## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 8, 1932

## Two Hundredth and First Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Durham on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, A. D. 1932, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk (*Chas. Wentworth*), one Selectman for a term of three years (*Fred E. Davis*), a Town Treasurer (*George D. Stevens*), a Collector of Taxes (*Esther Y. Burnham*), two Auditors (*Leon W. Hitchcock and Clement Moran*), and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years (*Frederick W. Taylor*).

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:

- (1) Trunk Line Maintenance (\$4,200.00).
- (2) State Aid Maintenance (\$700.00).
- (3) State Aid Construction (\$2,622.00).

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges (\$8,000.00 raised of which \$2,500.00 was to be used for Packer's Falls road).

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses, including State and County Taxes as required (\$11,723.24).

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the use of the Tree Warden during the coming year. (*Indefinitely postponed.*)

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed to the road by the residences of E. T. Donovan and C. L. Follansbee and will accept and maintain said road as a town highway. Said deed to cover a length of about five hundred and ninety feet. (*Adopted.*)

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a suitable amount of money to build a state highway on the Packer's Falls Road from the Newmarket town line to the Durham Village-Lee Hill road. The first two miles to be built in 1932 and the remaining mile in 1933. (*Tabled.*)

9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to renew the contract for street lighting. (*Adopted.*)

10. To see if the Town will vote to put in additional street lights on that part of Mast Road by the residence of Max Abell and raise and appropriate money for the same. (*Postponed.*)

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to complete the purchase of the "Quarry Lot" so called and raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to pay for same. (*Adopted.*)

12. To see what action the Town will take relative to approval of by-laws adopted by the Selectmen permitting and regulating retail business, plays, games,

sports, and exhibitions on the Lord's Day. (*Adopted and by-laws approved.*)

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purposes of extending the hydrant service on Madbury Road from Garrison Avenue to Bagdad Road. (*\$2,200.00.*)

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the two hundredth anniversary of Durham. (*\$200.00.*)

15. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law. (*Voted.*)

16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. (*Voted.*)

17. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2 per cent if paid on or before July 1.

1 per cent if paid on or before September 1.  
(*Adopted.*)

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

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**March 14, 1933**

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Two Hundredth and Second Annual Meeting

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March, A. D. 1933, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:

(1) State Aid Construction.

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges.

5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses, including State and County taxes as required.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to extend the hard surface of Mill Road as far as the junction of the highways near the residence of Fred Daniels.

7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

8. To see if the Town will appoint a Zoning Commission in accordance with the requirements of the State Zoning Enabling Act.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust control.

10. To see if the Town will appoint a committee of four to act with the Selectmen to study the water situation of the Town and report at the next town meeting.

11. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law.

12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2% if paid on or before July 1.

1% if paid on or before September 1.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

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### *To the Town of Durham:*

The policy of spending the entire town appropriation of \$100 for children's books, begun by Mr. Shirley, is being continued by the present Librarian. While this fund is inadequate for needs, it does permit the purchase of outstanding new books and the replacement of some of the badly worn volumes. In his report for 1931, the Librarian urged that the Town appropriate an additional \$90 to match a like sum expended by the University for furniture for the Children's Room. The present Librarian wishes to repeat this suggestion and urge that the annual Town appropriation be doubled. The Children's Room collection could be improved immensely by rebinding worn and dilapidated books now on the shelves. Brightly bound books circulate much more readily than those with dull, ragged, and uninviting covers, however excellent their contents may be.

The people of Packer's Falls were again fortunate in being able to secure library books through the generous cooperation of Mrs. Edward Griffiths. During the year a total of 200 volumes were left on deposit at her home. These books circulated for a total of 740, which probably means that they were read well over 2,000 times, as for these books one circulation usually means that a whole family has read the book.

One change in the staff occurred during the year. Mrs. Stanley R. Shimer, Reference Librarian, was replaced by Miss Jeanette M. Blair of Peterboro, N. H. Miss Emily Washburn's appointment as Circulation

Librarian was continued, Miss Mary Falt being still on leave of absence.

The total number of accessioned volumes belonging to the library January 31st was 73,934. Total circulation for home use, University and town, was 43,365, including 3,004 juvenile books. 2,881 volumes were added during the year, including 45 from Durham Public Library funds, 44 from Durham Library Association funds, and 71 from the Simpson fund of the Durham Library Association.

The people of Durham are urged to take greater advantage of the facilities of the library, which are far better than those of other communities of like size in the state, and to make known their wishes and constructive views.

This may, however, indicate a healthy state of affairs.

The only activity which could be noted about the cemetery all summer was that of an unemployed student occasionally mowing some of the lots and of an ex-stonemason completing half of the new wall along the roadside.

Until such time as our local cemetery business picks up, the Committee has decided not to ask the Town for any appropriation of funds.

As a matter of historical interest, the following item from the will of John S. Woodman, dated May 14, 1870, and filed July, 1871, is here recorded. This item delineates the bounds of the Woodman cemetery which is placed under the perpetual care of the Town of Durham through the acceptance by the Town of the Anna M. Woodman trust fund of \$300, as noted in the annual report of the Town for the year ending March 1, 1891.

#### Item I

“I give and devise to the eight heirs of my father, Nathan Woodman, forever, in trust, for a burial place for the Woodman family and their friends, and for purposes of care, ornamentation and care of trees and plants, with a right of free access to and from at all times, the Woodman Cemetery on the old homestead, where my father and mother are buried, including all the land bounded by a N & S line, running from the salt marsh on the South to the thread of the valley on the north, and ten (10) rods westerly from the centre of the Woodman family monument, and bounded N E & S by the edge of salt marsh.”

Also the following bequest in the will of the late Forrest S. Smith of Durham, which bequest was accepted by the Town in March, 1931:

“Out of the residue of said estate that may be remaining at the time of the decease of my said wife, Sarah Adla Smith, I give and bequeath to the Town of Durham the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), the income thereof to be used for constructing, laying

out and beautifying greens or squares as however otherwise designated, in the Village of Durham, and the improvement and cleaning up of roadsides of the highways in the Town of Durham.”

## REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

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*To the Town of Durham:*

The Durham water was sampled at regular intervals during the year ending January, 1933, and was found in good condition at each analysis.

All the children both in the Durham Village and the Packer's Falls Schools were vaccinated or presented certificates.

A slight epidemic of Scarlet Fever occurred about the middle of April 1932, at Packer's Falls necessitating the closing of the school for a period of seven days beginning April 18, 1932, as a preventative measure. During this period the school was fumigated and the parents were given the required instructions.

In January, 1933, a slight epidemic of Scarlet Fever occurred in the Village of Durham. Due to the excellent cooperation of everyone concerned only a few cases occurred.

**REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

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Somersworth, N. H., February 1, 1933.

*To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:*

This is the fourth annual report which I have been permitted to submit.

Last July Principal William B. Hounsell resigned to take a headmastership and Principal Guy Croquette of Salmon Falls was elected to take his place. The change was made without friction and the work of the Junior High School has gone smoothly with Mrs. Wilcox again in charge of the Home Economics, with an assistant Cadet. We also have good cadets in History and French and Professor Batchelder supervises the cadets who teach the Manual Training. Miss Alma Roy, who has taught art successfully in Somersworth for several years was persuaded to take up the same work in Durham, visiting the village school once a week and Packer's Falls once in two weeks.

Miss Annie Hammond wished to be transferred to a higher grade so she was given the position in grades 3 and 4 left vacant by the resignation of Miss Simonds and Miss Marguerite Farley of Somersworth, who had taught for several years in Newmarket was elected to fill the position of first grade teacher. In September grades 3 and 4 opened with forty-three pupils and the number increased to fifty. This necessitated relief for an over-worked teacher and Mrs. Delta Ham was secured to take classes in the recitation room. This has meant that the work of these grades has been somewhat departmentalized and with good results. Next year grades 5 and 6 will number in the vicinity of

forty-five and a division will have to be made here. If the University takes over grades 7 and 8 in a six year University High School, ample room will be had for a division of these grades. If not the large room on the first floor will have to be divided. By either plan the pupils can be accommodated next year.

Your high school pupils are nearly all going to Dover by transportation provided by the district. Now that the road has been rebuilt the transportation is being better handled. A promise of the Dover authorities to notify the Durham telephone operator when the high school in Dover is closed on account of storms, should remove the last difficulty of transportation.

In 1931-32 there were 246 school districts in operation in New Hampshire and Durham was only a little above the median in per pupil cost for elementary schools. The median was \$82.11 and Durham's cost was \$89.70, so although Durham is having as good schools as any of the districts the financial burden is not excessive.

A George Washington Bicentennial celebration was held last May and it was a success because of the hearty cooperation of parents and teachers. Miss Laurenia A. Eastman was awarded the Good Citizenship Medal given by the New Hampshire Sons of the American Revolution. This was because she was voted to have best exemplified Good Citizenship by her conduct and work during the school year. I wonder if it would not stimulate scholarship if other medals or monetary prizes were offered by the Parent-Teachers' Association or other interested parties.

The noon lunches were started after the Thanksgiving recess but were discontinued in January because only five or six pupils were taking the lunches. Most

pupils who brought their lunch seemed to prefer their own thermos bottle. The number of pupils taking milk and graham crackers has increased, partly due to the fact that the Hayden Dairy Company of Dover is supplying chocolate milk at no additional cost.

The school at Packer's Falls had the lawn graded during the summer and some see-saws added to the playground equipment. The seats and desks of this building need refinishing next summer. We have here a nice school of the first six grades.

The report of the school nurse follows my own. Please note that while on all sides we have been surrounded by epidemics, so far we have escaped everything but the "grippe." This disease has lowered the attendance record of the Junior High School—otherwise we report a good rate of attendance and a decrease in the number of tardy marks. Please note the statistics which follow.

My thanks are here expressed to the teachers, nurse and school board for continued support and cooperation to the sole end that we shall have good schools.

One of the outstanding events of the year was the testing of the children's hearing by means of a 4 A Western Electric Audiometer loaned to the schools by the State Department of Education. One hundred and twenty-two individuals were examined and ten were found to have defective hearing. A two-fold advantage has resulted from the test! First, the parents have been notified of these findings and advised to consult a physician in regard to the child's hearing; Sec-

ond, the teachers have been warned of the pupil's defective hearing—girls and boys who here-to-fore have been considered dull and inattentive on account of this unknown fact of defective hearing, will be given seats in the front of the room and special attention be given to them. In this way we hope to overcome the handicap that accompanies loss of hearing.

The children's teeth have been carefully examined from time to time and the defects have been reported to the parents. Many have had the defects corrected.

Hot lunches and milk were served daily to all children who desired it.

In conclusion, it will be well to review the first part of the report and note the remarkably few cases of contagious diseases that are listed. In spite of the fact that we have had several pupils who have been absent from school due to colds, it seems that a splendid record has been established for the past year and that the money set aside for this department has earned good results.

I wish to thank the School Board, Superintendent, Teachers and Parents, for their helpful co-operation during the year.
