# FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance Committee met with representatives from the various agencies and organizations seeking town funds. We reviewed the actual amount of service provided to Tamworth residents as well as additional funding sources, future plans of the organization and other details.

In an unfortunate oversight the Chocorua Public Library failed to meet the deadline for submitting its warrant article petition to the town. We had met with a representative previously and voted unanimously in favor of the proposed request for \$2500. A possibility exists for this request to be added by amendment to another article at Town Meeting. The Finance Committee felt the Cook Library operating budget article may be the appropriate place.

The full Committee abstained on the Cook Memorial Library land acquisition article, although in favor of the idea presented by the Library's representatives. At the time of our meeting (February 4th) the plan lacked specifics. The Committee would favor a finalized plan with firm prices to include:

- a completed purchase and sales agreement for the land;
- detailed costs for surveying, boundary line adjustment, title search and other legal work;
- the deletion of the \$5000 for emergency repairs. The Library representatives indicated these details would be available at Town Meeting.

On the Emergency Management article requesting funds to install the donated generator, the abstaining Committee members are in favor of the article providing the following steps are taken:

- test run diesel motor and the generator to assess performance before any other work.
- Use an electrical engineer to review the setup and draw up specifications for electrical contractor bids.
- Get two or three bids for the above work.

The Committee reviewed petitions from fifteen social service organizations. The services range from child care to hospice, from food/fuel assistance to local business support. A total of \$66,635 is requested by these organizations. Most of them receive funding from several sources and ask for a portion from the various towns they serve. Some members of the Finance Committee feel organizations should reduce reliance on town dollars by renewed outside fund-raising efforts.

A majority of the Committee felt that town funds should not be spent on private child care. This does not deny the need nor the quality of care provided by the Bearcamp Valley School & Children's Center.

The United Front Inc. is a newly organized mental illness peer support group

similar to a dozen such groups throughout N.H. The other organizations are state certified and funded. We recommend this route for The United Front Inc. also.

We believe the Meals on Wheels program provides valuable service to Tamworth and we support their request this year. However, in light of the steady increase in costs we recommend a closer look at funding sources and food supply for the future.

A future concern for the town will be the final closing of the landfill. The Finance Committee recommends that the town proceed with an arrangement with Casella Waste Management rather than bear the startup expense and uncertain future of operating its own transfer station.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

During 1998, all funds under the jurisdiction of the Treasurer's Office were invested so that the town would receive the maximum interest available at the time of the investment. Citizen's Bank and the Municipal Deposit Investment Pool both offered excellent yields, along with safety through full collateralization.

We borrowed \$1.5 million in tax anticipation notes in March, at a cost of \$52,381.25, for the use of this money until December 31. Citizen's Bank was the low bidder. However, investments earned a total of \$82,060.19, so the town gained \$29,678.94 in interest while using this money.

While I will be on vacation during the Town Meeting period, I welcome any questions concerning the office of Town Treasurer at any time. After all, this is your money. I also welcome any comments, concerns, or suggestions relative to the Treasurer's duties.

Special thanks go to Selectmen's Assistant Janet Conner, Town Clerk/Tax Collector Theresa Boewe, Selectmen John Roberts, Mariette Ross, and Lanette Goodson, and the staff at BNH, Citizen's, Fleet, and the MDIP for their help and support. Members put in over 533 hours of training this year. Training included testing hose, fire behavior, self-contained breathing apparatus, adrenalin, safety, electrical safety, forestry equipment, pumping, emergency vehicle liability, relay pumping, propane trucks, propane tanks, propane regulators, propane gas live fire, CPR, wildland fire, hazardous materials operations, Basic Forest Fire and Firefighter Level I.

Here are some safety tips that we all should follow: make sure matches are out of reach of small children, vacuum and change the batteries (if battery operated) in all smoke detectors at least once a year, and keep all combustibles at least three feet from wood stoves. Make sure your home has an evacuation plan and every one in the home knows the routes and the meeting point; this is especially important if you have children in the home.

I would like to remind those that have Places of Assembly that they are by law supposed to be inspected twice a year. I would appreciate your help in seeing that the alarm system, exit lights, emergency lights are in working order and fire extinguishers have been checked and then call and remind me to come and inspect.

# REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire & timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. Early in 1998 we experienced an ice storm, which caused severe damage to forests of New Hampshire. This damage created a greater potential fire hazard as well as safety hazards to many areas of the state. Your local fire warden and Forest Rangers need your assistance in preventing wildfires in these hard hit areas and throughout the State. If you need assistance or information dealing with ice damaged woodlands, please call 1-800-444-8978.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols & 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection & reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires & keeping the loss of property & suppression costs as low as possible.

# TAMWORTH RESCUE SQUAD

The Tamworth Rescue Squad has been very busy this past year. We presently have 15 members all of whom have done a wonderful job of responding to calls. Their dedication has helped bring the squad to what it is today. In 1998 we responded to 205 calls: 30 motor vehicle accidents, 8 trauma, 22 assist fire and mutual aid, and 140 medical aids. We took part in 5 community activities some of which include sponsoring the bike rodeo at the Kenneth A. Brett School and sharing our duties and rescue truck with the school during EMS week. We also distributed Baskets of Warmth over the holidays for the elderly people and others in town.

This coming year hopes to be a promising one for us. We are hoping to put together another disaster drill as we did with the bus incident 2 years ago.

We also hope to put together some new ideas for fund raising.

Several members of the squad have been attending classes in different areas of training, some of which include High Angle Rescue, Pediatric Traumas, Logger Rescue, and Vehicle Extrication. We have also done special trainings in the squad to further our education and to better serve the community.

We are still looking for people to join Tamworth Rescue who would like to be a part of a team effort and who would like to learn emergency and

medical skills to help the community.

Again I would like to thank the community for their support and the Tamworth Rescue Squad members for all their hard work and dedication.

This last year brings to a close my service on and with the planning board. I have spent 14 years both on the board and on zoning committees. I have enjoyed serving the town in this way. Many things have been accomplished over the years, but there is still much work to do. Along with carrying on the monthly operations we have done many other things, including working on the subdivision regulations, the rules and procedures, the master plan and a proposed zoning ordinance.

My biggest disappointment is not being successful in proposing a zoning ordinance that the town would accept. According to questionnaires for the master plan and according to what we hear most people in town enjoy living here and a majority would like to keep Tamworth the way it is or with just a few minor changes. The difference in opinion occurs when you ask people how that goal should be accomplished. The planning board thinks that a simple zoning ordinance would be the right answer. My hope is that in time we can find a solution that most people will like. Lets join together and ensure that Tamworth will be a place that our children will want to stay in.

#### AGENCY INFORMATION

Tamworth Community Nurse Association continues to function as a licensed community health agency. Our annual inspection by the NH Bureau of Health Facilities which occurred on August 13, 1998 was deficiency free. Board policy, operating procedures, patient charts and documentation were reviewed for content and accuracy.

Our mission to promote optimal health, safety, and quality of life continues. Home visits to the elderly, disabled, or otherwise infirm are a main function of TCNA. Providing clinical care, teaching, reassurance and support to patients and their families as well as collaboration with physicians\clinicians and other community health agencies are key elements to ensuring that patients can remain in their homes. Office hours continue to be offered from 9AM to 11AM Monday through Thursday. An RN is available to check blood pressures, answer questions and offer medical advice, and tend to minor medical problems during this time.

Dr. John Patten continues to serve as our medical director. His dedication and professionalism are greatly appreciated.

The Board of Directors of TCNA continues to meet monthly to direct agency functions and operations and to handle financial matters. The Board members and the Friends of TCNA (formally the summer board) volunteer their time with board activities such as clinics and screenings, special programs and fund raising events. With their guidance and assistance and support from the townspeople we have continued to function as a non-profit, non-charging community health agency.

As a non-charging agency which receives no reimbursement from medicare or other insurance, we are not bound by the constraints of medicare or managed care which have recently become more stringent. Our visits are based solely on our nursing assessment and collaboration with physician, patient and family members or caregivers. This however, limits our ability to provide ancillary services such as home health aides, homemakers, physical, occupational, and speech therapy, hospice and high tech care requiring 24 hour coverage. Hence, referrals to other agencies are another important function we provide. We are thankful to Carroll County Health and Homecare Services, Northern Carroll County VNA, and VNA and Hospice of Southern Carroll County and Vicinity for providing supplemental services.

Our valuable office manager, June Donovan, continues in the same capacity. All those who have called or stopped by the office are greeted by June's warm friendly attitude.

Mary Smith, RN, our part time nurse has returned after a lengthy illness. TCNA staff, board members and patients alike are ecstatic over Mary's recovery. We are thankful to Kathryn Sullivan, RN for filling in during Mary's absence.

Attending meetings for networking and information gathering purposes, and conferences to fulfill the required continuing education units for RN licensure are a necessity for TCNA. Health care is one of the most rapidly changing industries today. Incorporating these changes into a home health care agency as unique as TCNA can be a challenge.

#### **AGENCY PROGRAMS**

Monthly blood pressure clinics continue in the TCNA office on the last Wednesday of every month from 12 to 1PM and at the Congregate Meal site on the third Monday of each month.

The Spring Adult Health Screening cosponsored by TCNA, the Whittier Lions Club and Memorial Hospital was held at the Whittier Lions Club on April 3rd. Over one hundred people were screened for basic vision, glaucoma, dental, hearing, blood pressure, blood glucose, cholesterol, hemoglobin, pulmonary function, height, weight and body fat analysis along with nutrition counseling. Also available was information on Living Wills and Advanced Directives, RSVP, and chiropractic advise. Many thanks to Lion, Dot Provenzano for organizing the event and to all the professionals that donate their time.

The annual flu clinic was held in October at the TCNA office. Over 200 people were vaccinated at the clinic.

The dental program at the Brett School continues to be offered in the spring and fall to all children eligible for the free or reduced lunch program. We are grateful to Dr. Michael Glick for providing the dental care and to the TCNA board members for donating their time to transport children to and from the dentist office. We also thank the Tamworth Foundation for their continued support of this worthwhile program.

We continue to be actively involved in the Tamworth Community Christmas Program. June and I serve on the board. Along with many volunteers and the generosity of the townspeople and area businesses, gifts were obtained for over 70 children.

The Tamworth Meals on Wheels program continues to be coordinated by June. Meals are prepared by Ossipee Concerned Citizens and delivered by volunteers. Much effort goes into scheduling drivers to deliver the meals to more than 30 households 5 days a week. We thank our many faithful drivers, OCC, and June for this valuable service.

TCNA is also the area Salvation Army Unit Station. Some emergency funds are available for Tamworth or Sandwich residents experiencing a financial crisis when all other financial avenues have been exhausted.

The "loaner" closet continues to be of great use by many residents. Wheelchairs, commodes, walkers, canes, crutches, car seats, and assorted supplies are available free of charge. We thank all who have donated items and encourage all residents to use the equipment and supplies.

In an effort to identify and meet the needs of the community, TCNA works closely with the community food pantry, the Brett School, area clergy and other community members. The grief and bereavement support group, "Journey Through Grief" evolved as a result of some of these contacts. Facilitated by counselor Margaret Cannon, the group is held in the Spring and Fall to offer support to those suffering a loss. Another need identified has led to the formation of a steering committee to organize a pool of volunteers to provide transportation, friendly visits, and respite care to those in need. It is being modeled after the Wolfeboro, Sandwich, and Center Harbor Caregivers who have been very generous in sharing information.

We are thankful to all those who support TCNA and continue to seek it throughout the year.

# REPORT OF THE LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

LRPC, with a service area covering over 1,200 square miles in Belknap, Carroll, and Grafton Counties, is one of nine regional planning agencies established by state statute. We continued to have a very busy year. Our work program remains diverse with activities such as local planning assistance, circuit rider planning, regional information systems & mapping, transportation planning, economic development, and natural resources planning. We are funded through multiple sources including local dues contributed by member municipalities. LRPC was called upon many times each day to provide local technical advice, and to respond to requests for service. We have also continued to maintain a regular dialogue with those state agencies that depend on us for a linkage to the communities in the Lakes Region. Our goal remains to provide support and leadership to the region, its governments, businesses, and citizens.

A few of our accomplishments over the past year are as follows:

- Co-hosted and organized three public Municipal Law Lectures, a public workshop on excavation taxes, and a workshop on the dollars and sense of conservation open-space zoning. Attended many local meetings for technical planning assistance.
- Initiated a comprehensive outreach effort to identify preferences for areas of local natural, historic, and cultural significance in our 31 communities. Responded to two requests under the Developments of Regional Impact statute.
- Prepared a report on trends in commercial, industrial, and residential development permits in the Lakes Region from 1992 to 1996.
- Approved transportation enhancement projects for consideration by the NH Dept. of Transportation. Completed the first of a two-year Scenic Byway Plan for the Lakes Region Tour. Staffed the Route 16 Corridor Study. Created a video on Access Management using computer simulation.
- Coordinated the 13th annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection (HHW), the largest single day, multi site collection in New Hampshire. Renewed efforts to include a permanent HHW Collection Center.
- Guided area economic development policy as a board member of the Belknap County Economic Development Council and the Newfound Economic Development Corp.
- Served as the Lakes Region's data clearinghouse for U.S. Census, demographic and statistical data. These data are available to community officials and the public. Updated sections of the regional

land use map using geographic information system technology. Responded to requests from all member communities.

- Amended LRPC's Bylaws to ensure that commissioner membership and meetings would include geographic balance throughout the region.
- Represented the region before the International Forum of Coastal Communities on Tourism and the Environment.
- Provided support to the U.S. Americorps staff working with local landowners for water quality and land management. Staffed the Pemigewasset River Local Advisory Committee. Conducted reviews of flood plain ordinances.

### TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION REPORT

The Carroll County Community Contact office is a private, non-profit subdivision of Tri-County Community Action. Tri-County Community Action was incorporated in 1965 with a mission that includes "to make the entire community more responsive to the needs and interests of the poor by mobilizing resources and bringing about greater institutional sensitivity." The Carroll County Community Contact office was established in and has operated from our base at 5 Folsom Road, Center Ossipee since 1984. We presently have nine regularly scheduled satellite office sites located throughout Carroll County.

The Carroll County Community Contact office has provided services for 482 of Tamworth's citizens, processing 187 fuel applications, 53 being elderly and 42 disabled, and linked 200 with other Community Action Programs.

# TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION HAS SPENT \$41,103.82 ON TAMWORTH CITIZENS BETWEEN JULY 1,1997 AND JUNE 30,1998.

Community Contact is dependent upon funding from your town and neighboring communities county-wide to provide necessary services for the less fortunate citizens in our communities. The local funds are combined with the Community Services Block Grant, Fuel Assistance, New Hampshire Emergency Shelter Grant, Homeless Programs, FEMA and private and corporate benefactors. We also are the conduit through which the USDA Surplus Food gets distributed to the 11 food pantries and 4 dinner bells throughout Carroll County in order to serve our residents.

Carroll County Community Contact has many links to local families. The Fuel Assistance and Weatherization programs are a major gateway for low-income households to interact with our staff in completing applications and receiving benefit. We use FEMA and McKinney Funds in our Homeless

Prevention Program.

Carroll County Community Action will be working with TANF recipients in job retention support and post-employment services. Our office is one of six sites statewide for the Family Empowerment and Advocacy Services Program. We also have effective working relationships with energy providers, electric utilities, town welfare officials and other community services and resources.

Carroll County Community Contact is known as a family friendly agency. Our staff has the trust of the entire county. We are able to successfully partner with individual families and assist them with achieving greater self-sufficiency. We generally work with families one-on-one to identify barriers blocking the way to self-sufficiency and the resources to overcome these barriers. We provided information and referral and assisted with advocacy for more than 6,500 households in Carroll County last year.

We have greatly appreciated the support, cooperation and partnership

with your elected officials and staff, as well as other social service agencies, residents and our clients.

# TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS AND CEMETERY COMMISSIONERS

As trustees we are currently responsible for the safe keeping and investment of approximately \$519,468 in trust and reserve funds. The details of these funds are shown on the accompanying schedules.

As of December 31, 1998 we are holding \$158,428 in permanent trust funds for such purposes as cemetery maintenance, library, park, etc. In addition, we are holding \$361,040 in capital reserve funds. These are non-permanent funds established for the purpose of special education, purchasing fire trucks, purchasing recycling equipment, etc.

All but a small amount our funds have been invested the NH Public Deposit Investment Pool. This provides us with a favorable return on our investment. For 1998 the average annualized yield was 5.12%.

Costs for cemetery maintenance increased approximately 4% this year due to several factors. The January ice storm created a lot of spring clean-up costs and the excessive rain during the month of June increased the need for mowing during the Summer season.

Our 1999 budget reflects a slight increase. This is due to increased mowing costs as well as the need for fence repairs in some cemeteries. In order to help offset these increased costs in the future, the Trustees voted at a recent meeting to increase the cost of cemetery lots. The new rates are \$250 per lot for Tamworth residents and \$500 per lot for non-residents. The Trustees are also taking a more diligent approach to collecting late payments for lots.

# **COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY**

The Cook Memorial Library is a public library open 18 hours per week with programs and services available to residents and nonresidents. The library strives to better meet the needs of the community in providing educational, cultural, recreational anal informational services. In order to manage increased library usage and in response to a recent library survey, the board of trustees will increase the library hours an additional four hours per week in 1999. This total of 22 open hours also enables the library to meet official state standards for a library our size.

The library is very proud of the increased usage in 1998. Annual circulation (materials checked out) is now 14,000, which is a 4% increase over 1997. In-library use (materials used in the library) was 4,056. Over 8,000 visits to the library were logged. We appreciate the hard work of Patti Rau, our assistant librarian, as her research skills enabled us to answer over 500 reference questions, borrow over 400 items from other libraries and lend over 200 items to them. Now that the library is fully automated, we officially discontinued use of the manual card catalog.

Use of the library for community meetings has doubled from two years ago to a total of 101 meetings. We had numerous programs consisting of 30 storytimes and 28 juvenile programs. The popularity of the summer reading program continued with 97 children registering. We also offered more programs of interest to adults. Our programs and activities included the annual book and bake sale, a program called Preserving Family Archives, a book discussion group, a three-part genealogy series, a grant-supported program called "Picturing Words" under the direction of Children's Programmer, Jay Rancourt assisted by Louise Wrobleski, and a December Open House where more than 50 library patrons enjoyed the story telling magic of Marion Posner. A grant was received from the Saul O. Sidore Foundation for new shelving in the Reference Room. Cecilia Johnson, an AmeriCorps volunteer, offered several months of tutoring in reading. The library now offers Internet training and a computer for use by the public.

Planning for the future of the library was an important part of the Trustees' 1998 agenda. They initiated a long-range building renovation program and then recruited a volunteer Building Advisory committee to assist in its development and implementation

Of special note in the past year was the reorganization of the Friends of the Library with the adoption of new bylaws and election of officers. One of the first activities of the "Friends" was constructing a prize-winning float for the Family Day parade in cooperation with the Chocorua Library. In August they contributed financially to the library by holding a highly successful Bake Sale at the same time as the Annual Book Sale.

Cook Memorial Library is a public library with programs and services available to residents and nonresidents alike. The library loans books, magazines, videos, book cassettes and music CD's. The New Hampshire Collection is a well-used circulating collection. A noncirculating local history and genealogy collection (our Ulitz Room) is maintained by devoted volunteers. I wish to thank everyone in the community for your assistance in making this busy year a success. I welcome each of you to visit the Cook Memorial Library or visit our Web Site (www. ncia. net/library/tamworth).

We postponed our holiday party so we could have an open house in February. This will be a great opportunity to meet the new librarian and socialize with our neighbors.

We are excited about planned events for the upcoming year. We will be expanding our children's storytime to include music, arts and crafts, an adult discussion group will begin and much more. We encourage everyone to come visit the Chocorua Library and participate in our many activities this year.

# TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

MEMBERS: Kris Bontaites was elected chairman, and John Mersfelder vice-chairman. John also will be point person in Wetland Matters. Charlie Townsend was re-elected Treasurer, and Betty Steele Recording Secretary. Charlie will also serve as easement co-ordinator and will continue on the Town Solid Waste Committee. Marlene Ostrowski was appointed by the Selectmen as a regular member of TCC (Tamworth Conservation Commission), having previously been an alternate. She continues as the TCC representative on the Town Biosolids Committee. Bob Griffin was appointed a new member of TCC, and will serve as trails co-ordinator. Laura Campbell offered to work for TCC and was elected as an associate member. Chris Conrod resigned after ten years of service, but will service as a consultant to train someone in easement monitoring. He will continue to be involved with trails. His resignation was accepted with regret and with thanks for the tremendous amount of work he has done for TCC and the Town.

TRAILS: All trails were monitored in April for effects of the January ice storm. Chief damage was in Hemenway State Forest - Spur Trail almost obliterated and Loop Trail obscured in one section. Jackman North was affected chiefly by fallen branches, and the bridge over the brook at the west end of the trail had washed out. There was little damage from the ice storm on other trails.

Work at Remick Natural Area has now been done by Chris Clyne, with help from Scott Hayman and twelve students from Brett School - signs painted, bridge across a brook built, and trail brushed out. Thanks to all of them.

Hemenway trails were cleared by TCC members, with help from Brian Cutter and Dave Bowles. On Jackman North trail a new and more stable bridge has been put in and the trail cleared. Bob and Kit Griffin cleared the trail up Page Hill, on which the Town now has an easement.

EASEMENTS: Chris Conrod has lined up volunteers for easement monitoring. First step is a full record of each easement, so in the future a monitor will know whether the terms of the easement have been adhered to. The Perkins - Community School easement monitoring is more involved than most, as this is a working farm and constant changes are being made within the easement area.

A new easement was acquired by the Town this year - along the woodroad up Page Hill and the area of the ledges. Sally Gallagher sold all her property to Andrew Mockler, after putting an easement on the portion of it that has been used by the public for so many years, so it can remain in public use. TCC will maintain the woodroad trail.

DREDGE AND FILL: TCC has made on-site visits and recommended approval of three dredge and fill applications - work on abutments to bridge

over Chocorua River at Ski and Beach; a farm pond on Farley property off Rte. 16 near Chocorua Lake; and repair of erosion at the bridge over Pollard Brook on the Mountain Road. All have been approved by the Wetlands Board.

DREDGE AND FILL: TCC has checked two complaints - that Tamworth Landfill may have placed fill in wetland near dump; but found no fill had been put in the wetland. That there is possible violation off Swift River Way, with a stone retainer wall placed in river; but found Dept. of Environmental Services taking no action, as it was not extensive and nature would take care of the problem.

BIOSOLIDS: Marlene Ostrowski, TCC representative on the Town Committee, has worked on this, attended meetings and given reports to TCC. Main concern is that sludge be properly applied. More information and debate is needed. Ned Beecher, interim coordinator for N. E. Biosolid and Residual Association, attended a TCC meeting to speak on work of the association and recommended proper oversight of sludge application.

An article on biosolid application has been petitioned on Town Warrant and passed with the amendments by TCC for a one year moratorium and the formation of a Town Committee to make recommendations to the Town. John Mersfelder and Marlene Ostrowski are TCC representatives of the committee. TCC has agreed to be keeper of site plans and applications in regard to sludge.

SOLID WASTE: The Solid Waste Committee has mapped the landfill to see where a transfer station can be put. Five acres are needed. A proposal has been received for a site for transfer station on Route 25.

MEETINGS ATTENDED: John Mersfelder, now on the board of the N.H. Assoc. of Conservation Commission, attends regular board meetings. Three TCC members went to the annual meeting and workshops in Concord, two attended a meeting of the Conservation District on Risk Assessment, three a meeting on Ossipee on \$ and Sense of Current Use Assessment, and two a meeting of the Regional Environmental Planning Program (REPP).

LAND AND COMMUNITY HERITAGE COMMISSION: REPP is promoting a land protection program with permanent state funding, similar to Land Conservation Investment Program which has now ended. The State Legislature appointed a Land and Community Heritage Commission (LCHC) to study the establishment of such a program. TCC members have attended a conference in Concord, a Commission meeting, and several other meetings on the subject. LCHC has made a report, which TCC has endorsed, to propose legislation to establish such a program.

BOOKCASE: Chris Conrod offered to build a bookcase, at cost, for the lobby of the Town Office Building. TCC financed cost of materials and, as of this

writing, the bookcase has just been installed. It will be used for TCC reference material, for public use, with some control, as in a library.

LOGGING IN HEMENWAY STATE FOREST: In November Bob Hardy, State Forester for Hemenway, was invited to a TCC meeting to outline the proposed cutting on Great Hill. Aim of cutting is to salvage timber. To this end more extensive cutting than usual will be done, including a 9 1/2 acre clear cut south of the tower, needed because of such extensive ice storm devastation. Other cutting will be selective.

The State has included in the TCC - Hemenway Special Use Permit that trail to the tower from the parking lot at the junction of Hemenway and Dana Steele's property. This trail has now been cleared.

OTHER: TCC chairman, Kris Bontaites gave a talk at Runnells Hall on black bears - a timely subject as bears have lately been interested in food in bird feeders.

By-Laws have been written and approved by TCC for its administration. As usual, TCC has helped publicize a household hazardous waste collection day and secure a volunteer to work on the day itself.
