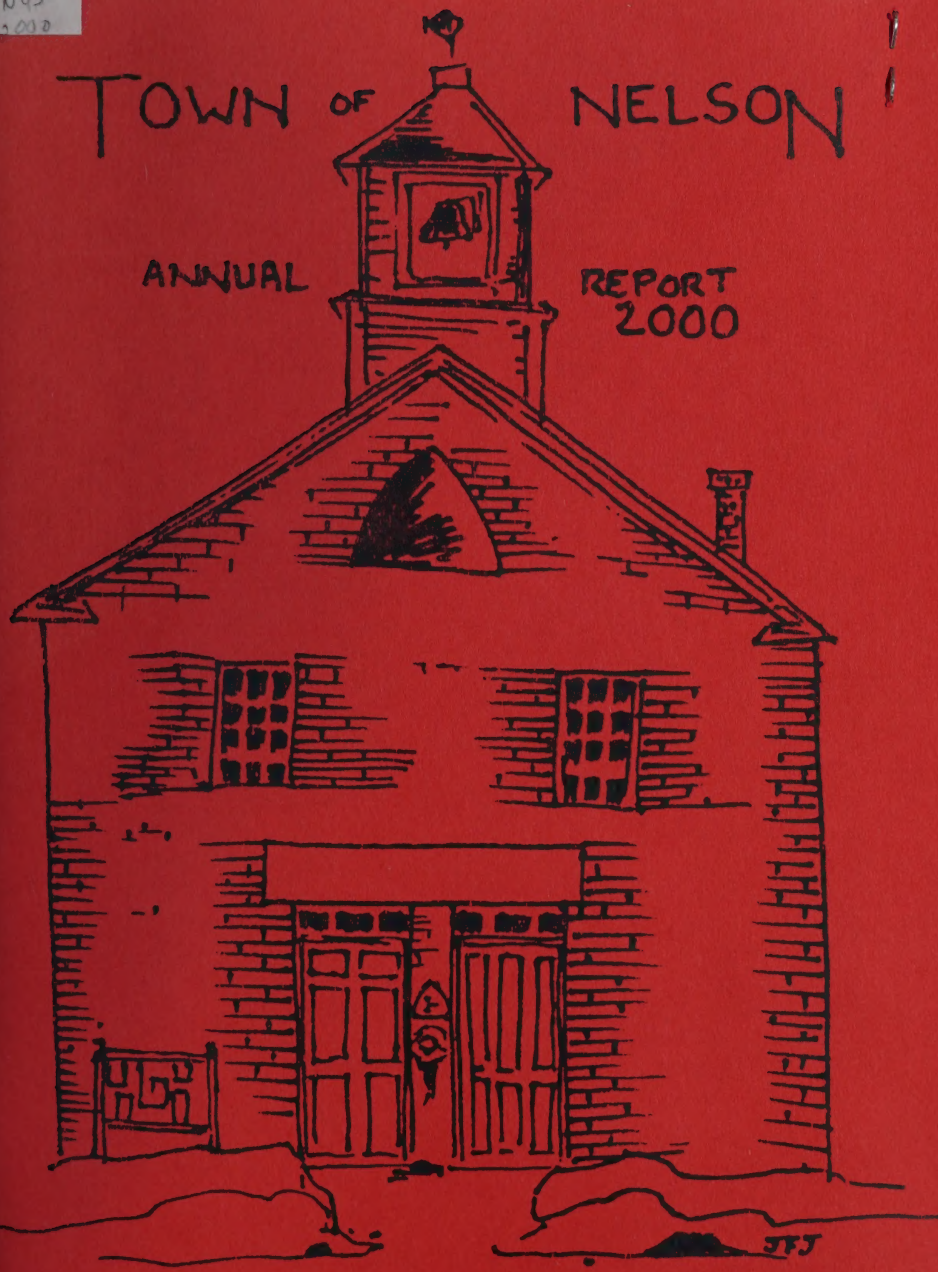

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This has been a year of many changes. First, the Selectmen wish to thank Michael French and David Birchenough for their years of hard work on the Board. Thanks also, to Cheryl Gline, Administrative Assistant, who moved to Arizona. We were fortunate to have had her service for two years. On March 1st, Christine Giroux succeeded Cheryl. She is doing well handling a myriad of subject matter.

The Board is very appreciative of the willingness of Michael Tarr to become Acting Road Agent. We think he has done a marvelous job. Recently, Bryan Trudelle was hired to assist Mike. Both have the required CDL license.

In early fall, John Bly and Brendon Bosquet were hired as our Police Department. Both meet New Hampshire Police Standards and are certified in various police activities/skills (i.e.: operating our new radar gun!).

Through Roger Turcotte's efforts we acquired a \$5,000.00 computer for police use at no charge to the town. It was available through a government program. Over the years Roger has been wonderfully helpful, filling in as our Police Chief as necessary; and, we thank him very much.

The town-wide property revaluation by the Department of Revenue Administration continued with new values being made available in late spring. About ninety percent (90%) of the taxpayers have accepted them.

The renovations were completed on the first floor of the Old Brick Schoolhouse so that the Town Offices could be moved to that space. The new work areas are very attractive and the historical integrity of the building has been retained. It is a great accomplishment to have met the requirements of the American Disabilities Act (ADA), NH Life Safety and NH Labor Administrative Rules.

Many thanks to the residents who served on the committees for this project.

Our Archivist, Roberta Wingerson, is displaying some of our town's most precious treasures in a showcase in the Town Office. Currently, she is exhibiting our first town book of minutes dated 1755! By the way, about 50 residents attended our Town Office open house on December 13th. A highlight was Bert making a stereopticon available with a photo card of the famous Hotel Nelson.

Regarding 911, the Selectmen are happy to report that this project is almost complete. David Birchenough continues to be our town coordinator.

The Selectmen have not received word from the NH Supreme Court as to the decision about our case involving the winter maintenance of the Granite Lake Road / Old Route 9 highway. None of the justices who heard Attorney Bill Robinson present our case in May, 1999, are sitting on the bench now. A few months ago the Selectmen accepted an offer from the court to allow two justices to listen to the tape of the May hearing. We have no idea when the judges will render a decision.

By the way, the Board of Selectmen wish to thank Attorney Robinson who served as town lawyer for his excellent work. Our new town Attorney is Gary Kinyon. He is an expert in Municipal Law.

It is the desire of the Selectmen to continue to improve the personnel policy for town employees. As of April 1st, full time employees will have the opportunity to participate in the New Hampshire Retirement Plan.

The Board wishes to thank all the other town officials and employees for their hard work.

TOWN WARRANT

TO THE INHABITANTS of the Town of Nelson, in the County of Cheshire, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs: YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED to meet in the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, 2001, at 12:00 noon to act upon the following articles:

POLLS will open at 12:00 noon and close at 8:00 p.m.
BUSINESS MEETING will start at 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

1. To choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$134,275 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2000 appropriation was \$121,829.)
3. To see if the Town will vote to modify the elderly exemptions from property tax based on the assessed value, for qualified tax payers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years of age, \$25,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$37,500; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$50,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$20,400 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$30,400. The taxpayer can not have assets of more than \$35,500. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500 to purchase a used Minolta copier model C355 with a 5 year guarantee. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,608 for support of the Town Library. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 1999 appropriation was \$13,875.)
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,636 in support of social service agencies which provide assistance to Nelson residents. The agencies chosen to receive funds are: Home Health Care (\$550), Monadnock Family Services (\$586), The Keene Community Kitchen, Inc. (\$1000) and Southwestern Community Services (\$500). The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (In 2000, these agencies were voted to receive contributions from the Town in the amount of \$1,607.)
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to be added to the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund. No withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2000 appropriation was \$2,000. The fund balance on 12/31/00 was \$5,213.17.)
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,000 for reroofing the Old Brick Schoolhouse. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for repairs to the Town Barn. Labor for this project shall be paid from the general highway budget. (Article #18) The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH PLANNING & ZONING

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$645 for dues to belong to the Southwest Regional Planning Commission. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2000 appropriation was \$636.)

ARTICLES DEALING WITH SERVICE AND PROTECTION

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500 as a subsidy for ambulance service for the ensuing year, it being understood that residents will still be charged for individual calls. This sum represents payment for 5 quarters. The City of Keene has not yet billed for the 4th quarter of 2000. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The appropriation for 2000 was \$4,375.)

12. To see if the Town will vote for the Fire Chief position to be an appointed position not an elected position. This will become effective at the March 2002 town election. The Selectmen recommend this article.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for the proper expenses of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2000 appropriation was \$8,000.)

14. To see if the Town will vote for the Police Officer position to be an appointed position not an elected position. This will become effective at the March 2002 town election. The Selectmen recommend this article.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,500 for the proper expenses of the Police Department. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2000 appropriation was \$6,500.)

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,375 for the fourth year's payment for the police vehicle. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

17. To see if the Town will vote for the Road Agent position to be an appointed position not an elected position. This will become effective at the March 2002 town election. The Selectmen recommend this article.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$161,000 for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year budget. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

\$128,215.61 TO BE RAISED BY TAXES

\$ 32,784.39 to be designated from the
Highway Block Grant
(The 2000 appropriation was \$150,000.)

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,365 for the fourth year's payment for the highway one ton dump truck. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. It is understood that no withdrawals may be made from this fund for the purchase of road equipment except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee. The Road Equipment Committee (which includes the Selectmen) recommends this appropriation. (The 2000 appropriation was \$10,000. The fund balance on 12/31/00 was \$17,946.43.)

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for the necessary paving & sealing project on Murdough Hill Road. Labor for this project shall be paid from the general highway budget (Article #18). The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

OTHER ARTICLES

22. To transact any other business or discuss other warrant proposals as may legally be brought before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE NELSON FIRE CHIEF

Exciting news has come to Nelson and it's fire department. By the time of this year's town meeting we will have taken delivery of our new fire truck. To start with I want to thank all of you who supported our request at last year's town meeting for the appropriation of funds for this new truck. It's been quite a year with approval, finalizing the specifications, going out to bid, deciding upon the contractor and awarding the bid. Involvement has also dealt with paint specifications, trip to the vendor, email's with pictures of it's status and all the decisions associated with making this all happen. Our initial work on the vehicle will be getting it all equipped; radio, hoses, nozzles and all the other tools needed to make it a functional unit and dealing with the appropriate training for it's use. Hopefully this will be kept to a minimum and this unit like the others will be for just in case something happens.

We have completed our purchase program during the last three years of new SCBA's. These units are all in service now bringing the department up to having the latest standards and being equipped with the latest technology has to offer.

As in years past, we continue to look for individuals who are interested in joining the fire department, especially those who are or want to become an EMT (Emergency Medical Technician). We manage with a couple First Responders, but we are always in need for adding people in this area to provide a better service to the town. The department will pay for the training and will support the individuals in their activities. Anyone interested should contact the fire department.

This past year has seen support done with the construction work at the Old Brick Schoolhouse as the town offices were moved down stairs. Meetings with the architect, contractor and inspections were done as progress was made. This improved location with the required fire safety features should allow the town many future years of service.

Total number of calls is 18, down slightly from last years 20. Rescue calls continue to play a major roll in our activities. Again this year as in the past, we supported the mutual aid system which is so beneficial to all the towns involved. It is ever so helpful to have this support.

REMEMBER, TO MINIMIZE CHIMNEY FIRES, WE SUGGEST TO EVERYONE THAT USES A WOOD STOVE TO HAVE THEIR CHIMNEYS CLEANED FREQUENTLY AND TO INSPECT THEM ON A REGULAR BASIS DURING THE HEATING SEASON. BURN DRY, SEASONED WOOD TO MINIMIZE CREOSOTE BUILD UP IN THE CHIMNEY. ALSO, CHECK YOUR SMOKE DETECTORS AND REPLACE THE BATTERIES ON A REGULAR BASIS. IF YOU DON'T HAVE SMOKE DETECTORS, THEN IT'S HIGHLY RECOMMENDED THAT YOU PURCHASE AND INSTALL THEM. THEY MAY SAVE YOUR LIFE SOMEDAY.

I would like to again thank all the active members for their continued effort and support. Remember, to report a fire or other emergency, DIAL 911 or 352-1100.

FIRE PERMITS

As stated in New Hampshire state law (RSA 224:2713), "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.

Burning may be done before 9 am or after 5 pm. If it is necessary to burn during the day for commercial purposes, a special permit is required from the state Forest Ranger. It is also possible to burn during the day if it is raining, however, a written permit is still required. Written permission is required if an individual wishes to burn on land belonging to someone else, as well. If individuals wish to burn in an incinerator, a seasonal permit may be issued, but the burning must still be done before 9 am or after 5 pm. In Nelson, there is no charge for these permits at this time.

TOWN OF NELSON ROAD AGENT REPORT

This past year has been one that I found very challenging. On May 1, 2000, I unexpectedly found myself as the acting road agent for the town of Nelson. Much of the routine maintenance and needed projects were done alone being the only one working for the highway department for three of the months from this past year.

This past spring, for a third year in a row, was an easy one. For those residents living on graveled roads, there was very little mud. The usual spring graveling was completed with approximately 1800 yards of gravel being used on the town roads. The grading of town roads was completed by the first of June, just in time for the summer traffic.

The summer months were designated to much routine housekeeping maintenance. The town did rent a backhoe for a month to clean clogged culverts and replace any culverts that may have been deteriorated. This type of maintenance does help for good drainage and prevents costly washouts. Roadside mowing was completed, brush was cut, and ditches were cleaned.

This fall the highway department started preparing for the upcoming winter and spring seasons. Henniker Crushed Stone was hired to crush 3000 yards of gravel from the town gravel pit to help replenish the highway department supply. The highway department did bring in all of its winter sand.

One large project was completed this past fall. The bridge at Granite Lake was replaced with a large culvert and guardrails were installed. The old bridge was in much needed repair and would not withstand the large traffic volume. The project was time-consuming with its many meetings and needed permits to be obtained. Part of the project did have to be contracted out due to the staff shortage in the highway department. Phil Hamilton was hired to do some of the necessary digging.

The town of Nelson highway department is proposing a budget of \$161,000.00. From this budget \$150,000.00 is for highway and equipment maintenance, utility expenses, and employee wages. This will be the fourth year with the same budget. In 2000 the highway department was able to operate under budget by \$6,193.38. The additional \$11,000.00 added to the budget is due to personal benefits now offered to the highway department employees. We found it necessary to offer these benefits due to the job market and the needs of its qualified applicants.

For this upcoming year the highway department is once again proposing the following two warrant articles. Last year these articles had been defeated, however, the highway department does feel that these projects are necessary.

The first proposal is to renovate the old town barn. This building is 70 years old and needs upgrading. Soil testing has been completed and shows that there is no contamination in the ground. To prevent any contamination in the future, the highway department would like to cement the currently dirt floor. This building is not heated and needs to be insulated so that it could be heated in the future.

The second proposal is to reclaim the section of Murdough Hill Road from the top of the hill to Old Route 9. This section is 2800 feet in length. This road is heavily traveled and is in much need of repair. The base of the road has failed resulting in a rough road surface. To properly correct this section of Murdough Hill Road the following needs to be done: the existing pavement will be ground up and used as a base; underdrain and new culverts need to be installed; 2000 tons of new gravel will be added to the road; to complete the job, the road will need to be repaved.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT 2000

The Olivia Rodham Memorial Library continues to have a high attendance each day. Patrons using the library, throughout the year, numbered 3,950, an increase of nine percent from 1999. Library programs, in conjunction with book circulation, the use of the periodical corner, and computer access, contribute to the active environment of the library. The librarians, with the consistent help of volunteers, have developed a routine that has established a companionable library environment.

The library connection to the Internet may be used by library patrons for information and e-mail access. The library homepage, top.monad.net/~oliviari, has webpages about the library history, a link to the Nelson Grapevine Newsletter, Trustees of the Library, library programs and procedures, including a link to a webpage with useful connections to the Internet. You may write email to the library via the homepage or using the address oliviari@monad.net

Children's programs invite the kids to use the library in an exciting way. Story hour takes place every Wednesday after school. This school year we read picture books during the fall. The winter / spring session of story hour will focus on chapter books. Our first chapter book was [A Dog Like No Other](#) by William MacKellar. Every week eight to a dozen children attend to hear the next chapters. During the summer we continue our tradition of the summer reading program, created this year by the librarian and volunteer Pam Tolman. The theme was "Reading Cats and Dogs", with parties and projects focussing on this theme. Many kids attended the two parties and 26 participated in the reading portion of the pro-ram, reading 216 books. The Friends of the Library hosted the parties at which over fifty children and their stuffed pets attended to share activities and refreshments. Children completing the pro-ram received Toadstool gift certificates from the Friends of the Library.

Another summer tradition is the book sale on Old Home Day, hosted by the Friends of the Library. This year was a success. Thank you to everyone who donated books, tapes, CDs, and videos. You all made it possible to buy \$1,000 worth of books for the general library collection, to be purchased in the year 2001. Donations of books can be dropped off at the library throughout the year, and especially needed is the donation of time; before, during and after Old Home Day to organize the sale. The Friends of the Library hosted the Annual Friends meeting held in August.

The Nelson library receives donations throughout the year. Monies from Trust Funds were used to supplement town appropriations and gifts to the library. The Henry Melville technology fund was used to support the Internet connection. The Barrie, Barbara, and Bruce White Trust Fund money bought books on tape for the kids collection, and the Elizabeth Hatch Trust Fund bought books on tape for the adult collection. The gift of two adult passes (children can go for free) to the Boston Museum of Fine Arts, was donated by an anonymous donor. These passes may be used by library patrons, and taken out at the library desk.

The other donations we appreciate are the current (only the present month please) periodicals that are dropped in our box. The periodical reading corner has two comfortable reading chairs to sit in and peruse our large selection of 25 monthly magazines.

The Trustees during most of 2000 were Sandy Mackenzie, Toni Gleason, Gordon Peery, Dave Upton and Donna Kidd. There were 11 meetings of the Library Trustees this year.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Nelson Conservation Commission (NCC) holds regular monthly meetings as well as meetings to respond to conservation issues as they arise, including, this year, monitoring beavers on Old Stoddard Road to prevent road flooding, meeting with utility companies to minimize tree cutting for new electric lines on the Nelson Road, resolving an issue on the misuse of land under a conservation easement, and reviewing dock permits.

We sponsored a non-binding warrant at town meeting in support of the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) which passed in town and in the state legislature. It establishes a permanent program of investing in open space, natural resources, and cultural resources.

Two well attended public programs were presented by the NCC, the first in February cosponsored by the Friends of the Library. Ben Mahnke from the Monadnock Conservancy spoke on Land Conservation in the Monadnock Region. In September, Peter Allen led a Forest Management Walk to view his property on Log Cabin Road that he has been actively managing for almost 50 years.

In June, a grant from the Wright Fund administered by the Monadnock Community Foundation allowed us to undertake a Natural Resource Inventory directed by Dr. Rick Van de Poll with the aid of two graduate students, Jeff Littleton and Chris Horne from Antioch Graduate School. We have been meeting with the team as part of the process and it is nearing completion. The final report generated by Dr. Van de Poll will provide a basis for making informed decisions concerning the most important areas in the for conservation. In addition, it will provide a data base that will be valuable in many aspects of planning for the town.

ARCHIVIST'S REPORT

The Nelson Town Archives are now fully operational with a humidity and temperature control system installed in the archives room on the second floor of the Brick Schoolhouse thanks to a grant from the New Hampshire Health and Human Services program to conserve and protect vital records. The grant also covered the deacidification, rebinding, and microfilming of two volumes of the town's early records, one from 1751 to 1802 and the other from 1826 to 1853. They were handsomely conserved by Brown's River Company of Vermont.

A glass display case has been set up in the waiting area of the new town offices where items from the archives will be displayed in changing exhibits. At present, the volumes rebound under the grant program are on display. Above the case are two frames of photographs taken during the dedication of the Civil War memorial in 1915. They have been rematted in archival quality material under UV protective glass thanks to two private donors.

All the 50 plus volumes of town records have been catalogued, organized, and given specific locations in the archives cabinet for ease of access. Other records are being worked on as received and the card catalog is expanding. The Bemis records now in the library will soon be located in the archives because of better storage conditions there.

Any records, maps, photographs, old deeds or documents about Nelson history in your attic? We have a place for them! Please call me if you do.

Article 5. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to add to the capital reserve fund for dam maintenance and repair. The motion was appropriately moved and seconded. The vote was affirmative.

Article 6. To see if the district will accept funds from the Granite Lake Association and from any other source for the purpose of maintaining, repairing, and replacing the dam. The motion was appropriately moved and seconded. The vote was affirmative.

Article 7. To see if the district will schedule its annual meeting directly following the Granite Lake Association annual meeting in July, 2000. The motion was appropriately moved and seconded. The vote was affirmative.

Article 8. To see if the district will vote to place the sum of \$4000.00 now in the capital reserve fund into a certificate of deposit. The motion was appropriately moved and seconded. The vote was affirmative.

A move to adjourn was appropriately moved and seconded. The vote was affirmative and the meeting adjourned at approximately 1:20 pm.

NELSON, NH TOWN MEETING MINUTES – MARCH 14, 2000

1.) To choose necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

The polls opened promptly at Noon on a beautiful March day, and closed at 8:06PM. Ethan Tolman, Moderator, requested a waiving of the reading of the warrant in its'

entirety. A motion was made, seconded, and approved unanimously by voice vote. Polling was moderate and steady, with a total of 208 voters or 46% of those registered casting their votes.

The official checklist included names of 449 residents with 7 new townspeople registering to vote at the polling place. Thirteen hardy citizens as well as the Supervisors of the Checklist, Moderator, Town Clerk, and Deputy Town Clerk stayed to help with the counting which lasted from 10:45PM to 1AM.

Ethan Tolman, Moderator called the business meeting to order at 7:05PM, and the Boy Scouts carried in the United States Flag and the Boy Scouts Flag of Colors for Troop #530. All joined in with a Pledge of Allegiance.

Ethan requested a motion to waive the reading of the Warrant in its' entirety. Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously by voice vote.

Ethan made the following announcements:

The Boy Scouts will be selling coffee and goodies throughout the meeting. There are large print warrants available for those who wish to have one.

ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

2.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$121,829 to defray Town Charges for the year ensuing. (The 1999 appropriation was \$116,138) The article was moved and seconded as read. Mike French, Selectman explained the major differences between this years' request and last years' approved amount. Those

differences being an increase in the second and third selectman's pay to match that of the first selectman's pay of \$600, and the inclusion of archival expense of \$5,724 which will be offset by State funds. The article passed unanimously by voice vote.

3.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,875 for support of the Town Library. (The 1999 appropriation was \$13,637)

The article was moved and seconded as read. Dave Upton, Library Trustee, explained that the increase is due primarily to an increase in employee wages. The article passed unanimously by voice vote.

4.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,607 in support of social service agencies which provide assistance to Nelson residents. The agencies chosen to receive funds are: Home Health Care (\$550), Monadnock Family Services (\$557), and the Keene Community Kitchen, Inc. (\$500). (In 1999, these agencies were voted to receive contributions from the Town in the same amounts as stated above.) The article was moved and seconded as read. There was no discussion, and the motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

5.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to be added to the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund. No withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 1999 appropriation was \$2,000. The fund balance on 12/31/99 was \$3,010.42) The article was moved and seconded as read. There was no discussion, and the motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

Before Article #6 was addressed, Mike French, Selectman, stood up and publicly thanked all of the members on the SchoolHouse Renovation Committee for their dedicated work in developing the plan that is being presented to the Town for consideration.

6.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for an Architectural Review of the Old Brick Schoolhouse so that the building can be brought up to Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements, NH Life Safety, and NH Labor Administrative Rules. This amount will be added to \$2,500 carried over from 1999

The article was moved and seconded as read. Karen Tolman moved that this article be discussed after Article #7. The Moderator denied the request. After some discussion, John Wright moved that the article be tabled until Article #7 is acted upon. This motion was seconded, and passed by voice vote.

7.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65,000 for bringing the Old Brick Schoolhouse up to Code Requirements.

The article was moved and seconded as read. Bud French, on behalf of the Schoolhouse Committee presented an amendment as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,000 for bringing the Old Brick Schoolhouse up to Code Requirements. The amendment was seconded, and discussion followed. Maury Collins explained that the committee is offering three possibilities. 1.) \$65,000. based on the original architectural scheme, which includes the maximum amount of improvements discussed by the committee 2.) \$48,000., a more modest scheme which excludes a kitchenette area and replacing the existing flooring, 3.) \$25,000., the amount necessary to meet the ADA and NH Life Safety Codes, and the NH Labor Administrative Rules. This

would not include any partitions, shelving, or other changes in the main room. Betsey Street offered an amendment to the amendment: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 for bringing the Old Brick Schoolhouse up to Code Requirements, but this amendment to the amendment was defeated by voice vote. After further discussion, the amendment passed by voice vote, and the meeting went on to accept by voice vote Article #7 as amended.

6.cont'd) The Moderator brought the meeting back to Article #6, and discussion continued. It was explained that this article would be added to the amount already spent, and would pay for blueprints which will be used to put the project out to bid. The article passed by voice vote.

8.) If Article #7 is approved by the Town, this article is to see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to withdraw the accumulated principal and interest from the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund to go toward the cost. (The fund balance on 12/31/99 was \$3,010.42)

The article was moved and seconded as read, and passed by voice vote.

9.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the purchase of sixty folding chairs and a storage rack for the Town Hall. The article was moved and seconded as read. The Selectmen had samples of three different chairs on display in the hall with the cost of each. There were paper ballots and a "ballot" box so townspeople could vote a preference. The Selectmen explained their plan to replace 60 of the oldest chairs in the hall. Discussion centered on how many of each chair this money would buy. In the end, John Wright offered an amendment to remove the words sixty folding, to read To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the purchase of chairs and a storage rack for the Town Hall. The amendment was seconded and passed unanimously by voice vote. The meeting then went on to approve Article #9 as amended, by voice vote. A recommendation was made to the Selectmen to look in to the purchase of a plainer, less expensive chair than those that the Selectmen had as samples at the meeting.

10.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for repairs to the Town Barn. Labor for this project shall be paid from the general highway budget. (Article #19) The article was moved and seconded as read, and discussion ensued.

Mike Tarr offered the following amendment: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000 for repairs to the Town Barn. Labor for this project shall be paid from the general highway budget. (Article #19) This amendment was approved by voice vote. In the discussion which followed, two amendments to the amended Article #10 were offered and withdrawn: 1.) To see if the Town will vote to put in an 1800 square foot cement floor (\$4,000), replace posts and do structural work (\$1,000), replace the north side of the roof (\$2,500), and miscellaneous electrical work (\$1,000), And 2.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to put in an 1800 square foot cement floor and such other matters as money will allow. There was general agreement of those in attendance that the background information presented was inadequate and further study is necessary. The meeting went on to deny Article #10 on voice vote. Because of the environmental issues raised by this article, a strong sense of the meeting was that further study should be done and a report brought back to the Town at next year's Town Meeting outlining the best course of action for

the Town to pursue.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH PLANNING & ZONING

11.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$636 for dues to belong to the Southwest Regional Planning Commission. (The 1999 appropriation was \$627)

The article was moved and seconded as read, and the article was passed by voice vote.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH SERVICE AND PROTECTION

12.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,375 as a subsidy for ambulance service for the ensuing year, it being understood that residents will still be charged for individual calls. This sum represents payment for 5 quarters. The City of Keene has not yet billed for the 4th quarter of 1999. (The appropriation for 1999 was \$3,500)

The article was moved and seconded as read. With no discussion, the article passed unanimously by voice vote.

13.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500 for the proper expenses of the Police Department. (The 1999 appropriation was \$6,500)
The article was moved and seconded as read. Some discussion focused on whether a bullet-proof vest was needed. Rick Lewis, Police Chief, stated he is not requesting one at this time. The article passed unanimously by voice vote.

14.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,375 for the third year's payment for the police vehicle.

This article was moved and seconded as read. The article was unanimously passed by voice vote.

15.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for a radar unit for the police vehicle and to authorize the selectmen to withdraw the accumulated principal and interest from the Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund to go toward the purchase. (The fund balance on 12/31/99 was \$417.14)

The article was moved and seconded as read. There was a lot of discussion about the speeding problems at several locations in town, and what benefit a radar unit will provide to curtail the problems in conjunction with the amount of surveillance time the police budget will allow. In the end, the article passed unanimously by voice vote.

16.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,250 for the purchase of wildland fire equipment. The Town will receive \$5,000 of the Federal ICE Monies and the community share will be \$1,250.

The article was moved and seconded as read. Rick Lothrop, Fire Chief spoke to this article, explaining that "ice monies" are federal funds left over from the ice storms a few years back. Rick explained what equipment will be purchased (personal protective gear, hand tools, and portable pumps) and what it is used for. The article passed

unanimously by voice vote.

17.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for the proper expenses of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad. (The 1999 appropriation was \$8,500.)

The article was moved and seconded as read. There was little discussion and the article passed unanimously by voice vote.

18.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165,000 for the purchase of a new fire truck and to authorize the selectmen to withdraw the accumulated principal and interest from the Fire Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose, and to authorize the selectmen to negotiate borrowing the remainder by long-term bond and/or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. The fund balance on 12/31/99 was \$113,930.02. Should this article be approved, there will be no tax impact in 2000, as the first payment will be due in 2001. (Paper ballot and two-thirds majority required.)

The article was moved and seconded as read. Rick Lothrop, Fire Chief, spoke to the article explaining what the new truck will be like, what it will offer to the Fire Department, how the old truck will be used, and that the old truck will be used until it is no longer serviceable (See the handout titled "New Nelson Fire Truck" at the back of these minutes). The ballot clerks passed out the written ballots.

While the ballots were being cast and counted, Bill Riley, our State Representative spoke. Bill stated that he will not be running for re-election this year, after 20 years of service. He wanted to make the following appeal:

Use your State Representative. He/She is there to work for us. Bill was able to get legislation passed which benefited his constituents, but he felt people should have called him more, requested his help more frequently.

Bill also extended a warm thank-you to all for our support of him. He stated his thanks are truly heartfelt.

The meeting responded with a standing ovation for Mr. Riley

Jane Kirk, Selectwoman, then presented the Town of Nelson Resource Book. This resource includes a listing of services of all kinds that are available to our citizens, along with the information necessary to pursue any avenue of help needed. Jane stated that this book will be on the shelf just inside the door of the library for anyone to use.

Mike French, Selectman, then spoke and asked that we recognize Richard Lothrop for his many, many hours spent in volunteer service to the Town. Mike had nominated Rick for an award which Rick did not win, but Mike felt recognition by the Town is in order. Everyone agreed, and Rick was given a healthy round of applause.

It was then time to attend the state of the vote on Article #18. Those voting YES – 73 Those voting NO – 9, and the article passed.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

19.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000 for our highway budget. (This sum includes \$137,000 for general highway expenses and labor in the maintenance of the Town's roads and bridges and \$13,000 for maintenance of the

contested sections of old Route 9). (The 1999 appropriation was \$150,000.)

The article was moved and seconded as read. There was some discussion on the Old Route 9, and the status of the legal action taken by the Town. Mike French, Selectman, stated that the Town has lost both actions taken, and the issue is on the way to the State Supreme Court. The article passed by voice vote.

20.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,365 for the third year's payment for the highway one ton dump truck.

The article was moved and seconded as read. There was little discussion, and the article passed by voice vote.

21.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. It is understood that no withdrawals may be made from this fund for the purchase of road equipment except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee, The Road Equipment committee (which includes the selectmen) recommends this appropriation. (The 1999 appropriation was \$10,000. The fund balance on 12/31/99 was \$16,919.30.)

The article was moved and seconded as read. There was little discussion, and the article passed by voice vote.

22.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000 for repair of bridges and box culverts. This sum is to be non-lapsing for two years or until the completion of the project, whichever comes first. Labor shall be paid from the general highway budget (Article #19). The selectmen recommend this appropriation. The article was moved and seconded as read. Question arose as to where this money will be spent. Bruce Warner, Road Agent, stated that it will be used for repairs needed at the Granite Lake outlet. The article passed by voice vote.

23.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for necessary paving and sealing projects. This sum is to be added to the \$12,000 approved in 1999 and carried forward. Labor for this project shall be paid from the general highway budget (Article #19). The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was moved and seconded as read. The Road Agent, Bruce Warner, stated that Murdough Hill Road will be taken up and repaved on the north side. In the discussion which followed, it was voiced by those living on Murdough Hill Road that they want the road left as it is, with its' bumps and lumps, hoping it will slow down traffic. Residents from other parts of town which also face increased speeding concurred, and felt that the wishes of those living on the road should be listened to. The article was denied by voice vote.

OTHER ARTICLES

24.) To see if the Town will vote to send the following resolution to the New Hampshire General Court: Resolved, New Hampshire's natural, cultural and historic resources in this Town and throughout the state are worthy of protection, and, therefore, the State of New Hampshire should establish and fund a permanent public/private partnership for the voluntary conservation of these important resources.

The article was moved and seconded as read. Bert Wingerson, Town Archivist and member of the Conservation Commission, addressed the article, stating that the Conservation Commission with the support of the Selectmen put this article on the warrant.

Senate Bill #401 which creates a permanent Board to award grants to towns and groups to support our cultural and natural resources, and our historic sites will be coming up for consideration. The funding for this Board is hoped to be in the vicinity of \$6million. Bert stated that if this bill passes and eventually becomes established, there are a few local projects which may qualify for funding through this resource (See the handout titled "Vanishing New Hampshire" at the end of these minutes). The article passed on voice vote.

25.) To indemnify by vote of the governing body and save harmless for loss or damage occurring after said vote any person employed by the Town of Nelson and any member or officer of its' governing board in accordance with RSA 31:105.

The article was moved and seconded as read. Jane Kirk, Selectwoman, explained that this is on the warrant on recommendation of the NHMA, and that it is meant to protect all employees and officers of the town from lawsuits resulting from the performance of their duties. There was much concern expressed that this would enable town officials to act irresponsibly without recourse. Jane assured the townspeople that this is not the case, that this only protects actions of officers and employees in the usual performance of their duties.

The article passed by voice vote.

26.) To see if the Town will vote for a two-year term for Road Agent. (Majority ballot vote required.)

The article was moved and seconded as read. A motion was made to table this motion indefinitely. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

27.) To transact any other business or discuss other warrant proposals as may legally be brought before the meeting.

At this time Ethan extended a thank you to Don Bennett for all of his help and to everyone else who helped to get the meeting and election process completed.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board
Nelson School District
Keene, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Nelson School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2000 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Nelson School District has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Nelson School District as of June 30, 2000, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Nelson School District taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Nelson School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

**NELSON SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING
MARCH 10, 2000**

The meeting convened at 7:00 p.m. on March 10, 2000. Ethan Tolman called the meeting to order. In attendance from School Administrative Unit 29 were: Dr. Phillip G. McCormack, Superintendent of Schools; Thomas J. Kane, Assistant Superintendent of Schools for the Towns; and John Harper, Business Manager.

ARTICLE 1: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

It was moved and seconded that the District receive the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers chosen as printed in the annual report. The Article passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 2: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate as a deficit appropriation to cover unanticipated tuition/special education expenses for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2000, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

It was moved and seconded that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 as a deficit appropriation to cover unanticipated tuition/special education expenses for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2000. It was then moved and seconded that the Article be amended by reducing the sum by \$10,000 to read \$40,000. Lewis Derby explained the reason for the deficit. There was no discussion and the amendment passed by voice vote. The Article, as amended, also passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 3: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

It was moved and seconded that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,105,081.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District. School Board Chairman Susan Peery led the discussion of the budget. John Harper addressed changes in revenue from previous years due to the "Claremont Decision." After some discussion, the Article was passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1.00 for deposit in the Capital Reserve Fund established by the voters of the District at the March, 1972 District meeting for the purpose of construction/reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment, and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

It was moved and seconded that the Article be passed over. The Article was passed over by voice vote.

ARTICLE 5: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Susan Peery thanked Carol Newcombe for her untiring help during the lice epidemic and presented her with a gift in recognition of her service. Patricia Jones also thanked Betsy Street.

Susan also thanked the Packersfield Parents Association for their support of the Nelson School, the bus drivers, volunteers, and Lucy Daniels and Glenn Stan for their help with the garden.

Susan also brought to the attention of those present that there was a need for a truant/attendance officer for the District. Dr. Phillip McCormack explained the duties and the pay involved (\$50.00 per year). The position is required by law for the Nelson School. Some discussion ensued regarding the position.

Susan Peery also thanked Lewis Derby for his six years of service as School Board Member. Ethan Tolman Read a resolution in Mr. Derby's honor. The text of the Resolution follows:

WHEREAS, the people of the Town of Nelson are most grateful for Lewis E. Derby's devoted service to the children of Nelson and the community as a School Board Member since 1994; and,

WHEREAS, Lewis E. Derby faithfully attended the numerous meetings required of this role; and,

WHEREAS, Lewis E. Derby has always conducted the duties of his position as School Board Member diligently and in a steadfast manner; and,

WHEREAS, Lewis E. Derby was a loyal advocate for the teachers and students of Nelson School; and,

WHEREAS, Lewis E. Derby's commitment to quality education was evidenced by his interest in improving education in Nelson; and,

WHEREAS, Lewis E. Derby's ability to listen to teachers, students and parents enabled him to make decisions in a consistent, rational and fair manner; and,

WHEREAS, Lewis E. Derby willingly volunteered to coordinate the playground expansion, and cheerfully helped with painting and landscaping projects at the school, all of which truly reflect his love for the Town of Nelson, its children and their future; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the voters of the School District of Nelson recognize Lewis E. Derby's contribution to the children, the school, and the community by unanimously adopting this resolution as a lasting tribute to Lewis E. ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

Although there have been some significant changes at Nelson School with respect to enrollment and staffing, there have been no noticeable disruptions to the daily routine of the school, nor to student learning. I believe this reflects on the caliber of staff at the school and its commitment to the students.

For the first time in several years, we have seen a significant decline in the enrollment at Nelson School. The official (October) enrollment figures show 8 students in kindergarten, 2 in readiness, 6 in grade 1, 8 in grade 2, 10 in grade 3, 5 in grade 4, 4 in grade 5, and 9 in grade 6. The most notable impact of this decline relates to a reduction in staff. This year the kindergarten position was reduced from a full-time to a half-time position. There are 28 students from Nelson at Keene Middle School and 36 at Keene High School.

A review of student performance on the state mandated testing program shows Nelson students performing quite well. At the third grade level, 100 percent of the students taking the test scored at the Basic level or better in both language arts and mathematics. Also worthy of note is a very high score in the area of writing. Sixth grade scores also reflect a strong performance in all areas tested. Seventy-seven percent of the students tested scored Basic or better in language arts, 94 percent in mathematics, 59 percent in science, and 76 percent in social studies. As was the case with the third grade, sixth grade students also achieved a high score in writing (second highest in the SAU and well above the state average).

Performance at Keene High School also shows Nelson students performing well in the core subject areas. Grade point averages for Nelson's students exceed the average for all students at Keene High in mathematics and English. They are basically the same -- less than .06 of a point differential -- for science and social studies.

Student success at the middle and high schools and on state testing is related to the type of learning experiences they have in the elementary grades. The staff at Nelson School has maintained its emphasis on the development of fundamental skills. The writing program that has been implemented is proving to be quite successful. Staff and student reaction to the (relatively) new math program is very positive. The continued emphasis on school-wide thematic units and hands-on learning activities (especially in the area of science) serves to enhance student motivation and learning.

The ability of the staff to work cooperatively and cohesively greatly adds to the quality of programming at Nelson School and, ultimately, to the success students attain. The staff has been able to reach consensus on educational priorities which helps allocate resources and moves the staff in a consistent manner toward agreed upon goals. For example, the staff collectively agreed that it was a priority to teach aspects of the Responsive Classroom throughout the school. As a result, a decision was made to commit time and money to become trained in this program which occurred over the summer. Another example relates to the staff's commitment to effective teaching practices. When Ms. Demmons joined the staff this year, she realized that she was the only staff member who had not participated in the RBT (Research for Better Teaching) training. She has become involved in the semester-long training so that she will have the same perspectives and background as other staff members. This will greatly facilitate consistency in the way in which students are taught from level to level and classroom to classroom.

The climate that has been established at Nelson School is also a contributing factor to the success students are experiencing. Walking into the building, one can quickly sense a positive, caring atmosphere. There is a very strong commitment to the individual student. I think this is characteristic of a small, rural school such as Nelson. The work the staff has done to become trained in and to integrate components of the Responsive Classroom into the regular routine of the school day is a variable that has added to the positive climate at the school. Skills taught through this program (respect for one another, problem solving, accepting responsibility, and good citizenship) are transferable to future situations in the students' lives.

The level of support the Nelson community extends to its school is commendable and greatly facilitates what the staff is trying to do for children. A continuation of community involvement and support is critical to the operation of Nelson School. Please make an effort to become involved in, and informed of, school activities and issues. Also, please plan to attend the annual district meeting on Friday, March 9, at 7:00 p.m.

STAFF REPORT

Nelson School welcomed 51 students this school year. This number is down significantly from last year's number of 62, due to the loss of a larger-than-normal graduating sixth grade class. This reduction in population has resulted in different classroom configurations and staffing. Amy Hathaway, former K/R/1 teacher, returned as our half/one kindergarten teacher. Cindy Benner, former 2/3 teacher, returned as our Readiness/first/second grade teacher. Karen Almdale, former inclusion teacher, returned as our third/fourth grade teacher, and Nolan Kitfield, former fourth/fifth teacher, returned as our fifth/sixth grade teacher, replacing Melinda Belden.

Our five classroom teachers continue to serve as the school's management team, which works very closely with the Nelson School Board (Susan Peery, (Chairperson), Kelly French and Glen Stan) and SAU personnel (Phillip McCormack (Superintendent), and Thomas Kane and Barbara Tremblay (Assistant Superintendents)).

Other returning staff includes Natalie Germeroth as secretary, Linda LaMothe as art teacher, Trisha Jones as school nurse and health teacher, Marie-Elise Reilly as French teacher, Deb Hrdlicka as school counselor, and Liza Constable as music teacher.

New staff includes Paula Demmons as inclusion teacher, Jennifer Hazelwood as R/1/2 tutor, Erin Condap as physical education teacher, Karen Brunjes as speech/language therapist, and Erica Hutchins as custodian.

Our Fall all-school theme for this school year was Early American History, which took students and teachers from pre-Columbian natives and explorers to the Revolutionary War and our first President. Our Spring theme picks up where we left off and will take us on an exciting journey across our huge country and the mysterious West!

Once again, we are very happy and excited to have the assistance of the Harris Center in providing excellent hands-on experiences for the students and teachers. This year's themes include studies of bones (animal and human), felines (wild and domestic), invertebrates, rocks and plants. The 5/6 graders are involved in the exploration of 12,000-year-old matter from a New York site of a recent Mastodon excavation! Christine Payack is the very experienced, enthusiastic teacher for these units and provides several weeks of intense lessons in each classroom which tie into our science curricula.

Teacher-generated, grade-level academic goals and objectives, which are coordinated with SAU curricula and state frameworks provide the structure for academic planning, instruction and evaluation. Reporting takes place on a triennial basis, with objective checklists and narratives sent home in December, February and June. Teachers meet with parents for conferences in December and again in June for a portfolio conference. At that time, students attend and have the opportunity to share with parents the quality and favorite work they've done throughout the year. Teachers and parents may meet at other times during the year to discuss student progress.

Classrooms K-6 continue to implement literature/theme-based reading programs with an emphasis on the whole reading process. At the early levels, programs emphasize phonemic awareness, decoding, sight word recognition,

vocabulary and comprehension. At the upper levels, students' reading programs become more individualized to reflect personal reading preferences, but students continue to work toward their grade level reading objectives which focus more on higher order thinking skills and vocabulary. Throughout grades K-6, students have experience reading a variety of genres which are reflected in book choices and writing.

The writing process is also a very integral part of our language arts program from kindergarten through 6th grade, and results in many published works every year throughout the school. Students become very familiar with the writing process by the time they graduate. Students also are given many opportunities to write shorter, more directed pieces which may serve different purposes (to describe, to instruct, to reflect an opinion, to summarize, etc.). Incorporating the above processes, along with a strong sight-word based spelling program, has resulted in a comprehensive language arts program which, with modifications for individual needs, provides a balanced program for each student.

We continue to be very happy with our Everyday Math program which is implemented in grades K-6. This is a very challenging math program which emphasizes thinking and problem solving rather than rote learning. The spiral curriculum allows concepts and processes to be continually brought back to the students' awareness throughout each year's program and built upon throughout the K-6 curriculum. We've seen our students' interest and confidence in math increase as they move through the grades and, in general, our graduating 6th graders are very prepared for middle school math programs.

Nelson School has been implementing parts of the Responsive Classroom Program this school year as a result of staff participation in a week-long training. Each classroom has committed to implementing a daily morning meeting into the day. This meeting consists of a greeting, sharing, activity and news and announcements (with a daily interactive morning message). It has been wonderful in promoting class and whole school community, as well as individual student self-confidence, responsibility and appreciation of each other.

Nelson School has always put an emphasis on all-school community development. One effort this year is devoting the first hour of the day on Monday mornings to all-school activities. We have used this hour for beautifying classroom wastebaskets for each room, cross-graded reading buddies, and musical guests. We will use our Monday blocks later in the year for multi age groups to prepare for our end-of-the-year celebration of the Westward Movement. This is a wonderful opportunity for all students to get to know each other, share information and practice social skills.

Another way all-school interaction is encouraged is through four weekly all-school Big Circles which last approximately 15 minutes. Tuesday and Friday morning circles follow the Responsive Classroom morning meeting format and Wednesdays are devoted to sign language. Thursday mornings we have an extended circle with all-school sing, which is coordinated by our music teacher and consists of singing old favorites, new songs, and theme-related music. Students, staff and, occasionally, parents enjoy this fun time.

As usual, our community involvement has been wonderful. From helping with lice checks to working individually with students, Nelson parents and community members continue to come through when we need them. It's an aspect of the Nelson community that continues to be invaluable. Our parent organization, Packersfield, is consistently involved in school activities.

providing not only financial support, but hands-on support to the children and teachers of the school.

For the third consecutive year, Packersfield has provided our school with funds to allow Mary Alice Amidon to be an Artist-in-Residence to assist us with our annual theme studies. Her expertise and extensive experience have been invaluable in helping staff and students experience ongoing themes through music, dance and storytelling. Her residency has added another valuable dimension to our studies.

Nelson School is a such a special place and we thank our support and specialist staffs, community members, school board members, parents and all others who have helped make it a great place to teach and learn. Together we really make a difference for the children of Nelson.

CHAIR REPORT

The 2000-2001 school year has gone smoothly so far, and we can truthfully say that all of our problems have been little ones -- about the size of carpenter ants, actually. Removal of some rotten boards on the north side of the school last summer revealed a busy ant civilization eager to dine on the foundations of a good education. We had to say no. The problem has been taken care of, and from now on we will have periodic inspections and spraying for pests.

What is notable about the budget for the upcoming year is that it represents a slight decrease in spending and taxes for our town. (We can't promise this will happen every year.) In this budget, it is a combination of factors, including a slight increase in revenue from the State Adequate Education Grant, a slight decrease in tuition paid to Keene, and the absence of a deficit article on the warrant (which we faced last year).

This year, 28 Nelson students attend Keene Middle School, and 44 attend Keene High School. Enrollment at our elementary school is 55 as of this writing, down 10 from last year. Veteran teacher Melinda Belden resigned from our staff last spring so she could spend more time with her family, and we all miss "Miss B." We welcome inclusionary teacher Paula Demmons and physical education teacher Erin Condap. We have been blessed for many years with a skilled and dedicated staff, including the classroom teachers and excellent support personnel. Our school also receives wonderful help and input from the Packersfield organization and from volunteers in the community who offer their expertise and time in special projects.

We also were fortunate this year to receive a generous grant from the Cheshire County Commissioners for a pilot program for a late bus from Keene, three days a week. Harrisville chipped in, further reducing the cost to our town, and the project has been a great success in terms of ridership. As part of the new contract negotiated with Laidlaw Transportation, the late bus will run two days a week at no additional cost to the town, beginning in the fall.

We have a statement of purpose at our school: *"The mission of Nelson School is to instill strength of spirit and ignite a love of learning."* I believe that our progress in meeting this goal depends on the quality of the connections and links that support the school from every direction. Parents, your interest in your child(ren)'s education is the key to their success. To the parents, teachers, community members, SAU administrators, school board members, bus drivers, and everyone else with a stake in the success of the school, goes a heartfelt *thank you* and the hope that you will stay connected.

The school board meets on the second Wednesday of the month at 4:30 p.m. at the school. Meetings are open to the public, and we welcome your participation.
