THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in the Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at 10:00 in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Article 1, listed below, and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the ninth day of March next at 7:30 PM to act upon the remainder of the listed Warrant.

Article 1. To bring in your votes for one Selectman for three years, and for all other town officers elected by ballot, as passed by Town Meeting, or State Statute for the specified number of years.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following Town expenditures for the ensuing year.

- a. Town Officers' salaries
- b. Town Officers' expenses
- c. Election and Registrations
- d. Town Hall
- e. Parks
- f. Vital Statistics
- g. Insurance
- h. Social Security
- i. Shade trees
- j. Interest temporary loans
- k. Memorial Day
- 1. Town Dump
- m. Street Lighting
- n. Dog Officer
- o. Legal Fees
- p. Planning Board
- q. Civil Defense
- r. Tax Map & Reassessment Update

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee, to consist of the Fire Chief, Police Chief, Budget Committee Member, Planning Board Member and Board of Adjustment Member, for the purposes of studying the street lighting needs and present practices of the Town and of making recommendations on these needs and practices, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to implement the committee's recommendations, within the limits of budgeted street lighting appropriations and negotiate such contractual changes as may be necessary.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for highway summer maintenance.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for highway winter maintenance.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$399.55 to which the State will contribute \$2,663.70 if voted and accepted, for the construction of Class V roads.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote on the recommendations of the Public Works Committee.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Fire Department.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Police Department.

<u>Article 10</u>. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the District Nurses Association.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Water Department.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to support the operating costs of the Cheshire Hospital.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate a sum of money for the continuation of the War Memorial Program.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Gay-Kimball Library.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of the cemeteries.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money for Old Age Assistance and Public Welfare.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money for the support of the Monadnock Regional Association.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money for the support of the Monadnock Family & Mental Health Service.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-

priate the sum of \$1,270.00 for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to reopen and maintain that section of road off Route 12 leading to the residence of Chester Priest. (By Petition)

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to change the term of the Fire Chief, First Deputy and Second Deputy from one year to three years, to be effective at the next Town Meeting, over a three year period to provide for staggered terms.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for the development of a sanitary landfill as engineered by C. E. McGuire and approved by the State of New Hampshire and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 23. To see if the Town will appropriate six thousand dollars (\$6,000) for special tires for the Town's payloader for use at the sanitary landfill and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate ten thousand one hundred fifty dollars (\$10,150) for a one-ton truck and plow for use by the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for use by the Gay-Kimball Library and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for use at the War Memorial Program and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for use in town hall renovation and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Article 28. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the regulations, prepared by the Troy Fire Department, which set the minimum requirements for the installation of a master fire alarm box or auxillary systems connected to Mutual Aid by municipal circuits in the Town of Troy. Upon acceptance this will be prepared as a Town ordinance.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to require that the Selectmen, before disposing of real property the title to which has been acquired by Tax Collector's deed, first consult with the Conservation Committee, said commission to recommend if the retention of such real property would be in the best interests of the Town as provided in RSA 80:42a, subject to final ratification at the next Town Meeting.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize that the Conservation Commission be empowered to manage the Town forest(s) under the provisions of RSA 31:112 (D), and that any proceeds as might accrue from said forest(s) be placed in a separate conservation trust fund to be managed by said Commission.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1977 appropriation said funds to be placed in a special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for Federal funds with the assistance of the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to a Capital Reserve Fund for the Fire Department.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to a Capital Reserve Fund for the Highway Department.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to a Capital Reserve Fund for the Police Department.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax deeded property.

Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650. to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund to partially cover the cost of a soil survey of the Town of Troy. The Selectmen are hereby authorized to administer these funds.

Article 40. To hear reports of committees, agents or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

We especially want to thank the residents of Troy who have taken pride in the Town and have improved the appearance of the Town by painting and improving their property. The center of Town is now in the process of becoming very attractive for all and we do hope the spirit of the majority continues.

Two major projects were completed in 1976 which were authorized in 1973 and 1975: the reappraisal of the town and completion of the steeple. The assessors completed their 100% assessment of the town by November. All tax bills sent out for 1976 were based on this 100% reappraisal. The assessors will be back this spring to finish up properties that were not completed. The reassessment has brought all property to an equal evaluation.

The steeple, with much fanfare, was raised in June, thanks to the efforts of the Bicentennial Committee and Gerald Callahan. The spirit shown during the raising of the steeple and the dedication ceremonies on Founder's Day are an example of the real citizens of Troy.

Two unfinished projects concerning the Town are the dump and sewerage. Hopefully the construction on the sewer will start this fall. After meeting with the Sanitary Landfill Committee, we urge the acceptance of a partial sanitary landfill, since Troy has been ordered by the state to stop all open burning by July 1, 1977.

By using present Town equipment and manpower along with an expenditure from Revenue Sharing, we would like to initiate a partial sanitary landfill. Until alternatives are offered which would cost less for the Town, we urge an effort towards voluntary recycling.

One of the biggest assets to the Town as been the acquisition of an ambulance. Thanks to the effort and devotion of TEASI, the ambulance has become an important function for the Town. We would like to express special thanks to Barbara & Roderick Page, Ray and Marilyn Woods and David Tucker, original incorporators of TEASI.

Troy Emergency Ambulance service is operated strictly on donations. During the winter months, they derive income from Saturday morning car washes which have become popular and well received. Every resident of the area covered by TEASI will be receiving a request for donations in the mail shortly; we encourage each and every resident to participate with a donation. No matter how small or large, all donations will be received thankfully.

The committee on Public Works has done a fine job and the Selectmen hope their report is well received. We believe that with the addition of a one ton truck the Highway Department, Sanitary Landfill and other departments can operate together to save the residents tax dollars. A fulltime road agent with one fulltime additional man and the present dump attendant can do a lot to keep us in the present appropriations.

We would also like to thank the Troy Concerned Citizens Committee for their sponsorship of Bingo, which has purchased chairs for the Town Hall and a nozzel for the Fire Dept. and the Troy Community Theater for utilizing local talent. Efforts such as these help to unify and enhance the Town.

Many calls have been received from residents expressing their gratification for the peaceful atmosphere that we now have in the Town. We are sure that the Police Department will serve the residents well.

Statutory Changes Affecting Publication of Annual Reports of Trustees

The statutory requirements pertaining to the publication of the annual report of trustees of trust funds with respect to trusts created for the care of cemeteries and burial lots have been amended by enactment of Chapter 78, Section I, of the Laws of the 1975 Legislature.

Accordingly, in connection with the publication of the annual town report for 1976 and subsequent fiscal years, the trustees "shall not print in such report the reports of trusts created for the care of cemeteries and burial lots, except that in the year in which the town accepts gifts, legacies and devises for such purposes, the trustees and auditor shall print the names of the donors and the value of such gifts, legacies and devises at the time of donation."

Consequently, except for the printing of the required information pertaining to newly created cemetery trusts, it is no longer required that trustees publish detailed reports of trust funds created for the care of cemeteries and burial lots.

It should be clearly understood, however, that trustees of trust fund funds are still obligated to file with the appropriate agencies, namely the Attorney General and this Division, the detailed reports of trust funds required by the Commissioner of Revenue Administration.

In addition, the trustees must publish in detail a report of all other trust and capital reserve funds in their custody. A report of the common trust fund investments should likewise be published in the Town Report.

REPORT OF TROY WATER WORKS

During this coming year, the Water Department will be doing work on the reservoir which will require that it be drained for two days. During this time we will be supplying water to the town from the well. The well is capable of supplying approximately 60 gallons a minute.

At the present time the town's water needs are running at an average of 70 gallons a minute and sometimes as high as 80 gallons. This means that in all probability we shall run out of water. For this reason work will be done on a weekend and all water users will be asked to be very conservative in their water usage at this time.

The work that will be done at the reservoir is a thorough cleaning and also refacing the dam which is in need of repair. By cleaning the reservoir we are making yet another attempt to improve the color and odor of the water. Leaves, mud and silt come in each year and if the reservoir is not cleaned eventually the water would become undrinkable.

A filter is one way to obtain cleaner water, however this is a very costly undertaking. This year the Water Department will be working with the State to find out if a filtration system will be needed in the future.

New testing equipment is being added to the Water Department this year to meet Federal standards.

We have received some complaints about the amount of chlorine in the water. The state of New Hampshire determines what level of chlorine must be maintained for safety. There are, however, certain times when the chlorine content is increased. These times are during the summer when water supplies are low, when ice blocks the sun's rays during parts of the winter, when the spring runoff is underway and also when we work on the reservoir on on the main line. This increase is for the safety of the water consumer.

As the town grows and the water consumption increases, so also increases the problems and costs to the Water Department as with any other department in town.



Wood once again has become a popular fuel for heating homes and this is causing an increase in the number of chimney fires. Those of you who are heating with wood should inspect your equipment. Clean chimney, stove pipe, check dampers and remove any goods stored by the chimney clean out to insure safe operation of your equipment.

Plans are being made to replace the 1951 Reo chassis under the tanker. It will involve removing the tank, red lights, siren and radio from the present chassis and installing them on a newer one. This will be accomplished by the members of the department. Installation of the radio will require the services of a radio repair man. The new chassis will be obtained through the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. A lease agreement program makes the chassis available to the town at no cost provided we will maintain it.

It is hoped the citizens will support the improvements in the fire alarm system being proposed in this year's budget.

We hope your children have enjoyed the school fire prevention program run during Fire Prevention Week. It will be continued again this year.

Anyone wishing to have their home inspected for possible fire hazards may do so by contacting the Board of Engineers.

If a fire emergency occurs, help is close as your telephone dial "352-1100" state your name, town's name, street address and describe the fire emergency.

TROY VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

We have come to the end of the Bicentennial year. Many changes took place around the town of Troy and the Town Hall and those changes included the V.N.A. The Selectmen and Town Clerk took our "old" office, it was bigger, and we moved to another room, which is quite comfortable and adequate.

When the idea of mass immunization was announced by Pres. Ford our nurse, Mrs. Jan Smith, attended meetings in Concord and in Keene. For four months no dates could be set as to when vaccine would be available. For a time we did not know if we could hold a Swine Flu Clinic or not but finally found out that we could. Everyone connected with the Clinic was pleased with the number of people who came for this free immunization. 392 people from the area were immunized. The VNA also had 3 immunization clinics last spring with 37 children immunized. Dr. George Hamm was in attendance at all of these Clinics. The VNA also sponsored a dental clinic held at the Elementary school for all children.

During this "Bicentennial" year our nurse made a total of 830 calls besides being on hand for all the clinics. 519 calls were made in Troy and 311 in Fitzwilliam. The following is a breakdown of calls:

Medicare, 61: Medicaid, 71; Paid, 332; Health Supervision, 228 (free); Pre-natal 11 (free); New Babies 11 (free); Admissions, 34; Discharged, 13; Not Home-Not Found, 31; Telephone Calls, 56 (free); T. B., 2; Office, 29 (some were free); Deceased, 6.

Some of the calls made by our nurse are for the purpose of Health Supervision and providing pre-natal, post natal and adult health service. These are free calls.

In compliance with Medicare regulations we had to raise the fee of paid calls from \$4.00 to \$8.00 during the past year. We're sorry about this but it had to be done.

The VNA looks forward to being of service to the people of Troy-Fitzwilliam for another year. Anyone can call and inquire as to the services available and get excellent care by our nurse, Mrs. Jan Smith.

The office is located in the Town Hall and the telephone number is 242-3094. Our clerk is Mrs. Helen Kivela.

REPORT OF PUBLIC WORKS STUDY COMMITTEE

According to the Town Warrant, Article 13, for the year ending December 31, 1975, a committee of three were requested to study the feasibility of establishing a Department of Public Works and to require this committee to make a report. The primary concern was to focus on better use of manpower and equipment.

Our study entailed checking into town reports and records to determine some of the basic expenses and over head of each department. These included the Water Department, which is separate from the town of Troy. The Cemetery, which is funded both through perpetual care and town tax money. The dump is operated under its own budget to pay the custodian. But all other expenses come under the Highway Department budget. In the Highway Department the appointed road agent has charge of highways under the direction of the selectmen. The department operates on an annual budget of \$45,000, about \$25,000 is spent on snow plowing and winter road maintenance. Troy is responsible for about 18 miles of town owned roads. Plowing takes approximately five hours for one pass. Major equipment presently owned consists of a 1973 International dump truck and a 1969 Hough H60-B Loader. Road agent is part-time with 2 or 3 men, semifull time. This department is the nucleus of our equipment expenses and public works concern. While cooperation with these agencies was very good, some answers were of course biased towards the individual's viewpoint, much the same as a man who is asked to appear for a tax audit.

Some problems sited in each area are as follows: <u>Waterworks</u> separate (at least on the books) from the rest of the town services, yet they depend on the Highway Department and outside contractors for 70% of the necessary repairs! Records are good, but only one person is really familiar with them. There is no increment built in the billing to allot for maintenance of lines. No set schedule for replacement or reconditioning. <u>Cemetery</u> records have been improved but changing hands too many times have left some loose ends. Especially related to trust funds and perpetual care, funding is often unclear. It was suggested for this reason committee members serve two years on this board.

Dump expenses could be one of our largest concerns. A study is presently in force on changes, as open burning will no longer be allowed after mid-1977. The best plan at this time leans toward sharing town equipment, turning toward things like recycling centers and being careful how money is spent in that area.

The Highway Department, while short in equipment and in some cases man power, seems most beset by schedule and organization problems. The road agent adjusts work schedules almost daily according to town demands. Yet certain maintenance must be done every year.

Trying for more concrete information on town related problems, we worked with Dick Rourke of the SW Regional planning commission and John Andrews of the N. H. Municipal Association. We all feel that a <u>coordinator</u> of some type is absolutely necessary to maintain any working system and protect the town from unnecessary abuse of town money. He would be expected to:

- 1) Work under direction of the Selectmen (RSA 275)
- 2) Handle necessary paper work and help coordinate records
- 3) Develop and keep records
- 4) Be a member of the Planning Board
- Keep track of man hours and budget time so required maintenance can be completed.
- 6) Watch the town's expenditures and protect their interest during sewer construction.

The committee also feels that the town <u>cannot afford</u> or fully utilize a full-time person in any new position. Therefore, the best alternate solution would be a full-time TOWN MAINTENANCE CO-ORDINATOR to head a town crew and combine all department duties.

It was suggested that the position of road agent be made into this full-time position. He would be expected to do most of the above listed tasks and he should be justly compensated. According to the N. H. Municipal Association a foreman and two employees would cost the town \$28,000. Further details concerning a workable maintenance crew budget have been submitted to the selectmen for their consideration. This is public information.

It is felt that a full-time town maintenance crew with some needed equipment would eliviate many problems. Some of the cost would be defrayed by hiring out services to the Water Works, during times of repairs and maintenance or even meter reading. The Cemetery Committee could also utilize the town man power and equipment. Reimbursing the general fund for services rendered would be necessary. Or, it would be a simple matter of the maintenance coordinator submitting weekly the hours in each departments, service and money would be alloted accordingly, from the various sources. The dump or landfill operation may also be taken care of by one or more of the town crew as the sporatic needs arise.

The final point to be considered is equipment. The town must consider a reserve of about \$5,000 each year to both Highway and the Fire Department, for the town crew will need things like a small backhoe (priority #1) and a pickup truck to help with plowing and cut down on errands in the larger truck presently owned by the town.

Flexible operations, equipment needs, time allotments, skills

and replacement costs are some of the things that must be considered if we are to effectively share our equipment and COMMUNITY WORK FORCE. The decision must be the peoples and they should know that regulation of the use and abuse of town resources must be dealt with or costs cannot be reduced; and as needs grow, we will be paying more for necessary services due to a lack of coordination.

TROY BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

From September, 1975 to December, 1976, the "Celebration in Troy" Committee directed Troy's participation in the celebration of the American Revolution Bicentennial.

The activities began in October with the town-wide selling of daffodil bulbs by the school children and climaxed in June with the Grand Bicentennial Parade and Founder's Day Festival. Other activities included the Bicentennial Flag Presentation Ceremony, a Halloween party for the children. a teen-age disco dance, a puppet show, a carol sing, a church supper, a harpsichord concert, and the Grand Bicentennial Ball held at East Hill Farm in April. Commemorative plates, tiles, mugs and pitcher and bowl sets were sold. Over one hundred houses in town were researched and dated. Hundreds and hundreds of man hours specialized skills were donated for the steeple project, the gazebos, the booklet, the parade, the publicity, the showcase and the several other lasting reminders; not to mention the memories.

Special thanks to Judy Hakala who managed the finances and extra special thanks to Linda Foskett who coordinated the program.

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING - MARCH 2, 1976

The Polls were opened at 10:00 AM on March 2, 1976 at the Town Hall by Moderator Edward Lang. The Polls remained open until 6:00 PM.

The Town Meeting to take up the Warrant was held at the Troy School Auditorium on School St., at 7:30 PM on March 3, 1976.

The meeting was opened by the Moderator, Edward Lang. The prayer was given by Dolores Vose. A salute to the flag was led by Edward Lang.

Article 1. To bring in your votes for one selectman for three years and one selectman for one year, and all other town officers elected by ballot, as passed by Town Meeting, or state statute for the specified number of years. The results of the voting were as follows:

Tyler Selectman for 1 year - Robert Harkins, Jr. Water Commissioner for 3 years - Roger Smith Town Clerk-Tax Collector for 3 years- Constance Poirier Overseer of Public Welfare for 1 year - Nelson Lafreniere Cemetery Committee for 3 years - Avis Harling Trustee of Library for 3 years - Eileen Breckell Trustee of Library for 2 years - Avis Harling Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years - Dorothy Morton Budget Committee for 3 years - Linda Foskett Herman Schierioth Avis Harling Fire Chief for 1 year - John C. Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,277,250. for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications and constructing sewerage and sewerage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal Funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$1,277,250. under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Troy, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

Mr. John Bradshaw representing C. E. Maguire was allowed to take the floor to explain the proposed sewerage treatment program.

The meeting was recessed at 8:30 PM and remained open a full hour until 9:30 PM to allow for voting by ballot on the issue.

Articles 3, 4 & 5 were passed over until the ballots were counted.

Final vote on Article 2 was 199 for and 47 against, which constituted a majority of the voters and so was passed.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the design of, and construction of a sewerage disposal system, and to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in N.H. R.S.A. 33:7 et seq., as amended, and pass any vote relating thereto. This passed.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 252 (suu), with relation to sidewalks and sewers. This passed.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take any and all such action as may be necessary to acquire whatever easements and lands as are required for the pollution abatement project. Further, the Selectmen are hereby authorized to employ whatever statutory provisions, including RSA 31:92-a, as are deemed necessary or desirable in order to secure the easements and lands required for the project. Passed.

Article 6. To see what action the voters wish to take upon the recommendations of the Budget Committee.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following Town expenditures for the ensuing year:

- a. Town Officers' Salaries \$13,100
- b. Town Officers' expenses \$3,850
- c. Election & Registration \$1,600
- d. Town Hall \$3,750
- e. Parks \$650
- f. Vital Statistics \$100

- Insurance \$8,200 g. Social Security - \$5,500 h. Shade Trees - \$100 1. j. Interest - Temporary Loans - \$4,750 Memorial Day - \$425 k. Town Dump - \$4,625 1. Street Lighting - \$12,500 m. Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to add street lights on Jaffrey Road. (By Petition) Town voted to put two lights in the area of Cleon Rouleau residence.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to add street lights on Richmond Road. Town voted to put two lights on the Richmond Road.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Highway Summer Maintenance. Passed.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Highway Winter Maintenance. Passed. \$45,000.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$401.59 to which the State will contribute \$2,677.28 if voted and accepted, for the construction of Class V roads. Passed.

Article 13. To see if the Town will nominate and elect three citizens at the annual meeting to consult with the Selectmen and the Highway Agent in making a study of the feasibility of establishing a Department of Public Works and to require this committee to make a report with the recommendations at the next annual meeting. This passed. It was first amended to include the Planning Board. Nominated to serve on this committee with the above were Robert Smith, Chairman, John Hakala and James Doherty.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) for the Fire Department to be used for the purchase of a compressor and related equipment and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Passed.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Fire Department. The motion was changed to \$10,500 as the original article included the compressor covered by Article 14. Passed.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Police Department. Passed - \$18,000.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to support the District Nurse Association. Passed in the amount of \$3,850.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Water Department. Passed in the amount of \$11,000.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to support the operating costs of the Cheshire Hospital. Passed. \$1,626.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate a sum of money for the continuation of the War Memorial Program. Passed \$6,000.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and approthe sum of \$1,270. for the studies and operation of the Southwestern Regional Planning Commission. Passed.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Gay-Kimball Library. Passed in the amount of \$4,450.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of the cemeteries. Passed. \$1,200.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money for Old Age Assistance and Public Welfare. Passed in the amount of \$12,000.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money for the support of the Monadnock Regional Association. Defeated.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money for the support of the Monadnock Family & Mental Health Service. Passed \$850.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase an ambulance for an amount not to exceed \$23,527.87 provided that an amount up to \$8,335.00 is provided by the New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency out of Federal Highway Safety funds, and provided that the Troy Emergency & Ambulance Service, Inc. donates an amount equal to the purchase price of the ambulance less whatever money is provided that said ambulance shall be operated and administered by the Troy Emergency & Ambulance Service, Inc. with title to said vehicle remaining in the Town of Troy. Passed.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) to be used to improve and maintain that section of Bigelow Hill Road from the Richard Pelto residence to the Liimatainen property and from the Luopa property to the Meagher property. Any work done on this road shall not constitute its acceptance as a Town Highway. (By petition) Declared illegal as written, but was amended to read "pending direction of Town counsel as to the legality of the motion." Passed as amended.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to reopen and maintain that section of road off Route 12 leading to the residence of Chester Priest. Defeated.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) for the purchase and erection of fencing and related improvements for the War Memorial Recreational Area and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Funds. Passed.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be used by the Bicentennial Committee in restoring the steeple to the Town Hall and authorizing the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Funds. Passed.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500) to be used for repairs to the heating system and other repairs in the Town Hall and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Funds and anticipated income to the Revenue Sharing Funds. Passed.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) to be used by the Bicentennial Committee in funding a Founders Day exercise and authorize withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Funds and anticipated income to the Revenue Sharing Funds. Passed.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon. Passed.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to a Capital Reserve Fund for the Fire Department. Passed \$2,000.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to a Capital Reserve Fund for the Highway Department. Passed \$4,000. Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Three Thousand One Hundred and Thirty-five Dollars (\$3,135.) to provide monthly payments to the Robert DiLuzio Ambulance Service. Amended to read "an ambulance service." Passed.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax deeded property. Passed.

Article 39. To see of the Town will authorize the Selectmen to establish the Arvi Maattala property which the Town owns by Tax Collector's Deed as a Town Forest. Passed.

Article 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with F. T. Cumings, Inc. for the sale of the so-called Sprissler property to said F. T. Cumings, Inc. Approval of this article is sought to establish clear title to the said property and to return it to the tax rolls. Passed.

Article 41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the New Hampshire Housing Commission to operate in Troy as provided in Chapter 204-A, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated and the provisions of Sections 8 of the New Hampshire Housing Act of 1937 as amended. Passed.

Article 42. To hear reports of committees, agents or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative. No reports.
