# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, Parents and Voters of the Gilford School District:

Since our last report, the War has been very much with us. Upon the teachers has fallen the additional work of promoting the various rationing and educational campaigns of the Federal Government. The pupils have participated in drives to purchase War Stamps and Bonds, collect scrap materials, and to conserve materials and health. On all there have been calls for assistance in local volunteer efforts. These activities are supplementary to our regular work, our primary task of educating boys and girls.

In this report, we shall attempt to show the changes in our personnel and school programs during the year.

#### Teachers

# Air Raid Shelter Within Building

Without heavy expense, there can be no absolutely safe place for children during an air raid. The school officials have attempted to provide a

satisfactory shelter and have developed an organization by which the pupils may be directed.

Drop covers, made of tekwood, suspended at the tops of windows and moved by cords, were installed in the auditorium and corridors adjacent to it. Pupils by squads assemble on signal at prearranged places and wait in the auditorium during the drill. This appears to be more effective than to use the classrooms with large window openings on one side of each room.

# Fingerprinting

The State Council of Defense urged school officials to have fingerprints of pupils taken and filed in the State Bureau of Identification. During the latter part of the school year, the State Police assisted in recording the prints.

## War Damage Insurance

War Damage Insurance, costing 90c per \$1,000 for one year, has been placed on the school building. The \$30,000 coverage was purchased to protect outstanding bonds.

# Repairs

The corridors were painted during the summer This painting completes the interior decorating in classrooms and corridors, the portions of the building which needed first attention.

In addition, many townspeople have been very generous with their time and have made it possible for the registering to be expeditiously done. To all, the school officials express their gratitude for the spirit in and the efficiency with which the work has been done.

Pupils have taken part in the National Scrap Drive for the collection of aluminum, brass, cast iron, copper, steel, lead, automobiles, tires, rags and paper.

# School Lunch Program

A very satisfactory noon feeding program has been active since last Spring. About 100 pupils have been fed a substantial, well-balanced meal each noon. The parents have paid 5c for this during the first three months and 6c per meal during the fall and winter of 1942. Certified cooks and helpers, Mrs. Alfred Bedard, Mrs. Edith James, and Miss Evelyn Rand, under the supervision of the Feeding Supervisor of the Works Progress Administration, together with Mrs. Winnifred H. Varney, Mrs. Helen Watson, Mrs. Muriel R. Harris, and Mrs.

Harvey Rand, have prepared the meals. Many supplies have been provided by the Agricultural Marketing Administration through Surplus Commodities Distribution. The following have contributed to the school lunches: Charles Bolduc, potatoes, carrots, beets; Mrs. Arthur Harris, beets, carrots; Mrs. Laura Varney, cabbage, squash, pumpkin; Mrs. Maurice Watson, cabbage; Mrs. Elmon Phelps, carrots; Mrs. Morrill Swain, potatoes; Irving Bickford, squash; Ena Morin, squash; Harvey Rand, salt pork, pumpkin; Mrs. Alfred Bedard, carrots, salt pork; William Vose, \$10 in cash, dishes.

#### Air-Mindedness

The present years might be termed: "air years". We are living in an "age" when people are becoming "air-conscious". The years in which pupils now in school will pass their adulthood will be "air" years. The work of transportation in large measure may be done by air. Control of the world, if such ever comes, may be accomplished by strategically placed aircraft. The schools will be training mechanics, giving pre-flight instruction and changing the content of school subjects to be in harmony with the "air age".

# World Geography and Aviation

The revolution now in process is world-wide, oceans are no longer great bodies of water to span, upheavals in society in one country are felt around the globe, communication with a country twelve thousand miles away is now a matter of seconds, self-dependence has given way to interdependence, our neighbors in the national sense reside anywhere on the globe.

In the school rooms, pupils are making large maps of the world. The importance of the Northern and Southern hemispheres from the standpoint of aviation is being stressed. There are daily geography lessons based on the news. The effect of the climate, temperature, rainfall, rivers, mountains, or seacoast on the day's events reported over the radio or in the daily papers is considered. The location of relatives in the armed forces is found. Geography of the world is a subject of primary interest in our classrooms.

# Problems in Everyday Living

Strength of mind and good mental health, strength of body and good physical health are important these days. Strength of character and of willpower, strength of soul and of spirit dominates all. Intensity of desire for cooperation, for freedom, for liberty, for unity, for Christian love and and understanding build a strong people capable of assisting oppressed populations around the world to regain their standard of living after the present international conflict ends.

#### Conclusion

You will notice a report on Heath by the Nurse, which merits your reading.

In submitting this third annual report, I wish to commend the parents for their hearty cooperation with the teachers and officials, the School Board members for their interest in and support of school matters, the teachers for their industry and achievement, and the Nurse for her attention to the health of children.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK

To the Townspeople, School Board, and Superintendent of Schools:

In my eighth annual report of the health work in the Gilford School I am pleased to note that there have been few cases of communicable diseases reported during the last school year. Three cases of scarlet fever, 4 measles, 15 of mumps, 7 of whooping cough, 7 cases of pediculosis, 5 of impetigo and of scabies completed the list. There was no large scale epidemic at any one time and these cases were supervised as it became necessary.

The most forward health measure taken in Gilford was the completion of plans for the long awaited hot lunch program. This service went into operation at the very end of the last school year, and was continued again this year until an interruption was necessary due to the W.P.A. Program having been cancelled at Washington. The hot and quite complete lunch is very beneficial to pupils. General nutrition in the school has improved noticeably.

Greater interest in the correction of physical defects by Gilford parents has been shown every year. Eight years ago, in 1936, only 16% of the defects found in the children were corrected; next year, 1937, the percentage was 18%; then for 1938 it was 19%, the following year, 1939, 20% were corrected; in 1941 30%; and last year 38%. The improvement is good but we are aiming for a goal of 100% of the defects to be corrected.

There were several eye clinics again this year and some of the most serious of the eye cases have

received attention. Nine children were fitted in school clinics in Laconia and several very serious cases were taken to Hanover at the recommendation of local eye men. But there are nine children who still need glasses badly.

Four out of 37 children needing tonsil operations were able to have this done. Only 31 Gilford pupils had dental work done last year. A School Dental Clinic is still the most necessary corrective project for Gilford pupils. No means of raising the necessary funds has yet been found to make it practical to undertake this project. At this time it would be very difficult to find a dentist with the necessary time to do this work.

I wish at this time to thank School Board members, teachers, parents, citizens and pupils for their increasing interest in the health problems of Gilford and for their efforts in helping improve them. The maximum health of our children is surely one of our patriotic duties in these times.
