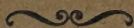
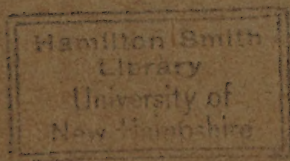

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community House in said Pembroke on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear and act upon the report of the Town Ways and Means committee.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20) cents on and after September 1st, 1944, on all unpaid 1944 poll taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes; and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to purchaser of such land.
6. To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Broadway near the residence of Ernest Chamberlen.
7. To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Pembroke Street near the bridge over the Meeting-House Brook.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the purchase of a new fire whistle and alarm boxes to replace the present fire alarm system.
9. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to give

a two per cent discount on all 1944 taxes paid on or before July 1st, 1944.

10. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for a series of band concerts.

11. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) to help in the care and upkeep of Pembroke Park for the ensuing year.

12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain a street known as Bridge Street Extension, beginning on Front Street and ending at the arch bridge of the Suncook Valley Railroad.

13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain a street known as Corporation Street, beginning on Cross Street and ending on Glass Street.

14. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF CIVILIAN DEFENSE COMMITTEE

During the past year the activities of this committee have been rigidly kept to the minimum required to maintain an organization trained to cope with any unusual catastrophe. In the Month of February of this year our control center was closed to conform to the order of the State Civilian Defense Committee.

All air raid warnings will in the future come direct to our chief air raid warden who will direct the sounding of the alarm by the Fire Departments of Pembroke and Allenstown. It is expected that the Chiefs of the Fire and Police Departments of the two towns will maintain a reserve of auxiliary firemen and policemen as in the past two years. We also expect that the Chiefs of these departments will direct their proper training to the end that our community may be adequately protected.

We again advise that all the chairmen of the various committees maintain the personel of their committees and so direct them that they may continue to properly function in the event of any unforeseen contingency.

We wish to express our appreciation to all who in the past have given so freely of their time and efforts to this committee and trust that for the duration they will stand by to be available should anything now not predictable, threaten our community.

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REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Discipline calls for personal restraint from following unrestricted natural impulses to do as one pleases with regard to fire; alertness in cautioning others against imprudent and illegal burning and in promptly reporting fires to the local forest fire warden; cooperation in complying with laws, rules, and regulations governing the kindling and care of fires, smoking, safety of mechanical units using fire in and near woodlands and assisting the local warden in extinguishing such fires as may occur.

Your town warden is, perhaps, more perplexed and anxious during these war years than ever before because of increased forest fire hazards and diminishing supplies of available man-power. He looks directly to you to aid him. Will you? You can aid him most effectively by always securing the required permit before attempting to burn and by complying fully with permit requirements; by being patient when he advises of departmental restrictions on permit burning or that he deems it unsafe to burn; and by giving him the needed assistance in extinguishing fires when he needs your help. To do so is to meet one real test of citizenship.

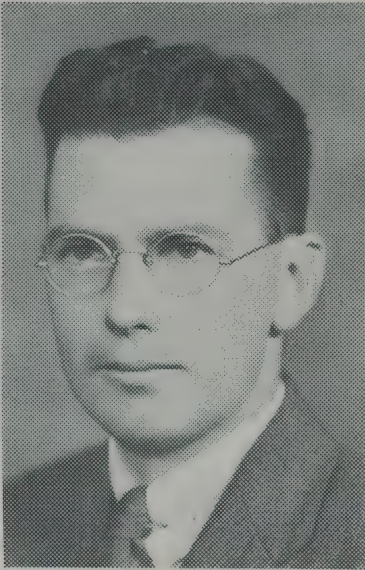
Three of our citizens have paid the supreme sacrifice and it is in their memory that we dedicate this annual town report.

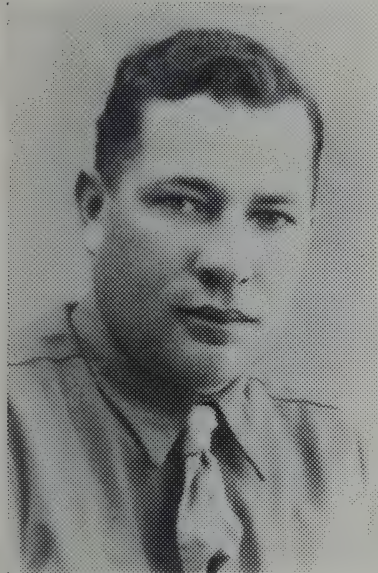

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF PEMBROKE ACADEMY FOR THE SCHOOL YEAR 1943

Teaching Staff and Enrollment

School opened Wednesday, September 8, 1943 with 169 pupils and seven regular and two part-time teachers. One year ago there were 190 pupils. Three new pupils have since entered the Academy. Several changes in the teaching staff were made, so that the following teachers began their duties with the opening of school in September. Mrs. Mary Hoitt of Concord, N. H., succeeded Miss Iris Valley as teacher of English. Courses in Latin and French were curtailed allowing Miss Thomas to combine her instruction in Mathematics and French. Miss Lula Price of Concord, N. H. has taken over the work of Miss Furlong as instructor in the Commercial department. Mr. Cecil P. Grimes of Penacook finally consented to take charge again of the Manual Training Courses. Mr. David Jennings returned in charge of Social Sciences and, in addition, assumed the duties of Submaster, and Mrs. Ruth Hayden continued in her position as teacher of Home Economics and Dean of Girls. Mr. Jarvis T. Beal began his seventh year as Headmaster and teacher of Science. Mrs. Doris Buswell of Andover, N. H. was retained as Music Instructor, and Mrs. Elizabeth Buswell of Andover, N. H. was retained as Music Instructor, and Mrs. Elizabeth C. Morrill became a full-time teacher on November 1, taking over two courses in English I and two divisions of General Science.

Extra-Curricula Activities

We are still in the war — or, I should say, in an all-out effort to win the war. The total number of boys is slightly less than last year. Only twelve boys and five girls have left school this year, and of the twelve boys five have entered the service of their country and the others are gainfully employed either in defense work or on the farm. Duties of pupils and teachers outside of school hours take much of their time and vitality. Much sickness this present winter has made it difficult to maintain a high standard of scholarship. Following are some of the achievements in activities outside of classes.

The shop boys under Mr. Grimes' supervision built a small shop, 16' x 24', outside of the main building, wired it for electricity, and set up their machinery there. This was to take the place of the shop room which had to be sacrificed for the storage of soft coal. New storage space was made by building two balconies high up on the sides of the stage. Other school equipment has been made and repaired by the boys in their shop classes.

On November 12, 1943, the Senior Class held an Armistice Ball, and on February 18, 1944, the Freshman Class had a Valentine Dance. The Memory Prize Speaking Contest was held on December 16, 1943. The winners in order were William VanderHeagen, Bernice Higgins, Roger Beal and James Bates. Mrs. Morrill is planning to enter several of her pupils in the State Contest at Laconia High School in March.

Mrs. Doris Buswell, music director, has had to contend with much sickness at home as well as the difficulties of transportation and travel. However, she has organized a mixed chorus and boys' and girls' separate groups, and trained them to take part on special occasions. An oper-

etta and special graduation music are two contemplated projects.

Because of the difficulties of food rationing and the scarcity of some foods, our noon lunch program was not started until after Christmas. It was necessary to charge 15c, but these hot lunches seem to have been appreciated by the pupils. The Health Department of the Student Activities Program contributed \$50. toward this project. Mrs. Ruth Hayden and Mrs. Bert Robinson (cook) have worked and planned faithfully and well to continue this noon-lunch program. I want to thank those parents and friends who have contributed supplies to this undertaking.

The faculty and members of the Senior Class have selected Mary Elizabeth Farnum as "Best Citizen" in the Senior Class at Pembroke Academy. This contest is sponsored by Buntin Chapter D.A.R. and included girls only.

A special committee with members from each of the classes was selected to promote the sales of Bonds and Stamps during the Fourth War Loan Drive. At the end of the first week, the sales totaled \$630.

Although there was no League formed in basketball this year, the boys' and girls' teams played about fifteen games and learned a lot of basketball under the direction of Mr. David Jennings and Miss Helen Thomas. Each team won a majority of its games played. The difficulties of finding referees and cars with gasoline enough for transportation were numerous.

In conclusion; although it will be difficult to find teachers for another year, and necessary to drop some courses temporarily, it is to be hoped that no fundamental courses will have to be curtailed. Time, patience, and perseverance will help us over this war crisis and guide us to the dawn of brighter days for all the schools of our land.

I want to thank you, Mr. Harmon, and also the Trustees and teachers of Pembroke Academy, for your helpful and loyal support during this school year.
