THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said state, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Jackson on Tuesday, the 14th of March, next, at seven thirty of the clock in the evening, to act on the following subjects:

 To choose all the necessary Town Officers for the coming year ensuing. Polls open at 12:00 noon and close at 6:00 P.M..

To see if the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Jackson Zoning Ordinance.

This amendment establishes a complete revision and recodification of Jackson's Zoning Ordinance including provisions regarding: authority and purpose; non-conforming uses; definitions (including but not limited to condominium, dwelling unit, hotel/motel, lodging house, non-conforming lot, non-conforming structure or building, non-conforming use, minor subdivision); interpretation of zoning district boundary lines; zoning board of adjustment; and elimination of the historic buildings section.

3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Jackson Zoning Ordinance.

This amendment reduces the size of the Village District at its northern end along Route 16 from Jackson's border with Pinkham's Grant to a new District boundary line where the National Forest (Tax Map R-12 U.S.F.S. 62 BI) abuts The Trails and the northernmost property line of Tax Map R-12, Parcel 85 (about a half mile north of Eagle Mountain Road.)

(This amendment shall be effective to amend either the new Zoning Ordinance proposed in Amendment No. 1, should it receive an affirmative vote, or the Ordinance that was in effect as of March 13, 1987.)

4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Plannino Board for the Jackson Zonino Ordinance.

This amendment requires that commercial, industrial and multi-family residential developments meet the same minimum lot size requirements that subdivisions are currently required to meet by adding the words

"and commercial, industrial or multi-family residential developments" following the words subdivision or subdivisions, wherever they may appear in the Minimum Lot Size Section (except in the subsection 3.)

(This amendment shall be effective to amend either the new Zoning Ordinance proposed in Amendment No. 1, should it receive an affirmative vote, or the Ordinance that was in effect as of March 13, 1989.)

 To see if the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Jackson Zoning Ordinance.

This amendment requires that multi-family residential developments be subject to the same maximum number of lot or dwelling unit standards as is currently required only of subdivisions by adding the words "or multi-family residential development" to the first sentence of Minimum Lot Size sub-section 3 following the word "subdivision".

(This amendment shall be effective to amend either the new Zoning Ordinance proposed in Amendment No. 1, should it receive an affirmative vote, or the Ordinance that was in effect as of March 13, 1989.)

 \underline{NOTICE} : Articles 2 through 5 will be on a special ballot. Polls will be open from 12:00 noon to 6:00 p.m. for voting on these Articles.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which comes available during the fiscal year. in accordance with R.S.A. 31:95b.
- 55. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of a lien or tax deeded property in accordancee with R.S.A. 80:42 and as justice may require.
- 56. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
- 57. To act upon other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1988 was a dramatic year for the Town of Jackson. It was a year when the Town and its citizenry looked toward the future. The purchase of the Gray's Inn property probably best exemplifies our eyes to the future. Jackson will grow in numbers as the years pass. Already our Highway Department is in need of more space. The Board of Selectmen decided to inquire about the availability of the thirty odd acres where Gray's Inn stood. The time was right, heirs to the Loew estate, the owners of the property were willing to sell. A compromise price was met, citizen input was accepted, and the purchase took place. The Highway, Police and Fire Departments are adjacent to the Gray's Inn property. Someday when an expansion to those departments is needed, the Gray's Inn property will fit the bill.

After many years of work by several members of the community, the Wildcat Brook, on the twentieth anniversay of the Federal Wild and Scenic River Program, received a Wild and Scenic Designation ensuring that the river will forever appear as it now does cascading through the Town of Jackson. All the work surrounding the designation was yet another example of citizen vigilance in Jackson. The process was lengthy and time consuming, but worthy of great effort; and all who worked so hard should be commended for their efforts.

Once again, as has been the habit of the Selectmen of Jackson, they met with over a dozen members of the community to look over the 1989 proposed budget. It should be noted here that all the departments in the Town spent less than they had budgeted for in 1988. We believe this indicates that Jacksonians spend wisely and only when necessary. Yes, taxes will be up this year, but they will rise out of necessity. It should also be noted here that Jackson has one of the lowest equalized tax rates in the entire state.

On the solid waste front, Jackson finds itself in a position not unlike most of the municipalities in the Granite State if not the country. Largely because of environmental concerns, the landfill will be replaced by a transfer station. A contract to ship Jackson garbage to Sanco in Bethlehem has been signed, and it is expensive. At the moment there are no alternatives. The actual cost of shipping garbage each year for the next three years (the term of the contract) is difficult to estimate. The Board of Selectmen will keep a close watch on costs and will do everything in its power to keep costs down. Recycling may be in the offing as a cost cutting measure. Fees have also been discussed. It's too early to make any decisions, only time can help us make the best judgments.

In closing, it's customary to thank all the people in town government who have given their time to the various boards and departments. A special thanks goes to 'Peggy' Kramp who volunteers her time to help keep the transfers of property updated and Ruth Williams who pinch-hits when Ellie Lang is on vacation or needs an extra hand in the Selectmen's Office. Government by the people would be impossible without all of you. On that score, there are positions that need to be filled. Please contact the Board of Selectmen to find out how you can help your Town, and remember the three Selectmen are accessible and willing to hear from all the Town residents on matters pertinent to the smooth running of the prettiest town in the State of New Hampshire.

The year 1988 was another busy and productive one for the Jackson Public Library. Circulation increased as did attendance. Our librarian, Mrs. Priscilla Bissell, and her assistant, Mrs. Susan Way, continued their fine work. JACKSON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Jackson Conservation Commission has met monthly as prescribed by statute. However, the Commission also held a number of additional meetings to conduct field investigations of sites requiring Dredge and Fill Permits from the New Hampshire Wetlands Board or Corps of Engineers.

The Commission has two new members required by the resignation of John Howe for personal reasons and Margaret Connolly whose term expired. The new members are Richard May and Veikko Hurme. The Commission expresses its gratitude to John and Margaret for their efforts on behalf of the Commission and residents of Jackson.

As in previous years the Commission continues to maintain the various river vistas north and south of the village on Route 16, at the Covered Bridge, at Profile Rock, along Jackson Falls and various trails under our jurisdiction. The Commission wishes to thank the various individuals who have aided this effort.

Ned Beecher of the Tin Mine Conservation Commission delivered the first draft of the Prospect Farm Trail Guide in late December. It now goes to the printer after some minor revisions, and distribution will begin in early 1989.

On October 28, 1988 President Ronald Reagan signed into law the Wild and Scenic Designation for Jackson's Wildcat River. This effort by the citizens of Jackson and organizations local, state and national was acknowledged on November 15th by the American River Commission, which awarded the American River Colleague Award in recognition of its outstanding work and accomplishments in the evaluation and protection of the Wildcat River in New Hampshire.

On December 12th The Conservation Foundation awarded the Town of Jackson the Successful Communities Designation.

On December 29th the local paper The MOUNTAIN EAR awarded the citizens of Jackson the "Ear of the Year" Award for their efforts in obtaining the Wild and Scenic Designation for the Wildcat River.

The Commission continues to need your help in monitoring the Town's environment; clean water without pollution, run-off or erosion are vital for the survival of all of Jackson's citizenry. If you have any questions about our environment which falls under the Commission's jurisdiction, call or notify any member of the Commission.

The Commission meets monthly on the second Thursday of the month at the Jackson Public Library at $4:00\ P.M.$

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

This past winter was fairly normal. All winging was done with the grader as a wing was purchased for the Dresser grader. A considerable amount of time was spent taking care of the skating rink and putting up Christmas wreaths and lights.

The highway crew painted the plows, dump bodies, and plow equipment readying it for the winter season. The winter sand was stockpiled early in the summer.

The crew cut roadside brush and limbs, spent a lot of time burning and putting out the fire at the dump, built a new transfer station building, rebuilt the road at the site, and put up the new street signs made by William Brown.

All roadside ditches on Tyrol were cleaned, and we mixed 750 yards of pugmill mix and put it out on the roads with the grader. Eagle Mountain Road, sections of Whitney's Hill, lower portion of Highlands Road, a portion of Tin Mine Road, Thorn Mountain Road, and all roads on Tyrol were tarred. New culverts were put in where needed. The balance of the flood damage repairs were completed, and the Town received a final check for \$12,007.00 from the State and Federal Government to close out work under this project.

The Road Agent supervised the construction of three development roads to be sure that they were built to town road specifications; namely, High Pastures East at Black Mountain, Cameron Drive at Eagle Mountain East off Wilson Road, and at Wentworth Resort.

Howard Kelley was hired to mow the park and other Town grounds, and Robert Tibbetts mowed the roadsides again this fall.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden, and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Persons wishing to burn large brush piles or burn over fields must notify the Town Forest Fire Warden a few days in advance so that he may check the site prior to issuance of a permit. A permit is needed for all outdoor burning (including incinerators) once the ground is clear of snow in the immediate area. Burning is only allowed before 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining. Permits are available at Ellis Grocery Store during regular store hours or at the Forest Warden's home evenings. For large brush piles, permits must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden.

Enforcement of a state timer harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdeamor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, he uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. For more information, contact one of the persons mentioned above.

ANNUAL REPORT OF JACKSON FIRE DEPARTMENT - 1988

The fire department made a total of 77 runs last year with over half of them being runs to the town dump. We would like to extend our thanks to the Town officials and the Jackson Police Department for their continued assistance and cooperation.

The equipment of the department consists of two engines, one tanker and a Jeep utility vehicle provided by the N. H. Department of Resources and Economic Development.

Engine I is a 1972 International pumping engine built by American LaFrance. Although I7 years of age this truck is in good condition, but parts shortages have developed and will be more acute as the unit exceeds 20 years of age. At this time there is no reason to believe that this truck cannot continue to be serviceable for three to five years.

Engine 3 is an 1979 International pumping engine built by Grumman Corporation. This is the department's front line attack piece and is currently in top running order.

The tanker is a 1962 International M-747 military chassis that was converted in 1984 for fire department service by Farrar Corporation. The chassis had been retired by the U. S. Army some years before and was acquired through Memphis Equipment. Over the past two years this truck has had a series of mechanical problems that have consumed most of the department's maintenance budget and hundreds of man hours. Parts for this chassis are not available locally and must be obtained from Memphis Equipment. This truck was out of service for more than 50% of the time last summer. In the interest of maintaining good fire protection, the department is requesting funding this year to replace this unit. There is currently over \$93,000 in the Capital Reserve Fund to apply to the purchase of a truck.

The station is in good condition and renovations to the second floor meeting room are continuing using bar-b-que profits and member's labor. The equipment, supplies and safety equipment are adequate. All the men are now suited with nomex fire coats and most have nomex bunker pants.

The department would like to extend thanks to Chief Jim Burns for his involvement and dedication over the past two years.

We would like to thank everyone for their cooperation and support of our annual fund raiser. Since this will be our 25th annual Chicken Bar-b-que, we will be hosting a two-day event over the Labor Day Weekend.

1988 was our busiest year on record. We have had 240 calls for service, that is one every 36 hours.

We now have fifteen full time members of which most have advanced training. Like the local fire departments, we are always looking for new members who are willing to put in a lot of time and effort, with the greatest reward being a "Thank You" in someone's time of need. So instead of finding fault, contact your local fire or ambulance service, and help us help others.

Our donations this year are about seven hundred dollars. This money can go towards training and equipment, updating our service to state of the art. It will also help offset the costs of being tested for transferable medical disease for our members.

Our ambulance is now seven years old. At the end of 1988 we have invested about fifteen hundred dollars in repairs to engine and electrical system. In 1990 we will have to purchase a new ambulance at an approximate cost of seventy-five thousand dollars. Any and all tax deductible specified donations would be gratefully accepted and recognized. Please help us to keep all costs as low as possible. I would like to take this opportunity to assure everyone, that when your ambulance is down for repairs, our team is not. Our response time is still just a matter of a few minutes. Actual transport to Memorial Hospital would be made by North Conway Ambulance Service, with our personnel in attendance. We all work as a team, and many thanks to all.

In closing, I would like to thank the local fire and police personnel for their help on many of our calls.

JACKSON PLANNING BOARD 1989

The Jackson Planning Board was quite busy with a number of subdivisions and other issues in 1988. Though large subdivision applications and approvals slowed in the later part of the year, we did issue approvals for Mirror Lake, The Trails and Eagle Mountain East Subdivisions. Many other smaller subdivisions and lot line adjustments came before the Board.

As the number of applications slowed, it provided the Board an opportunity to discuss and seek resolutions to some of the difficult issues which we faced on various applications. The issue of back lots, roads, and driveways seemed to emerge many times during the year. The Board did approve the adoption of the Town's Road Specifications.

Work on the Master Plan was completed after much hard work from many concerned citizens. The Master Plan was adopted and will help in providing direction and information for the Board.

As in previous years the Board appreciates the technical assistance from the North Country Council in dealing with the complex technical issues that we encounter.

The Town appropriated \$10,485.90 to cover Planning Board expenses and North Country Council dues. The total expenses were \$9,563.22 of which \$5,731.62 was paid to the North Country Council for the Circuit rider and other travel and administrative expenses. The balance was for associated expenses of recording fees, advertising costs, secretarial services, postage and copies. Total receipts for 1988 were \$3,729.76, leaving a net cost to the Town of \$4,547.56 for Planning Board expenses.

A plan to recodify the Zoning Ordinance was undertaken and reviewed by the Planning Board. This recodification took a great deal of time by the involved members to whom we are grateful for their contributions. This recodification will be voted on at Town Meeting.

Again, this year I would like to thank all the Planning Board members for their dedication and hard work. Through their untiring efforts, the members have helped to make this town one which we can proud to live in.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC. ANNUAL REPORT

North Country Council observed its sixteenth year of successful operation in 1988. The Council, chartered under NII RSA 36:45, provides non-profit local and regional planning assistance to member municipalities. The Board of Directors determined that last year's work program would focus on community planning, economic development, solid waste, transportation and housing. The Council maintains four standing committees which monitor local issues and determine Council policy. Overall, the Council's major objective is to work with North Country towns in solving local and regional problems.

The Town of Jackson participated for the fifth consecutive year in the Council's Circuit Rider Planning Program. The Program provided monthly assistance to the Planning Board by reviewing subdivision applications, scheduling site visits, researching planning-related questions and proposing amendments to the zoning ordinance. The updated Master Plan was adopted in July and a total revision of the Zoning Ordinance is underway. In addition to general planning assistance, the Council has provided solid waste disposal advice. In particular, recycling analysis and implementation proposal was submitted to the Town, coordination of the Carroll County Solid Waste Study Committee occurred and a proposal which will result in a 20-year solid waste disposal plan was prepared by the Council.

Community planning assistance continues to dominate our staff resources. New state mandates and rapid residential and commercial growth throughout the region placed an increasing burden on local planning and zoning boards in 1988. Regional workshops, technical bulletins and newsletters, ordinance review and update, as well as review of specific subdivision and site plan applications are a sampling of the myriad services performed this year for our membership. The Council also co-sponsored the popular Municipal Law Lecture Series which reviewed new case law and other specific areas of legal interest to local officials.

In addition, grant writing and grant administration continues as important components of the Council's work program. Currently, NCC staff are working in twelve towns administering fifteen Community Development Block Grant programs. These projects include feasibility studies for local infrastructure needs, water and sewer construction projects and targeted housing rehabilitation programs for income eligible residents.

In summary, it is important to understand that the North Country Council is organized and administered for the benefit of its constituents, local town governments. Our future success is, in large part, contingent upon your participation in Council activities. We rely on and appreciate involvement of town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.

If the offer is refused, the Selectmen will start Eminent Domain Procedure to take possession of the property for the Town. A non-binding show of hands was taken to determine the support of the voters present, and the vote was unanimous in support of the Selectmen proceeding with the above.

Moderator Abbott advised that there were again too many social service type articles on the Warrant, and they should be eliminated. It was noted that there is legislation now in the Legislature to eliminate items on the Warrant not germane to the Town.

The Meeting was dissolved at 11:06 AM.

MINUTES OF THE JACKSON SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING March 23, 1988

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Raymond H. Abbott, Jr., at the Jackson Town Hall at $7:05~\rm p.m.$

The results of the voting on March 8, 1988, were:

APTICLE 1. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Jackson School Board to apply for, accept and expend in the name of the School District, such gifts, advances, grants in aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may be available or forthcoming from any source during the fiscal year, in accord with and upon such terms as are found in RSA 198:20-b. The article was passed.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$72,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing two school buses; and to determine whether the voters will authorize the withdrawal of \$68,000.00, or some other sum, from the Capital Reserve Fund (School Buses) to be applied to the purchase of two school buses; and to authorize the Trustees of the Capital Reserve Fund (School Buses) to withdraw said monies and to pay the same over to the School District Treasurer on 1 July 1988, with the balance to be raised by taxation. There was some discussion questioning the need to replace the school buses every five years. The School Board hopes in the future to time new bus purchases so that both buses will not need replacing in the same year. The article was passed.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the School District will vote to contribute to the already established Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA Chapter 35, as amended, to be held in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds for the Town of Jackson; said Capital Reserve Fund to be maintained solely for the future purchase of school buses; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund (School Buses). After a short discussion on the benefits of capital reserve funds, the article was passed.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the School District will vote to contribute to the already established Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA Chapter 35, as amended, to be held in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds for the Town of Jackson; said Capital Reserve Fund to be maintained solely for the future purchase of instructional equipment; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in the

Capital Reserve Fund (Instructional Equipment). Article was passed.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the School District will vote to contribute to the already established Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA Chapter 35, as amended, to be held in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds for the Town of Jackson; said Capital Reserve Fund to be maintained solely for unanticipated special education costs; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund. Article was passed.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the School District will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$15,000.00 or some other sum, from the Capital Reserve Fund (Special Education) to be applied to the accrued unanticipated Special Education cost for the 1987-88 school year; and to authorize the Trustees of the Capital Reserve Fund (Special Education) to withdraw said monies and to pay the same over to the School District Treasurer on or before 30 June 1988. It was pointed out that the phrase "or some other sum" could be misleading, after which the article was passed.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the School District will vote to appropriate (funded by the Capital Reserve) as supplemental appropriations to the 1987-88 budget year for the purpose of meeting the unanticipated expenses in the account of Special Education. Nancy Freeman moved to raise the sum of \$15,000.00 instead of "what sum." The article was passed.

ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money the School District will vote to raise and appropriate as a deficit appropriation tot he 1987-88 budget year for the purpose of meeting the unanticipated expenses in the accounts of Special Education and Regular Education Tuition. Willis Kelley suggested that the School District raise and appropriate \$40,000.00. This was moved by Shirley Perry and seconded by Frank Connolly; the article was passed.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the School District will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA Chapter 35, as amended, to be held in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds for the Town of Jackson; said Capital Reserve Fund to be established solely for improvements to the Jackson Grammar School property; and to see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund (Property Improvement). The article was passed.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the School District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory

obligations of the District. It was pointed out that the taxpayers pay \$1.00 for every \$70,000.00 appropriated, based on the estimated, increased (as of April 1) tax value of the Town. Voted on line by line, total appropriations came to \$547,125.00. The article was passed.

ARTICLE 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. Dr. Bill Jutras announced that last night in Conway there was a 62% yes vote to separate from SAU #9. He predicted that Concord will probably say no, at which point Conway could go the State Legislature. Regardless of what happens with Conway and SAU #9, Conway will always take our students at Kennett.

The cooperative system of administration was also discussed. Dr. Jutras explained that, under this system, all school districts would come together and form one School Board, thereby eliminating the Jackson School Board. Although this cooperative system would be a dream come true for the SAU (not dealing with nine different School Districts), the issue of local control has prevented this system from happening.

Dr. Jutras concluded that the Jackson School District will not feel the effects of Conway's vote for a few years, if at all, but it is important to be aware of how the situation is developing.

Paul Lodi spoke for all of us at this well attended meeting and thanked the School Board for their hard work and dedication.

The meeting was dissolved at 8:15 PM.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

by Dr. William A. Jutras

"Growth" is, for yet another year, the word which describes our student enrollment at the elementary level, the quality of education, and community support for the nine schools in SAU #9.

Every elementary school has felt the impact of the changing population of the surrounding community. This is a time simultaneously of much apprehension and hope. We are concerned that it will be difficult to continue to provide strong instructional programs, and yet we know that if issues are thoughtfully and deliberately addressed, we will succeed. In my opinion, it is good to look to a future of growth and what that could bring.

It is encouraging that two communities have already met the challenge brought on by growth in enrollment. Tamworth residents supported a substantial addition and renovations to the K.A. Brett School, and Conway residents in a history-making vote, approved the construction of one new elementary school, and additions and renovations to two others. Not to be outdone, the districts of Bartlett, Freedom, Jackson, and Madison are making serious plans for improvement and expansion of physical facilities. Much of the pressure for these plans, in addition to population expansion, comes from significantly elevated expectations for quality from the State through its minimum standards, and from self-imposed standards of excellence in our schools.

In the latter case, we have selected the standards of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. All eight elementary schools are now accredited by this organization. (Of course, Kennett High School already had this distinction.) We are among the first in the Northeast to have accomplished this, and it was through our own initiative that this happened. Aside from the status conferred, accreditation is a clear signal to the community that our educational professionals willingly open themselves to scrutiny by colleagues in other school systems. Using standards of the association, strengths have been identified and recommendations made to serve as guidelines for further growth in the guality of education in the schools of SAU #9.

In the area of academics, our students have grown. Results on the California Achievement Test show an overall improvement, continuing the trend of the past several years. This has been due clearly to the leadership of principals and

the skills and hard work of teachers. Curriculum efforts in Language Arts and Science are expected to yield dividends now and in the next few years. Committees for Gifted and Talented and Health curricula are very active. Finally, Vocational Education will become an increasingly important facet in career preparation for many at the high school.

Concerned about the substance abuse problems for many youth, Kennett High School is leading the way toward solutions. A grant for training by the Northeast Regional Center for Drug Free Schools was awarded through the efforts of Conway School District's Substance Abuse Prevention Coordinator. Administrators, police, parents, students, teachers, and community members have become actively involved in solving problems associated with substance abuse. Sincere gratitude is extended to so many who have contributed to efforts thus far. The experience has been most heartening.

Special Education - Total School Involvement, has been this year's theme. Although still early, it is clear that there has been a heightened sense of awareness, understanding, and appreciation for the importance of serving our students with special needs. There is a nearly complete and expanded staff, and the tremendous work being done is being felt positively by students and parents alike.

Organization of this school administrative unit again was in the state's limelight. Conway's request to form its own SAU was denied by the State Board of Education this January. Nevertheless, multidistrict SAU's in New Hampshire will continue to be the object of study as student populations increase, and the urgency of local control causes some districts to feel that they can operate on their own. The matter of SAU #9's structure is far from settled. In the meantime, the addition of an Assistant Superintendent to the Central Office staff is permitting improved administrative services to the nine districts comprising the largest SAU in the state (based on the existence of nine independent school boards and the SAU board).

The total student population in SAU #9 is now 2,583, with significant increases occurring in the elementary schools. Students are receiving a better education and are achieving in the classrooms and in interscholastic athletics. The communities are providing even more support for our schools by active participation in school affairs and by positive votes at district meetings. We are growing.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT by David Poon

The Jackson Grammar School has experienced some growing pains this past year as we have seen our enrollment increase to 33 from last year's figure of 22. The projected growth figures are estimated to increase to the following levels listed below:

The above figures do not include any influx of new families which may move into the area and thus may actually underestimate true enrollment totals.

Nevertheless, future growth is almost a certainty. Although not unexpected, the anticipated increases in student enrollment over the next 5 years do present educational and administrative challenges which must be addressed. The growth will be particularly "felt" among the lower levels of the grades. Consequently, efforts are underway to determine whether or not the present space within the current structure will accommodate the educational needs of our students. A study is underway to determine the feasibility of building an addition to the school or renting an existing space within the town for classroom purposes.

The Jackson Grammar School has contracted several new staff member services from the Bartlett School in an effort to meet state minimum educational student quidelines. These new services include quidance, speech, and instrumental music program, and health education. In addition, the Jackson and Bartlett School Boards have ratified a 5 year tuition agreement for grades seven and eight. Students entering those grades will be tuitioned to Bartlett upon graduating from Jackson.

All of these efforts have helped the Jackson Grammar School to receive an initial institutional accreditation by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) which is retroactive to November 18, 1987. The commission's letter of accreditation commended the community and school staff for ensuring that an "atmosphere of concern and nurturing is maintained" within the school.

Areas that still need to be addressed before the five year follow-up report include the development of:

- (1) A coordinated curriculum for grades K-6.
- (2) A plan for staff development.
- (3) The following policies:
 - (a) Children's Discipline Code
 - (b) Basic Instructional Standards
 - (c) Procedures for Emergencies
 - (d) Health and Safety

Policies a-d have already been developed, and we are working to comply with the other two areas in order to ensure future accreditation status.

The Jackson Grammar School's curriculum has been updated in the areas of math, science, and social studies. We are going to be purchasing another computer and additional educational software for our students.

Finally, the existing bus routes are being reviewed by the Long-Range Planning Committee to iron out any inconsistencies or inequities in the system. The committee is also working to determine the safeness of existing roads for bus travel. The committee will be making recommendations to the principal and school board for future action.

The past year has been one of change and renewal for the school. It is my hope that the Jackson Grammar School continue to pursue academic excellence and be a vital link to the Jackson community. With your support and involvement we will continue to make that goal a reality for the sake of students of Jackson. Do they deserve any less from us?

AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Kembers of the School Administrative Unit Board School Administrative Unit No. 9 Conway, New Hampshire

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the School Administrative Unit No. 9 as of and for the year ended June 30, 1988, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the School Administrative Unit No. 9 at June 30, 1988, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The individual fund financial statements and schedule listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the School Administrative Unit No. 9. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

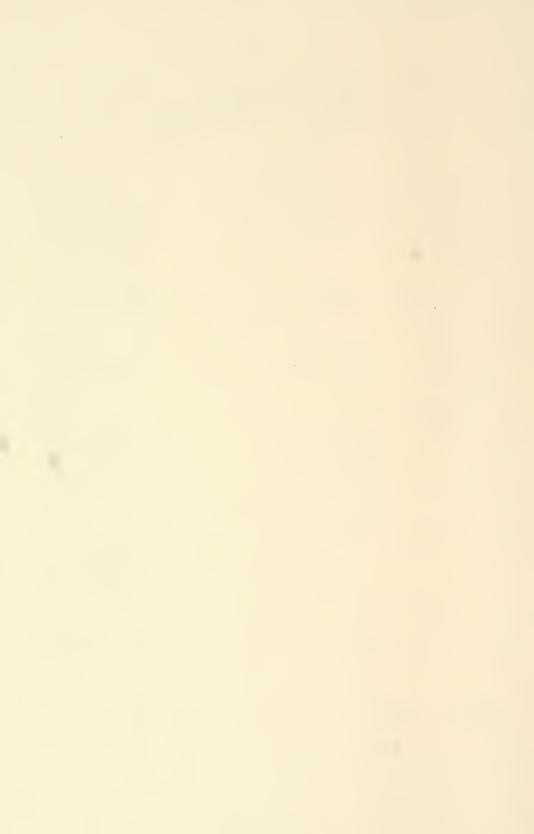
