TOWN WARRANT
State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Loudon on Tuesday, the 7th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Polls will open at 9:00 A. M. and close not earlier than 7:00 P. M.

3. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on all property taxes paid within thirty days after presentation of tax bill.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums of money not to exceed in the aggregate more than 75% of the anticipated amount to be collected in taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town of Loudon negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in 1972 from taxes collected during the current municipal year.

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.

6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to use available Capital Reserve funds for a new truck if necessary before the end of the current year.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for use by the Bicentennial Committee to help finance the coming celebration.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$375.00 for the Concord Hospital to help defray their estimated deficit for the year 1972.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund as set up in the 1963 Town Meeting.

10. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to prepay the remainder of notes that will become due in 1973 this year by raising the sum of \$2,370.00.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$320.00 to procure a town tax map.

12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase a loader complete with snow plow and wing to replace present loader.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bond the town for an amount not to exceed \$30,000.00 to be repaid by serial notes at the option of the Selectmen.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase a V snow plow for the grader.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400.00 to cover cost of purchase of V plow.

16. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to reset the salaries of all town officers to meet the amount of money as set in the budget.

17. By Request: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to pay in the amount of \$200.00 for lawyers fee; unfortunately the tax collector gave a deed containing erroneous description of the Ordway land.

18. By Request: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Conservation Commission under the provisions of R.S.A. 36A and that the Selectmen shall appoint said commission, to consist of (three to seven) members, within 60 days of the said annual meeting, and that said Selectmen also designate for the purposes of calling the first commission meeting, a temporary chairman.

19. To see if the town will vote to add to the existing town ordinances the following variances:

4. Variances: For Existing Town Ordinances.

Where strict conformity to the Town Ordinances would cause undue hardship to the owner of the land, a plan substantially in keeping with the regulations may be approved; providing that the spirit of the regulations, public convenience and welfare will not be adversely affected.

A. Questions arising therefrom may be brought before a committee of five (5), appointed by the selectmen, who shall rule on such matters by a simple majority vote within sixty days.

1. Said committee shall consist of one selectman, one planning board member and three residents of the town for three year terms — no more than two of which shall expire annually.

20. That the Moderator appoint a special unpaid advisory committee of three persons to be known as the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee to work with the Central N. H. Regional Planning Commission to make recommendations to Town Meeting for upgrading the Town Dump to meet State standards and to comply with the standards set by the N. H. Air Pollution Control Commission, Regulation No. 2, which sets termination dates for open burning.

21. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell at Public Auction land acquired by tax deeds.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN OF LOUDON OFFICE OF SELECTMEN

Each year many problems have been brought to this town as to other towns. We have tried to deal with these problems, to the best of all concerned.

As our population has increased so has our assessed valuation. The high increase in our school costs causes our tax rate to be so high.

The increased costs in material caused our General Expense Account to be greater than expected, however, the addition of the Special Account will help in this next year.

The increase in the Parks and Playground budget is to help the children at the playground in the Village.

We believe that some of the town officers salaries should be raised, especially the Tax Collector as his work has more than doubled since his salary was established.

There is a law compelling towns to have a tax map for assessing purposes. There is also a law to take a population count each year.

There is money left in the T.R.A. fund to complete the Oak Hill Road this spring. We plan to start the road from Rte. 129 by Earl Cate's as far as Carter's Corner piece, with T. R. A. money this year. We also plan to complete Clough Pond Road from the East end of the pond to the Canterbury line.

The town V plow is over twenty years old and is in bad shape.

The town tractor loader has been costly on repairs so we would like to replace it with a larger one with a plow and a wing. In purchasing a tractor we recommend it be paid for in a three year period. With the high interest rates we feel this is the best method.

We would like to thank all the town officers for their cooperation and support. We have enjoyed working with them and with all the other people of the town.

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REPORT OF HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Following is a report of the Highway Department for the past year.

The T. R. A. Project on Oak Hill Road progressed, in that another 2000 feet was paved. Also, the last remaining section was widened and graveled to the Concord line. With the paving of this last section this summer, we will have a first class road from Loudon to East Concord and the Interstate Highway.

This year we started two projects on Ridge Road. One at intersection of Route #129 and one about a half mile north. Both were narrow and dangerous, so this should make for much safer travel on this road.

Also, this year we repaired the foundation on the north end of the town garage. Added steel girders in the roof and thereby made more space to stockpile winter salt.

Thought should be given to the replacement of the loader. The present machine is nine years old and now in need of extensive repair, before it can be dependable for another year.

HIGHWAY SUBSIDY TO TOWNS AND CITIES

An Extra from House Bill 400, Chapter 504, Laws of 1971

Chapter 241:14 Highway Subsidy to Towns and Cities. In addition to any funds hereinbefore apportioned for construction, reconstruction and maintenance allotment purposes, the commissioner shall apportion on the basis of a sum of not less than four million four hundred eighty-seven thousand five hundred dollars, to each city, town and unincorporated place, on a one-half mileage and one-half population formula, an amount based on the proportion which the mileage of the regularly maintained class IV and class V highways in that city, town or unincorporated place as of January 1 of the previous year, bears to the total mileage of regularly maintained class IV and class V highways in the state as of that date, and the latest proportion which the official population census of that city, town or unincorporated place bears to the latest official population census of the state as of that same date. On or before January 1 of each year, the commissioner shall notify all cities, towns and unincorporated places of the amounts of highway subsidy being allotted in each fiscal year. Payments shall be made in quarterly increments in the months of July, October, January and April. If at the end of any fiscal year, the total amounts allocated to municipalities under the budget of the department of public works and highways does not amount to nineteen percent of the road toll revenue for the preceding fiscal year, the amount of such deficiency shall be added to the amount specified in this section and shall be apportioned according to the formula set forth above and paid with the October payments. Those officers charged in RSA 71:24 with the keeping of uniform accounts shall also be responsible for the

keeping of such accounts as related to those funds granted to municipalities under this section in a manner prescribed by the commissioner of the department of public works and highways. Such accounting officers shall, on or before March first of each year, return to the commissioner on prescribed forms showing the summary of receipts and expenditures during the last fiscal year. Such accounting officers shall also furnish at other times such information as the commissioner may require to assure that funds paid to towns, cities and unincorporated places pursuant to this section are not used directly or indirectly for any purpose prohibited by constitutional or legislative limitation. These funds shall be used only for the purpose of maintenance, construction and/or reconstruction of class IV and class V highways. Under no condition shall dollars received under this section be used for the purpose of matching to obtain additional state funds for other forms of highway aid. Whenever any city, town or unincorporated place is unable to utilize the full amount of their apportionment in the manner herein provided for any given year, as made under this section, the unused balance shall not lapse but shall be added to the total available for distribution to all towns and cities, the following fiscal year.

Effective Date. This act shall take effect August 1, 1971.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Lest We Forget — It Can Happen Here

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar-holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them **dead out** when leaving.
4. **Most Important** — instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year — 1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

I would like to also extend a note of thanks to many of the wives of our officers whose hard work and time made our 1971 annual policemen's ball a success. Also to the local business for their contributions.

Again I must stress the great need for your help in keeping our town the safe and peaceful community we want it to be. Give full information of your call and your name before you hang up, this being a great must for us to answer any call efficiently.
