This town report is respectfully dedicated to Marine Corps Lance Cpl. Joel Lee Papakalos, who typifies the young men of this town who have served or are serving their nation in the Vietnam War.

Son of Tony and Mary Papakalos, Lee was only in the Southeast Asian country a short time as a Marine Corps rifleman when he was wounded in action and suffered the loss of his sight.

Lee is a graduate of Goffstown High School. Prior to his enrollment in the Marines in 1968, he attended the Culinary Institute of America in New Haven, Conn., and later enrolled at Barrington, R. I. College to study the management end of the business.

At 23, his dreams were shattered on the battlefield.

Now he faces the tremendous task of adjusting to a new way of life.

But one thing that remains intact with Lee despite his misfortunes is his spirit, which caused one doctor to comment: "I've never met a young man like him. His attitude is fantastic. He is extremely pleasant, cheerful and happy and is grateful for every little thing done for him."

Lee prefers to think more about the future than the past.

"I'm upset about what happened, but you never get anywhere feeling sorry for yourself. You just have to grin and bear it and make the most of it."

For a young man with his outlook, there are certain to be many pleasant and happy moments left in life. He will learn Braille and hopes to enter the field of IBM programming.

He will undergo plastic surgery, receive artificial eyes and with continued therapy regain the use of his injured leg.

REPORT FROM YOUR SELECTMEN

Several changes in Town policy were accomplished during 1968. We feel this will provide you with better services.

Plans are already well on the way for the addition to the Town Hall with monies provided by the Stark Estate and in accordance with the donor's will. An architect has been hired and a rough drawing made, revealing a building that all citizens of the Town can be justly proud. The land adjacent to Town Hall is to be acquired for parking facilities. The upper level of the building is to be used for Town Offices and District Court rooms. The lower level will house the Police and Communication Departments.

During the past year, the new bookkeeping machine was installed in our accounting department. This has provided the Selectmen and Budget Committee with up-to-date listing of expenditures and revenues. This method of accounting was of great value when the 1969 Town Budget was being proposed. These records were very helpful to the chairman of the Budget Committee for the finalization presented to you.

Your Selectmen have stayed within their Budget for 1968. In fact, the records will show a balance of approximately \$40,000.00 surplus. Our requested Budget for 1969 will show an increase of approximately \$10,000.00 when requested appro-

priations and anticipated revenues are balanced. Rising cost of education of our children should be uppermost in the minds of our citizens. It should be pointed out most of the tax dollar is spent for this purpose.

Your Selectmen wish to thank all Department Heads and members of their Departments for their cooperation throughout the past year. We also, on behalf of all the people and ourselves, wish to thank all the various Boards who have given so generously of their time and knowledge.

1969 TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Goffstown in said County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs and to the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Goffstown qualified to vote in School District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goffstown High School in said Town on Tuesday, the 11th of March, at six o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

The polls will open at 6:00 A. M. and close at 6:30 P. M. at the Central Polling Place and will open at 6:30 A. M. and close at 6:00 P. M. in the Fifth District Bartlett School.

None of the articles in the warrant, except those relating to the election of officers and those covering questions on the ballot shall be considered during the time that the polls are open.

1. To choose all Town Officers, Trustees and Commissioners, and School District Officers for the ensuing year, including a member of the Board of Selectmen for three years, and another member for a period of two years.
2. Do you favor the continuation of the Town Manager Plan as now enforced in this town? Inserted by petition of more than ten legal voters. (By Official Ballot)
3. Do you favor adoption of the Australian Ballot System for the election of the Goffstown Town Officers. Inserted by petition of more than ten legal voters. (By Official Ballot)
4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee in the amount of Six Hundred Ninety-Two Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-Three Dollars and Twenty-Four Cents (\$692,223.24), and raise by taxes the sum of Five Hundred Four Thousand Six Hundred Ninety Dollars and Eighty-Eight Cents (\$504,690.88). (County Tax not included)

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow from time to time, such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be needed to meet the necessary running expenses of the Town.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed, purchase, prescription or gift.

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the land, building and base station of The Pinardville Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc., on the corner of Mast Road and Plummer Street, and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$115,000.00), to construct a fire station on the site of the presently existing building; the sum of One Hundred fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$115,000.00), to be raised through the issuance of serial notes or bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of Revised Statutes Annotated) and any amendments thereto; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and the time and place of payment and condition of sale thereon, and to take such action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Goffstown. (2/3 majority required) RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee.

8. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of March 14, 1961, as amended, so that the following area be included within the commercial district:

Map 34, Lot 178

Map 35, Lots 4 through 11A inclusive

Inserted by petition of more than ten legal voters.

9. To see if the Town will vote to publish in the next Town Report and annually thereafter a list, by name and amount, of the amount of adjustments and abatements allowed from the values listed in the Real Estate Assessment Booklet as printed and distributed as of April 1, 1967. Inserted by petition of more than ten legal voters.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Two Hundred Ninety-Six Thousand Fifty-Five Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents (\$296,055.75), and interest as bequeathed by the late Mildred G. Stark, and authorize the Selectmen to take or purchase land abutting the present Town Hall, and contract for the completion of the Town Hall at a cost not exceeding the bequest and according to the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Mildred G. Stark, which reads as follows: "All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate, real, personal or mixed, wherever found and however situated, I give, bequeath and devise to the Town of Goffstown, N. H. for the express purpose of completion of the Town Hall and if any sums are remaining after the completion of said Town Hall, the income on the balance to be used for maintenance of said Town Hall."

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a special unpaid committee consisting of three persons to act as the regional refuse disposal planning committee and who along with similar committees from other municipalities in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Region will make up the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board.

12. To hear the reports of the Town Officers, Auditors, and Committees and to pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

POLICE

TO THE CITIZENS OF GOFFSTOWN:

The police department has recorded a heavier work load this year, than in any previous years. This department received and investigated 1714 complaints from the citizens of Goffstown. Of these, 235 were accidents, 147 larcenies, 116 property damage, 158 dog complaints, 162 motor vehicle complaints, 27 prowler, 83 burglaries, 42 missing persons, 3 sex complaints, etc.

A total of 842 arrests were made of which 478 were for motor vehicle violations consisting of 169 speed, 50 stop sign violations, 41 yellow line, 8 driving to endanger, 12 operating after suspension or revocation, 30 operating without license, 17 driving while under the influence of liquor, 5 leaving the scene of an accident, etc.

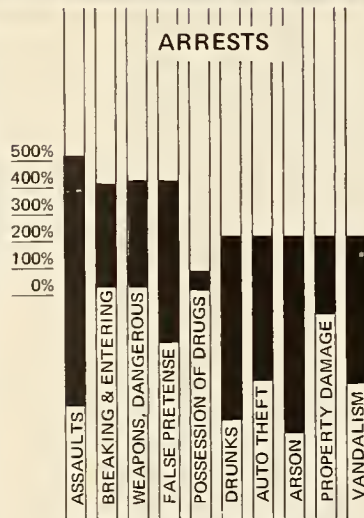
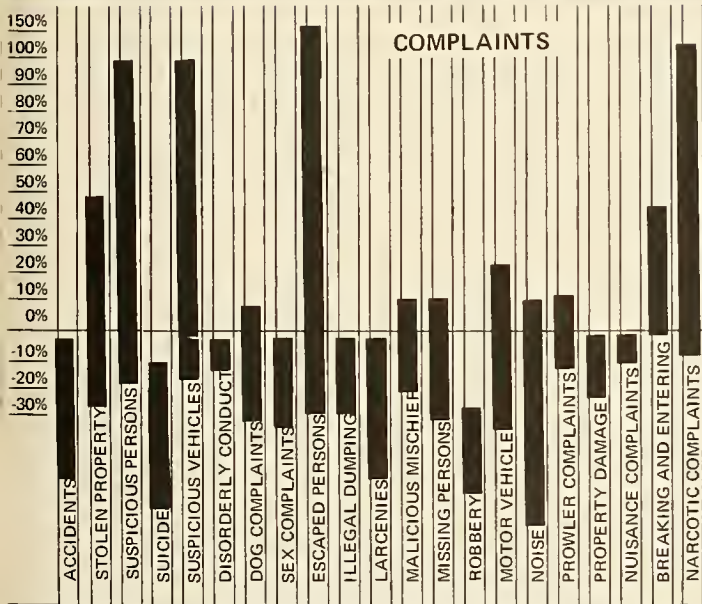
364 arrests were of a criminal nature and a general breakdown is 22 assaults, 33 larcenies, 24 drunks, 60 illegal possession of liquor, 16 breaking and entering, 9 escapes, 4 possession of dangerous weapons, 7 malicious property damage, 5 illegal possession of drugs, 4 arson, etc.

Checking the graphs, you will notice a breakdown of complaints and arrests and their increases, percentage wise, over the year 1967.

It must be remembered that the police need assistance and support of the citizens, to enable them to perform and render the services that are expected of them; for without information from citizens of known offenses committed in the community, numerous man hours must be spent to develop leads which will identify the perpetrator, thus increasing the overall expense, to the taxpayer, for the solution of the crime.

CRIMINAL ARREST PERCENTAGE INCREASE IN 1968 COMPARED TO 1967

The above percentages show increases or decreases of individual complaints received and investigated by the police in 1968 compared against similar complaints handled in 1967.



FIRE DEPARTMENT

Once again it is that time of year when we come to you, the taxpayer, to keep our fire defenses and equipment modern and up to date.

As you remember it was voted at the 1968 Town Meeting to purchase a new fire truck. This is to replace our 39 year old Seagrave. It is hoped that the new one will be delivered in time for you to see on Town Meeting day.

Also one new chassis had to be purchased for Engine 5 stationed in Pinardville.

As you will notice in your Town Report a new fire station is being proposed for Pinardville. The present station is not owned by the town, but by the Pinardville Firemen's Association. It is the opinion of the Fire Department and Selectmen that a new station is needed there.

Library Trustees Report

We gratefully acknowledge the services and gifts of various townspeople during the past year. In particular, we wish to mention the receipt of a bequest from the Mabel Stark Estate, and the establishment of the Gilbert Clapp Memorial Fund. We commend our librarian, Mrs. Daniel H. Vickery, and her staff for their conscientious efforts.

Improvements for the past year include installation of a new heating plant, additional book shelves in the adult room, a new light fixture over the librarian's desk, a typewriter and vacuum cleaner, seasonal decorations to enhance the attractiveness of the library, and expansion of the library hours to give better service to the town.

An open house was held in the spring with a film program on the restoration of Williamsburg. We would like to point out that these improvements are dependent on monies from trust funds left to the library. The funds allotted to the library by the town are sufficient only to cover the basic yearly running expenses.

We are hopeful that we may continue our program for developing the library so that it may serve the town in an ever-growing measure.

This has been a very busy year at your Public Library, for not only has an increase in circulation been noted, but greater use has been made of our resources in answering questions and doing research work. The State-Aid grant of \$100 for Reference Books each year for the past four years has greatly improved our facilities in this area. We have updated the World Book Encyclopedia this year and added the New Book of Knowledge for the younger readers.

Several teachers have used our collection to provide wider reader interest for their classrooms and several classes have visited the Library, including the Kindergarten and the Head Start group.

The Summer Reading Program was extremely popular with a very fine group of readers participating. Better comprehension in reading was our goal this year.

In May, we provided a Film Program for Adults and this was very well attended.

The excellent, additional shelving around the walls of the Reading Room has helped to relieve the crowded conditions in the Stack Area, but with increased demand for materials from Public Libraries, we should look forward to further expansion, which is needed to provide better and more varied services for our town.

We wish to express our thanks to the Goffstown Garden Club, the Goffstown Unity Club and the Shirley Club for their continued interest in providing gifts of books in various fields — also for the beautiful 2 volume set "Wild Flowers of the U. S." from several clubs and interested friends.

CHARTER COMMISSION

Your Town Charter Commission report for 1968-69 is based upon the results of action taken by you the voters at Town Election and Town Meeting in March 1968.

At that time we asked you to express your wishes regarding our report and proposed modernization of our form of government. We had recommended a council-manager type of municipality as best meeting the requirements of our community.

A voice vote was called for at Town Meeting and indicated an even division of opinion on the question. We did not consider this to be a sufficient mandate for pursuance of the change of government we had suggested.

We also had to contend with the referendum question on the town ballot, inserted by petition of ten voters, requesting the adoption of non-partisan election of town officers. The adoption of this question by ballot affected directly the many considerations we had been studying and recommending.

We therefore suggest at this time, that the Charter Commission as appointed, be continued so that should the need and/or demand arise for future action from this body, we would be ready to act accordingly.

PLANNING BOARD



The most significant milestone for the Planning Board in 1968 was the completion and publication of the Comprehensive Town Plan. This plan represents many hours of work, not only by the Planning Board, but also the Selectmen, Town Manager, Superintendent of Schools and all Town Department Heads. The cooperation between the Planning Board, other Town Officials and Mr. Myron Lamb of the James W. Sewall Co, Planning Consultant, has produced this plan. It is used as a guide line to allow Goffstown to continue to grow, provide adequate schools and municipal services with a minimum impact on the town tax burden.

The projected population of Goffstown in 1980 will be 11,500, up from 9,322 in 1969. To accommodate this growth, with a minimum tax burden, the Plan contains a Capital Improvement Budget which, if followed, would actually lower the percent of tax dollars required for such Capital Improvements: such as, new fire trucks, school sites and highway construction.

The Capital Budget in the Goffstown Comprehensive Plan so impressed the N. H. Department of Resources and Economic Development that they had additional copies printed to use as examples to show other towns in New Hampshire, completing comprehensive town Plans. The Planning Board hopes that the Town will avail itself of the advantages of this comprehensive plan and the

Planning Board pledges to make the Plan a continuing document by revising it as conditions change.

The Subdivision Regulations of the Town of Goffstown required a considerable amount of time by the Board. A number of proposed subdivisions were viewed and acted upon in 1968. The guiding principles followed by the Board in all cases is that the Board welcomes expansion of the Town but that it should be done with no or minimum expense to the taxpayer in general.

In administering these Subdivision Regulations, the Board is attempting to remove the cost of these new streets and sewers from the taxpayers' shoulders. In addition, proper street-layouts can prevent snow plowing, drainage and fire fighting problems and contribute to the orderly development of the town.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Board of Adjustment heard twenty-four applications for variances and exceptions during 1968. Twelve applications were granted, nine were denied and the Board took no action on three applications because there were no apparent violations of the zoning ordinance requiring consideration by the Zoning Board.

There were several applications to construct apartments at or near Goffstown Village. One application for an exception was granted, permitting a proposal to construct approximately 45 apartments on property located at the north end of Maple Street.

The numerous Applications for the construction of apartments indicates investor confidence in Goffstown and it is felt by the Board of Adjustment that the apartments will be a benefit to all residents of the Town.

THE COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC) has now completed its second full year of operation. The municipal members include the Towns of Auburn, Bedford, Goffstown, Hooksett, Londonderry and the City of Manchester. Municipalities become members of the Commission by ordinance or resolution, payment of the established per capita fee, and official appointment of representatives who have been nominated by the local planning board.

Although officials of several municipalities have requested the Commission to increase its membership, the Commission feels that it would not be

desirable to expend its membership until it completes studies on some of the immediate needs of its existing area of responsibility.

The purpose of the Commission is to develop 'regional plans' to encourage the coordinated development of the region, and to make recommendations regarding development in the region. In addition, the Commission provides local planning assistance to member Planning Boards. This assistance takes the form of professional planning staff attendance and assistance at Planning Board meetings. The professional staff acts as advisors on regional activities and local development questions. The Local Planning Assistance provided by the Commission has been a particularly appealing aspect for local planning boards. The 1969 program anticipates even greater service in the year ahead.

THE ACTIVITIES

During 1968, major Commission activities included the following:

Community Shelter Plan

The Community Shelter Plan has a twofold purpose: (1) to provide a detailed plan of action and designated shelters for protection against fall-out in case of a nuclear attack upon the United States, and (2) to provide the Commission with much needed basic data on land use, population and other characteristics in the region.

Section 204 Review

During 1968 the Commission reviewed applications for Federal financial assistance that involve regional considerations. This review is required under Section 204 of the Federal Demonstration Cities and Metropolitan Development Act of 1966. Among the applications reviewed were the Route 3 and 2B-A intersection improvement proposal and the Hooksett Sewerage Improvement Plan, as well as others of importance to both City and Towns.

Regional Sewerage and Water Facility Study

In June the Commission received notification that its application for a two-thirds

Federally funded Regional Sewerage and Water Facilities Study was approved. The next six months saw the Commission tooling up for this detailed study which is expected to carry a major portion of their work load over the next two years. It is anticipated that this study will provide the Commission with much needed development criteria. The firm of Hayden, Harding and Buchanan, Inc., Consulting Engineers of Boston, Mass., is assisting the SNHPC on this project.

Refuse Disposal

Early autumn found the Commission reviewing refuse disposal problems in the region. This consideration was a result of two factors: (1) the recent regulations passed by the New Hampshire Air Pollution Control Commission regulating open-burning dumps, and (2) a request from the Town of Bedford for assistance in locating a new site for operation of a sanitary landfill. The Commission viewed refuse disposal as a significant regional problem and undertook a study of existing refuse disposal methods and sites in the region. Initial review indicated that cooperative activity was feasible and should be studied further. Therefore, the SNHPC adopted a resolution requesting the Towns to include an article in their Town Warrant for the March 1969 Town Meeting to allow the Selectmen to appoint three people to an unpaid refuse disposal committee. This committee would meet with similar committees from other SNHPC member municipalities as the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee. The purpose of the Committees would be to study the feasibility of cooperative efforts in refuse disposal, and to make recommendations to the municipalities for vote at the 1970 Town Meeting.

Regional Planning Policy

The latter part of the year the Commission reviewed portions of the "goal statement" which it hopes to complete during the ensuing months. After complete review and revision, the "goal statement" will become the policy framework within which the Commission will continually evaluate its own activities.

STAFF

Until August of 1968, the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC) relied solely upon the part-time services of the City of Manchester Planning Board staff to perform SNHPC staff functions under a working agreement with the City of Manchester.

In August, the Commission hired Mr. W. Ray Walker as a full-time Regional Planner. Mr. Walker is responsible to the Commission and works under the direction of Mr. John F. Grogan, Executive Director of the Commission who also serves as Manchester City Planning Director. Also, Mr. Neil A. Sieminski of the Manchester Planning Board staff will continue as part-time technical advisor for the Region as well as project director for the Community Shelter Plan.

The hiring of Mr. Walker provides the Commission with the full-time service of a professional planner. He holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Urban and Regional Planning from Michigan State University and did post graduate work at the University of Pittsburgh. Mr. Walker's experience in the field of planning includes two years as a Regional Planner for the Tennessee State Planning Commission and two years as a Community Planner for the Lehigh-Northampton County Planning Commission in eastern Pennsylvania.

THE YEAR AHEAD

Looking ahead to 1969 and beyond, the SNHPC finds the following objectives:

- * Completion of the Community Shelter Plan
- * Substantial progress toward completion of the detailed Sewerage and Water Facilities Plan
- * The continuing Local Planning Assistance to members on an even more intensified basis.
- * An intensified effort to find and use all means of increasing the communication linkage between regional planning and the towns and cities through visual aids, publications, meetings with professional groups, local service clubs, industry, gatherings of private citizens, etc. In short, a concerted effort to encourage the Region to "Think Planning," because planning is everybody's business.

Progress Report

... progress ... proceeding; taking place; happening; to go forward or onward; proceed; also, to make progress; advance; improve.

The Goffstown Recreation Advisory Council can be justifiably proud of the progress made in the recreational facilities and programs of Goffstown.

In 1968, Phase I of a long range plan was started and completed, to the extent of the funds available. At the Pinardville Playground a shelter building, parking lot and 3 tennis courts were completed. They were not ready in time for the '68 season, but they are ready now, and should be of great benefit to the youth of the area.

There have been several delays in applying for Federal funds to start Phase II and III; however, this has been done and from the State of New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development we received this information dated December 11, 1968... concerning the Pinardville pool... "We expect to process this application in the very near future, so that Bureau of Outdoor Recreation approval can be granted prior to the 1969 construction season."

From the same letter concerning the Barnard facilities:

"It is hoped that this application can be processed before the next construction sea-

son also. However, a cutback of 28% in the funds granted under the Land and Water Conservation Fund for 1969, and limits on the funding of development projects, will require that final approval of Stage III be granted by the Washington Office of the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. We expect that approval to be granted, but it may not be in time for the beginning of the 1969 construction season.

"We shall make every effort to successfully accomplish both Stages II and III of the Goffstown playground project in as short a time as possible."

We, the Advisory Council, consider this progress, and we are still hopefully pressing for a 1969 completion date on all present construction plans.

The Goffstown Recreation Advisory Council will continue working toward development and improvement of all Goffstown facilities and programs.

BARNARD PLAYGROUND



The 1968 Summer Program at Barnard Playground has continued to grow. This year there was more teen age participation than in the past years, and the emphasis was to direct the activities and planning toward the interests of this age group.

In the mornings the toddler group had free play in the Kiddie area where there are six swings, a trapeze, a baby swing, a horizontal ladder, five saddle-mates, set of teeters, a merry-go-round, a climbing tower and a sand box. These little ones

also have available to them coloring, puzzles, blocks and can participate in organized games.

The older children are broken down into age groups for instructions, such as archery, tennis, badminton, etc. Activities included softball, soccer, tetherball, tennis, darts, archery, horseshoes, basketball, checkers, chess and various games as Monopoly and its like.

Contests were held weekly in most of the activities; a Field Day with Pinardville Playground as guests and the annual trip to Milford for a meet and girls' softball game.

The Neighborhood Youth Corp Employees were of great assistance again this year in helping Mr. Konieczny to supervise.

It was the hope of the Trustees that this coming Spring of 1969 would see ground breaking to implement the long range building plan. Due to circumstances at State and Federal levels we are still awaiting written approval of the Barnard Playground Matching Funds.

Mr. and Mrs. Konieczny helped the children organize a Carnival for the N. H. Muscular Dystrophy Association. The children enjoyed the activity and raised \$121.17, which was turned over to the association. They were awarded a set of encyclopedias.

THE BLUE GOOSE YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNION

THE BLUE GOOSE YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNION, now concluding its first year of operation, was established in March 1968 as a place where teen agers can go and just be teen agers.

THE BLUE GOOSE is located in the former St. Lawrence Parish Hall which was purchased by the Town of Goffstown with funds appropriated by the 1967 Town Meeting specifically for a youth center. The building and properties were, in turn,

leased by the town to the Union.

Any teen ager residing in the Goffstown School District may become a member by purchasing a membership card for \$1.00. At present the BGYPU claims a membership of 305 young people.

The BGYPU is administered by a board of officers

who are directed by a formal constitution. Augmenting the officers are the 10 adult advisors, elected by the membership and who, according to the constitution, "must be present whenever the building is open."

For its first year, the BLUE GOOSE has functioned primarily as a "drop-in" place for members. At the BLUE GOOSE members play pool, ping-pong, cards, listen to records or just visit while enjoying the numerous refreshments which may be purchased from the kitchen. Special events like

dances or folk concerts are held as the membership desires. The facilities are also open after school activities and athletic events.

Last Fall, the BGYPU received a grant from the Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trust for their ability to raise \$2,500 from within the community. The funds, totaling 3,500, will be used to provide a wider variety of recreational activities at the GOOSE.

ARTICLE 7: Moved by Mr. Hebert and seconded by Mrs. Meyers to approve question. Carried.

ARTICLE 6: Mr. Hambleton moved and seconded by Mr. Hall that this article be laid on the table. Carried. Mr. Robert Gagnon moved to reconsider and was seconded. Moderator advised that it was unanimous that we reconsider this article. Motion made by Mr. Robert Chase and seconded by Mr. Tyler Carlisle that the membership of the Goffstown School Board be increased to a total of nine. These nine members shall be elected from the three districts presently in use and each district shall have equal representation. By a standing vote on the amendment it was defeated by NO — 127, YES — 63. The voice vote on the original motion was then carried.

SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Goffstown qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goffstown High School in said district on the 18th day of March 1969, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.

5. To see if the district will vote to create and elect an AREA School Planning Committee consisting of three (3) qualified voters of the district of whom at least one (1) shall be a member of the School Board, which committee shall perform the functions and duties set forth therefore in the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, Chapter 195-A, for the purpose of considering fully and objectively the question whether Goffstown, Dunbarton and New Boston, and any other town or towns so desirous, should unite to establish an AREA high school in Goffstown, so as to be eligible for increased state building aid, tuition-bonus payments, and such other advantages as are provided for by said R. S. A. 195-A.

6. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) to be used for the purpose of hiring an architect or architectural firm to make preliminary plans and cost estimates for a new Goffstown Junior High School. (Submitted without recommendation)

7. To see if the Goffstown School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of forty-two thousand dollars (\$42,000.00) for the renovation of the Bartlett School to provide additional classroom facilities for increased pupil enrollment. (Recommended)

Submitted herewith is the report of the examination and audit of the accounts of the Goffstown School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)
Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1967 and June 30, 1968, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$102,599.85 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures – Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$10,530.03 plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$3,463.76, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$13,993.79.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1968, is indicated in Exhibit F.

School Lunch Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the receipts and expenditures of the School Lunch Account is included in Exhibit G.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit H)

Exhibit H presents a statement of the School Tax Account with the Town of Goffstown. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1968, the School District had received from the Town the total of the 1967-68 School Tax in the amount of \$761,523.21.

Building Fund Account: (Exhibit I)

A statement showing the activity in the Building Fund Account is presented in Exhibit I.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1968, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit J.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$4,599.85, from \$9,393.94 to \$13,993.79, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968 as shown herewith:

To see if the town will vote to direct the Goffstown School Board to officially notify the school boards of the towns of New Boston and Dunbarton that tuition students will no longer be accepted in Goffstown schools after July 1, 1969, without a tuition contract, and that the Goffstown School District would like to be relieved of all tuition contracts with the above named towns as soon as possible. (Inserted by petition)

9. To see if the Goffstown School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500.00) for the filling, grading, and seeding of the physical education area at the Goffstown High School. (Not Recommended)

10. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Goffstown I herewith submit my seventh annual report relative to the schools of Goffstown.

The Growing School Population

There has been, in recent years, a phenomenal increase in the number of students enrolled in the Goffstown schools. In 1959-60, 994 pupils were enrolled in the Goffstown schools compared to 1900 in 1968-69. With approximately 200 tuition pupils included in the 1968-69 total, it is evident that we now have in excess of 700 more Goffstown students in our schools than we had less than ten years ago.

Our facilities are overtaxed. We have exhausted all available classroom space. The new high school, Maple Avenue School and Bartlett School are overcrowded from a standpoint of efficient use of the buildings in an atmosphere that is conducive to good teaching and effective learning.

In the fall of 1969 Goffstown High School will enroll more than 700 students or 150 more students than the 550 student capacity for which the new high school was constructed only three years ago. In ten years, our enrollment has increased from a total high school population of 227 to the anticipated 700 next September. The increase in September 1968 over the 1967 enrollment was 118 students or more than 20% in one year. The growth is due mainly to the increase in the Goffstown population and not in the tuition student population.

Goffstown Junior High School is badly overcrowded with a current enrollment of 382 in a building built to comfortably accommodate less than 300 students. The September 1969 enrollment is expected to exceed 400 students.

Goffstown Junior High School was built in 1925 to serve as a High School for Goffstown. In 1925 there were 92 students enrolled in the high school. The addition to the school was built in 1948 when the enrollment numbered 113 high school students. This number increased to 330 high school students in 1962 at which time it became evident

that it was imperative that a new facility be provided. The new Goffstown High School was built in 1965 to accommodate a 550 student population. The Goffstown Junior High School enrollment will exceed by nearly one hundred students that of Goffstown High School at the time it was deemed that a new high school was needed. Goffstown Junior High School with a capacity of 280 students and an enrollment of 382 cannot continue to house a student body that in September 1969 will be in excess of 400.

The problem of overcrowding is further compounded by the inadequacy of the separate facilities within the Goffstown Junior High School building and the complete lack of certain facilities which are necessary in a modern educational plant.

The following are some of the inadequate facilities: sub-standard classrooms, science laboratories, study areas, storage areas, boys and girls locker rooms, and playground areas.

Lack of certain facilities in the Goffstown Junior High School include the following: inadequate number of classrooms, no language laboratory, planned library, audio-visual area, large group instruction area, proper office space, music room, art room, health services area, remedial reading room, guidance area, student lockers or teachers room. The playground areas are wholly inadequate to accommodate the combined approximately 550 White School and Junior High School students.

It is not generally possible to attain quality education in an overcrowded school with inadequate teaching facilities and with the use of modern teaching techniques and the enrichment of courses curtailed by a limited physical plant.

The Goffstown School Building Needs Committee recommends that a facility to accommodate the Goffstown Junior High School be constructed in the immediate future. Occupancy as early as September 1970 is desirable from the standpoint of the welfare of students attending the Junior High School.

The increased enrollment at the Bartlett School will require at least one additional classroom for September 1969. A renovation of the basement area of the original Bartlett School has been suggested as a solution to the lack of additional classrooms at Bartlett School.

The Maple Avenue School is overcrowded to the extent that currently if classes were of the recommended 25 pupil maximum, four additional teachers and classrooms would be needed.

Presently all second, third, fourth and fifth grades are overcrowded with individual classes running as high as 35 students in a class. The cafeteria of the Maple Avenue School has been converted to two classrooms. These should be returned to the original cafeteria purpose for which the space was provided. If this were done, we would need six classrooms immediately for the present enrollment, four to eliminate oversized classes and two to return the cafeteria. The school therefore has inadequate facilities not only for the student enrollment but for the cafeteria as well.

With the construction of a new Junior High School, the present Junior High School building could house grades five and six thereby relieving the conditions at Maple Avenue School, which would then have only grades one through four.



Goffstown High School

Goffstown High School opened her doors in September to a record number of students including an enrollment of more than 200 Freshmen.

Despite problems caused by a tremendous increase in school population, it was decided to proceed with plans for program improvement.

Under the direction of Mr. Donald Foley and Mr. Raymond Regan, a humanities program was planned and implemented as an elective for Seniors.

In the area of mathematics, a two-year algebra I program was instituted for those who would realize a greater measure of success should the subject be studied over a two-year period. Also scheduled was a geometry class for Freshmen who had taken algebra as eighth graders and who would graduate with five years of college preparatory mathematics. The number of tracks in mathematics now numbers four which meets the needs of students very effectively. Mr. Raymond Regan, Mr. Robert Bruno, and Mr. Raymond Trombly have established courses in advanced mathematics including calculus for interested students. We have long been in need of a third foreign language. This year we offered a first year of Spanish. Interest and grouping required the establishment of three class sections for this course.

As our business curriculum was revised last year, it was not necessary to add to the program for the present. Large enrollments in business courses

testify to the interest in and need for the business curriculum.

In science, we plan to relate our Freshman program to the new Junior High science curriculum. In the meantime, we have added general science to the Freshman offering of earth science to allow for an elective science course in each of the four years of high school.

Offered for the first time this year is a course in public speaking. The decision to add this program was motivated by student need and interest.

An enthusiastic response has been displayed by students this year in our choral offering under the direction of our new choral director, Mrs. Martha Kellett. The band program has enjoyed continued growth under the direction of Robert Rausch, Teacher of Instrumental Music.

Needed for some time and added this year was a full-time remedial reading program. Many students have availed themselves of much needed help.

The addition of courses of a vocational nature will complete for the present the progress in curriculum revision that our space and staff will allow.

In the Spring of 1968, Goffstown High School completed its evaluation as required for membership in the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. The staff has been busy this year studying recommendations for improvement made by the Visiting Committee of the New England Association of Colleges & Secondary Schools and implementing the recommendations under the able direction of Robert O. Moulton, Principal. The major project assumed by the staff for 1968-69 is the up-dating of curriculum guides used in the presentation of all courses.

Goffstown Junior High School

There are 386 students presently enrolled in Goffstown Junior High School. Next year the anticipated enrollment will reach 410 pupils. At the present time the physical plant is being utilized 100%, which prevents the possibility of extensive curriculum expansion. Our Goffstown Junior High School has a comprehensive rating from the State Department of Education.

Curriculum revisions, results of intensive studies, have been implemented.

A new program has been instituted in the English Department. The purpose of this new approach is to stimulate a genuine interest and enthusiasm for English.

The program is the result of a two-year study under the direction of Mr. John Auld of the St. Anselm's English Department and Mr. Gordon Bennett of the New England College English Department.

At present it is being offered to five of fifteen groups taught by the English teachers Mrs. Fottler, Mr. Clark and Mr. Psirogiannis.

The reading program has been expanded to include all pupils to give each an opportunity to participate in a developmental program as well as remedial. This program is geared to improve the reading ability of all pupils.

We are building a library of new and up-to-date books on a Junior High level. At the present time we have approximately 577 books, students assist as librarians. Each year additional books are provided by regular budget requests, Title II ESEA and the Goffstown Mothers Club.

Our present Math curriculum, which was revised last year offers Algebra I to advanced students and also Modern and Traditional Mathematics.

The Industrial Arts program added a unit on small engines. This addition will provide a more varied experience in industrial arts which already includes, mechanical drawing, printing, sheet metal, and wood work.

Offerings in Science have been screened to provide a program that will eliminate repetition in grades above and below the Junior High level and provide a more meaningful experience. This program is being implemented by providing students with an opportunity to explore and investigate, to their fullest, with the help and guidance of a science instructor.

The Home Economics Department has actively participated in cooking, sewing, good manners, good grooming and bulletin boards.

During the year Mr. Bruce Hale was appointed as Assistant Principal in the Junior High School. He is a full-time Science teacher with additional duties in pupil attendance and disciplinary problems including bus behavior.

Communication between the Junior High School and the upper and lower grades has been initiated to bring about a continuity in subject content, materials used, and methods of presentation.

We are constantly taking inventory in all areas so that the needs of our pupils will be met, and refinements can be made to provide the best possible education for all students.

The Junior High School is used to the fullest extent during the regular school hours. After school hours, the Junior High and High School basketball teams hold practice sessions as time allows. Each evening during the week such activities as Boy Scouts, recreational badminton and basketball groups use the building. During the winter months, Bidy Basketball activities usually take place on Saturday and Sunday, completing a full week of activity.

These activities are community recreational activities and are permitted if there is no conflict with school sponsored activities.

Maple Avenue School

During the 1968-69 school year at the Maple Avenue School one hundred books were added to the school library. At the rate of 100-150 additional books per year our library will reach the standards suggested by the American Library Association within a few years.

A new classroom of furniture was added leaving only about 25 pieces of older furniture to be replaced. In new equipment a number of filing cabinets were purchased for teachers' classroom use. A new overhead projector was purchased which has been most useful. A new electric duplicating machine was added.

During the 1968-69 school year from early March until closing of school, a reading curriculum committee studied the needs of our reading program. The committee continued its work this year until mid-November. At this time recommendations were made for a new reading series. The series was adopted and will be placed in service this year. We are certain that the adoption will upgrade our reading program.

A number of materials such as microscopes and magnifying glasses were purchased to be used with our new science program. These will stimulate interest in the science area and serve as learning tools.

Additional custodial services have greatly helped to keep the building in a better condition.



White School

In November 138 sixth grade students spent a week participating in the Boston University Sargent Camp Outdoor Education Program.

Locally the program was under the direction of Leonard Hall, White School Assistant Principal, assisted by the sixth grade teachers.

The students participated in a rich supplement to our school's natural and social science curriculum by providing the children experiences they could not have in the classroom.



They studied animals, plants, land formations, mapping, compass, pond life and survival. In addition to the formal indoor and outdoor classes there was a supervised recreation period each day.

The cost of instruction, lodging and meals was \$25.00 for the week which was paid by the parents.

Many organizations in Goffstown generously provided scholarships so that no student was denied the opportunity to participate.

The program was an unqualified success and it is hoped that this will become an integral part of the sixth grade curriculum.

Under Title II, classroom libraries have been established. Prior to this time the White School had no library. The pupils either used the Maple Avenue library or the town library.

With the additional U. S. Education Act Title II books for the 1969-70 school year there will be in excess of a book per child or about 250 books. These will be placed in the individual classrooms and then rotated from one room to another giving the children access to different books.

Teachers from the White School participated in the reading curriculum study which resulted in the selection of the new reading system.

An additional overhead projector has been purchased, a new Bell and Howell movie projector was purchased to replace a ten year old machine.

A new room of furniture was purchased, replacing old one-piece units. We have been replacing old furniture at the rate of one room per year. At present three rooms have new furniture and the other three the older furniture. Within three years, we should have all new furniture.

Bartlett School

Bartlett School enrollment is continuing to increase. We presently have three first grades and two classes of each grade two through five. Our enrollment has reached 241 students. In order to accommodate our growth, we are presently using a basement room in the old section of Bartlett School. This room is not adequate for a classroom. Next fall we will need more space and hope the entire basement of the old building can be renovated for this purpose.

Ruth Powers, our Remedial Reading teacher is qualified to give individual intelligence tests. This has proven very beneficial to the school. Miss Powers has tested a number of students in all grades when requested by teacher or principal. The results have proven helpful in determining pupil difficulties and ability.

Our Library continues to be staffed by mothers from the Mothers Club. The library is opened daily to enable students to borrow books. Mothers have been working in the library for three years and their service has been greatly appreciated.

The Boys Club continues to operate at the school. The club now is a direct branch of the Manchester Boys Club. The merger has proven most satisfactory. More supervision and a greater variety of equipment has been purchased to make the program more meaningful to club members. The Boys Club has been operating successfully now for about five years.

The Mothers Club is a very active club working closely with the school. Over a period of years, they have been instrumental in providing many items used in the school and on the playground.

Goffstown High School Library Report

Mrs. Suzanne Duncan, the Goffstown High School Librarian is one of the outstanding school librarians in the State of New Hampshire. The following is her report:

It was heartening this year to find that the students seemed to be able to find adequate material for research in the library. The greatest problem lay in magazine research. I, therefore, recommend purchase of one microfilm reader and purchase of sufficient magazines to start a microfilm library. This is a practical solution to eliminate extensive storage facilities and is one being employed in many progressive high schools today.

Again this year library instruction was offered to all incoming freshmen. The students in general seem to have been more self-sufficient this year than in previous years which indicates the importance of continuing this program in future years. Materials have been purchased this year to upgrade the course of instruction.

The average weekly attendance was 335. Our estimated inventory in June 1968 numbers 4,015 books exclusive of dictionaries and encyclopedias. There are many books on our shelves at present that were brought from the old high school and which either because of condition or quality should be deleted from the collection. As our collection is of sufficient size now, I recommend that we initiate a systematic process of weeding the collection to insure an updated library.

Having undergone the evaluation, we have taken the following steps to comply with the recommendations of the evaluation committee.

1. Enlargement and broadening of the fiction collection.
2. Inclusion of recommended periodicals or equivalent magazines.
3. Establishment of vertical files for non-book materials. Next year this project will be undertaken to a greater extent.
4. Establishment of a professional library.

The increased use of audio-visual equipment certainly justified the purchase of same. I recommend for the future purchase of another record player and a 35mm. camera (the latter was recommended by the evaluating committee). I further recommend as did the evaluating committee an in-service training program for teachers and students. There should be some member of the staff appointed to head up the audio-visual program. I do not feel the librarian has sufficient time to assume this task. She should be responsible, however, for the cataloging and circulating of audio-visual equipment and materials.

The enthusiastic response of the library assistants resulted in formation of a library club. Delegates of the club participated in and joined the state-wide organization for school library assistants traveling to Timberlane this year.

Summation: In general our library is moving rapidly forward. Books and non-book materials are becoming increasingly more available. Unfortunately, this time is not sufficient and clerical assistance not available to keep the technical work from falling far behind. At present only about half of the collection is cataloged. The audio-visual materials have never been cataloged. There is merely a shelf list for film strips, records etc. Title II technical work is greatly in arrears with no one delegated to this task. This problem will become increasingly worse unless provisions are made. According to American Library Association Standards the staff for the library should number as follows and I quote, "Librarians: For the first 900 or fraction thereof: 1 librarian for each 300 students or major fraction thereof. For each additional 400 students or major fraction thereof: 1 librarian. Clerks: 1 clerk for each 600 students or major fraction thereof. The school having 200 students has a full-time librarian and a half-time clerk".

Thanks to continued allocation of the necessary funds the school library has been able to undertake a planned program aimed at achieving the standards set by the American Library Association. The reference section has reached the point at which research projects can be undertaken

without dependence on library sources outside the school itself. Maintaining the recent rate of growth in building our book collection will assure Goffstown High School of an outstanding school library.

The Transportation System

The growth of the school bus transportation system has kept pace with the increase in school enrollments. Daily 683 students are transported on eight busses leased from Clayton Sargent and Contract Bus Service.

The town of Goffstown has been fortunate in having the services of Clayton Sargent, experienced in transportation and a dedicated Goffstown resident, who over the years has provided excellent service at a reasonable cost. As his contract expires in 1970 the school board and school district will be faced with solving the ever growing school transportation problem without the services of Mr. Sargent, who has notified the school board of his plans to terminate his bus contracts in 1970.

It should be noted that tuition students are transported by busses provided by the New Boston and Dunbarton School Districts.

The Hot Lunch Program

The Goffstown Hot Lunch Program provides appetizing and nourishing meals to approximately 1,000 pupils daily. During the 1967-68 school year the program provided more than 180,000 meals to the students of the five Goffstown schools at a most nominal price of 35c per meal for elementary and high school students. Deserving students are provided a meal without cost.

The Federal Government through the State of New Hampshire supports the program by supplying vast quantities of food and by subsidizing in part, the cost of milk.

To date the program has not been supported by Goffstown School District funds except for the purchase of equipment and the maintenance of the cafeterias.

Goffstown Teachers and Principals

The Goffstown School Board is attempting to place all teachers at their place on the salary schedule adopted by the board and approved by the teachers.

The Goffstown teachers' salaries, to attract and retain outstanding teachers for Goffstown, must be competitive with neighboring communities. Goffstown currently enjoys a highly motivated and dedicated staff of teachers. Reasonable conditions of employment and a competitive salary schedule contribute to a stable staff and a healthy educational climate that nourishes desirable pupil growth.

Acknowledgement

I Wish to commend the members of the Goffstown School Board for their dedicated service to provide Goffstown with an outstanding educational system that concerns itself with the full development of the individual boy and girl. I wish further to extend my appreciation for the support and cooperation extended to me by the school board, our new Assistant Superintendent of Schools, Paul Kilmister, the principals, teachers, pupils and citizens of Goffstown as well as the loyal support of the Supervisory Union No. 19 office staff.

Three well child conferences were held at St. Edmonds with pre-school children referred.

The State Department of Health was notified after three cases of measles developed in our elementary school. Free vaccine was then made available for all school children up to the age of 12 years. Two hundred and ninety-eight children were vaccinated. Dr. Snay was the attending physician.

A Screening Clinic for Amblyopia was held in the Goffstown and Bartlett School areas. This clinic was conducted by the local Lion's Clubs, with school nurses and student nurses from The Sacred Heart Hospital assisting. Students from The Future Nurses' Club of the Goffstown High School were also in attendance.

The Goffstown Mothers Club in cooperation with the School Health Services, conducted a preventative program consisting of cleaning the teeth plus an application of topical flouride. Dental Health Education was an integral part of this program. We were most fortunate in having the services of both Mrs. Sally Rising and Mrs. Deborah Brown as our dental hygienists. This program will also be available for the 68 - 69 school year.

Miss Patricia Linehan, a state dental hygienist, attended our pre-school registration. At this time all pre-school children received a dental health evaluation and recommendations were made. A total of one hundred and fourteen children with mothers were present.

Miss Patricia Linehan returned to our Bartlett School and conducted an educational program, at all grade levels.

Optimal health is essential for maximum utilization of educational opportunities. Therefore, the health status of the child bears a direct relationship to the quality of educational achievement. The School Health Service attempts to be a stabilizing influence between the home, the school, and the community, and is ever contributing to the improvement of health and education of the students.

We wish to express our thanks to the Superintendent, Parents, Teachers, and the School Board for their cooperation.

VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The services of the Visiting Nurse Association, a United Fund Agency are available for all of the residents of Goffstown regardless of race, creed or ability to pay. The Association is a home health agency certified to care for Medicare patients.

The Visiting Nurse provides bedside nursing care, treatment and instruction and the Registered Physical Therapist provides physical therapy; all services are carried out according to directions by the patient's physician.

Maternal and child health guidance and instruction is given before and after the arrival of new babies and classes for instruction of expectant parents are held three times yearly at the agency.

Family health guidance is also given with special emphasis on prevention of disease and promotion of health.

1,009 visits were made to Goffstown residents in 1968. Mrs. Grace Gage, R. N. is the nurse in the Goffstown area.
