RECORD OF TOWN MEETING
March 8, 1983

To the inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, Qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday, the eighth of March, A.D. 1983, at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of voting on Articles 1 through 3, and at 7:30 o'clock in the evening for action on Articles 4 through 17. The polls which open at 1:00 P.M. for the purpose of voting on Articles 1 through 3 will close at 9:00 P.M. unless extended by vote of the meeting.

The annual meeting of the Town of Madbury was called to order at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon by Moderator Robert E. Houston Jr. The warrant was read and certified to posting. The polls were declared open.

ARTICLE 1. To choose the following Town Officers. Sample ballot with totals — see Supplement #1.

Selectman for the ensuing three years, Sylvia H. Grimes
Town Clerk-Tax Collector for the ensuing three years, Pamela A. Seaver
Treasurer for the ensuing year, John W. Printy
Two Auditors for the ensuing year, Barbara G. Houston and Kathleen Traut
Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years, Ethel B. Hayes
Supervisor of the Checklist for the ensuing year, Patricia Hodsdon

ARTICLE 2. Voted by ballot on amendments to the Zoning Ordinances and Building Regulations as recommended by the Madbury Planning Board. Sample ballot with totals - see Supplement #2.

ZONING ORDINANCES:

- Amendment 1. Amend Art. III, Sec 13 to read: "Dwelling shall mean any residence, building, structure, trailer, mobile home or camp or part thereof, used and occupied for human habitation or intended to be used and includes any appurtenances belonging thereto or usually enjoyed therewith." PASSED
- Amendment 2. Amend Art V, Sec. 1, A and G; substitute the word "dwelling" for the word "residences." PASSED
- Amendment 3. Amend Art. V, Sec. 1, B, to read: "A single-family or a two-family dwelling is permitted in this district." PASSED
- Amendment 4. Amend Art. V, Sec. 2, B as follows: change "Lots for dwellings" to "A lot for a dwelling." PASSED
- Amendment 5. Delete Art. IX, Sec. 1, A, which reads: "Waive the General Residential and Agricultural District frontage requirement where there are unusual conditions," and substitute: "Vary the General Residential and Agricultural District requirement to allow for a permit to be granted for a replacement dwelling to be erected while the present dwelling is occupied." PASSED

- Amendment 6. Add "as amended." to Art. X, Sec. 1 PASSED
- Amendment 7. Amend Art. XV, Sec. II, E, by deleting "in a calendar year" and adding after the word "excavated" the phrase "from a lot of record". PASSED
- Amendment 8. Delete subsections 1 and 2 from Art. XV, Sec. IV, B, and substitute "Gravel bank operations in existence on March 11, 1969, will comply with Section 3". PASSED
- Amendment 9. Delete subsection C of Art. XV, Sec. IV (a housekeeping change). PASSED
- Amendment 10. Various minor editorial changes are being proposed such as the renumbering of sections, termed "housekeeping changes". PASSED

BUILDING REGULATIONS:

- Amendment 1. Amend Art. III, Sec. 1 to read: "Any person, persons, partnership, or corporation intending to construct a new building or to make structural alterations valued in excess of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) shall first make application for a permit from the Building Inspector. General maintenance and upkeep shall not be considered as making structural alterations." PASSED
- Amendment 2. Add "as issued by the National Fire Protection Association as now printed or as may be amended." to Art. V, Sec. 1, B, for the purpose of clarification. PASSED
- Amendment 3. Delete Sec 2 of Art. V, which reads: "The construction of accessory buildings not used for living purposes, together with minor alterations, repairs, and general upkeep of existing accessory buildings shall be exempt from the provisions of this Ordinance." PASSED

ARTICLE 3. Voted by ballot to grant the power of appeal in the Building Regulations to the Board of Adjustment, as provided by RSA 156:4-b. PASSED

Sample ballot with total votes - see Supplement #2.

ARTICLE 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to choose and appoint all other Town Officials. CARRIED

ARTICLE 5. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies in anticipation of taxes.

Selectman Moriarty explained that the Department of Revenue Administration advised not to set limits on amounts of money to be borrowed, therefore no definite amount is mentioned in this year's article. CARRIED

ARTICLE 6. Voted to raise and appropriate \$436.80 for Class IV and V highways to match the sum of \$2,912.00 to be contributed by the State. CARRIED

ARTICLE 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Madbury Conservation Fund. CARRIED

ARTICLE 8. Voted to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1983 appropriation, said funds to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5. CARRIED

ARTICLE 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund CARRIED

ARTICLE 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the Town Hall Expansion Capital Reserve Fund.

Selectman Moriarty explained that the Board regretted not being farther along with plans for this project at this time, however because of the revaluation project and its huge expense the Board felt it just not prudent to spend money on the Town Hall at this time. They hope to be working more on this project during the upcoming year

so that they can come before the citizens at the next Town Meeting for a vote to go ahead with implementing a plan for expansion. CARRIED

ARTICLE 11. Voted to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith:

Appropriation	Amount
Landfill Development	\$1,000.00
Road Construction	2,000.00

Selectman Grimes explained that using Revenue Sharing monies as setoffs will keep the entire town budget down. Joan Schreiber asked for clarifications on what specifically this money would be used for in road construction and landfill development. Selectman Moriarty said that at the present plans for road construction are reconstruction of Evans Road from the railroad bridge on Perkins Road to the Robert Mrak residence (approximately). Establishing plantings around the entrance to the landfill will probably be the landfill development project using Revenue Sharing funds. CARRIED

ARTICLE 12. Vote to approve and accept the proposed budget of \$146,855.80 for the current year. CARRIED

ARTICLE 13. Voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant one or more franchises to operate a cable television system in this town, said authorization to encompass the setting of such conditions as the Board deems necessary and appropriate. Said conditions may include the setting of subscription or service rates to citizens and franchising fees to the town or the extent that they are not inconsistent with N.H. RSA 53-C and the Rules and Regulations of the Federal Communications Commission.

Selectmen Houghton spoke to this enabling article, saying that the Board of Selectmen would be appointing a Cable TV Committee to assist them in bargaining with different companies. This project will not take up any of the Board's time and certainly not any town monies. CARRIED

ARTICLE 14. Voted to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Madbury and to the health and welfare of the people of Madbury. These actions shall include: 1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990. 2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote on this article will be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States.

Madbury's Conservation Commission Chairman Craig Seaver spoke to this article, encouraging its passage. He briefly explained what acid rain is and does. He explained how Madbury's Conservation Commission has been involved in a State task force during the past year. They actually collected and tested precipitation for its acidity. CARRIED

ARTICLE 15. Voted to adopt an ordinance regulating the distribution of campaign materials and electioneering as follows: 1. No person who is a candidate for office or who is representing or working for a candidate shall distribute or post at a polling place any campaign material in the form of a poster, card, handbill, placard, picture, or circular which is intended to influence the action of the voter:

- (a) Within the building where the election is being held; or
- (b) Within a radius of 100 feet of the building entrance/door of the building where the election is being held. CARRIED

ARTICLE 16. There were no Committee reports to be heard this year.

ARTICLE 17. David Raynes thanked for all the support the FAST Squad has received from Madbury residents in the form of donations, but what they really need now is volunteers to be members of their Squad. They are down to only two Madbury members and desperately need more.

Since no other business was brought up at this time, the meeting was adjourned at 9:28 P.M. Ballots were counted and the Meeting was officially adjourned at 11:20 P.M.

**WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING
TOWN OF MADBURY, NEW HAMPSHIRE**

March 13, 1984

To the inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, A.D. 1984, at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of voting on Article 1, and at 7:30 o'clock in the evening for action on Articles 2 through 17. The polls which open at 1:00 P.M. for the purpose of voting on Article 1 will close at 9:00 P.M. unless extended by vote of the meeting.

ARTICLE 1. To choose the following Town Officers:

- A Moderator for the ensuing two years.
- A Selectman for the ensuing three years.
- A Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- A Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
- A Supervisor of the Checklist for the ensuing six years.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all other Town Officers.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$190,000.00) to build an addition onto the Town Hall. The appropriation to be funded and implemented in the following manner:

- (a) To raise Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$85,000.00) of said sum by borrowing the same from a bank or other lender, for a period of Five (5) years with the first payment of principal and interest on said loan to be made one (1) year after the date thereof. The annual payment of principal and interest in any year shall not be less than the amount of principal and interest payable in any subsequent year by more than Two Percent (2%) of the principal of the entire loan.
- (b) Expected use for life of the public improvement for which said loan funds are to be used exceeds Five (5) years, as determined by the Selectmen. The said borrowing shall be represented by a note which shall be signed by Selectmen, or a majority thereof, countersigned by the Treasurer, and shall have the corporate seal of the Town affixed thereto. The discretion of fixing the date, maturities, denominations, interest rate, or discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said note, and providing for the sale thereof, within the terms above, are delegated to the Selectmen.
- (c) To authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the capital reserve fund set up for the purpose of Town Hall expansion the principal of said sum plus any accumulated interest thereon, said amount is approximately Twenty-Two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000.00).
- (d) To raise the difference between the sum of One Hundred and Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$190,000.00) and the total of Items (a) and (c) above from the taxes levied by the Town.
- (e) To authorize the Selectmen to enter into the necessary contracts and agreements necessary to implement the construction of the Town Hall Addition.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies in anticipation of Taxes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Madbury Conservation Fund.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the retention of the unexpended portion of the 1984 Conservation Commission appropriation, said monies to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for the purchase of new fire equipment.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the Town Hall Expansion Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

Police Department	1,500.00
Waste Disposal	1,500.00

ARTICLE 11. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 763:6-1 which provides for the appointment of Alternates to the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 763:6-1 which provides for the appointment of Alternates to the Board of Adjustment.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money; provided, (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies; and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as provided by RSA 31: 95-B.

ARTICLE 15. To hear the reports of the Committees chosen, and act on any motion relating thereto.

ARTICLE 16. "To see if the Town of Madbury shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly con-

vene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Madbury, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire." This is a petitioned article.

ARTICLE 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

In other business, the Commission considered one dredge and fill application, and members attended a wetlands workshop in June, the Municipal Law Lecture Series in October, and the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions in November.

The appointment last spring of David Belford, forester, as the Commission's newest member has strengthened the group and widened its perspective.

Comments and suggestions are always welcomed by the Commission.

We have answered 56 calls this year; only one was a major structure fire, George Taylor's barn. We have been busy with accidents, brush fires and a few chimney fires. We have continued our training and maintaining our building and equipment.

Through the efforts of Bill Greig and a grant from the Exxon Company we have purchased a portable radio and a pager. Donations from local businesses and residents were used to purchase another pager.

We hope to complete the reinstallation of the Moharimet Drive hydrant in the spring.

I would like to install a hydrant on the Bellamy Reservoir near the bridge on Littleworth Road. There is also a need for hydrants on the Portsmouth pipe line at Evans Road, Rt. 155 and Freshet Road. There are "T"s at these intersections that could be used.

A reminder to renters and landlords, as of January 1, 1984, smoke detectors or smoke and heat detection systems must be installed in all rental units by the landlord. This is a new state law and will be enforced by the Chief of the Madbury Fire Department.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGE

Once again, our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and woods fires when the ground is not snow covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is twofold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

As smokey says, "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires!"

LAMPREY REGIONAL SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE

January 1984

The Directors of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative are pleased to report that the incinerator/energy recovery plant located on the University of New Hampshire campus is operating on a continuous twenty-four hour, seven day a week schedule.

The day-to-day operation is carried out under the supervision of the Cooperative's Administrator, under the general supervisory control of the three-member Operations Committee from the Joint Board of Directors. The plant personnel, in addition to the Administrator, includes two mechanics, a truck driver, two daily shifts of 12 hours each involving 8 persons, plus a daily cleanup crew. This organization operates the incinerator system, maintains records, and coordinates with the University's Power Plant staff to monitor the boiler and steam production elements of the plant. The Cooperative's organization also handles the collection of refuse from the transfer stations of five communities, and handles the ash removal and its transfer to the landfill site.

In our report of 1983 you were informed that the Cooperative was moving toward electrical generation as a means of utilizing the excess steam production capability during the summer months. Since the 1983 report the University has received a grant for the rapid construction of a new science building. The designers of the building are investigating the possible use of steam for air conditioning. If the excess steam can be used for this purpose the Cooperative will have a market for the steam which will not require a large capital investment as would electrical generation.

Arrangements were finalized with the New Hampshire Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission and the Office of State Planning which provided a grant of funds to replace the bituminous concrete tipping floor at the incinerator with a reinforced concrete floor. In return for the much improved tipping floor the Cooperative will incinerate oil spill debris from oil spills in the Seacoast area.

During mid summer the plant was shut down for a period of about three weeks while the new concrete floor was installed and considerable maintenance, particularly of the ash conveyor was accomplished.

Our previous annual report stated that the town of South Berwick Maine had voted to join the Cooperative as a member. Legal problems concerning a Maine town joining a New Hampshire Cooperative appear of such magnitude that South Berwick will continue as a customer as opposed to joining the Cooperative.

Recently a contract was signed with the town of Derry wherein Derry will also become a customer and will guarantee to deliver approximately one hundred tons of refuse per week to the Cooperative during the colder months when the additional tonnage is most desirable.

The Directors of the Cooperative wish to express their deep appreciation for the assistance given their efforts by the University's staff as well as the officers and personnel of the cooperating towns. Every effort will be continued to keep the residents of the region informed of the progress in the collection, processing and disposal of the waste which is being handled at the plant.

NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

The Newmarket Regional Health Center completed its twelfth year of service in 1983. The Health Center operates two medical offices, one in Newmarket and the other in Raymond, the Lamprey River Clinic. Both facilities provide general medical care, preventive health services, community outreach, social services, and short term counseling with referral to area mental health agencies.

In 1983, Joseph Fuller, M.D., a family practitioner, joined the staff. The Health Center offers a Prenatal Program under the direction of Maude Guerin, M.D., which includes prenatal, delivery and postpartum care. In addition, the Health Center offers nutritional counseling and prenatal classes.

Other members of the medical staff include Sarah Oxnard, M.D., Michael Lewis, P.A.-C., Barbara Janeway, M.S.N., A.R.N.P., and Anne Fawcett, A.R.N.P. The medical team also includes registered nurses, medical assistants and community health workers. For more information, or to make a medical appointment, call 659-3106 in Newmarket, 895-3351 in Raymond, or toll-free in Newmarket at 1-800-582-7279.

The community health workers coordinate a school health program and preventive screening clinics to detect potential health hazards. They hold informative workshops and act as liaisons between the medical providers and patients.

In November, 1982, the Newmarket Regional Health Center initiated a Self-Care Program for the Elderly in conjunction with the Occupational Therapy Department of the University of New Hampshire. The purpose of this program is to enable the elderly to

stay in their home setting as well as to maintain a quality of life and independent status within their community. The focus of the program is to provide self-care skills before disability occurs and to anticipate problems with functional activities. The Newmarket Regional Health Center continues to operate the Senior Citizen Transportation Program. Three of the four buses are equipped with hydraulic lifts to provide services to the handicapped. 1983 ANNUAL REPORT OF MADBURY WATER DISTRICT

During the past year the Water Board reviewed accumulated materials in the files and assessed past projects and concerns in an effort to reinforce goals.

We have set an objective of working in cooperation with the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Selectmen, and other town agencies for the purpose of promoting management of town resources while allowing for changes and growth. To do that, we have sought knowledge of activities of other organizations and will provide input to those other groups. We are making efforts to obtain necessary data on water related issues from the state, University sources, the Regional Planning Commission, businesses working with water testing, and publications. It is our wish to provide background and recommendations to the town for policies of water protection and use as stated in our purpose. Immediate strategies and goals include studying ground water supplies and developing an aquifer protection ordinance. Expanding on results gathered in a 1977 well water survey, we are again requesting residents' assistance on an updated survey to monitor and chart the locations, depths, and water qualities of wells. Because of growing concerns about ground water availability and quality, we want to effectually involve ourselves with the town's future development.

The concept of regional water supplies in New Hampshire seems to have increasing importance as the area grows. Though the Bellamy Reservoir now provides water to the city of Portsmouth, they are seeking an alternate, less expensive water source. A few Madbury residents are connected to that system, so we have asked Portsmouth's Water Department to keep us informed of further developments. We believe it is especially necessary to protect our other water sources for the future. Mr. Boucher of Dover's Water Department states that a trench has been dug around the Dover landfill adjacent to the reservoir, since learning that hazardous waste was dumped at the site. It is hoped, we are told, that the possible flow of any polluting materials will be directed away from that area; and that no contaminants have shown up in recent testing of the reservoir.

We also received a complaint in June about suspected pollution of Barbadoes Pond; and made appropriate contacts for handling the questions.

At least one commissioner will attend the spring lecture series offered by the Strafford Regional Planning Commission on site plan reviews, site hydrology, and soils. We hope to coordinate efforts for attendance and follow-up with the Conservation Commission.

Residents are welcome to attend our meetings, now listed on the town calendar, and are encouraged to contact Board members Denise Grieg, Dianne Mrak, Kathy Traut, or Anne Keefe with any relevant questions or comments.

MADBURY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

In 1983, the Madbury Historical Society held four regular meetings. The January meeting was held jointly with the Durham Historic Association in Durham. Our spring meeting on historical gardening was given by Lucinda Brockway of Strawberry Banke, and a follow up field trip to the gardens at the "Banke" was hosted by Anne Mankin. At the annual meeting in October, Bob Hodgson and Eileen Corrow discussed the preservation of historical documents, displaying some Madbury documents in our collectin. At our final program, Phil Johnson of East Lebanon, Maine, gave an illustrated talk about mills. For Madbury Day we gathered together over 40 "Whatsits" for a table in the town hall where young and old tried to guess what each item was.

Besides our regular meetings we have continued our series of "Moseys about Madbury." In January we walked across the frozen Bellamy Reservoir along the old Hook Mill Road from Littleworth to Nute Roads, exploring the cellar holes and sites along the way. This fall we walked Long Hill Road from Hook Mill Road (now at the edge of the Reservoir) into Barrington, discovering the old town line marker along the way.

The completed Cultural Resource Survey, Inventory and Plan of Madbury was received from the Rockingham Planning Commission in July. Members of the historical society spent hours compiling and recompileing forms on Madbury's historical houses. Copies of this survey are on file with the Historical Society, Selectmen and Planning Board.

The Madbury Historical Society meets the second Tuesday of October, November, January and April, with October being the annual meeting. We invite all who share our interest in preserving Madbury's history to participate in our various meetings, walks and projects.
