



## SULLIVAN COUNTY DELEGATION PROCEEDINGS

Legislature Chamber State House Concord, New Hampshire

January 8, 1969

The Sullivan County Delegation convened at 2:00 P.M. in the Legislature Chamber, Concord, N. H., on January 8, 1969 with Pat Angus, Chairman, presiding.

The roll call was checked by Ruth Hamilton, Clerk, pro-tem. The following members were present: Frizzell, Galbraith of Charlestown; Gaffney, Rousseau, Ward one; Barrows, Hamilton, Ward three; Angus, Campbell, Spaulding, Nahil, Ward two; all of Claremont.

Coggeshall, Downing, Saggiotes, Tracey, of Newport.

Merrifield of Sunapee.

Williamson of Goshen.

Mackintosh of Cornish.

Logan of Plainfield.

Absent was D'Amante of Claremont.

Chairman Angus called for the election of officers and nominations were in order: Mr. Galbraith nominated Martha Frizzell for Chairman, which was seconded by Sam Nahil, and the vote was unanimous. Chairman Frizzell took the Chair and proceeded with the election of the following: Stanley Williamson, Vice-Chairman; Ruth Hamilton, Clerk.

Chairman Frizzell called for nominations for the Executive Committee. The nominations of five members were as follows: Sam Nahil, Chairman; William Tracey, William Gaffney, Roma Spaulding, and James Mackintosh were voted unanimously.

The Delegation instructed Chairman Frizzell to have the Attorney-General give an opinion concerning ex-officio members of the Executive Committee having a vote and be accepted as final. Chairman Frizzell queried whether ex-officio members of the Executive Committee had a vote. The Delegation instructed her to inquire from the Attorney-General for an opinion and abide by it.

A vote of confidence was asked by the Chair for HJR 2, providing for a sum of \$20,000 for more construction for Fort #4 at Charlestown, which was to be presented to the appropriation committee the following day. Maurice Downing and James Saggiotes were recorded as not voting.

Meeting adjourned at 2:25 P.M.

Because of inclement weather, the annual meeting and dinner at the County Home was cancelled. Members were called to meet at 7:00 P.M. at the Claremont Commissioners' Office. Meeting was delayed until a quorum could be declared.

Legislators present were: Barrows, Galbraith, Angus, Gaffney, Williamson, Tracey, Spaulding, Campbell, Nahil, Mackintosh, Frizzell and Hamilton.

Commissioners: Woodhull, Bascom and McCusker.

County Officials: Colby, Mr. and Mrs. Ahern. Kay Waltz from the Commissioners' Office and several interested citizens.

Chairman Frizzell opened the meeting and called on Commissioner Woodhull to review the budget as previously presented to the Finance Committee and Public Hearing.

After some debate over several budget items, the Finance Committee, chaired by Sam Nahil went into action and amended several items in anticipated revenue and reductions in expenditures.

22. On motion of Mackintosh, seconded by Angus, VOTED that the sum of \$100.00 be raised and appropriated for Civil Defense.

23. On motion of Spaulding, seconded by Nahil, VOTED that the sum of \$844,496.64 be the total budget accepted and passed, and the amount to be raised by taxation is to be sum of \$474,010.52.

Mr. Ahern presented figures prepared by Rollins, King and McKone, Inc., Consulting Engineers, concerning the improvements necessary to upgrade the existing boiler plant at the County Farm and Hospital. No action was taken other than a motion by Pat Angus, seconded by Allen Campbell, to have the Finance Committee make a study of the apparent need for changes in the heating system, and report to the Delegation its decision. The motion was carried.

Delegation Chairman Frizzell instructed the Clerk to include in the minutes the re-appointment of the members of the Building Committee as follows:

## **COMMISSIONERS' REPORT**

To The Citizens of Sullivan County:

1969 has been a real working year for all county officials and many good county projects have been accomplished.

Surplus food distribution and welfare have been stepped up to take care of an increased number of families. New settlement laws, as well as studies by State and Federal governments, have stressed that the counties should do a more thorough job in this area.

The addition to the County Nursing Hospital in Unity has progressed faster and more successfully than was expected. It will be finished in a few more months, and this should be of great assistance to many on our waiting list.

The fire in the hay and cattle barn was a sad experience although it was completely covered by insurance. This fire has led the commissioners to request from the county extension service a complete survey of the farming operations at Unity. The question we want answered is, "does it pay the taxpayers of Sullivan County to be in the farming and land owning business?" Stanley Colby and his staff are presently doing this study.

In this year of rapid inflation we were able to operate well within our budget. Much of the credit for this accomplishment has to go to our faithful staff and all employees. To name individuals would lead to forgetting some, so the Commissioners are thanking each and every one that works for Sullivan County. We could not ask for a better group to work with.

By statute of the State of New Hampshire we are compelled to make a report each year. The above is a small part of your county history for 1969. To give you a complete report would require hundreds of pages — besides much is enclosed in this booklet.

Our aim is to make 1970 an even more successful year!

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

January, 1970

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners:

The year 1969 saw real progress being made in our new construction. The building was totally enclosed in October and during December the new oil fired heating boilers were placed in operation for heating the complete institution.

The Nursing Hospital has continued to be filled to capacity with a long list of applicants waiting their turn. The adjoining of the new addition to the present building resulted in the loss of a room which reduced our number of patients by three. Federal law made it necessary to provide a nursing station and drug room on the first floor decreasing our male census by two patients.

The use of the House of Correction and Jail facilities remain about the same with a younger population. Some progress has been made in rehabilitation and the use of volunteers in this area. The men have taken advantage of Adult Basic Education and courses which have been available at the New Hampshire Vocational Technical College. We have continued with our work release program and find this beneficial.

The farming operation for the past year continued as usual. We suffered a great loss when a fire destroyed our hay storage and eighteen head of livestock. A committee has been formed to study our farming program and make recommendations for future considerations.

We want to thank the many volunteers and the various groups and organizations who have provided entertainment, gifts, etc. to the residents of the Nursing Hospital.

In closing we want to express our thanks and appreciation to our county commissioners, the sheriff and his department, our county attorney, Dr. Stearns, Mrs. Waldo, our chaplains, and all our personnel for their support and interest which make it possible to operate the Sullivan County Home and Nursing Hospital.

# THE SULLIVAN COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH ASSOCIATION

December 31, 1969

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:

The Sullivan County Mental Health Clinic entered its third year of operation with a steadily increasing demand from the community for its services, but because of budgetary limitations it was unable to make commensurate increases in the services available.

The number of patients carried over in continuing treatment from 1968 was 88 as compared to 37 the previous year. Two hundred new patients were seen during the year and by October the number of patients in treatment on a continuing basis had increased to over a hundred.

This increase in treatment caseload resulted in a more prolonged waiting list, with non-critical patients often having to wait two to three months for diagnostic evaluations and several more months for treatment service. The Clinic also had to terminate contracts with the schools and Head Start for regular monthly consultation hours, and put their referrals on the same waiting list basis as other prospective patients.

Although referrals to the Clinic continue to include a high incidence of serious disturbances and crisis situations requiring emergency help, there have been some changes in patient categories and in types of treatment. The ratio of child patients to adults has steadily increased from an initial 40-60 to 60-40.

While it is gratifying that help is thus being sought before disturbances become more severe and deeply entrenched, this increase in child cases also makes heavier demands on staff time because parents of children under 18 are usually seen on as frequent a basis as the children. In order to alleviate the staff shortage as much as possible and to make wider use of treatment time the Clinic is utilizing family therapy whenever it is appropriate, and is initiating group therapy with parents of children with similar problems.

The Clinic was fortunate to receive an increase in the County contribution to its 1969 budget. However, the State was unable to provide matching funds on the customary 2 to 1 basis and its contribution to the Clinic budget was limited to approximately one-half of the funds requested. Therefore, the urgent need for additional staff could not be met except minimally through the replacement of the part-time (three days a week) social worker, who resigned in May, by a full-time social worker two months later.

Although the most frequent referral source continues to be the family doctor, the percentage of self-referrals has increased and a new source, referrals by former patients, has become the third most frequent category, reflecting a growing awareness and acceptance of the need for mental health services by the community. It also underlines the necessity for the Clinic to be able to provide increasing services to meet the increasing demands.

And if a more intensive program is begun, such as group work, I think the chaplain should definitely be included. Some of these fellows would never go back to prison if they had the right help to get a good start. Here again, I've appreciated cooperating with the Aherns in this very important work.

On January 12, 1970 a survey of the department's radio equipment was made by General Electric under the auspices of the Governor's Crime Commission. I believe that the Federal Government will do part of the funding for an up-to-date radio system.

I wish to thank our County Attorney, Charles V. Spanos for his sound advice and counsel over the past year. Also, I wish to thank the County Commissioners, my deputies and all law enforcement officials of the County for their wonderful cooperation.

### **REPORT OF COUNTY ATTORNEY**

December 31, 1969

The Commissioners of Sullivan County Newport New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

The following is my report to you as Sullivan County Attorney for the year 1969, relative to matters handled by this office during the course of the year.

The year 1969 showed an increase in the crime rate in Sullivan County, however, not, in my opinion, an alarming increase. The increase is noted mostly in the area of Burglary cases. It is interesting to note that these types of crimes have fallen off dramatically in the past three months, even below the usual rate.

In 1969, this office represented the State and County in the following matters:

There were (40) prosecutions for Burglary (many of these committed by the same persons); (4) Larceny by check; (3) Statutory Rape; (2) Reckless Driving Resulting in Death; (4) Aggravated assaults; (7) Grand Larceny; (2) Robbery; (1) Unnatural and Lascivious Acts; (2) Receiving Stolen Goods; (1) Illegal Possession of Weapon; and (10) Possession of Marijuana.


This office processed (27) cases under the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act; (18) Appeals to the Superior Court and a number of misdemeanors in our District and Municipal Courts.

The Dunham Murder Case has not been solved as yet, however, the people of our County should know that the investigation still continues and will continue by this office, the Sheriff and Chief of Police of Charlestown until we apprehend and convict the person responsible.
