TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CLAREMONT, IN THE COUNTY OF SULLIVAN IN SAID STATE, QALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

FIRST—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

SECOND—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools the ensuing year.

THIRD—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Stevens High School.

FOURTH—To choose a Committee for Stevens High School for the ensuing year.

FIFTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges the ensuing year, and determine how it shall be paid.

SIXTH—To raise by vote the necessary amount of money to pay legal expenses of the town for the ensuing year.

SEVENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the debts of the town.

EIGHTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Fiske Free Library.

NINTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.

TENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay firemen.

ELEVENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay for the use of hydrants.

TWELFTH—To see what action the town will take in regard to lighting the streets, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

THIRTEENTH—To determine the rate of discount the town will allow to persons paying their taxes within such period as the town may designate.

FOURTEENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the expenses of Memorial Day.

FIFTEENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the benefit of the American Band.

SIXTEENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the Board of Education the ensuing year.

SEVENTEENTH—To see if the town will vote to repair, heat, and ventilate the Stevens High School building and raise and appropriate money therefor.

EIGHTEENTH—To see what action the town will take in regard to the land lately purchased for a new cemetery; whether to sell said land and make another purchase, or proceed to lay out lots on the present site.

NINETEENTH—To hear the report of the committee chosen at the last annual meeting in relation to a site for a new cemetery and to take any action they may think proper in relation to the same.

TWENTIETH—To see what action the town will take in regard to a system of sewerage, and what sum or sums of money the town will vote to raise, borrow, or appropriate therefor.

TWENTY-FIRST—To see what action the town will take in regard to exempting from taxation property of the Ladies' Union Aid Society of Claremont known as the Lull farm, purchased by said Society for hospital purposes.

TWENTY-SECOND—To see if the town will vote to reserve as trustee, money in sums of not less than Fifty Dollars, advanced by any person; the interest of which is to be expended agreeably to the recorded wish of any such person, (advancing any such sum or sums), for the especial purpose of keeping the burial lot in any cemetery of the town, represented by such person, in perpetual good order and repair.

TWENTY-THIRD—To see what action the town will take in regard to having two policemen, one for the day and one for the night, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

TWENTY-FOURTH—To see what action the town will take in regard to the planting, protection and preservation of shade and ornamental trees in highways and upon grounds of the town devoted to public uses.

TWENTY-FIFTH—To see if the town will vote to pay firemen at the rate of fifty cents an hour for actual time spent at fires.

TWENTY-SIXTH—To see if the town will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot System in the annual town meeting.

TWENTY-SEVENTH—To see if the town will discontinue off the westerly side of Pleasant street, over land of George P. Hunton, Edward D. Baker, Isabella C. Rice, Herbert S. Osgood and George D. Wolcott, so much of the highway as was added to Pleasant street, as it was before, by the widening and straightening of Pleasant street by the action of the Selectmen, Nov. 10, 1890.

TWENTY-EIGHT—To see what action the town will take in regard to paying or refunding that part of the Town Debt that becomes due July 1st, 1893.

TWENTY-NINTH—To see what action the town will take in regard to concreting sidewalks in the village, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

THIRTIETH—To see what action the town will take in regard to the surface water and such other waters that come from, so called, Eastman Pond which run across Hanover street down on to Eastman street, so called, and determine how said water shall be taken care of, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

THIRTY-FIRST—To see what action the town will take in regard to the establishment of a free bridge at some point on the Connecticut River between the town of Claremont and Weathersfield, Vt.

THIRTY-SECOND—To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the Collector of taxes for the year ensuing.

THIRTY-THIRD—To see what action the town will take with the fund now deposited with The Sullivan Savings Inst., known as the fund for disabled firemen.

THIRTY-FOURTH—To see if the town will vote to require the proprietors of the Sullivan County Railroad, at Claremont Junction, to raise the highway (by bridging), where it is crossed by their railroad so as to safely accommodate the travel.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER.

The year ending March 1, 1893, has been an exceptionally active one for the Claremont Fire Department, as the following report will testify.

April 15, 1892, old town farm buildings ; total loss ; time of alarm 6:40 o'clock P. M.

Oct. 27, Mrs. Cook's house, Sullivan street.; alarm given 1 o'clock A. M.; slight loss.

Dec. 18, sap-house at Elm Farm ; no alarm.

Dec. 27, old house at Mr. John Lovell's ; no alarm.

Jan. 2, 1893, Ide Block ; alarm 1:30 o'clock A. M.; small loss.

Jan. 7, house of Mr. A. N. Winn, Summer street ; alarm at 10:30 o'clock P. M.; slight damage.

Jan. 30, Monadnock Mills stock house ; time of alarm 2:30 o'clock P. M.; loss estimated at \$75,000.00.

Feb. 23, Rand's Block ; time of alarm 1:50 o'clock A. M.; damage to building \$5,000.00 ; to tenants about \$5,000.00.

At the Town Farm fire the firemen with steamer were on hand without delay ; but as no water was to be had, all the firemen could do was to rescue what property they could from the burning buildings.

Very slight loss resulted from the fire at Mrs. Cook's, Mr. Winn's and the Ide Block, on account of the promptness with which the department answered the alarms.

The fire at the Monadnock Mills stock house was an exceedingly stubborn one. Although the water was twelve or fifteen hundred feet away, four streams were speedily playing upon the building, continuing from 2:30 o'clock P. M., until after midnight ; and one stream, night and day continually, for the succeeding week. The loss from the fire was large, owing to such quantities of cotton stored in one building without brick partitions ; however, the owners feel satisfied that everything was done by the fire department that could be to save the stock house and its contents.

For the fire in Rand's Block, the alarm sounded at 1:30 o'clock A. M. The department was there promptly, notwithstanding the severe snow storm and the extreme cold. It worked hard until 6 o'clock A. M., four streams of water being employed from the hydrants ; and it is the general opinion that the fire was extinguished with as small damage to the building as could be expected.

A sixty foot extension ladder has been procured the past year ; also there has been a fire alarm system put in, consisting of eight boxes of the most approved and improved kind, and placed at convenient localities throughout the village, with alarm bells in five officers' dwellings, giving them the location of the fire simultaneously with the general alarm. This cost about \$475.00, much being saved by buying the material at wholesale prices and having the work done by competent workmen in town. The alarm system works perfectly, and supplies a long felt need. Other boxes can be added when desired.

It is necessary to procure a few hundred feet of hose to be used in extreme cases, when the distance from the water is long. With this addition the department will be in excellent condition, and too much praise cannot be given our firemen for their promptness and willingness in despatching their

duty under any circumstances, and not failing in confining the fire to the building whence it originated. Two hydrants have been added this last year ; one in the Square, the other near Freeman's Block, Sullivan street. In the early spring one other is to be placed in the locality of Balcom's Mill, making forty-six in all. I would earnestly recommend that two or three more hydrants be put in this ensuing spring, as no better investment can be made for the protection and security of property than these.

Report of Trustees OF STEVENS HIGH SCHOOL FUND.

The amount of this fund in the hands of the Trustees is the same as reported last year, \$10,000. The income for the year 1892, \$600, has been paid into the town treasury.

The Paran Stevens Legacy of \$40,000 still remains unpaid. There has been some advance toward a settlement of the Stevens Estate since our last report, and there was good reason to expect a final decree during the present month, but the sudden and unexpected death of Arthur Leary, executor, under the will of Henry Leiden Stevens, and trustee for Mary Fiske Paget, has postponed a decision until a new executor and trustee is appointed after notice, and this requires additional time as some of the parties are in Europe. There is now apparently good reason to expect the payment of the legacy within the coming year. If however anything should arise to further postpone payment, it is not suggested from any quarter that there can be any doubt as to its ultimate payment with interest.

THE ALDEN LITERARY PRIZE FUND, consists of the real estate bequeathed by the late Mrs. Mary J. Alden, and \$1031.17 deposited in the Sullivan Savings Institution. We have received during the last year for rent \$144, for interest \$40.55, and paid for prizes \$120, repairs of Alden house \$57.38, water rent \$8, and care of Alden lot in cemetery \$2. GEORGE L. Report of the School Board.

OF THE TOWN SCHOOL DISTRICT.

It is with pleasure that we are able to record at least the usual degree of prosperity during the year just closed in our public schools. In the main our teachers are fairly well informed in modern methods of instruction, and are conscientious and efficient. Several of them are Normal graduates. In a few cases they have not wholly succeeded in methods of discipline, but these are exceptions.

There is in the primary grade a considerable misapplication of energy. This grade needs a new and uniform course of study, and the introduction of additional illustrative apparatus. The teachers ought to meet each other and the school board two or three evenings each term, for comparison of methods, discussion and instruction relative to class work. We have cheerfully allowed the teachers a visiting day each term, hoping thus to bring them to a better acquaintance with each other's work.

The condition of the intermediate and grammar grades is more favorable. Requirements are better understood and the outcome is good and uniform work. The board regretted the loss last summer of Miss Isophene K. Dow from the principalship of the grammar school. Miss Dow occupies a place in public esteem perhaps never before earned by a

teacher in Claremont. We retained her services during the spring term by an increase in salary, and very much regretted our inability to persuade her to remain through the year.

Realising the uncertainty of getting a good teacher from abroad, the board promoted Miss Ellingwood to the position. On her resigning, Miss Lizzie G. Phelps, long the faithful teacher of the High street intermediate, seemed the natural successor. Miss Phelps has acquitted herself in this somewhat trying position, with entire satisfaction to the board, but we think the best thing that could be done for the grammar school would be the employment of a male principal.

The hiring of teachers, adjusting matters of discipline, buying and distributing school supplies, the care of buildings and oversight of repairs, accounting for the various school funds, and many other things that enter into the business management of the schools, leave the members of the board less time than they would like for supervision of instruction. Some work in this direction has, however, been done. The Board having made one hundred and six visits during the year. There is a field for much hard work, particularly in the primary grade, and the board will be the cheerful servants of the town in cordially helping to carry into effect whatever plan for supervision may grow out of the efforts now being made to this end.

There has been no change in text books during the year, but the grammar scholars have each been supplied with a school dictionary.

The elements of book-keeping and commercial forms are now taught orally during the last year at the grammar school. The board is of the opinion that more attention should be given to this work as an elective branch for the benefit of such scholars as do not contemplate entering the High school.

We recommend the introduction of drawing: Last spring we bought a set of models for the grammar school and they

have been used with a fair degree of success. It has been apparent to us that to get the best results in this direction an expert in drawing should be employed, in much the same manner as the music teacher now is, and this branch should be required in all the lower schools.

Although no complaints are made to the board, we cannot be insensible to the fact that a large number of parents and guardians are not complying with the statute on the compulsory education of children under sixteen years of age. Here is a large field for the employment of the school board, a superintendent, or truant officer.

At the present rate of increase in the population, there is a growing class of youth who desire the advantages of schooling but are unable to attend the day sessions. An evening school for their accommodation will soon be a question demanding the attention of the school authorities.

The appropriation of two hundred dollars for repairs at the last annual meeting has been expended in slating and painting the Broad street house and laying new floors, painting and papering at the North street house. Other repairs have included shingling the Draper Corner house and the usual minor repairs on several of the other school buildings, the expense of which was met from the 5 per cent. allowed by law from the school funds.

An appropriation of five hundred dollars is recommended for the following repairs: slating the North street house, putting a new floor and suitable seats in the primary room of the High street house, and painting the woodwork within and without the entire building. The Draper Corner house also needs painting. Minor repairs are needed at the Puckershire and several other houses. We believe it is the best economy to keep all our school buildings in good repair by a small annual appropriation, rather than to set apart large sums at long intervals to pay the cost of neglectful management.

The present building at West Claremont is entirely inadequate for the school and is hardly fit in its present condition for school purposes. In our judgment, it cannot be economically repaired, and we recommend the erection of a new building suitable for the accomodation of fifty scholars.


