

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The revaluation of the Town will be done in 1994. The starting date has not been set as yet. Article 10 in the warrant is for the cost of the revaluation.

The Highway Department has had a busy year. Gravel was crushed, the first stage of Manselville Road, Union Street, and Mill Street were completed. Shim and overlay was done with good results. Road Agent Peter Beard and his Highway Crew have done a very good job.

The Fire and Rescue has seen a great increase in calls this year with the Rescue responding to 99 emergencies. Responding to the large number of calls, as well as keeping up the required certifications, requires a great deal of dedication towards the Town and its people. The Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, would like these volunteers to know how much they are appreciated.

We have received many positive statements of how professional, courteous, and concerned Police Chief Michael LaChappelle and his Officers are towards the townspeople. The Chief, as well as most of his officers, have attended advanced schooling in their respective field. This year the Chief will be asking for a new cruiser, we are in favor of this because of the unreliability of the present one.

We are pleased to say that we finished the year with a modest surplus of about \$24,000. We would like to let you know that the Municipal Budget Law has been revised effective August 28, 1993. This means that all budgets must be prepared on a "gross basis" and all anticipated revenues, as well as tax revenues, be shown. There are limitations on expenditures with penalties applying if these limitations are not conformed to.




CERTIFICATE OF AUDIT FOR 1992

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

## TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUND

The Board would like to thank those who worked to keep the cemeteries in a high state of maintenance this past year.

We were able to achieve a major plan this year in the mapping of the Yeaple Annex of the East Deering Cemetery, by hiring an individual, not only a surveyor, but also on a cemetery committee. We felt that the combined knowledge would be a great asset in mapping out a difficult lot due to the grade of the parcel.

The plan includes over 300 individual burial plots. In addition, there are service areas for vehicles, a turnabout and an area for disposal for excess materials from burials. If the need arose, there could be future possibility of mapping out the service areas and add another 90 burial plots.

In order for the board to sell lots in the annex, it will be necessary to install a gravel roadway from the low end of the Yeaple Annex to East Deering Road. Due to the slope of the Annex and the established section of East Deering, it is very difficult for passenger cars to negotiate on the grass surface. Anticipated costs for this are in the range of \$3,000.00. We will secure other estimates to get the lowest cost.

The annex section of Wilkins Cemetery on Old County Road will be mapped by the Trustees. Due to the present roadway and the flat surface, we should be able to lay out close to 250 individual burial plots.

We are also in the process of setting up guidelines for the annex sections. All markers are to be flush with the surface and plantings will be restricted to containers. These two measures will cut down on the annual maintenance costs.

PENALTY

If such forfeiture is not paid within that period, a summons shall be issued for appearance in District Court and said person shall thereafter be subject to a penalty not to exceed \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars).

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an Ordinance for the Town of Deering as follows:

PARKING RESTRICTIONS

It shall be unlawful for any person to park or let stand any motor vehicle or trailer at the Public Boat Launch, so called, in the area designated at the Deering Reservoir Dam in said areas posted with appropriate signs, except for the purpose of:

1. Launching or picking up watercraft.
2. Temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading merchandise or passengers.
3. Work being done by employees of the Town of Deering or any governmental agency, said persons must be actively working at said time.

PENALTY

Persons violating this regulation shall be subject to a forfeiture of \$10.00 (Ten Dollars), which shall be paid to the Deering Town Clerk within 72 hours of the date and time of the violation. If such forfeiture is not paid within that period, a person shall thereafter be subject to a penalty not to exceed \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars).

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will accept an additional 763' of Tubbs Hill Road (between the Beideman barn to Continental Cablevision's new driveway) as a Class V town highway, or to take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by petition)

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following: That starting April 1, 1994 that all town employees will contribute 20% to the cost of their medical insurance. (Submitted by petition by Deering Taxpayers Association)

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept

and expend, without further action by town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with RSA 31:95-b until rescinded by a vote of the town meeting, or to take any other action relating thereto.







## LIBRARY TRUSTEES REPORT

Despite continued, dedicated efforts of the Trustees/Librarians to uphold the services, only 192 Deering residents used their Library in 1993, one-third less than in 1992. They checked out 208 books (192 in 1992). The summer story hours, offered for the second year in alternate versions for preschoolers and grade school students, were poorly attended; no children showed up on grade school days.

This discouraging lack of interest of Deering residents in their Library obviously reflects a message conveyed by the Trustees' voluntary budget reduction from \$200 to \$50, meant as a goodwill gesture to the Town.

The Trustees are all the more grateful for the support received from a steadfast group of volunteers. Tom Copadis deserves special thanks for his time and effort in plastering and repainting the Library ceiling. His work improved not only the appearance, but also the light in the Old Schoolhouse. Maureen Berger, Lynn Compton, Ginny Craven, Ruth Jarvis, Bryan Terry, and Virginia Young all contributed their time to library service and story hours. A Trustees' luncheon in October was but a small way to thank them for their help.

Without the book donations the Library received, there would hardly be a new title on its shelves this year; we thank the State Library, the Brown Memorial Library in Bradford, and a handful of Deering supporters.

## Deering Conservation Commission Annual Report

The Deering Conservation Commission (DCC) has proceeded with its charge to protect the natural resources of the Town for its citizens and future generations. The DCC has continued its involvement in the State of New Hampshire Lay Lakes Monitoring Program for Deering Lake. The program is now totally funded by private lake oriented groups with the DCC serving as a collection and retention point for the water quality data. Other DCC sponsored and funded programs included sending a student to Conservation Camp, clean up day, the Wood Duck Restoration Program and sponsoring a science teacher from the Hillsboro-Deering Middle School to attend an environmental education teacher training workshop. The conservation easement monitoring was completed and no violations or infringements were noted.

A new program which was initiated this year involves the collection of specific conductance readings from various perennial streams and surface waters throughout the Town. The purpose of this data collection is to determine areas where salt contamination may pose a problem. The DCC worked in conjunction with the State of New Hampshire and the Deering Road Agent to limit salt usage on a section of Reservoir Road as a result of a similar testing program.

The DCC has been actively reviewing Dredge and Fill Permit Applications and investigating complaints of illegal activity. The DCC has been fortunate enough to have had two new members appointed last year, but was unfortunate in its loss of a long time commission member Peter Cross. Hopefully, the new year will bring a renewed spirit of cooperation between the DCC and the people of the Town of Deering and a concerted effort to support, upgrade and improve existing programs which we have implemented and perhaps embark on some new ones such as the lakeside planting of shrubbery around Deering Lake, revision of some zoning ordinances and foundation of a Friends of the Rails Program to promote proper recreational use of the abandoned rail bed in West Deering. All citizens are invited to our monthly meetings. We are always interested in new members and are more than willing to provide information on any of our programs.

## DEERING POLICE DEPARTMENT

1993 has been a busy year for your Police Department. While the rest of the Nation and State has seen an increase in the burglary rate, the Deering Police Department has successfully reduced that rate in town from 15 in 1992, to 3 in 1993. I attribute this major reduction to the initiation of pro-active patrol procedures and the cooperation from the citizens of Deering by reporting suspicious activity to their police department.

Deering is not immune from violent crime. This is evident when you note the increase in assaults. As a result of one of these assaults the Deering Police Department recovered four stolen firearms. This led to the successful indictment of the persons responsible for the theft.

This further illustrates the need to protect ourselves and the Town with quality training programs, techniques and to have the proper equipment to work and serve better, as your Police Department strives for an even higher level of professionalism.

In May, Officer Annett Carrier resigned from the department for personal reasons. Officer Guthrie was hired in September and completed his Police Academy in November. Officer Guthrie comes to us with a background in law enforcement from Texas. Officer Guthrie resides in Town with his wife and two children.

I would like to thank the citizens of Deering for their support and involvement in the Police Department. I would also like to thank the members of the Deering Police Department for their continued dedication to the goals and objectives of the department.

## 1993 DEERING FIRE & RESCUE REPORT

The Deering Fire Department responded to a total of 42 Fire calls this year. This is an increase of 16 calls. The first month of 1994 we have responded to 14 Fire calls. The rescue has also had a very busy year with 99 calls. We have given and received mutual aid from Hillsborough, Weare, Antrim and Washington.

The breakdown for the types of calls are as follows:

Structure fires-8, Car fires-1, Brush fires-1, Chimney fires-7, Illegal burns-2, Motor vehicle accidents-6, Wires down-3, Mutual Aid-10, and false alarms-4; totaling 42 calls for the 1993 year. This does not represent the service calls responded to by myself, and other Deering Officers that were not toned by dispatch. There were 15 such calls this year. Illegal brush burns are still a problem for the department, as well as false alarms. These calls still put our members at risk, and cost the taxpayer money, and we hope that the upcoming year will show an increased responsibility by the public to cut these needless responses.

The Deering Fire and Rescue is your department, and we depend on your input to make the department more efficient, and to make sure we service your needs, in a cost effective way. We wish to thank all residents of Deering for your support this year and look forward to working with you in the upcoming year.

We are very proud of the Deering Fire and Rescue, and hope you feel the same. This is your department and as in the past if you have any questions or input, please feel free to call the Chief, Fire Wards, or the Board of Selectmen. The members of the Deering Fire and Rescue hope you all have a healthy and fire safe 1994.

## DEERING RESCUE SQUAD REPORT

The Deering Rescue Squad responded to a record number 99 calls in 1993, a 27% increase over last year. Trauma topped the list of runs at 38, with 37 Medical Emergencies and 24 responses in support of the Fire Department. The past year also marked the first time our Squad worked with Paramedics on an intercept basis for critical need patients. This proved to be a highly successful practice that we intend to continue.

Currently, the Squad consists of nine Basic Level EMT's and one driver. Although last year was a hectic one, our members were busy keeping their certifications current in Advance Life Support classes for Defibrillation and the Esophageal Obturator Airway; learning about Off Road Vehicle Rescue, and five members took part in their Refresher Training Program and State recertification test which is mandatory every two years. Additionally, two of our members are new to EMS in 1993, having completed the 120 hours of classroom and 10 hours of Emergency Room time, plus the State and National testing required to become a Basic Level EMT.

Through the continued generosity and support of the townspeople of Deering, our 1984 Ford ambulance was purchased and placed in service, fully licensed and operational, in late April. This vehicle responded to 44 of our calls and performed flawlessly. Words alone are inadequate in describing the Squad's sincere thanks to everyone. Your vote to purchase this ambulance reflects a great deal of confidence in the Rescue Squad and that is greatly appreciated by all of us.

Though the upcoming year will undoubtedly be another busy one, fundraising will once again be a priority. In addition to raising money for the Squad, the majority of events we plan will be an opportunity for the people of Deering to meet the members of the Squad. Please, always feel free to ask questions; and if you can't see us in person, you can correspond with us by writing to Deering Rescue, RFD #1 Box 166, Deering, NH 03244.

Lastly, a reminder to keep your emergency numbers posted near every phone and teach every member of the family how to use them. Do not hesitate to call us, as we remain your Rescue Squad, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND  
STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1993, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were campfires left unattended, unsupervised children and debris that escaped control. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help!

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1993 and participated in many fire prevention programs. This year, the nation is celebrating Smokey Bear's 50th anniversary. The State of New Hampshire Forest Protection Bureau will be working with many communities to spread the fire prevention message - "Remember...Only YOU can prevent forest fires. Fire prevention is the most cost effective fire suppression tool. Please be careful around fires and help us and our communities have a fire safe year.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT  
1993

The Deering Board of Adjustment received only three original petitions in 1993, one for a special exception to operate a home office, two for variances in connection with additions to vacation cottages on Deering lake. All were granted.

One variance granted in 1992 for a pre-existing (pre-zoning) non-conforming building lot less than 2 acres with inadequate road frontage was carried over into 1993 because of an appeal for rehearing by an abutter. Upon reapplication and rehearing the variance was confirmed in January 1993. The Board rejected a new motion for rehearing by the abutter in March 1993. The abutter has appealed to Superior Court and that case (Rowe v. Town of Deering) is still pending.

The Board responded to several inquiries from potential applicants, including informal consultations per Sec. 4-1 of the Ordinance. To date, these have not materialized as applications.

The Board worked during the course of 1993 on an amendment to its By-laws to provide for payment of extraordinary costs by applicants or others whose applications or appeals obligate the Board to incur such costs. Examples include consultants' fees, certain legal fees, and notifications of rehearing. Amendment procedures will commence in 1994.

CENTRAL NEW HAMPSHIRE REGIONAL  
PLANNING COMMISSION

The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission is a voluntary association of 20 towns and the City of Concord in Merrimack and Hillsborough Counties. The Town of Deering is a member in good standing of the Commission.

The CNHRPC is one of nine RPC's organized under RSA 36:45-53. Our principle charges are to prepare coordinated plans for the region and to provide planning assistance to member communities. Every city and town in New Hampshire is within an organized region.

Our accomplishments over the last year include:

The Commission prepared and distributed the complete draft of the transportation element of the regional master plan in October. The plan describes the transportation system of the region, identifies current and future transportation issues, discusses the role of the CNHRPC in transportation, and makes recommendations to towns, the region, and the state to address the transportation issues in the region. Although the plan element is scheduled for adoption in February of 1994, public comment on implementation of the plan is continuously welcomed.

Transportation will continue to be a focus in 1994 and beyond. We will adopt and submit our first ever transportation improvement plan for transportation in the region, and will continue to review, comment, and participate in state transportation projects, programs, and plans.

The Commission continues to provide high quality and timely services to member municipalities through circuit riding, master plan assistance, research, and other technical assistance.

Specific Activities in Deering included:

Providing copy of official Flood Insurance Rate Map; researching requirements for ordinance amendments on recreation vehicles; attending meeting at Town Hall to discuss amendment process, enforcement options, flood insurance program requirements and elevation certificates; and providing reference materials on flood plain administration.

Article 2. Are you in favor of increasing the Board of Selectmen to five Members? Yes - 130;  
No - 332

On Saturday, March 13, 1993, at 9:00 AM, Mr. Charles A. Gaides, Moderator, opened the meeting with a salute to the flag, followed by a moment of silence. The following Rules for the Town Meeting were voted:

1. If you wish to be recognized, just raise your hand.
2. When you are recognized, please stand and state your full name.
3. You now have the floor and may speak without interruption.
4. You must address the issue at hand or you will be considered out of order.

5. If others desire to comment on what is being said they should raise their hands and when the person speaking is finished they will be recognized.

6. Everyone will have an opportunity to speak and with this in mind the motion to close debate will not be considered until everyone has, at least, spoken once.

7. If you are making a motion or an amendment the Moderator must receive a printed copy.

8. There shall be no more than two (2) amendments at one time. Once we have two we will vote on them.

9. After a non-ballot vote is taken and declared, seven (7) voters may question the Moderator's declaration.

10. Only one (1) reconsideration of an article will be recognized.

11. There shall be no substantive motions on the last article.

It was voted to waive reading of the entire warrant at this time.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for the purpose of reconstruction and improvements of Town roads; One million dollars of such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept federal, state, or other aid, if any, which may be available for said project; to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver said bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action of terms thereof; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote relative thereto. This required a paper ballot and the polls were opened from 89:55 PM for a at least an hour. There were 181 ballots cast; Yes - 42; No - 139. The article was defeated.

Article 4. It was voted to accept the reports of the Town Officials, Agents, Committees and Auditors for the year 1992.

Article 5. It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell by private sale back to the previous owner from which title was obtained or



through public auction, property taken by Tax Collector's deeds in accordance with the provisions of RSA 80:80.

Article 6. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Because of inclement weather, it was voted at 12:30 PM to adjourn and reconvene on Saturday, March 20, 1993, at 9:00 AM.

On Saturday, March 20, 1993, at 9:00 AM, Mr. Charles Guider, Moderator, opened the meeting with a salute to the flag, followed by a moment of silence.

Article 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$146,454 for general municipal operations, as follows:

Article 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,542 for the final year lease of a pickup truck for the highway department.

Article 11. By a hand vote, (Yes - 64; No - 42) it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,000 for gravel purchase, crushing and screening.

Article 12. By amendment it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for calcium chloride maintenance application to Longwoods Road, and experimental applications to hilly portions of North Deering Road, and Second N.H. Turnpike with testing to be included.

At this time it was voted that no previous articles would be reconsidered.

Article 13. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,200 for full depth reclamation with calcium chloride treatment of .15 miles of Manselville Road, .2 miles of Union Street and .2 miles of Mill Street.

Article 14. By a hand count, (Yes - 61; No - 46) it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,000 for rad sealing of Peter Wood Hill, Cross Road, portion of East Deering Road (1.3 miles) and Old County Road.

Article 15. This article was lost for lack of motion.

Article 16. This article, to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for Highway Equipment, was defeated.

Article 17. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$36,524 for the current operating expenses of the Fire and Rescue Department.

Article 18. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,900 for the purchase of an ambulance.

Article 19. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$72,900 for the current operating expenses of the Police Department.

Article 20. This article to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for a Police cruiser, was defeated.

Article 21. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$92,631 for the following solid waste expenses:

Article 22. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,000 for the Town Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 23. It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with RSA 31:95b.

Article 24. It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept or purchase with appropriated moneys, on behalf of the town any federal or state surplus equipment.

Article 25. By amendment, it was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus town property by public auction, such moneys to be deposited into the general fund.

Article 26. It was voted to authorize the board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose as permitted by RSA 31:19.

Article 27. Under this article the following suggestions were made:

1. That the Selectmen establish at least the following citizen advisory committees: A budget committee and a highway committee. The purpose of the committees shall be to review, research and to make recommendations on all capital expenses in excess of \$5,000, and to assist the Selectmen in any town business as directed by the Selectmen.

2. The Selectmen make public the town warrant one (1) month prior to the town meeting. All warrant articles shall be accompanied by a brief explanation and a summary of the principle supporting documentation of rationale.

3. The budget and highway committee shall meet no later than one (1) month from the date of the town meeting at the direction of the Selectmen.

All town residents are encouraged to attend and contribute to the committees. Each committee shall elect a chairman and a secretary to record and coordinate its activities. All town offices and employees are directed to cooperate fully with the requests for information by committee representatives. Preliminary budget information as complete as possible will be made available no later than October 1st. Final budget information as complete as possible will be made available January 1st. At the completion of the town meeting the Moderator will collect a list of people interested in participating on either committee and direct the Selectmen to notify these people of the first meeting. (At this point the Moderator stated the he could NOT DIRECT the Selectmen to do anything).

4. Any project bid (s) for town accepted be sent out for rebid if specifications or materials area changed from the original bid.

It was voted to adjourn the meeting at 1:50 PM.
