To the inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

**You are hereby notified to meet at the Barnstead Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the Fourteenth (14<sup>th</sup>) day of March, next at 7:00 a.m. of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:**

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To vote by official ballot on amendments to the Barnstead Code of Building Regulations and to the Barnstead Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Barnstead Planning Board, as follows:
  1. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 1 as Proposed by the planning board for the town code of building regulations as follows:

Amend the regulations to delete the 1990 Edition of the CABO One and Two Family Code as published by the Council of American Building Officials and replace with the 1995 Edition, adopted by reference with the following amendments:

1. Penalties established in Section 106 shall be replaced by penalties contained in Article 10 of the zoning ordinances.
2. Amend tread and riser dimensions contained in Section 314.2 and replace with maximum riser height shall be eight and one-quarter (8.25) inches and a minimum tread depth of nine (9) inches.

2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 2 as proposed by the planning board for the town code of building regulations as follows:

Amend the regulations to delete the 1987 Edition of the BOCA National Building Code as recommended and maintained by the Building and Code Administrators International, Inc. and replace with the 1999 Edition, adopted by reference.

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment 3 as proposed by the planning board of the town code of building regulations as follows:

Amend the regulations to adopt simplified process, as provided in RSA Chapter 674:52 VI, for adopting updates or revisions to national codes that have been previously adopted by reference.

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 4 as proposed by the planning board for the town code of building regulations as follows:

Amend Section 1 by eliminating Section 1-1 and inserting:

Section 1-1

A building permit is required for each new residential, recreational, commercial or industrial building. A building permit shall also be required for any addition to an existing building that exceeds \$1,500 in cost.

5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 5 as proposed by the planning board for the town code of building regulations as follows:

Amend Section 2 by deleting Section 2-7 and inserting:

Section 2-7

The exterior of every new building or addition to an existing building shall be completed as soon as practicable, but in no Case shall this period exceed two (2) years from the date of construction start.

6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 6 as proposed by the planning board for the town code of building regulations as follows:

Amend the regulation to provide the building inspector the authority to issue temporary certificates of occupancy, for certain circumstances, in accordance with the provisions of RSA Chapter 676:12 III.

7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 7 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Repeal Article 11, Management of Sewage and Sludge, in its entirety.

**The second session for the purpose of discussing and voting upon the remaining articles of the Town Warrant shall be held on Saturday, March 18<sup>th</sup>, 2000, at 9:00 a.m. at the Barnstead Elementary School.**

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$697,000 (gross budget) for the construction and original equipping of an addition to the Oscar Foss Memorial Library, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$265,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes to determine the rate of interest thereon: furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of \$312,000 from the Library Construction Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose; and to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend donations made for this purpose in the amount of \$20,000, with the balance of \$100,000 to be raised by taxation. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7 VI and will

not lapse until the construction and original equipping of the addition to the Oscar Foss Memorial Library is completed or by December 31, 2001, whichever is sooner. (2/3 ballot vote required). (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)

4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for the purpose of purchasing two (2) hydraulic sanders and to authorize the withdrawal of \$12,000 from the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,200 for the purpose of paying the Town's portion of the cost of equipping the new Lakes Region Dispatch Center. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of completing the upgrade of the computer system. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$116,309 for the purpose of completing the assembly of the fire truck (purchased in 1999) and to authorize the withdrawal of \$46,300 from the Fire & Rescue Capital Reserve Fund and to authorize the withdrawal of \$70,009 from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000 for the purpose of road reconstruction and paving four tenths (4/10s) of a mile of Varney Road and a portion of Colbath Road. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7 VI and will not lapse until the road reconstruction

and paving is completed or by December 31, 2001, whichever is sooner. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 to be placed in the Library Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in the Bridge Construction Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 and place said monies in the Library Collection Development Trust Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in the Cistern Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
16. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the New Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund created in the year 1993, said funds with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal are to be transferred to the General Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,988,051.00 which represents the operating budget. Said sum does not include special or individual warrant articles. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee)
  
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to reestablish the Barnstead Sludge Committee for the purpose of reviewing and updating the sludge ordinance adopted at the March, 1998 Town Meeting to include the management of septage and sludge/biosolids. Said committee is to report its findings and recommendations to the March 2001 Town Meeting.
  
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To The Members of The Board of Selectmen  
Town of Barnstead  
Barnstead, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Barnstead as of and for the year ended December 31, 1999. These general-purpose financial statements are the responsibility of management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general-purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general-purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general-purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general-purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general-purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Barnstead has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general-purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Barnstead, as of December 31, 1999, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Barnstead. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general-purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

## BARNSTEAD FIRE-RESCUE, INC. REPORT

The members and employees of the Fire-Rescue had another very busy year in 1999. The demands of training, maintenance, fire prevention, and emergencies continue to require dedication from both the members and their families. We wish to express our sincere appreciation for the support of all the other departments and employees working in our Town.

The Kid's Safety Trailer has been from Pittsburgh to Lebanon to Plaistow and continues to provide a valuable tool to send the safety message to this critical group, our children. Barnstead Fire-Rescue, Inc. was recognized for this commitment to the children with our 11<sup>th</sup> Gold Circle Partnership Achievement Award with the Barnstead Elementary School.

The Fire-Rescue added a Rescue-Alive ice rescue sled to our rescue equipment. This provides a much-needed tool to allow for quick rescue for victims who have fallen through the ice. The main benefit over other types of equipment is the limited manpower required to utilize the sled effectively and safely.

Many hours were spent planning for the new fire truck, which will arrive in 2000 and will replace 6M2, a 1968 Ward LaFrance. This will be delivered in Fall 2000 and is the second new engine for the Town based upon the Capital Improvement Plan, which keeps apparatus on a 20-year replacement schedule.

Lakes Region Mutual Aid Association provides dispatch services for 35 towns in the Lakes Region area. The Dispatch Center is moving to a new location where it will be in the same building as the Back-up 911 Center. This new facility will incorporate new technology to better serve the member communities. The Fire-Rescue requests your support for this important new facility.

The Fire-Rescue needs new members and invites those interested in joining to stop at the station or call to discuss joining this dedicated group. It's a lot of work but the rewards of knowing you made a difference is what makes the job all worthwhile.

I would also like to add my sincere appreciation to each member and

their families for the dedication and commitment to our organization and the Town of Barnstead.

## OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY REPORT 1999

At the top of the list of exciting things happening at the library were all the Building Committee meetings. This hard working group meet at least monthly with our Architect, Tom Wallace from Tennant/Wallace, Inc. and many, many hours were spent mulling over the interior and exterior of the new addition. The primary concern of the committee was to maintain the integrity and character of this beautiful old building. The committee worked very hard not only to keep the old building as it is but to make the addition blend and enhance the old. The plan is a good one and we truly hope that this dream will become a reality in the year 2000.

The need of MORE SPACE became even more apparent when we received 2 new public access computers this year. The library applied for a Technology grant at the State Library and we were delighted to be the recipients of the highest monetary grant awarded. This enabled us to upgrade the Director's computer and to add on a new computer and printer for public access and to purchase some supplies, software and to take some computer courses. The second public access computer and printer were donated by the New Hampshire Department of Employment Security. This computer comes with NH Works a direct access to job employment in New Hampshire as well as a great resume package. We also have applied for the Schools and Library grant for reduced funding for the direct cable, that we have from Bell Atlantic. This direct line allows us to have immediate Internet access, no dial up and the speed is just great! Internet access has been provided to the library free of charge from Worldpath. We have had many students and adults coming to the library to use these computers either for the Internet, for general word processing or job search.

We applied for and received another grant. This was from CLIF, the Children's Literacy Foundation, "a non-profit organization dedicated to nurturing a love of reading and writing among children in rural New Hampshire and Vermont." This was a 2 to 1 grant and our matching funds were graciously donated by the Friends of the Barnstead Library. Only 12 libraries in all of Vermont and New Hampshire were chosen in the Spring of 1999 so we were once again, thrilled to be one of the ones selected. This particular grant allowed us to choose over 100 brand new children's books for the children in Barnstead. With space limitations always in the forefront, half of our

book choices were books that were replacement copies for many of the timeworn classics and well loved books. This gives many of the "old" books a great new face-lift and once again hold special appeal to the young readers. A special program was held in June when Duncan McDougall, founder of CLIF presented the OFML with the new books. Many children and their families were on hand for this GRAND celebration!

Several different internal policies were written or rewritten this year with the Library staff and Trustees. A new Library Policy, Personnel Policy, Internet Policy and general Computer Policy were all approved in 1999.

The Friends of the library helped out again this year by having a Mother's Day plant sale and a Thanksgiving Pie Sale. As stated before, they also very generously voted to pay for 1/3 of the CLIF grant. The Friends usually meet 3 to 4 times a year and would really like to have you join, so be sure to watch for their Spring Meeting and plan now to attend.

Bonnie Brannigan has been at the Library for more than 5 years and continues to be an excellent Assistant. She enjoys being at the Library and helping out the patrons, whether it be looking for that silly book of poems for the little one to read or promoting and organizing the once-a month Book Discussion group.

I am working on year 16 at the Library and am still amazed at everything that happens each year and the more I learn. This past year with all the new computers, new programs, new printers has added on another dimension I am determined to conquer. Part of the reason why I so enjoy the job is the constant change and daily challenge. The GREATEST change and challenge yet will be a new building and providing and promoting new programs, new materials, new computer stations, etc. All of us at the OFML have you, the residents of Barnstead, as our primary interest and want the library to offer and provide just what you need.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY BUILDING COMMITTEE JANUARY 2000

The Oscar Foss Memorial Library (OFML) Building Committee was formed and has been meeting monthly since May 1997. The committee is made up of approximately 12 interested citizens as well as the library staff & Board of Trustees. From a group of five firms that submitted proposals, Tom Wallace of Tennant & Wallace Architects, AIA, PA was selected to provide architectural services in April 1998 and has met with the committee each month since. Progress continues toward the goal of completing a much needed addition to the town library. Conceptual drawings and cost estimates were presented at the 1999 Town Meeting at which time the town voted to add the library's capital reserve fund as the committee refined details of the expansion plans.

This year the OFML Building Committee has continued the work of developing an expansion plan that will meet the needs of the next century as well preserve the historic architectural features that make our library special. Decisions have been made regarding the substructure, superstructure, roofing, exterior & interior construction, mechanical & electrical specifications, and renovations. At each and every stage, all options were carefully considered to ensure the outcome will best meet Barnstead's needs for quality and affordability.

The Committee has also continued its fund-raising efforts (the 1998 July 4<sup>th</sup> Auction, birdfeeder sales, benefit concert, etc.) Almost \$20,000 was raised this year as a result of the Building Committee's fund drive which was mailed to Barnstead residents and property owners in October.

Recently, the committee carefully reviewed materials submitted by contractors to ensure they met certain qualifications for this type of project. As a result, 7 pre-qualified contractors have been invited to bid on the expansion project. Prior to Town Meeting, bids will have been received and the project in its entirety will be presented to the voters.

It is the hope of the OFML Building Committee that everyone will share our belief in the importance of this project. Our library is the "centerpiece" of our town and has met the needs of all citizens-toddlers, school children, business and professional people, parents, homemakers, senior citizens, summer folk and year round residents-since 1917. Our new library will meet these needs well into the next century.

# BARNSTEAD PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT

Reasonably priced property turned over rapidly in 1999, indicating an increased demand for affordable housing. Though demand remained strong, this did not translate to the development of large or moderate sized subdivisions. Even though subdivision applications doubled over last year, none exceeded two or three lots. Applications for site plan review and minor lot line adjustments remained the same as the previous year.

The Planning Board approved the following applications:

- 4 Site plan reviews
- 4 Minor lot line adjustments
- 8 Subdivision plans

With the exception of small structures, all new buildings or alterations to existing buildings require a building permit prior to construction. Several nationally recognized building codes have been adopted in the Code of Building Regulations to insure that buildings meet at least minimum standards of construction. Residential construction is governed by the Council of American Building Officials (CABO) One and Two Family Dwelling Code. All other construction is governed by the BOCA National Building Code. Each code is updated periodically, but it has been several years since the Code of Building Regulations has been updated. The Board has been working with the Building Inspector to adopt the most recent version of the national codes which will be presented at Town Meeting.

Since an amendment to the Code of Building Regulations was proposed, the Board also reviewed the present format. Over the years additions to the Code were added in no particular order. The regulations have been codified in an attempt to eliminate confusion and create a document that is easy to read. All regulations remained the same except for those questions found on the ballot. We hope you will agree that the new format is easier to interpret.

During the year the Planning Board actively worked to bring the town's Capital Improvements Plan into compliance with state statutes. This task has not been completed as yet because more information has been requested of department directors. Once all the data has been compiled, every effort will be made to complete the plan prior to Town Meeting.

Several amendments have been adopted to the Barnstead Zoning Ordinance. Next year the Planning Board will be reviewing the Barnstead Subdivision Regulations to determine revisions needed to compliment the Zoning Ordinance. As always, the Planning Board will conduct public hearings to consider suggestions from residents prior to adopting any amendments.

# REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission and the Parks and Recreation Committee have been working together to "redefine" the rules for the town beach and the recreation area. New signs will be posted in the spring.

Across the lake, on the Harrison property, a young man working toward his eagle scout badge under took the challenge of clearing brush and debris out of the road and ditches from Beauty Hill Rd. down to the water's edge. This is truly a great piece of property, obtained by the Town through the LCIP program and a generous gift from Mr. and Mrs. Norman Harrison.

The Conservation Commission has also had the signs refinished at both the Grau and Harrison properties.

As mentioned in last year's report, the Barnstead Conservation has embraced the NH Coverts Program. To date, two members of our group have attended the three day short course offered by UNH Cooperative Extension. Our newest member, Andrew Stowell, has in fact participated in a project whereby 25 acres of his farm have been restored as wildlife habitat and approximately 60 wild apple trees have been released from heavy cover.

In the coming year it is our intent to contact local land owners and work with them to secure cost saving funds in order to restore more wildlife habitat throughout Barnstead.

# REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. During the 1999 season Forest Rangers were busy assisting communities with suppression of difficult and remote multi-day fires. Forest Rangers have also investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The 1999 fire season was a challenging but safe year for wildland firefighters in New Hampshire. The severe drought conditions throughout the spring and summer months combined with residual effects of 1998 Ice Storm, resulted in a dramatic increase in wildland fires. In addition to burning in excess of 452 acres, 35 structures were also impacted by wildfire. Wildland fires in the urban interface is a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their structures by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

Please contact your local fire department before doing ANY outside burning.

# BCEP SOLID WASTE DISTRICT

## A Message from the District Committee

1999 saw the District substantially finish its rebuilding program. It was also the first full year of recycling since the fire. While the percentage of materials recycled is not yet back to its prefire levels, the District was able to recycle almost 800 tons of material, saving some \$48,839.04 in tipping fees and generating \$42,432.23 in revenue. This provided a total real cash benefit to the taxpayers of \$91,271.27.

Unfortunately, 1999 also saw a substantial increase in fees for materials that are still landfilled or incinerated. In fact, fees increased 20% during the year. To make matters worse, it appears that this type of annual increase can be expected in 2000 and for the next few years. Currently, the District has only one company, within affordable trucking range, for disposal of materials. In simple terms, a monopoly has developed in southern New Hampshire which has eliminated any price competition for the disposal of waste. The District has no choice but to pay whatever tipping fee is demanded. You will note that the 2000 budget for tipping fees has increased by \$70,000.00. As a result of this increase, the District has been forced to pass a portion on to the four towns (\$52,745.00). While tax increases are always a negative, the amount is less than the cost increases to the District, and is the first tax increase from the District in six years.

The good news is that there are some things the general public can do to help the District control disposal costs. During 1999 the District paid to dispose of almost 3,200 tons of waste. Realistically, as much as one third (1,000 tons) of this waste was recyclable materials in the trash due to poor separation by some residents. Had this material been properly separated during 1999, the additional savings and revenue would have avoided any need for a tax increase in 2000.

The District Committee is specifically requesting that each and every resident who uses the facility squeeze every recyclable item possible from their trash. If everyone cooperates, the District will be able to avoid, or at least limit, future tax increases. For those facility users that don't have time to properly separate, the District Committee has instructed the Administrator and staff at the facility to aggressively enforce separation of materials for recycling. Enforcement will involve

guidance first, followed by a warning, and for those who still don't separate, a substantial charge for each pound of material not properly separated.

If you have comments or suggestions please pass them on to the staff at the facility. If you would like to attend a District meeting, the Committee meets the last Thursday of each month, at 7:00 PM, at the Facility. If you would like to be on the agenda for a Committee meeting, please let the Administrator know prior to the day of the meeting.

## REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE GENERAL COURT

This year, Stan Czech was elected to fill the vacancy left by Alice Z. Calvert. Alice served ten years as our representative for Belknap District 5, and was on the Health, Human Services and Elderly Affairs Committee. Alice leaves a very big pair of shoes to be filled and she will be missed. Stan Czech who replaced Alice is a former Selectman from Alton and is on the Transportation Committee and will be on the Resources, Recreation and Development Committee for the next session. Rob Boyce was selected to be on the Finance Committee. Gordon Bartlett remains on the Transportation Committee.

Much of the 1999 session was spent on Claremont related issues. Cigarette taxes were increased to help support the 825 million dollar school tax package. Video gambling was defeated as was a sales tax. A state income tax was passed and then vetoed by the Governor, and finally, a state property tax was established to meet the needs of the court mandated school funding issue.

## REPORT OF THE BARNSTEAD NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH COMMITTEE

The Barnstead Neighborhood Watch Committee is a citizens organization formed to heighten community awareness as to ways we can help detect and reduce crime. We have now completed our sixth year.

The Neighborhood Watch hosts several meetings each year to provide information on personal protection as well as advising citizens as to how we can help protect our community as a whole.

Sgt. Bolduc of the Barnstead Police Department informed us of a grant which allows for more police patrols in town, and the downward trend (for the most part) for crime in the past few years. Christopher Boothby, Belknap County Commissioner, told us of the workings of his office and that he can be called on for assistance in any matter. Sue Roberts, School Resource Officer, (courtesy of a grant) told us what her job involved and her initial impressions regarding the children of the community. Jennifer Doris of the New Hampshire Humane Society spoke regarding the link between animal, child, and domestic abuse. Barbara Mountain of the Social Security office in Portsmouth filled us in on what's new at S.S.

Neighborhood Watch expanded its sphere of interest this year to include crimes against our environment. In that vein, Jody Connor from Environmental Services Department - Water Supply and Pollution Control Division spoke to us in the spring and again in the fall. Jody drew crowds both times he came. He spoke concerning the damage being done to our bodies of water by speeding motorboats and the reckless maneuvering of jet skis. He also informed us that aquatic growth is being destroyed, the water polluted, and the shorelines eroded.
