PALMER CLARK READ, SR.
(1888 - 1960)

The Town of Plainfield pays tribute to one of its citizens who gave generously of his time and ability over the last half century of his long and useful life to the public service of his native community. Palmer C. Read, born March 8, 1888, began his public career in the office of Supervisor of the Check List, acting in that capacity for several terms. During the succeeding years he was elected Selectman, serving nine years, Moderator, Trustee of Trust Funds, Auditor of the Town and School District the State Legislature 1935-37, County Commissioner 1952-1960. He also the State Legislaure 1935-37, County Commissioners 1952-1960. He also served the Town as Fire Warden, as a member of the Finance Committee, and as a member of the Town Planning Board.

Other outstanding contributions of time and public service were: a Director of the N. H. Fire Insurance Co. 17 years, Trustee and Deacon of the Plainfield Community Baptist Church, an officer of the N. H. State Grange twenty years, and Master of Blow-Me-Down Grange.

Palmer C. Read, Sr. married Lena Rogers in 1910, his entire life was spent at the Read Homestead, his occupation was farming and dealing in livestock. Graduated from Kimball Union Academy class 1907. Mr. Read died December 1, 1960

NOTICE OF SELECTMEN'S MEETINGS

The Selectmen will meet at the Town Hall in Meriden on the second Saturday of each month at 10:00 a.m.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Plainfield Town Hall, in said Plainfield on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, a Treasurer, a Tax Collector, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, two Auditors and any other necessary town officers.

You are further notified to meet at the Plainfield Town Hall in said Plainfield on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, not to exceed twenty thousand dollars, in anticipation of taxes, to be paid on or before one year's time pursuant to the New Hampshire Laws of 1917.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or trade the Power Loader now owned by the Town; proceeds of said sale or trade to be applied on the purchase of a new Loader; the balance to be raised by appropriation and issue of long term serial notes.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to reappraise the improved lands and buildings of the Town, and raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars therefor.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars to be used for expenses of the Bi-Centennial celebration of the chartering of the Town.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to add one street light to the Plainfield Village street lighting system, said light to be located near John Morse's residence, and raise and appropriate money therefor. (By request)

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to add four street lights to the East Plainfield Street lighting system, said lights to be an extension southerly from the present lights, and raise and appropriate money therefor. (By request)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to choose a board of two Auditors in accordance with Chapter 82 of the New Hampshire Laws of 1959.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following described section of Black Hill road, beginning at the first culvert easterly of Albert K. Read's swimming pool and continuing easterly over Black Hill to its intersection with the road to the so-called Porter Place.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or administer all real-estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds, said vote to continue in effect until revoked by vote of the Town.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to charge a fee to be paid for cemetery lots as new lots are laid out in the several cemeteries owned by the Town, and if so voted to determine the amount of fee, and adopt any vote to make disposition of the money so received.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund to be used for building State Aid Bridges.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise an appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for major repairs to or replacement of the Covered Bridge at Meriden.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to allow a two per cent discount on 1961 property taxes paid within 30 days following the day the Tax Warrant is delivered to the Tax Collector.

Article 16. To see what action the Town will take with regard to the reports of Town Officers.

Article 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The polls will remain open until six (6:00) p. m.

Town Meeting 1960

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield, County of Sullivan, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, holden at the Town Hall in Meriden in said Town on March eight, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, the business of the day was disposed of in the following manner.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Tracy M. Spalding; Prayer was then offered by the Reverend Mr. Jack Hemenway of the Meriden Congregational Church. The Warrant was read, omitting Article 2 through Article 14. Notice of the Direct Primary was read Pursuant to the warrant of the meeting, Article One was read and the polls were opened.

At one thirty the business of the day was taken up as follows: Prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Ray Leavett of the Meriden Baptist Church. Articles 2 through 14 were read and the following action was taken.

ARTICLE II. It was moved and seconded that the Town vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, not to exceed \$20,000 (Twenty thousand dollars) in anticipation of taxes to be paid on or before one year's time pursuant to the New Hampshire Laws of 1917.

The motion was voted in the affirmative.

A motion was made and seconded that Articles 3, 4, 5, and 6 be postponed until after Article 7 has been enacted upon, after which we shall return to Articles 3, 4, 5, and 6. This motion was voted in the Affirmative.

ARTICLE VII. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to instruct the Selectmen, when they are drawing up the Town Warrant for the Annual March Town Meeting to notify the inhabitants, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, to meet at Ten o'clock a.m. for the election of Town Officers; and further to notify said inhabitants, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, to meet at 7:00 o'clock p.m. to act on the remaining subjects in the Warrant for such meeting.

A paper ballot was called for.

Yes 51 No 59

and the motion did not carry.

ARTICLE III. It was moved and seconded that the Town instruct the Selectmen to trade the Chevrolet truck now owned by the Town, and the sum of \$5,000. be raised for said purpose. \$1,000. to be raised by appropriation, and the balance be raised by the Selectmen issuing two serial notes in the name of the town for \$2,000. each. Said notes to be repaid, one each year, beginning in 1961.

The motion was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IV. A motion was made and seconded that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$43,625.75 to defray Town charge for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE V. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to discontinue the three sections that were formerly part of Route 12-A as described in Article 5 of the Town Warrant, namely: Section 1, beginning near the Blancha L. Daniels Place and leading westerly along the northerly side of the new road to the Freeman Hill Road; Section 2 beginning at the westerly side of the Freeman Hill road and leading westerly and southerly to the River Road; Section 3, beginning on the south-westerly side of the River Road and continuing southerly to the new state road.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VI. A motion was made and seconded that we pass over Article 6 of the warrant, namely that a section of Black Hill Road be discontinued.

Voted Yes 38 No 30 and the article was passed over

ARTICLE VIII. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the lot on Snow Mountain now owned by the Town, the Selectmen shall make sale by giving proper notice and receiving sealed bids.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IX. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to establish a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for building State Aid Bridges.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE X. A motion was made and seconded that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for major repairs to or replacement of the Covered Bridge at Meriden.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XI. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to pass over Article 11 in the warrant, namely that the Town sell or lease land to the School District for a Garage.

Voted in the affirmative and Article 11 was passed over.

ARTICLE XII. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to allow a two percent discount on 1960 property taxes paid within 30 days following the day the Tax Warrant is delivered to the Tax Collector.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XIII. A motion was made and seconded that the Town vote to accept the reports of Town officers as printed in the Town Report, subject to any necessary corrections, and that a copy be placed on file by the Town Clerk.

AMENDMENT to motion on Article 13.

Moved and seconded that Article 13 be amended as follows: Correct page one of the report by changing Dec. 31, 1958 to Dec. 31, 1959; on page 10 correct Article 8 by changing the Lot No. 630 so that the Article reads "to sell the Town's interest in Lot No. 596, located on Snow Mountain."

Amendment voted in the affirmative. Article 13 voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XIV. Be it resolved that the Moderator appoint a Finance Committee of six persons, within thirty days after this meeting.

Voted in the affirmative.

Moved and seconded that the Selectmen and Finance Committee work together for the simplification and clarification of the Town Report.

Voted in the affirmative.

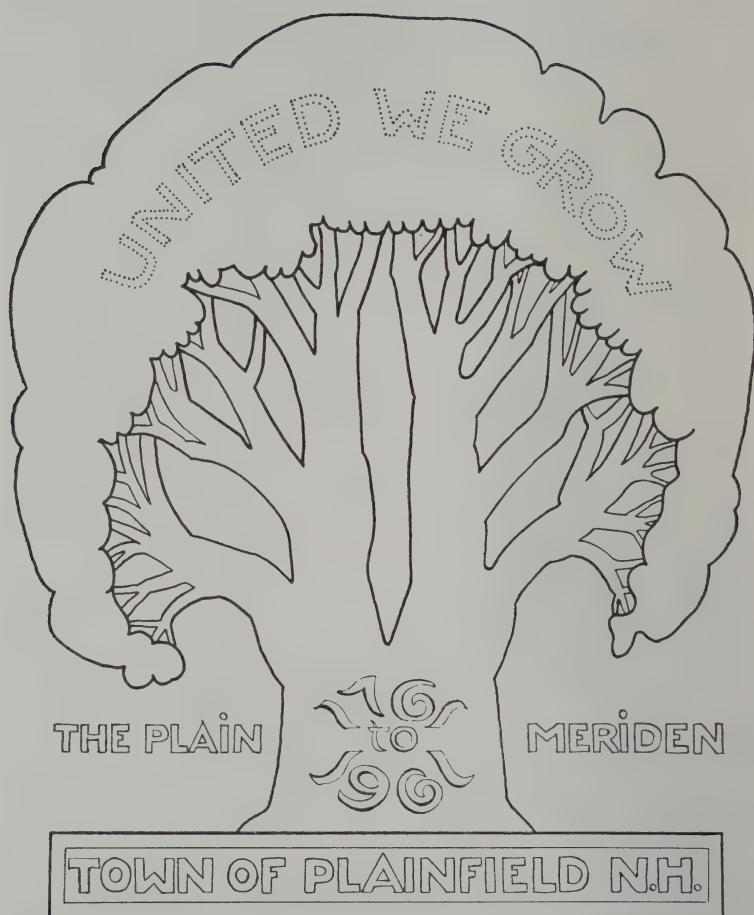

Your Bicentennial Planning Committee outlined for you in the Town Report a year ago its general plan for the celebration of the 200th Anniversary of our Town Charter on August 12th, 1961, to be celebrated partly in Meriden and partly on the Plain. That plan has not been changed. This is the schedule —

Opening Ceremony, Plain Town Hall, 10-11:30 A.M.

Noon Dinner, 2 sittings, Blow-Me-Down Grange Hall, Plainfield Plain,
12-2:00 P.M.

Historical Parade, the Plain Street, 2-3:00 P.M.

Meriden Event, Meriden, 3:30-5:30 P.M.

Supper, 2 sittings, Meriden Grange Hall, 5:30-7:30 P.M.

With such a close schedule, each part of the plan must take place exactly on time. For the Opening Ceremony and the Historical Parade there will be no charge. It should be mentioned, because of inquiries, that the Historical Parade will be planned and put on by the committee. There will **not** be a carnival type of parade, in which each organization enters a float. So, there will be no prizes for it.

On Sunday, August 13th, the churches of the two villages may plan their own Bicentennial observances, or they may combine their planning. On Sunday afternoon, from noon until 6:00 P.M., the Meriden Volunteer Fire Department will hold its Annual Chicken Barbecue.

During the past few months the attention of your chairman has been directed toward co-operation with other towns in the area, as this committee was requested to do.

On April 10, at a meeting in Lebanon, a group of towns on both sides of the river with 1761 charters became organized under the name of "Middle Grants", as these towns, when first chartered, were called Grants. They chose for the area insignia a Twin-State map, showing at the middle the group of allied towns, in outline.

An Executive Committee, composed of the chairmen from each of the towns, has met once each month to discuss the co-operative activities only. That committee has nothing to do with celebrations carried on within each town, except to give them publicity.

A donation to the "Middle Grants" treasury of \$50.00 from each town was requested, to meet the expenses of publicity, brochures of events, roadside markers, display cards of the insignia, etc. Our Town donated \$40.00 on account, keeping the other ten dollars for its own expenses for this past season.

The Information Center for the "Middle Grants" area will be the Visitors' House at Wilder Dam. Brochures of scheduled events in the towns, directions or area maps, and other information will be handed out by the usual custodian there, and also by women of the area serving as hostesses. A historical display relating to the first fifty years only will be arranged from materials furnished by the Exhibition Chairmen of the towns. The rotary slide-projector there will show slides taken within the towns of their special local views. Outside, in view of the highway, a large pictorial map on a bill board will mark

each town with a typical sight—ours being Meriden's covered bridge.

In September, 1960, a special insignia, to be used here in our own Town during this Bicentennial Year, was prepared by this committee and approved by our Selectmen. This design shows a great ancient tree, signifying our 200-year-old Town. Above it two separate but parallel and straight-growing tops signifying the East and West parts of Town that have grown equally side by side during all of those years. From the two villages of Meriden and the Plain, the spreading branches suggest the idea of the radiating roadways and outlying areas of the Town. This insignia will be shown on occasions and used to ornament special Bicentennial souvenirs.

The most recent activity of your Bicentennial Planning Committee has been to organize a group of specially qualified and willing persons who will undertake to do the work of putting on the celebration as it is planned and outlined above. The Moderator has appointed the chairmen of each committee. Additional committee members will be selected to assist, as they are needed. Herewith is the list, as appointed, usually one each from the Plain and Meriden.

Plainfield School District.

At a legal meeting of the voters of the School District of the Town of Plainfield, qualified to vote in the District affairs, Moderator Tracy M. Spalding called the meeting to order at 1:00 in the afternoon of Saturday, March 5, 1961, at the Meriden Town Hall.

The Moderator read the first five articles and the remainder of the warrant omitted until the 2 p.m. meeting. The check-list was charged and the polls opened for voting by the Non-Partisan ballot system.

Article 6. Mr. Hans E. Nicolaisen offered the following motion and moved its adoption: "I move that the reports of the officers, agents and auditors be accepted as printed in the annual report." The motion was seconded and the District voted to accept it by a voice vote in the affirmative.

Article 7. School Board Chairman, Mr. Basil McNamara offered the following resolution and moved its adoption: "Resolved: That the School District raise and appropriate \$84,007.81 and authorize and direct the School Board to apply against said appropriation such income as may be received exclusive of state and federal aid and upon the de-

termination of the amount of such aid to be received by the School District, during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received, and with the School District Clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for School purposes." The resolution was supported and the District voted to accept it by a voice vote in the affirmative.

Article 8. Mrs. Vera H. MacLeay offered the following resolution and moved its adoption: "Resolved: That the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00, of which one half shall be from local taxes, for the purpose of accepting National Defense Education Act Funds (Public Law) (85-864), and to authorize the School Board to make application for, to accept on behalf of the District, and to apply against this appropriation any or all grants or other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act." The resolution was supported and the District voted to accept it by a voice vote in the affirmative.

Article 9. Mr. Nicolaisen offered the following resolution and moved its adoption: "Resolved: That the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the purchase of a school bus and that the District authorize the money in the capital reserve fund to be withdrawn and used toward the purchase of said bus and that the sum of \$4,000.00 be raised by current taxation." After some discussion, William Franklin offered the following amendment: "To raise the sum of \$1,000.00 by direct taxation, and authorize the School Board to issue notes for \$3,000.00, to be retired at the rate of \$1,000.00 each year for the following three years." This amendment was supported. Showing of hand vote. In favor of the amendment—29; against amendment—48. The amendment did not carry. The original resolution was voted in favor of, by a voice vote in the affirmative.

Article 10. Mr. Nicolaisen made the motion to pass over Article 10. His motion was supported and the District voted in the affirmative by a voice vote.

Article 11. Mrs. Byron Snider offered the following resolution and moved its adoption: "Resolved: That the School District raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$550.00 to reimburse the Meriden and Plainfield School lunch programs at the rate of 3c per meal served to elementary school students; proof of number of meals served to be attested to School Board by a copy of the monthly report to the State." Winston Spencer offered the following amendment to the resolution: "The school lunch committees be directed to appeal to the State for permission to increase the rates for school lunches." Vote on amend-

ment was a voice vote in the negative. A paper ballot was requested by Norman Blue for the original resolution: Yes—54, No—40. The paper ballot was in the affirmative and the resolution passed.

Article 12. Mr. Paul Amidon made the motion to pass over Article 12 and it was supported. The District voted in the affirmative to pass over.

Article 13. Mr. C. P. Jones offered the following motion: "I move that the following people be elected at this meeting: Mrs. Julian Thompson, Mrs. Paul Amidon, Mrs. Elbert Barton, Mr. Philip Hurlburt, Mr. Abe Read, and Mr. Basil McNamara, to serve for one year as a study committee working in close cooperation with the School Board, Superintendent and teachers for the purpose of exploring problems relative to the expanding high school tuition population, the crowding in the elementary schools, and the long range needs at all levels of education for the children of Plainfield ; said committee and/or School Board to bring in a report of findings and recommendations for action at the 1961 Annual Plainfield School District meeting." Supported. Mrs. Margaret Rosa offered the following amendment, "I move that this committee, with the School Board, have at least one open meeting for the entire town, to be well advertised beforehand, so that the public could add its suggestions." Voice vote voted to accept the amendment and add to original resolution. Mrs. Bernard Thielen made the following amendment: "I move that the finance committee members replace those names which are in the motion and McNamara, the retiring member of the School Board be a member ex officio." A voice vote on Mrs. Thielen's amendment was in the negative and therefore cast out. The District was then asked to vote on original resolution and Mrs. Rosa's amendment, and the voice was in the affirmative and the Article was carried.

Mr. Norman Blue then referred to Article 12 of the year 1958 and the School Clerk read it, "Move that the Moderator appoint a committee of two to study the School District's transportation costs, set up depreciation schedules for buses and report back to the next annual meeting." Mr. Blue wished to move that this motion be renewed. The District voted in the negative and the motion was cast out.

Mr. William Franklin made the following resolution and moved its adoption: "That the clerk include the minutes of the previous School District meeting in the Annual Report." The District accepted this motion by a voice vote in the affirmative.

Moderator Spalding announced at 4:20 p.m. that the District would return to the first five articles of the warrant.

The polls were officially closed by the Moderator at 6 p.m. and the counting of ballots followed.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and Citizens of Plainfield:

School District problems are centered around books, supplies, buildings, teachers, transportation, budgets and taxes. Plainfield has eight full time, and one part time, teachers, a music teacher and a nurse. The teachers endeavor to challenge each child to do his best in school studies, and most of the children, today, do endeavor to acquire a good education.

Books, supplies, and other "tools" of learning are reasonably adequate, but they never entirely meet the needs of the wide range of pupil ability and interest. Desks are being replaced as necessary, and equipment for science is available with National Defense Education funds paying for one half of the cost. The buildings have been maintained in good condition but do need painting and improvements in the boys' basement at the Plains School. These maintenance items are recommended in the 1961-62 budget. The transporting of over 200 elementary and high school pupils daily creates problems, but the district owned buses are operated at a reasonable cost of about 24 cents per mile.

Taxes are necessary, although painful. There is a close relationship between the amount spent for each pupil's education and the quality of education the pupil acquires. The report from the Study Committee recommends one specific way of providing pupils with greater instruction. All reports from the legislature indicate that there will be a substantial increase in State financial support to Plainfield in 1961-62. This is not shown in the budget because there are no exact figures, but the State Tax Commission will reduce the net local appropriation by the amount of any increased aid.

The long range school problems can be solved by constructive thought and efforts by parents and citizens working with the School Board. The cooperative school program is gaining an important place in making possible good education for more children at a realistic cost in several areas of New Hampshire. This possibility may be worth studying.

In conclusion, I emphasize that education is acquired through hard work. Parents and grandparents can encourage children to attend school with a **desire** to do well and **study effectively**. Children owe

themselves, their community, and country the effort to acquire an education that will make them productive citizens.

My thanks to the School Board, teachers, and all school personnel and citizens who assisted in any way to promote a good school program.
