BURNING REGULATIONS

TO REPORT A FIRE DIAL 483-2521

The State of New Hampshire requires that written permits be obtained for all open fires at all times when the ground is not snow covered.

Permits may be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden, Mr. Cedric Preston, for grass, brush, campfires, etc. Permits must be obtained on the day burning is to be accomplished.

Burn when there is no wind, on rainy days and damp days, in a safe place and in accordance with the terms of the permit. Burn before 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M. Keep some buckets of water close by; if wind develops, promptly extinguish the fire. All fires must be extinguished before you depart the scene.

PARKING DURING SNOW STORM

- A. From November 1 to April 1 of each year no person shall park any motor vehicle on any public highway between the hours of 11 p.m. and 8 a.m. or at any other time in such a manner as to impede snow removal operations.
- B. Any vehicle parked in violation of section A hereof may be towed by the road agent, the chief of police or their agents or by independent contractors engaged by the road agent or the chief of police; any vehicles so towed shall be stored and released to the owner only upon payment of the cost of towing and storage by the owner.
- C. Any person violating section A hereof shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed twenty-five dollars for each offense.

DOG ORDINANCE

- A. **RESTRAINT:** All dogs shall be restrained from running at large within the limits of the town, except when they are on the owner's or keeper's property or being used for hunting or training purposes.
- B. **PENALTY:** Any person or persons, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than fifteen dollars (\$15.00) for each offense.

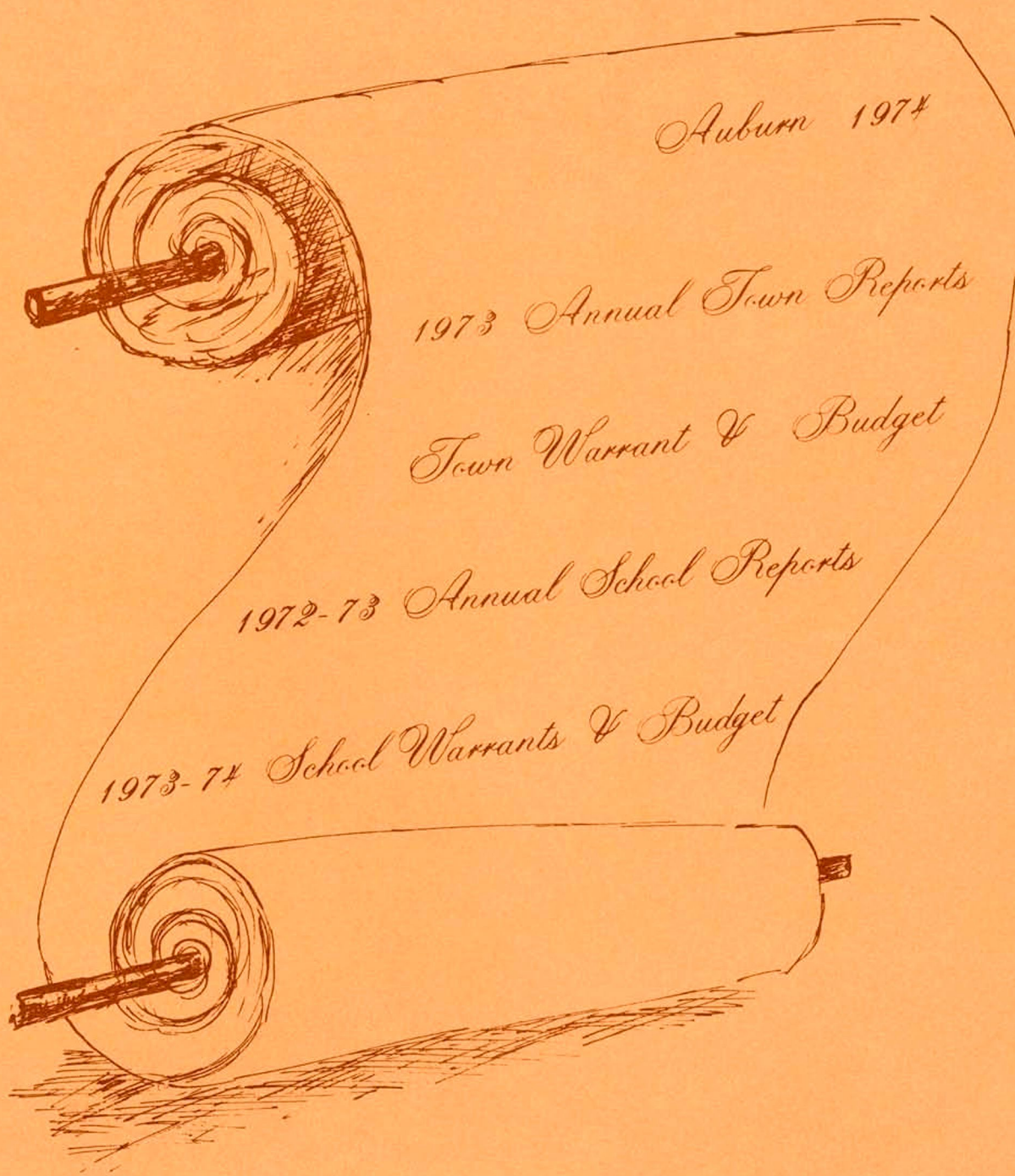

To the inhabitants of the Town of Auburn, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Roy Seavey Memorial Gymnasium of the Auburn Village School in said Auburn on Tuesday, March the 5th, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- First: To bring in your ballots for:
- Town Clerk for the ensuing year,
 - One Selectman for three years,
 - Town Treasurer for the ensuing year,
 - Highway Agent for the ensuing year,
 - One Library Trustee for three years,
 - One Cemetery Trustee for three years,
 - One Trust Fund Trustee for three years,
 - One Auditor for two years,
 - One member of the Police Commission for three years.
- Second: To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
(Vote on Official Ballot)

Polls will open at 10:00 A.M. and close at 7:00 P.M.

You are also notified to meet on Saturday, March the 9th, next at 2:00 P.M. at the Auburn Village School, Roy Seavey Memorial Gymnasium to consider the following articles:

- Third: To see if the Town will vote to incur debt for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes.
- Fourth: To see if the Town will vote to accept such Trust Funds as may have come in during the year and Trust Funds as have not been previously accepted.
- Fifth: To see if the Town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham Fund for schools or library.
- Sixth: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept, in the name of and in behalf of the town, gifts for the use of the Town.

- Seventh: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept aid relative to disasters.
- Eighth: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any and/or all property acquired by tax deed, by public sale with the right to accept or reject all bids.
- Ninth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to allow the Selectmen to pay up to this amount, to anyone giving information leading to the arrest and conviction of any persons responsible for setting incendiary fires, depending upon the severity of the fire. (This amount included in budget)
- Tenth: To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 55:9A and RSA 55:9B, giving the town clerk the power of the supervisors of the checklist. No applications hereunder shall be accepted after the last meeting of the supervisors before an election. Such application shall be made during the regular hours of the town clerk.
- Eleventh: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$28,272.31 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or to take any other action hereon:
- To rebuild the following roads:
Nutt Road and Maple Falls Road. The balance of appropriations to be used on Calef Road. (This money included in budget)
- Twelfth: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Revenue Sharing Fund, the sum of thirty thousand (\$30,000.00) dollars to be set aside for the purpose of future sanitary landfill. These monies will not be spent until authorized by town meeting. (Funds appropriated from the Revenue Sharing entitlement period January 1974-December 1974) (Included in budget)

Thirteenth: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972 for the use of set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or to take any other action hereon:

Such enclosure, including gates thereon, shall be not less than four (4) feet in height.

ARTICLES IN THE TOWN WARRANT AND PROCEEDINGS OF THE
MEETING MARCH 6, 1973

The Annual Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator C. Donald Stritch at 10:00 A.M., March 6, 1973. The Moderator read the Town Warrant Articles 1 through 3. The School District Warrant was read by the School Moderator C. Donald Stritch. The ballot box was inspected and found empty. The polls were declared open and balloting proceeded under the direction of the Moderator.

The business meeting was called to order by the Moderator C. Donald Stritch at 2 P.M., March 10, 1973. Rev. Herbert Moore gave the invocation. The Moderator read the results of the election on March 6, 1973.

ARTICLE 4 – TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO INCUR DEBT FOR TEMPORARY LOANS IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES.

Mr. Dollard moved that the article be approved as printed. Moved and Seconded. Passed.

ARTICLE 5 – TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO ACCEPT SUCH TRUST FUNDS AS MAY HAVE COME IN DURING THE YEAR AND TRUST FUNDS AS HAVE NOT BEEN PREVIOUSLY ACCEPTED.

Mrs. Albert Burt moved that the article be accepted as printed. Seconded. Passed.

ARTICLE 6 – TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO USE THE INCOME OF THE H. B. BURNHAM FUND FOR SCHOOLS OR LIBRARY.

Margaret Griffin moved that the H. B. Burnham Fund interest be used for the Library. Seconded. Passed.

ARTICLE 7 – TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO ACCEPT, IN THE NAME OF AND IN BEHALF OF THE TOWN, GIFTS FOR THE USE OF THE TOWN.

Mr. Lacourse moved adoption of the article. Seconded. Passed.

ARTICLE 8 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO DISPOSE OF ANY AND/OR ALL PROPERTY ACQUIRED BY TAX DEED, BY PUBLIC SALE WITH THE RIGHT TO ACCEPT OR REJECT ALL BIDS.

Mr. Dutka moved the acceptance of the article. Seconded. Mr. Dutka offered the following amendment to the article: "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the property formerly of Richard Desrochers acquired by tax deed by offering, in writing, said parcel to him for the total amount of the tax sales, plus all interest, costs and legal expense, but if such former owner does not accept such offer within fifteen (15) days of the same by paying said amounts in full and taking a deed of the premises, then the Selectmen may dispose of such property in accordance with the procedure otherwise provided in this Article". Seconded. Amendment passed. Article passed with amendment.

ARTICLE 9 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,000.00) TO ALLOW THE SELECTMEN TO PAY UP TO THIS AMOUNT, TO ANYONE GIVING INFORMATION LEADING TO THE ARREST AND CONVICTION OF ANY PERSONS RESPONSIBLE FOR SETTING INCENDIARY FIRES, DEPENDING UPON THE SEVERITY OF THE FIRE.

Mr. Donald Dollard moved the adoption of the article as printed. Motion seconded. Article passed.

ARTICLE 10 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO WITHDRAW UP TO THIRTY-SIX HUNDRED DOLLARS, (\$3,600.00) FROM THE EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR THE PURCHASE OF TWO NEW POWER ANGLING SNOW PLOWS AND WINGS.

Mr. Clifford Stacy moved adoption of the article. Seconded. Adopted.

ARTICLE 11 - TO SEE IF THE TOWN WILL VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF ONE HUNDRED FIFTY DOLLARS, (\$150.00) TO PROVIDE CLERICAL ASSISTANCE, PURCHASE ENVELOPES AND RELATED COMMITTEE COSTS, FOR THE BASIC WORK OF THE AUBURN TOWN CONSERVATION COMMISSION AS AUTHORIZED BY R.S.A. 36A. (BY PETITION)

M. Nancy Willey moved that article be adopted as printed. Then she offered the following amendment. "To see if the town will vote to 'insert the work *establish*', raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to provide clerical assistance, purchase envelopes and related committee costs, for the basic work of the Auburn Town Conservation Commission as authorized by R.S.A. 36A by petition of the following:" Amendment lost. Vote on original motion. Article defeated.

REPORT of the FOREST FIRE WARDEN and DISTRICT CHIEF

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our state by the forest fire warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 A.M. and 5:30 P.M. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's Job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

The Commission's local planning assistance program continued to be of significant value to various Auburn officials and boards during 1973. Local concern for efficiency in government, coordination among Town boards, and increased activity in land subdivision required the presence of a professional staff planner at a series of sixteen meetings held in the Town Hall to deal with a variety of local development issues. Among those participating in these sessions were members of the Planning Board, the Board of Adjustment, School Board, representatives of Supervisory Union #10, and the Board of Selectmen.

Considerable "in house" resources were also utilized to provide administrative and technical services for the Town on a variety of matters ranging from review and update of subdivision regulations to legal services related to Planning Board and Board of Adjustment activities with respect to the application of minimum requirements of the zoning ordinance.

Although Auburn did not experience an increase in population of the magnitude felt by some other communities in the region during the past year, it is important to note that land subdivision activity in Town doubled that of the previous year in spite of the fact the 1973 Town Meeting supported a zoning change which doubled the minimum lot size permitted in the residential districts.

In a related context, current figures project a population increase of approximately twenty-three percent between 1970 and 1975. In terms of absolute numbers, this is by no means staggering, but an associated demand for increased services, particularly educational facilities, should not come as any surprise. What type? How much? When? and Where? are examples of considerations that must be answered shortly.

Regional Planning Program

The SNHPC staff, under the direction of the Board of Commissioners acting on behalf of their respective communities, initiated a series of "area-wide" programs during the year. Several of these, as they are implemented, will produce tangible benefits to the region as a whole while others are intended to support local management capabilities by developing back-up data and providing technical services required by local decision makers. Current regional priorities include future land use, transportation and the development of inter-municipal agreements to permit implementation of our regional water and sewerage facilities program. Member communities are being asked this year to adopt the provisions of RSA Chapter 252 which authorizes the Selectmen to negotiate agreements for water and sewerage services with other municipalities.

FROM YOUR REPRESENTATIVE TO THE GENERAL COURT

During 1973, my first term as a Representative to the State Legislature, representing Auburn, Candia and Chester, I was only too glad in seeking guidance and comments from the proposed legislation which had a bearing on their well-being.

It was gratifying to me that the residents of Auburn came to me for information and assistance on matters pertaining to the state government and every such request was acted on to the best of my ability.

I feel it most appropriate to tell you that the other two Representatives, Richard D. Benton of Chester and Helen Wilson of Candia, who also represent Auburn, Candia and Chester at the State House, strongly supported, along with me, the concept of "economy and efficiency in Government" and have worked with me in supporting legislation which permits towns and school districts to manage their own affairs with as little interference as possible from the state government.

Visiting Nurse Association services are available to Auburn residents in their homes at no additional cost to the town. This United Community Services association is a home health agency certified to care for medicare patients as well as persons of all ages, regardless of race, creed or ability to pay, who need nursing care or instruction.

Services on a part time basis (with physician's orders) include:

- Skilled nursing care and/or treatment
- Physical therapy
- Occupational therapy
- Speech therapy
- Homemaker Home Health Aide service

There is a fee for service and payment will be discussed on the first visit. Adjustments can be made if full fee cannot be paid. Some patients are eligible to have service paid for through Medicare, Medicaid and other health insurances.

Services at no charge include:

- Maternal and child health guidance and instruction
- Classes for expectant parents (held in Manchester)
- Family health guidance with emphasis on prevention of disease and promotion of healthful living
- Regional immunization clinics yearly.

473 visits were made by Mrs. Davis, R.N. and Mrs. Roy, R.N. to Auburn residents in 1973. These nurses assisted with immunization clinics held in Auburn for Auburn and Candia children.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the citizens of Auburn I hereby submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The staff of the Auburn Village School has devoted many hours in attempting to improve the educational opportunities offered to our students. Our basic philosophy, simply stated, is that we believe each child should be given assistance to develop and progress to the best of his ability for each has varying degrees of ability, needs, emotions and values and thus should be able to achieve success within the bounds of his capacity.

We have tried to bring this statement into reality with our curriculum development. This Supervisory Union has operated on the premise that curriculum development can best be accomplished by the staff working together. We fully realize that a good curriculum is never complete, that it should undergo constant evaluation so that it may meet the needs of our changing community. I would like to express my appreciation to Arthur Mitchell, Jr., Assistant Superintendent of Schools, for his leadership in the curriculum area.

During the past two years emphasis has been placed on developing a system of Management by Objectives. All school administrators in Supervisory Union #10 participated in a MBO Workshop this past summer. We were fortunate to have as a consultant in this area Dr. Joseph Ferreira of Boston University. Each principal has developed objectives for this school year. These objectives will be evaluated by the Superintendent and School Board at the close of this current school year.

The rate of inflation has become a major problem facing our school system. National figures, published by *School Management*, show a national per pupil increase of over 63% in the last six years. The increase between the 1972-1973 school year and the 1973-1974 school year is 14.5% on a national level. The Auburn School District faces the same buying problems as the average taxpayer. Everything we purchase to operate the school is increasing day by day. We realize our responsibility to the taxpayer to spend his money wisely. With this in mind, we are endeavoring to establish the ground work for a pupil program budget which should be operating in this school district sometime in the near future.

As the result of a vote by the New Hampshire State Board of Education, the Auburn School District will leave Supervisory Union #10 as of July 1, 1974. I wish at this time to express to the Auburn

School Board my appreciation for their support and encouragement over the past year. I wish to thank the people of Auburn for their support and would also like to express my appreciation to the building principal and the teachers in Auburn for their efforts to provide a good education for the students of Auburn.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the citizens of Auburn, I hereby submit my report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

I returned to my duties as Assistant Superintendent of Schools for Auburn in January 1973. An entire new teaching staff and principal were in the building for the second year. Meetings were held with small groups of teachers in order to reinforce communication between the classroom and the central administrative office. This was part of a program intended to maintain an awareness of the needs and problems of the classroom teacher in order that we may plan more effectively. As a result of these and other meetings a workshop day in March was designed around the specific requests and needs of the classroom teacher. A program was planned for the summer to introduce a perceptual approach in reading. The Auburn primary teachers volunteered to attend this program. A Math Curriculum Committee met throughout the year with Dr. Greenes, a consultant from Boston University. In order to investigate, plan and update our mathematics program, the Math Committee met throughout the year with representatives from other towns of Union 10; and with the help of teacher surveys and student test

results were able to make a decision by May of 1973. This decision was presented to the staff and administration in that month. The introductory program for the staff was scheduled for August of '73 with follow-up sessions to take place during the year. The Auburn Staff showed great enthusiasm and willingness to participate in the program.

The Social Studies Committee formed in August 1972 continued their work with Dr. Phyllis Henry of Boston University. They met in conjunction with other teachers from Supervisory Union 10 to explore the philosophy behind social studies in the educational setting. The committee surveyed teachers and new materials were investigated. A program was selected that would investigate not only the American style of life but other cultures in order that we make comparisons between our way of life and peoples of other longitudes and latitudes in an attempt to understand the reasons behind different habits and customs of people. The fourth grade program is the study of New Hampshire. Whereas a commercial material is not available the teachers developed their own program following the same organization of the commercial program that they purchased. Our teachers have had the honor of being asked by the Northeastern Social Studies group to present the material they developed to the spring convention of the Northeastern Social Studies Council in Boston. The committee planned to continue meeting through the summer of 1973 and 1974 to finalize their work in the social studies area. We have been proud of the enthusiasm that Auburn staff members showed as members of their curriculum committees. Curriculum is the study of what is taught and how it is taught in the school. If it is to truly fit the needs of the children in a community then the "how" of its being taught can best be prepared by the local staff. We have found our most productive curriculum sessions have been held in the summer when teachers can give full concentration to that creative task of planning curriculum implementation.

I would like to express my appreciation of the Auburn Staff for their cooperation and professionalism in the past year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL - JUNE, 1973

To the School Board, citizens of Auburn, the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent of Schools, I hereby submit my annual report for the school year 1972-73.

The total enrollment at Auburn Village School has once again remained relatively stable regardless of changes in individual registrations. The academic year opened with 362 students registered and closed with a pupil population of 364. At this time it is difficult to project the actual first grade enrollment for the coming year, but it is important to note that there was an increase of 16 prospective first graders over the usual number registered in May.

During the week before Labor Day the faculty participated in orientation meetings. There were three teachers new to the building, and Mrs. Timme, a former teacher at Auburn, returned to teach in the sixth grade. These meetings are valuable in that teachers have an opportunity to plan curriculum, prepare classrooms, and meet with specialists who work with individual children in the school.

In-service meetings and curriculum planning continued throughout the year. All members of the staff participated in a Union-wide workshop in the spring. Throughout the year there were teachers serving on various committees - Miss Balon, Math; Mrs. Timme and Mrs. Harris, Social Studies; and Mrs. Gann, Report Cards. Mr. Morgan and Miss Houghton were the school representatives to the Staff Development Committee which is working on teacher certification requirements for this supervisory union. Mrs. Dorothy Nault, a teacher in Derry, spoke at an in-service meeting, showing slides of schools she had visited in England, and displaying many examples of teacher-made curriculum materials.

There were nearly one hundred visitors in the school for the open house held during American Education Week. This provides parents and friends an opportunity to see their children participating in regular classes. Mrs. Kenney, Speech Therapist, held her annual parents' meeting in November. Two coffee hours for parents of Primary and Intermediate students were held in the spring by Miss Aylward, Reading Teacher, and Mrs. Pounder. At these meetings Reading and Math levels were explained. The origin and planning for the programs now in operation, including the school philosophy, were reviewed. Many parents also visited the annual Science Fair for the seventh and eighth grade students, under the direction of Mr. Savinelli, and later the second and third grade Science Fair under the direction of Mrs. Taylor. There were many fine exhibits at both of these Fairs, evidence of much planning and work on the part of both students and teachers.

Many interesting activities are carried on at special times of the year. For example, the fifth grade, under the direction of Mrs. Gann and Miss Balon, planned and served a three course Thanksgiving dinner in their classroom. Second graders dressed up as Indians and Pilgrims and enjoyed their regular hot lunch served in a classroom, which was decorated appropriately for the feast. During basketball season, cheerleading was organized under the supervision and coaching of Miss Davieau. The girls had new uniforms and added a great deal to the spirit of the game. The annual Spelling Bee sponsored by the Union Leader is an exciting event. Bruce Willey, a seventh grader, was the winner in the school and the representative to the county meet.

Special programs for students have been held throughout the year. Some of them were: "Movies of the Month" paid for by the PTA; a lecture by Sue Ellen Bryson, an IFYE delegate who had just returned from Turkey; a movie on skating shown by a representative from the McIntyre Ski School; a program on smoking presented by a representative from the Cancer Society and a radio personality; personnel from the Elliot Hospital and Navy recruiting office came to discuss careers with the seventh and eighth graders; Rev. Moore presented a film to the seventh and eighth grade boys and answered questions on the problems of adolescence; and a National Guardsman spoke to the fourth grade on the relationship of the colonial militia and Guardsmen today.

In addition to special programs, all students went on field trips in conjunction with their academic studies. Lexington and Concord, House of Seven Gables, Museum of Fine Arts, New England Aquarium, N. H. Historical Association, State House, Moosehead Orchard, and the Union Leader building were some of the places visited.

Mrs. Heald, school nurse, showed many films on health and safety, conducted clinics, and brought in special speakers in addition to giving attention of the needs of individual children. Through her efforts the assembly on smoking was a success, and Mrs. Beaudry, from the State Dental Department, spent two days showing films, demonstrating dental health techniques and answering questions. Mrs. Marcoplos, Guidance Counselor, and Mrs. Kenney, Speech Therapist, have contributed greatly to the well-being of many children in the school. Miss Aylward, Reading Teacher, has been of great assistance in helping with in-service meetings for teachers as well as guiding the Reading Program. Mrs. O'Brien, Librarian, has endeavored to supplement areas of the library such as arts and crafts, biography, and history, in her selection of books for the enrichment of the curriculum.

SRA testing during this year was limited to Grades 3, 5, and 7. Grade 4 was tested for mental ability. These tests were administered during May, as were standardized Reading tests in all grades.

On June 10th, an Open House was held in honor of Mrs. Taylor, third grade teacher, who is retiring this year. This event was planned by the community in appreciation for the services Mrs. Taylor has rendered to the school and her many students. It was well attended and a happy event for all. Mrs. Taylor received many gifts from various groups and individuals.

Graduation exercises were held in the Roy Seavey Auditorium on June 20th. Forty-two students received diplomas. Honors were won by Elizabeth Shatford, Highest Honors, Emerson Heald, Valedictorian, and Thomas Dollard, Salutatorian. DAR Citizenship awards were presented to Dianne Therrien and Donald Crete. Joseph Hartel, a former teacher, was the speaker of the evening.

At this time I would like to thank all the members of the teaching staff for their contributions throughout the year; Mrs. Preston, school secretary, for her invaluable assistance; the cafeteria workers and custodians, whose services are so vital; and the teacher aides for work on behalf of the school program.

I would like to express my thanks to Mr. Ellis, Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Mitchell, Assistant Superintendent, and the members of the School Board for their encouragement and assistance throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE GUIDANCE COUNSELOR

To the Superintendent of Schools, Members of the School Board and Citizens of Auburn:

Guidance and counseling in Auburn has been especially busy and gratifying this year, since I returned "not as a stranger". Counseling was well-established on a "walk-in" basis among children, teachers, and parents. Contacts with public agencies and special schools were accomplished, and mutual cooperation continued on behalf of several Auburn children.

During the year I counseled directly with sixty children and ten groups of children. Nine scheduled meetings were held with groups of teachers. Twenty-one scheduled parent conferences were held, and many more occurred spontaneously. Individual teachers referred students freely and consulted with me regularly concerning student needs.

A start was made in the area of career exposure for seventh and eighth graders, a program by the Junior Naval ROTC for the boys and a program for children in the nursing field for the girls, thanks to Mrs. Marion Heald, School Nurse.

Evaluations for five children with special needs were accomplished. The cooperation and sensitivity of Mrs. Gail Kenney, Speech Therapist, was especially helpful in this regard. Regular contacts and meetings with agencies and schools offering special education for the handicapped child were maintained throughout the year on the behalf of Auburn youngsters. At the present time, we have fourteen children with special needs being assisted by such schools or agencies, four residential and ten day students. Most of these will be re-absorbed into the Auburn School as soon as sufficient progress is made.

The program in Guidance and Counseling for 1972-1973 has been Federally funded through Title I ESEA, and your counselor served on the Title I Advisory Board for parents.

In June, 1973, I participated in an Intensive Behavior Modification Workshop in Columbus, Ohio; this was extremely rewarding.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, the members of the Auburn School Board, the Principal, School Nurse, Reading Consultant, teachers and parents for consistent interest and support of the Guidance and Counseling Program.

READING CONSULTANT

To the Auburn School Board and the Superintendent of Schools.

During the school year 1972-73, progress has been made in strengthening the Reading Program. Emphasis has been placed on providing all children with a coordinated, sequential training in basic skills. Frequent meetings during the year between teachers and the consultant have aided in making the present program strong, yet flexible, and have provided opportunities for planning for the coming year.

In the fall the first graders were given the reading readiness test. In May, all students in grades 1-7 were given the Gates-MacGinitie Reading Test. These results are helpful in assisting with individual and group placement. Children selected for remedial help were from the primary grades during the months of September through January. Children were selected from the intermediate grades to receive remedial help from February through June.

The Scott Foresman Reading Systems has been purchased for grades 1-3. This program offers a skills-centered approach that helps pupils gauge their own progress. Mrs. Roberta Best, an Educational Consultant for Scott, Foresman and Company conducted an In-Service-Workshop for the primary teachers. At this time she explained in detail the components of the Reading Systems and offered suggestions for using the materials. New materials were purchased for grades 7 and 8 which will allow for greater individualization of instruction.

Mrs. Dorothy Nault also held an In-Service-Workshop with the teachers of grades 1-6. She spoke on Open Education and demonstrated teacher-made materials for classroom use.

Mrs. Pounder and I provided an opportunity for the parents of children in grades 1-6 to attend an informal "coffee hour" at which time student placement and skill levels were explained.

It has been a pleasure to work in your school. At this time I would like to thank Mr. Bernard Ellis, Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Arthur Mitchell, Assistant Superintendent, and Mrs. Marion Pounder, for their cooperation and guidance.

SPEECH THERAPY PROGRAM

Supervisory Union No. 10

To the Superintendent of Schools and the members of the School Boards:

The Speech Therapy Program continued this year to serve ten schools in Auburn, Derry, and Londonderry through Title I funds. Mrs. Gail Kenney and Mrs. Deborah Gratton, Speech Therapists, provided diagnosis and therapy for 180 children. It was necessary to put those who couldn't be seen on a waiting list.

Each child was enrolled in the Program on the basis of one of the following reasons: 1) his speech problem was identified during a pre-school screening or a third-grade screening, 2) he was already enrolled in the Program from the previous year, or 3) he was referred by a teacher, a parent, or a member of the school staff. The types of problems that need to be remediated are: articulation disorders, voice disorders, auditory perception problems, stuttering, delayed speech and language development, language disorders, and speech problems associated with hearing impairments.

Orientation meetings were held in the Fall for parents of children in the Program. Communication with parents is considered an integral part of a child's speech progress. A meeting was also conducted with each school staff in September to describe the Therapy Program and to explain the referral procedure the staff was to use.

Several children in the Program were referred to Crooked Mountain School for diagnostic consultation. Others were referred to the Greater Manchester Easter Seal Center for reverse swallow therapy, and audio-logical testing. In a few cases, children were seen by a medical doctor for throat examinations. When advisable, a psychologist from the Easter Seal Center worked with the speech therapists in parent conferences.

Throughout the school year, each speech therapist was involved in several staff conferences of children whose needs were determined by observation and testing, and whose needs were met by recommendations and follow-up procedures. These staffings included the school nurse, principal, guidance counselor, learning disabilities tutor, classroom teacher, and remedial reading consultant along with the speech therapist.

Both therapists belong to the New Hampshire Speech and Hearing Association which sponsored two Special Study Institutes on "Voice Disorders" and "Public School Speech Therapy Programs".

Mr. Bernard J. Ellis was able to attend the latter of the two institutes as one of the Superintendents in the State representing his School Union. The Program Director was invited to present a lecture to the Derry Rotary Club on the Speech Therapy Program in Derry in December. Other professional improvement opportunities included a visit to the Speech and Hearing Clinic of the Lawrence General Hospital and the Laconia State School.

During the pre-school registration in each town, all entering first-graders were administered a speech and language test to determine if a problem existed. Parents were given booklets describing speech and language development and suggesting home activities.

A Summer Speech Clinic was held for four weeks in July. A speech therapist worked with school-age children who had already been receiving therapy during the school year, but needed continued help to maintain their progress. Two first-grade teachers and another speech therapist conducted group language activities for children selected from the pre-school registration.

A Title I Advisory Board consisted of parents and staff who helped effect changes in the program.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, School Board Members, Principals and their staffs, and the Supplemental Services Team for their help and support for our Program. Special thanks go to Mrs. Kathy Copp who did so much to help by providing secretarial services.

Gentlemen:

Due to a workload in excess of the personnel resources available to this Division during the calendar year 1973, we have been unable to perform an examination and audit of the accounts and records of your School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973 before the publication of the annual 1972-73 School District report.

We regret the inconvenience which this may cause and wish to assure you that an audit of your accounts will be scheduled as expeditiously as possible.

Our current projections provide that our next examination of your School District's records shall simultaneously cover both the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1973 and the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1974.

Should this arrangement prove to be unsatisfactory to your Board, steps should be taken to petition the 1974 School District Meeting for rescission of the previous vote of the School District requesting an audit by this Division, and to choose local auditors in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. 197:14, which is quoted herewith:

"197:14 Officers To Be Chosen. The officers of every school district for which the law does not otherwise provide shall be a moderator, a clerk, a school board of three persons, a treasurer, one or more auditors and such other officers and agents as the voters may judge necessary for managing the district affairs; provided, however, that school districts requesting an audit by the municipal accounting division of the state department of revenue administration shall not be required to choose auditors for the year covered by said audit."

It should be noted that the foregoing statute implies that such auditors shall be local residents.

We are pleased to inform you that the 1973 Legislature has authorized additional positions for our audit staff. It is therefore expected that annual audits in the future will be made on more timely basis.

We appreciate your patience and understanding these circumstances.

CHAPTER 21

CHAPTER 21.

AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE SALE OF SUBDIVIDED LAND.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

21:1 Subdivision of Land. Amend RSA 36:27 (supp) as amended by 1963, 163:3 and 1969, 185:1 by striking out said section and inserting in place thereof the following: **36:27 Penalties for Transferring Lots in Unapproved Subdivisions.** Any owner, or agent of the owner, of any land located within a subdivision in a municipality that has adopted subdivision regulations, who transfers or sells any land before a plat of the said subdivision has been approved by the planning board and recorded or filed in the office of the appropriate register of deeds shall forfeit and pay a penalty of five hundred dollars for each lot or parcel so transferred or sold; and the description by metes and bounds in the instrument of transfer or other document used in the process of selling or transferring shall not exempt the transaction from such penalties. Said municipality may enjoin such transfer or sale and may recover said penalty by civil action. In any such action the prevailing party may recover reasonable court costs and attorneys fees as same may be ordered by the court.

21:2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect sixty days after its passage.

[Approved May 4, 1970.]

The New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission hereby gives notice that Governor Peterson has signed Senate Bill 233 which broadens the jurisdiction of the Commission under Chapter 149-E, Revised Statutes Annotated relating to sewage disposal systems and subdivision of land.

Effective July 1, 1971 all land being subdivided for the purpose of sale, rent, lease, building construction or any other purpose must have prior approval of the Commission.

No building from which waste will be discharged and no waste disposal system can be constructed in the state without prior approval of the plans of the waste disposal system by the Commission.

Previously the law applied only to land located within 1000 feet of any surface water. The amended law now covers the entire state.

Lots in previously laid out subdivisions which are still owned by the developer must be approved by the Commission before they can be sold.

No plans of subdivisions or individual lots need be submitted when municipal sewerage is available, however, plans for extensions of sewerage systems must be submitted by the municipality and approved by the Commission.

To Whom It May Concern:

Misunderstandings have developed regarding the requirements of the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission in case (a) where the sale or other conveyance of property involves merely an exchange of land among two or more owners which does not increase the number of owners and on which no sewage disposal system is to be constructed; and case (b) where an individual intends to divide his land and there is no intent to undertake any building construction involving sewage disposal.

Please be advised (despite any contrary advice you may have received) that the only requirements are as follows:

Case (a) - No requirement to submit any information to the Commission.

Case (b) - Where no construction is contemplated within two (2) years and the lot size of the subdivided portion is in excess of five (5) acres, only a plan showing how the property is being divided, drawn to scale (lot lines and property boundaries), and information regarding the nature of the soil in the area is required. The required soil data are available from the U. S. Soil Conservation Service which maintains an office in each county.

Where the subdivided portion is less than five (5) acres in size, additional information may be required, and persons should contact the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission at 105 Loudon Road, Concord, regarding that information.
