

You are hereby notified to meet at the new Consolidated School in said Thornton on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To consider the Budget—item by item—as posted, and to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if a discount will be allowed on property taxes paid before a certain date to be later set by the Selectmen.

- 5. To see if the town will vote to sell Town Property taken on tax title.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to accept money in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the Scott Benton cemetery lot.
- 7. (By request) To see if the town will vote to build and maintain a town road between the State Highway and the home of Alice and Chester Downing, and appropriate money for the same.
- 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The year 1955 is a memorable one for Thornton, for it registers the building of our new modern central school building.

This building not only provides adequate facilities for the classes, but it also relieves the town of the future responsibilities incident to the three old wooden district buildings which have been vacated. And what is more, the new building has been planned so as to be useful for other town purposes.

The Selectmen have executed a lease arrangement with the School Board, giving us the use of a small room for a Town Office. The room has been provided with a built-in vault which gives the Town, for the first time, a really safe place for town records and valuable papers.

This year, we have called for the Annual Meeting to be held at the School Auditorium. We hope that the comfort and convenience thus to be had, will be appreciated by all.

An effort was made to have hydrants put in the Campton water main, which would be of service to property owners in that section. It was found impossible to locate hydrants where they would serve to affect insurance rates to any advantage and the plan was not followed out.

In the Annual Town Report Contest, conducted at the State University in Durham, our town again won recognition for having a good Report. You will find the Report useful to you if you will bring it with you to Town Meeting.

Town Roads

Each year we find our Town Roads improved more and more. The change in State aid for Sandwich Notch which reduced the amount available for 1954 was slightly increased in 1955 by act of Legislature. With this, and the increased appropriation by the Town, we find the Town roads very well maintained. A few outlying roads still need some more attention as they get nearly impassable in the mud season.

We will have available for TRA construction in 1956 a balance of approximately \$800.00 left from 1955 plus the 1956 allotment. This money is spent by the State Highway Dept. on Town roads, according to State specifications.

Some bad turns on the Mill Brook Road were widened and straightened and fence posts installed this year. Charles Kimball donated all the fill for this job and assisted our road agent in doing this work. Costs on this job ran to \$278.05 plus fence posts and a small amount of tar.

The Town purchased 150 oak fence posts from Charles Kimball at \$.75 each. Some of these were used this year and the rest stored at the Town House.

It was decided not to retar any roads in 1955, but to buy a load of tar to be used by the agent for patching and other repairing. He has been mixing the tar patch as it has been required this year with a machine at his home, saving the Town about one-half in cost where it had been previously bought from the State Highway Dept. and had to be trucked a considerable distance. This tar cost \$295.16 and other materials for tarring came to \$51.70, a total of \$346.86, leaving a balance of \$336.75 to be used in 1956.

Mowing bushes cost the Town \$273.50, an average of approximately \$14.40 a mile.

668 yards of gravel were used for highway maintenance this year. Cost \$73.00.

A number of small bridges in Town have been replaced lately with large steel culverts. These culverts make a permanent installation with no wory to the Town about future repairs or overloading.

The bridge beyond the Reitsma home will have to be replaced this year and a steel culvert will be used there.

The total for all summer work for 1955 came to \$2,989.01.

The sand for winter roads was purchased from Campton Sand & Gravel this year at a considerable saving to the Town. We require 160 yards of sand to maintain safe roads. The cost of sand was \$56.00, labor putting up the sand pile \$103.64, and salt and paper \$82.00. The winter sanding under Bert Benton cost \$309.26 or a total in all of \$550.90 for a winter's sanding.

Plowing in the Mad River district done by John Rivers came to \$1,248.00 and for the rest of the Town done by Clayton Ham, \$1,760.00, a total for plowing of \$3,008.00.

\$681.15 was spent for general expenses of the highway department. This includes money spent for the Town's share of the "Sandwich Notch Special," gravel and sand, salt, culverts, tools and all supplies, and repairs needed on Town equipment. The blinker light, which was in West Thornton, has been removed as it was repeatedly damaged, and seemed impractical for the Town to maintain.

The Town can well be proud of its public roads and also of its agent, Mr. John Rivers, who serves us so faithfully.

CEMETERY REPORT

This past year, most of the appropriation was spent as usual, cleaning up and mowing the grass. The driveway at Pine Grove Cemetery had to be gravelled last spring. I made two trips to the Tripoli and Orris Road cemeteries and cleaned up the Hanson Cemetery twice.

I had a plot plan drawn and copies printed of the Mad River Cemetery. This did not cost much, thanks to Alfred Hayward. These have been distributed to Roy Sawyer, the Town Clerk's Office, the Selectmen, and I have a copy.

Four tons of lime were purchased this fall instead of phosphate, and have been divided between Pine Grove and Mad River Cemeteries.

This fall Emery Tobyne made an estimate of \$350.00 to repair and paint the fences at Mad River and Pine Grove Cemeteries. It is hoped that the town will vote to have this job done next year.

OUR NEW SCHOOL

March 1952 saw the start of discussions for a consolidated school. George Thompson and Richard Bradley were elected to work with the school board.

We discussed the type of building which we thought would be best for the town at the 1953 school meeting. \$100.00 was appropriated to use in making plans. Of the few available places in town, we decided on land adjacent to the Center School, owned by Mrs. Bernice Landry, and an option was taken.

In December 1953, we contacted Norman Randlett, architect, and he presented a plan following our suggestions for a cinder block building. This plan was estimated to cost \$52,000, not including the land, water, architect's fee or furnishings. This plan was presented to the voters, March 1954, together with an article in the warrant to appropriate money for the purpose. A motion was made to raise a sum not to exceed \$59,000 through the issuance of serial bonds.

Three more members, Charles Ouellet, Kenneth Robbins and Charles Robertson, were added to the committee. A second consideration of plans produced our present building as the most practical one which would still give us what we felt we needed for the least amount of money.

The Bay State Artesian Well Company completed drilling a well in July and installed the pumping equipment. The well is 430 feet deep, produces 6 gallons per minute and is a flowing well.

Plans and specifications for the building were completed and sent out for bids in August. The bids were publicly opened September 1. These were rejected September 4. Changes and omissions were made and a second set of plans with specifications were sent out in October. These were opened October 21 and a contract was awarded to Armand Roux of Laconia. Construction began the last of November and was subsequently completed by June 1, 1955. Committee members and fathers completed the stage so that graduation was held in the new building.

The school board recognizes the splendid assistance given them by the building committee and wishes to express appreciation for the cooperation and assistance they have received from the community in such a progressive accomplishment.

At some future date it would be wise, I think, to equip the kitchen and establish a hot lunch program which is getting to mean so much to school children all over the nation.

During the spring achievement tests were administered to all the pupils in the Thornton Schools with good results, the majority of the children rating at or above the national norm. As this is written another series of achievement tests are being ordered to administer in the spring as well as some mental ability tests which will be given to some grades every year. Effective next September I hope achievement tests will be given in 'the fall of each year for diagnostic purposes and again in the spring to determine the amount of progress that has been made and the areas where a pupil might still need help or be weak.

New artithmetic and language books have been installed in your school which allow for articulation and correlation throughout the eight grades. In a few years this should have a noticeable effect upon the learning process, for the book in each grade blends itself into the work of the next higher grade and so on throughout eight years of elementary education. It is hoped that by next year we shall have adopted a new social studies and science series which are now the only two areas that I feel need attention.

Mrs. Lovett, the School Nurse, resigned in June and we were fortunate in securing Mrs. Helen Fisher, a former experienced school nurse from Ashland. She has been doing what I consider an excellent job. She visits the school regularly and is very capable in handling school situations as only a nurse can.

Miss Miriam Meyer, the music supervisor, also resigned and was replaced by Mr. Joseph Malfa. He is a graduate of Boston University Conservatory of Music and Boston University School of Music Education with experience as a music supervisor in New York State. He is a fine instrumentalist, has the ability to teach several instruments and I feel is well qualified and capable.

May I take this opportunity to thank the school board and teachers and pupils of your school for their cooperation during the past year. You have a fine school in Thornton and I shall do everything I can to see that present standards are maintained or surpassed.

EXPLANATION OF

SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent as per the following quotation:

"REPORTS. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1954-1955 received a salary of \$5825 which was made up as follows: \$2500 paid from the per capita tax and \$3325 pro-rated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$750 for travel within the union was also pro-rated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.

Superintendent's salary for 1954-1955 based on the above figure is reconciled as follows: \$3325 paid by the various districts, plus \$2500 received from State per capita tax, equals \$5825 Superintendent's basic salary. This, plus \$750 travel allowance allocated as indicated above, totals \$6575—amount received from State Treasurer for salary and travel of the Superintendent of Schools.

Another device of which they displayed enthusiasm was of setting words to music. They seem to enjoy this and they can sing the notes easier because they made them up themselves.

Subject: Music Grades 3-5 No. of children 27 Textbook: New Music Horizon 4 and Music in the Air School: Thornton

Most of the work has been done in Music in the Air although this book is too advanced for this group. Songs of "Roses from the South" by Strauss calibre and two part singing of Little Brother Dance With Me consist of making this a very particular musical group. Also, they like to sing in foreign languages such as "Alouette" (French) and Cielito Lindo (Mexican).

Subject: Music Grades 6-8 No. of children 30 Textbook: Juniors Singing and Music in the Air

All of the children have learned to compose music and to read and sing it after it was written. To their pleasant surprises, and mine too, some were, indeed, tuneful. They have worked with notation and the melodic music is best.

Instruments: 2 pianos, 1 violin, 1 drum, 1 accordion, 1 mandolin.
