TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough in said State of New Hampshire; qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March, next, at 7:00 o'clock in the 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon to set upon the following Articles:

- Article 1. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegatesat-Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, District Delegates and Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the various Political Parties; to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.
- Article 2. To elect necessary town officers and school officers for the ensuing year and ensuing three years.
- Article 3. To amend Article XVII paragraph Q to include the requirement of building permits for swimming pools.
- Article 4. To amend Article III, paragraph B of section Four (4). The Land Subdivision regulations to read as follows:

It shall also include a division of land where each resulting parcel fronts on a public street previously excepted or taken by the Town.

- Article 5. To reclassify land owned by Mr. Ralph Langdell on the East side of 101 and the junction of the 101 by-pass for a frontage of approximately 1300 feet, going back from 101 to a point of 600 feet in depth and back from 101 by-pass to a point 800 feet in depth and running at right angle from this point back to the point of 600 feet in depth coming in from Route 101, from Agricultural Residential to Limited Commercial.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to amend the zoning ordinance by changing the following described tract of land from a classification of Industrial to the classification of Commercial:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of River Road leading from Manchester to Nashua, also known as the Daniel Webster Highway; thence westerly from the corner at the intersection of stone wall on line of land formerly owned by Daniel Ferguson, and now or formerly owned by Pollack and Harry Lund, and by said Ferguson's north line eleven hundred (1,100) feet to a point; thence northerly on a line parallel to Route 3 approximately four hundred seventy-five (475) feet, more or less, to a point; thence easterly along the south line of land now or formerly owned by LaPorte and Medley, eleven hundred (1,100) feet, more or less, to a point on the westerly side of the Daniel Webster Highway; thence south on the westerly side of the Daniel Webster Highway four hundred thirty-eight (438) feet, more or less, to the point of beginning.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to amend the zoning ordinance by changing the following described tract of land from a classification of Limited Commercial to the classification of Commercial:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of the Daniel Webster Highway south, said point being at the southeasterly corner of the land of Maurice and Lenora Beliveau; thence westerly a distance of eight hundred fifty (850) feet, more or less, along the southerly boundary line of said land of Beliveau to a point; thence north 70 15' east a distance of six hundred ninety-eight (698) feet, more or less, to a stake placed in the northerly boundary of said land of Beliveau; thence easterly along the northerly boundary line of said Beliveau land one hundred seventy (170) feet, more or less, to land of the Estate of Charlotte Woodbury; thence continuing along the same course and across said land of Woodbury two hundred thirty-five (235) feet, more or less, to a stake; thence southerly in a straight line a distance of forty-five (45) feet, more or less, to the northwesterly corner of land of Office Machines of New Hampshire, Inc.; thence easterly along the northerly boundary of said land of Office Machines of New Hampshire, Inc. four hundred forty-five (445) feet, more or less, to the northeasterly corner of said land of Office Machines of New Hampshire, Inc. on the westerly line of said Daniel Webster Highway south; thence southerly on said Daniel Webster Highway south six hundred fifty-three and 5/10 (653.5) feet, more or less, to the point of beginning.

Voting on above Articles shall be by written ballot. Polls are to open at 7:00 A.M. and are not to close earlier than 6:00 P.M.

Action on the remaining Articles will be at the McKelvie School at 8:00 P.M.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year:

- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes if needed, and to raise and appropriate a sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the payment of interest on such borrowing.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty Nine dollars and Eighty cents (\$1,739.80) for the construction of Class V Highways within the Town, provided that the State of New Hampsshire shall contribute Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Ninety Eight Dollars and Sixty Five cents (\$11,598.65).
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Two Hundred Twenty dollars (\$35,220.00) to operate and maintain the Town Police Department.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred dollars (\$10,500.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund: Five Thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) toward the purchase of a new Fire Truck, Three Thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) toward the purchase of a new Road Grader, and Two Thousand Five Hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) toward the purchase of a new Tractor Loader.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred dollars (\$3,500.00) for the purchase of office equipment for the new Town Office Building.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of five (5) people to investigate land sites and, or, other feasible means of refuse disposal, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred dollars (\$500.00) for use by this committee. This committee is to submit a report at the next annual Town Meeting.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Ninety Six dollars (\$11,596.00) to complete a new Grade-Level meeting room at the Bedford Public Library addition and to replace the heating system in the existing Library building with electric heat; and to authorize the Trustees of the Bedford Public Library to accept Funds from the Federal Government should they become available. (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)

- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) for the cost and installation of an Air Raid Warning System, half of this amount to be recovered under matchings funds from the State and Federal Agencies of Civil Defense. (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred dollars (\$6,500.00) to construct an addition to the Town garage, and to install toilet facilities, and to make other necessary repairs. (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Ten dollars (\$210.00) to install five (5) new street lights: one at the intersection of Route 101 and Colonial Drive; one on Rundlett Hill Road between Worthley Road and Donald Street; one between 25 and 29 Curtis Lane; and two at the East and West entrances to Blessed Elizabeth Seton Church. (Submitted by petition.) (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote in favor of having the Town Clerk elected for a three year term, beginning with the March election of 1969, pursuant to N. H. RSA Chapter 243:1 as passed by the Legislature of 1967. (Submitted by Petition.)
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote in favor of having the Tax Collector elected for a three year term, beginning with the March election of 1969, as pursuant to N. H. RSA Chapter 243:1 as passed by the Legislature of 1967. (Submitted by Petition.)
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote in favor of having the Town Treasurer elected for a three year term, beginning with the March election of 1969, as pursuant to N. H. RSA Chapter 243:1 as passed by the Legislature of 1967. (Submitted by Petition.)
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept Heritage Drive in a southerly direction for a distance of 553 feet by 50 feet wide.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept an extension of Ministerial Branch for a distance of 952 feet, said road being

50 feet wide and extending in a Northerly direction from Steppingstone Road to Wildwood Drive.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred Fifty dollars (\$150.00) from Lucy G. Tillson for the Harold G. Tillson Cemetery Lot to be placed in trust, the income to be expended for the care and maintenance of the same in the Bedford Center Cemetery.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 1968

Town Government Budget

The Budget Committee held meetings with the various department heads to discuss and analyze their requests for the fiscal year, 1968. In addition, a Public Hearing was held on February 12, 1968. It would be well at this time to say how gratifying it was to the members of the Budget Committee to see the enthusiastic interest and support given at the Public Hearing this year. All aspects of the budget have been carefully discussed and we do recommend its passage as written.

The following Articles require comment: Civil Defense Siren Article:

The Budget Committee does not recommend passage of this article. This article has been submitted and rejected for two consecutive years, with no new interest apparent at the Public Hearing. Library Special Article:

The Budget Committee *does not recommend* passage of this article. It was felt that this additional expense should be postponed until next year. However, the article was included in the budget, to give the Town Meeting the opportunity to act upon it independently, if interest is shown.

Grader Shed Article:

The Budget Committee *does not recommend* the passage of this article. Without pertinent information and facts pertaining to the physical condition of the existing building and future plans at the site of the dump, the Committee felt unqualified to recommend this appropriation. However, the Committee has placed the \$6,500.00 in the Budget without recommendations, so as to allow the Town Meeting to take independent action on the article.

New Street Lights Article:

The Budget Committee submitted this article without recommendation to give the Town Meeting opportunity to act on these street lights independently.

INFORMATION ABOUT ARTICLE 17

(Grader Shed Repairs)

The Board of Selectmen felt that the Townspeople should have advance information and facts pertaining to the recommended repairs and addition to our present Town Garage or Grader Shed as it is known, in order to be able to make an intelligent decision when voting.

The Shed as it now stands is approximately 20 years old and structurally sound. Like any other building after being exposed to the elements it needs a face lifting.

Estimated costs by a reputable contractor for the recommended repairs is \$6,500.00. Included in this price is the following:

A one stall addition between the present garage and salt shed approximately 20 x 40 which will include toilet and washing facilities. We feel that it is imperative for any town building to have these facilities for its employees. (Presently there are none.)

The garage roof needs new shingles as it leaks in various spots.

Also by properly insulating the ceiling with blanket insulation it will reduce the heating bill considerably. The present heating system is fully adequate to heat the proposed addition.

There is loose mortar in various spots which will be removed and replaced.

Two coats of a mortar type sealer will be applied to the exterior to seal the cement blocks. Also included will be a septic tank and leach field.

We feel that this expenditure is a necessity and will certainly add many more years of life to the building but if nothing is done the Town will be faced with a much higher expenditure in the immediate future for a replacement.

Please consider these facts and figures before making your decision.

REPORT OF THE BEDFORD PLANNING BOARD

Many citizens have on occasion asked questions as to the actual function and operation of the Planning Board. The following brief thumb-nail sketch is intended to satisfy some of these questions and enlighten others who may have certain misconceptions.

The Planning Board consists of seven members, six of whom are appointed by the Town Selectmen and must serve without compensation. The seventh member is a Selectman acting as an ex-officio member. The usual term of each appointee is five years on a rotation system of tenure, so as one retires off the board a new appointment is made. Consequently, we have a continuous pollination of minds, new ideas, new energy, thereby, preventing stagnancy.

Town Planning Boards are required by the New Hampshrie State Enabling Legislation to meet at least once every three months. Cognizant of the rapidly changing times, your Planning Board meets the 2nd Monday of each month at 7:30 P.M. in the Town Hall.

Once a year, after the annual Town Meeting, a majority of the Board must elect the officers, which consists of a Chairman and Secretary to serve for one year with eligibility for re-election.

We are not a legislative or enforcement body as such. The Planning Board was created by the Town's people in 1953, to serve in the best interest of the majority of the citizens of Bedford, keeping in mind the rights of the minority. We must be responsive to the needs of the community and responsible to all the voters in the planning of sound community growth both economically and socially. The problems of proper land use, water, sewage, lights, traffic patterns and control, town services and the general health and welfare of the community are all an intricate part of our considerations when planning or making any recommendations to you, the council.

The year 1967 was not without its problems and we on the Planning Board have learned a great deal from our experiences. Many of you will recall the spirited Public Hearings held prior to the last Town Meeting. The knowledge acquired, better prepares us to continue to serve you in the forthcoming year. Last March we proposed ten recommendations, six of which were amendments to

all of the various commercial classifications of our Zoning Ordinances and adding a new Highway Commercial classification; these were all approved by a majority vote. By enacting these changes the citizens of Bedford gained control of any future service stations, outdoor restaurants, garages, parking lots, used-car sales lots, or amusement centers that may be proposed to the Town in the years to come. In addition to the above mentioned amendments, we also proposed four parcels of land for re-classification which were also approved. Two of these parcels are already being developed with one nearing completion and already with a prestige tenant occupying one third of the office space available. The new office building was made possible by the Town having approved the area for limited commercial. Having all ten of our recommendations approved by the Town must be some indication of the citizens' trust and confidence and it is most gratifying to us on the Planning Board since our efforts were not in vain.

Other commercial plans that were reviewed and approved were: Harvell's Floor Covering Co. Route 101, Dr. Durant's Animal Hospital (no kennel boarding) on Route 3, Dupont Heating and Home Appliance Center, Route 101, and the Dunfey Shopping Mall, Route 3. All of these are in some stage of development and should be completed some time in 1968.

The following Land Sub-divisions were received and approved: Maple Leaf Acres on Gault Road by Frank Yaquis; Richard Frank, Smith Road; Merrill Manning, South Hill Drive; Presidential Estates, Nashua Road by Andrew O'Malley; and sub-division of Donald and June Wallace on Meetinghouse Road and Gault Road.

Our interest and other involvements have encompassed — the traffic problem of Route 3 and the widening of it to 50 feet from the Manchester line to the intersection beyond the Country Club; the water which is necessary for the development of our Industrially zoned area; the consideration of the probable need of a Building Code and Building Inspectors; the review of all our Zoning Ordinances. These are unfinished business at this time and there is much work yet to be done on these projects as we enter into the year 1968.

Bedford is at a critical point in its development, and we cannot because of our geographical location, prevent the growth that we will experience. We should all give some serious thought to certain facts: our lands are approximately 20,000 acres of which 50% is unsuitable for building developments of any kind. We have a very

limited amount of land suitable for the proper development of Neighborhood Commercial, Limited Commercial, Full Commercial and Industrial, all of which are necessary in proper balance to complement each other in the development of a comprehensive plan that would best serve Bedford in establishing a permanent tax base other than home real estate. The lands best suited to serve all of the various commercial and industrial needs are along Route 3 and 101. The front and back door of the community. There are many trends taking place which if continued could detract from the livability, order, and economy of the community. We must be prudent and not act in haste when approached by speculating developers, whose first concern is themselves. Rather than have them dictate to Bedford, the Town should try to control its own destiny. The prestige of Bedford should be maintained by high quality development, for which there is no substitute.

Although this is not official information as yet, it, the data, is being processed through the Governmental agencies. We are able to find 9,185 Shelter spaces in buildings possessing an adequate protection factor. Blessed Elizabeth Seton Catholic Church has a basement shelter adequate for 185 persons, and Jordan Marsh Store is able to house 9,000. Bedford must train their own Shelter Managers and Crews to man such buildings in times of emergencies. Training is available and of high priority. Trained leadership will keep panic and chaos out.

The Radef Teams have been faithful in making necessary reports, and the Communications Team has been equally faithful in manning the Races Net, our communication in time of disaster. Messrs. Durette, Ton, and Freedman are due a vote of thanks from the Town for their dedication and faithful performance.

Under Leo Bongers, Jr., Captain and Training Officer for the Fire Department, Chief Wiggin reports continuing training in First Aid and Light Rescue techniques.

Chief Bruno Vincent plans training for all officers of his Department to insure skilled use of the new Resuscitator which we obtained through matching funds last year.

We need volunteers for our Radef Teams, and we are still looking for a Radio Officer with license to head our Communications Section.

Paul Johonnett has a co-chairman, Orlo Richardson, Mr. Johonnett will handle fuels, and Mr. Richardson will handle rationing of gasoline in any emergency.

Civil Defense is hoping that an adequate Emergency Operating Center will be established in this coming year. Half of such cost and equipment will be covered under Federal Matching Funds.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

A good public library is a basic educational community resource for all citizens throughout their entire lives. With this thought in mind, the Bedford Public Library has each year strived to keep pace with the various interests of all people. The circulating record collection, summer activities (especially the pre-school story hour) creative writing courses for adults and young adults, annual art show and the Library Forum Series are representative of the services actively supported by the Bedford Public Library.

Now in its fifth season, the Library Art Exhibit held in observation of National Library Week in April has continuously proven to be more and more successful. It has now been extended to run for one month. This year there were 30 exhibitors, 55 works of art and approximately 625 visitors to the Library. The contributing artists to the exhibit were honored at an appreciation party held on the last night of the exhibit.

A special "Legislative Appreciation Luncheon" in observance of National Library Week was held on Tuesday, April 11, at the New Hampshire Highway Hotel. At that time, the Librarians of New Hampshire honored the Honorable Walter Peterson, Speaker of the House of Representatives, for his part in introducing the 1963 Library Development Program Bill. The Librarians and Trustees were pleased to have as their guests our three legislators from Bedford — Ralph Wiggin, Sr., John Loxton and John Graf.

The Summer Reading Program for children was conducted from June through September under the guidance of Mrs. Doris Peck. One hundred sixty-five (165) children participated in this program with a total number of books read being 994. A party for the participating children was held on November 10 at the Bedford Town Hall.

The Salmagundi Book Sales is continuing to be quite successful as 150 books have been sold in 1967. Funds obtained from this source are sued to purchase replacements or additional books for the Library. In addition a special Library book sale of donated books from Bedford Citizens was held on June 10. Through the

generosity of our patrons we feel that this venture was and will continue to be a profitable one. Funds realized from this source are to be used toward the purchase of a film projector. Many free films are available for Library use and will be most useful in supplementing not only our Summer program but will be available through the year.

In October the Librarians attended a special joint meeting of Librarians from public, state, school, college and institutions held to focus attention on all aspects of library service for New Hampshire residents. This convention was a product of the New Hampshire Library Council formed to encourage improved Library service by stimulating coordination and cooperation among these groups. We are fortunate that our Librarians take an active part in the New Hampshire Library Association. Mrs. Wiggin continues as Chairman for the Southeast District Council and Representative for four of the districts to the New Hampshire Library Council. Mrs. Peck continues to serve as editor of the "Newsletter" the official publication of the New Hampshire Library Association.

The climax for the Library in 1967 took place at Town Meeting in March when funds were approved for an addition to the present Library facilities. In April it became apparent that there would also be available Federal Funds for Bedford, making possible the building of a more complete addition. These funds were applied for and finally accepted at a special Town Meeting held on October 11, 1967, at McKelvie School. Final approval was received from the Tax Commissioner in October and the contract was awarded to Remi Fortin in the early part of November. Construction was started in mid December and should be ready for occupancy in late March. The Librarians are also pleased to announce that the Library will now be open from 2-5 on Mondays, making Library service available every day in the week including Saturday morning.

As in the past, many friends of the Library have been more than generous to us during the year. This year we are truly grateful to the Bedford Woman's Club for their special gift of \$500 to be used toward furnishings for the reading room of the new addition. A Committee has been appointed and various sources and types of furnishings have been discussed. The Bedford Mother's Club, the Bedford Garden Club and the many individuals who have helped us during the year with gifts of books, magazines and their time make possible the continuous growth of our Library program. We do feel that special recognition should go to Mr. Fred Goode and his com-

mittee who have given so generously of their time to make possible the continuation of our Library sponsored forum series. The Library Association is always most appreciative of any gifts which will aid in better Library services to the people of Bedford.

As Bedford continues to grow in population, the Library must be prepared to meet its needs. Our per capita figure for Library services in Bedford denotes a steady growth toward reaching the recommended figure of \$5.00 per 5,000. Our figure per capita in 1967 was approximately \$2.00 — up from \$1.85 in 1967. We are still far behind our goal and cannot afford to stand still.

VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

194 Concord Street, Manchester, N. H.

The services of the Visiting Nurse are available for all residents of Manchester, Auburn, Candia, Bedford, Goffstown and Hooksett regardless of race, creed, age or ability to pay. The association is a Home Health Agency certified to care for Medicare patients.

The Visiting Nurse provides beside care and treatment according to the direction of the patient's physician. She gives the nursing care and teaching that are needed for the rehabilitation of the patient. Physical Therapy is available by Registered Physical Therapists. Instruction in maternal and infant care during pregnancy and to mothers with new babies is another important part of the service. Classes for Expectant Parents are held Spring and Fall.

The Visiting Nurse is also a teacher who gives family health guidance.

In Bedford, Mrs. Grace Gage, R.N., and Mrs. Mildred Farrell, R.N., admitted 31 new cases during 1967, five of whom were on Medicare.

The physician, patient, family or friend may call the Visiting Nurse Association for service. Call 622-3781, Monday through Friday between 8 - 4:30. The office is located at 194 Concord Street, Manchester, N. H.

BEDFORD HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

During the year the Health Department received several complaints relative to sewerage disposal and water supply contamination.

Well Child Clinics were held under the sponsorship of the Bedford Women's Club, for immunizations against Smallpox, Polio, Diptheria, Tetanus and Pertussis.

Several forms were processed for the Veterans Administration regarding septic tanks, leaching beds, and percolation tests for new home construction.

The Visiting Nurses Association of Manchester, N. H. continues to offer local residents free classes for expectant parents, home visits to families with new babies, and part time nursing care for homes where nursing help is needed.

The largest and perhaps most important of these being Line Item 200, Instruction. This item was included in the budget as presented by the School Board by a split vote, with five members in favor, and three members dissenting.

REPORT OF THE BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD

During the year construction was completed on the 19-class-room wing at the McKelvie School. Five of the classrooms were not needed this year and the interior finish was not completed. Monies remaining in the building fund are sufficient to complete all work. The Board proposes to complete these rooms in the near future. Bedford now has two steel and masonry school buildings containing total floor space in excess of 95,000 square feet.

Recently the School Board delivered a deed to the Selectmen conveying the Stevens-Buswell School to the Town of Bedford. That building served the citizens well as a school for many years. The transfer of the Stevens-Buswell School also marked the end of an era. All of the small, wooden 2 to 5 classroom buildings which served originally as neighborhood schools are now gone. Our sorrow on the passing of these schools is tempered by recollections of the recent utilization of every inch of these buildings in order to provide for our expanding student population. The use of small, dimly lit classrooms and dingy basement rooms is now, hopefully, a thing of the past.

In the 1962 Annual Report the Teacher Consultant quoted a leading educator: "Generally, to speak of the school is to conjure up in the public mind an image of a building. It would be closer to the truth if the word SCHOOL were to bring to mind a picture of the teacher. THE TEACHER MAKES THE SCHOOL." Those words seem particularly appropriate now. We have been extremely fortunate in Bedford in having teachers and administrators of the highest quality. This has been no easy task. While our population has grown rapidly, so it seems has the population everywhere. The net result is an ever increasing demand for teachers and the demand now far exceeds the supply. Districts in other states enjoy the luxury of substantial state financial support which is used to attract good teachers by offering higher salaries. During the present school year neighboring districts have had to operate without a full staff because they were simply unable to hire sufficient teachers. In Bedford we have to date, at least, succeeded in hiring not only enough teachers, but in hiring good teachers. The Memorial School has the distinction this year of being one of the only schools in this area which had a completely experienced staff. In order to retain our teachers and in order to attract additional teachers we must squarely face the need to offer a salary schedule which is realistic and competitive. Because of an increase in students next year we must hire four additional classroom teachers. As a result of strong demands expressed at the public hearing held February 12, 1968, the Board voted to hire a school librarian. The Board originally voted to hire a second physical education teacher but now seeks a librarian instead. Next year we will have almost 1,000 children in grades 1-8. We should have a second physical education teacher, a second art teacher and a second music teacher, but we do not feel that the community can afford the added burden.

These are trying times for the members of your School Board. In a period of rising costs the demand for additional staff and facilities caused by a rapidly expanding population can only mean a sharp increase in total expenditures. Better quality always costs more, but the additional cost of quality education is small. Poor quality is no bargain for the taxpayer or the child.

The horror of a war which usually seems remote and unreal was brought home to Bedford when one of our young men, a recent graduate of our school system, was killed in action in Viet Nam. No words can adequately express to his family our sympathy and our feeling of loss. A bronze plaque has been erected in the Library of the McKelvie School dedicated to the memory of Lance Corporal Richard K. Harvell, USMC. I only wish we could do more.

Some years ago Herbert Wells in his book, *The Outline of History*, expressed the delicate balance of life in a Nuclear Age in the following words: "However history becomes more and more a race between education and catastrophe." Education is more important today to the youth of our country than ever before. I sincerely hope that the citizens of this community will continue to support a program which will give our children the fine quality of education which they will need for the years ahead.

I am happy to express the sincere thanks of the Board to all who have been associated with our schools for the excellent work they have performed during the past year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Bedford:

The recently completed addition to the McKelvie School lends a sense of beauty and function to the original building. This school combined with the Memorial School serves to offer the children two modern and highly functional educational environments. The people of Bedford should take pride in the facilities that help educate their children.

The pupil enrollment continues to project a steady increase. In September of 1967 we enrolled 864 pupils as compared with 775 for the same period one year earlier. We project 973 pupils for September, 1968. This increase will demand that we finish and have available for September, 1969 the five unfinished classrooms at the McKelvie School.

For the past six months the New England School Development Council of Cambridge, Massachusetts has been conducting a study of the potential future educational alternatives of Bedford. Chief among the results of this report should be some direction for the education of our pre-school and secondary pupils. With our present instructional program geared to meet the needs of our students in grades one to eight it seems only sensible to develop a sincere direction for kindergarten and high school age pupils.

Our comprehensive instructional program of studies is implemented by an excellent teaching staff. Bedford should continue to offer a salary schedule and accompanying welfare benefits that will enable it to attract and hold highly competent teachers. It is a pleasure to announce the following additions to our instructional staff:

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

January 15, 1968

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

The following paragraphs constitute my report as Assistant Superintendent in the School District of Bedford, New Hampshire.

The current school year has been a year of expansion for the Bedford Schools. The most significant aspect of this expansion has been the establishment of a new primary unit in the McKelvie School. This move was necessary in order to preserve the integrity of the non-graded form of school organization in the face of rapidly increasing enrollments at this level.

The primary goal of non-grading is to provide the opportunity for vertical movement within the grade levels encompassed by this form of organization. With only 14 rooms available at the Memorial School, 12 of which are free to use as classrooms, taking into consideration the need for a library and an art room, it was evident that the Memorial School could house only those youngsters ordinarily in the first and second grades and eventually only children in their first year of school. By doing this we would be automatically limiting our vertical movement to two years creating a situation that would allow only for a sophisticated type of homogeneous, horizontal grouping. By redistributing the youngsters on the basis of residence, we were able to create a situation where two heterogeneous units encompassing the first four grades, providing for vertical movement, and comprised of a suitable number of youngsters from each age level, became a possibility. At this writing the development of each unit has progressed at a satisfactory rate.

The Middle School concept has been refined considerably during the current school year. A modular type of scheduling has been adopted that allows for greater flexibility than was previously possible. All of the subject areas in grades 6, 7, and 8 are also scheduled concurrently so as to allow freedom of movement between the various groups when necessary.

The primary change in the area of curriculum has been the addition of a reading supervisor in grades 1-8. The reading supervisor works on a clinical basis with youngsters having a specific reading problem. She also teaches developmental reading to the youngsters in grades 7-8 who can benefit from this type of instruction. Through the medium of the reading consultant it is also possible to coordinate the program to a greater degree than was previously possible and to allow for continuous evaluation.

French instruction has been added in grades 5-8 with the addition of a full time teacher in this area. A fully equipped language lab has also been included to make possible instruction via the audio-lingual approach. The program has been implemented fully in grades 5 and 7 and on a modified basis in grades 6 and 8. It will be fully implemented during the coming year. It is our belief that through the introduction of a foreign language at this early age the children will have the opportunity to learn the sounds, basic speech habits and culture patterns of a different people while keeping on a competitive level with the Manchester youngsters who are now receiving foreign language instruction in the new junior high schools

Our pupil services have been significantly improved with our second year of guidance at the elementary level. All of the beginning children were administered a comprehensive battery of readiness tests prior to the start of school. This enabled the receiving school to accurately assess the readiness level of each youngster and to determine at what point in the continuum the youngster should begin formal school activity.

The Guidance Counselor has also worked closely with the children at each level in order to coordinate the program and provide the most suitable instruction possible for each child.

Bedford is once again participating in Tittles I, II, and III of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965. In conjunction with the town of Merrimack we are engaged in cooperative Title I project in the area of special education. Four Merrimack youngsters are transported daily to the McKelvie special class while the special services of a psychiatrist and teacher aide along with additional equipment have been added to the program. Bedford will receive approximately \$4,400.00 through Title I.

Title II of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of

1965 provides for the purchase of library resources, textbooks, and other printed and published materials. Bedford will receive approximately \$1,635.60 in library materials through this title.

Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965 is administered through the U. S. Office of Education and is designed to provide supplementary educational centers to service large areas of the state. Along with other communities in the Greater Manchester area Bedford is participating in a project called "Center for Arts Exposure" administered through the Manchester Institute of Arts and Sciences. This project is designed to bring professional practitioners of the visual and performing arts into the school in order that children might be exposed to the aesthetic qualities inherent in a program of this type.

In closing I would like to thank the School Board and yourself for your direction and guidance, Mr. Ryerson and Mr. Little for their unfailing cooperation and finally the citizens of Bedford for their commitment to excellence in the school program.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Innovations in education have continually been squeezed into a traditional time-block organization. The 45-60 minute period has been followed by most schools for many years. As traditional programs disappeared, schools continued the daily period of pre-determined length restricting the number of offerings and the opportunity for flexibility.

At the McKelvie School we have taken an important step towards eliminating the time barrier. We have attempted to give our program the ultimate in flexibility and have provided for the future expansion of our present program as well as to allow for new approaches and innovations.

The adoption of a Modular type schedule, in place of periods, has provided us with the organization needed to cope with advancing programs and curriculum. Twelve modules per day have been scheduled. Students meet for 8 modules per week in each of the major subject areas and from 2-6 modules per week in other instructional areas.

This organizational pattern has given our program:

- A. UNLIMITED FLEXIBILITY.
- B. ADDITIONAL OFFERINGS TO OUR CURRICULUM.
- C. AN OPPORTUNITY TO INCLUDE SPECIAL ACTIVITIES TO OUR DAILY SCHEDULE.
- D. MORE TIME FOR INSTRUCTION IN ALL AREAS.

FLEXIBILITY:

- 1. Students are grouped homogeneously in each subject area.
- 2. Students may move vertically in each subject area as their performance warrants.
- 3. Large and small group instruction is carried on in each subject area.
- 4. Team-teaching is carried on at every opportunity.
- 5. Groups are combined for enrichment activities.
- 6. Library facilities are available at any time during the school day.
- 7. Length of time spent in any area can be altered to meet the needs of the individual or group.

CURRICULUM:

- 1. French has been introduced.
- 2. A program in Study Skills has been initiated.
- 3. Developmental Reading has been expanded.
- 4. Laboratory usage has been made available to all students.
- 5. A Remedial Reading Program has been initiated.
- 6. An Electronic Lab has been made available to all classes.
- 7. Research Areas have been organized for individuals or groups.
- 8. Instruction in Library usage has been implemented.

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES:

- 1. Band.
- 2. Chorus.
- 3. Dramatics.
- 4. Science Club.
- 5. French Club.
- 6. Math Club
- 7. Audio-visual Club.
- 8. Educational movies.
- 9. Library periods.

TIME:

All areas receive more time for instruction and the opportunity to provide each student with his own time schedule is at hand.

At McKelvie we attempt to set a wholesome environment; an environment that will allow students to progress according to their ability; one that encourages students to take the initiative and responsibility that they must face in the near future as citizens. The development of the whole-child is the concern of the entire staff and administration.

The future holds a great deal of promise for the children of Bedford. Advances in programming, curriculum, and facilities will provide each individual with a sound education. Planning is nearly completed for:

- 1. Expansion of the French program.
- 2. Individualized instruction.
- 3. Development of curriculum guides.

- 4. Expanded research facilities.
- 5. Individualized programming.
- 6. Accelerated grouping.
- 7. Cross-grading.

At the primary level the non-graded organization is moving ahead in leaps and bounds, removing all barriers that restrict growth and performance. Continued research and planning will place Bedford at the top of the Educational ladder.

It has been my pleasure to serve the citizens of Bedford for these past two years.

Dear Mr. Leavitt

The past year has certainly brought a great change in the educational structure in Bedford. The closing of the Stevens-Buswell School, and the reorganization of the ungraded primary unit consumed much of the time and energies of the administrative and teaching staffs of both schools. However, I am happy to report that all of the pre-planning made it possible to maintain the ungraded program at the Memorial School at a high level of efficiency, and enabled the McKelvie School ungraded primary unit to launch its new program successfully.

The afore-mentioned change made it possible for us to add one more year to our continuous progress plan and affords Mrs. Ronald Hale and Miss Helen Andersen an opportunity to become more closely attached to our program. Due to the addition of our fourth year students we have expanded our curriculum from ten to twelve levels of achievement and progress.

The average pupil-teacher ratio at Memoiral School is 23.8 students per homeroom. This factor plus several others, such as, a centralized library and a remedial reading teacher has made the educational climate at the school a very healthy one indeed.

Mrs. John Ton, a former teacher-aide at the school has proven to be a valuable asset in the functioning of the administrative section of the school.

Mr. Gordon Ellison is now our full time custodian. It would be difficult to find a harder working, and more efficient man.

Of course, in a report such as this, it is perhaps a dangerous practice to identify individuals for special recognition as it is quite easy to overlook someone who should not be. However, the following individuals and their contributions to the children of the school have been and are noteworthy.

Mrs. William Hutton our part time librarian without whom our library certainly would be less efficiently run.

Miss Mary Ann Ganem has been a wonderful addition to our staff in her capacity as reading teacher. Miss Ganem has helped many children and teachers to pinpoint reading weaknesses and has developed programs to help strengthen them.

Mrs. Norman Stahl of the New Hampshire Council for Better Schools is to be commended in organizing the volunteer program for our library. Thanks to the efforts of Mrs. Stahl and the volunteers we are able to keep the library open at all times.

The school cafeteria personnel under the leadership of Mrs. Edwin Gott have consistently done a fine job.

Mrs. Arthur Bostwick, R.N., continues her role as our much appreciated school nurse.

The children always look forward to meeting with Mrs. Clifford Ostergren, Music Supervisor and Mrs. Arthur Kurlansky, Art Director.

Mr. William Wilson, Physical Education Director, had to modify his program somewhat due to the growth at the McKelvie School, but continues to run a very sound program for the children.

Miss Cynthia Mowles in a year-and-a-half has implemented a Guidance Program that has proven itself invaluable to our children.

Much to the credit of the school board, we have been involved in an in-depth study of the educational situation here in Bedford. The study has been organized by the New England School Development Council (NESDEC) and has afforded the staff at the Memorial School an opportunity to meet with educational leaders from Boston College, Harvard University, and Tufts University. We are looking forward to continuing our associations with these educational leaders in the months to come.

With a greater acceptance of the ungraded school in New Hampshire, we find that more and more educators are coming to visit the school. This year one assistant superintendent of schools, a half dozen principals, and some fifteen teachers have come to visit.

The play area of the school is in the process of being beautified. All of the play area to left and rear of the school is being regraded, and the playground equipment relocated in a more central location. Much of the regraded area will then be hardtopped and the remaining area seeded.

Room One of the buildings has been utilized to serve as a classroom and materials center for music and remedial reading. It also houses an intsructional materials center in reading and mathematics for the staff.

In the final analysis, the quality of a school is inseparably equated with the quality of the instructional staff. Fortunately, for the children of the Memorial School they have a highly skilled and devoted teaching staff.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the School Board and the Administrative Staff of the Superintendent's Office for their continued support.

To the citizens of Bedford:

This is the second year that a guidance program has been in effect in the Bedford schools. Throughout the past year the program has undergone changes in an attempt to best meet the needs of the students.

We are of the opinion that the steps taken when a child enters the first grade and when a child graduates from the eighth grade are of paramount importance. For this reason a substantial amount of time is spent with these children to facilitate their transition.

This past spring 115 incoming first graders were tested. Each child was individually administered a Gesell Developmental Test. The results of this test give us an indication of the rate at which the child is developing and also indicates the degree of his maturity. The Metropolitan Readiness Test was also administered in groups of six to eight children. The Metropolitan tests the more academic areas such as the child's knowledge of letters and numbers — and his ability to listen and follow directions. All of these results, along with recommendations from the kindergarten teachers, are considered when grouping the children in their first grade classrooms. By testing in the spring we are able to more accurately group the children; thus class changes will not be necessary during those first crucial weeks in the first grade. Early testing also helps in identifying problems to which parents should be alerted for correction before the child begins school. In some cases it is suggested that the child would profit from "growing another year" before beginning school.

At the other extreme in our school program we have our eighth graders. Last year each eighth grader had an individual conference to help plan his high school program and to discuss any concerns that he might have about attending high school. This year we hope to enlarge this part of our program and involve the parents to a greater extent. The first step will be to invite the parents to review with us their child's eighth grade testing scores and also the results of his interest inventory. At this time the freshman year program at West High School will also be explained. This will give the parents an opportunity to discuss the alternatives with their children at home before the children come for their conference and select their courses. Hopefully, all of our eighth graders will be given a "positive start" on their high school careers.

Parents are always urged to come in for conferences; it is not necessary to wait for a problem to arise! Conferences may be held to discuss the overall school program, to explain class placements, to review test results, to plan for future schooling — or to discuss a problem.

Appointments for individual counseling and testing may be made by the staff, the parents, or the child himself. Sometimes it is necessary to meet with the child on only one occasion, while other children are seen more frequently on a regular basis.

The weakest link in our program is the lack of personnel. With only one guidance counselor and over nine hundred students, there are not enough hours in the day to meet with all of the students. Hopefully additional staff will be added in the future.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the staff; Mrs. Bostwick, school nurse; Mr. Little and Mr. Ryerson, our principals; Mr. Leavitt and Mr. Dolloff; the School Board; and the parents of Bedford for their cooperation and encouragement.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the Citizens of Bedford:

For the first time in the history of the town, a full time nurse was hired in the school system beginning in September 1966. I have served as this nurse since then and have found it a most rewarding and happy experience.

This change over involved not much more than a continuation of the procedures followed for the past years except with two days added to the week and many students to the enrollment as well as my own acclimation and adjustment to a program having few established guidelines. All of which consumed my full-time attention and my plans for a more comprehensive program of good health presentations and poor health preventions has had to be postponed to the future when I hope to develop my time allotment, by compromise or cunning, to include the features.

Since the closing of the Stevens-Buswell School, my week is divided between the two schools in a fairly consistent pattern of three days at McKelvie and two days at Memorial, subject to change by the ring of the phone for emergencies.

In April, as usual, we held our pre-school registration clinic at the Town Hall for all children five years and nine months or over by September, who would enter first grade in the fall. Dr. Manning and Dr. Kennard were the examining physicians with the assistance of nurses from the other schools in the union. This is a pleasant and helpful exchange that has been in practice for the past few years. We also had the kind assistance of local nurses and women of the town. We registered 119 first graders at this clinic, picking up more during the summer months to a final census of 126 by September. Registration slips are sent to the parents of all eligible children, currently listed in our census file, prior to the registration date, to be filled out at home and brought with the child to facilitate the procedure at the clinic.

There are no vaccinations given at the time of registration, but these may be obtained at one of the Well-Child clinics sponsored by the Women's Club of Bedford and held during the spring months, or by the family doctor. All children who have not been vaccinated for reasons of allergies or skin conditions must be re-

checked by their doctor after the stated time, usually one year, and their certificate or excuse sent to the school nurse. Parents who do not register their child at this clinic may do so at a published time and place in the month of August, presenting a birth certificate, proof of vaccination and a physical report from their doctor.

Our annual school physcials are held as soon as possible after the opening of school in September. These physicals include all students except the first grade. Our School Physician, Dr. Manning, commented on the very small number of neglected teeth he found during the physicals, due, I am sure to the excellent programming of visitations set up by the dentists and the conscientious adherence of parents to such appointments. There has been a change in our visual testing program. Beginning in 1966, the school district engaged the services of a team of optometrists to do our visual screening and I would like to express my appreciation to the parents for their cooperation in following up and returning the referall slips sent home concerning those children needing attention.

During the year we have had a normal smattering of communicable diseases, none of which reached epidemic proportions and the common cold accounted for more absenteeism than any other factor. I have purposely excluded a statistical report of the various ailments, illnesses, and operations that have occured during the year for I feel this count to be inaccurate, time consuming, and serving no useful purpose. I do make separate reports of such pertinent facts of health statuts to the superintendent's office in Hudson and to the State Department of Education in Concord each year.

Because of questions on the part of several parents and the feeling that there may be a misunderstanding on this point, I would like to state that the school nurse is not allowed, by law, to administer oral medication. The exception being made only at the written request of the parents when a prescribed medication needs to be given during school hours. During the year there are available throughout the state, educational seminars and lectures on the different phases of Public Health and Child Welfare and I have enjoyed and benefited by my attendance at such meetings. I have also taken a course at St. Anselm's this past year and am planning to take advantage of courses offered this coming year.

In conclusion, I would like to express my thanks to Gladys Smend, former school nurse, who so helpfully started me on my way; to Mr. Ryerson and Mr. Little, our principals, whose sincere and hearty cooperation helped make my adjustment to the school family

so easy and happy; to all the staff and faculty of both schools; to Mrs. Ton and Mrs. Kelly, whose kindnesses and help have been invaluable; to Miss Mowles, our guidance counselor, whose counseling has added greatly to my understanding and insight into many areas of my duties and to whom I am very grateful; to the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Leavitt, and his assistant, Mr. Dolloff and the School Board, who have all contributed to making my past year so pleasant.

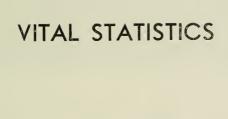
