee has met with the School Board and Teachers' Committee and with the Library Trustees and have had committee meetings considering every angle from the employees side and from the ultimate cost to you, the taxpayers. It would be wonderful if the perfect solution could be worked out and acted upon at once. But the facts remain that we have many problems and we are not a rich community. How-

ever, the finance committee has agreed unanimously to recommend to the City Council that each and every salaried employee of the city be given the same cost of living increase of \$3.60 a week (or \$187.20 a year). It is to be clearly understood that this is a cost of living increase and should not be considered as a merit increase. These pay increases in total will amount to \$16,000.00 and will mean \$2.00 a thousand added to our tax rate unless we can make offsetting savings or increases in our valuations.

Franklin is the first or one of the first cities in our State to have the new mercury lights installed in our business area. These new lights give us 121.7% more lighting and at a reduction of 3% in cost. Main Street in Ward One is also going to have these new mercury lights. Many people from here and outside our city have acclaimed the virtues of these new lights. The cost of installation has been borne entirely by the Public Service Company and represents an outlay of upwards to \$20,000.00. We have gratefully acknowledged by letter this new and much needed service to Franklin to Mr. Cederholm of the Public Service Company and to his associates, Mr. Swain, Mr. Schiller and the Board of Directors. Councilman Powell and the lighting committee will continue to make an overall survey of the street lighting problem.

An endless and tireless worker for the good of Franklin is Leo Bourassa. He has done more than anyone else to interest new industry in coming here. He has contacted many leads and has had some hopeful prospects. But you taxpayers do not want talk, you want results and until such a time, Mr. Bourassa is reluctant to talk about his efforts.

Visionary and far fetched ideas quite often go together. We do not wish to be guilty of either, but expansion and growth of Franklin could be in the Willow Hill, Sanborn Street to Tilton line area. The initial cost for water and sewer services would be very high but many are inclined to believe it would prove successful in the long run.

We must not let our streets and sidewalks go beyond repair. I have talked with the other members of the Finance Committee and we intend to recommend to the Council that all our streets be repaired and resurfaced this coming year. It is our belief that Commissioner Zak will be able to do this extensive work on our streets at a minimum cost as he did on the High School, the Hancock and the Nesmith Schools this summer, when he and his men completed all the work that needed to be done for approximately \$6,000.00 although earlier estimates by contract ran from \$12,000.00 to \$15,000.00.

Mrs. Helen Sullivan who has served Franklin and the Schools so well for nine years decided not to run for re-election to the School Board. We regret losing the excellent services

rendered by Mrs. Sullivan. She will always be gratefully remembered.

However, we are all pleased that Dr. Morin has decided to take his turn in public office and that he was elected unopposed for member of the School Board.

Our new Superintendent of Schools, Fred W. Snell, has been with us since August. We understand that he likes it here in Franklin and we would like to have him know that it is mutual, Franklin also likes him.

We wish to thank the outgoing councilmen Charles Slack, Lawrence Gauthier and Frank Gerry for the cooperation and work they have rendered the city at no remuneration, except for the desire and will to be of service. We hope that Mr. Slack will be on hand when we all accept the new fire engine for which he fought so hard and doggedly.

A year ago at the inaugural we asked that those who have the ability, prepare themselves to take their turn in the responsibility of running the city. We can be very pleased that our new members of the Council, Arthur Dalphond, Emil Bonk and Edward Kelton took heed and are with us tonight.

We are told that in case of War and of Atom Bombing our role will probably be that of caring for the evacuees from the larger cities. Plans are being made from Federal and State levels and I believe we can feel assured that our Civil Defense Director, Malcolm Thompson is preparing our city for our part in the emergency. I am grateful to Mr. Thompson for accepting this important and difficult job and I am very pleased at the progress he is making. Volunteer help is not as numerous as it needs to be and I make the plea that every available and capable person rally to this cause and offer their assistance.

In many ways we have had Harmony and a very high percentage of the motions and resolutions have been voted upon unanimously by our 1950 Council. Politics played a very minor part. Economy was promised and the results as previously read proved that with all of us working together Economy was achieved. We have not made all of the Progress that we would like and perhaps we will have more to show at the end of our second term. I wish to thank all the employees of the city, our City Clerk, Mrs. Mildred Gilman and Deputy Clerk Mrs. Julie Johnson; all the Department Heads and Councilmen for their cooperation this past year.

I fervently hope that 1951 will bring peace to the world and that we will continue to work towards Harmony, Economy and Progress here in Franklin.

## Exaugural Address

W. Frank Welch delivered the following address on his retirement as mayor on Monday, Jan. 7, 1952:

Rev. Wolverton, Mayor-elect Retter, Members of the old and new City Council, Citizens of Franklin:

Two years ago, when I was asked why are you getting into politics I answered, and it is a matter of public record—"I have a sincere feeling that I can get along with the different elements in the political life in our city and bring about harmony. I have no axes to grind, no enemies to punish, and only a firm desire to work for the betterment of Franklin which I feel can best be done in an atmosphere of harmony."

This proved to be a big order, but by and large we did get along extraordinarily well. You will remember that all our council meetings were held openly, that every member of the council, regardless of party, had equal opportunity to be heard, that citizens who came to the council meetings were given the same opportunity, and that the press was always welcome and invited to attend every meeting. Everyone knew what was going on and there was the feeling that everyone was being treated fairly.

In this atmosphere of Harmony your council and mayor found complete cooperation with all city department heads and their staffs, and working together like this brought many fine results.

You will be glad to know that our finances will be in the black figures rather than the red figures I feared earlier. Our auditors tell us that we will have \$3,465.34 to add to our surplus, making a total surplus figure of \$13,893.50.

We will also carry over into 1952 a total of \$4,325.13 which will be set up as follows: a new war memorial fund \$1000.00, for further development of the Webster Lake bathing beach projects \$2,643.53, and for a playground and a suitable memorial for the Daniell Park Development \$681.60.

Our Parking Meter account had a balance of \$3,808.55 and your council has voted that \$2,880.00 of this account be set aside as an initial payment on a road improvement fund of about \$60,000, which will be shared with us by Federal and State Funds; about \$30,000 Federal, \$15,000 State, and \$15,000 City Funds. Your new council will continue to study this project more carefully and decide the best course to take. It is my recommendation that you go ahead with this progressive plan.

Most of our departments operated within their appropriation and had a total of \$11,816.78 unexpended; but a number of departments over-expended their appropriation to the amount of \$15,794.47. This left a net over expenditure of \$3,977.69.

Those department heads who were successful in staying within or who came very close to their figure I wish to commend highly. In the case of the over expenditures by some departments, I believe that the expenses were legitimate and perhaps entirely unavoidable and necessary.

During my two terms in office your council has purchased

a new 750 gallon fire pumper, a new police cruiser, a new pick up truck, a used tractor, two used trucks, plowing equipment and a new water pump. However, the highway department is still in need of more new equipment. Our auditor suggests that if it is necessary to purchase three to five new pieces of equipment including new trucks, that a bond issue of short term duration three to five years should be considered.

This year we started a General Improvement Plan. A large committee was named including your mayor, each member of the council and interested citizens from each section of the city. There were twenty-one on this committee and we met a number of times with excellent attendance. Sewerage, water extension and maintenance were studied, as well as the need for road and highway improvements. Out of these meetings came the recommendation for a **Long Term Plan** which included the widening of Aiken Avenue and lower Sanborn Street, the commitment on the part of the council to extend sewerage to South Prospect Street first, and next the extension of water to the Sanborn Hill section which has been without water for so many years. The plan then recognized the need for extension of sewerage and water to the Plains area, and sewerage to the Sturtevant, Carver and Hutchinson Streets; as well as Salisbury Road and a section of South Main Street. I hope that the intent of this Long Term Plan will be carried out as adopted, with the work being done by the city workmen and out of current appropriations.

Our council can point with pride to the work done at the Webster Lake Development which was initiated by Councilman LaBranche; by the improvements at Odell Park as suggested by Arthur Pinard of the Parks and Playgrounds Commission; of the complete renovation of the Fire Station as planned by Councilman Gilman, Chief Boomhower and your mayor. The extension of sewerage on Salisbury Street, Douphinett Street and Freedom Drive; the much needed repairs on the High School; the better street lighting we now have all over the city, including the new mercury lights installed by the Public Service Company in the business sections of Ward I and Central Street.

More than any other achievement your council, your city solicitor and your mayor can be proud of is the settlement of the Public Service Case which saved the city of Franklin taxpayers over \$100,000.00.

Figures at their best are boring and I shall not attempt to go into too many more, but a careful study of the records will show that your outgoing council has given you a very economical administration.

In the two years they were in charge of your city finances they added to the surplus \$20,191.89; they set aside \$2,880.00 and \$4,325.13 for special projects in 1952. They paid off \$5,000.00 on the Temporary Loan balance, and left \$928.55 in the Meter Fund.

This was not a simple task because they had to accept a loss of valuations of one half million dollars, which in itself meant \$24,500.00 less taxes. They also had the cost of lawyer fees of \$9,103.15. The interesting fact is that this was accomplished with only \$10,666.96 of additional taxes, having been raised over and above the preceding administration tax (1949) of \$411,962.82. (See page 18 of the 1950 Annual Report.)

To Commissioner Zak, I want to pay particular tribute. His efforts have been tireless. Too few people know of all his ac-

complishments in his many city jobs that he holds. To his assistant, Earl Nowell and the highway men for their grand work, winter and summer, I have the highest praise.

In the last two years, Franklin has established record low costs in fire losses; this year's low was \$6,000.00. To Publisher, John P. Lewis who has campaigned so successfully for Fire Prevention, to Chief Boomhower and his firemen who have faithfully and regularly inspected all properties for fire hazards, and to the council which has fostered weekly pickups of all refuse, I believe this credit should go.

Special mention should be given to Commissioner of Welfare, Albert Ayotte for doing a splendid job. Welfare costs have been cut over 25% and no one has been known to go hungry, suffer from the cold nor be without medical attention.

To Clem Lemire who has done so much good with the recreational activities . . . to our City Clerk and Tax Collector, Mrs. Mildred Gilman who does her work so expertly and collects better than 90% of the taxes currently each year. . . to Chief Dodge and his policemen who protect our city so ably and at a minimum police protection cost as compared with other cities of our size. . . to Superintendent Snell, the school committee and the faculty. . . to Librarian, Mildred Peaslee and the library trustees. . . to the Park Commissioners. . . to Superintendent Merrill and his crew who are on call 24 hours a day . . . to the Water Commissioners . . . to City Solicitor Daniell and to all other city employees; I want to express my thanks and appreciation for their fine work.

I want it to be known that our Tax Assessors, Chamberlain, Sokul and Lane have done their jobs faithfully and well. They have helped immeasurably to keep the tax rate down through fair valuations to all.

In the way of special recognition, I want especially to thank Richard Clarenbach, Wiggin Gilman and Arthur Dalphond who gave so willing of their time and knowledge with your mayor on the Finance Committee; to Leo Bourassa, Earl Goss and all the others who gave so much of their time, effort and cooperation to your mayor in the endeavor to bring new industry to Franklin.

To our new Mayor, Harold Retter, I pledge my cooperation and assistance at any time he may wish to call upon me. GOOD LUCK, Harold. My best wishes to you and your council for a successful Administration.

To the members of the outgoing council and former members, Charles Slack, Lawrence Gauthier, Alcide LaBranche and Richard Clarenbach, thank you for your splendid cooperation.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my work and my associations with all of you. To the people of Franklin, I sincerely want to thank you for bestowing upon me the great honor of having been your Mayor.

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# Auditor's Report

CITY OF FRANKLIN, NEW HAMPSHIRE  
FOR THE YEAR 1951

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January 16, 1952

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council

Franklin, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

At your request and in accordance with the City Ordinances, I have made an examination of the books and underlying records of the City of Franklin for the year ended December 15, 1951. I submit herewith my report consisting of Exhibits and Schedules together with my comments.

## Scope of Audit

I examined and tested such records and supporting evidence by the methods and to the extent I deemed appropriate. A substantial number of outstanding Taxes Receivable and Water Accounts Receivable were verified by direct correspondence. Independent verification was obtained on such items as Cash in Bank and Loans Payable.

With the exception of Taxes, Accounts Receivable and some accruals, the books of the City are kept on a cash basis.

## BALANCE SHEET—GENERAL FUND

The Balance Sheet—General Fund discloses the financial condition of the City of Franklin as at December 15, 1951.

**Cash on Hand and in Banks—\$45,908.01**

The Cash in the Bank was reconciled as to the bank statement and the independent verification received from the depository, while the Cash on Hand was verified by count as at

the close of business on December 15, 1951. The receipts were traced to the bank deposits and all checks canceled during the year were examined.

**Accounts Receivable—\$1,615.81**

A listing of the unpaid accounts receivable balances was in agreement with the controlling accounts.

**Taxes Receivable—\$41,698.29**

The uncollected taxes as at December 15, 1951 were \$41,698.29 against which there is a reserve for uncollectible taxes in the amount of \$1,460.24. There has been no change in the reserve in the past few years, all abatements having been charged to the overlay. A detail of the activity and the levies of the various years is shown on Exhibit A—Schedule 1 which also discloses the difference between the control and the detail accounts. These variances are substantially the same as those at the end of the previous fiscal year, indicating that the activity in the controlling accounts was correctly reflected in the detail account.

Several hundred verification letters were mailed to the unpaid tax accounts. All differences reported to me were investigated and satisfactorily explained. Approximately 91% of the 1951 tax levy was collected.

The 1951 tax warrant was completely footed and reconciled to the ward books. The valuation was also proved. A spot check was made of the daily receipt stubs on taxes collected and further traced to the tax ledger.

The 1951 tax rate of \$4.90 per hundred, as approved by the State of New Hampshire Tax Commission, was confirmed by direct correspondence.

**Unredeemed Tax Sales—\$4,463.16**

**Property Acquired by Tax Deed—\$1,147.09**

These items which represent the property acquired for non-payment of taxes was accepted as shown on the books.

**Soldiers' Bonus Taxes Receivable—\$260.27**

**Head Taxes Receivable—\$2,312.00**

The above items represent taxes to be collected and paid to the State of New Hampshire.

**Due from the State of New Hampshire—\$4,850.84**

The above caption is detailed on the Balance Sheet. Most of the items were independently verified with the proper authorities and some of them were received during the progress of the audit.

**Temporary Loans in Anticipation of Taxes—\$60,000.00**

This item represents the balance due the First National Bank of Boston on borrowings in anticipation of taxes and was verified by correspondence. The current budget included an item of \$5,000.00 for the reduction of the temporary loan and I recommend that this procedure be continued until the account is completely liquidated.

Exhibit H is submitted showing comparative balance sheets for the years 1941-1950 and shows the growth of the temporary loan account. Exhibit I discloses the activity in the Surplus Account since 1941 and was prepared from published reports for this period. An examination of the Surplus Account discloses the necessity of the temporary loan. The years 1941, 1942 and 1943 reveal a decrease in surplus as a result of two important factors. First, appropriations made in excess of revenue, and second the excess of overdrafts and other charges over unexpended balances. In 1946 and 1947 deficit financing continued which in turn required an increase in loans.

**Reserve for Soldiers' Bonus Taxes—\$273.31**

**Reserve for Head Taxes—\$16,986.00**

These items represent the City's liability to the State of New Hampshire on Soldiers' Bonus and Head Taxes.

**Parking Meters—\$3,808.55**

The foregoing item represents the balance on parking meter collections, the cash for which is necessarily included in the Cash on Hand.

**Unexpended Balances Carried to 1952—\$4,325.13**

The activity in these accounts is shown in Exhibit A—Schedule 2C.

**Surplus—\$13,893.50**

Exhibit A—Schedules 2, 2A, 2E and 2C detail the activity operations for the current year and further substantiate the amount transferred to Surplus at the end of the year in the amount of \$3,465.34. The 1951 budget appropriated \$15,000.00 from the Surplus Account which is the principal reason for the decrease in Surplus.

**BALANCE SHEET—GENERAL INDEBTEDNESS**

**EXHIBIT B**

The Balance Sheet—General Indebtedness discloses the City's Liability on bonds, serial notes and long term notes as at December 15, 1951. The indebtedness is detailed in Exhibit B—Schedule 1. All bonds canceled and interest coupons paid during the year were produced for my inspection.

**BALANCE SHEET—TRUST FUNDS**

**EXHIBIT C**

The Balance Sheet—Trust Funds records the assets and sources of such assets in the custody of the trustees of the trust funds.

**Cash in Banks—\$37,617.67**

Cash in the commercial and savings banks was reconciled to the bank statement as well as the independent confirmation received directly from the depository.

**Investments—\$83,203.93**

The securities were inspected in the presence of the trustees of the trust funds. Exhibit C—Schedule 1 lists the various trust funds and shows the activity for the year.

## BALANCE SHEET—WATER WORKS

### EXHIBIT D

The Balance Sheet—Water Works sets forth the financial condition of the Water Works for the year as at December 15, 1951.

**Cash in Franklin National Bank—\$5,564.14**

**Cash in Franklin Savings Bank—\$1,220.32**

**Petty Cash Fund—\$35.43**

The Cash on Hand was verified by count and Cash in Banks was reconciled to the bank statement and to the independent verification from the banks.

**Accounts Receivable—\$8,909.08**

A listing of the detail accounts was in agreement with the controlling accounts. Outstanding balances as at the close of the period were verified by direct correspondence.

**Inventory—\$14,525.79**

There was an increase of \$13,223.79 in the inventory over the previous year. No attempt was made to check the physical items but the prices used were traced or compared with the most recent invoices.

**U. S. Treasury Bonds—\$14,009.50**

The investment in U. S. Treasury Bonds is in accordance with the Public Laws of 1943, Chapter 160 and is reserved for future construction. The bonds were examined in the presence of the trustees of the trust funds in whose custody the bonds are kept. A detail of the investment appears on Exhibit D—Schedule 1.

**Fixed Assets—\$305,608.32**

The Balance Sheet shows the cost, the depreciation reserve and the net book value of the accounts comprising the Fixed Assets.

### **Due City of Franklin—\$121,000.00**

The above amount is due the City of Franklin for bonds issued, known as Water Bonds, and sold in 1948.

### **Surplus—\$62,175.02**

The gain for the year as well as the adjustment of Petty Cash was added to the Surplus balance of December 15, 1950 and results in a Surplus of \$62,175.02.

### **School District—Statement of Cash Receipts and Disbursements**

### **Public Library—Statement of Cash Receipts and Disbursements**

### **Overseer of Poor—Statement of Cash Receipts and Disbursements**

The books and records of the above were examined and the canceled checks were compared with the cash disbursements records. The Cash in the Bank at the close of the year was reconciled to the bank statement and independently confirmed with the various depositories. Vendors' invoices unpaid at the end of the year are not reflected on these statements since the City is on a cash basis.

### **Payrolls**

I examined all payroll checks canceled during the year and reconciled the bank statement.

### **City Clerk's Office**

The books and records of the City Clerk's office were spot checked. The daily cash collection register tapes were checked to the cash receipts book and traced to the bank deposits. A spot check was made of the automobile permits and dog licenses issued during the year. Other business licenses were also spot checked.

Exhibit A—Schedule 2C sets forth the budgetary appropriation for the year and discloses the activity in each of the departments. It is to be noted that the overexpended balances were \$15,794.47 and that the unexpended balance was



\$11,816.78 or a net overexpenditure of \$3,977.69. About one-half of the departments overexpended their appropriations. This preponderance of overexpenditures indicates that either insufficient consideration was given in preparing the budget or that greater services are being provided than were planned in the budget. In either case an effort should be made to keep within the appropriations and to exercise every possible effort to budget the services to be rendered.

Because I realize it is impossible to foresee every possible expenditure for each department, I would suggest that a contingency fund be established in the budget. The Mayor and Council would authorize transfers from this appropriation to departments having expenditures beyond their control or unforeseen at the preparation of the budget. The account would act as a shock absorber and if unexpended at the end of the year would be closed to Surplus.

Some of the departments purchased heavy equipment during the year. This of course means that the current budget bears the entire cost of the equipment which is going to be used for a number of years. It is my suggestion that equipment which is going to last for several years be purchased through a bond issue and that the bonds be amortized over the life of the equipment. The budget for the subsequent years would include an amount to be paid on these bonds and these payments would be comparable to depreciation charges.

An analysis of the abatements on property taxes discloses the following reasons for their issuance:

As a result of a law suit, The Public Service Company of N. H. v. The City of Franklin, Superior Court, April Term 1950, there is a contingent liability of \$100,000.00 which is described in detail in the report for the year 1950.

The following summarizes the salient points which should be given your careful consideration:

1. Liquidating the temporary loans as soon as possible.
2. Eliminating departmental overexpenditures.
3. Establishing a Contingency Fund.
4. Purchasing heavy equipment through bond issues.
5. Amortization of these bonds based on the life of the equipment.

I wish to express my appreciation to all the City Officials and the members of their staffs for the cooperation and courtesies extended me during the audit.

## ENGINEER'S REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1952

The fire loss has been kept very low this year. We have been able to install sirens, operated from Fire Headquarters, at the three most dangerous intersections in the City, to reduce the traffic hazard. The Central Station is being painted inside and out. Three new overhead doors have been installed and the front of the building remodeled. New fluorescent lights have been put in on the first floor and also new lights on the front of the building. A small room has been made over and we now have a kitchen where we can serve coffee and light lunches to the men after a fire. A new wash sink and a sink to refill the extinguisher have also been put in on the first floor. The foundation and the first floor have been braced up to accommodate the heavy trucks. This work has been done by the permanent men at no extra cost to the City. The new Seagraves pumper was placed in service the first of August, taking the place of the obsolete American La-

france. The purchase of more 2½" hose and the replacement of the 1927 Lincoln service truck is recommended.

The Board of Fire Engineers wish to take this opportunity to thank His Honor, the Mayor, the Fire Committee, and Members of the City Council, also the members of the Fire Department for their assistance in making the year of 1951 successful.

## LIBRARIANS REPORT

In reviewing the year 1951 the impression of change is evident, sometimes an improvement and again conditions have been affected adversely. Sometimes resembling previous war conditions exists, for there has been an increased cost in nearly everything it has been necessary to purchase. The circulation of library materials has held up almost to the increase of the previous year, although we have lost many readers who have entered the services or defense industries.

The library collection numbers 27,457 volumes at the close of the year. Town readers and those who attend school, work, or trade in Franklin have borrowed 48,059 books, magazines, items of filed material and pictures. The reading average has shown a gain in every group, now standing at 52% fiction; 25% non-fiction; 23% juvenile reading. The book collection received 907 additions: 792 by purchase, 115 by gifts, while 11 of the books were presented for addition to the Memorial Book Shelf which contains 86 volumes to date. Readers had the use of 6 newspapers and 140 magazines, of which 43 were received as gifts. Worn volumes discarded totaled 184 volumes, about twice the number withdrawn last year. Newly registered borrowers have numbered 368, withdrawal of inactive borrowers was 323, leaving an active borrower list of 3,214 names. Of this number 422 are non-resident borrowers. Our library has borrowed 62 volumes from other libraries and loaned 15 of our books requested through what is known as the Inter-library Loan system.

Franklin's per capita reading score is still 7 plus for the year. The circulation of books placed at Junior High School for student reading totaled 384, with the addition of other school circulations making a count of 486 volumes. School teachers and their classes have visited the library on several occasions. The largest attendance was during Book Week

when 9 teachers and 250 pupils came to see the new books and a foreign doll exhibit. A High School teacher held class visits as a project on the use of the card catalog for finding authors, titles and subjects of books.

Exhibits have varied, chief of which have been those featuring early Franklin schools, old maps, local dramatic groups, baseball stars including local men (especially Charles E. Chapman), French newspapers published locally in early 1900s, foreign dolls, Korean exhibit honoring Paul Clifford (who as Lt. Col. led the first American troops into the North Korean capital). H. A. Currier pictures, National Hospital Day (pictures of local hospital), Calvin Coolidge display, and an art exhibit of different types of prints done by Gladys (Hood) Detwiler.

Operating expenses for the year totaled \$12,711.88. The uncompleted Carter bequest of \$5,625.00 received to date has been turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds of the city for investment. Salaries amounted to \$7,262.83 which included increases provided by the Council and Library Board a year ago. For the first time librarians and library employees became eligible for the benefits provided by the Social Security Act, necessitating further withholdings from individuals and equal contributions by the Library Board. Book and magazine costs have increased sharply during the year, with \$2,518.08 spent for these items. Fines amounted to \$477.65 and rentals were \$510.84. The telephone bill, without toll charges, totals \$96.00 per year, while in 1946 the cost was \$38.04.

The customary good care was given building and grounds by Ralph C. Colcord and Fred K. Longley. Water damage to the lawn between the library and City Hall will require some sort of remedial treatment at an early date. Repairs within the building have been the painting of the three rooms facing Central street. This is the time when the acoustical tile ceilings have saved the city over one hundred dollars on a redecorating job. The cement floors in the service corner of the basement and the staff-workroom received a coat of paint. The staff room has been improved further by the addition of a reversible fiber rug, plastic hangings and a new chair at the work table. New glass curtains were a necessity in the reading rooms this year. Two CO<sup>2</sup> fire extinguishers were added after fire inspection recommendations were made. A Mitten kit of white letters for bulletin board use makes a welcome addition to library equipment.

The two most important improvement projects of the year were (1) new chairs in both reading rooms and at the table in the Draper Room, replacing chairs remaining after 44 years of service, and (2) Slimline fluorescent lighting in the seven poorly lighted aisles of the stack room on the main floor.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT (Continued)

Library Hall has been used regularly by the Woman's Club and the Hospital Aid Society. The Visiting Nurse Association and Girl Scouts Troop 2 have each held one public meeting there during the year. School superintendents of the state held a one-day annual session at the library, as last year. Each year the TB Christmas Seal Tag Day team uses the library as headquarters.

The Board of Library Trustees added a new member when Alger S. Bourn was appointed to fill a two year unexpired term of Rodney A. Griffin II, resigned. The Board lost a valued member by the death of Mrs. Carrie L. Eddy who had served three terms (9) years as an interested trustee.

Many friends have remembered the library with gifts of books, magazines and music. Items of local interest and value have come from Kendrick C. Bean, Wallace Buchanan, Gertrude M. Dresser, Carrie L. Eddy, Mabelle T. Kidder, John P. Lewis, Herbert J. Peaslee, Bessie C. Rowell, Frank T. Ripley, Jean M. Shaw, Alice M. Shepard and Mrs. Barron Shirley.

The Girl Scouts, Troop 2, presented a career story to the Children's Room during Book Week. The Woman's Club has given a Tasha Tudor sketch which they plan to have framed for the Children's Room.

The librarian has spoken on current books on three occasions during the year and attended the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association held in Nashua on May 11 and 12. Book Suggestions appear regularly in The Journal-Transcript.

Staff changes have occurred. In February Miss Chase returned to her duties after a leave of absence during which Miss Goodell served well as library assistant. # Board of Education

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## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

**To the Members of the Franklin School Board, Mayor and Council and Citizens of Franklin:**

I herewith submit my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools. This is the fifty-first in the series of reports prepared by school superintendents.

Each year brings with it many new problems which the schools must face. This year has been no exception. We have seen, heard and read about the seemingly moral decline in political life, scandals in the athletic world, stalemates in the field of international understanding, and a growing tension regarding the high costs of schools and government. Realizing that something should be done to bring about a better understanding on these matters your school system conducted a two day workshop in September of this year. The theme of that meeting was "Teaching of Moral and Spiritual Values in the Public Schools." Your teachers were enthusiastic participants in the various discussions which pertained to the best manner of teaching the fundamental concepts regarding the right way of living. Your children are reaping the benefit of these two days from their teachers. They will be shown and be taught these things which are so fundamental to our democratic way of life.

In my report of last year I stated that the community had its responsibility to the youth of Franklin. This is still true. On the other hand the youth of Franklin owe a responsibility to the community. It is their responsibility to so regulate their school life that they will be able to gain as much as they possibly can to perpetuate our way of life and to improve the community. The varied program of studies and the guidance available is such that all the youth in our schools should be able to develop qualities that will make Franklin a better place to live. Your staff is aware of the need for preparing youth to take their place in the community and are meeting it to the best of their ability. We have many other agencies in the community that are giving us valuable assistance in this important job. All of us working together should prove helpful in bringing about the desired results.

This report, along with those of the high school principal, nurse, and statistical tables covers the year 1951. It will attempt to cover Personnel, School Plant Maintenance, School Financing and point out some of the needs of the District.

## Personnel

Franklin has again been fortunate in having a small teacher turnover during the year 1951. Since December 16, 1950 there have been only five changes. Mrs. Mavis Rutherford, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College in January of 1951 replaced Mrs. Jeannette Therrien who resigned in January. Mrs. Rutherford was transferred in September to the second grade position made vacant by the retirement of Miss Florence Jackman last June. Miss Jackman closed out, in June 1951, a long and successful period of teaching at the Nesmith School. Her contributions have been many and friendships numerous. The District is deep in its appreciation of the many years of service that Miss Jackman has given to the youth of the city.

Miss Rosalind O'Brien, teacher of English at the Franklin High School resigned in June to accept a position in Malone, New York. We were most fortunate in finding, as her replacement, Mr. Robert Arthur, a graduate of the University of Vermont and holder of the Master of Arts in Teaching from Harvard University. Mr. Arthur has made an admirable start in his first year of teaching.

During the summer of 1951 Mr. Edward Connor tendered his resignation to enter business. It was with deep regret that it was accepted. Mr. Connor had done much to pioneer Driver Training for Franklin and was an excellent member of the staff. He assisted developing many good line men for the football team and was the faculty manager of athletics. To fill his position we were again fortunate in being able to find a person who would fill the gap left by Mr. Connor. Mr. John Knight, a graduate of Boston University with a major in the field of social studies was elected as teacher of Social Studies, Driver Training and assistant in Football. He has filled this position with credit to himself and to the pupils under his tutelage.

Miss Clara Heselton resigned to accept a position in the Concord, New Hampshire public schools. Her position as teacher of Grade I at the Nesmith School was filled by Miss Maxine Chellis, a Franklin High School graduate and a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College. Here again, as in the case of the others, we find that the pupils are showing progress and enthusiasm under her teaching.

Because of the large number of fifth grade pupils at the Nesmith School this year it was necessary to have a helping teacher for that grade. Mrs. Rita Seamans, kindergarten teacher for the morning sessions, was employed on a full time basis and is assisting with Grade V in the afternoon.

Upon the resignation of Mrs. Helen Welch, for many years instructor of Handwriting, the services of the Rinehart Handwriting System of Waltham, Massachusetts, was obtained. This insures the carrying on of the excellent work Mrs. Welch had been doing for the District.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (Continued)

The Franklin Salary Schedule has been a determining factor in keeping a constancy in the teaching staff. In order to meet the competition for the services of teachers it was necessary to revise the salary schedule upward. The new minimum was established at \$2256 with a maximum of \$3120. The new schedule calls for a single salary for all teachers. Previously the maximums were smaller for the teachers of the elementary schools. This year 1952 will see all teachers placed on schedule. The new schedule is still short of meeting the recommended minimum in the state of \$2400.

The year 1951 saw very little done with regard to the caring for much needed repairs. Only general routine matters were taken care of because of the reduced budget. In all buildings the janitors cleaned all floors, sealed and waxed the same, varnished all desks, and painted some of the areas in the various schools. They installed a small number of bulletin boards and cared for the school lawns. No major work of any sort was done. Left undone were such things as painting the outside of the High School, Hancock School, replacement of toilets, replacement of machine tools and machines in the High School shop, and the making of storage space at the High School. It is hoped that some of these things will be able to be done in the budget year fo 1952.

The Junior High Barn, so called, was given to the city in order that it might be used by a Recreation Center thereby benefitting all youth in the City of Franklin. The School Board and the Parks and Playgrounds Commission agreed upon the articles of transfer. The Recreation Association will furnish its own heat and lighting, as well as maintaining the building. The school will reserve the use of the band room and will be granted the use of the gym when necessary. This has been a step in the right direction in that it makes the building much more useful than it had been when reserved wholly for the Junior High activities.

Considerable thought should be given to the establishing of a planned program of maintenance of the school plant. This can be done over a period of three to five years. A sum of money should be made available each year to do a portion of the whole job. For instance: Lighting is a problem in all of the schools. To do this job all in one year would be too great a burden to assume. If, however, some of it were done yearly we would eventually arrive at the solution to the problem. The other needs can be treated in this same way. To keep your property in good repair calls for an annual expenditure of monies. It is good business practice to meet the need as it arises. In the regular maintenance program we are trying to keep up the appearance of our plant. Major needs, however, have to be financed and dealt with in another manner.

## Financing

During the school year 1951 the taxpayers of the City of Franklin contributed \$179,000 for the support of its schools. This represents an expenditure of about \$185 per pupil. Compared to the state average of \$212 it appears as though Franklin was not supporting its schools to the average ability of other districts in the state. This is also reflected in the new state aid formula which does not give Franklin any aid. We are classified as one of the wealthier communities in the state when it comes to distribution of state aid monies. All manners of economics have been effected to try to keep the expenditures down as low as possible without causing any serious break in the educational program. One of these has been in the field of transportation. The School Board set up minimum standards for distances pupils should walk, rearranged the stops on the routes, and eliminated one vehicle. The District bus is operating for its first full year with every evidence of proving the worthwhileness of district ownership of busses. While this report is being written the Board is requesting an additional vehicle in order that the District may eventually operate its own system of transportation. This will mean a saving in the fixed costs of the district.

Another means whereby the District might effect savings is to place one of the staff on a full time basis year round and let him take care of a major portion of the work needed to be done in the schools so far as capital improvement and outlay was concerned. This may also be a solution to the eventual need of a third school bus driver if the District is allowed to purchase busses to do all of its own transporting.

## Needs

The needs of the District are many but for the purpose of this report I should like to list a few of the most needy. All rooms in the schools of the District are in need of light improvement. A check at the Junior High buildings shows that the lighting system does very little toward the supplementing of daylight. In some spots in the classrooms there is as little as five foot candles of lighting. This is barely enough to do the roughest possible kind of work. Recommended is an intensity of at least 15-20 foot candles. If fine work is to be done the intensity should be increased. In the same room with the lights on we find that the intensity is increased by only about 4-5 foot candles. This check was taken on a dull day with snow on the ground. If taken on a dull day with no snow there would be smaller readings obtained.

Improvement in lighting of a classroom, however, entails more than just putting in new fixtures. The amount of light which can be made available for the pupils depends upon the reflective surfaces. Therefore, when new fixtures are installed we should also take care of the dark surfaces in the rooms.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (Continued)

These should be painted in lighter colors. Desk tops should be sanded and varnished with a clear varnish to give the natural effect of the wood. Blackboards should be painted green and all the wood trim lightened. Each of the buildings has many trees around it. Each tree, while it adds some to the beauty of the grounds, prevents a great deal of natural light from entering the classroom. Some planned removal of trees should be considered at the Hancock, Nesmith, and the Junior High Schools. Removal of trees on the Hancock area would allow for more play space which is badly needed.

The instructional program of the District could be greatly improved by the addition of a person to head up the Physical Education Department. Your pupils are being deprived of the opportunity to engage in wholesome play activities which the physical education program would provide. Another factor in the improvement of the instructional program would be the addition of a supervisor of the art program. You have many pupils who would benefit from this instruction. All pupils would be able to know and appreciate good arts and crafts work if this were included in their program of studies.

We have, at the present time, a member of the staff who works part of the day as a remedial reading person. Because of the number of pupils who are experiencing difficulty with the reading programs and other portions of their work it would be of great help were we able to have this person full time. More pupils could be reached and more time could be spent with pupils needing help because of days lost, slowness in learning and physical difficulties.

In closing this report I wish to express my appreciation to the Board, Mayor and Council, Teachers, Parent-Teacher Associations, and the many citizens who have been so helpful during the past year. Your help, your friendly spirit, and your enthusiasm for good schools makes this position one of deep pleasure. I hope that we can continue for many years this kind of relationship in order that our boys and girls may have the very best possible education.

The total is about 20 less than the total enrollment for last year.

## Faculty

Three changes were made in the teaching staff this year. Mr. John Knight replaced Mr. Edward Connor as teacher of Driving, Economic Geography, and Problems of American Democracy. He is also assistant football coach and coach of Hockey. Mr. Robert Arthur replaced Miss Rosalind O'Brien as teacher of Junior and Sophomore English. He is also Dramatics coach. Mr. George Hancox will replace Mrs. Catherine Tolman as teacher of Freshmen English and Public Speaking. He will also be advisor of the Assembly Committee and of the school newspaper. He will begin his service on January 15, 1952. Mr. Arthur and Mr. Knight began service in September, 1951. They have adjusted to our school very well and are sincerely interested in our boys and girls. Mr. Frank Crowley is now Faculty Advisor of the Athletic Program. This responsibility was formerly held by Mr. Connor.

## New Developments

Two new subjects were added as electives to our Program of Studies this year. Public Speaking is a half year course which is designed to give training and experience in oral expression. Mrs. Tolman organized the course and put it into operation. The results have been very encouraging. In the next school year, it will be required of all college preparatory and commercial pupils. It will be elective for all others.

Many girls go through the four years of High School without having any experience in the Home Economics department. The usual reason is that required subjects make scheduling the Home Economic subjects impossible. Miss Bertha Pellerin planned a combined course which is now available to Senior girls only. It is called Special Home Economics and includes some features of the regular Home Economics subjects called clothing and textiles, foods and nutrition, the home and the family.

## HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT (Con't)

Miss Mary McIntosh has completed the cataloging, numbering, and card indexing of the books and magazines in the school library. We now have over 600 volumes in the library. Students have been trained as librarians. It is open and used every period of the day. The successful operation of this project is due to the careful supervision of Miss McIntosh.

The half year subject, called Government, has undergone a complete revision this year. It was originally a more advanced study of Government than Freshman Civics. Those taking Driving, a half year subject, took Government during the second half year. It could now be called Current World Problems. The texts used are newspapers, and magazines such as Newsweek and Time. The purpose is to help the pupil become familiar with world events and how to use common sources of information.

In cooperation with the University of New Hampshire, we renewed the testing program in Grade 8. The purpose of the tests is to give information for Educational Guidance. Information of this type is essential as we try to understand each pupil and his problems. I recommend that during the next school year the program of testing be changed so that Educational Guidance tests be given to the Freshmen in October and the Vocational Guidance tests be given to the Juniors in November. In this way we will test all pupils and have the results when we need them for guidance work.

### Scholarships

The Franklin Teachers Association established the Bessie C. Rowell Scholarship during the last school year. The purpose of this scholarship is to assist boys and girls to prepare to become teachers. The sum of \$200 was awarded at Graduation in June 1951 to Gerard St. Cyr. The money was raised by the public performance of the play "January Thaw." The combined efforts of all teachers in the system resulted in a very successful performance. The Association is doing a real service for the boys and girls of Franklin.

The Franklin Lodge of Elks, No. 1280, has announced the "Franklin Elk's scholarship." The sum of \$250 will be awarded at graduation to a senior from Bristol, Franklin, or Tilton-Northfield High Schools who qualifies on the basis of scholastic ability, character, leadership and financial need. This scholarship will be awarded annually at graduation. The Franklin Lodge of Elks has again demonstrated its leadership and its interest and confidence in the boys and girls of this area. Many boys and girls will be given a chance to continue their education with this help.

The Franklin Women's Club presented a \$50 scholarship award at graduation in June 1951 to a senior who was going

to college to train as an elementary teacher. The award was made to Miss Doris Roy who is now a freshman at Plymouth Teachers College. This award will encourage seniors to consider the field of elementary teaching.

We were notified in June 1951 that the Cogswell Freshmen Scholarships at the University of New Hampshire were being discontinued. These amounted to \$250. We were fortunate in having three of our graduates receive these scholarships last year. Usually only one graduate in each of the twenty selected schools received an award. I mention this because this scholarship usually was the deciding factor in helping a boy or girl get started in college. I hope that organizations and individuals will follow the example of the Franklin Lodge of Elks, the Teachers Association, The Womens Club, Mr. Walter Duffy and Mr. Jere Daniell. Scholarship Funds are urgently needed. Investing in Franklin's potential leadership will produce great dividends.

### **Curriculum Development**

Each year in my annual report I have urgently requested that provision be made to include Physical Education in our program. As I look back over past reports I find that Mr. Raymond Kendall made the same request in 1929. We now have the facilities which did not exist at that time. We have staff members who have Masters Degrees in Physical Education. In order to establish a program we need one more person on the staff to release present members for the work. To have a complete program we also need the services of a physician to give physical examinations and act as a consultant. I hope that funds will be available this year to establish a program of physical education for both boys and girls.

### **Building and Grounds**

Our enrollment has decreased through the last few years. I believe that we have reached the end of this trend and that we will have increases after this year. Definite plans will have to be made, in the next year or two, to take care of the large number of pupils who will be in the High School in four or five years. We now operate twelve home rooms. We can increase this to fourteen by using the study hall and the biology laboratory as home rooms. This building when built was a three year school, with maximum enrollment of 375. We now include the freshmen class. When the enrollment averages 100 per class we will be very crowded. Indications are that in a few years each class will have well over 100 pupils. We should plan now to take care of that situation before it is upon us.

The plan of building repairs begun last summer is a good one. I refer to refinishing the building by sections. In addition to painting, consideration should be given to improving the lighting facilities. The study hall and classrooms on the

north side, lower floor, have very poor lighting. This situation should be corrected as soon as possible. The new chairs in the sewing room have straightened out the cafeteria seating problem. New desks and chairs are needed in three classrooms. This is furniture brought down from the old building twelve years ago for temporary use. It is in very poor condition. Our athletic field needs a lot of attention. The playing surface improved somewhat during the favorable weather last summer. However, it needs seed and fertilizer this year. We should be replacing some of our shop machinery each year. The rest of the building is in reasonably good condition.

This report has attempted to show that the curriculum of Franklin High School is not static. It changes gradually each year as the needs of our school population change. We are very much concerned with each pupil as an individual and try to understand and help him as such. We are fortunate to have a cooperative, friendly, hardworking staff of teachers and other school employees. Their interest, enthusiasm, and cooperation is reflected in the attitude of the students. We are also much concerned about future developments in our school. All requests for change are intended to improve the educational opportunities of each boy and girl. On behalf of the faculty and students of Franklin High School, I express our appreciation to the Superintendent, the School Board and the people of Franklin for your sincere concern for the youth of our city and all of your efforts to give the best to every boy and girl.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

The advance of health programs in American schools during the past two decades has been a testimonial to the awareness of the American people that good health means more than freedom from illness or disease. In fact, the implications for good health are such that to consider it merely from a negative point of view is to lose sight of its most important factors. Broadly defined then, good health implies a state of complete physical, mental, social and emotional well being and as such provides the basis of a happy and successful way of living for every individual. At the same time, the events of recent years have made us more than ever aware of this broad approach to health and of the need of safeguarding it at all levels. We have come to realize the importance of physical fitness, the prevention of the spread of disease, good personal adjustment, wholesome practices in daily living, and adequate recreation for everyone. To insure these values to the school children of Franklin by offering to them the advantages that are available for keeping them in good health has been the constant aim of the health department of the school. Foremost among such advantages are adequate measures for the early diagnosis and prevention of spread of infectious disease.

Tuberculosis is a communicable disease that can be transmitted from person to person in the classroom or elsewhere. The detection of this disease no longer depends on the observation of symptoms. As a matter of fact, it is now recognized that such symptoms as quick fatigability, loss of weight, digestive disturbances, persistent cough and slight fever, which were once designated as the early signs, are now known to appear only after the disease has made considerable progress. Fortunately, more precise diagnostic methods are now available for early recognition of tuberculosis, notable among which are the Tuberculin Skin Patch Test and the X-ray method.

On February 9, 1951 a Patch Test clinic was held and the test given to 583 pupils, 19 teachers and three cafeteria workers. Twenty-three children showed a positive reaction. As a result, the X-ray machine of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association was set up in the Senior High School and the 23 children who had reacted positively to the Patch Test were X-rayed. A careful check is being made on all children showing a positive reaction to the Patch Skin test. In addition to the skin test and subsequent X-ray procedure, two chest clinics were also sponsored by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association at which 48 children were examined by Dr. Robert Kerr of Manchester, N. H., and 36 were X-rayed.

Diphtheria, once a serious menace to public health, is now less dangerous because of adequate immunization techniques as well as the comparative ease of accurate diagnosis and the

availability of highly effective curative treatment. Immunization is accomplished by injection of a preparation known as toxoid. While it is very important that children should be immunized during the first year of life, it is equally important that those children who enter the kindergarten unprotected or are in the higher grades without immunization should be given this protection. A Toxoid Clinic co-sponsored by the Franklin School Health Department and the Franklin Visiting Nurse's Association was held in April and May with 27 school children participating.

Disease of the tonsils has for a long time been correlated with the incidence of poor health. The Franklin Rotary Club in keeping with their abiding interest in the health of the Franklin school children sponsored their annual tonsil clinic in June. Eight school children were cared for at that time.

The physiotherapy center at the Junior High School was conducted once a month with Miss Mary Bullock, physiotherapist of the State Board of Health, in charge. Eight children from the Franklin schools have received supervision for such defects as flat-feet, poor posture and other orthopedic disabilities. These children also attended the orthopedic clinics held in Concord and Laconia.

The relation of good health to success or failure in the school has particular application in the areas of vision and hearing. These constitute the two most important avenues of information and when they are impaired school success is likely to suffer unless remedial measures are taken. The Franklin schools are indeed fortunate in possessing two highly diagnostic instruments for the detection of impairments in vision and hearing. These instruments are the Massachusetts Vision Test and the Puretone Audiometer. The school nurse administered both tests to 1500 children during the school year.

A pre-school clinic was held in May at the Hancock and Nesmith Schools. At this time 79 children were examined by Dr. Robert Morin. Physical examinations were also given by Dr. Robert Morin to the pupils participating in the athletic program of the Franklin Schools.

Every health program recognizes the importance of good nutrition in safeguarding health and preventing disease. At the same time, the child who is malnourished, hungry or tired, cannot be expected to do his best work in school. Health authorities have continually pointed out the importance of hot and balanced lunches given to school children in off-setting the dangers of under-nourishment. That the Franklin schools have not failed in this matter is evidenced by the fact that the total amount of money spent for hot lunches from December 1950 to May 1, 1951, was \$317.95.

National reports reveal that there is still much to be desired relative to the dental health of our state. Although prevention is the watchword in dentistry today, the pupils of the Senior High School still maintain their position as the group have the largest number of dental corrections. Measures for better orientation towards prevention are being taken and through the generosity of the Parent Teacher Association, 23 children received the Fluorine treatment.

Parents have the primary responsibility for the health of their children. Yet physicians, dentists, nurses, health officers, social and welfare workers, such official organizations as the medical, dental and nursing associations, as well as voluntary health agencies are rightfully concerned with health activities in their communities. Cooperation is the keynote essential to the success of the efforts of all concerned with the health of our children. Only in this way can schools and communities develop balanced programs of health and health care.

I wish to express my sincere gratitude to the Directors of the Tobie Trust Fund, the Franklin Kiwanis Club, the Franklin Rotary Club, the American Red Cross, the Motor Corps, the Sulloway Mill, the M. T. Stevens Co., the Franklin Elks Club, the Pollyanna Class of the Baptist Church, the Franklin Community Chest, the Women's Auxiliary of the American Legion, the Franklin Parent Teacher Association, the Women's Fellowship of the Christian Church, school administrators, teachers, parents and pupils for their wholehearted cooperation during the past year.

It shall be the duty of the Overseer of the Poor or Director of Welfare and Relief to appear before the City Council monthly, to render a "broken down" report of all expenditures made by the Board of Welfare and Relief during the month, to include in this report the name of firms or individuals with whom the commodity or service has been purchased or rendered with amount paid them.
