BOARD OF SELECTMEN AND CITIZENS OF GOFFSTOWN:

On the following pages is my first annual report as your Town Manager. 1967 was an extremely busy year at the Town Hall for several obvious reasons and your Town Report reflects this in many ways.

The demands on your tax dollars have never been greater than they are today at all levels of Government. Therefore, my obligation to the Board of Selectmen and to you the citizens can be stated in a few words.

"To give you the best possible value in Town Services for your Tax Dollar." Our every effort during 1967 was to this end and several programs were instituted which we feel are based on sound judgment.

Some of them are: The establishment of a central purchase procedure based upon requisition and purchase orders, the elimination of the Position of Superintendent of Public Works, the stabilizing of our sanitary land fill and operating it in accordance with exacting and efficient standards.

One of the primary problems facing us is, in 1968, the general conditions of our roads. We are now in a process of formulating an overall construction plan for our roads with priorities, construction techniques to be used and project cost estimates. This is a sound way to approach the problem and we earnestly believe that you will see results of this program during 1968.

I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation of the department heads, Town employees, Boards and Committees I have worked with during the year. Goffstown is fortunate to have such dedicated and knowledgeable people willing to give of themselves in order to create a better Town in which to live, work, and raise your families.

1967 was a year during which many plans of previous years were brought to a conclusion.

Revolution, with equalization as its guiding principle was accomplished and while it is true that this was a very difficult time for some taxpayers, we earnestly believe that equalization was accomplished.

Goffstown became the first Town in New Hampshire to utilize a computer in Head, Poll and Property tax billing.

Other uses of the computer are being analyzed which we feel can be of direct benefit.

During the year, numerous meetings were held with the Budget Committee to keep them abreast of Town Financial affairs. This close liaison will be continued and broadened in scope during 1968.

Through the efforts of the Planning Board, subdivision regulations for Goffstown became a reality and their benefits are already being felt.

Your Board of Adjustment once again did an outstanding job of handling appeals and their full report is published for your inspection.

We respectfully accepted Mr. Scribner's resignation and after an exhaustive search appointed Mr. Benson your Town Manager in July.

The Goffstown Bock Road Project was completed to Gosmere. This 2.2 mile section of road was completed at less cost, per mile than the State Highway Department thought possible. The State Highway Department is presently quoting \$125,000. per mile for this type of construction or a cost of \$275,000. for what cost the Town \$85,000. This we believe is a solid accomplishment.

Mr. Barnard attended the assessor's School at Bowdoin College for the third year and successfully completed the three year course.

The New Hampshire Municipal meetings were regularly attended and we had an opportunity to discuss mutual problems with other towns which can only be beneficial.

It is only fitting that we express our appreciation to your Town Manager and all Department heads for their achievement during 1967.

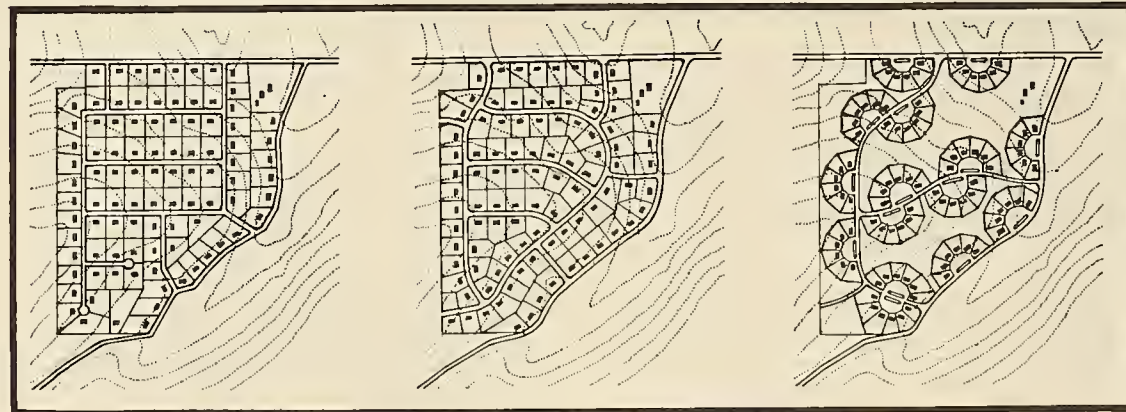

1968 TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Goffstown in said County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs and to the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Goffstown qualified to vote in School District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goffstown High School in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th of March, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

The polls will open at 10:00 A. M. and close at 7:00 P. M. at the Central Palling Place and will open at 10:30 A. M. and close at 6:30 P. M. in the Fifth District Bartlett School.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goffstown High School in said Town on Wednesday, the 13th of March, at 7:30 P. M. in the evening for the business meeting.

None of the articles in the warrant, except those relating to the election of officers and those covering questions on the ballot shall be considered during the time that the polls are open.

1. To choose all Town Officers, Trustees and Commissioners, and School District Officers for the ensuing year, including a member of the Board of Selectmen for three years.

2. Do you favor the continuation of the Town Manager Plan as now enforced in this Town? Inserted by petition of more than ten legal voters. (By Official Ballot)

3. Do you favor having a three year term for the Town Treasurer? Inserted by petition of ten legal voters. (By Official Ballot)

4. Do you favor having a three year term for the Town Clerk? Inserted by petition of ten legal voters. (By Official Ballot)

5. Shall the Non-Partisan Ballot System for the election of Town Officers be adopted by this Town. Inserted by petition of ten legal voters. (By Official Ballot)

6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee in the amount of Six Hundred Forty Nine Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty Two Dollars and Fifty Three Cents (\$649,722.53), and raise by taxes the sum of Four Hundred Eighty Three Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty Seven Dollars and Fifty Three Cents (\$483,927.53) (County Tax not included).

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow from time to time, such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be needed to meet the necessary running expenses of the Town.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed, purchase, prescription or gift.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept McElroy Street, located in the Town of Goffstown, between Marion Street and McGuigan Avenue. Inserted by petition of more than ten legal voters.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase of a Pumper Truck for the Fire Department at the lowest competitive bid. Such cost not to exceed Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00). Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$17,000.00) to be raised and appropriated, the remainder of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000.00) to be from the Capital Reserve Fund Fire Equipment Account. Submitted WITHOUT recommendation of the Budget Committee.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase of a separate Police Radio System including frequency for a sum not to exceed Five Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$5,700.00). Such purchase to be based upon the lowest competitive bid. RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) for the Highway Reconstruction Project on Callege Road and Warren Street. The sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$150,000.00) to be raised through the issuance of serial notes or bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of Revised Statutes Annotated) and any amendments thereto; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon, and the time and place of payment and condition of sale thereon, and to take such action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation sole and delivery of such notes or bonds as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Goffstown. NOT RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) to provide the residents of the Knollcrest area of Goffstown with proper facilities for the disposal of sewerage including piping, excavation, pumping facilities and engineering as may be necessary to alleviate the unsanitary conditions which now exists. Such sums of money to be raised through the issuance of serial notes or bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of Revised Statutes Annotated) and any amendments thereto; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes or bonds as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Goffstown and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept such Federal and State Funds which may be forthcoming on such projects and to apply such funds to the cost of the Knollcrest Sewer Project. Inserted by petition of more than ten legal voters. Submitted WITHOUT recommendation of the Budget Committee.

14. Do you favor the adoption of a Town Charter and Council - Manager form of Government to replace the present type of Town Government?

15. To hear the reports of the Town Officers, Auditors, and Committees and to pass any vote relating thereto.

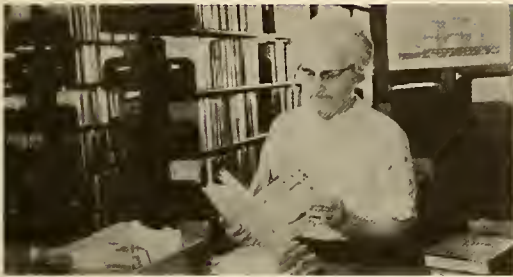

The Library offers many services today. Not only do we loan books from our collection, but we borrow the books not available here from the State Library. At present, we have no record or film collection, but again we borrow often. A film program is provided each month for patients at the Caron Building through the kindness of the State Library. We have a fine selection of Periodicals for Reading Room use, as well as for loan. Students find our file of back issues very helpful. This year, we have added three daily newspapers. In our Reference Section, there are many new volumes, including the new Encyclopedia International.

Each year, we welcome visits from the Kindergarten and Elementary School classes. We continue to provide additional books for class-room use.

In September we celebrated the Tenth Anniversary of the Summer Reading Program. All of the children who had participated during July and August, enjoyed a special Birthday Party.

Our collection is overflowing the available space. This makes it difficult for patrons to locate books. Study and Reading space is even more crowded with Sixth-grade pupils using the Library more for study. We hope for some relief in the very near future.

Need I mention that as a result, law enforcement has a greater responsibility than any other agency in the community?

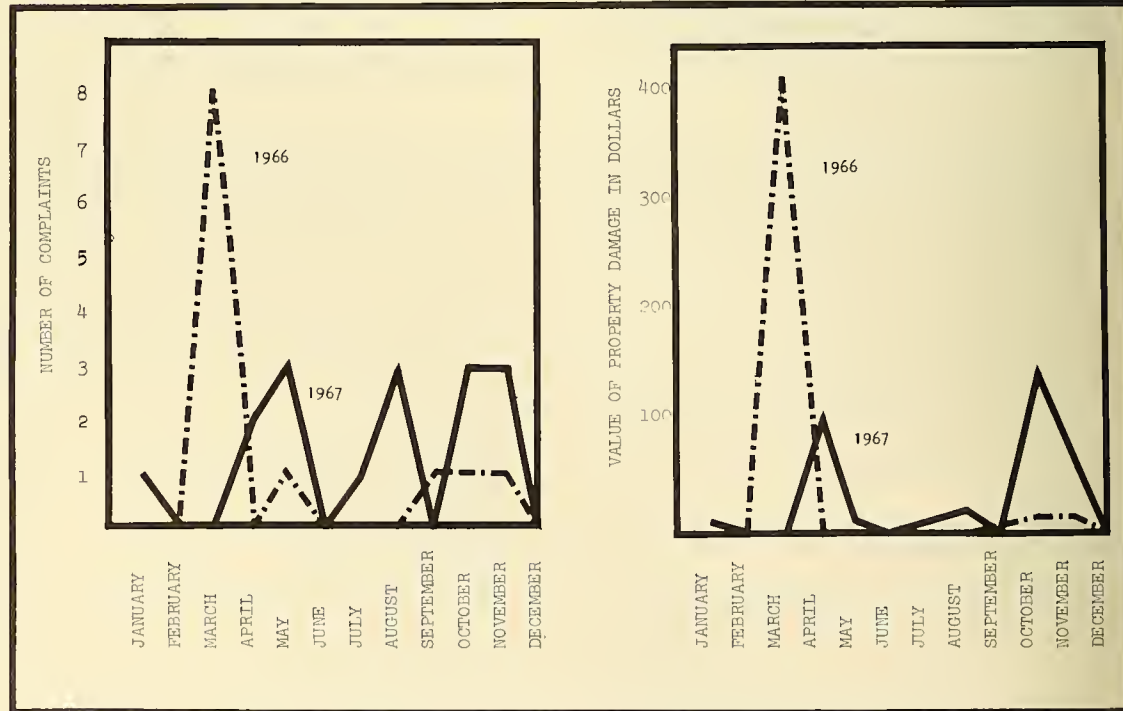

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GOFFSTOWN FIRE DEPARTMENT

Sorry to report but this was an expensive year for the Fire Department. The number of fires was down but the cost was greater. More repairs to the fire trucks than usual also added to the cost of operating the Department this past year.

During one bad working fire, two fire trucks broke down. New trucks and equipment are needed.

During the past year, a survey was made of the Town's fire protection facilities by the New Hampshire Board of Underwriters. Their report shows that the Town of Goffstown needs to update its fire protection. I wish the entire report and recommendations could be printed in this report but space does not allow it.

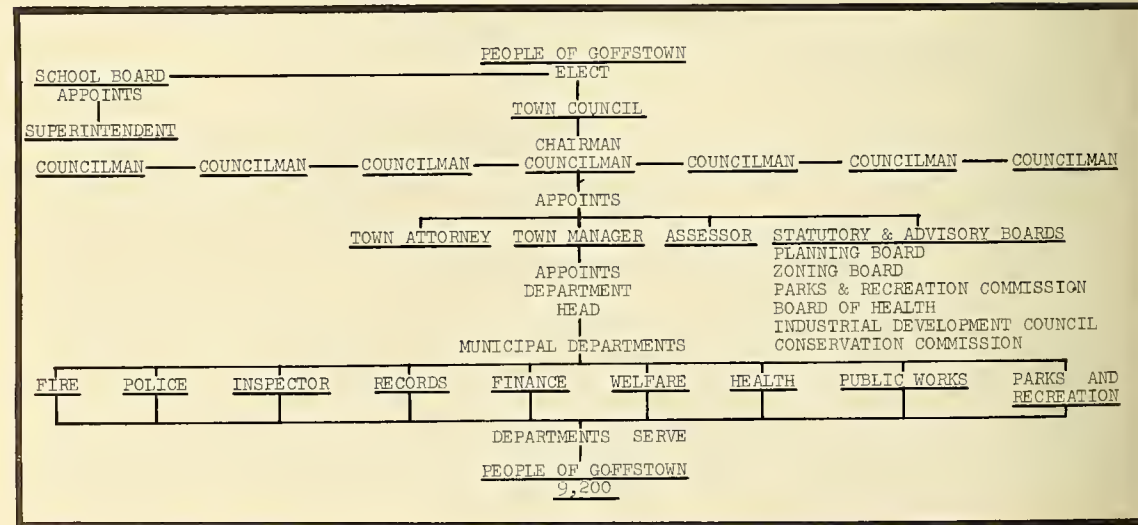
CHARTER COMMISSION

This commission, after detailed investigation and careful consideration, decided to recommend the Town Council-Manager form. An example of which, is given below. Here are a few of the reasons why this form was chosen:

1. The Town Council — Manager form is more efficient. The council meetings are equivalent to 12 to 24 Town Meetings a year and important decisions do not have to be delayed for the annual meeting or special meeting.
- b. Voter ignorance or apathy on many issues is replaced by informed officials and interested citizens participating at council meetings.
2. The Town Council-Manager form gives better representation. More voters can ballot for officials to direct town policy than can come to Town Meeting to vote on the articles of the warrant.
3. The budget is reviewed and recommended by elected officials responsible for its objectives, rather than the Budget Committee with no official responsibility.
4. By law a Charter would require a professional assessor.
5. Through initiative and referendum, the voters have the right to change any decisions or propose action to the council.
6. Citizens may speak at any council meeting and may possibly speak more freely than in Annual Town Meeting.
7. Responsibility for decisions is pinpointed on the council rather than the general public.

As far as cost is concerned, we have been unable to find that this system will cost any more than the present system and perhaps less.

Your commission, after many meetings and two public hearings on the question, "Is there a need for a change in Goffstown's present form of government", is bringing the question before the public. This is due in part to the fact that the public hearings failed to show sufficient numbers of voters to form a broad cross section of the town. We therefore propose this question for consideration at the 1968 Town Meeting: "Do you favor the adoption of a Town Charter and the Council-Manager form of government to replace the present type town government."

Before discussing this question in depth, the Commission wishes to state that this report is in no way a reflection on past or present municipal and school officials.

It is quite apparent from our studies that the disadvantages of the present system of our Town Meeting Government far outweigh the advantages. A summary of disadvantages includes the following:

1. An Annual Town Meeting (or on occasion a special Town Meeting) held once a year to conduct all the town's business is inefficient.
2. The voters may be uninformed and unknowledgeable about the many issues on which they are asked to vote.
3. Each voter must be present to vote on many articles, at a specific time, thus disenfranchising many for reasons beyond their control.
4. The Town Meeting may be controlled by orators and demagogues, resulting in voting by emotion rather than reason.
5. It is possible for pressure groups to control the Town Meeting.
6. As population increases, citizen participation in Town Meeting decreases. This results in a smaller percentage of voters controlling town affairs.

The commission could find only one principal advantage of the present form of government. In theory the Town Meeting is the most democratic form. This theory does not work in the practical sense in a town the size of Goffstown because of the poor attendance at Town Meeting by eligible voters.

INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL

Although earnest in spirit, the Industrial Council does not have much to cheer about at the end of 1967. In the 1966 Town report this council urged all citizens who had land available for industrial development to get in touch with them. There were no answers until late in the year when one citizen presented himself.

Upon investigation the council found this land to be desirable and set upon the task of linking prospective occupant(s) with the owner. Unfortunately industrial locatees or developers are attracted to a package where price, zoning, utilities and feasibility studies have been established and we have not been able to offer this.

In a recent meeting the council voted to form an Industrial Corporation, as permitted by statute, and apply for state monies for acquisition of industrial land in the hope that by this time next year we will be able to brag about our first new industrial tenant.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Board of Adjustment held nine regular meetings and one special meeting during 1967. Eighteen applications for variances were heard by the Board. Eight were granted, nine were denied and one application was withdrawn by the applicant.

The stated purpose of the Goffstown Ordinance is, "To protect and preserve the physical appearance of our Town, and to encourage an orderly and attractive pattern of development in Goffstown."

The Board feels that the Zoning Ordinance has served its purpose well since it was adopted at Town Meeting on March 14, 1961 and the Board hopes that its efforts in administering the Ordinance have been satisfactory to the residents of our community.

CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

The Conservation Committee, with the co-operation of L. W. Shirley, Arthur Filteau and Charles Wilkinson, established a wild life sanctuary on Shirley Hill Road.

With the aid of the Highway Department bulldozer, the old beaver dam was restored, resulting in flooding 4 to 5 acres with water one to three feet deep, making an ideal spot for ducks and wading birds. The State has furnished us with one beaver and may give us more later.

In the summer, they have promised to stock the area with fish to attract herons and bitterns and possibly for use of fishing activities. A Scout Troop with direction from Raymond Ducharme posted no hunting signs and put up two wood duck boxes.

In the Spring, we plan to approach Tamposi of Nashua, who recently acquired the Wilkinson land on the north side of the road which contains half the flooded area to see if he will give the area to the Town.

A second area of 15 acres belonging to the Village Water Precinct and 5 acres belonging to Mrs. K. A. Rice has been designated a sanctuary in perpetuity and posted accordingly.

Have placed a salt block for deer which roam there occasionally, another duck box will be installed there. We hope also to plant seeds and fruit bearing shrubs and trees which are available from the State.

PLANNING BOARD



The Goffstown Planning Board held its organizational meeting on March 17, 1967, at which time Mr. Lawrence Shirley was elected Chairman and Mr. Edward Murphy was elected Secretary-Treasurer. Once organized, the Board proceeded with the review of the major elements which will make up the Comprehensive Town Plan. First on the agenda was the review of the proposed subdivision regulations which were prepared by the Town's planning consultant and authorized by the people of Goffstown at the 1967 Town Meeting. These regulations were presented at public hearings and finally adopted by the Board in July of 1967.

In August the Board regretfully accepted the resignation of Mr. Murphy. Mr. Charles Parker was elected Secretary-Treasurer and in December, Mr. Paul Bedard was appointed to the Board to fill the vacancy left by Mr. Murphy's resignation.

During the year the Board reviewed many reports on various elements of the Town Plan including; the Public Utilities Plan, Recreation Facilities Plan, Community Facilities Plan, Library Report, Land Use Plan, Economic Base Study, and the Capital Improvement Budget Study. These elements plus others will be finalized shortly and will comprise the Comprehensive Town Plan. Once adopted by the Town, the Plan will serve as a guideline for all future development in the Town of Goffstown.

Throughout the year the Board has worked closely with the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission, of which the Town is a member along with the Towns of Auburn, Bedford, Hooksett and Londonderry, and the City of Manchester. The Board is looking forward to a continued close relationship with the Commission which could provide Goffstown with needed planning and implementation assistance in the difficult years ahead. The Board has requested, through the Town's representatives on the Commission, that Goffstown be considered as a possible location for the new location of an extension of the University of New Hampshire.

The Planning Board wishes to express its appreciation for the excellent cooperation extended to it by the Selectmen, Town Manager, School Officials, other Town Boards, and the people of Goffstown.

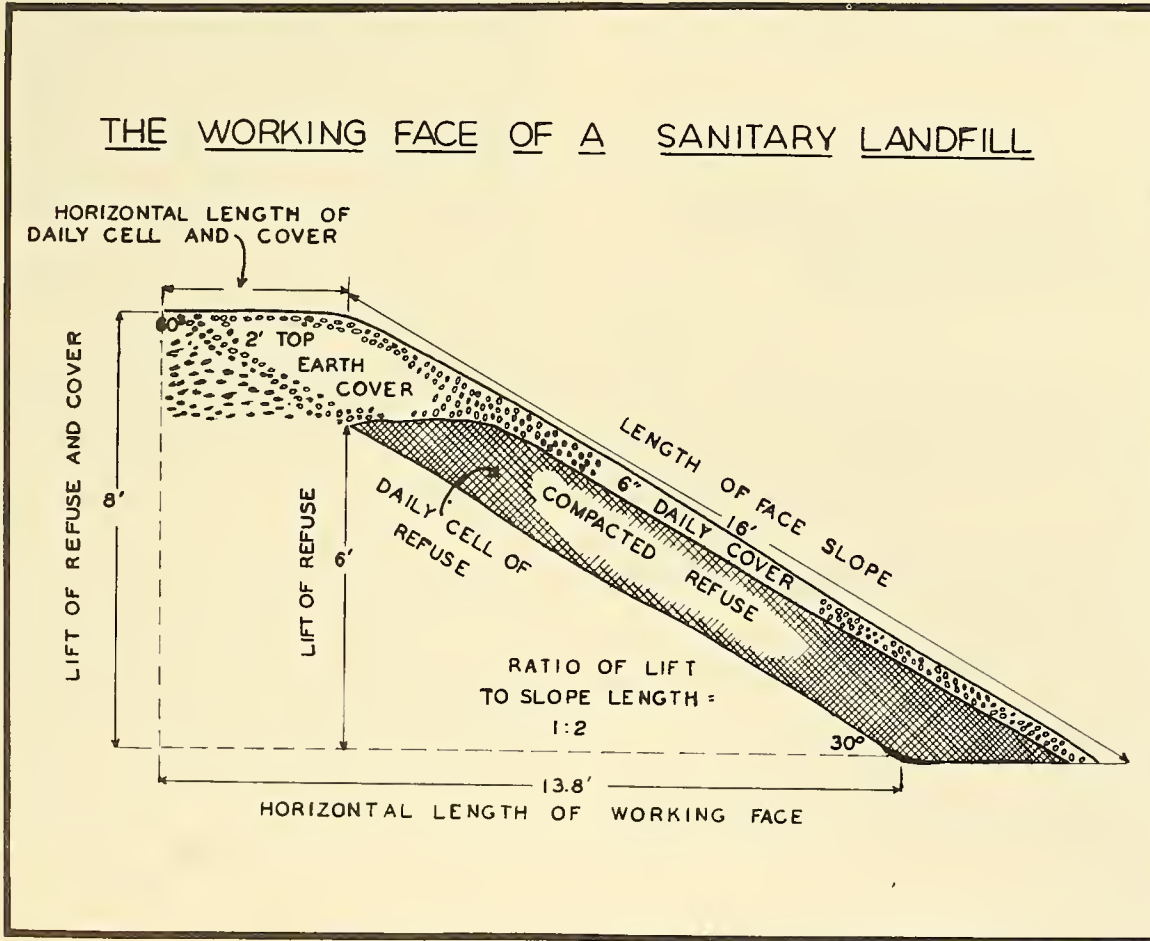

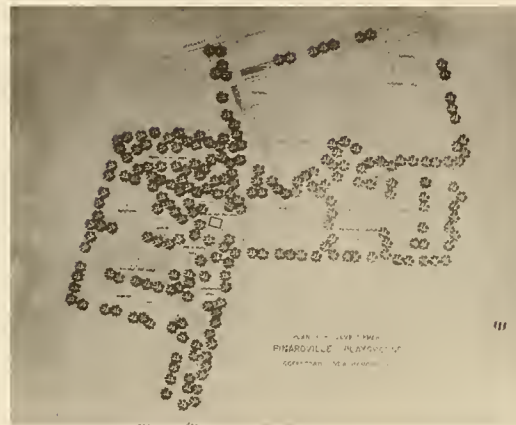
After many years of faithful service, Chairman Harry Anslow and Committeeman Norman Colburn resigned.

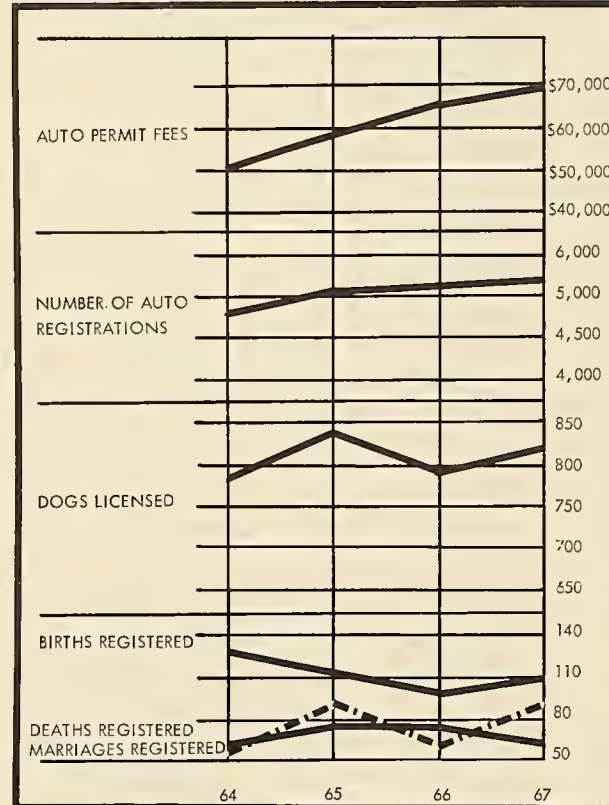

 Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1966 and June 30, 1967, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$88,189.82 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1967.

ANALYSIS OF CHANGE IN FINANCIAL CONDITION: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

COMPARATIVE STATEMENTS OF APPROPRIATIONS AND EXPENDITURES - ESTIMATED AND ACTUAL REVENUES: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1967, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$17,198.35

less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$7,768.89, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$9,429.46.

SUPERINTENDANT OF SCHOOLS REPORT

To The School Board and Citizens of Goffstown
I herewith submit my sixth annual report relative to the schools of Goffstown.

THE AREA PLAN

The citizens of Goffstown, at the March 1966 school district meeting, voted to elect an AREA School Planning Committee for the purpose of considering fully and objectively the question whether Goffstown, Dunbarton, and New Boston, and any other town or towns so desirous, should enter into an AREA School Plan so as to be eligible for increased state building aid, tuition-bonus payments and such other advantages as are provided by the legislation which made possible the establishment of AREA Schools.

Goffstown will not relinquish control of its school system under the agreement but will retain complete control of the employment of teachers, the curriculum in the schools and all decisions and policy as it relates to the school system.

The first financial advantage to be gained is an increase in state building aid from 30 percent to 45 percent. For example, this year we paid \$60,000 on the principal of the debt on the new Goffstown High School. We received \$18,000 from the state. If we were under the AREA plan we would have received \$27,000 from the state toward the \$60,000 payment so that we would only have paid \$33,000 of the \$60,000 due this year.

A second financial benefit, if and when the legislation is fully implemented, will be the receipt from the state of \$75 for each Dunbarton and New Boston high school student who attends Goffstown High School and \$60 for each Dunbarton and New Boston student who attends Goffstown Junior High School.

The educational advantages of the AREA plan include broader ability grouping practices, wider course selection, additional pupil services such as music, art, library, guidance, health, athletic programs and modern plant facilities.

The citizens will have an opportunity to vote to establish the plan at the annual school district meeting. The planning committee recommends the adoption of the program because it believes that the plan will provide financial and educational benefits and long term security for the school districts involved.

GOFFSTOWN HIGH SCHOOL EVALUATION

Under the capable direction of Robert Moulton, Principal, Goffstown High School was evaluated this year for continued membership in the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

At the December meeting of the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools,

Goffstown High School was granted full membership in that organization. The principal, teachers, students and supporting staff of Goffstown High School are to be complimented for this achievement.

Highlighting the evaluation report are the following commendations:

1. The school's system of ability grouping.
 2. The effort to provide a variety of opportunities in academic and practical arts areas.
 3. The excellent rapport between the teachers and the students.
 4. The involvement of Driver Education students in maintaining bulletin boards and visual aids.
 5. The attitude of staff members that all the students are worth educating - the terminal, as well as the college bound and the business students.
 6. The frequent use of the language laboratory in supplementing the classroom texts and the correlation of the tapes used with them.
 7. The arrangement and organization of the Home Economics area.
 8. The availability of the Industrial Arts program to all male students.
 9. The relatively high percentage of students enrolled in mathematics courses.
 10. The individual and small group instruction available to band members.
 11. The physical education instructors' use of practical and written tests at the end of each unit for the purpose of evaluation.
 12. The background in pure science of science department members and the utilization of strengths through scheduling.
 13. The introduction of a Non-Western History course.
 14. The Goffstown School District's provision of funds for student activities.
 15. The quality of the present library collection.
 16. Leadership in comprehensiveness of guidance services.
 17. The quality of the health staff.
 18. The wise planning by the School Board and administration in providing a well-thought-out school that is consistent with the Goffstown High School Philosophy of Education.
 19. The evidence of professionalism, dedication and sincerity on the part of the school staff.
- Recommendations that must be considered and adopted after a reasonable period of time include the following:
- ### PROGRAM OF STUDIES
1. That special provision be made in all subject areas to provide the slow learner with a meaningful curriculum.

2. That additional staff be employed in the art and music department, so that more offerings can be provided.

ART

1. That the art room facilities be expanded at the earliest possible time, and the dual use of the room by art and industrial arts be resolved and that additional equipment be purchased to implement a crafts program.

DRIVER EDUCATION

1. That consideration be given to the scheduling of Driver Education during the school day.

2. The purchase of additional instructional materials and equipment for use in the classroom.

ENGLISH

1. That a reading specialist be employed to assist English teachers in working out a developmental reading program.

2. That plans be formulated to cut the number of classes, as soon as practicable to four per teacher, total load not to exceed 100 and class size to be limited to 25.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES

1. Consideration be given to purchasing additional tape recorders to encourage additional practice and independent study by the students, and that time be made available for this.

2. An additional modern language be added to the curriculum.

HOME ECONOMICS

1. Strongly, that a survey be made to determine the need for vocational training opportunities to meet the needs of this and surrounding areas.

INDUSTRIAL ARTS

1. The purchase and installation of adequate dust and gas exhaust equipment.

2. The purchase of laboratory test equipment and appropriate hand tools for the power mechanics area.

MATHEMATICS

1. That an in-depth study for providing a fifth year of mathematics for those students who are beginning Algebra I in grade 8 be conducted.

2. That efforts be made to reduce class size to a number approaching 25 students.

MUSIC

1. That consideration be given to establishing at the earliest possible time general and elective music courses in the curriculum as stated in the evaluative criteria.

2. That funds be provided for the purchase of books, recordings, music, and recording equipment for the music program.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

1. Sufficient outside facilities be provided.
2. Two full-time instructors be employed.

SCIENCE

1. That a department chairmanship be appointed.
2. That science teachers have no more than two preparations daily and no more than four classes.

SOCIAL STUDIES

1. That bookshelves and magazine racks be installed, and that globes and a variety of wall maps be purchased for all Social Studies rooms.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

1. That serious consideration be given to the immediate development of outdoor physical education fields.
2. A more varied selection of assembly programs and suggests possible joining of "The Assembly Service."
3. That an auditorium be considered as soon as is practicable.

INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS SERVICES

1. That a part-time clerk be employed in order to permit the professional librarian more time to concentrate on professional activities.
2. That all rooms be equipped with film screens and darkening facilities be purchased for them.

GUIDANCE SERVICES

1. That an additional full-time Guidance Counselor, preferably female, is needed immediately, to implement the philosophy of school with relationship to guidance services.
2. That more secretarial assistance is necessary, particularly with the addition of another counselor. (Minimum one-half time.)

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

1. That consideration be given to adding another nurse in the department.

SCHOOL PLANT

1. That consideration be given to planting trees and shrubs to add to the exterior appearance of the building.
2. That the zoning temperature system of the main wing be restudied.

SCHOOL STAFF AND ADMINISTRATION

1. That the position of assistant principal be made full time.
2. Strong consideration to naming department chairmen in each major subject field.

3. That anticipated enrollment increases make it imperative that a careful study be undertaken to assure a reasonable pupil-teacher ratio.

GOFFSTOWN JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

Goffstown Junior High School enrolled 346 children, 166 seventh grade and 180 eighth grade. The students are grouped according to ability in all

academic subjects. This grouping provides for accelerated teaching in these subjects.

Pupils having reading difficulty have been provided with Remedial Reading to overcome their problems. Pupils are assigned when it is determined extra and special help is needed. Duration of this special help is determined by the individuals needs.

The services of Junior High School library are being improved under the direction of the Mothers Club and Mr. H. Pruter, teacher in charge. The library is being used to do research work. The circulation in recreational reading is 140 to 200 books per week. Student librarians staff the library. Each year new books are added to the library. American School Library Association Standards will be met in the not too distant future.

The opportunity class (Special Class) functions as an integral part of the Junior High School. Pupils having problems in school are provided with an opportunity to accomplish, within individual limits, the work required to continue their education.

The Junior High School Band has made its identity known and is a functioning group of 45 members under the able direction of Mr. Robert Rausch.

The Hot Lunch Program provides hot lunches for about 50 percent of the children in school. Lunches are wholesome, well balanced, well prepared and served in an appetizing manner in the newly renovated cafeteria.

There is an urgent need to replace the obsolete Junior High School dishwasher to assure that sanitary conditions prevail.

MAPLE AVENUE SCHOOL

Mr. William Brendle, Principal reports that this year with our new remedial materials and equipment we have improved our services in remedial reading. We now have the special materials needed to cope with the wide range of problems that occur in reading. Presently, we have numerous tests that greatly help in pinpointing the specific problems children have in reading. We also have an excellent supply of materials which can be used to reinforce skills in reading once the difficulties have been determined.

This past summer two curriculum committees worked on curriculum guides in the areas of Science and Language. As a result of this study, we have complete and detailed syllabi in the areas of Science and Language. The teachers are filling out activity sheets which will be incorporated into the syllabi which will eventually become curriculum guides.

We are planning the preparation of syllabi in Reading, Arithmetic and Social Studies.

Within two years, we will have our own curriculum guides which will give detailed ideas, suggestions and outlines of each subject which is studied at the elementary level.

We are in need of another remedial reading teacher which will allow Miss Powers to remain at Maple Avenue School for the full day. Presently she is dividing her time between Maple Avenue School and Bartlett School.

Maple Avenue School has two special classes. One is a combination 4th and 5th grade in which we have students who have in the past had difficulty but who have the potential to be successful students.

In our second Special Class we have children selected from Goffstown, Dunbarton and New Boston. This class consists of children who have had much difficulty in school and seemingly lack the potential to succeed in the framework of a regular class. The materials used with these children are commensurate with their abilities.

The number of books in the elementary library has been increased by about five hundred volumes due to our Federal Title II allocation and our annual budgetary requests being realized.

With Title II and local appropriation, within two years our library will reach minimum standards recommended by the state. It will take four or five additional years to approach the standards recommended by the American Library Association.

In the 1968-69 school year emphasis will be placed on books at the sixth grade level where we will attempt to develop classroom libraries.

WHITE SCHOOL

With additional enrollment increasing the number of classes from four sixth grades to six sixth grades, our grouping has become more refined.

In the sixth group, which is the slow group, the teacher has been able to do much in the remedial aspect of reading.

With money obtained from our Federal Title I Project, we have been able to purchase much equipment and special materials for this group. We now have a complete set of film strips that covers all of the basic concepts in phonics and structural analysis which has been especially useful. These materials used with a tachistoscope and tachisto-flashers have helped much to increase speed in reading with children who have had much difficulty.

The grouping system has given total flexibility in groups. This means that we can transfer a child in an individual subject to allow for placement according to individual subject area strengths or weaknesses.

The refinement in grouping coupled with addi-

The increase in enrollments in the Goffstown schools is due primarily to the population growth in Goffstown. It is evident from the projected in-line enrollments and from recent professional studies of Goffstown that Goffstown must undertake a school building program in the immediate future.

STATE BUILDING AID AND STATE FOUNDATION AID

Goffstown received 30 percent of the principal payments made annually to school districts from funds appropriated by the legislature except for the Bartlett School. The State Board of Education has denied a \$3,000 per year payment to Goffstown which would represent 30 percent of the \$10,000 annual payment on the principal for the Bartlett School Addition until such time as only grades 1 through 4 are enrolled in the school. Currently grades 1 through 5 are enrolled in the school.

Chapter 198 of the Revised Statutes Annotated as amended in 1957 prescribes the method by which Foundation Aid to New Hampshire school districts is to be distributed.

Two basic factors must be considered in determining the amount of state foundation aid to be paid to a school district. The first is the cost of the educational program which must be maintained in a school district. The second is the extent of the resources of that district for meeting the cost of the educational program. As an objective measure, the state foundation aid law specifies that the cost of an educational program shall be computed at \$200 for each elementary pupil and \$300 for each high school pupil residing within a district and educated at district expense. The law further specifies that it shall be the duty of the state board of education to adjust the cost of this required program in accordance with the amount appropriated for distribution as foundation aid. This cost shall not exceed the state average costs per elementary pupil and per high school pupil of all current expenses of operation as established by the state board of education for the year in which the foundation aid

computation is made. This cost is referred to as the "foundation program."

Goffstown is eligible to receive \$37,153.47 in Foundation Aid for the 1968-69 school year from funds appropriated by the legislature.

If the existing statutes were fully implemented Goffstown would be eligible to receive \$221,653.48 in Foundation Aid or \$184,500.01 more than it will receive under the current appropriation of the legislature.

TEACHER EVALUATION AND RETENTION

Full time supervising principals in all Goffstown schools allow for a continual teacher evaluation program. The school board, prior to setting salaries and renewing contracts for the ensuing year, meets with the principals to hear evaluation reports by the principals relative to each teacher in the Goffstown School System.

Goffstown is fortunate to have an excellent staff of teachers. It is imperative that the Goffstown Salary Schedule remain competitive with our neighboring communities in order to retain and attract outstanding teachers.

BARTLETT SCHOOL

The Bartlett Elementary School has ten well-staffed classrooms working harmoniously to present the pupils with a curriculum which adequately prepares them for the Goffstown grade six and the Junior High School.

Grade five has been departmentalized and the children are grouped into two ability groups. The teachers are very enthusiastic and the program is meeting a high degree of success.

We are presently using a new phonics program which incorporates a great deal of reading and also introduces more difficult skills at a lower grade level. The program also blends in well with our reading series.

The remedial reading program has been expanded to include more visual treatment enabling students to overcome reading problems.

The library is growing continuously. Children enjoy reading the many books provided for them. The library is staffed by the Mothers Club who open the library daily for the children's use.

The Bartlett School Mothers Club recently purchased a new set of eight swings and made provisions for a basket-ball court and a volley-ball court. This adds to our present equipment for the use of the playground.

During the evenings, parts of the school continue to be used for the Boys Club. More than one hundred boys from the Pinardville area continue to enjoy the many activities provided for them in the Boys Club.

GOFFSTOWN SCHOOL BUILDING NEEDS COMMITTEE

The voters approved the appointment of a Goffstown School Building Needs Committee at the March 1967 School District Meeting, with Carl Hecker as Chairman. The committee has met frequently to consider the various aspects of the proper housing of Goffstown students both presently and in the immediate future.

The committee has studied the school population projections and the reports of the Greater Manchester Planning Report, 701 Report, Sewall Company study and the Manchester, Hooksett, Bedford, Goffstown, Candia study as they relate to the Goffstown Schools.

The committee will present a report of its study at the annual school district meeting.
