School Report.

In compliance with the Statutes of the State, making it the duty of the Superintending School Committee to report to the Town the condition of the schools under his charge for the past year, your Committee submits the following to the citizens of Wentworth:

Without giving a separate account of each of the schools in Town, I will say that as nearly as I could judge, they have made good improvement with two exceptions.

The summer term in districts No. 2 and 9 is deserving of special mention.

In district No. 8, in winter, I did not find good order, and the scholars necessarily did not make the improvement they should. It was the teacher's first attempt at teaching and she, like a good many beginners, failed because she tried too hard to please all the scholars, while they, taking advantage of her inexperience, made it unpleasant for their teacher and unprofitable for themselves. The fall term in district No. 11 did not prove a profitable one to the district. I received notice from the Prudential Committee when the school commenced, but the teacher not having a certificate I did not visit till near the middle of the term, when I found only two scholars present, the rest having been kept away by their parents. I could form no conclusions as to the cause of the trouble, from the appearance of the school with only two small scholars present. There were two faults apparent, however; one of them being the teacher's, in not obtaining a certificate before she commenced school. The other was the parents', in keeping their children from school. . If

they thought the teacher incompetent to teach the school, it was their duty to apply the proper remedy and have her discharged. Such a proceeding would in my opinion have given better satisfaction on both sides than keeping their children from school.

There have been new black-boards obtained in districts No. 5 and 6 the past year. The citizens of district No. 1 should see that their school-room is provided with more black-board before another term of school, as no teacher can instruct a school like that properly without more black-board.

The enumeration of schools for the year 1883, as taken by the Selectmen on the first day of April, was as follows: Whole number of boys, 67; whole number of girls, 60; making the number of scholars between the ages of 5 and 15 years, 127.

Some of the Prudential Committees do not engage a teacher till a few days before they want school to commence, when they often find it difficult to get one that they want. They should remember that *good* teachers are in demand, and act in season to secure the services of one, before they are all engaged.
