THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Music Hall in said town on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Free Public Library.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and construction of highways.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the oiling of streets.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for state aid construction of highways, or town roads maintenance in cooperation with the state.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the expenses of the district nurse.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Emily Balch Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hospital.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the Plymouth Common.
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts during the summer of 1936 by the Plymouth Community Band.
13. To see what action the town will take in regard to hiring or leasing a parcel of land for parking purposes in the rear of the Rand block.
14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the lakes region.
15. To choose a library trustee for a term of three years.
16. To choose a trustee of trust funds for a term of three years.
17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
18. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on the early payment of taxes.
19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

During the past year 20 new services have been put in at a cost of \$ 697.17.

Meters have been installed as follows: 33 new installations—dwellings; 2 new Commercial (large); 22 meters replaced. By May 1st, meters will be installed in all cases.

New Construction: Merrill Street, 300 feet new 6 inch pipe and hydrant moved: cost \$764.30. Garland Street: 300 feet new 6 inch pipe and hydrant moved: and new hydrant at Keeble and Garland Streets, cost \$1,050.62. (This serves two new dwellings and takes 6 houses off the old 1¼ inch pipe). Avery Street: 100 feet new 6 inch pipe at a cost of \$199.10.

Replacement: From Golf Course to dwelling of Georgia Richards: 900 feet of 1¼ inch pipe at a cost of \$457.47. Highland Avenue: 135 feet of 6 inch pipe replacing old cement pipe on which two breaks have been caused within a year, cost \$333.40.

Breaks: Hydrant pipe at Court and Main Streets cost \$68.87. Highland Ave., in February 1935, cost \$135.95. Service pipe on Main Street at Ronan Block, cost \$179.95. Repairs or additions on pipes under the cement road make necessary putting 4 inch pipe supports under the cement so that the road will not "sink" after the work is completed.

Freezing and Thawing: Considering the experience of the neighboring towns and cities the District has been fortunate in having but seven "freeze-ups" the past year and cost of thawing was \$211.50.

A new roof was necessary at the Pumping Station at "Peg Mill" and one was installed at a price of \$50.00 for labor and materials.

The new power contract with the Pemigewasset Electric Company shows a substantial reduction in amount paid for electricity.

Note liability has been reduced by payment of \$4,000.00 on notes and interest rate on outstanding notes has also been reduced.

It is impossible to secure Federal Aid as there are not enough men on Relief in this town so that the Government will authorize any funds for projects here.

All water rents in arrears are in process of collection.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

We submit the financial report together with the reports of the Superintendent of Schools, Headmaster of the High School and the School Nurse which give in detail the management of our schools.

With the help of the State Department we have substituted a School Nurse in place of the Medical Examiner which has proved very satisfactory thus far. We think it advisable to continue this plan and have asked for an additional \$100.00 to finance this work.

It became necessary to renew the plumbing in the basement of the Model School this year which was the direct cause for the large repair expense charged to the District Schools.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSING SERVICE

For First Half of Year 1935-1936

To the Members of Plymouth School Board:

One of the chief objectives of a school nurse's work should be good health habit forming. I have tried to work with this thought in view.

In September, the usual health inspection was made and cards sent home reporting symptoms found and advising medical advice.

726 children were examined with findings of the following symptoms:

Dental defects	236
Enlarged and diseased tonsils	54
Skin diseases	26
Under weight	12
Defect vision	65

The heart and thyroid cases will be followed up from last year's diagnosis.

The following number of children have had physical corrections made since last school examination:

Dental corrections	134
Tonsil operations	20
Correction of vision	24

The children in the elementary schools were weighed a second time in December as it is far more important to know that a child is gaining than that he weighs a certain amount at a certain time.

Through the kindness of the Woman's Club, milk is being furnished at school to 14 malnourished children, and Cod Liver Oil was given to some through the State Department of Education.

21 school children attended the clinic and were examined by Dr. Deming in October.

Since September, six children have been taken to Dr. White for eye examinations and glasses. Some of these bills were paid by the local Red Cross Chapter

and the State Public Welfare. One child was in Massachusetts General Hospital a week for a skin condition affecting her eye sight. One child attended an orthopedic clinic at Manchester and was examined by Dr. Jones who advised an operation. One child goes to Dr. Jones at stated intervals for treatment. One child was at Massachusetts General Hospital for operation of cleft palate. There has also been occasion to take several children to local doctors for diagnosis and treatment.

Through the cooperation of the Community Chest a dental clinic is being carried on every Friday morning, 30 children have received treatment. The local Red Cross is also helping with this work.

A "Prevention of Home Accidents Campaign" was carried on through the schools by the Red Cross and a Home Nursing Course is being conducted with a class of girl scouts.

Epidemics of contagious diseases have, as yet, been light. Ten cases of mumps, and eleven cases of german measles have been reported, also, one case of scarlet fever at Lower Intervale School.

116 school calls have been made by the nurse, which consist of inspection, weighing and measuring, special calls (as injuries and contagious diseases) class room talk, arrangement of clinic, etc.

Twelve home calls and 45 business calls have been made in connection with the work.

I have greatly appreciated the cooperation of parents, school authorities, teachers and public agencies.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Plymouth:

I submit my fifteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Statistics

Enrollment for the school year ending June 30, 1935, was 734.

Distribution: High School, 334; Model School, 280; Rural Schools, 120.

Non-residents, 188; average membership, 670; per cent of attendance, 95; promoted, 607; failures 33.

Visits: members of school board, 21; citizens, 784; Superintendent, 989.

Total registration, February 1, 1936, was 753.

Distribution: High School, 357; Model School, 275; Rural Schools, 121.

Subtracting three for transfers within the system, we have 750 different pupils: 383 boys; 367 girls. Non-residents number 203. Withdrawals and removals brought the total membership to 707 on February 1, 1936.

Of the 48 pupils graduated from the Junior High School grades of both Model School and Rural Schools, 45 entered Plymouth High School, while two entered similar schools in other states. Forty-two are still carrying on in Plymouth High. A large class of 65 pupils received high school diplomas.

Repairs

Repairs during the summer were sufficient for the upkeep of school property. It would be difficult to overestimate the value for health and sanitation of the toilet facilities installed in the Model School building.

Changes in Teaching Staff

At Lower Intervale, after two years of experience in North Groton rural school, Anna Collin has taken

the place of Miss Greenly, who completed thirteen years of conscientious service in the Lower Intervale school and community.

In the Model School, Mrs. Clyde Fussell, finished the year as substitute critic teacher in the fifth grade. Her place is taken by Berthe Desmarais of Lowell, Massachusetts. Esther Bozarth, third grade critic, and Hazel Corson, fourth grade critic, terminated several years of highly satisfactory service to accept positions in Wellesley, Massachusetts. In their places are two experienced teachers. Katherine Longley of Norway, Maine, came to our third grade from a position as critic teacher in the Normal School at Machias, Maine. Lulu Hoyt of Limerick, Maine, has taught the fourth grade since the first of October after Estelle Winkley of Rochester substituted for a month. Miss Hoyt has taught several years, her last position being in Plymouth, Massachusetts. Last December, Hilda Haskell of Northeast Harbor, Maine, became teacher of the Kindergarten after the resignation of Wilma Roberts.

Mrs. Helen Keniston retired from her position in Plymouth High School after many years of unusual competence as head of the household arts department. Her place has been taken by Margaret Newman of Keene, who has taught two years in the high school at Warner, N. H. The marriage of Rita Stimson last August created an unexpected vacancy which was filled by Doreen Nelson of Woodsville, who teaches the same courses as Miss Stimson and assists in coaching girls' athletics.

General Progress

Our teaching staff is composed of men and women trained and skilled in the standards of their profession. By constant study and by summer school attendance by a large number of them, they are keeping abreast of the constant changes in the field of education, thus increasing their individual competency in terms of professional growth. A leading aim of supervision is to assist them in gaining higher standards of teaching and management.

The function of schools is the development of character. Training in the fundamentals, the manifold school activities, and creative experiences are accessories to the development of socially serviceable personalities. The superintendent is certain that such progress is being made.

This year for the first time all our schools are on the schedule of thirty-eight weeks in the year to realize a total of 180 school days.

Health Service

Under the authority voted at the last school meeting, Plymouth is employing Mrs. Anna Lovett, R. N., as school nurse, uniting in a district with several towns. A careful reading of her report will show that her work is not only medical inspection and follow-up; also in a practical sense she is a teacher of health and sanitation. I recommend the continuance of this important service.

Adult Education

One important result of last winter's adult classes was the formation of an excellent community band. Over 90 interested adults are enrolled in classes under the direction of Mrs. Velma Hatch and Ynes Minickello. In this work the State Board of Education is cooperating with the W. P. A. authorities and our local school board is furnishing classroom facilities.

The High School

As usual, detailed information about Plymouth High School will be found in the Headmaster's report. As superintendent I have made almost daily calls at the high school, have visited all classes and have noted the organization and management. I again attest verifiable facts: that the school is truly progressive; its conduct and morale are high; its teaching force is competent; and it stands well among the high schools of the state.

The school offers courses directed to the satisfaction of varying individuals. However, manual arts for boys should be added to our curriculum offerings.

The number of teachers is inadequate for so large a school. The average load per teacher is above that of the state as a whole. Another teacher should be added to the high school staff at the beginning of the next school year.

Again I recommend a supervisor in music in both rural schools and in high school. We should not neglect this important subject longer.

Recommendation Repeated

The issue of accommodations in the Model School should be faced at once and long range planning inaugurated to provide for this.

Finally, I wish to express my thanks to the School Board for kindly cooperation with me in my efforts.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit, herewith my seventh annual report as the Headmaster of the Plymouth High School.

Class of 1935

The exercises were held in the Plymouth Theatre for the second consecutive year. There were 65 members of the class of 1935 to graduate. 35 girls and 30 boys. Of this number, at least 19 have entered post-secondary institutes, distributed as follows:

Graduates of the Plymouth High School who have met the college entrance requirements and secured a certificate grade (85) in each subject, are entitled to enter without examination the University of New Hampshire, the Worcester Polytechnic Institute; Simmons College; Maine State Agricultural College; Middlebury College; Syracuse University; Dartmouth College; and all the Colleges and Universities represented by the New England College Entrance Certificate Board.

Aims and Methods

The courses are so arranged, that any student with the ability and desire to work and to carry on college work can meet the specific requirements of any college. It is, however, very important that a student, who is planning to go to college, determine early in his course what college he wishes to enter, and what kind of work he intends to pursue.

The school not only aims to prepare its students for college but it also aims to give that majority not going to college an education which will help them to do successful work and to become useful and honorable citizens. The school is helpless in gaining these ideal objectives without the cooperation of the home, the church and the community.

In order that all entering the school may derive some benefits during their membership and presence here, the teachers are ever alert to meet the change in social and educational conditions and the difference in the rate of speed which the individuals show in doing their work. The nature of the assignments and subject matter involved are carefully supervised, while the teachers are always ready to aid each student to overcome his difficulties.

Enrollment

The total enrollment for the year 1935-36 has been even larger than in previous years, with 358 students distributed in the four classes. 186 of the pupils in Plymouth High School have come from the surrounding towns of Campton, Thornton, Holderness, Rumney, Wentworth, Warren, Groton, Hebron, Center Harbor, Bridgewater and New Hampton.

School Activities

The annual Prize Speaking Contest was held on May 3, 1935, with nine contestants. The event was sponsored by the English Department, under the supervision of Miss Muchmore and Mrs. Frink.

A school orchestra, under the direction of Mrs. Harl Pease has furnished an opportunity for some of the students to study instrumental music. Such an organization is not only an asset to the individuals but to the school as well.

Last Fall, for the first time in several years, a chorus for boys and girls, was started. There are now 75 who are enjoying this privilege under the direction of Mrs. Agnes Potter. It is hoped that this activity may continue, so that the boys and girls who go out from this school may have as good a knowledge and understanding of the subject as those of other schools.

The Girls' Club and a Home Economics Club have been re-organized under the leadership of Miss Newman, the Home Economics Teacher.

School parties and assemblies have been conducted throughout the year under the direction and with the aid of the teachers. Several outside speakers have also appeared before the school (at assembly).

Under the supervision and coaching of Mr. Dawson, many members of the school have had an opportunity to participate in athletics, such as football, basketball, and baseball. The victories gained have been many, but in victory or defeat on the field, or in the hall, all have been better trained to meet the problems of life in a fair and sportsmanlike way.

The headmaster feels that there are other activities which should be included within the school to reach a larger number of students with different abilities, but on account of large enrollment, the present teaching staff finds their days fully occupied.

The school deeply appreciates all the aid and cooperation the communities have given in carrying out these outside activities as well as the regular program of the school. Neither could be as well done, without the help of pupils, parents, and friends.

The members of the Senior Office Practice Class, as in the past few years have performed the duties of

stenographers, typists, clerks, and bookkeepers in the offices of the headmaster and the superintendent, under the supervision of Miss Riley of the Commercial Department. It has not only given the boys and girls the practical application required, but has saved the school district several hundred dollars.

Recommendations

1. That in the near future some kind of manual arts course be organized for the boys.
2. That winter sports have a place in the school program.
3. That the 1936 graduation exercises be held in the Plymouth Theatre.

Conclusion

I wish to thank you, Superintendent Speare, the members of our School Board, the citizens of Plymouth and outside communities, and my excellent staff of teachers for the support that has been given me during the past year.
