

Norman A. McMeekin opened the meeting as a self appointed chairman. He was then elected temporary chairman so that an executive committee could be nominated and elected.

The following were elected: Phil A. Bennett, Chairman; Shirley K. Merrill, Vice-Chairman; Edna B. McGee, Clerk.

Frances B. Dudley was appointed temporary clerk in the absence of Edna B. McGee.

The Clerk called the roll: present, Gardner, Rich, Stevenson, Tilton, Higgins, Brummer, Chamberlain, Bennett, McMeekin, Anderson, Park, Radway, Smith, Dow, Foster, Trembly, Dudley, Merrill, Ellms, Hopkins, Bell, Sears, Karsten, Mitchell. (24 present) Absent: McGee, Cone, Johnson, Duhaime, Blain, Buckman. (6 absent)

Chairman Bennett introduced the former chairman – now Governor's Councilor Stephen W. Smith who gave a resume of projects which had been worked on for the past two years. He thanked the members of the former Grafton County Delegation and recommended that county government be continued.

Councilor Smith then gave a report of his committee on the hiring of consultants to make a study on building a new county courthouse. He left an outline of the report from E. Verne Johnson, Robert W. Hotvedt and Associates, Inc., Boston, Mass. with the Chairman.

The following were elected to serve as delegates on the Executive Committee: Gardner, McMeekin, Sears, Tilton, Duhaime.

The above, together with the officers previously elected will serve as the Executive Committee.

Mr. Bell, County Commissioner, talked about the new courthouse building and the financing. Discussion

followed.

Vice-Chairman Merrill moved to accept the committee report regarding the courthouse and implement the payment of \$3000.00 for the consultants to make the study as outlined. Seconded.

Mr. Stevenson offered an amendment to get an appraisal on the Plymouth and Woodsville courthouses. Seconded. After discussion, Mr. Stevenson withdrew his amendment.

The original motion was passed unanimously.

Mr. Stevenson moved to have the Plymouth and Woodsville courthouses appraised. Seconded and unanimously carried.

The question arose whether it was legal to take \$3000.00 for the study from surplus.

Mr. McMeekin suggested consultation with the County Attorney to see if the delegation may pay the consultants fee.

Mr. McMeekin and Mrs. Merrill asked for a straw vote on House Bill 63. It was favorable.

Rep. Radway spoke in favor for Lebanon Court.

Rep. Johnson said Haverhill Court was second choice of all lawyers, but it was a good choice.

Rep. Merrill questioned Johnson on Plymouth Court.

Rep. Gardner questioned the cost of transporting prisoners.

Rep. Rich asked if this was a delay until new courthouse.

Rep. Brummer questioned on cases before court.

Rep. McMeekin questioned on Jury Cases and Probate Court.

Rep. Johnson said he had no objection to Probate Court in Woodsville.

Rep. Bell questioned Mr. Johnson on power to try court cases, and said Lebanon Court was a poor court-house.

Rep. Radway wanted an amendment but one wasn't prepared.

Rep. Stevenson spoke in favor of proposed amendment.

Rep. Brummer spoke against amendment.

Rep. Merrill questioned Mr. Brummer on building new courthouse.

Rep. Bell spoke in favor of one courthouse.

Rep. Dudley questioned if appraisal of Plymouth and Lebanon Courthouses had been done.

Rep. Bell said Tax Commission would do it.

Rep. Dudley opposed to closing Lebanon Court.

Rep. Blain spoke against it also.

Rep. Sears thought the town of Plymouth would buy Plymouth Courthouse.

Rep. Johnson proposed an amendment.

Rep. Radway seconded the motion.

The 1954 County Delegation voted to build a new courthouse in Haverhill. Rep. McMeekin said Mr. Jones, Past President of Grafton County Bar Association, favored Haverhill to build courthouse. Then he spoke against the amendment.

Rep. Johnson defended position on Lebanon Court.

Rep. Merrill wants very strongly new courthouse and would accept amendment.

Rep. Brummer questioned "terms of court".

Chairman Bennett called for the show of hands: 13 for and 9 opposed. Amendment was passed.

Rep. Stevenson moved House Bill # 63 out of delegation, ought to pass as amended.

Rep. Dow seconded the motion.

New help for addition \$41,000.

Raised employees \$15,000.

Total \$72,000.00.

Estimated income of \$260,000.00.

County Extension Service up \$4500.

Depends on House Bill # 11.

Rep. Ellms made a public comment that if House Bill # 11 does not pass, local tax will have to bear the cost.

Rep. Brummer questions Soldiers Aid; if \$20,000

figure is realistic.

Comm. Bell stated; One guess is as good as another.

Chairman Bennett asked Delegation to wait for Richard Rutherford, County Extension Service Agent, to explain his budget.

Comm. Shores asked for a sum of money to celebrate County's 200th Anniversary.

Rep. Brummer backs the idea of a special observation for 200th Ann.

Comm. Shores requested \$500.00 for such an event.

Rep. Merrill moved Delegation vote for a sum of \$500.00 for celebration.

Rep. McMeekin asked for a new item be made for \$500.00 for bi-centennial.

Rep. Merrill withdraws motion; made new motion for a special item.

Rep. Chamberlain seconded.

Moved by show of hands.

Motion adopted to raise \$500.00 for bi-centennial celebration.

Comm. Clement introduced Harold Brown, new Superintendent of County Home.

Councilor Smith of Plymouth reviewed the past year as to new courthouse. 1968 Delegation set up courthouse committee to study the situation.

Dec. 1968, Committee voted to recommend to Delegation the firm of E. Verner Johnson, Hotvedt, and Associates, Inc., architects, which presented a Statement of Needs for a new Grafton County Courthouse.

Rep. Merrill asked Councilor Smith on courthouse committee.

Councilor Smith referred question to E. Verner Johnson. Mr. Johnson gave a resume of projects that they are now involved in. Mr. Johnson met with Building Committee and came up with present recommendations.

Rep. Merrill asked Mr. Johnson on percentage of architects fee.

Mr. Johnson said 7.5% of total fee items (\$24,000 part of basic fee). The lawyer's fees are not nor the

building site figured in.

Rep. Merrill stated that out of state architects use out of state materials. Wished to have architects use N.H. materials.

Rep. Ellms stated that N.H. roads are not as good as pictured.

Rep. Chamberlain asked if we could not use Grafton County soil conditions test instead of hiring for test borings.

Rep. Brummer asked if more than one site available. Also, if courthouse cost less would architects fee be less.

Mr. Johnson stated yes.

Rep. Hopkins asked if was policy of E. Verner Johnson and Associates to use local materials.

Mr. Johnson stated so far as possible, yes.

Rep. Higgins asked if architects specify to contractors certain materials.

Mr. Johnson stated yes.

Rep. Brummer asked if basically would this reflect on contract.

Mr. Johnson stated that as long as contractor stays within price range, architects can favor one brick over another.

Rep. McMeekin asked if cafeteria is necessary.

Rep. Johnson felt there was a need for cafeteria. Sheriff Ash stated no existing facilities for feeding jurors.

Councilor Smith stated cafeteria would help isolate jurors.

Rep. Merrill asked if new courthouse could be started sooner.

Mr. Johnson said yes, but would be costly.

Rep. Wm. Johnson what phase of the plans was, and Mr. Johnson stated it could be a model plan.

Rep. Merrill moved that the Grafton County commissioners borrow \$35,000.00 in short term notes for planning and specifications as called for in Johnson, Hotvedt, and Assoc., Inc. Statement of Needs as stated on page 51. Rep. Wm. Johnson seconded. Unanimous vote.

Delegation gave round of applause for Commissioners for job well done.

Chairman Bennett recessed session for brief period. Hearing reopened at 2:30.

Richard Rutherford explains budget.

County Extension Service explains House Bill #11. Asked state to put in state's share of money as per 1958 law.

If House Bill #11 does pay, County Extension Service Budget could reduce \$1,750.00. The budget is \$37,000. Coos County had a county agent who left Grafton County and Coos County to share one man for redevelopment resource projects. \$4,000 for each county.

Rep. Brummer moved that Delegation raise and appropriate \$654,887.78 to be raised by taxes. Seconded by Rep. Johnson.

Rep. Merrill asked to amend budget by adding \$3,500.00 for station-wagon for County Home.

Rep. Gardner seconded.

Unanimously voted. Original motion unanimously voted to raise by taxes \$658,368.78. Total \$1,044, 376.70. Unanimously voted.

Rep. Merrill moved to adjourn. Seconded by Rep. Higgins. Moved by voice vote. Hearing closed at 3:30.

Members that were present: Bennett, Chamberlain, Duhaime, Brummer, McMeekin, Bell, Dudley, Parks, M. Smith, Mitchell, Gardner, McGee, and Sears. Commissioners Bell, Shores, and Clement.

Comm. Bell explained commissioners unable to come to a trade with the Reeds. He wants Delegation to authorize commissioners to take Reed lands by eminent domain.

Comm. Bell stated county got \$96,000.00 from Hill-Burton Fund, and anticipated another for same amount, and also another for a lesser amount.

Comm. Clement stated commissioners want to get rid of old red silo, which is an eye sore, next to courthouse land. Also, county definitely needs Reed land.

Rep. Smith questioned popularity of eminent domain. County Attorney Papademas stated that the building of new courthouse is public knowledge, and that the Reeds know this. If we are to build a new courthouse we will need Reed land to have an appropriate site.

Rep. Brummer believes Commissioners have authority if petitioned by one member of Delegation to buy Reed land.

Atty. Papademas believes not. He reads "R.S.A. 26 and R.S.A. 234" which states that any purchase has to be authorized by County Convention.

Rep. Dudley states that land purchase should not be in Bond Issue.

Atty. Papademas states that bonding company very particular in all proceedings.

Chairman Bennett states County Convention authorized Commissioners to trade land, but did not authorize them to **buy** land.

Atty. Papademas says Comm. make offer, and if refused by Reeds, money is then deposited with Superior Court and land automatically belongs to County. Superior Court has it appraised by an impartial, competent appraiser and sets judgement.

Rep. Dudley asked if County will have a surplus. Comm. Bell states yes as County got \$96,000.00 that they did not anticipate as previously mentioned.

Comm. Clement wants land across road from county property appraised and that county sell land not needed.

Atty. Papademas states meeting not legal as no quorum present so Chairman Bennett had convention call another meeting to be held Monday, Sept. 8, 1969.

Comm. Bell states that the situation is that the commissioners cannot trade lands with the Reeds, and wishes authority to take property by eminent domain. Stated Building Committee met and architects plan already includes some of Reed land.

Rep. Dudley inquired if the Reeds had set a price.

Comm. Bell states no.

Rep. Van Gardner states that it was the consensus of Exe. Comm. to acquire Reed land.

Chairman Bennett states that the procedure is to make an offer for the land, if offer refused, money is to be deposited with Superior Court.

County Attorney Papademas states when County Convention authorizes county commissioners to take land by eminent domain, commissioners must make a cash offer; if accepted, okay. If refused, money is deposited with clerk of Superior Court and county takes immediate possession. Also states, if authority given, commissioners will have a tool with which to acquire the Reed land.

Rep. Merrill questioned if courts would set more than a \$1,000.00 an acre value.

County Atty. Papademas states county would have to pay whatever court set as value. Also stated, appraisal part of eminent domain.

Rep. Chamberlain states not only land of Reeds, but ground silo, and old barn.

Rep. Stevenson moves County Convention authorize commissioners to buy Reed land.

Rep. Brummer seconded.

Discussion:

Comm. Bell says commissioners just want authority to buy land; no money.

Rep. Van Gardner says pay up to \$1,000.00 an acre. Rep. Hopkins asked value of land that commissioners were willing to trade.

Chairman Bennett states commissioners had not set a sum of money as value of land.

Rep. Chamberlain said meadow land worth more than Reed land.

Chairman Bennett states eminent domain proceedings must come first before appraisal of land.

Rep. Smith says that an appraisal must and will be made after eminent domain proceedings.

Atty. Papademas states that correct reading is for the County Convention to authorize the county commissioners to buy or take Reed land and buildings thereon for the amount of land needed for courthouse project; sum of money not exceed \$12,000.00.

Rep. Stevenson moves the previous statement.

Rep. Brummer seconded. Unanimous vote by show of hands.

Rep. McMeekin states commissioners to be guided by the architects scheme of courthouse plans; plans show for the necessity of taking Reed's land.

Chairman Bennett states both commissioners and building committee have architects plan for courthouse needs, and have approved it.

Rep. Higgins moves Convention revoke authority given county commissioners to trade for Reed land. Seconded by Rep. Brummer.

Rep. McMeekin opposed motion.

Rep. Buckman says keep meadow land.

Rep. Chamberlain wishes to find out how Comm. Clement feels towards issue.

Comm. Clement states emphatically that Reeds will not trade.

Higgins motion moved by show of hands. McGee, McMeekin, Mitchell, and Sears opposed.

Comm. Clement says 700 copies of Grafton County Bi-Centennial booklets ordered to sell for \$1.00 a piece. Also, said dedication of new hospital and wing on October 11, 1969, speakers beginning at 1:00 o'clock sharp.

County Atty. Papademas says county attorney should

devote 50% of his time to his office. States drug problem growing by leaps and bounds; simply fantastic. States police officers not experienced enough to handle cases legally. County attorneys should teach police officers in legal procedures. Also suggests county will have to go to a full time attorney in steps, eventually \$18,000 a year for attorney.

Rep. Brummer moved to adjourn. Seconded by Merrill.

Adjourned at 11:50.

Rep. Ellms asked why vote necessary.

Bennett said Convention set top figure of \$12,000.00 on Sept. 8, 1969.

Rep. Brummer moves amendment to raise \$32,500.00. Rep. Merrill seconded.

Rep. Brummer doesn't wish to throw County money away. \$32,500 only about 1% of total cost; don't waste anymore time, build courthouse.

Rep. Stevenson says subverting interest of residents but says wants courthouse to be built.

Rep. McMeekin says very short sighted to save \$20,000 and spend \$100,000.

Rep. Brummer moves additional amendment to Rep. McMeekin's motion to raise the sum of \$32,500.00 for the purpose of Art. II, sum not to exceed the amount of \$32,500.00.

Rep. Merrill seconded the amendment.

Rep. McMeekin's motion passed 17 yes and 6 no.

Rep. McMeekin moves County Convention reconsider the action taken on Art. II on Sept. 8 meeting.

Rep. Merrill seconded. Moved unanimously.

Article III: Shall serial bonds or notes not exceeding One Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (1,800,000.00) be issued for the construction of Item 1, and for the purposes of equipment, furnishings and related facilities incidental thereto.

Rep. Merrill moves serial bonds or notes not exceeding One Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars be issued for the construction of Item 1, and for the purposes of equipment, furnishings, and related facilities incidental thereto. Rep. McGee seconded motion.

Rep. Foster questioned if bid over \$1,800,000.00, would convention have to come back.

Rep. Bennett replied yes.

Motion carried 18 yes and 4 no.

Article IV: Shall the County Commissioners be authorized to issue or negotiate the bonds or notes as referred to in Item 3 and determine the rate of interest thereon and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effectuate the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as may be in the best interests of Grafton County and pass any vote relating thereto.

Rep. Ellms moves that the county commissioners are authorized to issue \$1,800,000.00 bonds of the county under RSA 28 and the Municipal Finance Act to finance the construction and the original equipping and furnishing of a new county courthouse.

Rep. Buckman seconded the motion.

Motion carried 21 yes and 1 no.

Rep. Stevenson asked if courthouse at Plymouth had been appraised.

Rep. Bell says courthouse to be appraised December 3, 1969.

Rep. Merrill moves we adjourn.

Rep. Bell seconded.

Motion carries.

Question Presented: The Grafton County Commissioners, having applied to the Executive Committee of the Grafton County Convention for permission to use any unexpended surplus and to borrow whatever money necessary for County Farm and Court expenses in addition to the amount appropriated in the 1969 budget, as an emergency payment, the Executive Committee of the Grafton County Convention will hold a Public Hearing on the request of the Commissioners at the Court House in Woodsville, N. H., at 10:00 A.M., Monday, December 22, 1969.

Bell: explained need of hearing, need authority to use surplus on hand and to borrow in anticipation of taxes. Have substantial amount on hand, but need authority to use it; new bookkeeping system requires paying all December bills in December with no carry over to January as present system; thus 13 months bills to be paid in one year.

Tilton: How much to borrow from surplus? Additional for extra months payments?

Bell: Approximately \$50,000 over and above budget.

Tilton: Not running over operating budget as a whole at present time.

Bell: A little.

Merrill: A public hearing; anyone to speak as public? Kenneth Curran, Littleton: Three things to mention: One past - hospital job; 2nd - Court House as future; and 3rd - this front page (budget).

Merrill: This hearing on borrowing of money - you wish to divert?

Curran: Not in one case. Hospital - Hill-Burton money - when it first became known?

Bell: In beginning not known; said none available for three years; so authorized borrowing whole amount. Started construction in September; in Dec. State checked everything - figured spent and on hand, and took from there on for percentage. Could not allow on previous spent.

Clement: Changes to comply figured possibly roughly at \$8,000.

Curran: Last subject - Court House - a total four million dollar project. Wanted delay to get more information. As contractor, know delay would not cost that much, and might be quite a saving. As tax payer, object to amount for 3 acres of land; design very expensive; total cost four million principle and interest. Realize need for storage, archives; but this is too much debt for too few tax payers.

Merrill: This is out of order as far as this meeting concerned, but allowed you to express your feelings.

Tilton: Emergency payment of how much?

Shores, Clement & Smith (Bookkeeper): Needed for new bookkeeping system; explained and discussed; new system requires cost accounting (cash basis from month to month with no carry over); to do this, and start the new system off right as of the new year, need to pay up all current bills, meaning paying 13 months bills this year, not budgeted for.

M. Sears arrived.

McMeekin: No authority needed if not over 10% of

total budget. Motion to authorize paying December bills in the month of December within the present 1969 budget - not to go over 10% of the total budget.

Van Gardner: Seconded.

Merrill: Discussion? (None)

Questions? (None)

All in favor? - (all indicated so)

Opposed? - (None)

Merrill: To borrow in anticipation of taxes will be taken up in Executive Session of this meeting. Anything on the budget?

Curran: Thanks for clarifications of overages caused by Dartmouth incident. Bail forfeiture represents small income. Cost high, but explanations clarify.

Merrill: Public Hearing declared closed at 10:45 A.M.

Grafton County celebrated its 200th Anniversary on October 11th with ceremonies dedicating the newly constructed 79-Bed Nursing Home-hospital wing. Festivities featured a buffet serving some 225 guests, honored by the presence of Governor Peterson and Senator Cotton. Mrs. Rita Little, our Acting Superintendent, was highly commended for her endless efforts during this period of construction, commendations, also, extended other staff and personnel for their assistance. The Woodsville High School Band provided music. Miss Gladys Whipple honored the County by writing a Grafton County History for the occasion. Conducted tours through the new wing concluded the day's festivities.

In November Mr. and Mrs. William Siegmund were hired to fill the positions of Superintendent and Matron and Mrs. Little as Administrator of the Nursing Home.

The budget for 1970 will show a sizeable increase for Old Age Assistance due to excessive medical costs. Direct relief cases remain about the same.

Surplus foods are still being distributed; more towns have been added during the year.

We wish to express our appreciation to our staff of employees, the County Delegation, the various town officials and State Welfare Department for their continued cooperation.

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# REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY ATTORNEY For the Year 1969

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

Herein is the first annual report of the activities of the office of the Grafton County Attorney for the year 1969.

This office disposed of 99 felonies, 81 misdemeanors, and 26 petitions under the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act. This office represented one deputy sheriff who was a party defendant in a civil case, and that case was successfully terminated.

As a result of student activities at Dartmouth College, this office processed and disposed of 54 criminal contempt cases, this being one of the few times such cases ever arose in the New Hampshire Courts.

There were additional miscellaneous activities that took your County Attorney to almost all parts of the county in the pursuit of the duties of the office, and more specifically, to assist law enforcement departments.

As other County Attorneys may have reported to you, the duties of the office are increasing both in number and in scope. It is not too soon to consider that the office shall require the services of a full time attorney. This will be necessary because the field of law enforcement has been rapidly changing in the past decade, and up until now it has been impossible to spend much time with law enforcement departments.

Lastly, I would be remiss if I failed to report to you that this office received full and complete cooperation from all law enforcement departments and especially from the office of the Grafton County Sheriff. Much of the work of these departments is reflected in the number of convictions in the above stated felonies and misdemeanors.

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

I hereby submit my report for 1969:

This has been a very busy year with a capacity load, a waiting list of 5-8 most of the year and the new hospital wing starting to take shape and eventually moving into it in early November.

The patient load has been as follows:

Patients in Hospital Jan. 1, 1970	56

No new purchases were made in the old hospital because of the many renovations in the wing-new bath lifts, tubs, showers, a physical therapy unit and others.

This new wing with its adequate storage facilities relieved the crowded situation in the old hospital both as regards to patients and storage facilities.

Kitchen renovations and new serving techniques have improved the food and meals for the patients. The new dining-recreation area has made meal time much pleasanter.

During the bad storm the last week in December when electricity was off the County used its facilities to house some of the older people in the area who were without heat and lights.

Obstetrics and major surgical cases are still done in nearby General hospitals under policies laid down by the State Board of Health.




